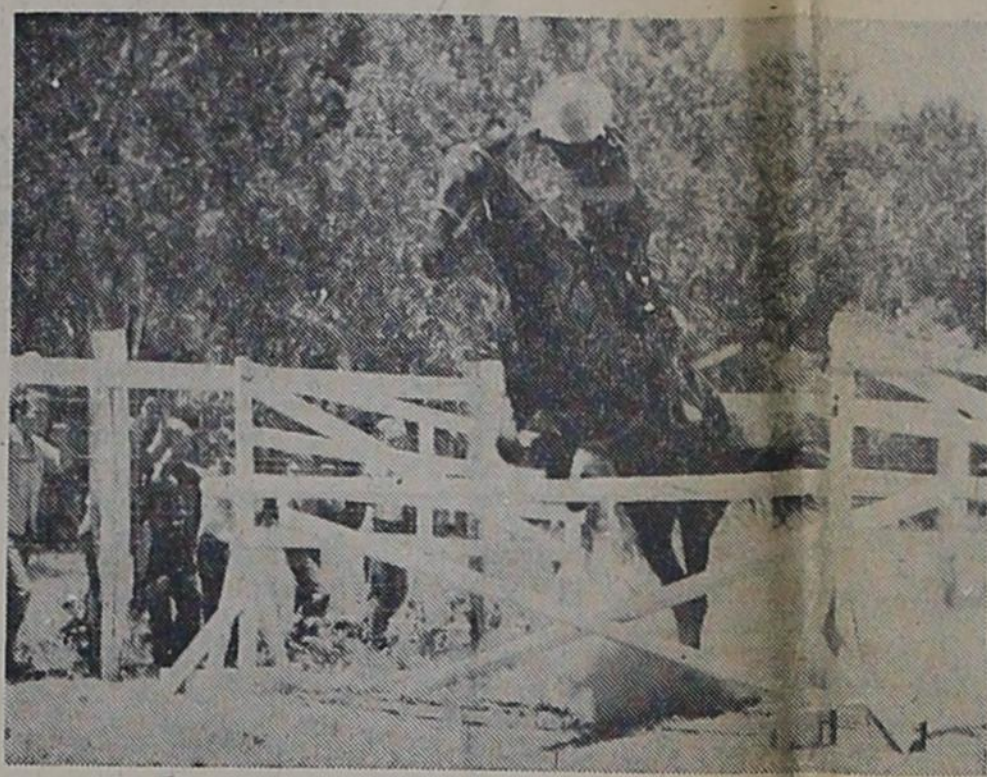
Jim Jowell, nice tackle prospect, became the first casualty of the season when he suffered a broken arm in Tuesday night's scrimmage.

### AUGUST 31 IS CLOSING DATE TO ACCEPT APPLICATION FOR 1949 WHEAT INSURANCE

"Don't hesitate or you'll be too late" is the warning notice that the County ACA Office is sending out to wheat producers who have delayed making a decision regarding whether or not they will protect their investment in producing wheat with an all-risk Federal Crop Insurance policy.

August 31, 1948, is the last day that farmers in the county can apply for the new low-cost production of their operating costs.

"We have received applications for all-risk Federal crop insurance protection from 45 of about 1045 of our county wheat farmers who are eligible for this insurance," Horace Blagg, Supervisor of the local ACA pointed out.

We will do our very best to give every producer who wants to utilize this sound business proposition to protect his crop investment an opportunity to sign, but it is a voluntary decision on their part so they will have to cooperate with us before August 31, 1948, or there will be no all-risk crop insurance available to them for at least another year."

In order to give every interested producer an opportunity to sign an application or get answers to any last-minute questions regarding this low-cost protection of the wheat crop investment, the County ACA Office will be available during regular office hours to assist those who are not familiar with the wheat insurance program. 200 applications are needed to qualify for insurance in Castro County.

### PLANS ARE COMPLETE IN CASTRO COUNTY FOR NATION'S FIRST PEACE TIME DRAFT

Plans have been completed this week for Castro County's participation in the nation's first peace time draft of young men for military service. Mr. Frank Latimer, who was appointed this week to serve on the Regional Selective Service Board, stated that all Castro County men between the ages of 18 and 25, would register at the Court House in Dimmitt, and that the American Legion Auxiliary had agreed to supervise the registration during the first week. Other organizations will be called on to furnish clerical help until the bulk of the men of the county are registered.

