### Obama VS. **McCain**

Clinton's run for president is over; she's talking VP now

Associated Press Writer WASHINGTON - The Democratic presidential nomination his, Barack reached Obama out Wednesday to mend fences with his defeated rival as Republican opponent John McCain tried to frame the fall campaign on his own terms. "I think he has exercised very bad judgment on national security issues and others," McCain said. Hillary Rodham Clinton was angling to become Obama's running mate and her aides ramped up the speculation on that matter Wednesday. "I think a lot of her supporters would like to see her on the ticket," Clinton campaign chairman Terry McAuliffe said. But Obama spokesman Robert Gibbs cautioned "there is no deal in the works." Clinton has vet to Obama's acknowledge victory in the bruising Democratic race and her aides — also dodging that conclusion - said on the morning talk shows that she would take a few days to decide what comes next for her. Obama spoke by phone with her Tuesday night and both sides predicted he and Clinton would sit down together before long. "When the dust settles and it makes sense for her, he'll meet whenever she wants to," Gibbs said. "She's accumulated a lot of votes throughout this country. We want to make



# Arizona St. routs A&M for WCWS title

OKLAHOMA CITY - After seven national championships at the junior college level, Clint Myers made a bold prediction in his first meeting with the Arizona State softball team.

Then he followed through on it by bringing the Sun Devils a championship of their own.

Katie Burkhart threw a fourhitter, Kaitlin Cochran finally showed off her hitting prowess

with a three-run home run and Arizona State claimed its first Women's College World Series title with an 11-0 win over Texas A&M on Tuesday night.

Myers said it was more than the players taking "a fat, old, greyhaired guy" at his word.

"It was something you had to earn. We had to go out and we had to earn their trust. We had to teach them and show them that what we were saying, we truly believed," Myers said.

The sixth-seeded Sun Devils (66-5) put together a complete game, combining Burkhart's dominance in the circle with an offensive outburst never seen before in the championship round to claim some bragging rights in the Pac-10, which already had a slew of titles from softball powers UCLA and Arizona and one from California.


"It is a tradition we're trying to build, and this year's team put it on the map," Myers said.

Burkhart (41-5) struck out 13 to win her 11th straight decision, firing back-to-back shutouts to close out Texas A&M in the best-ofthree championship series. She credited a friend with inspiring her to have the mentality of a shark because "in the wild when they go for prey, when one shark goes, they all go."

"Every pitch I was thinking, 'Be that shark. Right here, let's

# L.A./Celts rivalry goes beyond Bird, Magic

WALTHAM, Mass. -Larry Bird and Magic Johnson have had two decades to nurse the memories of their fading rivalry, keeping it alive in their minds because the Lakers and Celtics have had little to compete for on the court.

Largely because of Boston's unprecedented title drought, the matchup that helped establish the league has been dormant since the Celtics' last appearance in the NBA finals in 1987. Now they're back, and the Lakers are again waiting.

It's Kobe and KG.

Paul and Pau.

East and West. But, mostly, the Celtics

against the Lakers. "It was just great to be able to be in that heated rivalry for so many years," Johnson said Tuesday. "The cities disliked each other; the teams disliked each other. But we respected each other because we knew they were so talented of a team, and also wellcoached.

"We always wanted to play the best," Johnson said. "And that was the Celtics." Winners of 30 NBA titles between them, the Lakers and Celtics will meet in the NBA finals for the 11th time starting on Thursday night with Game 1 at the new Boston Garden. And with the rekindling of that rivalry, the NBA got Johnson and Bird on a conference call with reporters to talk about the old days. "It was extraordinary, great competition. It was battles every game," Bird said. "I just feel very honored being able to be in an opportunity, with the great See NBA, Page 3B

teammates that I had, to compete against a team either better or on an equal level as we were. It was an extraordinary time."

Bird said the anticipation of meeting the Lakers each year was so intense that he was actually disappointed when they lost to the Houston Rockets in the 1986 Western Conference finals.

"I know all of us felt down a little bit because we weren't going to be able to play the Lakers again," Bird said. "(But) when you think of the Celtics and Lakers, it didn't start with me and Magic. It goes back to the '50s and '60s."

