Drug bust results in two arrests

A raid on a home in the 1000 block of Stadium Tuesday night netted investigators more than two pounds of marijuana and two arrests, according to officials with the Big Spring Police Department.

Victoria Lozano, 23, and Chad

were arrested at 1005 Stadium Tuesday and charged with possession of marijuana — more than four ounces, less than five pounds in a drug free zone. According to police records, the address that was raided was the residence of the two suspects.

"The Big Spring Police

Warren, 29, both of Big Spring, Department Narcotics Unit executed a search warrant at 1005 Stadium at approximately 8:45 p.m. Tuesday," said Sgt. Tony Everett, public information officer with the BSPD. "The warrant was the result of an investigation into marijuana sales from the residence. Officers seized more than two pounds of mari-

juana, approximately \$4,000 cash and three vehicles."

Everett said Lozano and Warren were each freed on \$3,000

Bulls win rodeo's opening night

No bull? How about all bull?

It wasn't a good time to be a bull rider on the opening night of the 75th Big Spring Cowboy Reunion and Rodeo Thursday at the Rodeo Bowl.

Seven riders attempted to ride the bulls they drew and seven failed as Pete Carr's big livestock proved unconquerable.

However, not all of Carr's animals had that dominant of a night. The horses were pretty much owned by cowboys throughout the evening.

The bareback event witnessed five of six broncs successfully ridden with Rvan Stutes of Sulphur, La., starting the night with an impressive score of 85. His score was equaled by Dennis Foyil of Guthrie, Okla., and Evan Jayne of Marseille, France.

Jake Halverson of Amarillo and Forrie Smith of Capitan, N.M., each registered a 76. Halverson continued his strong night in the saddle-bronc, posting an 84 to lead the event. He's trailed by five cowboys who posted scores of 77.

Big Spring's own Stephanie Fryar currently sits second in barrel racing with a time of 17.34, trailing only Dylan Carter of Merkel with a 17.14. The women's event is one of the more hotly contested ones after the first night with El Paso's Jessie Moody in third with a time of 17.36 and Colorado City's Callie

Coahoma baseball campers have fun learning skills

COAHOMA — Many find retaining what is being taught is much easier when learning is fun.

That's the main objective at the Coahoma Baseball Camp led by Coach Brad Harman. Harman utilizes several competitions and other activities in order to teach campers about the fundamentals of the game.

"It's got to be fun," Harman said. "If kids aren't having fun for the four hours they're out here in the heat, then they're not going to want to be here. It also encourages them to get off the couch this summer and get outside to do some activi-

Harman wrapped up his annual camp Thursday with two big competitions and one teaching activity that allowed the campers to cool down in the hot weather after spending the first three days working on throwing, fielding and hitting.

"The first day, we spent the day learning how to properly throw the ball. Tuesday, we spent the day fielding, and Wednesday was our hitting day," noted Harman. "So on the last day, I throw in the base running, and we have two big competitions with the winners getting some pretty good prizes."

To teach the campers

Harman set out a slip and slide in foul territory along the third-base line. The boys were told how to slide, and the more times they did it right, the longer they got to continue sliding.

The camp ended with a fielding and throwing competition as well as a hitting competition with the winners receiving prizes such as hats, batting bags or tickets to a Rockhounds Midland

Twelve boys participated in this year's camp — the lowest total since Harman has led the event. However, he wasn't discouraged by the lower numbers and still concentrated on the

Pacman knows he has to prove himself

IRVING — Adam "Pacman" Jones had to wait more than a year to get back on the field. So when the suspended cornerback was finally cleared this month to practice with the Dallas Cowboys, he was ready.

"He's very serious. I think he understands that this is a big step for him this year," secondary coach Dave Campo said.

"He's hungry. He wants to do good. He wants to play good."

Really, Jones just wants to play after missing all the 2007 season while serving his NFL suspension that has not yet been completely lifted.

