3 jailed on arson charges

Chief deputy says they stole pickup and set it on fire

Three Howard County residents have been arrested in connection with a stolen truck that was set afire at a location on Gail Highway, according to local law enforcement officials.

Shane Allen Knowlton, arrested was Wednesday by Howard County Sheriff's Office on charges arson, evading arrest/detention and unauthorized use of a motor vehicle.

Cassandra Kathleen Villa, 18, and Quinten Lee Little, 19, were arrested Thursday and also charged with arson and unauthorized use of a motor vehicle. According to HCSO

Chief Deputy Mark Hall, the trio are accused of stealing brown Chevrolet Z71 pickup from a residence on S. Highway 87.

"We received a report of a vehicle fire on Gail Highway the morning of March 11," said Hall. "We responded, along with the fire department. Shortly after the fire was reported, the owner of the vehicle reported it missing. "We investigated the

incident for possible insurance fraud, but found nothing to indicate that's what had happened. The truck was a total loss, but it wasn't completely destroyed and we were able to recover evidence from the wreckage."

Nowitzki's late 3-pointer delivers Dallas important win over Utah

DALLAS — A playoff spot, 50 wins and a second straight tight victory over an elite team.

Just a few weeks ago, the Dallas Mavericks didn't seem capable of pulling off any of those. Now, they're doing it all.

Dirk Nowitzki immediately answered a banked-in, gametying 3-pointer from Deron Williams by running down the court and swishing a 3 of his own with 0.9 seconds left, giving Dallas a 97-94 victory over the Utah Jazz and two nice bonuses a clinched playoff berth and win No. 50.

"How do you leave the MVP wide open? It's unbelievable," teammate Jason Terry said.

"I heard people say we wouldn't even make the playoffs, but now we're in," Terry added. "Tonight, we took another step in the right direction. We have to treat all these games like playoff games. We have a long way to go but winning games like these is

Nowitzki scored 32 points and Terry had 21, all coming in the second half. The duo scored 25 of Dallas' 30 points in the fourth quarter. They had to step up because Josh Howard left in the third with a bruised right knee. He hurt it on Sunday running into Shaquille O'Neal, then aggravated it in the first half. He tried coming back at the start and end of the third quarters, "but couldn't do much," he said.

"I'm going to get some rest and be ready to get back out there," Howard said. Dallas plays Saturday in Portland and Sunday in Seattle, then returns home for the season finale Wednesday against New Orleans.

The Mavs don't have to do scoreboard-watching much between now and then. This win, coupled with a loss by Golden State, locks up a playoff spot. Dallas has a two-game edge on Denver for the No. 7 seed.

Getting to 50 wins is significant, too. The Mavs have done that and made the playoffs for eight straight seasons. San Antonio is the only other team that can make the same claim, though the Spurs have nine in a

San Antonio also has four titles in that span, while Dallas is seeking its first. That's why the club made the bold move of trading for Jason Kidd in February. The deal was starting to look like a mistake when the Mavs were skidding into late March, especially when Nowitzki went out with ankle and knee injuries.

Rangers sweep doubleheader from O's

ARLINGTON — Now the Baltimore Orioles have a streak they don't want to extend.

The surprising O's (6-3), still tied for the American League's best record, had their six-game winning streak — already matching their longest of last season abruptly ended Thursday in a doubleheader sweep by the Texas Rangers.

"It's a long day," manager Dave Trembley said. "It's much longer when you lose."

Kinsler's hit was a hard shot that shortstop Luis Hernandez couldn't backhand, and the third consecutive one-out single against Chad Bradford (0-1). That scored Ben Broussard, who had moved up to third on Adam Melhuse's hit

Jamey Wright (1-0) worked 2 1-3 innings in relief of starter Kason Gabbard before Wilson pitched his second 1-2-3 inning of the day for his third save of the season.

"Our pitching has been incredible," shortstop Michael Young said. "They've been leading the way for us. ... We know we have a lot of guys capable of doing special things.'

In the opener, Kevin Millwood (1-2) allowed one run in seven innings to lower his ERA to 1.29 and finally get a victory to show for his solid pitching this season. Joaquin Benoit then struck out three of the four batters he faced before their left-handed closer took over.

Young, who scored twice in the opener, hit a solo homer in the first inning of the nightcap. Milton Bradley had a two-run double and David Murphy an RBI single in the third off Adam Loewen for a 4-1 lead.

Rose leads after first day at Masters

AUGUSTA, Ga. — The Masters had a familiar feel Thursday, from the warmth of a spring garden to the pockets of cheers that celebrated spectacular shots, even to some of the names on the leaderboard.

Justin Rose was at the top after 18 holes, the third straight time he's managed that.

Tiger Woods couldn't break 70 on the first day for the 12th straight year.

The four-time Masters champion failed to make a birdie at Augusta National for the first

2003, although there was no reason to panic. He chipped in for eagle from 25 feet behind the 15th green to salvage an even-par 72, leaving him four shots behind Rose and co-leader Trevor Immelman.