The teams first hooked up in the finals in 1959, when the Lakers were still in Minneapolis and Boston was on the cusp of a dynasty. The Celtics won that one — and the next seven times they met head-tohead — as they piled up an NBA-record 16 championships.

"It was hard to call it a rivalry because, you know, the Celtics always won," Johnson said.

And it was hard to keep the rivalry going while Boston kept losing.

The Celtics went to the finals four times in the mid-1980s, but they haven't been back since 1987. Meanwhile, Johnson made it back to the finals three more times — beating Detroit in 1988, losing to the Pistons in '88, and losing to Michael Jordan and the Bulls when Chicago won its first title in '91. The Lakers went through a dry spell before winning three more championships with Kobe Bryant and Shaquille O'Neal in 2000-02. The Celtics missed the playoffs entirely nine times in the past 14 years.

### Hamilton, Bradley lift **Rangers over Indians**

ARLINGTON – The Texas Rangers needed a five-homer game from an already-surging offense to cover up for their overtaxed pitching staff.

Josh Hamilton and Milton Bradley hit consecutive homers to set the tone in a four-run first inning and the Rangers went on to a 12-7 victory over the Cleveland Indians on Tuesday night.

Hamilton went deep in his career-high fourth straight game one out after Ian Kinsler led off with a single to extend his careerbest hitting streak to 18 games. Hamilton's tworun drive gave him 17 homers and 67 RBIs, tops in the AL in both categories.

Bradley followed with his first of two homers, going back-to-back with Hamilton for the second time this season to help the Rangers end a twogame skid and return to .500 (30-30).

Texas' David Murphy had a homer among his four hits. Jarrod Saltalamacchia also connected for the Rangers, whose five homers gave them an AL-best 73.

"Right now we have to swing the bats to win games," Kinsler said. "That's the approach we're taking. We have to score a lot of runs. The pitching will come around. They're just going through a rough time."

Hamilton won AL Player of the Month for April and May, and he has a good start on June.

"It doesn't matter what they're throwing, he's playing like Superman right now," Murphy said.

# \*Wandy leads Astros past Pirates, 2-0

PITTSBURGH - There's a guaranteed way for a team in a bad hitting slump to win. That's outpitch the opponent, and Wandy Rodriguez and the Houston Astros' bullpen did exactly that.

Lance Berkman and Miguel Tejada doubled in runs and Rodriguez pitched six shutout innings in his second start after coming off the disabled list, and the Astros stopped a five-game losing streak by beating the Pittsburgh Pirates 2-0 on Tuesday night.

The Astros still aren't scoring - they've totaled only eight runs in six games, and were outscored 19-3 while being swept in a threegame weekend series by Milwaukee. They didn't need many runs in this game, not with Rodriguez limiting the Pirates to five hits while teaming with three relievers on Houston's third shutout of the season.

Chris Sampson, Doug Brocail and Jose Valverde finished up the five-hitter with a hitless inning each, with Valverde getting his 16th save in 19 opportunities. The three relievers retired all nine batters they faced.

"When things aren't going well, what you need more than anything else is someone to step up and give you a great pitching performance, that's what we got tonight," Berkman said. "We still didn't score a lot of runs, and things were a little difficult, but Wandy was the story."

"Any time we hit it hard, it was at somebody," Pirates manager John Russell said. "We didn't create much offense to support our pitching."

#### Police seeking man who molested two hospital patients

FORT WORTH (AP) - Police are searching for a man accused of molesting two female patients in their hospital rooms.

The man entered Baylor All Saints Medical Center on May 9 and told the two patients that he was a hospital worker, police said.

Both women believed he was member of the hospital staff because of his actions, attire and ability to come and go, said Fort Worth police Lt. Paul Henderson.

"He went into the patients' rooms and asked kind of routine questions," Henderson said.

The suspect was described as a 5-foot-10-inch black man with a dark complexion, about 19 to 25 years old, 250 pounds and clean-shaven. He was dressed in a navy blue polo shirt and khaki pants.

Police say he entered one patient's room around 7:15 p.m. and told the woman he was going to examine her. He touched the 43-year-old woman's genitals and left when she pressed a button to call the nurse.

The other victim was also in the hospital's fourth-floor progressive-care unit. She told investigators that a man entered her room to "check her." He lifted her gown and touched her chest, police said.

