

Mavs top Hornets in playoff preview

DALLAS Dirk ____ Nowitzki came right out and said it: The Dallas Mavericks did not want to open the playoffs against the Los Angeles Lakers.

They'd much rather take their chances against the New Orleans Hornets – especially after the way things went Wednesday night.

Jason Kidd and Jason Terry outplayed Hornets star Chris Paul, with Kidd racking up the 100th triple-double of his career and Terry scoring 13 of his 30 points during a 32-8 stretch that took Dallas from down by 11 to leading by 13. The Mavericks wound up winning 111-98 to set up a first-round between these series teams. "This was definitely a win we wanted to get," Nowitzki said. "The Lakers are probably the hottest team in the West. We definitely didn't want to face them in the first round. ... (New Orleans) had a great year, but I think we match up pretty well." The Hornets came in locked into the No. 2 seed Western in the Conference. To avoid the Mavericks, New Orleans had to win and have Denver win later Wednesday. Coach Byron Scott decided to go for it, sticking with his starters after taking a 50-48 lead at half- See MAVS, Page 2B

Paul agreed, even if he can't speak from experience. The closest he's gotten to the postseason is attending the last two NBA finals as a spectator. "The playoffs are a whole different game," he said. "Tonight they came out with a lot to prove, whether they played us or the Lakers. We definitely wanted to win but we also knew we also had the second seed." The teams tied 2-2 in the season series; it was 1-1 after Kidd joined the Mavericks.

Spurs pound Jazz for home court advantage

SAN ANTONIO The San Antonio Spurs made it clear they're ready to embark on their quest for back-to-back NBA titles.

The Spurs dominated the Utah Jazz 109-80 on Wednesday night to lock up the No. 3 seed in the Western Conference — the same as they had last season — and set up a first-round series against the rival Phoenix Suns, who have the sixth seed.

"We knew that we wanted to go into the playoffs on a positive note. It didn't matter who we were playing," guard Michael Finley said. "I knew we were going to come out with the aggression that we needed and that's what happened."

The No. 4 seed Jazz will take on

in a repeat of last year's first round, which Utah won in seven games.

The Spurs' win, coupled with Houston's victory earlier Wednesday evening, firmed up seeds 3-6 in the West, which were still up in the air on the last day of the regular season.

Despite the lower seed, Houston will have home-court advantage against the Jazz, who secured that spot because they won the Northwest Division.

While the Jazz were guaranteed either the third or fourth seed no matter what happened Wednesday, the Spurs had the potential to drop as low as sixth. Tony Parker had 24 points and 12 assists for San Antonio in the easy win. Tim Duncan added 14 points and 11 rebounds, and four

the fifth-seeded Houston Rockets other Spurs scored in double digits.

> C.J. Miles led the Jazz with 12 points. Mehmet Okur scored 11 and Carlos Boozer had 10 rebounds.

> "We're just going to move forward, not dwell on it too much," Boozer said. "We've had a hell of a season, and we'll get ready for Houston."

> The San Antonio-Phoenix matchup could be the best of the first round. The two met in the second round last season and the Spurs eliminated the Suns in six games on their way to their fourth title in nine seasons. But with the Eastern Conference weaker last year. many considered the Spurs-Suns series as on par with a finals matchup.

It certainly lived up to expectations by featuring plenty of bumps and bruises, suspensions, controversial fouls and harsh words between the teams.

But the usually fast-moving, high-scoring Suns are a different team this postseason. They acquired Shaquille O'Neal in a blockbuster trade and have been melding him into their system to give the team a defensive boost.

"Shaq slows them down a little bit," Manu Ginobili said. "So they gain a lot in one part, but they lose a little bit in another part. Still, Shaq is Shaq and you have to respect that."

Phoenix won the season series against the Spurs 3-1, including a 96-79 rout April 9 in San Antonio.

The Rockets are playing without Yao Ming, but had one of the season's headlines as they went

Rangers win in 14th inning on wild pitch

TORONTO - A.J. Burnett's wild pitch led to a wild win for the Texas Rangers.

Frank Catalanotto scored the go-ahead run on Burnett's wild pitch in the 14th inning and the Texas Rangers beat the Toronto Blue Jays 7-5 Wednesday night, snapping a five-game losing streak.

"We certainly showed some fight and a lot of character tonight," Texas manager Ron Washington said. "We got the monkey off our backs."

With the bullpen depleted, Burnett (1-1) relieved in the 14th, his first relief appearance since Oct. 13, 2004, with Florida at Philadelphia. Burnett, who started in Texas on Sunday. became Toronto's ninth pitcher of the game, tying a team record.