While Jones might have to wait until the week before the Cowboys' Sept. 7 opener to find out if commissioner Roger Goodell will let him play during the regular season, Jones is already trying to prove himself to the Cowboys, who acquired him from Tennessee in April. So far, Jones has made a good

impression. "He's just an instinctive cornerback," receiver Patrick Crayton said. "He backpedals natural. He doesn't look nervous. ... Right now, he's just trying to get back in the groove."

In each of his first two practices two weeks ago, Jones had an interception that he returned toward the end zone. He took some snaps with the first-team defense during the team's only mandatory minicamp this week, which wrapped up Thursday without a practice session.

"Kind of what we thought. He works hard," coach Wade Phillips said. "I thought he was a competitor, but he is an extraordinary competitor. He really likes to mix it up out there and make every play."

Jones had told reporters that he'd talk Thursday after the end

of the minicamp. But there was no media access after Phillips canceled the final scheduled practice.

Instead of practice, players, coaches and their families took part in a picnic and other family activities at the Valley Ranch facility. The family lunch was already planned, but players weren't told about the cancellation of practice until getting to

*Woods having season-ending knee surgery

CHICAGO — Doctors who treat the kinds of knee and leg injuries that ended Tiger Woods' victorious season have one word for his U.S. Open victory remarkable.

"The fact that he had surgery two months ago and seemed to visibly be in pain with certain shots ... I find it remarkable that he could play as well as he did and win a major tournament," said Dr. David McAllister, a UCLA sports medicine special-

Still, there's no reason to think it will be Woods' last — despite

needing surgery to repair a ruptured left knee ligament and treatment for a double stress fracture in the same leg's shinbone, experts said Thursday.

But even if Woods returns to playing championship-level golf next year, as expected, his prospects further down the road are uncertain. The repeated wear and tear on his knee, including an operation that will be his third in five years, could result in early arthritis that might eventually slow down his career, said Dr. Charles Bush-Joseph, the Chicago White Sox' team physician and an orthopedic surgeon at Rush University

Medical Center.

"Given his natural ability and athletic talent, I think his chances are excellent. He should be able to get back and compete at the same level. How well he holds up long-term over the next five to 10 years, that's what's in doubt," Bush-Joseph said.

Woods. 32, announced Wednesday that he will have surgery to reconstruct the anterior cruciate ligament he ruptured last year while running. It will sideline him for the rest of this season's PGA Tour and likely will require up to nine months of recovery, experts said.

He also revealed he needs time

off to recover from stress frac- of tendon taken from another tures discovered after his April surgery to clean out cartilage damage from the ACL injury.

The ligament is a band of fibrous tissue at the center of the knee that helps stabilize the joint. When the ACL is injured, cartilage, the knee's natural shock-absorber, can tear, said knee specialist Dr. Nicholas DiNubile, a spokesman for the American Academy Orthopaedic Surgeons and consultant to the Philadelphia 76ers.

Reconstructive ACL surgery typically involves replacing the damaged ligament with a piece part of the patient's knee. Ligaments from cadaver donors also are sometimes used. Surgeons generally make a small cut below the knee, insert a narrow tube and thread the tendon or graft up the tube and position it into the knee joint.

Woods' decision not to have surgery last year when he first injured the ACL wasn't necessarily misguided, doctors said.

The initial rupture likely was extremely painful, but soreness and swelling typically subside. McAllister said he has treated

their position meetings Thursday morning.

The three-day minicamp followed four weeks of optional workouts, the first two coming before Jones was cleared to participate. There are no more organized practices for the Cowboys until they report to training camp in Oxnard, Calif., on July 24.

Jones was suspended in April 2007 following an accumulation of arrests and legal problems, including his connection to a shooting at a Las Vegas strip club. He's been arrested six times and involved in 12 incidents requiring police intervention since being drafted in the first round by Tennessee in 2005.

"The past is the past. I made some bad decisions and I owned up to all my decisions," Jones said June 4, after his second workout with the Cowboys and the first open to the media. "Now I worry about the future."

That was the only extensive interview Jones has

done at Valley Ranch since being cleared by Goodell to return to the field for practices and preseason games. He said then it was "in a great position and I'm ready for it."

