## Referendum On Cotton Program Is December 15

Farmers "eligible to vote" in the upcoming referendum on 1959-crop cotton marketing quotas has been defined by Searcy M. Ferguson, Chairman, Texas Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

"The general rule is that anyone who engaged in the production of upland cotton in 1958 is eligible to vote in the December 15 referendum," the Chairman explained. "This, of course, would include all persons—whether owner, operator, tenant, or sharecropper—who had an interest in the 1958 upland cotton crop.

"However, under provisions of law now in effect, the term 'eligible voters' also includes some other persons whose right to vote on cotton quotas may not be so well understood," Ferguson declared.

"For instance, any grower who had a 1958 cotton allotment for his farm but who produced no cotton this year is also eligible to cast a ballot on 1959-crop quotas. "Likewise, a farmer who placed his 1958 cotton allotment in the Soil Bank is eligible to vote in the December 15 referendum.

"These are the principal classes of persons who are defined as 'eligible,' " the Chairman stated, "but persons may also qualify to vote as a guardian, administrator, executor, or trustee for another person. In such a case the person for whom he is acting may not also vote.

"Each individual's right to vote depends upon his or her own qualifications," Chairman Ferguson concluded, "and this applies to husbands and wives, as well as minors who were engaged in the production of cotton in 1958."

Where any person has a question about his eligibility to vote in the December 15 referendum on 1959 cotton marketing quotas, he is urged to get in touch with his local county ASC office where he may obtain all the necessary facts.

## Vegetable Executive Speaks To Processors

Mr. Merv Arenchild, manager of the Pacific Fruit and Produce Company division of the Gamble Robinson Company was a visitor in Dimmitt and speaker before a meeting of local plant personnel and the board of directors of Dimmitt Produce Company at noon Monday.

Mr. Arenchild, who is head of all Pacific Fruit and Produce Company operations, said he was well impressed with the Castro County area as a vegetable producer. He indicated that Castro County production will probably eventually reach the same level as their operations in the Rio Grande Valley. By utilizing the local vegetable production, Mr. Arenchild said that it is possible to keep the same workers the year round. When the crop in the Valley plays out in the early summer the company can move their employees to Dimmitt where they will work until the first of the year before returning for a new South Texas crop.

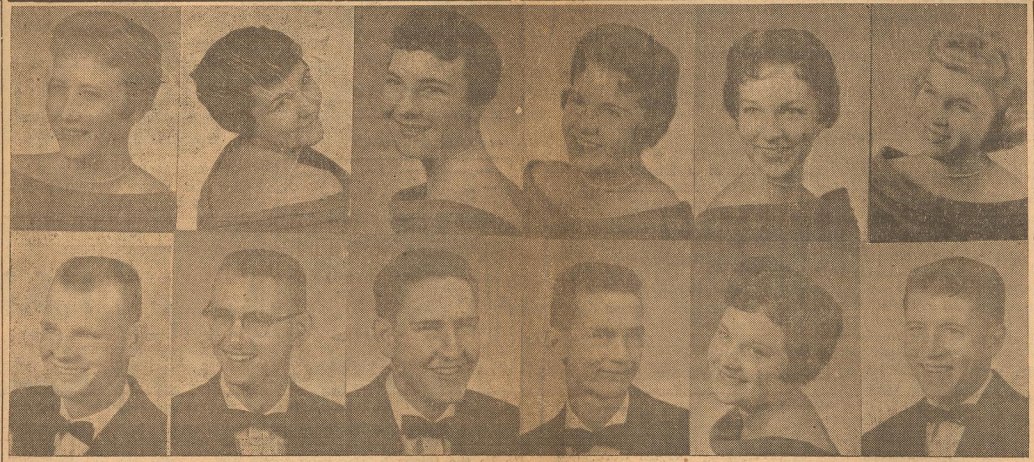

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## Boy Scouts Start '58 Christmas Tree Drive with Grocers

Boy Scout Troop No. 67, as in years past, are selling Christmas trees in Dimmitt.

