
Everett said planning your trip —

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McNamee preserves right to sue Clemens

NEW YORK (AP) — Roger Clemens' former personal trainer filed paperwork preserving the right to sue the seven-time Cy Young Award winner in New York.

Brian McNamee, who told federal investigators that Clemens used performance-enhancing drugs, contends the pitcher defamed him after McNamee spoke to investigators for former Senate Majority Leader George

Mitchell. The summons, filed in Queens Supreme Court last week, preserves McNamee's right to sue, Richard Emery, a lawyer for McNamee, said Tuesday.

Clemens filed his own defamation suit against McNamee in January after the trainer said in the Mitchell Report that he regularly injected Clemens with steroids and human growth hormone. Clemens later told a congressional committee under oath he had never taken steroids.

In the federal case in Texas, McNamee's attorneys say the trainer was forced to talk to investigators under threat of prosecution, rendering him immune from any defamation lawsuit.

A federal prosecutor backed McNamee's claim, but a judge has yet to rule on his request to toss the case.

Still not a winner

Loss to Oakland leaves Texans short of earning first winning season

HOUSTON — The Houston Texans followed up their best game of the year with their worst.

The Texans lost 27-16 to the lowly Oakland Raiders on Sunday, a week after beating AFC South champion Tennessee. The loss snapped a franchise-record four-game winning streak — and made earning their first ever winning season impossible.

Now the best Houston can hope for is matching last season's 8-8 record with a win over Chicago in next Sunday's season finale.


For a team long out of playoff contention, the loss leaves the Texans with very little motivation for the Bears game.

But coach Gary Kubiak is confident the Texans will bounce back.

"I expect our team to be up every week," he said. "That's the National Football League. You play a lot of games. It's very emotional week to week.'

Houston has had an up and down season, starting 0-4 before winning three straight. The Texans then lost three in a row before the four game winning streak.

"We have to learn how to keep the winning streak going," Andre Johnson said. "This is a step back, but we can't hang our heads. We have to learn from



NFL asks courts to reconsider suspensions

Associated Press Writer MINNEAPOLIS - The NFL wants an appeals court to reconsider a federal judge's order that blocked the suspensions of five players for violating the league's anti-doping policy, according to court documents filed Monday in U.S. District Court in Minnesota.

Attorneys for the NFL filed notice they were asking the 8th Circuit Court of Appeals to take up the issue after U.S. District Judge Paul Magnuson in St. Paul, Minn., earlier this month cleared the way for Kevin Williams and Pat Williams of the Minnesota Vikings, and Charles Grant, Deuce McAllister and Will Smith of the New Orleans Saints to continue playing.

Magnuson had said he needed more time to consider the dispute between the NFL and the NFL Players Association.

Monday was the deadline for the parties to propose a schedule for further proceedings in the case.

The NFL also asked Monday that discovery proceedings before Magnuson be put off until the 8th Circuit Court makes a decision on the league's appeal.

The players were suspended four games each after testing positive for a banned diuretic bumetanide — in the dietary supplement StarCaps.

Bumetanide can be used as a masking agent for steroids. Diuretics are also used to quickly shed weight. The StarCaps label didn't list the diuretic as an ingredient, and the players' union had argued the NFL didn't properly inform players about what it knew about StarCaps.

The NFL's attorneys have argued that claim, and others, had been considered and rejected in a process set out by the league's collective bargaining agreement.

Magnuson's initial ruling Dec. 5, and another ruling Dec. 11, allowed the players to rejoin their teams for the rest of the season. Barring a quick reversal by the appeals court, it's likely at least Kevin Williams would play for the Vikings if the team makes the playoffs. Pat Williams is out with a broken bone in his right shoulder. He missed Sunday's loss to the Atlanta Falcons and will also sit out when the Vikings play the New York Giants this Sunday Pat Williams has said he hopes to return to his team for the first playoff game in potential January.

Johnson followed his career-high 207 yards receiving against the Titans with two receptions for 19 yards on Sunday. The Texans inexplicably threw to the NFL's leading receiver only once in the first three quarters.