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Former aide: Bush should tell all on CIA leak

Associated Press Writer WASHINGTON — A former White House spokesman told Congress on Friday that President Bush and Vice President Dick

Cheney wanted him to say that Cheney's chief of staff wasn't involved in the leak of a CIA operative's identity, an assertion that turned out to be false.

Scott McClellan, Bush's spokesman from 2003-2006, said he had reservations about publicly clearing the name of I. Lewis "Scooter" Libby, Cheney's chief of staff at the time. Later, Libby was convicted of obstructing the investigation of the leak of Valerie Plame's CIA identity.

McClellan told the House Judiciary Committee that he doesn't know if a crime was committed. But he had harsh words for the White House, suggesting that the administration is continuing to cover up.

The four-time All-Star had the game-ending RBI single and the Texas Rangers rallied twice to beat Atlanta 5-4 Thursday, the Braves' major league record 22nd straight one-run loss on the

Hitless in his previous 13 at bats, Young knew it was about time to reverse that trend.

"Gradually today I started seeing the ball better and driving the ball to right field," said Young, whose average during the slump had dipped from .304 to .282 prior to Thursday's game. "I think I'm on my way. Sometimes a slump is good for you. I love playing in the big leagues because the game always pushes you to test you."

With the score 4-all, Ian Kinsler led off the ninth with a double off Blaine Boyer (1-5). Chris Shelton popped out on a bunt attempt before Young lined a single to right off Jeff Bennett. Kinsler scored without a throw to the plate as right fielder Jeff Francoeur was unable to field the ball cleanly, and Young was mobbed on the field by his team-

"I felt like I would have had a chance to make a play but it was hard hit," Francoeur said. "It either flew out of my glove or I might have kicked it. I felt my glove and the ball wasn't there. It had to be a really good throw because (Kinsler) is fast.'

Rangers manager Ron Washington felt confident that Young's slump wouldn't last much longer.

"We certainly had the right guy up at the right time, and he delivered," Washington said. "We all know what type of hitter Michael is. If he is in a slump, we know it won't be for long."

Chipper Jones went 0-for-4 for the Braves as his major leagueleading batting average fell below .400 for the first time since Morton ran into trouble in his



 ${\it BALTIMORE-As\ a\ vintage}\ tune\ by\ {\it Pink\ Floyd\ blared}$ throughout the clubhouse, the Baltimore Orioles celebrated their latest harrowing victory and packed their bags for a ninegame road trip.

Headed for Milwaukee, the Orioles spoke hopefully about building on a 5-1 homestand that ended Thursday night with a 7-5 victory over the woeful Houston Astros, completing a three-game sweep.

Baltimore played four straight one-run games — two against Pittsburgh and two against Houston — before George Sherrill blunted a ninth-inning uprising by the Astros, who have lost eight in a row.

"We're just doing enough to get by right now. I tell you, we'd really like a game where we just blow somebody out," said Aubrey Huff, who had one of Baltimore's three home runs. "But we'll take 'em any way we can get them."

Alex Cintron and Ramon Hernandez also homered for the Orioles, whose last three-game

sweep of an interleague foe came in June 2005 — at home against Houston. Baltimore fell behind 2-0 before winning for the 17th time when trailing by at least two runs.

"When you get a sweep, I don't care if it's easy, hard, indifferent or whatever, vou'll take it." Orioles manager Dave Trembley said. "It's a positive occurrence around here. ... So on we go to National League-style baseball for the next nine days and we'll see what we got."

Brian Burres (6-5) allowed three runs and seven hits in 52-3 innings to help the Orioles climb three games over .500 (37-34) for the first time since May 21.

Sherrill entered with the bases loaded in the ninth and gave up a sacrifice fly to Kazuo Matsui and a run-scoring infield hit to Miguel Tejada before retiring Lance Berkman on a short fly ball to earn his 24th save.

"That's all you can ask for is to get the tying run up to the plate," Berkman said. "Really, when you're facing that kind of deficit heading into the ninth, most of the time you're not going to get it done. Just to get the tying run up there is a good thing."

