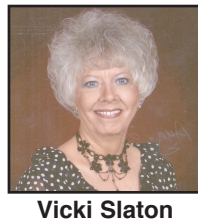

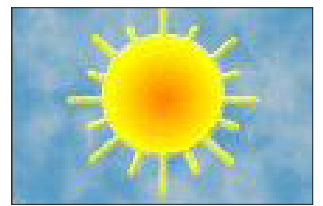

Obama vs. McCain

Clinton's run for president is over; she's talking VP now

WASHINGTON — The Democratic presidential nomination his, Barack Obama reached out Wednesday to mend fences with his defeated rival as Republican opponent John McCain tried to frame the fall campaign on his own terms. “I think he has exercised very bad judgment on national security issues and others,” McCain said.

Hillary Rodham Clinton was angling to become Obama's running mate and her aides ramped up the speculation on that matter Wednesday. “I think a lot of her supporters would like to see her on the ticket,” Clinton campaign chairman Terry McAuliffe said. But Obama spokesman Robert Gibbs cautioned “there is no deal in the works.”

Clinton has yet to acknowledge Obama's victory in the bruising Democratic race and her aides — also dodging that conclusion — said on the morning talk shows that she would take a few days to decide what comes next for her. Obama spoke by phone with her Tuesday night and both sides predicted he and Clinton would sit down together before long.

“When the dust settles and it makes sense for her, he'll meet whenever she wants to,” Gibbs said. “She's accumulated a lot of votes throughout this country. We want to make

Bynum search unsuccessful

Feds find weapons, arrest man for conspiracy to manufacture meth

The search for clues in the 2003 disappearance of 40-year-old Arlin Bynum turned up nothing new Tuesday, as state and federal investigators sifted through evidence at a residence north of Big Spring.

However, one man was arrested on federal charges unrelated to Bynum's disappearance and further warrants could be issued.

Thirty-six-year-old Clay Atkinson was arrested on charges of conspiracy to manufacture methamphetamine. He was taken into custody and was to be arraigned in federal court in Midland today.

According to Howard County Sheriff Dale Walker, several search warrants were served at the residence — located east of the county airport on the Old Colorado City Highway — during the early morning hours Tuesday. “A search warrant was

executed at the property of Horace “Bunky” Atkinson,” said Walker. “There is a state search warrant which allows for investigators to search for the remains of Arlin Bynum, or any evidence pertaining to his disappearance.

“Investigators also exercised

a federal search warrant issued by the ATF (Department of Alcohol Tobacco Firearms) for firearms violations,” Walker said Tuesday.

Walker said “lots of weapons” were recovered at the Atkinson residence.

Horace Atkinson had come

under federal scrutiny when he applied for a hunting license.

“As a convicted felon, he's not allowed to possess a firearm,” Walker said, explaining ATF's reason for searching the residence. “I suspect there may

The Howard College Theater Department will chronicle the exploits of the homicidal sisters

when it stages “Arsenic and Old Lace” Thursday and Friday in the Hall Center for the Arts on the college campus.

“It's a hilarious comedy — about serial killers,” Davidson

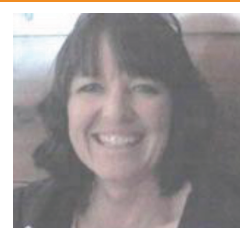

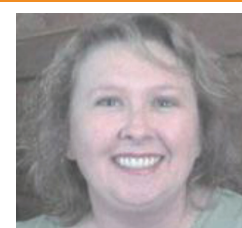

Chamberlain's debut disappointing NBA

Joba Chamberlain's first big league start was over almost as quickly as it began.

The star reliever got just seven outs in his much-ballyhooed move to the Yankees' rotation, coming out after he approached his pitch limit in the third inning.

By then he'd walked four batters, given up a pair of runs and generally looked nothing like the shut-down reliever he has been.

"I was mad at myself," Chamberlain said. "You know you've only got so many pitches and I didn't do a very good job of conserving those pitches."

Roy Halladay held New York in check despite

some control problems of his own, leading the Toronto Blue Jays to a 9-3 victory on Tuesday night.

In Tuesday's other games, it was: the Los Angeles Angels 5, Seattle 4; Oakland 5, Detroit 4, 11 innings; Boston 7, Tampa Bay 4; Baltimore 5, Minnesota 3; and Chicago White Sox 9, Kansas City 5.

Chamberlain touched 101 mph on the Yankee Stadium scoreboard but walked three and threw 38 pitches in the first inning as Toronto took a 1-0 lead on Alex Rios' groundout.

Chamberlain retired the side in order in the second and got Marco Scutaro to fly out to right to begin the third. But Rios walked on

four straight balls, and that was enough for manager Joe Girardi, who lifted him for Dan Giese (0-1) after 62 pitches, about what the Yankees had planned to limit him to.

His line for the night: 2 1-3 innings, one hit, two runs — one earned — four walks and three strikeouts. Not a disaster, but not what anyone had in mind. Except maybe the Blue Jays.