"Naturally, there are calls made to get him the ball and to get him more involved," Kubiak said. "Coverages dictated that we go some other places with the ball."

Kubiak partially blamed the lack of receptions on an overall poor performance by his team.

"Part of not playing well is Andre's part of that, the (offensive) line's part that)," he said. "We're all part of that. So naturally he didn't touch the ball

Time for playoff reduction? Bad teams are making NFL postseason

The Arizona Cardinals have lost four of their last five games, allowing 37, 48, 35 and 47 points. Their only win during that period was over St. Louis, a 2-13 team. And if they don't beat 4-11 Seattle at home on Sunday, they will finish 8-8.

Do we really want these guys in the playoffs?

Same for some of the other teams we will see in the postseason: Minnesota or Chicago; Tampa Bay or Dallas; Denver or San Diego, one of whom will win the AFC West? Heck, even the embarrassing New York Jets with the embarrassing Brett Favre have an outside chance to get in.

Very outside, fortunately.

For a number of years, there have been suggestions from some teams (usually ones just on the outside) to increase the number of teams qualifying for the postseason from 12 to 14 or even 16. For a number of years,

thankfully, a majority of owners have decided the current number is just fine.

This year, 12 may be too many because the random ways of division alignment are producing playoff teams that don't belong.

In the NFC, the East and South are relatively loaded, with the last place teams each 8-7. But the North and West are, respectively, mediocre and dismal.

'Right now, we aren't what we were," Kurt Warner acknowledged after Arizona lost 47-7 to Bill Belichick's Patriots on Sunday, outgained 514-186. "If we're happy with winning the division, then that's all we'll do."

Here's a very easy prediction: that's all the Cardinals will do.

That's because they are the beneficiaries of the nature of division alignment that this season has them grouped with the Rams, the Seahawks and the 49ers (6-9).

You can argue that San Francisco,

4-4 since Mike Singletary took over as coach and installed Shaun Hill at quarterback, might have won the division if the Singletary-Hill combination had been in place from the start. Instead it was J.T. O'Sullivan at QB, installed by offensive coordinator/genius Mike Martz with the concurrence of now departed head coach Mike Nolan.

But that would have provided just another mediocre playoff team.

In the AFC, the West is awful; the North and South strong at the top and the East a mystery — a division in which the Patriots, champions the last five seasons, could get left out with an 11-5 record although they are playing better than anyone in the division right now.

The only positive thought: Belichick sitting in front of his tele-

vision set watching an 8-8 team (or two) struggling through the postseason. As he watches the Chargers and Cardinals stagger through a playoff game, he mutters to himself. In public, he says: "(We) weren't good enough. Didn't do what we had to." Pressed on that, he says: "It is what it is."

That's if Belichick bothers to watch, which is unlikely.

How did we get here?

Blame the random nature of division alignment (see above). Plus bad coaching, bad luck and Ed Hochuli.

But not injuries. Yes, the Chargers defense struggled without Shawne Merriman, but the Giants lost their equivalent, Osi Umenyiora, during the preseason and are currently 12-3 with home-field advantage in the NFC against a much tougher schedule than San Diego endured in the AFC West. And Tennessee beat Pittsburgh on Sunday without Albert



Grimes spoke highly of Haywood, who is in his fourth season at Notre Dame.

"He's been here ever since I've been here. I learned a lot under him," Grimes said. "He's had a tremendous impact on my career here. he's helped me on and off the field. He's had a big impact on me."




Still, the Texans had a chance to cut the lead to one score with about eight minutes remaining.

Chex Mix :This gift idea never goes stale

LEXINGTON, Ky. — The fondness we have for homemade food gifts ranks right up there with treasured memories of Santa and his reindeer.

A popular homemade recipe that has made the rounds for more than 50 years is Chex Mix. The recipe first appeared on the box of Wheat Chex in 1953, and that standard recipe gets a new twist with every generation.

More than 70 versions of the mix appear on Chex.com, but there probably are as many recipes as there are squares of Chex.