Mr. Latimer was appointed on the Selective Service Board replacing Mr. Robert Estes who was the original appointee but was disqualified because he is a member of the Organized Reser-

Lions Louis Elleston and Robert Singer were appointed to circulate a petition requesting all business firms to close Friday afternoon for the final clean up drive.

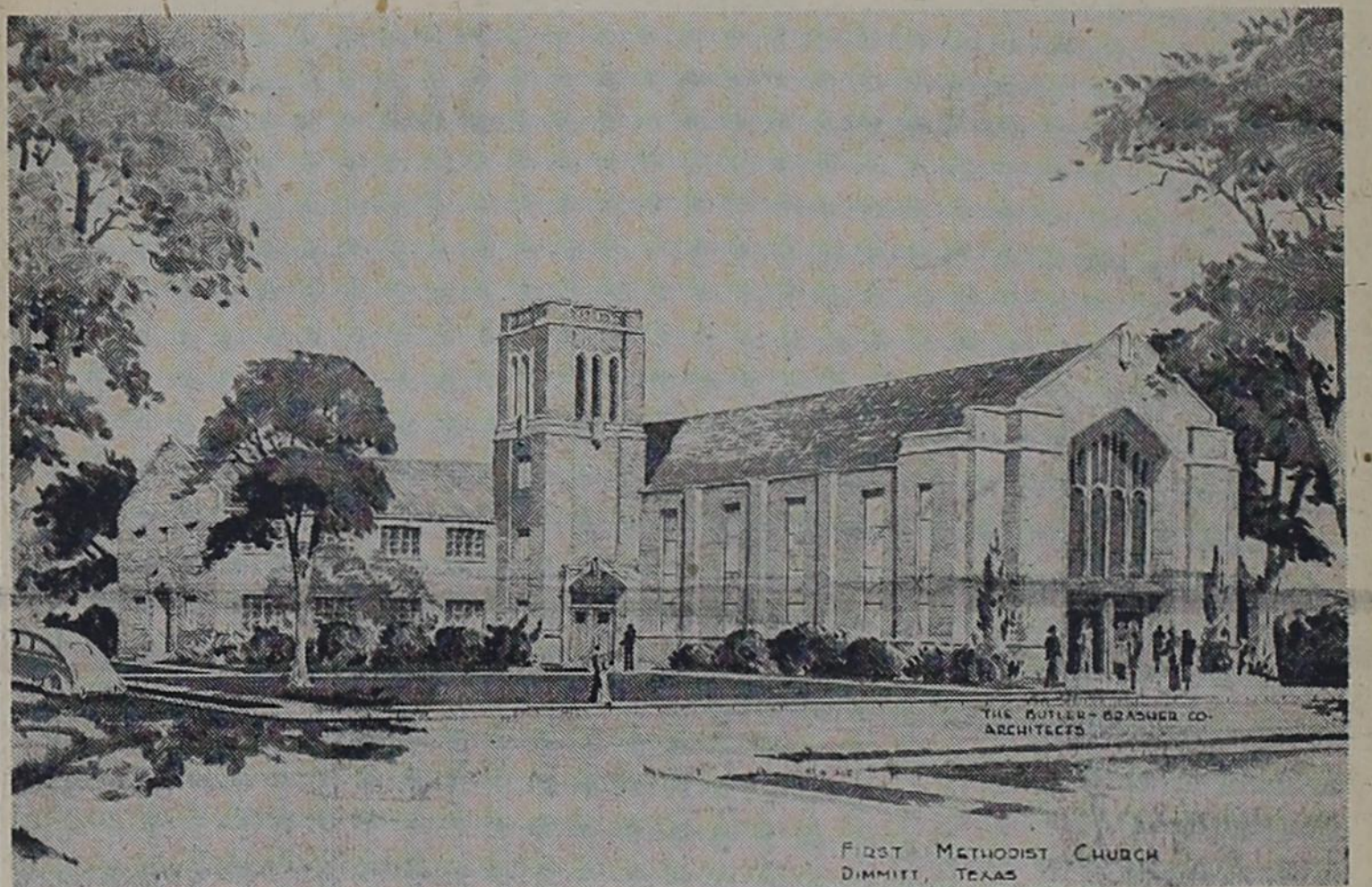
### FIRST LOAD OF ROW CROP GRAIN RECEIVED HERE MONDAY

The first load of row crop grain from the present crop was brought to Dimmitt Monday and stored in the Castro County Grain Company Elevator. The grain was produced on the B. Vaughn farm 8 miles north of Dimmitt, and according to local grain men is the earliest grain harvested from row crops in this

section in recent years. Produced on an irrigated farm, the hegar is making 60 bushels per acre. The present market price is \$1.75 per cwt.