Toronto savvily concentrated on Chamberlain's pitch count and forced New York to use six pitchers total.

"We worked him good, we really did," Blue Jays manager John Gibbons

"Every great franchise must go through downtime," Johnson said. "A mark of a true and great franchise is whether they can come back. Both of them have come back, and come back in a big way."

The Celtics did it all in one year, adding Kevin Garnett and Ray Allen to mainstay Paul Pierce to turn last year's 24-win team into the NBA leader with a 66-16 record this

season. The Lakers didn't drop as far or rise as quickly, riding Kobe Bryant's MVP season to the best record in the West.

Now they're back in the finals again, and facing each other again. But everything else — the players, coaches, even the arenas — is different.

"The intensity is not up to that level right now," Celtics guard Sam Cassell said. "If we play the Lakers next year in the finals and the year after that, I think the rivalry will become like it was in the '80s. But

right now it's just two teams who respect one another."

In the end, Johnson said, it's not about the rivalry anyway.

"Trust me, when that ball goes up on Thursday, they'll understand," he said. "They'll have their own rivalry because it's for all the marbles, it's for everything. It doesn't matter whether they understand the rivalry or not. They're going to create their own new rivalry, right, on Thursday night."

"He's swinging it better than anyone in baseball," said Indians manager Eric Wedge, who ordered an intentional walk for Hamilton in the second inning, the first time Hamilton has received an intentional pass this season. "He's an inspired player right now."

Rangers pitchers had given up 26 runs in their previous two games, so Tuesday night represented a little progress.

The Texas bullpen, overworked because the starting pitching has been spotty, has allowed 20 runs in its last three games.

"We can't keep going like that," said Rangers manager Ron Washington, who added that he'll have to bring up some relief help from the minors Wednesday. "We're going to have to pitch well and catch the baseball. You can't always outslug people. You wanna talk about adversity, we've been able to handle it. If we can make it through this stretch and get back to normal everything will be fine."

Brandon Boggs added an RBI single against Tom Mastny (0-1), making his first major league start after 68 career relief appearances.

Mastny struggled through a 37-pitch first

inning and lasted only 1 1-3 innings, allowing five runs and six hits. Mastny was replacing Jake Westbrook, who went on the disabled list Monday with an inflamed right elbow.

A disappointed Mastny said after the game that he'd been told he would be sent down to Triple-A Buffalo on Wednesday.

"I tried to go out and give the team some innings but it didn't work out," Mastny said. "I've started before (in the minors). I just didn't do my job. I'll go to Triple-A and work on some things and try to get back here."

Frank Francisco (1-1) allowed one run and one hit in 1 2-3 innings.

Rangers rookie A.J. Murray, called up from Triple-A Oklahoma to make his second major league start, exited in the third inning with a left rotator cuff strain. The Rangers said Murray would be out seven to 10 days and would then be re-evaluated.

Bradley's solo shot in a three-run eighth extended Texas' lead to 12-6.

Murray didn't allow a run in the first two innings, but the Indians loaded the bases with nobody out in the third, then got an RBI single from Ben Francisco. After Ryan Garko was retired on a pop-up, Rangers trainers and Washington hurried to the

mound where Murray told them he was unable to continue.

Texas increased its lead to 8-2 in the fifth on Kinsler's sacrifice fly and Michael Young's RBI double.

Young stretched his hitting streak to 19 games, longest in the AL this season and second-longest of his career behind a 25-gamer in 2005.

Pinch hitter Shin-shoo Choo had a two-run double in the seventh and a solo homer in the ninth. Ryan Garko's RBI groundout in the eighth made it 9-6, but the Indians couldn't get any closer.

"As tough as it was on us early, we had a couple of chances to get within one or two runs," Wedge said. "We just couldn't get it done."

Notes: Garko had three hits. ... The Rangers' record for consecutive games with a homer is seven by Kevin Mench in April of 2006. ... Texas was outscored 26-17 in its two previous games. ... Kinsler's stolen base in the second was his 22nd straight without being caught dating to 2007, with 16 coming this season. ... Cleveland C Victor Martinez was out of the starting lineup for the second time in three games to protect his sore left hamstring. He walked as a pinch hitter in the seventh.

United Nations chief says up to \$20 billion needed to boost food production

ROME (AP) — U.N. chief Ban Ki-moon says \$15 billion to \$20 billion is needed each year to boost food production to combat hunger.

The United Nations secretary-general says most of that money would have to come from concerned countries.

Ban was speaking Wednesday at a summit on the food price crisis. Delegates at the summit in Rome have been divided over the role that biofuels play in driving up food prices to the point of provoking riots in some countries.

Ban says policy guidelines on biofuel production should be put in place because of its impact on food production.

Salmonella reported in 9 states; tomatoes common factor in Texas, New Mexico

ATLANTA (AP) — An outbreak of salmonella food poisoning first linked to uncooked tomatoes has now been reported in nine states, U.S. health officials said Tuesday.

Lab tests have confirmed 40 illnesses in Texas and New Mexico as the same type of salmonella, right down to the genetic fingerprint. An investigation by Texas and New Mexico health authorities and the Indian Health Service tied those cases to uncooked, raw, large tomatoes.