Tejada and Hunter Pence homered, and Berkman had three hits for the Astros, who have been outscored 57-28 during their eight-game skid. Houston has lost a franchise-record six straight interleague games and is 1-8 against AL foes.

"We have a lot of veterans on this team and guys who have beenthroughit before,"Berkman said. "It doesn't do a whole lot of good to panic. In fact, I think it's counterproductive. We've got to do something to right the ship. It's just been a tough last three weeks for us."

The defeat was Houston's 17th in 20 games. Only a loss by Cincinnati earlier in the day kept the Astros from dropping into last place in the NL Central.

"We have not been playing as good as we can," Houston manager Cecil Cooper conceded. "It's just one of those streaks you're in. You just got to keep playing hard. ... We just got to find a way to stop it. And we will."

Tejada went 2-for-5 and finished 2-for-12 in his first series against the Orioles since they traded him to the Astros in December.

older, amateur golfers who opted not to have surgery for ACL injuries and continued playing without any problems.

But when swelling and pain recur, it suggests the knee is unstable and probably at risk for damage to cartilage, McAllister

DiNubile said delaying surgery might have worsened the damage, but having the surgery would have ruined Woods' season and his thrilling U.S. Open win on Monday would never have happened.

Added Dr. Riley Williams, an orthopedic surgeon at Hospital for Special Surgery in New York:

"One could say he had a mixed result. He obviously made millions of dollars and had seven or eight more wins on tour. So it's hard to argue with his decision.

"But ultimately — as I'm sure his doctor told him — that knee problem is going to win," Williams said.

Woods' doctors said his intense rehabilitation after his April cartilage operation and preparing for the Open likely caused the stress fractures.

For right-handed golfers like Woods, the left knee takes the brunt of stress from the swing. But the high speed and torque of Woods' well-known "violent" swing puts even more stress on that left knee, said Dr. Sherwin Ho, a University of Chicago sports medicine expert. Ho said that could have contributed to the stress fractures and other damage.

Stress fractures are cracks in bones typically caused by over-

They can be mild or pretty serious, depending on the location, McAllister said.

Treatment includes rest, avoiding the activity that caused the fractures, or surgery in severe

When we are driving down the information highway, Lord, may we look for Your word. Amen

Columbia's most hated woman

ARRANQUILLA, Colombia — Everywhere you go in this country, the mere mention of her name evokes angry reactions. Cursing is people's preferred method to describe how they feel about Colombian leftist Senator Piedad Cordoba. And it's all justified!

Imagine how we Americans would feel if a U.S. senator went

around saying that the world needs more people like Osama bin Laden and telling other al-Qaida terrorists — in uncovered secret e-mails — that she sympathizes with their cause. Imagine those e-mails professing admiration for our enemies. And what if we intercepted e-mails between

terrorists in which they describe this senator as an ally and a possible interim president once the terrorists overthrow the U.S. govern-

It would be shocking, outrageous and disgraceful, right?

Yet that is precisely what Cordoba has done in a country that has suffered more than 40 years of bloodshed by the band of drug-trafficking leftist terrorists, the Revolutionary Armed Forces of Colombia, also known as FARC.

She praises the sacrifice of recently deceased FARC leader Manuel "Sureshot" Marulanda. She describes Venezuela's Socialist President Hugo Chavez, considered Colombia's worst foreign enemy, as her "commander," as someone who has been sent from heaven to save Latin America, and as the person who has restored her faith in Christianity. She calls herself a devout Chavista.

Most Colombians can't decide which is more repulsive: her worship of Chavez or her glorification of guerrillas who left thousands of Colombians dead, orphaned or mutilated.

"In a society where the immense majority sees Sureshot as the incarnation of evil and President (Alvaro) Uribe as a messiah, Cordoba has done what no one dares to do in this country: praise the most hated Colombian and insult the most popular," noted "Semana," a prominent Colombian news magazine.