Investigators are concerned the man may have attacked other patients at Baylor or other hospitals.

Baylor All Saints Medical Center officials say they are offering a \$5.000 reward.

#### Teen charged with killing paper delivery worker

ARLINGTON (AP) — Authorities have charged a teenager with capital murder in the death of a newspaper delivery worker during a robbery.

The name of the teen is not being released because he is a juvenile. The now 17-year-old from Mississippi was 16 at the time of the slaying.

He's accused in the Jan. 21 death of David Wayne May, 47, near the University of Texas at Arlington. May had been filling newspaper racks at about 5:30 a.m. when he was shot in a parking lot near a restaurant.

May delivered newspapers part-time and was not known to carry much cash.

Shortly after May's death, the teenager drew investigator's attention, said Lt. Blake Miller, an Arlington police spokesman. Police declined to say what led investigators to focus on the teen.



### Chamberlain's debut disappointing NBA

Joba Chamberlain's first big league start was over almost as quickly as it began.

### **OUR VIEWS Salvation Army** needs our help with fan drive

hey're called the "dog days of summer," that time in June, July and August when it gets so hot in West Texas you feel as though you could fry an egg on your forehead. And judging from the past few days, they're back with a vengeance.

In fact, the immediate inclination during the past few days has been to find as cool and shady a spot as possible and do as little as one can — basically a canine reaction to the heat.

Sadly, there are those in our community that have to resort to just that in order to deal with oppressive triple-digit temperatures.

As a matter of fact, too many people in the Crossroads area suffer due to a lack of air conditioning during the summer.

But the Salvation Army wants to help. To do so, however, it needs our help.

The Salvation Army's annual fan drive - an effort to get some heat relief to as many people as possible, particularly the elderly and newly born - is now under way.

Capts. Russ and Linda Keeney acknowledge they had a little bit of a head start this year, thanks to having a few fans left over from last year's thanks in no small part to the fact that the summer of 2007 was not as warm a season as normal.

However, judging from the past week of 100-degreeplus days, it doesn't look like that will become a trend.

"We're expecting an extremely hot summer, so

**Eyeing the Clinton spin cycle** 

e have to grant it to them: When it comes to spinning the arguments — bordering on dishonesty - nobody does it better than Sen. Hillary Rodham Clinton and her band of professional spinners.

For months, they have been telling us the states that will matter in November are the big swing states she has been winning in the primaries. If she ever became the Democratic nominee,

you have to wonder

tude would affect the general election vote in the many smaller primary and caucus states won by Sen. Barack

Obama. But now the Clintonites are spinning in the opposite direction. Instead of the crucial heartland states, now they tell us that Sunday's primary in Puerto Rico, which doesn't even vote in the general election, was critical.

Why do they say it was critical? Because the commonwealth island may have put her over Obama in Clinton's unique national popular vote count — as if the Democratic nominee were somehow decided by the national popular vote instead of delegates selected in state primaries and caucuses.

If the rules are not favorable to the Clinton campaign, they simply come up with their own rules.

As for having the majority of the national popular vote, that's only true if you use Clinton's own new math. You would have to rely on estimate counts from caucus states, for which no official popular vote count is available. And you would have to include an unfairly lopsided count for Clinton in two states in

which many voters stayed home because they were told that their Democratic primary did not count.

When the Democratic Party's Rules and Bylaws Committee divided the Florida and Michigan delegates between Clinton and Obama Saturday, it was delegates — not popular vote counts — that were awarded. And each of those delegates was given only a half-vote at the convention.

Yet the Clinton camp insists on counting the popular vote in Florida, where Obama didn't campaign, and in Michigan, where Obama wasn't even on the ballot. It's downright dishonest.

And yet this is the intelligenceinsulting "popular vote" argument Clinton is making to the remaining undecided superdelegates, who are likely to select the Democratic nominee very soon. Obama has won more delegates, more states and even more popular votes if you count them fairly. Yet Clinton is asking these politically astute superdelegates to overturn the will of the people.

If they did that, the Democratic Party would be so divided that it would take more than one election cycle to recover. For now, it not only would secure the election of Republican Sen. John McCain but also would deal a hard blow to Democrats in Congress.

