Big Spring losing 300 jobs

Big Spring's economy has taken a big hit with the news that Solitaire Homes and StarTek Inc. are shutting down local operations.

Both companies will close local operations in August, actions that will impact close to 300 employees.

Solitaire, which produces manufactured housing, will close its doors effective Aug. 27, according to information released by Plant General Manager Garland Gandy.

StarTek, which provides call center technical support for various businesses, will close effective Aug. 18. It currently employs 198 people.

Solitaire employed about 100 people, according to Gandy's

Solitaire purchased the local plant from the city in May 1999 after its predecessor, Signal Homes, closed the previous year.

In May 2002, the plant was closed by a fire which destroyed most of its manufacturing capability, causing the layoff of more than 160 employees. The plant resumed partial production in June 2006 and increased to full operations soon after.

Corporate officials said the inability to sustain a large enough work force led to the decision to close the plant.

"Big Spring Manufactured Homes was fortunate to have many hard-working and dedicated employees during its time in business," stated a release from company official D.J. Hogstad. "However, the simple, unfortunate truth is that we were never able to achieve and maintain a workforce sufficient to operate the factory to its necessary capacity."

Garland Gandy said company officials would assist workers in finding new employment.



LOS ANGELES — George Carlin, the frenzied performer whose routine "Seven Words You Can Never Say On Television" led to a key Supreame Court ruling on obscenity, has died.

Carlin, who had a history of heart trouble, went into St. John's Health Center in Santa Monica on Sunday afternoon complaining of chest pain and died later that evening, said his publicist, Jeff Abraham. He had performed as recently as last weekend at the Orleans Casino and Hotel in

Sales tax receipts up for city of Big Spring

Sales tax receipts were up for June for the city of Big Spring, according to the State Comptroller's Office.

The city accepted \$451,190.89 this month. compared to \$402,148.62 in June of 2007 — a difference of 12.19 percent. For

the year, Big Spring has taken in \$2,792,191.88, up a scant 2.48 percent.

Coahoma took in \$18,394.76 this month, down 41.92 percent when compared to the \$14,453.89 received a year ago. So far in 2008. Coahoma has received \$55,030.45, down 4.86 percent.

Forsan witnessed a 35.08

percent increase, comparing compared to the \$2,408,382.14 this month's total of \$9,010.30 with last June's total of \$6,670.21. For the year, Forsan has received \$39,210.65, down 5.68 percent.

Following suit, sales tax revenues were up in Abilene well. The Key City as received \$2,608,982.68 this month, up 8.32 percent when received in June 2007. For the year, Abilene has taken in \$17,031,393.74, up 1.31 percent. Andrews had a good month, receipt-wise. That city took in \$310,352.81, up 31.90 percent compared to the \$235,282.11 received in June 2007. For the

NEW YORK (AP) — Raging Midwest floodwaters that swallowed crops and sent corn and soybean prices soaring are about to give consumers more grief at the grocery store. In the latest bout of food inflation, beef, pork, poultry and even eggs, cheese and milk are expected to get more expensive as livestock owners go out of business or are forced to slaughter more cattle, hogs, turkeys and chickens to cope with rocketing costs for corn-based animal feed.

The floods engulfed an estimated 2 million or more acres of corn and soybean fields.



functions of running the line out at the plant and doing all we can do to help our employees in finding new employment after Solitaire has ceased its operation here," he said.

For his part, Gandy will focus on selling existing Solitaire homes to independent retail dealers.

"Luckily, for myself and my wife. Holly, this leaves us with several options, including staying here in Big Spring to run

that part of the business," he said.

Corporate officials stated in a release that some key or management employees may move to work in factories located in other states.

"A Solitaire-related entity may also be in a position to offer positions at a new factory slated to open in 2009 in Ojinaga, Mexico," the release stated.

StarTek opened its Big Spring office, located in College Park Shopping Center, in 1999.

In their statement, StarTek officials cited "changing business needs" as the reason for local operations. closing

Officials said they will provide a variety of employee assistance programs, including job fairs and career counseling, to help with the transition.

Where feasible, the statement read, eligible employees may have an opportunity to transfer to one of the company's other facilities.

"We want to take this opportunity to express our gratitude to the citizens of Big Spring who have made StarTek a welcome member of the community," said David Whyburn, Big Spring center director. "During this difficult time we will do everything we can to ensure the continued

success of our employees as they transition to new careers."

Terry Wegman, executive director of the Big Spring Economic Development Corporation, said businesses throughout West Texas are having trouble attracting sufficient employees right now.

"It's kind of a paradox right now," Wegman said. "Overall, the economy is in good shape, but a lot of employers are having trouble finding enough people." Such was the case with StarTek

and Solitaire, he added. "It was kind of a shock and we

certainly didn't anticipate (the closings), but we did realize that a lot of our employers are in des-____ perate need of extra help," he said. "These were two businesses that could not reach the 'critical mass' necessary to sustain their operations."

Wegman said several governmental entities, including the Workforce Commission, will assist workers in finding new employment through a variety of efforts, including job fairs and helping people with resumes and other job-finding skills.