At least 17 people in Texas and New Mexico have been hospitalized. None have died, according to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Another 30 people have become sick with the same Salmonella Saintpaul infection in Arizona, Utah, Colorado, Kansas, Idaho, Illinois and Indiana. CDC investigators are looking into whether tomatoes were culprits there, too.

In Texas and New Mexico, raw large tomatoes — including Roma and red round tomatoes — were found to be a common factor in the 40 illnesses. But no farm, distributor or grocery chain has been identified as the main source, said Casey Barton Behravesh, a CDC epidemiologist working on the investigation.

Astronauts install Japanese lab at space station; grand entry, toilet repair coming up

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — With astronauts hustling inside and out, the international space station got its biggest live-in addition yet, a Japanese lab stretching 37 feet that opens for business Wednesday.

Japanese astronaut Akihiko Hoshide had the honor of installing the billion-dollar lab, named Kibo, which means hope, just as two crewmates were winding up a spacewalk Tuesday. He used the space station's robot arm to nudge the bus-size lab into place.

"We have a new hope on the international space sta-

tion," announced Hoshide.

NASA's deputy space station program manager, Kirk Shireman, later noted, "It was an amazing day."

The drama was to continue Wednesday afternoon, when the 10 space fliers on the linked shuttle and station open the doors to the lab and float in.

Children of polygamist sect reunited with happy parents

ELDORADO (AP) — Just a fraction of the children taken from a polygamist sect's ranch remain in foster care after parents traveled this sprawling state to reunite their families.

By Tuesday, 397 children had been returned to their parents, leaving just a few dozen of the roughly 430 to be picked up from far-flung foster care centers. Those reunions were expected to occur Wednesday.

Families began trickling back to the Yearning For Zion Ranch on Tuesday — exactly two months after child welfare authorities and law enforcement first arrived at its battered metal gate looking for a caller to a domestic abuse hot line.

"We're sure grateful to be home," said Zavenda Young, whose 3-year-old daughter clung to her while her three sons, ages 5 to 9, stood nearby. "They can't believe it, for sure. Even though we drove all night, they hardly slept."

Willie Jessop, an elder with the Fundamentalist Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, didn't know how many families plan to return to the ranch. He said some were cautious about bringing children back to the 1,700-acre spread they last saw when police clad in body armor raided the ranch's homes, school and temple, looking for evidence of underage girls pressed into marriage and sex.

Central America storms kill at least 9 as aid rushed to flood victims

BELIZE CITY (AP) — Flash flooding carried away houses and ripped a child from his father's grasp in Belize, while falling trees killed two people in Honduras, raising the death toll from Central America's twin tropical storms this week to at least nine.

Prime Minister Dean Barrow declared a disaster area Tuesday in southern Belize's Stann Creek Valley, and the government rushed food, water and clothing to more than 13,000 people affected by the floods.

Over the weekend, Pacific Tropical Storm Alma swept over Belize hours before Tropical Storm Arthur roared in from the Caribbean at the Mexico-Belize border.

Witnesses said a couple and their 14-year-old daughter died when a flash flood swept away a house in Stann Creek Valley early Monday. The couple's 12-year-old son is missing.

"The water just come right up and picked up their house and took it down there and mashed it up," Bedford Ritchie told Channel 7.

Wellington McKenzie said a friend drowned trying to help him rescue people in their neighborhood.

Officials also were searching for a young boy who was pulled from his father's arms by floodwaters as the two tried to reach the safety of a mango tree.

Mel Ferrer, film actor-director-producer, husband of Audrey Hepburn, dead at 90

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Mel Ferrer, the tall, darkly handsome star of such classic films as "Lili," "War and Peace" and "The Sun Also Rises," as well as producer and director of movies starring his then-wife, Audrey Hepburn, has died at age 90.

Ferrer died Monday at a Santa Barbara convalescent home, his son Mark Ferrer told The Associated Press on Tuesday. He had been in failing health for the past six months and had recently moved to the home from his nearby ranch in Carpinteria, his son said.

Ferrer's most impressive film role came in 1953 in "Lili." He played a crippled carnival puppeteer with whom a French orphan (played by Leslie Caron) falls in love.

He also won critical acclaim as Luis Bello in Robert Rossen's 1951 depiction of the public and private life of a bullfighter in "The Brave Bulls," based on a Tom Lea book. In later years, he turned more to directing and producing for movies and TV.

Chinese police cordon off school after breaking up protest

DUJIANGYAN, China (AP) — Chinese police Wednesday blocked access to a school that collapsed in last month's massive earthquake, a day after breaking up a protest by parents of students who died in the disaster.

A cordon of police held back reporters and others gathered at Juyuan Middle School on the edge of Dujiangyan in Sichuan province. More than 270 students died when the school collapsed in the May 12 earthquake.

Police were also out in force at the Xiangge Middle School, where 300 students died. Unlike at other schools, no memorials, banners, or photos of children had been set up at the school, also near Dujiangyan.
