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Citizens hold a **Tea Party**

70 attend protest against U.S. government policies

More than 200 years ago, a group of Americans protested their government's taxation policy in an event that became known as the Boston Tea

On Thursday came the sequel.

As part of a nation-wide event, about 70 local residents gathered at the Howard County Courthouse Wednesday for a "Tea Party" to protest what they described as an overly intrusive federal government.

Upset with recent actions by President Obama and the Democratic-controlled Congress, conservatives across the nation held Tea Parties across the nation to voice their displeasure with the policies.

Wednesday's rallies used the dreaded April 15 — the U.S. deadline to file income taxes — as a hook to vent about government spending and corporate bailouts in an homage to the Boston Tea Party.

The tea parties were promoted by FreedomWorks, a conservative nonprofit advocacy group based in Washington and led by former Republican House Majority Leader Dick Armey of Texas, who is now a lobbyist.

District Judge Orlando Garcia in San Antonio said in a ruling earlier this month that the TYC erred when it forced Patricia Logterman and Corinne Alvarez-Sanders to resign or be terminated in mid-

Garcia's ruling also said a 2007 reform measure that allowed the TYC to fire any employee at will was unconstitutional, because it was applied retroactively to workers who were hired as "for cause" employees.

"TYC is going to have to re-evaluate its employment relationship with probably hundreds of workers," Dan Hargrove, an attorney for

"If employees were forced to resign, they're entitled to their job back with the state of Texas," Hargrove added.

TYC officials said they could not comment because of motions pending before they judge. But they said the personnel

an effort to strengthen the agency, improve its leadership, and make tions of our state's leadership and Texas taxpayers," spokesman Jim Hurley said.

The newspaper reported that its review of TYC personnel records showed at least 150 people were fired in the months immediately after the abuse scandal broke. Forty of those employees resigned instead of being terminated. Hundreds of others left the agency, but it was unclear whether they were fired or left voluntarily.

"I'm just realizing how monumental this ruling is, what a tremendous bearing it has on our case," said Alvarez-Sanders. "I'm excited to be vindicated."

Hurley said all employees fired by the agency were given termination hearings, as required by policy.



April is national Child Abuse Prevention month. Most child abuse happens in a child's home, with a smaller amount occurring in the organizations, schools or communities the child interacts with.

A study in 2000 showed 879,000 children were victims of child maltreatment.

Child abuse can take many forms: 63 percent of cases were neglect, in which an adult fails to adequately provide for various needs, including physical, emotional or educational

Physical abuse accounted for 19 percent of the study's findings — physical aggression directed at a child by an adult and also the kind of a chapter does Obama transmission of toxins (drugs and alcohol) to a child through their mother in-utero.

Ten percent of abuse is sexual abuse, which is any sexual act between an adult and a child, including penetration, fondling, exposure to adult sexuality and violations of privacy.

Psychological abuse, also known as emotional abuse, which can involve belittling or shaming a child, inappropriate or extreme punishment and the withholding of affection, accounts for eight percent of abuse found in

When adults feel frustration with little ones, they should:

- Take a deep breath. Take a few more. Remember, you are the adult.
- Close your eyes and imagine you are hearing that your child is about to hear or receive the same punishment.

- Put yourself in a "time out" chair. Are you really angry at the child or is it at something or someone else?
- Press your lips together and count to 20.

Obama could disarm them

e rules a country from the left, yet he doesn't have any need to be totalitarian. He has been called a socialist, yet he doesn't jail his political opponents, censor critical media, or try to amend the Consti-

tution to prolong his time in power. Just by being

himself, our new liberal American president could disarm the Latin American left. When President

Barack Obama goes south of the border this week, he has a unique opportunity to change the course of Latin

American history. Just by being himself, he could steer Latin America back from its recent decline toward totalitarian socialism. The revival of the old Latin American caudillos, now rebranded as leftists, could come to a screeching halt if Obama plays his cards well. First in Mexico and then in

Trinidad and Tobago, where he will participate in the Summit of the Americas with 33 other leaders this weekend, Obama undoubtedly will begin a new chapter in the history of U.S. relations with Latin America and the English-speaking Caribbean.

The question now is this: What want to write? Will he tell Latin Americans to seek freedom and democracy above everything else? Or will he end up agreeing to sing "Kumbaya" with people who should be tried for crimes against humanity? Will he embrace dictators and ignore

their atrocities, as a group of Democratic lawmakers did in Cuba last week, or will he tell Latin Americans that any kind of caudillo, from the left or from the right, should be a thing of the past? After announcing an executive

order lifting U.S. travel restrictions for Cuban-Americans who want to visit or send remittances to their relatives back on the Caribbean island, two White House spokesmen — in English and Spanish — insisted Monday that the Obama administration now expects the Cuban government to make concessions that would lead to freedom and democracy for the Cuban people. This is crucial, and it means that President Obama may be on the right track.

It's not Washington that has to change. It's Havana!