The load of grain brought to Dimmitt Monday constitutes the kick-off in the harvesting of what will probably be Castro County's largest grain crop.

### CONTRACT IS LET FOR METHODIST CHURCH BUILDING



Pictured above is the architect's drawing of the new Methodist Church building to be constructed in Dimmitt. The modern edifice will be built on the site of the old Presbyterian Church in south central Dimmitt. The location was acquired by the Methodist Church several months ago. The new building, as pictured, will provide a large auditorium with the main entrance in the east end. Adjoining the auditorium on the west will be a two story Educational Building forming an L with the auditorium. At the juncture of the two buildings will be a tower which will serve as a front entrance to the educational building and rear entrance to the auditorium. The Butler Architect Firm of Lubbock drew plans for the building.

### Work to Begin Soon On Modern Church Edifice

According to an announcement today, Thursday, by Rev. Horace Brooks, pastor of the Dimmitt Methodist Church, a contract has been signed for the construction of the new Methodist Church building by the Claud Killingsworth Construction Company of Well-

ington, Texas. Rev. Brooks declared that the contract was in the amount of \$100,000 and was for the construction of the auditorium and a section of the educational building, comprising 8 class rooms, adjoining the west or back, of the auditorium. Rev. Brooks also declared that plans were to complete the educational building if sufficient funds were

available. The bid on the complete job was \$135,000. The auditorium is to be 44x97 feet and the first unit of the Educational Building will be 44x22 feet. The entrance tower was also included in the contract, and aside from serving as an entrance to the two buildings it will house the heating and cooling equipment. Rev. Brooks also stated that the contract was on a fee, or cost plus basis, a plan that would greatly reduce the ultimate cost of the building program.

The contractors will move their equipment on the grounds next week, and actual construction will begin the following week. It is estimated that six months will be required to complete the job. The building committee is composed of Earl Harrison, John Nichols and Rev. Horace Brooks.

## Trip to Colorado Is Success

### CASTRO, SWISHER, HALE COUNTY FARMERS STUDY COLORADO FARMING METHODS

Sixteen Castro County men, farmers and business men along with 19 Hale County and 3 Swisher County men had a very enjoyable three day tour of improved farming practices of the state of Colorado.

The purpose of the trip was to study the practices used by Colorado farmers in building up their soils as well as produce high yields on the land.

A resume of the trip is as follows: Monday, Aug 16 was spent in and around Rocky Ford which is famous for its cantalupes and Sugar Beets. Approximately ten stops were made and eight other farms were passed by showing some improved practices. Some of the stops and improved practices used were:

Christian and Fred Wunch using a complete one-year rotation as well as applying Green Manure crops of Barley, clover, black eyed peas, commercial fertilizer and barnyard manure. The Wunch brothers have a complete record since 1930 on all fields giving the crop yield and kind of fertilizer used.

The next place visited was the farm of Everett Marshall, former World Champion Heavy Weight Wrestler. Mr. Marshall had 400 lery and onions was the predominant crop. Yields on Mr. Spano's farm was as follows:

Celery; 2000 crates per acre, head of cattle to feed. He uses Hubam and Sweet Clover in connection with barnyard manure practices with a good crop rotation system. His average yield on onions over a period of years was 1400 crates per acre. Average

yield on beets was 22 tons per acre.

Mr. Marshalls' father, Claude Marshall, also practiced a good crop rotation using barnyard manure as fertilizer. Mr. and Mrs. Claude Marshall had one of the most beautiful yards and flower gardens it has been the writers privilege to see.

Other visits during the day was on farms around La Junta and the Arkansas Valley. The night of August 16 was spent in Denver Colorado.