They're not exactly selling the Christmas trees—that's being done by the local grocery stores—but they are selling dollar tickets which apply to the purchase of the traditional green trees.

It works like this: The Boy Scout knocks on the door of a resident and presents him with the proposition that he buy from one to four Christmas tree tickets at one dollar each. If the home owner agrees and makes the purchase, he can take the ticket or tickets to a grocery store and present them to a clerk as worth one dollar each toward buying a Christmas tree. If he has only one ticket he can either get a one dollar tree or put some more money with the ticket and get what he wants.

Any over-the-counter sale of trees will also go into Boy Scout coffers. While the local grocery stores will actually split the profit with the Scouts, the stores won't make anything on the sale of the trees since they must foot the bill for handling and selling.

In years past the Scouts have maintained central points for the purchase of Christmas trees. However it was decided to abandon this idea this year since it is virtually impossible to keep the small tree store named all the time.

According to local Scoutmaster Dr. James E. Wohlgenuth, the trees are expected to start arriving next week, and prices will range from \$1 to \$4.

Money collected in this manner by the Scouts will go to finance their annual trip to Boy Scout camp, among other things. Cost to send a boy to camp is from \$15 to \$20 for a week.

## Bobcats Lose In Bi-District Title Bid

The Dimmitt Bobcats had their 1958 season wound up for them Friday afternoon by the Abernathy Antelopes at Plainview.

After methodically grinding out what appeared to be a clear cut victory, the Bobcats saw the Antelopes come unwound and leave them defeated 20-26 at game's end.

Dimmitt started pounding out ground yardage in three and four yard chunks early in the game but never reached scoring territory until late in the third quarter when halfback Jimmy Curtis dived over right guard for the last yard with 3:22 left. Halfback Norman Nelson made a diving catch of quarterback Carlos Barnes' pass in the end zone for the conversion.

After the touchdown, Abernathy pulled the first of several passes that were heartbreakers for Dimmitt and scored easily. Their try for extra points failed and Dimmitt led 8-6 with one minute left in the third quarter.

With the wind to their backs, the Bobcats then apparently took complete control of the game, grinding out first downs at will on short runs. Five minutes into the fourth quarter, Dimmitt scored again but failed to convert, making the score 14-6. Nelson scored from one yard out.

Dimmitt's large safety margin held for only seven minutes when Abernathy quarterback Lane Tannehill passed to end Pat Attebury who was caught on about the five. Tannehill jumped over on a squeaker and the score was 12-14.

On the kickoff to Dimmitt, Abernathy tackle Carroll Powell recovered an on-side kick and the next play Tannehill and Attebury repeated their pass act and Abernathy moved ahead 14-18. Another pass gave Abernathy a conversion and they were still further ahead at 20-14.

Dimmitt started another touchdown drive, however, that gained its big push when end Junior Coffey grabbed a pass and loped to the fifteen. Dimmitt pushed it over via Carlos Barnes and tied up the score. The conversion attempt failed and the score was tied 20-20 with Dimmitt leading on penetrations 4-3.

Abernathy got the ball again with 40 seconds to go. Another Tannehill to Jim Dye pass netted 64 yards and a touchdown which sacked up the game for Abernathy.

The last half of the ball game was one of the wildest of any season. The lead changed hands during the last twenty minutes three times. It wrote an end to Dimmitt's hopes for this year and set the stage for Abernathy's regional bid against Spur this week.

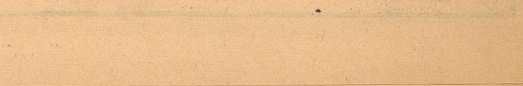
The Bobcats set up an amazing defensive record. Their season record was eight won and three lost, with two of the losses at the hands of Abernathy.

This game was the swan song for five Dimmitt men. All workhorses of this year's team, they are Jimmy Curtis, Norman Nelson, Mike Bailey, Ben Holcomb, and Don Warren. Curtis will be ineligible and the remainder are seniors.

"I was very happy and pleasantly surprised by this year's team," said coach J. D. Covington. "The boys wanted to play and I couldn't have asked for more effort and enthusiasm."