Gerald Laird greeted Burnett with a single and went to third on Catalanotto's one-out double just inside the first-base line.

With the infield in, Laird tried to score on Michael Young's grounder and was thrown out at the plate. Catalanotto moved to third on

later when Burnett threw a pitch through catcher Gregg Zaun's legs.

Catalanotto said third base coach Matt Walbeck warned him to look out for a ball in the dirt.

"Two seconds before it happened he said, 'Cat, be ready for a wild pitch," Catalanotto said. "I got an extra five feet and I was ready for it. Once it got by I knew I had a chance to score.

"(Burnett) throws a pretty nasty curveball so you've got to be ready at all times when he's on the mound," he added.

Zaun shouldered the blame for letting Burnett's pitch reach the backstop.

"It's frustrating," Zaun said. "It's one thing when the other team takes it to you and beats you. But when something as simple as a ball getting between my legs is possibly the difference in the ballgame, that's hard to swallow."

Josh Hamilton followed with an RBI double. Hamilton finished 4-for-7 and drove in two runs — for the first time in seven games, he did not score. Burnett said he'll be ready



The practice was widespread, lucrative and totally illegal. In one instance, it delivered a \$70 million bonus to Apple founder Steve Jobs.

story — often approvingly quoting Adam Smith: Ronald Reagan called for liberating business from government interference, in order to let the free market work its wonders. But in practice. Reaganite policy has jiggered the system to redirect money, resources and power upward. It is not the free market that creates inequality; it is the thousand little ratchets — taxes, subsidies, regulatory loopholes, failed enforcement, giveaways and outright graft — that direct a free lunch to

the top 0.1 percent. Johnston's new book, Free Lunch, catalogs ratchets, old and new, big and small, familiar and unfamiliar: Local and state governments give away land and tax privileges to national chains — at the expense not only of taxpayers, but of local businesses. Unregulated hedge funds, playing with investments from our pension funds, threaten our financial security. CSX Railroad, under former Bush Treasury Secretary John Snow, deliberately cut back safety inspections and repairs, at the cost of hundreds of deaths and injuries a year in railway acci-

dents. Burglar-alarm companies connect clients to local police stations, forcing police at taxpayer expense to spend hours of police time checking false alarms. Enron rigged the energy markets while regulators looked away. State regulators allowed insiders to privatize non-profit health insurance organizations like Blue Cross of California, buying them from the public at a small fraction of their value, and then raising premiums and cutting service.

Johnston has missed a few ratchets. One is the privatization of the military, which has fattened defense contractors in the Iraq fiasco. Another is the giveaway of natural resources, notably electromagnetic spectrum. Yet another is the war on drugs, enriching the private prison industry at the expense of taxpayers and of the many unfortunate poor non-violent offenders. (The U.S. now locks up 1 in 100 adults, by far the highest rate among developed countries.)

Free Lunch makes a rousing sequel to Johnston's prior book, Perfectly Legal, an expose of tax loopholes. And there's plenty of material for the next installment.




Obama's projections of bitterness

ne of the silver linings of the mostly dismal presidential campaign has been that Democrats have finally come to see – perhaps admit is a better word that the Clintons are pathological and ruthless power

addicts. But that latecoming epiphany looks increasingly irrelevant, as the ascendancy of Barack Obama delivers a whole new set of deeply troubling concerns.

Democrats — all but

fresh, charismatic figure — are forced to deny or downplay the almost daily revelations about Obama that would have derailed less promising candidates already. But they have to be concerned.

Given Obama's uncompromising liberalism, it was only a matter of time before his pretense toward unity and bipartisanship would be exposed for the mirage that it is. The contentiousness of the Democratic contest has just accelerated the process.

As these damaging items slowly dripped out about Obama, he was able to brush them aside dismissively. You'll recall his refusal to wear a flag pin, his categorical statement that "it would be a profound mistake for us to use nuclear weapons under any circumstances," his assessment that the lives of our fallen soldiers in Iraq have been "wasted," his mindless promise to withdraw troops from Iraq according to an irresponsibly arbitrary timetable and his naive remark that he would attach no preconditions to negotiating with the tyrants of Iran, Syria, Venezuela, Cuba and North Korea.

The cumulative force of Obama's common-themed actions and statements would have compelled even a statistician to doubt they could be attributed to coincidence.

Wasn't an objective pattern emerging to suggest that Obama would hardly be the fiercest guardian of America's national security interests?

