

Masons tab top teacher

Bauer's Chancy named instructor of the year

Like the people say, it takes a special teacher to teach special education.

Sharon Chancy, a special education instructor at Bauer Elementary, was chosen as the Big Spring Independent School District's Teacher of the Year by the local Masonic Staked Plains Lodge Wednesday afternoon.

This marks the fifth year the local Masons have honored a BSISD teacher, and the first year an instructor from Bauer won the award.

"The way I look at it, it takes a special teacher to teach special ed," said Bo Clawson of the Masonic Lodge. "There were three people on the selection committee ... and all three picked (Chancy)." Chancy is finishing her 19th year as a

Chancy is finishing her 19th year as a teacher, all with BSISD. She spent her first three years at now-closed College Heights Elementary, then moved to Bauer.

"This is just a total surprise," she said of the award. "I just feel very honored, very

Murder probe Police follow

Police follow leads in May 4 double killing

Police officials say investigations are ongoing in the May 4 shooting that claimed the lives of two Big Spring residents, but no arrests have been made.

"This is an ongoing investigation, so there's not really a lot I can tell you at this point," said Lt. Terry Chamness, speaking for the Big Spring Police Department. "We are actively looking for suspects at this time, and there are people of interest that we have brought in and questioned. However, no arrests have been made in connection with the shooting at this time."

Valerie Garcia, 20, and Michael Cardona, 21, both of Big Spring, were pronounced dead at Scenic Mountain Medical Center shortly after a shooting was reported at 905 E. 16th St. at 9:38 p.m. Sunday, May 4. According to police reports, Garcia was pregnant at the time of her death.

Also injured in the shooting were an unidentified 3-year-old girl, 19-year-old

nent for water resource conservation, McKinney will be taking over the studies of the Gulf of Mexico for the Harte Research Institute.

"When we started in 1985, environmental review of water permits and consideration for fish and wildlife did not exist," said McKinney. "Today every water permit includes such consideration and the passage of SB-1, SB-2 — and especially SB-3 — will put into place the policy framework that if adopted by the legislature will assure water for fish and wildlife on a statewide basis."

As director of TP&W's coastal fishery division, McKinney — the son of Howard County's own


Flying Thunder to visit Hangar 25 By THOMAS JENKINS

Improvements were obvious from the 2008 version of the Big Spring Steers baseball team when compared to last year's squad.

Evidence of strides being made in the right direction is visible in the alldistrict team which was released earlier this week. Receiving the biggest honor for the Steers from the the District 4-4A coaches was John Benavides, who was named the league's Newcomer of the Year. First-team selections were outfielder Matt Ritchey and utility player Lance Gross. Making the second team was third baseman Jeremy Solis. shortstop Nathan Doporto and outfielder Martin Yanez, giving Big Spring six athletes on the all-star team.That's large improvement after receiving just one nomination last year.

"Hopefully seeing an increase in the amount of kids who made the team shows we've improved a lot," Big Spring Head Coach Burt Otto said. "We're still a little disappointed with not picking up a win in district play, but we made big strides and competed well. We

expect to win more next year."

Benavides shared the newcomer award with Frenship's Tyler Lloyd. The Big Spring junior batted .330 for the year with four doubles and eight RBIs. He also played several positions, including pitcher, catcher and right field.

"John had a pretty decent batting average and I know they coaches from Lubbock Estacado were very impressed with him," Otto said. "Any time you can play two or more positions well then you're going to have a chance to contribute a lot."

Gross was one of just two seniors on the Steers' roster this season with outfielder Jordan Herrod being the other. He was also Big Spring's only alldistrict selection last year.

Gross batted .380 with two doubles, a triple and eight RBIs. More importantly, he provided sound senior leadership for the Steers.

"Lance was a good leader for us this season," commented Otto. "He did a great job leading by example, showing he was willing to play any position.

Apparently, the MVPs in Coahoma stand out more than most as two Bulldogs' baseball players were received MVP status from the District 5-2A's coaches.

Senior Casey Kilpatrick was named the league's Offensive MVP, while junior Donnie Garcia was honored as the Defensive MVP.