Dimmitt was hurt badly by graduations this year and pre-season guesses had been the Bobcats would not make much of a record. Officially they wound up as co-champions with Canyon of District 1-AA.

Dimmitt End Junior Coffey just missed this pass in the second quarter of the Abernathy-Dimmitt bi-district playoff game Friday. The unidentified Abernathy player was making sure Coffey wouldn't get far if he caught it.

### NHS Discusses Project For This Year

The National Honor Society met Thursday, October 20, in the auditorium. The meeting was called to order by the president, Myles Sadler. A project for this year was discussed and the new members were informed of the annual dues to be paid. The new members did not take the pledge of the club because of the absence of some members. This will be done at a later date.

### THANKSGIVING CUSTOMS

A day is set aside each year as Thanksgiving Day. This is a day of feasting and prayer for the blessings we have received during the year. The first Thanksgiving Days were harvest festivals, or days for thanking God for plentiful crops. For this reason the holiday still takes place late in the fall, after the crops have been gathered.

In the United States, Thanksgiving is usually a family day, celebrated with big dinners and joyous reunions. Many persons travel hundreds of miles to spend the day with their parents. The very memory of Thanksgiving often recalls memories of old farmhouse kitchens and pantries crowded with good things to eat.

The first American Thanksgiving Day was celebrated during the second winter the Plymouth colonists spent in the New World. The first winter in Massachusetts had killed nearly half of the members of the colony. But new hope arose in the summer of 1621. The corn harvest brought rejoicing. Governor William Bradford decreed that December 13, 1621, be set aside as a day of feasting and prayer, to show the gratitude of the colonists that they were still alive.

The women of the colony spent many days preparing for the feast. Foods were boiled and baked and roasted. The children were kept busy turning roasts on spits, in front of the open fires. More than 80 friendly Indians came to the feast. The Indians brought wild turkeys and venison, or deer meat as their share. The tables were set out doors, and all the people sat around them like one big happy family. Prayers, sermons, and songs of praise were important in the celebration. Three days were spent in feasting and prayer. Then the Indians returned to the forest and the colonists to their tasks.

For many years there was no regular National Thanksgiving Day in the United States. Some states had a yearly Thanksgiving holiday, and others had none. But by 1830, New York, had an official state Thanksgiving Day, and other Northern States soon followed its example. Virginia was the first southern state to adopt the custom.

Mrs. Sarah Josepha Hale, the editor of "Godey's Lady's Book," worked for thirty years to promote the idea of a national Thanksgiving Day. She sent out pleas through the columns of her journal and wrote letters to the various presidents. In 1863, President Lincoln issued a Proclamation setting aside the last Thursday of November in that year "as a day of Thanksgiving and praise to our beneficent Father."

### BOBCATS LOSE THRILLER IN BI-DISTRICT TILT TO ABERNATHY ANTELOPES

#### TD Pass in Last 39 Seconds Edges Out Bobcats 20-26

A touchdown pass the last 39 seconds edged the Dimmitt Bobcats out of state playoffs in Plainview last Friday in what writers called one of the most thrilling games of the season.

The Bobcats lost to Abernathy when Antelope quarterback Lane Tannehill connected with end Jimmy Dye for a 64 yard pass and run play with only 39 seconds left.

The first half was scoreless and it appeared that it might end that way. But the Bobcats received the kick-off in the second-half and drove 66 yards for a touchdown, with Jimmy Curtis going the final yard. The extra point was a pass from quarterback Carlos Barnes to halfback Norman Nelson.

After the kick-off Abernathy completed a 55 yard pass from Tannehill to Gerald Watson for a touchdown. The extra-point failed and Dimmitt led 8 to 6.

The next score was made after the Bobcats started a drive that went 33 yards in 7 plays with Nelson punching over from the one-yard line. The extra point failed and the Bobcats led 14 to 6.