Ruth Ann Storrow of Lexington, Ky., has been making the original Chex Mix for her friends and family at Christmastime for about 20 years.

Storrow's recipe is tattered and yellowed with age, while Bethany simply prints a recipe from her computer.

When Storrow began giving Chex Mix as a gift, she bought attractive holiday tins and told the recipients that if they returned the tin, they would get Chex Mix again the next year. "They all bring their tins back to me," she said. Ruth Ann Storrow's tattered recipe calls for baking the mix for two hours at 200 degrees. "I like it better than the microwavable version," she said.

CHEX MIX

- 1 teaspoon garlic salt
- 1 teaspoon garlic powder
- 11/2 teaspoons celery salt
- 11/2 teaspoons onion salt
- 1/4 cup Worcestershire sauce
- 2 cups oil
- 2 pounds salted mixed nuts
- 12 ounces Wheat Chex
- 10 ounces Cheerios
- 61/2 ounces Rice Chex
- 1 package pretzel sticks

Place garlic salt and powder, celery salt and onion salt in a bowl. Mix in Worcestershire sauce and oil. Set aside. In a large bowl, combine nuts, cereals and pretzels. Divide cereal mixture among 3 baking pans. Pour seasoning mix over each pan and mix well. Cover and bake 30 minutes. Remove cover and bake 1½ hours, stirring every 15 minutes. Pour onto paper towels to cool.

Hating the Holidays

Millions of people experience the holiday blues this time of year, but seniors tend to be especially vulnerable. Here are some suggestions that can help.

Holiday Blues

There are lots of factors that can contribute to an older person's sadness or apathy around the holiday season such as the loss of a spouse, sibling or a close friend. Some seniors feel alone and isolated because their grown children and grandchildren live far away. While others may feel blue because of financial concerns, poor health or because they're unable to perform routine holiday activities like shopping, baking or even attending religious services.

How to Help

Depending on what's making you mother blue during this holiday season, here are some tips that may help:

• Be a good listener: Talk to your mom about how she's feeling and why. Very often just being able to share feelings with someone can help.

• Prevent isolation: Encourage family members to be around your mom as much as possible during the holidays. If you can't be there physically, be sure to call more often.

• Find community help: Contact her church or other community resource where someone may be able to stop by for a visit, or pick her up for a religious service or community activity.

• Ease her financial guilt: If your mom is on a tight budget, be sure she doesn't feel guilty if she can't afford to buy the grandchildren fancy gifts. It's not what the holidays should be about.

• Lend a helping hand: If poor health or physical limitations are causing her blues lend her a hand with shopping, decorating and other holiday preparations. churches or civic groups would love her help (also see Web sites like www. volunteermatch.org and www.getinvolved.gov to find volunteer opportunities). Helping others is a great way to forget your own troubles.

• Watch the holiday spirits: Alcohol consumption for many people goes up during the holiday season, and alcohol is a depressant that can intensify the problem.

• Go for a walk: Exercise is a natural antidepressant so encourage your mom to go for a daily walk, or if possible, take one with her.

Watch for Depression

There's a big difference between feeling sad or blue and being chronically depressed. If your mom's blues linger beyond the holidays into the New Year, she may have a more serious problem. Here are the signs to watch for:

• A persistent feeling of sadness.

• Lost interest in hobbies or activities that she formerly enjoyed.

• Feeling worthless or hopeless.

• Inability to sleep or sleeping too much.

- Loss of energy or motivation.
- Not eating or eating too much.Trouble thinking, concentrating,

and making decisions.

• Feeling anxious, restless, or irritable.

• Thinking about dying or killing herself.

Another good way you can check your mom's mood is by giving her a depression screening test at www. depressionscreening.org. If you find that she's depressed, encourage her to get help beginning with her own doctor. There are a variety of treatment options that can help such as medications, professional counseling or a combination of both.

Combine cereals, pretzels, peanuts and M&Ms in a large bowl. Pour cereal mixture onto wax paper on countertop. Melt bark in microwave according to package directions. Pour over Chex mixture. It will be very gooey. Wash hands, then grease them with butter; combine mixture with fingers. Let cool overnight. Haynesworth and Kyle Vanden Bosch, its two most heralded defensive linemen.