Six other Bulldogs received alldistrict recognition with juniors P.J. Daylong and Corey Roberts, sophomore Chance Hart and freshman Adrian Amaro receiving first-team honors while sophomores Ray Gutierrez and Josh Paniagua were named to the second team.

Kilpatrick was the only senior on the 2008 version of the Bulldogs and Head Coach Brad Harman had plenty to say about his cleanup hitter. Kilpatrick led the team with 46 RBIs and batted .402. He had 11 extra-base hits, including three home runs. He also posted a 6-1 record on the mound.

Garcia received the district's most notable defensive award for his work behind the plate at catcher. Only two runners stole second successfully off Garcia this season.

"Donnie was great for us defensively, but he had a very good offensive year, too," Harman said. "Teams have started to pitch around him. He only had one atbat in the playoffs because Ballinger and Blanco both pitched around him. Blanco finally pitched to him in his last at-bat and he hit a double."

Lakers rally past Spurs, take Game 1, 89-85

LOS ANGELES — Even Spurs coach Gregg Popovich knew the Lakers' Kobe Bryant was just biding his time.

"Kobe, he was doing a trust-histeammates thing in the first half," Popovich said. "He was checking it all out and seeing where his territory was going to be. In the second half, he went to work."

With just two points on 1-of-3 shooting at halftime, Bryant scored 27 in the second Wednesday night to rally Los Angeles to an 89-85 victory over San Antonio in the opening game of the Western Conference finals.

"I just tried to see the flow of the game, tried to manage the game," Bryant said of the first two quarters. "I can get it off any time, and in the second half, I did that.

"I know I can make that push

and I knew once I did, I could get the game back under control, get it under 10 where we knew we could be in striking distance," he added.

The Lakers had trailed 65-45 early in the third quarter.

Bryant went 10-of-18 in the second half, including a 10-foot jumper for an 87-85 lead with 24 seconds left. He finished with nine assists and five rebounds.

Pau Gasol had 19 points and seven rebounds for the Lakers, who will try to make it two in a row over the defending NBA champions when the series resumes Friday night at Staples Center.

Tim Duncan led the Spurs with 30 points, 18 rebounds and four blocked shots. Tony Parker had 18 points, 10 rebounds and six assists.

The Spurs went stone cold in the fourth quarter, going 3-of-21,

including 1-of-9 from 3-point range as they were outscored 24-13. Manu Ginobili missed all three of his shots in the fourth, finished the game 3-of-13 and had 10 points.

"They started hitting some shots, all the obvious stuff, and we continued to attack but we couldn't get anything to fall at that point," Duncan said. "Obviously, they're a very good team in the fourth quarter, especially with Kobe."

Asked if it was an especially tough loss because of wasting the big lead, Duncan said, "You have to win four games, so losses are losses. Obviously, we were up 20 and we hoped to put that one away and put them on their heels, but we didn't. We have to recover. We have to come out next game and get that one."

Popovich, asked if he was worried about any carryover to Game

2, smiled and said, "Well, sure. Coaches worry about everything. We've got to dig down deep, forget about this and figure out a way to come back just as aggressively as we (played) the first three quarters."

The Lakers are 7-0 at home in the postseason, and have won 13 straight games at Staples Center overall.

Bryant made his go-ahead jumper after two free throws by Ginobili with 1:22 remaining and a follow shot by Duncan with 41 seconds left tied it at 85. After Bryant's basket, Ginobili missed a 3-pointer and the Lakers' Sasha Vujacic made two free throws with 7.3 seconds.

"We almost gave up home-court advantage to a great effort by the Spurs," Lakers coach Phil Jackson said. "That was a big comeback.



He played more positions in the field than any other player on the team."

This is the third all-district team Ritchey has made this season after being selected as a firstteam tight end in football and a second-team post in basketball.

Ritchey, a sophomore, led the Steers in batting average (.480) and RBIs (14). His batting average is the highest amongst the all-district selections. Ritchey was also Big Spring's ace pitcher, usually pitching in the Steers' first game of the week.