Nor have reports of his voluntary alliances and allegiances done anything to remove those doubts. Everyone paying attention knows by now that a number of people intimately associated with Obama have made derogatory statements about this nation he seeks to lead. His wife, Michelle, stunned peo-

ple with her admission that Barack's rise to power and the people's hunger for change made her "really proud" of her country "for the first time in (her) adult lifetime." This was his soul mate speaking.

Even more people are aware of the incendiary, vulgar, anti-American and racist tirades of Obama's longtime pastor, Jeremiah Wright. Obama's lip-service condemnation of Wright's statements, which Obama unconvincingly pretended not to have heard, still might have defied all natural laws of credulity and fooled the majority of the people were it not for further shoes that were destined to drop.

Then there's Obama's mysterious association with former Weather Underground terrorist William Ayers — whose group bombed the Capitol, the Pentagon and the State Department in the 1970s — which would have been enough to end any other presidential candidacy. So far, the mainstream media have shown no curiosity about the nature and extent of Obama's relationship with Ayers, despite Ayers' lack of repentance and defiant statements, "I don't regret setting bombs" and "I feel we didn't do enough."

If all this weren't enough to make us wonder whether Obama has issues with America, he made sure we know when telling us that small-town Americans, because of their bitterness about economic hardship, cling to religion, guns and hostility toward immigrants.

With such distorted perceptions about his fellow citizens, it's no wonder Obama appears bitter and angry at this nation. Given his experience with hostility emanating from his own pastor's pulpit, it's not surprising that he sees Middle America through that jaundiced prism and jumps to the perverse conclusion that smalltown Americans turn to God out of bitterness. Obama has some nerve presuming to lecture the rest of us about prejudice and being out of touch with what people think.

Obama couldn't be more wrong about what motivates people to seek a relationship with God. Though this may not compute for the liberation-theology mindset, it seems to me people turn to God in humble repentance, seeking forgiveness for their own sins and shortcomings rather than validation for their bitterness and permission to continue sinning. They go in pursuit of that "hope" Obama waxes so eloquently about, but they tend to place their reliance on God rather than government as the source of their hope.

More and more, when Obama talks about the alleged "antipathy" people have toward "people who aren't like them," one can't help but speculate whether he's projecting his own feelings of antipathy and bitterness toward others and the nation.

Even Obama's slick tongue will have difficulty deflecting the conclusion that his assessment of God-loving Americans as embittered, gun-toting nativists is of a piece with his wife's regrettable remarks and the disturbing fulminations of his beloved pastor.

If Obama wants to hold himself out as a tolerant, colorblind uniter, he should do a far better job of walking that walk.



Hundreds arrested in immigration raids at poultry plants

MOUNT PLEASANT (AP) - Federal agents say their case for a series of workplace raids in five states was strengthened by identity theft victims who recounted stories of plummeting credit scores and medical benefits denied.

Federal authorities carried out the sweeps Wednesday, arresting hundreds of workers at Pilgrim's Pride chicken plants on charges of identity theft, document fraud and immigration violations.

Authorities also arrested dozens of workers at a doughnut factory in Houston, and the operators of a chain of Mexican restaurants in upstate New York.

Authorities said agents investigating a scheme to provide documents for illegal immigrant workers had tracked down several of the identity theft victims.

ICE said nearly 300 people were arrested, but officials at Pilgrim's Pride Corp., the nation's largest chicken producer, said about 400 hourly, non-management employees were taken into custody.

A federal grand jury in Tyler handed up the indictments on April 1, but they remained sealed until the raids, which began before dawn.

Pittsburg, Texas-based Pilgrim's Pride worked with

Law enforcement chase leads to lockdown

KINGSVILLE (AP) — A truckload of suspected illegal

immigrants fled when pulled over at the Texas A&M University-Kingsville campus, forcing a lockdown of the school for three hours as police chased them, officials said.

The driver of the truck and five others were being held late Wednesday at a Border Patrol station, agency spokesman Daniel Doty said. He did not know about any others who may have also fled the truck.

Doty said the five passengers in Border Patrol custody were illegal immigrants who would likely face unlawful entry charges. He did not know the immi-

gration status of the driver.

The truck driver said he had been forced at gunpoint to take the illegal immigrants to Kingsville, according to Texas Department of Public Safety Trooper Eric Hinojosa. Texas A&M University at Kingsville spokeswoman Jill Scoggins said one person with a gun was taken into custody, but Doty said that had not been confirmed.

Scoggins said no one was hurt. A state trooper stopped a vehicle for speeding, and about 12 people got out of the truck and fled, Hinojosa said.



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

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