We simply cannot lift the U.S. economic embargo against Cuba without seeing some change fewer political prisoners, violations of human rights, and mobs of government-sponsored goons and less repression and censorship, just to get started.

Because he is considered a leftist, in Latin America, Obama may have much more credibility to speak for democratic principles than his predecessor. Let's face it: The radically leftist Latin American leadership nowadays especially in Cuba, Venezuela, Nicaragua, Bolivia and Ecuador — doesn't know what to do with Obama. 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

Crew that thwarted pirates

to reunite with families

ANDREWS AIR FORCE BASE, Md. (AP) - Arainy morning outside the nation's capital couldn't dampen the spirits of the crew of the Maersk Alabama, who returned to the U.S. a week after their ordeal off the coast of Somalia.

After they disembarked the charter flight from Kenya early Thursday, one crewman, carrying a child toward the terminal, shouted, "I'm happy to see my family."

Another exclaimed, "God bless America."

The crewmen were greeted at Andrews Air Force Base around 1 a.m. EDT by several dozen family members who crowded onto the wet tarmac near the arriving plane, waving small flags in the unseasonably cool air. A bevy of reporters and cameras captured the scene, which included a banner adorned with yellow ribbons reading "Welcome Home Maersk Alabama" that shipping company employees erected near the runway.

Captain freed by Navy snipers arrives in Kenya to strains of 'Sweet Home Alabama'

MOMBASA, Kenya (AP) — The American sea captain held hostage for five days by Somali pirates reached land Thursday, with the U.S. destroyer that rescued him docking to the strains of "Sweet Home Alabama" hours after his crew reunited with their families back home.

Capt. Richard Phillips of the U.S.-flagged Maersk Alabama cargo ship was brought into Mombasa harbor aboard the USS Bainbridge, which blared out the Lynyrd Skynyrd hit that includes the words "I'm coming home to you." The destroyer hoisted the U.S. flag as it arrived.

Phillips, 53, of Underhill, Vermont, gave himself up as a hostage to ensure the safety of his crew. He was freed Sunday by Navy SEAL sharpshooters who killed his three captors with three single shots taken from the Bainbridge amid choppy seas.

Phillips' wife, Andrea, and two children were still home in Vermont and did not know when or where they would meet him, according to her mother, Catherine Coggio.

Obama heads to Mexico

to offer solidarity in drug war

WASHINGTON (AP) — Confronting a security threat on America's doorstep, President Barack Obama is venturing into the heart of Mexico. His swift diplomatic mission is meant to show solidarity with a neighbor — and to prove that the U.S. is serious about halting the deadly flow of drugs and During his stop in Mexico City on Thursday,

Obama will emphasize cross-border cooperation and probably put a focus on clean energy, but the economic crisis and the bloody drug trade have set Among the other touchy points are disagreement

over a lapsed U.S. assault weapons ban, a standoff over cross-border trucking and immigration.

The escalating drug war in Mexico is spilling into the United States and onto Obama's lap as a foreign crisis much closer than North Korea or Afghanistan. Mexico is the main hub for cocaine and other drugs entering the U.S.; the United States is the primary source of guns used in Mexico's drug-related killings.

Mexican President Felipe Calderon's aggressive stand against drug cartels has won him the aid of the United States and the prominent political backing of Obama — never as evident as on Thursday, when the popular U.S. president is sure to stand with Calderon on his own turf and note his cour-

Foreclosures up 24 percent in first quarter as temporary halts expire WASHINGTON (AP) — The number of American

households threatened with losing their homes grew 24 percent in the first three months of this vear and is poised to rise further as major lenders restart foreclosures after a temporary break, according to data released Thursday. The big unknown for the coming months, how-

ever, is President Barack Obama's plan to help up totype:bold,italic; 9 million borrowers avoid foreclosure through refinanced mortgages or modified loans. The Obama administration expects its plans to make a big dent in the foreclosure crisis. But it remains to be seen whether the lending industry will fully embrace it, despite \$75 billion in incentive payments.

The faltering economy is causing the housing crisis to spread. Nationwide, nearly 804,000 homes received at least one foreclosure-related notice from January through March, up from about 650,000 in the same time period a year earlier, according to RealtyTrac Inc., a foreclosure listing

In March, more than 340,000 properties were affected, up 17 percent from February and 46 percent from a year earlier.

Foreclosures "came back with a vengeance" last month and are likely to keep rising, said Rick Sharga, RealtyTrac's senior vice president for marketing.

Republicans hope to capitalize on anti-tax sentiment expressed by tea party crowds

ATLANTA (AP) — Republicans have lost their grip on Congress and the White House, but they claim to have American anger over taxes and the economy on their side as tens of thousands turned out for anti-tax "tea parties" around the country.

Wednesday's rallies used the dreaded April 15 the U.S. deadline to file income taxes — as a hook to vent about government spending and corporate bailouts in an homage to the Boston Tea Party.

The tea parties were promoted by FreedomWorks, a conservative nonprofit advocacy group based in Washington and led by former Republican House Majority Leader Dick Armey of Texas, who is now a lobbyist.