For a few months last year, Cordoba was authorized by the Colombian government to join Chavez in negotiating the release of hostages held by the FARC in jungle concentration camps. They managed to get six hostages released. But once the government called off the negotiations because the rebels wanted their own chunk of Colombia in exchange for more hostages — it became clear that Cordoba had not been acting as an impartial "humanitarian facilitator," but as an enemy within the Colombian government.

In the past year, Colombians have seen Cordoba in Mexico calling on all Latin American countries to break diplomatic and trade relations with her own country, lobbying in Washington against the U.S. free trade agreement with Colombia, clapping in Nicaragua as Chavez attacked the Colombian government, and criticizing Uribe in Spain.

But it was the e-mails found in the computer of a rebel leader killed by the Colombian army that exposed Cordoba as a FARC conspirator. That computer, belonging to Raul Reyes, the FARC's second-ranking commander, was seized by Colombian authorities after a March 1 cross-border bombing raid on Reyes' camp in Ecuador. The same laptop that contained evidence implicating Chavez and Ecuadorian President Rafael Correa as supporters of Colombian terrorists also contained evidence that shows Cordoba was working against her government.

Chavez, Correa and Cordoba deny the accusations, noting that their only contact with the FARC was in trying to secure the release of hostages. But there are few people in Colombia who believe them, especially because an independent Interpol investigation found that no one had tampered with the rebel leader's computer files.

Because the FARC is classified as a terrorist organization by both the Colombian and U.S. governments, contact with these guerrillas can be considered a crime. But because Cordoba was designated by the Uribe government to negotiate with the rebels, prosecuting her might be difficult.

Nevertheless, she is clearly the most hated woman in Colombia, especially because she went as far as to make recommendations on which hostages should not be released because they are too valuable to the FARC and their cause.

Among more than 900 e-mails sent by rebel leaders mentioning Cordoba's name, there is one in particular that makes Colombians

very angry. In it, one rebel relays a message from Cordoba about the FARC's most prominent hostage, Ingrid Betancourt, a French-Colombian former presidential candidate, who was abducted six years ago. He reported that Cordoba told him "that Ingrid is skinny, but she has always been skinny, and she is not going to die from it. And she believes some hostages need to be released to Chavez at the border (with Venezuela), but not Ingrid."

In another e-mail, using the code name of Teodora de Bolivar, Cordoba encouraged the guerrillas to support Chavez in his failed effort to change the Venezuelan Constitution in a December referendum that would have given Chavez the power of a dictator.

Instead of acting as a government negotiator, Colombians say Cordoba clearly has "crossed the line" and conspired with the enemy. Many are now calling for her to be charged with anything from treason to inciting rebellion and terrorism.

Because more than 30 former Colombian legislators and Uribe allies are in jail for colluding with right-wing paramilitary militias, many Colombians believe that leftists who conspire with the FARC should also be in prison.

Last month, Colombia's chief prosecutor -- citing the e-mails from Reyes' computer -- called on the Colombian Supreme Court to investigate the FARC's ties with Cordoba and two other legislators. Under Colombian law, only the Supreme Court can bring charges against sitting legislators.

"One thing is freedom of expression, and another thing is to wipe the floor with the Colombian flag." charged Colombian legislator Roy Barreras. He also called on the country's highest court to stop Cordoba from working against Colombia's best interests.

Even former Colombian President Cesar Gaviria, the leader of Cordoba's Liberal Party, had to distance the party from her outrageous remarks and scandalous e-mails. "That attitude is harmful to democracy and liberalism," Gaviria told reporters.

Looking at photos and videos of the beret-wearing senator as she hugs and kisses the rebels makes many Colombians believe that instead of a public servant, Cordoba is public enemy No. 1. Her support of terrorism is no longer in dis-

No making sense of this loss

'n the outpouring of tributes and anecdotes about the passing of Tim Russert, one item caught my eye. It was a note that recalled that this was the second tragedy in a matter of months for the Russert family: It was less than three months ago that Tim's sister Betty lost her husband, William Buckenroth; he was 61.