"If you could say we had an ace, then it was Matt,"

Otto said. "We didn't necessarily have a pitcher that stood out among the rest, but Matt usually got on the mound first. He was a big bat for us and someone we knew we could count on."

Every coach has a player who wasn't named to the first team, but believes should have been honored with the selection.

That player for Otto is Solis.

In most circles, the opening lead of an ace against a notrump contract shows a nearly solid suit missing only one honor, and asks partner to play that honor on the ace if he holds

One purpose of dropping the honor is to clarify its location for the opening leader; another purpose is to unblock the suit so that it can be run. If the leader's partner does not have the honor, he gives count instead, playing his lowest card with an odd

number of cards in the suit, and starting a high-low with an even number. Consider this deal where East played the heart three on his partner's ace at trick one. Since the deuce was in dummy, it was easy for West to place East with three low hearts and South with the O-x-x. West now had to decide how to try to reach his partner's hand.

West reasoned that if East had the ace of spades, he would surely gain the lead before declarer could make the contract. The only way South could score nine tricks without a spade trick would be if he held nine cards in the minors, theoretically impossible on the bidding. It was therefore pointless to lead a spade.

West further reasoned that if declarer needed a diamond finesse to score nine tricks, East would win with the king and make the killing heart return. A diamond shift was therefore also without merit.

And so, by elimination, West found the necessary club shift that quickly set the contract after East took the ace and returned a heart. In shifting to the club, West was guarding against the possibility that declarer might have the ace of spades and four diamonds to the king he actually did - and was duly rewarded for his incisive thinking.

Obama begins search Φ for his vice president

WASHINGTON - Likely Democratic nominee Barack Obama has begun a top-secret search for a running mate, fresh signs that the general election campaign is well under way and the primary race against Hillary Rodham Clinton is basically over.

Obama has asked former Fannie Mae CEO Jim Johnson to begin vetting potential vice presidential picks, Democratic officials said Thursday.

Johnson did the same job for Democratic nominees John Kerry in 2004 and Walter Mondale in 1984.

The Democratic officials spoke on a condition of anonymity about a process that the campaign wants to keep quiet.

Vice presidential searches are usually closely held secrets, but Obama campaign officials say the effort is being handled by a particularly tight circle of advisers.

The campaign did not want to discuss the effort because they are still engaged in a fading primary campaign against Hillary Rodham Clinton, with three primaries left in Puerto Rico, South Dakota and Montana. The voting ends June 3.

Obama has repeatedly declined to discuss possible running mates while the primary is ongoing.

"We're not commenting about this process," said Obama spokesman Bill Burton.

But they are taking behind-the-scenes steps to move toward the general election campaign, with just 61 delegates needed to clinch the nomination according to the latest Associated Press count.

Obama has 1,965 delegates to Clinton's 1,780, with 2,026 required to secure the party's nod under Democratic National Committee rules.

The Obama campaign is rapidly adding to its campaign staff, both at the headquarters and in general election swing states. Obama has been traveling to some of those battlegrounds — Missouri, Michigan, Iowa and Florida in the last nine days - while the campaign is registering voters across the country for the November vote. And top Obama organizer Paul Tewes is in discussions to take over the Democratic National Committee.

It's all part of an effort to lay the groundwork for an aggressive kickoff to a general election campaign. Republican John McCain has a head start and has been building his effort for several months since the **GOP** primary race wrapped up in early March.

McCain is hosting at least three Republicans mentioned as potential vice presidential running mates at his Sedona, Ariz., home this weekend -Florida Gov. Charlie Crist, Louisiana Gov. Bobby Jindal and former Massachusetts Gov. Mitt Romney.

A top aide said it's a social event with more than two dozen guests not meant for veep vetting.