The tour continued on Aug. 17. The first visit was made to the Spano brothers farms where cecabbage; 10 to 12 tons per acre, onions; 300 to 600, crates. The Spano brothers raise 47 acres of vegetables. Gross last year on the 47 acres was \$47,000.

The afternoon of Aug. 17 was spent on the agronomy farm of the Colorado State Agricultural College. The most interesting thing observed on the college farm was the comparison of corn following legumes and corn not following legumes. The corn following legumes was much larger and darker green in color than the other corn which had a yellow color showing lack of nitrogen.

On the H. E. Brewbaker farm at Longmont Colorado the group saw an improved pasture consisting of 25% yellow clover and 75% white clover. The cattle were turned in on May 1st and 145 head had grazed on 15 acres since this time.

The night of August 17 was spent at the Camfield Hotel at Greeley. The day of the eighteenth was spent in and around Greeley, Colorado. One of the most interesting visits of the trip was to the Warren Montfort farm of Greeley. Mr. Montfort had 5000 head of cattle on feed at the time and feeds 20,000 head each year.

Mr. Montfort grinds his feed and stores it on the farm and sells barnyard manure to neighboring farms.

Another interesting visit was to the farm of Harry Bailey. Mr. Bailey grossed \$46,000 last year on 149 acres of ground. He raises on rotation sugar beets, alfalfa, pinto beans and potatoes.

Another interesting visit was to the farm of Carl Henry, a dairy farmer who stresses the use of irrigated pastures. Mr. Henry uses a mixture of Bromo, Meadow fescue, orchard grass and alfalfa. He has 10 acres and has had 24 head of Holstein cows on this since May 5. It had a good growth at the time and Mr. Henry believes he could support 4 head to the acre.

The tour was concluded at the farm of Less Ewing of Fort Lupton, Colorado. The tour was arranged by Mr. Hepperly, Agricultural Agent for the Burlington railroads, B. E. Knapp,

# Classes For Livestock And Products Listed For Castro Co. Fair

In order to have the best representative list of products exhibited at the Castro County Fair, the following suggestions are given by R. L. King, Castro County Agent on preparing the products and the number of each product to select.

- (I.) Corn (10 ears)  
 1. Popcorn 2. Corn, any variety  
 1. Select as soon as possible.  
 2. Uniform in size, shape, and color

- (II.) Small Grains and Seeds (Each sample to be one gallon)  
 1. Wheat, any variety  
 2. Barley  
 3. Sudan grass, any variety  
 4. Milo, any variety  
 5. Kafir  
 6. Higari

All seeds should be carefully selected, clean, free from trash and with plump, whole grains.

- (III.) Grain Sorghum Heads (Each sample to consist of 10 heads.)

- (1.) Milo  
 (2.) Kafir  
 (3.) Feterita  
 (4.) Hegari  
 1. Select at least a week before the show.

2. Select 25 to 50 heads in the field, take to house and select 10 that are uniform in size, shape, and color.

3. Wrap and leave them wrapped until day of show.

4. Select heads that are well filled out at tip and around stem.

5. Cut stems the same length.

- (IV.) Sheaf Grains (Sheaf grains to be 3 inches and not over 5 inches in diameter at middle band.)

1. Sudan  
 2. Grain Sorghums  
 3. Alfalfa  
 4. Millet  
 5. Sweet Sorghums

- (1.) Select 10 days to 2 weeks before show so it will cure.  
 (2.) Get heads and stalks uniform in size.

- (3.) Tie below heads, in the middle and at bottom.

- (4.) Cut bottom stems off even.  
 (V.) Hay baled (Size 8 X 10 X 16 inches and must be in marketable condition.)

The number and size of product exhibited conforms with the rules of the Panhandle South Plains Fair at Lubbock and all Products placing first and second at the Castro County Fair will be entered in the Tri-State Fair in Amarillo on Oct. 4th, or Lubbock Fair on Sept 27th.

The Livestock exhibits will include: Milking Shorthorns, Jerseys, Guernseys, and Herefords. Anyone in the county is eligible to enter livestock. These should be on exhibit by 10:30 o'clock September 17 at the Fairgrounds.

Junior Division will include the Sears pigs and Beef calves now on feed in the county.

## Grain Weevil Control Is Very Important Says County Agent

"With the shortage of grain storage space, there probably will be a lot of grain sorghum stored on farms in Texas and Castro County this year," R. L. King, County Agent points out. "The wise man will start early to protect his grains against weevils."