Let's start with Hochuli, who in the second week of the season blew a call that took away a late fumble recovery from the Chargers and ended up handing the Broncos a 39-38 victory. If San Diego had won that game, maybe it wouldn't have spent the season struggling to get to .500, a "landmark" it can achieve if it beats Denver at home on Sunday and ends up winning a division that also includes dysfunctional Oakland (4-11) and youth-laden Kansas City (2-13).

But the Chargers, notably president Dean Spanos and general manager A.J. Smith, are as responsible as anyone for their team's underachieving.

After a 14-2 season in 2006, they fired coach Marty Schottenheimer, who is sixth on the all-time wins list but was/is 5-13 in the playoffs; "is" because his name keeps popping up

for any number of potential vacancies.

So they hired the milder and more compliant Norv Turner, who had been San Diego's offensive coordinator in 2001. Dallas, meanwhile, hired Schottenheimer's defensive coordinator, the laid-back Wade Phillips.

Which brings us to the Cowboys, who managed to close Texas Stadium with a loss that dropped to 9-6 a team that was supposed to be the NFL's most talented. Then they lucked out when everything broke right for them Sunday and put them back in the lead for an NFC wildcard spot.

Phillips is doing a wonderful job of calling defenses — that unit seemed to keep the Cowboys close until Baltimore broke two late, long TD runs Saturday night. But the face of the team is owner Jerry "Coach" Jones or Terrell Owens, depending on what paper you read, what Web site you visit or what network you watch. ESPN managed to give T.O. plenty of face time to rebut the findings of its own reporter about the discord of which he is the alleged

Super Bowl. But there's a huge difference: last season's Giants were an unselfish and well-led team. Think Michael

Strahan, Antonio Pierce, Eli Manning and Tom Coughlin in place of T.O. and "Coach" Jones.

The NFC field will be the battlehardened Giants at the top with either Carolina or Atlanta at No. 2. Indeed, the Panthers, the conference's second-best team, could slip to No. 5 if they lose Sunday at New Orleans and the Falcons, as they should, beat the dismal Rams at home.

Remember this: No road team has won an NFC South game, so the Panthers could lose to the 8-7 Saints.

As of now, the rest of the field would include the Vikings, Cardinals and Cowboys with the Eagles, Bucs and Bears a possibility. In order: average; bad; dysfunctional; and inconsistent times three.

Other than Tennessee and Pittsburgh, the most dangerous team in the AFC may not make the playoffs: New England.

Baltimore has the defense, but can a rookie quarterback (Joe Flacco) win three playoff games? (That question also can be asked about Matt Rvan in Atlanta.)

If Miami wins the East, is it a threat? For one win, perhaps.

That leaves the Colts, the team most everyone perceives as a distinct threat.

Maybe.

But Peyton Manning, who is emerging as a most valid candidate for MVP, saved the Colts on Thursday night against a Jacksonville team that had long since stopped playing. Until the fourth quarter, the defense couldn't stop the Jaguars — no one tackled, especially when Maurice Jones-Drew had the ball.

On the other hand, when the Colts won the Super Bowl two years ago, a defense that couldn't tackle in the regular season suddenly was huge in the playoffs.

So make the Titans, Steelers, Colts and maybe the Ravens legitimate contenders.

Better than the NFC, but not great.

Fisher calls 'Terrible Towel' stomp unneccesary

centerpiece.

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) -Jeff Fisher didn't see any of his Titans stomping their feet on Terrible Towels after beating the Pittsburgh Steelers.

Seeing the footage Monday didn't make him happy.

"This was just a couple guys playing around with a towel. It was unnecessary in my opinion," Fisher said.

Linebacker Keith Bulluck dropped a towel, then swiped his foot across it celebrating the Titans' 31-14 rout of the Steelers on Sunday. He wasn't alone. Running back LenDale White stomped on a towel, and defensive end Jevon Kearse used one as he pretended to blow his nose

in actions replayed in video highlights over and over.