Woods didn't sound terribly worried.

"I played a lot better than what my score indicates," he said. "I kept myself in the tournament. I'm right there."

So is Rose, and that's becoming a tradition like no other at the Masters — at least on Thursday.

The 27-year-old Englishman overcame a sluggish start with

time since the opening round in four straight birdies that carried history, a warm afternoon of sunhim to a 68. The trick now is to figure out how to stay there over the next three days.

Rose led through 36 holes in 2004 until stumbling to an 81 in the third round. He was tied for the lead after 18 holes last year and stayed in the hunt all week until a late collapse on Sunday.

"Eventually you've got to say, 'OK, it's time to step up," Rose said. "But I'm not putting too much pressure on myself."

Pressure might come from the course.

Unlike last year, when Augusta was brisk and brittle and the scores were among the highest in

shine and only a light breeze brought back some of the scoring and sounds of cheering — on the fabled course.

"I think the golf course is right where they want it," Rose said. "They can take it whichever direction they would like. If they want to create some birdies, they can do that. And if they want to make par a good score, that could be done. It's probably perfect right now."

Immelman played that way, keeping bogeys off his card in his best start at the Masters.

But Kidd started asserting himself and Dallas has taken off, winning six of the last seven, with victories over Phoenix and Golden State in that span.

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

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

10 strikes against nuclear power

n a sure sign of progress for green energy advocates, all of the candidates left in the race for president at least pay lip service to a renewable energy future.

Hillary Clinton and Barack Obama have openly competed in debates to sound the greenest, and John McCain has been quoted as supporting renewables, even while leaving the door open to question climate change. As

McCain told Katie

Couric in December: "Suppose ... there's no such thing as climate change, and we adopt green technologies. Then we've just left our kids a better world."

Unfortunately, even with all this talk of a better world, not a single presidential candidate has taken nuclear power off the table, despite its well-known risks, and its inability to mitigate the climate crisis. With the following ten strikes against it, nuclear power should be out::

1) Nuclear waste — The waste from nuclear power plants is toxic for humans and the planet for more than 100,000 years. It's untenable now to secure and store all of the waste from the plants that exist. With nuclear proponents saying we need as many as 3,000 more plants (some say it's more like 17,000) to scale up to meet the climate challenge, nuclear waste containment is unthinkable.

2) Nuclear proliferation — In discussing the proliferation issue, Al Gore said, "During my eight years in the White House, every nuclear weapons proliferation issue we

dealt with was connected to a nuclear reactor program." Iran and North Korea are reminding us of this every day. We can't develop a domestic nuclear energy program without confronting proliferation in other countries.

3) National Security — Nuclear reactors represent a clear national security risk, and an attractive target for terrorists.

4) Accidents — Forget terrorism for a moment, and remember that accidents — human error or natural disasters — can wreak havoc at a nuclear power plant site. The Chernobyl disaster forced the evacuation and resettlement of nearly 400,000 people, with thousands poisoned by radiation.

5) Cancer — There are growing concerns that living near even accident-free nuclear plants increases the risk for childhood leukemia and other cancers. One Texas study found increased cancer rates in north central Texas since a nuclear power plant was established in 1990, and a recent German study found childhood leukemia clusters near several

nuclear power sites in Europe. 6) Not enough sites — Nuclear plants must locate near a source of water for cooling, and there aren't enough worldwide locations safe from droughts, flooding, hurricanes, earthquakes or other disasters that could trigger an accident. More than 24 nuclear plants are at risk of shutting down this year because of drought in the Southeast.

7) Not enough uranium — Even if we could find enough sites for a new generation of nuclear plants, we're running out of the uranium necessary to power them. Scientists in both the U.S. and U.K. have shown that if nuclear

power were expanded to provide all the world's electricity, our uranium would be depleted in ten years.

8) Costs — Some types of energy production experience decreasing costs to scale. Like computers and cell phones, when you make more solar panels, costs come down. Nuclear power, however, will experience increasing costs to scale. Due to dwindling sites and uranium resources, each successive new nuclear power plant will see its costs rise.

9) Private sector unwilling to finance — Due to all of the above, the private sector has largely taken a pass on the financial risks of nuclear power, leading the industry to seek taxpayer loan guarantees from Congress instead.

And finally, even if all of the above didn't exist, nuclear power still can't be a climate solution because there is ...

10) No time — We have the next ten years to mount a global effort against climate change. It simply isn't possible to build enough new plants in 10 years.

Solar power, wind power, geothermal, and aggressive energy efficiency are climate solutions that are safer, cheaper, faster, more secure and less wasteful

than nuclear power. With so many strikes against nuclear power, we should challenge our candidates for higher office to remove it from the table as a climate solution, and turn our energies toward the technologies and strategies that can truly make a difference.