Abernathy came back to score with Tannehill going over from the one-yard line, and Dimmitt still led 14 to 12. The extra-point failed. Then the Antelopes got their break when they covered an on-side-kick. They scored a few plays later when Tannehill passed to end Pat Attebury for 47 yards and a touchdown. For the extra-point Tannehill passed to Gerald Watson, which gave Abernathy its first lead, 20 to 14.

The Bobcats came right back to score with the biggest punch, a pass play from Barnes to Junior Coffey which covered 52 yards. Coffey was hit by four Antelopes before being knocked out of bounds on the 17 yard line. Barnes ran it over from the one yard line a few plays later to tie the score at 20-20. The extra point try was stopped short.

Then came Abernathy's final punch to give them the game. The Bobcats had 18 first downs to the Antelopes 12. On the ground the Bobcats gained 248 yards to Abernathy's 141. The Antelopes threw 10 passes and completed 6 for 245 yards to the Bobcats 4 out of 9 for 92 yards.

## Walter Rogers' WASHINGTON NEWSLETTER

The United States Public Health Service recently published a survey delineating the principal types of accident from all causes in the United States. The definition of the word itself implies the unexpected or unintentional. Most of us have, from childhood, been taught to prepare for the unexpected, and some of the statistics in this recent survey would certainly bear out the wisdom of that teaching. Accidents resulting in fatalities in 1957 totaled 37,350. The greatest killer by far is the motor vehicle accident, which accounts for some 40 per cent of all accidental fatalities. Home accidents claim 20 per cent, and all other accidents are responsible for some 32 per cent. One of my recent newsletters dealt with the all-important subject of traffic safety promotion. The following information might be helpful in the avoidance of, and preparation for, some common but frightening causes of accidents.

In 1956, 1,422 people died from accidental poisoning, of which almost 90 per cent were children five years or under. Medications, especially aspirin, but also barbiturates, laxatives, tranquilizers, antihistamines, iron pills and many over-the-counter and prescription drugs are accidentally swallowed most frequently. Pesticides, kerosene and related products, and household preparations such as bleach, soaps and detergents are frequently taken internally also. In the overwhelming majority of instances, the substances were not properly stored out of the reach of pre-school children.

The survey states it has been shown positively that alcohol is an accompaniment of accidents and deaths on the highways far in excess of the numbers expected. Physiologically, it produces effects which are still not completely known, but does show clear deficiencies of skill with even small amounts in the blood. Far more important, however, is the lack of recognition by the average driver of such effects. In addition, there are probably dangerous changes, also unrecognized, in his risk-taking tendencies and attitudes of care and responsibility.

The greatest single phenomenon associated with automobile deaths and injuries is ejection through doors which have popped open in crashes. Three out of four injured in automobile crashes sustained some degree of head injuries. These injuries occur most frequently to the front passenger near the driver, and least to rear passengers. Impact with the steering wheel and post cause a large proportion of the severe injuries to drivers.

It is pointed out that most fires occur in the home, and can be prevented by careful practices and proper equipment, such as the encouragement of home inspections by the local fire department, a constant look-out for fire hazards to children and the aged. In 1955, some 27,200 persons died from home accidents. Falls accounted for 13,636 deaths; fires and explosions for 5,347 deaths; mechanical suffocation for 1,222; poisons, liquid or solid, for 1,207; firearms accidents for 1,067; and poisonous gases for 839. More than 80 per cent of falls in the home occurred to persons over 65. Because of their relative helplessness, young children and aged persons were frequent fire victims. It is estimated that at least 20 million are injured in the home annually. In other words, each year approximately one person in eight in the United States is disabled one or more days by injuries received in home accidents.

Consumption of man-made fibers, such as rayon, in the United States has exceeded silk consumption since 1927 and wool consumption since 1941.

Of the 4,000,000 persons gainfully employed in the New York-New Jersey area, one out of every eight makes his living directly or indirectly from port commerce.