And if Clinton ever became the Democratic nominee, you have to wonder how she would be affected by her willingness to ignore the many Florida and Michigan Democrats who stayed home on primary day because their party told them they were being punished. These Democrats were stupidly deprived of the right to vote by their own party, and by refusing to recognize them for political expedience, Clinton has promoted their disenfranchisement.

For someone who claims to be

promoting unity among Democrats, you don't see much effort from Clinton to comply with the party's rules or to add with regular math.

Even as the Democratic Party's Rules and Bylaws Committee searched for a way to give Florida and Michigan some convention representation during their meeting Saturday, Clinton supporters on the committee insisted that their candidate should be given preferential treatment. In fact, they argued that although they believe in following party rules, this time — for Hillary Clinton — they should be broken.

And when they failed to get what they wanted, Clinton supporters who were watching the proceedings adopted a scorched-earth attitude that could end up scorching their party's chances of recapturing the White House.

When pro-Clinton motions failed, some Clinton sore losers turned into hecklers, even as some committee members were pleading for party unity. Many of them chanted "Denver," threatening to take their anger to the Democratic National Convention, which undoubtedly would diminish the Democrats' chances of winning in November.

Of course, to some degree, that has happened already. If Obama loses the general election against McCain, many will blame Clinton for staying in the Democratic race much longer than she should have, i.e., even after regular math clearly showed that she had lost the primary race.

Nevertheless, the staggering statistical evidence against Clinton doesn't seem to faze her. The Clinton camp is still on spinning mode, even if most Americans can't wait for them to stop insulting our intelligence and challenging our math.

however, are more advanced. Most of them are harder to figure out than chemistry lab element charts. I can decipher LOL (laugh out loud), BRB (be right back) and BFF (best friends forever), but beyond these, I'm clueless....

I miss complete sentences, written and verbal.

At the rate we're going in our text-bent world, it won't be long before axioms are modified to fit the era.

To wit, "a picture is worth 10,000 text messages.'

To get a strangle hold on gaining instead of losing words requires discipline few are willing to embrace.

In the world "out there," though, are troupers — few as they are who spice up our lives and enliven otherwise predictable scenarios. Somehow, they have the rare poise, keen minds and vocabularies that we hope will never be reduced to abbreviations.

These may be the same people who chew each bite 28 times, deep breathe regularly and maintain exercise regimens after most of us have said "to heck with it." (The late Congressman George Mahon, undefeated during a half-century of public service, routinely got double-takes from others on elevators. They weren't accustomed to seeing

elevator ups and downs.)

Our antennae reach out for priceless emissions — sometimes words, sometimes babble and sometimes Cheerios — from the mouths of babes.

Most remain in "listen up" modes to soak in the verbal gems provided by our kids and grandkids as they sail on through pre-school years and beyond. I'm in this group, but my tent is broad, including those in the autumns and winters of their lives.

I want to cite verbal responses made recently by three quick-witted folks in their mid-80s, all with well-worn, three-digit AARP cards. A couple of 'em I heard with my own ears.

One was Walter Buckel, long-time publisher of the Lamesa Press-Reporter. At age 17, he hitchhiked from California to Big Spring, where he heard the semi-pro baseball team needed a shortstop. Alas, a fresh bunch of new aspirants had arrived earlier; he was a day or so late and as many dollars short.

But, the West Texas-New Mexico League team in nearby Lamesa did, in fact, need another infielder, so he landed there. That was almost 70 years ago, and he's still there. Playing baseball actually was a minor part of his career. He worked for Lamesa schools, was county clerk, sold insurance and spent seven years in the radio business before entering newspapering at age 46.

He made a big journalistic splash and received numerous honors. Inducted into the Texas Newspaper Foundation's Hall of Fame earlier this year, he reflected on his baseball years, and on one point was emphatic: "I did it without steroids."

Other honorees included Alvin Holley, an East Texas publisher whose "newspapering" dates back to throwing the Corsicana Daily Sun. Two other giants in the field were cited posthumously - longtime Fort Worth Star-Telegram publisher Amon G. Carter and Harold Hudson, former president of the National Newspaper

She's tickled several shades beyond pink that a dozen relatives have attended WC. Someone said she's as likely as the cheerleaders to be waving pom-poms. And at 85, she may well be up to such waving. After all, during her college years, she was a member of the women's tumbling team, a forerunner of today's gymnasts."I try not to tumble nowadays, but when I do, someone has to pick me up," she joked.

