

ment House Bill 246, passed by the 67th Texas Legislature, which mandated revision of the public school curriculum. The law requires that 12 subject areas be included in each school district's curriculum. Those subject areas are English language arts; other languages, to the extent possible; mathematics; science; health; physical education; fine arts; social studies; economics, with emphasis on the free enterprise system and its benefits; business education; vocational education; and Texas and United States history as individual subjects and in reading classes.

Mendez was taken to Plains Memorial Hospital for emergency treatment, then was transferred to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo, where he underwent surgery to relieve pressure on the brain caused by a skull fracture and concussion. He also received a broken collarbone.

However, after 72 hours in intensive and intermediate care units, Mendez was in good condition and visiting with friends in his hospital room.

"I'm a little sore, but other than that I'm doing fine," Mendez told the News Wednesday morning. "There's a scar about eight inches long on the back of my skull."

Mendez, a sophomore aeronautical engineering major at UT-Austin, said he swerved off of the farm road to avoid another vehicle that was coming toward him.

"I had been downtown visiting with friends, talking and dragging Main, and was on my way home," Mendez said. "Right when I got to the intersection of Front Street I saw headlights coming toward me and I swerved to miss them. The headlights were in my lane, coming toward me. But I don't think the car stopped after the accident, because the police didn't say anything about it."

Preliminary damage estimates totaled more than \$50,000 to the vehicles, garage building and shop equipment. Williams said he had been buying and storing automotive equipment and parts in the garage while preparing to open an independent service garage downtown, and that much of the equipment was destroyed or heavily damaged.

Agriculture will offer special "Harvest for PIK" loans to cotton farmers who do not have enough upland cotton under Commodity Credit Corporation loan to satisfy their PIK requirements.

Rank said a special procedure will be available for those producers who are required to harvest 1983 cotton for PIK but do not want a regular loan. Two options are available at the time the loan is made: the producer may receive the PIK cotton immediately and the proceeds from sale of cotton to CCC after the PIK availability date, or receive the proceeds immediately and the PIK cotton after the PIK availability date.

CCC will pay warehouse storage charges through the date the producer redeems his loan to satisfy his PIK requirements unless the producer elects not to pay the loan service fee.

Family Civil War quilt to be donated to museum

By LINDA MAXWELL A hand-sewn quilt made by Susan Robb during the Civil War was donated to the Texas Tech Museum in Lubbock Monday.

Donating the quilt were Susan Robb's surviving great-grandchildren, J. R. Petersen of Lorenzo, Mary Lois Campbell Miller of Albuquerque, N.M., Tom F. Robb of Florence, Colo., and Don R. Robb of Idalou. Susan, the wife of Henry Robb, was living in Chicot County, Ark. at the time she made the quilt, according to family history. Fashioned of nine large blocks, the border blocks stitches are very small all contain large flower designs in the colors of red, green, yellow and orange. Figures of birds are placed throughout the design, and they are made from materials of red, orange and purple. The cherries stemming from the flower designs are red, purple and blue. The border stars are red. The center block depicts two groups of soldiers, marching two abreast, led by a single man on foot and a single man on horseback. Detailed embroidery and quilting stitches form the faces and clothing and other details of the pictures. On one corner of the center block the design depicts a pelican (bird of the South) knocking an eagle (bird of the North) off of a stump, indicating Susan's feelings about the war, family history says.