Meanwhile, their father, Tim Russert senior or "Big Russ," continues to live in Buffalo.

I can't help but think how crazy it is to lose your 61-yearold husband and then your 58-year-old brother, while your father survives them both. What sense does that make?

Children are supposed to bury their parents, not the other way

When someone as young and full of life as Tim dies, we all struggle to make sense of it. I read numerous posts about his medical situation, about his being overweight and even diabetic, about the plaque in his arteries and the size of his heart. We search for ways to prove that what happened to him somehow made sense in view of his condition, not ours, explanations that will allow us to create a safe distance between ourselves and the

prospect of sudden death.

But it doesn't work. There is no sense. Tim Russert was the king of the hill until he wasn't. He was the luckiest guy in town until his luck ran out. Luck shouldn't count for so much, but it does.

Washington is full of guys with cholesterol plaque in their arteries and too much fat in their middles who don't keel over and die at work at the age of 58. Many of them aren't nearly as good, nearly as generous, nearly as hardworking or honorable as Tim Russert was.

My father died of a heart attack at 54, shortly before I graduated from law school and moved to Washington. When I got there, I couldn't help but look around and see a town full of people in no better shape than my slightly overweight, workaholic dad, people who got up and went to work every day and kept doing what they were doing, while my father was not so lucky. At the time, it made me angry and sad. It seemed wrong somehow. My father was a better man than so many of them. Why did his heart give way, while theirs kept beating?

You wouldn't know it from all the tributes that sing his praises without reservation, but Washington is full of people who envied Tim Russert's successes and begrudged him his triumphs. Schadenfreude is at least as common in Washington as it is in Hollywood, and the busi-

ness of political journalism is full of people who think they deserve more than they have, or that others deserve less. No one is ever so celebrated in life as they are in death. None of us ever notices how much luck matters until it runs out.

I don't know Tim's sister Betty, but my heart goes out to her, along with the other members of the Russert family. Too much loss. Lousy luck. No sense.

As for the rest of us, the question is whether we will learn anything from their loss. I don't mean the lessons about good cardiac health, about exercise and arteries and taking and keeping weight off, although those are certainly important. I mean about being as generous in life as we are in death, about recognizing the good luck we have when we have it and being grateful for it so that we do not feel ambushed by misfortune when luck runs out.

No one is jealous of Tim anymore. Isn't that always true? So why be jealous in the first instance? Why not just be grateful for what we have? It is the only sense there is to be made of such a loss.




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News in brief

Obama's money decision allows him to implement new campaign strategy

WASHINGTON (AP) — Barack Obama faced two critical questions: where to play and how to pay. To answer both, the Democrat reversed course to become the first candidate to reject \$85 million in public money for the general election.

The decision will allow the record-shattering fundraiser to raise and spend as much as he wants — and, thus, implement his strategy to expand the Electoral College playing field.

Shortly after announcing that he would rely on his vast network of private donors. Obama launched a bold new advertising campaign that signaled a desire to compete in a mix of traditional battleground states and Republican strongholds while trying to win over independents and disaffected Republicans after eight years of President Bush.

"America is a country of strong families and strong values. My life's been blessed by both," Obama says in the ad slated to run in 18 states. "If I have the honor of taking the oath of office as president, it will be with a deep and abiding faith in the country I love."

In its images and in its words, the 60-second commercial that opens Obama's general election campaign seeks to introduce the first-term Illinois senator to voters. It also positions him more toward the center of the electorate by emphasizing universal issues of family and values while addressing some of his political vulnerabilities.

Small Missouri towns the latest front in battle to contain the Mississippi River

FOLEY, Mo. (AP) — For the second time in 15 years, Keith Aubuchon found himself packing his belongings and evacuating his home to escape a "100-year" flood of the Mississippi River.

He returned and remodeled his house after the flood of 1993. This time, he doesn't know if it will be worth coming back.