So there you have it — examples of solid, disciplined people who are at a "gain for words."

They've enriched our lives with words and deeds without texting. Such grand folks live in your community, too. Watch for them.

Listen to them. If they haven't been honored, get crackin' to do so. And maybe it'll make the newspaper.

for South to rebid a four-card suit that has not been supported. Therefore, the three-spade bid implies a five-card suit.

Once this determination has been made, North asks himself why South bid one diamond initially rather than one spade. South cannot have five of each suit, in which case spades the higher-ranking suit — would have been named first. Since South did bid a diamond, North should conclude that South's diamonds are longer than his spades.

**Proper play** produces 11 tricks even though both the diamonds and spades break unfavorably. East wins the heart lead and returns a trump. Declarer takes the ace and ruffs a heart in dummy. This leaves dummy with the lone jack of trumps. South is threatened with a possi-

ble diamond loser as well as a spade loser. If he cashes the king and does not catch the queen, his hopes will then rest on losing no spade tricks.

Instead of subjecting himself to the whims of fate. South uses the jack of trumps in dummy for another purpose. The king and ace of spades are cashed, and a low spade is ruffed with the diamond jack as West discards a heart (it doesn't help West to ruff with the queen).

Only a trump trick can now be lost, since declarer's remaining spades are good. In effect, South telescopes his two potential losers into one

#### United Nations chief says up to

#### \$20 billion needed to boost food production

ROME (AP) — U.N. chief Ban Ki-moon says \$15 billion to \$20 billion is needed each year to boost food production to combat hunger.

The United Nations secretary-general says most of that money would have to come from concerned countries.

Ban was speaking Wednesday at a summit on the food price crisis. Delegates at the summit in Rome have been divided over the role that biofuels play in driving up food prices to the point of provoking riots in some countries.

Ban says policy guidelines on biofuel production should be put in place because of its impact on food production.

### Salmonella reported in 9 states; tomatoes common factor in Texas, New Mexico

ATLANTA (AP) — An outbreak of salmonella food poisoning first linked to uncooked tomatoes has now been reported in nine states, U.S. health officials said Tuesday.

Lab tests have confirmed 40 illnesses in Texas and New Mexico as the same type of salmonella, right down to the genetic fingerprint. An investigation by Texas and New Mexico health authorities and the Indian Health Service tied those cases to uncooked, raw, large tomatoes.

At least 17 people in Texas and New Mexico have been hospitalized. None have died, according to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Another 30 people have become sick with the same Salmonella Saintpaul infection in Arizona, Utah, Colorado, Kansas, Idaho, Illinois and Indiana. CDC investigators are looking into whether tomatoes were culprits there, too.

In Texas and New Mexico, raw large tomatoes including Roma and red round tomatoes — were found to be a common factor in the 40 illnesses. But no farm, distributor or grocery chain has been identified as the main source, said Casey Barton Behravesh, a CDC epidemiologist working on the investigation.

### Astronauts install Japanese lab at space station; grand entry, toilet repair coming up

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — With astronauts hustling inside and out, the international space station got its biggest live-in addition yet, a Japanese lab stretching 37 feet that opens for business Wednesday.

Japanese astronaut Akihiko Hoshide had the honor of installing the billion-dollar lab, named Kibo, which means hope, just as two crewmates were winding up a spacewalk Tuesday. He used the space station's robot arm to nudge the bus-size lab into place.

"We have a new hope on the international space sta-

tion," announced Hoshide.

NASA's deputy space station program manager, Kirk Shireman, later noted, "It was an amazing day."

The drama was to continue Wednesday afternoon, when the 10 space fliers on the linked shuttle and station open the doors to the lab and float in.

### Children of polygamist sect reunited with happy parents

ELDORADO (AP) — Just a fraction of the children taken from a polygamist sect's ranch remain in foster care after parents traveled this sprawling state to reunite their families.

By Tuesday, 397 children had been returned to their parents, leaving just a few dozen of the roughly 430 to be picked up from far-flung foster care centers. Those reunions were expected to occur Wednesday.

Families began trickling back to the Yearning For Zion Ranch on Tuesday — exactly two months after child welfare authorities and law enforcement first arrived at its battered metal gate looking for a caller to a domestic abuse hot line.