Fisher defended his players, saying the Terrible Towel is just a towel to the Titans.

"They don't understand the significance or the meaning of the towel itself to the organization, the Steelers history or the Steelers fans," he said. "On one hand, I think they were having fun and just playing with a towel. It was certainly not a shot at the organization or the players or the staff or the fans."

Rookie running back Chris Johnson pulled a flag hanging from his waist and waved it around in celebrating his 21-yard touchdown run in the third quarter that put the Titans ahead to stay. Fisher said that potentially could be a problem since the rules prohibit using a prop.

The footage of those Titans stomping on the Terrible Towel will be replayed heavily if these teams meet again in the playoffs. With Tennessee seeded No. 1 in the AFC and Pittsburgh No. 2, that would only be in the AFC championship.

"If we're fortunate to see Pittsburgh again and that's the motivation they need to play better, then that's OK," Fisher said. "I think by the time you get to that ball game, whenever it is, I think both teams will be highly motivated.

Burress driving without insurance before crash

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. (AP) — Add this to the growing list of Plaxico Burress' problems: getting in a car crash and not having insurance on his nearly \$140,000 Mercedes-Benz.

The suspended New York Giants wide receiver was sued last week in Florida's Broward County Circuit Court for rearending a woman in May.

Burress neglected to pay his premiums.

Burress' Adam attorney, Swickle, declined comment.

Burress is still serving a team suspension for shooting himself Nov. 29 in a nightclub with an illegally carried handgun. Burress shot himself at the Latin Quarter when he accidentally pulled the trigger on the .40-caliHospital/Weill Cornell Medical Center for treatment.

Burress pleaded not guilty and was released on \$100,000 bail. He is due back in court March 31.

He was placed on the team's suspended/non-football injury list, and the NFL Players Association filed a grievance. The union said the Giants violated the collective bargaining agreement when they placed Burress on that list, suspended him for the final four games of the regular season and fined him an additional week's salary for conduct detrimental to the team.

It first appeared in The New York Sun in 1897 and has since been produced in every conceivable form, in every quarter of the globe.

The publication of Virginia's question and Francis Pharcelius Church's response is an annual tradition at the Herald. We hope you enjoy it.

We take pleasure in answering at once and thus prominently the communication below, expressing at the same time our great gratification that its faithful author is numbered among the friends of The Sun:

"Dear Editor: I am 8 years old. Some of my little friends say there is no Santa Claus.

If your dog or cat spends most of its time outdoors, it needs a warm weather-proof area, to escape the cold and wet. A dog house

> water. Keeping fresh water available in winter can be a challenge, but there are several types of heated water containers on the market. Whatever type you decide on, check it often to make sure water is available for your pet.

It's a lovely scene — a

tentedly in front of the fireplace. Animals are drawn to a cozy fire just as we are, but it can be a safety hazard. Make sure you have a sturdy fire screen to prevent them getting too close and that pet beds are out of the range of sparks. A flying spark can cause a burned pet, or at the very worst a house fire.

If you use a space heater, make sure it is tip proof, and in an area away from wagging tails and curious noses. A baby gate to keep animals out of the area is the safest way to use one.

Older dogs and cats and very young puppies and kittens can be affected by cold much quicker that a mature healthy animal. If they get wet and chilled, they should be brought inside and dried and kept in a warm place.

Older and younger pets should be given a bit more attention and care in winter to keep them healthy. This can help them resist the normal winter ills, such as Kennel Cough, Canine Flu and Rhino Virus.

Should you get your pet a coat or sweater? Some breeds and types of dogs can benefit from wearing a coat or sweater when going out in cold weather. Many of the toy breeds that are kept inside do not grow a heavy coat, and wearing a coat or sweater can make going outdoors more enjoyable.



Crested, Italian Greyhounds can get cold very quick. These types of small dogs usually appreciate the added warmth of a sweater or coat and can become quite the little Prima Donna showing off in their winter duds.