The first thing is to be sure that storage bins are weather and fumigant tight, Kings says. If the grain is not in storage yet, clean the bins and spray thoroughly with a five percent DDT spray.

King recommends two mixtures for the fumigation process. The first is three parts of ethylene dichloride and one part carbon tetrachloride. One thousand bushels of grain will use six gallons of the fumigant. Sprinkle with ordinary sprinkling cans over the top of the grain.

The second mixture recommended is one part carbon disulfide (highlife) and four parts carbon tetrachloride. Again, six gallons of the mixture will fumigate 1,000 bushels of grain. Pour it in shallow pans and place around the bin—it will evaporate and the fumes soak through the grain.

"Weevil control is important," King concludes, "not only from a grain-saving standpoint, but to protect your stored wheat if it is under government loan. August is a good month to get started on this important job."

### News From Your Home Demonstration Agent

The refrigerator is one of the coolest items around the house these hot, sunny days. And it's a good thing too, because it keeps food fresh and wholesome, if the food is put in the refrigerator properly, suggests the local Home Demonstration Agent.

Maybe you didn't know there was a proper way to put things in the refrigerator, some people just put things in and shut the door. However, here are some ideas on the proper way to store food.

The coldest spot in the icebox is nearest the freezing cabinet. This is where the most perishable foods go—such foods as fresh and cooked meats, poultry and fish, meat broth, gelatin dishes, milk, milk-and-egg dishes like custard and cottage cheese. These foods need a temperature of around 40 degrees F. or slightly colder.

Take a look at modern refrigerators. They are built to store these foods near the freezing compartment. Tall shelves for milk bottles are beside the unit, and a meat compartment is just underneath. Keep perishable foods and left over foods in covered containers and uncooked meat loosely covered or taken out of its wrapping paper and put in the meat compartment of the icebox.

Don't crowd foods too closely together because this will cut off the circulation of the cold air around them. Let cooked food cool to room temperature before putting it into the refrigerator. "Put it into the refrigerator as soon as it cools," Mrs. Seale says. "You don't want to leave it out any longer, for it may spoil."

## Public Eating Places Should be Sanitary Says Health Officer

AUSTIN — The Texas State Department of Health cannot maintain daily inspection of all eating places and the public is urged by Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer to insist on the proper sanitation of the establishment where they eat. It the public is careless in this respect the incentive to maintain clean food service will be lessened and operators will only maintain the level the public is willing to accept. He urged that the public patronize "eating establishments which measure up to a high standard of cleanliness."

The State Health Department is making every effort to improve sanitation of eating places, Dr. Cox said, and there is "no excuse for cafe owners not taking advantage of the food handlers schools which are being offered all over the state." He added that there are laws, rules and regulations which require the use of approved equipment and methods in such establishments.

"The public should be aware of these sanitary rules and regu-

lations and insist that restaurants observe them. Patrons should realize that tables and counters will be many times cleaner than the kitchen and other places out of sight," he warned.

He urged milk appraisal by the patrons also. Texas law requires that a milk bottle cap state the grade of milk, and whether it is raw or pasteurized. "Insist on having the milk served in its original container, with a covered

cap and a legal label," Dr. Cox advised. "Obviously," he said, "the best in sanitation can be had only in close co-operation between the public and the investigators of the State Health Department."

### Band Classes Will Accomodate All D. H. S. Students

When the new band and chorus building on the high school campus is completed, there should be room for as many students to take part in band as wish to do so.

The main rehearsal room will accommodate the whole band in rehearsal at one time, the four practice rooms, instrument room and office make possible practice time for students during their study hall periods while some other band class occupies the main rehearsal room. When completed, the building will compare favorably with music buildings or other school campuses in the state. The interior is being lined with celotex "Ivory-kote," which will aid in sound-proofing the various rooms.

Plans are being arranged with some music companies in Amarillo whereby a student may use an instrument rental plan similar to the one used this summer; but, instead of having the rental plan cover only three months, it will cover a full semester. These classes will meet at a regular period every school day just like algebra, English, history or any other class. When

a student registers for band at a certain period, he will report to that class at the same period every day of the week. Private lessons will be given either before or after school at \$1.50 per lesson.

Band classes will be available to senior high, junior high and grade school students from the third grade up.