Las Vegas. He was 71. "He was a genius and I will miss him dearly," Jack Burns, who was the other half of a comedy duo with Carlin in the early 1960s, told The Associated Press.

Carlin's jokes constantly breached the accepted boundaries of comedy and particularly language, with his routine on the 'Seven Words' all of which are taboo on broadcast TV and radio to this day. When he uttered all seven at a show in Milwaukee in 1972, he was arrested on charges of disturbing the peace, freed on \$150 bail and exonerated when a Wisconsin judge dismissed the case, saying it was indecent but citing free speech and the lack of any disturbance. When the words were later played on a New York radio station, they resulted in a 1978 Supreme Court ruling upholding the government's authority to sanction stations for broadcasting offensive language during hours when children might be listening.

He produced 23 comedy albums, 14 HBO specials, three books, a couple of TV shows and appeared in several movies, from his own comedy specials to "Bill and Ted's Excellent Adventure" in 1989 — a testament to his range from cerebral satire and

Despite his reputation unapologetically as irreverent, Carlin was a television staple through the decades, serving as host of the "Saturday Night Live" debut in 1975 — noting on his Web site that he was "loaded on cocaine all week long" and appearing some 130

He won four Grammy Awards, each for best spoken comedy album, and was nominated for five Emmy awards. On Tuesday, it was announced that Carlin was being awarded the 11th annual Mark Twain Prize for American Humor, which will be presented Nov. 10 in Washington and broadcast on PBS.

Carlin started career on the traditional nightclub circuit in a coat and tie, pairing with Burns to spoof TV game shows, news and movies. Perhaps in spite of the outlaw soul, "George was fairly conservative when I met him," said Burns, describing himself as the more left-leaning of the two. It was a degree of separation that would reverse when they came upon Lenny Bruce, the original shock comic, in the early '60s.

"We were working in Chicago, and we went to see Lenny, and we were both blown away," Burns said. recalling the moment as the beginning of the end for their collaboration if not their close friendship. "It was an epiphany for George. times on "The Tonight The comedy we were doing

Carlin told the AP in a 2004 interview. "There's an idea that the human body is somehow evil and bad and there are parts of it that are especially evil and bad, and we should be ashamed. Carlin was born on May his 12, 1937, and grew up in the Morningside Heights section of Manhattan. raised by a single mother. After dropping out of high school in the ninth grade, he joined the Air Force in 1954. He received three court-martials and numerous disciplinary punishments, according to his official Web site.

While in the Air Force he started working as an offbase disc jockey at a radio station in Shreveport.

Burns, a Texas radio buddy, for Hollywood to pursue a nightclub career as comedy team Burns & Carlin. He left with \$300. but his first break came just months later when the duo appeared on Jack Paar's "Tonight Show."

World Bank can help in food crisis

olicymakers around the world are beginning a conversation about rising food prices, the ones that risk creating great instability in countries like Haiti and Egypt. That conversation will directly affect Texas farmers.

The international situation is so grim that the World Bank just created a fund to help developing nations grow more food. That's a welcome shift.

Many developing nations have let the United States and other developed countries become their food suppliers. That arrangement can't hold up forever, not with so much U.S. corn going to produce ethanol and not with raging population growth in key areas around the world.

The World Bank, plus other institutions, will have the most impact by strategically investing in the farm economies of countries in Africa, Asia and the Caribbean. For example, developing nations often lack the hybrid seeds that yield bountiful harvests.

They don't get developed overnight, as farmers here in Texas and scientists at schools like Texas A&M will attest. But hybrid seeds can make a substantial difference in the production of a crop, which is why international aid could help farmers in less-developed nations produce more food with better seeds. The World Bank also can help farmers in poor nations afford fertilizer, the rising price of which is a huge issue here in Texas, too. U.S. farmers are paying 65 percent more for fertilizer than they did last year.

solving numeric equations, in favor of pushing students to write about math and how they might solve a problem. Their unofficial motto was: There is no right answer. (Even to 2 + 2.) They were clever. They knew how to make it seem as if they were pushing for more rigor, as

example, they said they wanted to teach children algebra starting in kindergarten, which seemed rigorous, but they had expanded the definition of algebra to the point that it was meaningless. the other side were reformers who wanted the board to push through rigorous and specific standards that raised the bar for all California kids. Miraculously, they succeeded, and they took pride in the state Board of Education's vote for academic standards that called for all eighth-graders to learn Algebra

Now many of those who fought on ground zero are afraid that the current board members will vote to undermine that standard. Earlier this month, many of those educators wrote to board President Ted Mitchell, urging that the board reject a vote they believe would undermine the Algebra I standard. The board tabled the measure until later. The fight continues.

Because this is an education issue. educratese obscures the issue, so bear with me. Understand that while the board members maintain that they voted to make Algebra I the standard for eighth-graders,

— and this is where the fighting starts — that Algebra I was never an eighth-grade standard. "There's a state desire for all eighthgraders to take algebra, but that is not the official standard," said spokeswoman Hilary McLean. They use the fact that the standard has yet to be met to back up their argument. "They've always wanted a safety valve for the kids who



It took three nights, but Pete Carr's bulls were finally conquered Saturday night at the 75th Cowboys Reunion and Rodeo.