Organizers said the movement developed organically through online social networking sites such as Facebook and Twitter and through exposure on Fox News and promotion from conservative pundits and bloggers.

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





"That shot may have been a little bit bigger than I thought it was," Finley said.

Tim Duncan had 20 points and 19 rebounds and carried the Spurs in a brilliant overtime. His final five minutes included six rebounds, two assists and a block on Hornets star Chris Paul.

The jewel came on a turnaround, onehanded baseline jumper with 41.1 seconds left that pushed the lead to seven. David West scored 34 points for the Hornets, but fumed after Duncan sank that one.

It was possibly the most commanding performance from Duncan since the All-Star break, when his aching knees started to become a constant worry. Tony Parker led

Kinsler got up and slapped his hands together after sliding headfirst into third without a throw for the triple to complete the fourth cycle in team history, and the Rangers went on to a 19-6 victory over the Orioles to snap a five-game losing streak Wednesday night.

Texas was already down 2-0 when Kinsler led off in the first. He hit the first pitch he saw for a double, then added a solo homer in the third and two singles in an eight-run fourth. "Kins got us started on the first

pitch and did let up all night," man-Ron Washington "Everybody followed suit."

Michael Young's groundout in the sixth plated Kinsler to make it 15-4. Then when Kinsler batted again in the eighth, he capped his 6-for-6 night with an RBI double and scored for the fifth time. The hits and runs matched team records.

"That was just a monster game. It's one thing to hit for the cycle, that's a once-in-a-lifetime type of game," Michael Young said. "But to add a couple of more hits to it too, it's an incredible game."

Nelson Cruz matched the AL home run lead with his fifth homer grand slam on reliever Radhames Liz's first pitch that gave the Rangers a 10-3 lead. That accounted for half of the eight unearned runs Texas scored in the fourth.

Marlon Byrd had went 5-for-6 with three RBIs for the Rangers, who had 19 hits. Their 19 runs are the most scored in the majors this season, and the most for them since their 30-3 victory in Baltimore on Aug. 22, 2007.

Kris Benson (1-1), who missed the last two seasons after surgery to repair a torn right rotator cuff, hadn't won since Sept. 21, 2006, when he was pitching for Baltimore against Detroit.

The right-hander allowed four runs in six innings.

"Today's game belongs to the offense," Benson said. "It was a great game all the way around. Our offense makes it easier to go out there and pitch six innings."

Cruz came only a few feet from hitting another grand slam, his flyball in the eighth hitting about halfway up the 14-foot wall in left field for a two-run double.

Baltimore, which still has won its first three series in a season for the first time in 11 years, jumped out to a 2-0 lead on consecutive RBI groundouts in the first after Benson walked leadoff hitter Brian Roberts and allowed a double to Adam Jones.

Luke Scott led off the Orioles second with a double and scored when Jones drew a bases-loaded walk for a 3-1 lead.

Only two of the nine runs allowed by Orioles starter Mark Hendrickson (1-1) were earned. The left-hander allowed seven hits and walked four in 3 2-3 innings.

"This one got away from us. I like the way we started. We just didn't pitch well enough and we didn't play well enough," manager Dave Trembley said. "Kinsler is a great player. ... It's a tremendous achievement for an All-Star player."

After Kinsler's homer, Young reached on shortstop Cesar Izturis' fielding error and scored on Hank Blalock's single that rolled under the glove of second baseman Brian Roberts. Byrd followed with an RBI double that broke the 3-3 tie and put Texas ahead to stay.

Rookie Elvis Andrus, the No. 9 hitter, drew a leadoff walk in the fourth before Kinsler singled and Young reached on Roberts' throwing error that allowed a run. There were two outs when Byrd's RBI single made it 6-3 and chased Hendrickson.

Then came Liz, recalled Wednesday after third baseman Melvin Mora and right-hander Alfredo Simon were put on the disabled list. The right-hander gave up four runs in his one inning, including an RBI triple by Andrus.

It was the first cycle for the Rangers since Gary Matthews Jr., at Detroit on Sept. 13, 2006.

The other Texas cycles were both against Cleveland, Mark Teixeira on Aug. 17, 2004; and Oddibe McDowell on July 23, 1985.

Alfonso Soriano had the only other six-hit game for Texas, against Detroit on May 8, 2004.

"It's more special on Jackie Robinson Day," Kinsler said. "He's a guy that could do everything in the game. Hit triples, hit home runs, steal bases, drive people in, score runs. He could do everything offensively. It's just kind of a weird thing that I'm playing second base on Jackie Robinson Day and that happens."

Antonio-New Orleans game went into overtime. Houston scored only 14 points in the final period. Yao took just one shot in eight minutes, all while being guarded by Brandon Bass — who is 10 inches shorter and 60 pounds lighter.

"It's good to have momentum going into the playoffs," Carlisle said. "It doesn't guarantee anything but I really feel like it's good for our team to be winning heading in."