"This is my second flood. I don't think there will be a third," Aubuchon said as he drove a pickup truck loaded with a washing machine and other belongings out of his subdivision. Floodwaters rapidly filled the roads, yards and gullies behind him just hours after a levee breached north of Foley. Authorities estimate much of the small town will be flooded by the weekend.

Three Mississippi River levees broke Thursday in Lincoln County, sending a creeping wave of water toward Foley and causing more concern in nearby Winfield.

The river was overflowing 90 percent of the levees in eastern Lincoln County, and at least four more breaches were expected to aggravate the flooding overnight, said Lincoln County Emergency Management spokesman Andy Binder.

Telecom immunity from lawsuits over eavesdropping a part of bill updating law

WASHINGTON (AP) — For months the debate over whether telecommunications companies should face lawsuits for cooperating with the government's warrantless wiretapping program has been the sticking point for updating a surveillance law.

With a compromise at hand, the House prepared Friday to vote on a measure that effectively protects telecoms from civil lawsuits but also sets out steps for investigating the wiretapping program to determine its scope and legality.

The update to the 1978 Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act was expected to pass the House, potentially ending the standoff between Democrats and Republicans about the rules for government wiretapping inside the United States. The Senate is expected to pass the bill with a large margin, perhaps as soon as next week.

Warrantless wiretapping, which went on for almost six years after the Sept. 11 attacks, was revealed publicly in late 2005 by The New York Times and then discontinued in January 2007. Some 40 lawsuits have been filed against the companies by groups and individuals who think the Bush administration illegally monitored their phone calls or e-mails.

Thousands of Thai anti-government protesters clash with police, demand premier's ouster

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) - Several thousand protesters pushed through a heavy police cordon around Thailand's seat of government Friday, vowing to peacefully besiege the compound until the prime minister resigns.

After initially scuffling with the demonstrators, the police offered little resistance as crowds surged toward and pressed up against a fence on two sides of the Government House compound.

The protesters, spearheaded by the People's Alliance for Democracy movement, claim that Prime Minister Samak Sundaravej's government is a proxy for former Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra, who was ousted in a 2006 military coup.

The alliance led mass demonstrations before the coup,

demanding Thaksin step down for alleged corruption and abuse of power.

They now accuse Samak's government of interfering with corruption charges against Thaksin and trying to change the constitution for its own self-interest.

China raises prices of refined oil products, electricity; oil futures pitch on the news

BEIJING (AP) — China raised prices for fuel by as much as 18 percent on Friday in a move intended to cool the nation's surging energy consumption.

Demand for the energy needed fuel China's booming economy has contributed to unheard of prices for a barrel of oil. That price pitched downward immediately Thursday, Light, sweet crude for July delivery fell \$4.75 to settle at \$131.93 a barrel on the New York Mercantile Exchange.

The price increases were announced late Thursday by the National Development and Reform Commission, the government's main economic planning agency.

Prices of gasoline and diesel oil rose by 1,000 yuan (\$145) per ton to 6,980 yuan (\$1,015) and 6,520 yuan (\$949), or 16 percent and 18 percent, respectively.

2 former Bear Stearns managers charged with lying to investors about housing meltdown

NEW YORK (AP) — Two former Bear Stearns hedge fund managers were hauled into jail Thursday and charged with lying to investors about the collapse of the subprime mortgage market, perhaps signaling the start of a wave of prosecutions arising from the housing melt-

Ralph Cioffi and Matthew Tannin were accused of encouraging investors to stay in their hedge funds, heavily exposed to subprime mortgages, even as they knew the credit market was in serious trouble.

They were indicted on conspiracy and fraud counts. the first criminal charges to hit Wall Street in the housing market meltdown.

The eventual implosion of their two hedge funds cost investors \$1.8 billion and started the domino effect that led to the demise of Bear Stearns itself, which barely avoided bankruptcy in a rescue buyout.

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
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
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
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
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*Anglican Bible conservatives hold summit

Less than a month ahead of a global gathering of Anglican leaders, conservative bishops angry about the liberalism of churches in the United States, Canada and elsewhere are meeting for a strategy summit in Jordan and Israel.