Well, at least two of them were.

Danny McDowell of Jena, La., opened the bull riding event with an impressive score of 82 on a bull named Blue Chip. Then, for the next seven riders, it appeared he might be the only cowboy to stay on for eight seconds, meaning McDowell would've received the entire purse of more than \$3,000 for the event.

However, the final ride of the night turned out to be one for the ages. Lamesa's Casey Bowman mounted the bull Air Up and delivered the best performance of the night in the judges' minds. After the whistle was blown, signifying that eight seconds had elapsed, Bown was given a score of 93, giving him a gold buckle and \$1.650.25.

Bull riding was the only event to have its eventual winner perform on the final night.

Ryan Stutes' opening score of 89 proved to be enough to claim the buckle in the bareback riding, netting the Sulphur, La., native \$1,102. Dennis Foyil of Guthrie, Okla., and Frenchman Evan Jayne shared the secondplace prize money (\$688.75) with rides of 85.

Native American Todd Rangel of Gladewater and Will Payne of Beaver, Okla., split the top prize in the saddle-bronc with rides scoring 85, netting \$895.37. Amarillo's Jake Halverson and Silverton's Leland Wood posted rides of 84 that were good enough to share the second-place pot of \$463.20.

Cimmaron Thompson of Hobbs, N.M., saw his time of 4.5 seconds hold up in the steer wrestling, netting him \$1129.55. Jake Hodes of Stephenville was just a tenth of second slower for

Busch wins fifth race of year in Sonoma

SONOMA, Calif. -Joe Gibbs Racing officials knew adding Kyle Busch to their organization could be a special pairing.

They had no idea, though, how quickly they'd see a return on their investment.

Busch won his fifth Sprint Cup Series race of the season Sunday when he rolled to victory at Infineon Raceway. With his first road course win, the newcomer and crew chief Steve Addington have grabbed as many victories as teammates Denny Hamlin and Tony Stewart have combined since the start of the 2007 season.

"When you look at it in the way that switching teams and coming to a new organization and working with Steve ... it's come a long way, our chemistry," Busch said.

A long way in a mere 16 races that have thrust Busch into stardom and made him the favorite to win the championship. He's already earned 50 bonus points to use in seeding for the Chase, and his victory Sunday proved he can rally when his momentum starts to slide.

A two-week slump sent Kyle Busch spiraling into crankiness

Catalanotto's pinch hit delivers Rangers over Nats

WASHINGTON — Frank Catalanotto helped the Texas Rangers to a rare kind of win one that put them above the .500.

Texas has found it easy to get even but getting over the hump has been a challenge. Even after Catalanotto sparked Sunday's 5-3 win over the Washington Nationals, the Rangers (39-38) are just 4-15 when trying to reach a winning record this season.

"We're a game over .500 right

now," Marlon Byrd said. "On Tuesday, we'll be two games over."

Vicente Padilla (10-3) gave up three runs and five hits over seven innings to win for the eighth time in nine decisions since April 27. He struck out five and walked two, but wasn't in line for the win until the Rangers rallied in the eighth.

"He's been out there, hanging in there," Texas manager Ron Washington said. "He certainly gave us a chance today."

Brandon Boggs reached on a walk off Luis Ayala (1-4), and after Joel Hanrahan came on in relief, Michael Young and Josh Hamilton struck out. Boggs stole second, went to third on a wild pitch, and after a walk to Byrd, Catalanotto dribbled an RBI grounder to left.

Jarrod Saltalamacchia followed with a base hit to give the Rangers a 5-3 lead.

Eddie Guardado pitched a perfect eighth and C.J. Wilson worked the ninth for his 15th save in 17 chances, sending Washington to its 15th loss in 21 games.

Washington is well aware of his team's struggles to get into the black.

"We've been here before. We've got to continue to play good baseball." Washington said. "And that will take care of itself."

Texas took a 2-0 lead on leadoff home runs by Boggs in the fourth and Ian Kinsler in the sixth. Kinsler's was his 12th of the season and second in two games.

Padilla allowed just one hit in the first five innings — an infield single to Washington starter John Lannan. Willie Harris, who was batting for Lannan, hit a homer to center field with one out in the sixth, his third of the season.

Texas added a run in the seventh on Ramon Vazquez's RBI single off Ayala.

Lannan hasn't won in his last six starts, but kept Washington

It was the remedy Busch needed after a frustrating two weeks. He won earlier this month at Dover, then embarked on his historic "triple" of three races at three different tracks in three days.

Although he finished second in the Truck Series race, the first leg of his journey, he wrecked his Cup car in practice the next day before jetting off to the Nationwide Series race. He wrecked in that event and finished 32nd, then wrecked in the Cup race and finished 43rd.

He wrecked in last week's Nationwide race, as well, and decided after not to hop all over the country this weekend to compete in the lower series' events in Milwaukee.