"We're sure grateful to be home," said Zavenda Young, whose 3-year-old daughter clung to her while her three sons, ages 5 to 9, stood nearby. "They can't believe it, for sure. Even though we drove all night, they hardly slept."

Willie Jessop, an elder with the Fundamentalist Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, didn't know how many families plan to return to the ranch. He said some were cautious about bringing children back to the 1,700-acre spread they last saw when police clad in body armor raided the ranch's homes, school and temple, looking for evidence of underage girls pressed into marriage and sex.

### Central America storms kill at least 9 as aid rushed to flood victims

BELIZE CITY (AP) — Flash flooding carried away houses and ripped a child from his father's grasp in Belize, while falling trees killed two people in Honduras, raising the death toll from Central America's twin tropical storms this week to at least nine.

Prime Minister Dean Barrow declared a disaster area Tuesday in southern Belize's Stann Creek Valley, and the government rushed food, water and clothing to more than 13,000 people affected by the floods.

Over the weekend, Pacific Tropical Storm Alma swept over Belize hours before Tropical Storm Arthur roared in from the Caribbean at the Mexico-Belize border.

Witnesses said a couple and their 14-year-old daughter died when a flash flood swept away a house in Stann Creek Valley early Monday. The couple's 12-year-old son is missing.

"The water just come right up and picked up their house and took it down there and mashed it up," Bedford Ritchie told Channel 7. Wellington McKenzie said a friend drowned trying to help him rescue people in their neighborhood.

Officials also were searching for a young boy who was pulled from his father's arms by floodwaters as the two tried to reach the safety of a mango tree.

#### Mel Ferrer, film actor-director-producer, husband of Audrey Hepburn, dead at 90

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Mel Férrer, the tall, darkly handsome star of such classic films as "Lili," "War and Peace" and "The Sun Also Rises," as well as producer and director of movies starring his then-wife, Audrey Hepburn, has died at age 90.

Ferrer died Monday at a Santa Barbara convalescent home, his son Mark Ferrer told The Associated Press on Tuesday. He had been in failing health for the past six months and had recently moved to the home from his nearby ranch in Carpinteria, his son said.

Ferrer's most impressive film role came in 1953 in "Lili." He played a crippled carnival puppeteer with whom a French orphan (played by Leslie Caron) falls in love.

He also won critical acclaim as Luis Bello in Robert Rossen's 1951 depiction of the public and private life of a bullfighter in "The Brave Bulls," based on a Tom Lea book. In later years, he turned more to directing and producing for movies and TV.

### Chinese police cordon off school after breaking up protest

DUJIANGYAN, China (AP) — Chinese police Wednesday blocked access to a school that collapsed in last month's massive earthquake, a day after breaking up a protest by parents of students who died in the disaster.

A cordon of police held back reporters and others gathered at Juyuan Middle School on the edge of Dujiangyan in Sichuan province. More than 270 students died when the school collapsed in the May 12 earthquake.

Police were also out in force at the Xiange Middle School, where 300 students died. Unlike at other schools, no memorials, banners, or photos of children had been set up at the school, also near Dujiangyan.

Dear Annie: I was married for 30 years before my husband passed away five years ago of colon cancer. During his 18 months of treatment, he was hospitalized four times for surgeries and infections, and each was followed by weeks of recuperation at home. I communicated almost daily with his parents, who lived in our town, and I assumed they conveyed the information to his brother, who also lived here, and to a sister in another state. My in-laws did not provide any assistance with my husband's care, but I was fortunate to have good friends who helped out. After his death, communication with my husband's family became nonexistent. almost Without my calls, letters, cards and flowers, I'm convinced there would be no relationship at all. Within the past three years, my in-laws have moved away, which means there is even less communication, and my brother-in-law has made it clear to me and my children that he has issues with us and no interest in maintaining contact. My sister-in-law sends a Christmas card, but that's about it, even though I have tried to see her several times when I have been in her town, and have called her often. My attempts to remain part of this family (for the sake of my children) constantly hit brick walls. Not only are we still grieving over the loss of my husband, but it is additionally hurtful that we no longer have a relationship with his family. We miss them very much. What can I do? -- Widow in Florida