Some of the larger breeds, like the Grevhound. Whippet and Doberman Pincher who have a slender build with less body fat, also do well wearing a coat or sweater. This type of dog has what is called a single coat, meaning that they don't have the dense fluffy undercoat that double-coated breeds have. Without this extra layer of fluffy hair, they don't have the protection from the cold, especially on

There are all types and style of doggie wear

available now, in many sizes. A coat or sweater should fit comfortably and not interfere with the dog's movement and cover the back from neck to base of the tail. It should cover the chest and tummy area.

There are also many types of dog boots and some dogs adjust to wearing boots very well - after all, they are very smart, and warm drv feet is much better than cold wet feet.

With a little extra care and planning, our pets can enjoy the winter weather and stay healthy and happy.

Little-known holiday facts

enjoy studying our different holidays to see if I can find some unknown facts. For instance, the celebration of Christmas has changed throughout the years. Many of today's

Christmas traditions were celebrated centuries before the birth of Jesus. Let's review a few.

The custom of giftgiving on Christmas goes back to Roman festivals. The very first gifts were simple items such as twigs from a sacred grove as good luck emblems. Soon that escalated to food, small items of

jewelry, candles and statues of local gods.

To the early Church, gift-giving at this time was a pagan holdover and therefore severely frowned upon. However, people would not give it up and some justification was found in the original gift giving of the Magi.

By the Middle Ages gift giving was accepted. Before then, it was more common to exchange gifts on New Year's Day or Twelfth Night.

Singing carols at Christmas is of English origin. During the Middle Ages, groups of serenaders called waits would travel around from

house to house singing ancient carols and spreading the holiday spirit. Most of the popular old carols we sing today were written in the 19th century.

The hanging of greens, such as holly and ivy, is a British winter tradition with origins far before the Christian era. Greenery was used to lift sagging winter spirits and remind the people that spring was not far away.

The custom of kissing under the mistletoe is descended from ancient Druid rites. The decorating of Christmas trees, though primarily a German custom, has been widely popular in England since 1841 when Prince Albert had a Christmas tree set up in Windsor Castle for his wife Queen Victoria, and their children.

The word wassail is derived from the Anglo-Saxon phrase "waes hael," which means "good health." Originally, wassail was a beverage made of mulled ale, curdled cream, roasted apples, nuts, eggs, and spices. It was served for the purpose of enhancing the general merriment of the season.

Like many of the ancient customs, wassailing has a legend to explain its origin. It seems that a beautiful Saxon maiden named Rowena presented Prince Vortigen with a bowl of wine while toasting him with the words "Waes hael."

Today is Wednesday, Dec. 24, the 359th day of 2008. There are seven days left in the year. This is Christmas Eve.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Dec. 24, 1968, the Apollo 8 astronauts, orbiting the moon, read passages from the Old Testament Book of Genesis during a Christmas Eve telecast that featured live images of Earth.

On this date:

In 1524, Portuguese navigator Vasco da Gama — who had discovered a sea route around Africa to India – died in Cochin, India.

In 1814, the War of 1812 officially ended as the United States and Britain signed the Treaty of Ghent in Belgium.

In 1851, fire devastated the Library of Congress in Washington, D.C., destroying about 35,000 volumes.

Tenn., called the Ku Klux Klan.

In 1871, Giuseppe Verdi's opera "Aida" had its world premiere in Cairo, Egypt.

In 1908, citing morality concerns, New York Mayor George B. McClellan Jr. temporarily closed the city's movie theaters. (The action gave rise to creation of a motion picture censorship board.)

In 1943, President Franklin D. Roosevelt appointed Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower supreme commander of Allied forces as part of Operation Overlord.

In 1951, Gian Carlo Menotti's "Amahland the Night Visitors," the first opera written specifically for television, was first broadcast by NBC-TV.

In 1980, Americans remembered the U.S. hostages in Iran by burning candles or shining lights for 417 seconds ,Åî one second for each day of captivity.

In 1993, the Rev. Norman Vincent Peale, who blended Christian and psychiatric principles into a message of "positive thinking," died in Pawling,