Hazy thinking on medical marijuana

o those with family members who rely on medical marijuana to relieve chronic pain. the federal government's crusade against the use of the drug is an outrage. According to a 2005 Gallup poll, 78 percent of

Americans support allowing doctors to prescribe medical marijuana. Yet only one of the three major presidential candidates, Sen. Barack Obama, is calling for needed change in federal policy by stopping federal raids in the 12 states that have passed laws legalizing medicinal use of

marijuana. In my 20s, I had expected my generation to understand the futility of Big Government drug laws. Au contraire — now in power, my generation imposes prohibitions on people who are seriously ill and in pain. Bill Clinton's administration went after doctors who recommended marijuana. Under George W. Bush, federal authorities have raided

medical marijuana suppliers. As the San Francisco Chronicle's Bob Egelko reported Monday, Sen. Hillary Rodham Clinton has spoken out against Drug Enforcement Administration raids on medical marijuana clubs. But last month in an interview with the Willamette Week in Oregon, Clinton would not say whether she would stop the raids, only that medical-marijuana raids "would not be a high priority."

Sen. John McCain opposes medical marijuana use. But on the campaign trail last year, he said that medical marijuana was an issue for states to decide and he pledged to do "everything in my power" to keep a seriously ill patient who used medicinal marijuana from being arrested.

"I gotta say, I'm not sure what happened to the Straight Talk Express on this one," quipped Marijuana Policy Project spokesman Bruce Mirken.

As a self-styled straight-talking maverick, McCain should rethink his position on medical marijuana use.

Of course, he is free to personally oppose it, but as a conservative, he should support the right of states to buck a heavy-handed federal mandate. As a human being, he should respect the right of sick people, and their doctors, to avail themselves of a drug that relieves nausea, pain and discomfort and stimulates the appetite of cancer patients on chemotherapy.

McCain spokesperson Crystal Benton cited the American Medical Association's recommendation that marijuana remain a Schedule I drug — with "no accepted medical use" under the Controlled Substances Act — until and unless studies, heretofore essentially barred by Washington politicians, establish medical uses. Be it noted, the AMA, like other medical groups, advocates more research on marijuana's potential treatments.

The American College of Physicians also wants more research. In the meantime, the

group has called for reclassification of marijuana, "given the scientific evidence regarding marijuana's safety and efficacy in some clinical conditions." That is, let doctors and patients — not government – decide what works for them.

Obama's position is not as clear as some advocates might prefer. Spokesman Ben LaBolt noted that Obama supports having the Food and Drug Administration regulate marijuana for medical use — a bad idea and a surefire way to bureaucratize and corporatize what has been a grassroots enterprise.

What about real and dangerous abuses, such as dealers who are running criminal enterprises disguised as cannabis dispensaries? LaBolt answered that Obama "believes that states and local governments are best positioned to strike the balance between making sure that these policies are not abused for recreational drug use and making sure that doctors and their patients can safely access pain relief.'

As for McCain, he would do well to heed the words of economist and conservative icon Milton Friedman, who before his death told Forbes, "There is no logical basis for the prohibition of marijuana."

And: "It's absolutely disgraceful to think of picking up a 22-year-old for smoking pot. More disgraceful is the denial of marijuana for medical purposes."

movie is a remake of



Oil climbs to record above \$135 a barrel

on supply worries, weak dollar

(AP) — Oil prices rose above \$135 a barrel for the first time Thursday, with supply worries, global demand and an ever weakening U.S dollar driving crude futures up.

The world's top energy watchdog is preparing a sharp downward revision of its oil-supply forecast, according to a report in The Wall Street Journal reported.

Light, sweet crude for July delivery rose as high as \$135.09 before falling back slightly. By midday in Europe, the contract stood at \$134.37 a barrel in electronic trade on the New York Mercantile Exchange, up \$1.20 on Wednesday's close of \$133.17.

That settlement price, up \$4.19 on Tuesday's close, marked NYMEX crude's largest one-day price advance since March 26.

Meanwhile, July Brent crude on the ICE Futures exchange in London also reached a new record of \$135.13 a barrel Thursday. By midday in Europe, it had retreated to \$134.35, a gain of \$1.65 on its Wednesday close.

"Simply put, this is a market you cannot afford to be short in," said U.S. analyst and trader Stephen Schork about Brent futures in his Schork Report.