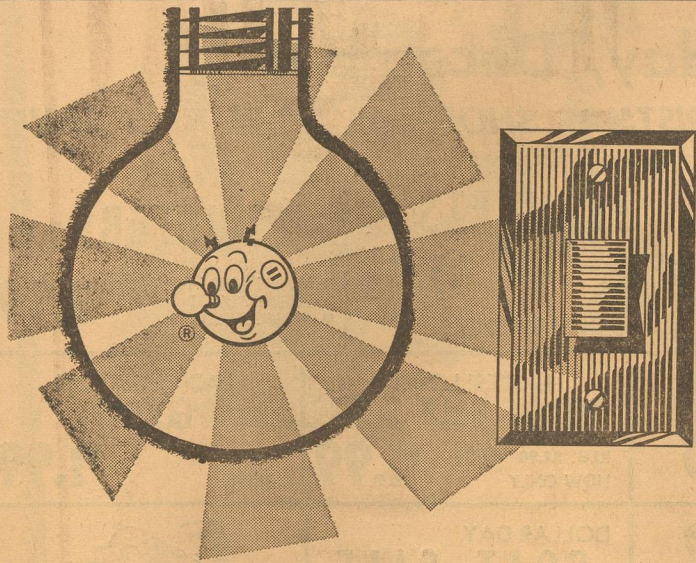

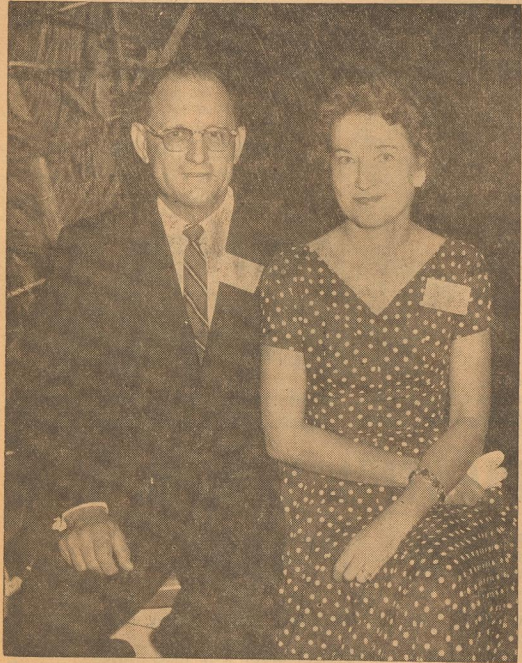

OUR SOIL ★ OUR STRENGTH

Virgil Hinson with the SCS and Charles Hottel, county agent, showed slide films of conservation practices and gave an explanation of the practices shown. Mr. Mills, who operates a farm between Hart and Nazareth, is well qualified for his position. He has a keen interest in agriculture and is respected as a good conservation farmer.

**WILDLIFE**  
A good example of the value of year round cover for quail can be seen at the corner of the Paul Chance farm south of Running Water Draw on the Twenty-five Mile Avenue. There is a small park-like area cut off of the Chance farm by the road that has several trees in it as well as weeds and tall grass. Last week we observed two large covies of bob white quail among the trees in the park. Food is ample in the area but the protection and cover is what keeps the quail there. Quail must have year round cover. We have noticed many odd areas on farms over the district that could be turned into excellent wildlife areas. 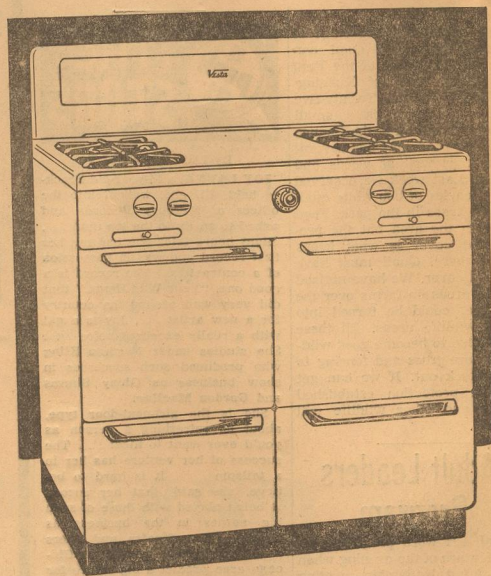
