The educational building is just about finished. It might be possible for the building to be used for the first time next Sunday.


**HART CHURCH OF CHRIST TO



HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 36 proposing an amendment to Section 61a of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new subsection to be known as 61a-1; giving the Legislature the power to provide, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for assistance on behalf of persons eligible for Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, or Aid to Dependent Children as provided in Section 61a of Article III and for providing for the necessary election fund for the purpose of paying such assistance; and providing that the amount of State Funds for such purposes shall never exceed the amount so expended out of Federal funds.

Section 1. That Section 61a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection to be known as subsection 61a-1, which shall read as follows:

"Subsection 61a-1. The Legislature shall have the power to provide, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for direct or vendor assistance for the purpose of paying such assistance on behalf of persons eligible for Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, or Aid to Dependent Children as provided in Section 61a of Article III and for providing for the necessary election fund for the purpose of paying such assistance; and providing that the amount of State Funds for such purposes shall never exceed the amount so expended out of Federal funds."

Section 2. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for the election and have the same published and held as required by the Constitution and the Laws of the State of Texas.

**THE NATIONAL DEBT**  
By the time this letter reaches you, the Administration will probably have asked for authority to increase the national debt to 288 billions of dollars. The permanent debt ceiling is \$275 billion. The Administration heretofore asked this session of Congress for approval to raise the debt ceiling to \$280 billion on a temporary basis. This was done. It presently appears that the new request of the Administration will be that the permanent ceiling be raised from \$275 billion to \$285 billion and that the temporary ceiling be lifted from \$280 billion to \$288 billion. The temporary ceiling of \$288 billion would probably run until June 30, 1959.

**SUMMIT TALKS**  
The Russian Bear has his propaganda machine going at full speed producing advertising designed to convince other countries that Russia is leading the march for world peace. Most Washingtonians in public life recognize that this propaganda barrage has been effective, even though some will not admit it. Our efforts to counteract it by exposing it for what it really is have not been too successful, because the State Department seems to lack the necessary imagination to offset it. Our knowledge of the purpose which Russia is pursuing should enable anticipatory moves on the part of this country to neutralize 90 percent of the propaganda, insofar as other countries are concerned.