Organizers of the Global Anglican Future Conference say they will not formally break with the 77 million-member Anglican family when the meeting ends June 29. Even so, the gathering is a challenge to Anglicans who want their fellowship to remain unchanged.

"This is a show of force, unity and global significance," said the Rev. Peter Moore, former dean of Trinity Episcopal School of Ministry, a conservative Pennsylvania semi-"The Anglican Communion is in the process of breaking up. What will emerge from that, I don't know."

The event, starting Wednesday with closeddoor sessions in Amman, Jordan, moves Sunday to Jerusalem for public discussions and visits to holy sites. About 1,000 attendees — including bishops, clergy, lay people and their families — are expected in Israel.

The timing is key.

The summit occurs one month before the Lambeth Conference, the once-adecade meeting of all Anglican bishops, organized by their spiritual leader. Archbishop of Rowan Canterbury Williams.

Many of the estimated 280 bishops attending the conservative summit are boycotting Lambeth, mainly because Williams invited bishops from the U.S. Episcopal Church, the Anglican Church of Canada and elsewhere who believe that the Bible permits committed gay relationships.

The Episcopal Church the U.S. Anglican body caused an uproar in 2003 by approving the first openly gay bishop, the Most Rev. Gene Robinson New Hampshire. Williams barred Robinson from Lambeth, but included the American bishops who consecrated him.

More conflict arose last weekend when it was revealed that two male Church of England priests exchanged rings and vows in a May 31 church ceremony in London. The bishop of London is inves-

tigating. 'Going to Lambeth? The question is 'What for?'" said Archbishop Henry Orombi, leader of the conservative Anglican Church of Uganda and a lead organizer of the conservative meeting.

"We don't think three weeks in Lambeth under those circumstances will edify anybody," he told

Anglican TV Ministries, an independent traditionalist group, last month. "There will be more conflicts rather than fellowship. It's not going to be helpful."

The division is rooted in the shifting center of global Christianity.

The Anglican Communion is a loose association of churches that grew from the colonial missionary efforts of the Church of England. Most Anglicans in Africa, Asia and Latin America embraced the missionaries' traditional outlook.

In recent decades, as membership dwindled in liberal-leaning European and North American churches, the roles of Global South churches, as they are known, expanded dramatically. The majority of Anglicans now live in developing countries and are scandalized bу Northern views Scripture.

The leadership of the summit conservative comes mainly from these provinces.

The top organizers are Orombi, along with the archbishops — called primates — of the Anglican churches of Nigeria, Kenya, Rwanda, Tanzania and the Southern Cone based in Argentina. U.S. conservatives, a minority within the Episcopal Church, and British Anglicans also are playing important roles.

"There is an air of certainty and clarity among the bishops going to GAFCON, which stifles debate and openness to those of other views," said Mark D. Chapman, lecturer in systematic theology atRiponCollegeCuddesdon in Oxford, England. "This would change the soul of Anglicanism as an inclusive and tolerant church that is able to live with difference."

But Bishop Martyn Minns, head of the conservative Convocation of Anglicans in North America, said orthodox Anglicans are the ones being shut out.

Minns leads a network of breakaway Episcopal parishes based in Virginia that have affiliated with Nigerian Archbishop Peter Akinola. The Episcopal Diocese of Virginia has sued to keep the parish property — worth millions of dollars — that Minns' group wants to take with them.

Minns said it was "insult-**Episcopal** ing" that Presiding Bishop Katharine Jefferts Schori is sending a representative, Colorado Bishop Robert O'Neill, to be her "eyes and ears" at the Jerusalem events. The invitation-only summit will focus on joint ministries, relations Muslims, training clergy and fighting poverty.

"We need to stop reacting to the latest American ideas and get along with the business of the Gospel,"

Minns said. While the conference participants share a theological outlook, they disagree over what they should do next. Some have close relationships with North American and Europeandioceses, schools and ministries, and gain stature from their ties to a major world church. The communion is the world's third-largest Christian body, behind the Roman Catholic and Orthodox Christian churches.
