

He was born Dec. 30, 1956, in Durant, Okla. He moved to Dimmitt in 1961 from Durant. He had been a resident of Lubbock for several years.



If you're thirsty, he'll share his water with you; if you are hungry, his food. He'll even split his ammunition with you in the midst of battle when you run He has learned to use his hands like weapons and weapons like they were his hands. He can save your life - or take it because that is his job. He will often do twice the work of a civilian, draw half the pay and still find ironic humor in it all. He has seen more suffering and death than he should have in his short lifetime. He has stood atop mountains of dead bodies, and helped to create them. He has wept in public and in private, for friends who have died in combat and is unashamed. He feels every note of the National Anthem vibrate through his body while at rigid attention, while tempering the burning desire to "square-away" those around him who haven't bothered to stand, remove their hat, or even stop talking. In an odd twist, day in and day out, far from home, he defends their right to be disrespectful. Just as did his father, grandfather, and greathe must. 





> Crosbyton only managed five hits off Nazareth's pitching and no one connected for an extra-base hit.


The Swifts enjoyed a 17hit day that included three doubles, a pair of triples and a deep home run.



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Q. My car was parked in my driveway when two young boys and their father came riding by on bikes. One of the younger boys swerved and scratched my car. The father apologized but did not offer to pay for the damage. I want to take the case to small claims court. Who do I sue?

A. You may not have anyone to sue. Under the

law, a young child generally is not responsible for accidentally damaging your property. And contrary to what many people think, parents are not automatically liable for acts of their children. For a parent to be liable you must show that he "negligent" supervising the child. That is, he did not take reasonable steps to protect your car

was just learning to ride, the parent has a duty to watch him closely and keep him away from parked cars. If the parent was not closely supervising the child, he could be considered negligent and responsible for the damage to your car. On the other hand, if the child knew how to ride a bike, the parent has no duty to closely watch him. If the child just lost his balance for a second and swerved, the parent probably has no

responsibility. I suggest you think about what happened and decide if you feel the father was negligent and should be held responsible for the damage to your car. Then can ask you compensation and consider small claims court.





NOTICE OF RECEIPT OF APPLICATION AND INTENT TO OBTAIN AIR PERMIT RENEWAL **PERMIT NO. 21537**

APPLICATION Castro Co Op Gin, Inc., has applied to the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) for renewal of Air Quality Permit No. 21537 which would authorize continued operation of the Cotton Gin at 714 South Highway 385, Dimmitt, Castro County, Texas. The existing facility is authorized to emit the following air contaminants: sulfur dioxide, nitrogen oxides, carbon monoxide, organic compounds, and particulate matter including particulate matter less than 10 microns in diameter.

The TCEQ received this application on January 9, 2003. The application is available for viewing and copying at the TCEQ central office, TCEQ Amarillo regional office, and Castro County Courthouse, 100 East Bedford, First Floor Lobby, Dimmitt, Castro County, Texas. The facility's compliance file, if any exists, is available for public review in the Amarillo regional office of the TCEQ.

The TCEQ executive director has determined the application is administratively complete and will conduct a technical review of the application. Information in the application indicates that this permit renewal would not result in an increase in allowable emissions and would not result in the emission of an air contaminant not previously emitted. The TCEQ may act on this application without seeking further public comment or providing an opportunity for a contested case hearing if certain criteria are met.

PUBLIC COMMENT You may submit public comments, or a request for a contested case hearing to the TCEQ Office of the Chief Clerk at the address below. The TCEQ will consider all public comments in developing a final decision on the application. The deadline to submit public comments is 15 days after newspaper notice is published. After the deadline for public comments, the executive director will prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. Issues such as property values, noise, traffic safety, and zoning are outside of the TCEQ's jurisdiction to address in the permit process.

After the technical review is complete the executive director will consider the comments and prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. If only comments are received, the response to comments, along with the executive director's decision on the application, will then be mailed to everyone who submitted public comments or who is on the mailing list for this application, unless the application is directly referred to a contested case hearing.

OPPORTUNITY FOR A CONTESTED CASE HEARING You may request a contested case hearing. The applicant or the executive director may also request that the application be directly referred to a contested case hearing after technical review of the application. A contested case hearing is a legal proceeding similar to a civil trial in state district court. Unless a written request for a contested case hearing is filed within 15 days from this notice, the executive director may act on the application. If no hearing request is received within this 15-day period, no further opportunity for hearing will be provided. According to the Texas Clean Air Act 8 382.056(o) a contested case hearing may only be granted if the applicant's compliance history is in the lowest classification under applicable compliance history requirements and if the hearing request is based on disputed issues of fact that are relevant and material to the Commission's decision on the application. Further, the Commission may only grant a hearing on those issues raised during the public comment period and not withdrawn.

A person who may be affected by emissions of air contaminants from the facility is entitled to request a hearing. If requesting a contested case hearing, you must submit the following: (1) your name (or for a group or association, an official representative), mailing address, daytime phone number, and fax number, if any; (2) applicant's name and permit number; (3) the statement "[I/we] request a contested case hearing;" (4) a specific description of how you would be adversely affected by the application and air emissions from the facility in a way not common to the general public; (5) the location and distance of your property relative to the facility; and (6) a description of how you use the property which may be impacted by the standing to request a hearing and the interests the group or association seeks to protect must also be identified. You may also submit your proposed adjustments to the application/permit which would satisfy your concerns. Requests for a contested case hearing must be submitted in writing within 15 days following this notice to the Office of the Chief Clerk at the address below.

If any requests for a contested case hearing are timely filed, the executive director will forward the application and any requests for a contested case hearing to the TCEQ Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting. Unless the application is directly referred to a contested case hearing, the executive director will mail the response to comments along with notification of Commission meeting to everyone who submitted comments or is on the mailing list for this application. If a hearing is granted, the subject of a hearing will be limited to disputed issues of fact relating to relevant and material air quality concerns raised during the comment period. Issues such as property values, noise, traffic safety, and zoning are outside of the Commission's jurisdiction to address in this proceeding.

Those on the mailing list will receive copies of future public notices (if any) mailed by the Office of the Chief

Olton student dies in wreck

OLTON - An Olton High School student and a 19-year old Earth man died Sunday, April 20, in a one-car accident, about 4.5 mailes north of Olton, according to reports.