With gas and oil prices setting new records nearly every day, analysts have begun to wonder what might stop prices from rising. There are technical signals in the futures market, including price differences between near-term and longer-term contracts, that crude may soon fall. But with demand for oil growing in the developing world, and little end in sight to supply problems in producing countries such as Nigeria, few analysts are willing to call an end to crude's rally.

China says death toll in quake exceeds 51,000, as it appeals for more tents

BEICHUAN, China (AP) — China said the toll of dead and missing from last week's powerful earthquake jumped to more than 80,000, while the government appealed Thursday for millions of tents to shelter homeless survivors.

The confirmed number of dead rose nearly 10,000 from the day before to 51,151, Cabinet spokesman Guo Weimin told a news conference. Another 29,328 people remained missing and nearly 300,000 were hurt in the May 12 quake centered in Sichuan province, he said.

The disaster left 5 million people homeless and leveled more than 80 percent of the buildings in some remote towns and villages areas near the epicenter. In bigger cities whole apartment blocks collapsed or are now too dangerous to live in because of damage and worries



about aftershocks.

"We need more than 3.3 million tents," Foreign Ministry spokesman Qin Gang told reporters, adding that 400,000 tents have already been delivered. It was the second call for tents from China in recent days.

"We hope and welcome international assistance in this regard. We hope the international community can give priority in providing tents," he said.

Democrats planning a farm bill redo Thursday, after printing gaffe

WASHINGTON (AP) — Democrats are picking up the pieces after an embarrassing technical gaffe that delayed a triumphant rejection of President Bush's veto of a massive farm bill.

Members from both parties hoped to bring the \$290 billion bill, which includes election-year subsidies for farmers and food stamps for the poor, back to their districts over Memorial Day. But that is looking less likely now that the legislation will have to be passed all over again due to a printing error.

The House voted overwhelmingly, 316-108, on Wednesday to override Bush's veto of the legislation earlier in the day.

The Senate then was expected to follow suit quickly, but action stalled after the discovery that a 34-page section of the bill had been omitted from the printed bill sent to the White House. That means Bush vetoed a different bill from the one Congress passed, raising questions that the eventual law would be unconstitutional.

In order to avoid a partisan dustup, House Democrats hoped to pass the entire bill, again, on Thursday under expedited rules usually reserved for noncontroversial legislation, and the Senate was expected to follow suit. The correct version would then be sent to Bush under a new bill number for another expected veto.

Kennedy's cancer has Massachusetts thinking: Who will succeed the senator?

WASHINGTON (AP) — People in Massachusetts suddenly are thinking the unthinkable: Who possibly could succeed Sen. Edward Kennedy, patriarch of the famed political family that has dominated the state for more than four decades?

The news about Kennedy's cancerous brain tumor has led to quiet speculation about whether he may try to handpick a successor, possibly paving the way for a relative to take over his seat.

The prospect of Kennedy's eventual departure also has touched off a scramble involving Massachusetts con-



gressmen and others.

Kennedy, 76, is not up for re-election until 2012. But his medical condition has people wondering if he might resign before then or decline to run for another term. Given Kennedy's stature in the Democratic-dominated state, it's a sensitive topic that few in politics are willing to talk about publicly.

"There will be great respect and delicacy, of course," said Tufts University political science professor Jeffrey Berry.


Top Iraq generals defend plan to pause troop reductions to preserve security gains

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. must be careful not to withdraw forces from Iraq too quickly because security gains could be lost, warn the nation's top two war generals.

The position of Gen. David Petraeus, nominated to assume control of U.S. forces in the Middle East, and Lt. Gen. Raymond Odierno, picked to replace Petraeus as the top commander in Iraq, all but guarantees that some 140,000 troops will be committed in Iraq for the remainder of the year.

The nominations, if approved by the Senate as expected, would keep the administration on its present course in Iraq and hand the next administration a pair of combat-tested commanders who have relentlessly defended President Bush's decision last year to build up troop levels rather than wind down the war.

Today's Highlight in History: On May 22, 1968, the nuclearpowered U.S. submarine Scorpion, with 99 men aboard, sank in the Atlantic Ocean. (The remains of the sub were later found on the ocean floor 400 miles southwest of the Azores.)



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
