Old Soreheads Trade Days rebounds from wild storm

STANTON — The Old Soreheads Trade Days survived a blow from Mother Nature to conclude another successful run Sunday.

Saturday's first day of the triennial event was cut short because of extremely high winds and rain which caused some damage, but the elements were much more benign Sunday and large crowds helped bring things to a successful close, organizers said.

Stanton Police Chief Mike Adams said the threat of severe weather forced officials to start shutting down Saturday's run a few hours early.

"We came under a severe weather warning at around 5 p.m. and we had everybody shut things down," Adams said. "Thank goodness we did. because we would have had some injuries if we hadn't."

Winds at speeds up to 70 mph blew through the area at about 7 p.m., knocking over tents and stands and scattering some merchants' merchandise to points unknown.

"It was a disaster area," Adams said.

With Saturday temperatures reaching 107 degrees in the downtown area Saturday,

Big Spring woman killed in shooting Husband surrenders to authorities early this morning

A Big Spring woman was pronounced

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dead at Scenic Mountain Medical Center early this morning following a shooting in the 1200 block of Sycamore, according to police officials.

Patricia Ramirez Gutierrez, 45, was pronounced dead at the SMMC emergency room by Howard County Justice of the Peace Quail Dobbs shortly after 1

Everett said the suspect, 48-year-old

Tommy Gutierrez Jr., later turned himself in at the Troy M. Hogue Law Enforcement Center.

"While detectives were looking for Gutierrez, he came to the police department and turned himself in just after 7 a.m. and was taken into custody and charged with murder," said Everett. "We expect to interview him this morning and book him into the Howard County Jail." Everett declined to comment further,

citing the investigation into the homicide is ongoing.

Electric provider Oncor (ON'-kor) reported early Monday that all homes and businesses that can receive power have been restored.

The utility earlier reported outages to as many as 500,000 homes and businesses after thunderstorms pounded the Dallas-Fort Worth area last week.

Police arrest father in missing baby case

DALLAS (AP) — Dallas police have arrested the father of a 9-monthold girl who was reported abducted from her home.

Alandus Weaver, 20, was arrested on suspicion of tampering or fabricating evidence to hinder an investigation, police said Sunday. Police declined to provide further details.

Police began searching for Daijsa Weaver on Tuesday after her mother reported a man broke into her apartment, tried to sexually assault her then took the baby. Weaver was not home at the time. Janse said the baby's mother recanted her account of the kidnapping.

Authorities searched Lake Lewisville on Sunday after receiving a tip the girl's body may be there. The child still has not been found.

Weaver was being held Sunday with bond set at \$100,000. No information was available on an attorney who could comment on Weaver's behalf, according to the

Weaver's father said his son told him he didn't know where the child is.

A&M president resigns before regents meeting COLLEGE STATION

(AP) — Texas A&M President Elsa Murano announced her resignation Sunday, one day before the A&M System's Board of Regents was scheduled to discuss the university's leadership in what had every appearance of a decision on Murano's future. Earlier this month,

the university system released a scathing performance review of Murano's first full year on the job, giving her low marks for leadership and management, including the lowest scores possible for decisiveness and for not being a team player.

Murano, the first female and first Hispanic president in the school's 132-year history, issued a statement through her lawyer Sunday saying that she was doing what she believed was best for the university and hoped to return to the

faculty.

In her statement, Murano said recent weeks had been "taxing" for university and thanked those who offered support.

Jakes says he barely avoided explosion

DALLAS (AP) — Dallas megachurch pastor T.D. Jakes says a lastminute change of plans saved him from being killed in a natural gas explosion at his home. Jakes told thousands

at a Sunday service at The Potter House that he would have been getting dressed near the blast last week had he not suddenly had the feeling he should call off an early morning meeting. The blast that ripped through an area of his 15,000-square-foot home did not result in any injuries.

Jakes' voice shook Sunday during his emotional account of how he and a church member who drove him to the church would have been in the middle of the blast.

About 375 kids are expected to participate Monday. When he told me about it, I said, 'We're in," said Cameron Doan, a golf pro at a club.

Kim Sater said that so far, they've been able to get enough corporate sponsorship so that all the money the kids raise goes to the hospital. She said that Scottish

Rite's focus on the kids always impressed her when she brought her son there. Ben Sater had his first surgery at the age of three on a pinky and thumb and then had surgery again at the age of 10 on three more fingers affected with trigger finger, a condition in which fingers lock or catch in a bent position. Stephanie Brigger,

vice president of development at Scottish Rite, said other patients have raised money with book drives and lemonade stands, but none have done anything so big at such a young age.

The tournament has a kids committee and an adult committee. The kids' duties include choosing the T-shirt design and fundraising prizes and helping set the day's program — Monday's tournament ends with a pool party.

"Each year, it's very much run by the kids," said Brigger, who added the event helps make people aware of the work they do at the hospital. "This is our next gen-

eration of philanthropists," Brigger said. "They're learning about what it is to give back and give to others. It's a beautiful thing that they've done."

Fourteen-year-old Stephen Hoefer, who has been participating in the KidSwing tournament since he was 7, will start volunteering at the hospital this summer by helping in-

any shoppers around and very few vendors." Burch and other com-



Border initiative welcome, so is more attention

t has one of the ponderous titles favored by the feds -- President Obama's 2009 National Southwest Border Counternarcotics Strategy. However, there's a simple goal buried in that

bureaucratese — attacking drug smuggling and

Homeland Security Secretary Janet Napolitano announced the initiative Friday in Albuquerque. With her were Attorney General Eric Holder and White House drug czar Gil Kerlikowske.

Efforts will focus on smuggling, as would be expected. But in remarks in Tucson on Thursday, Napolitano said, "This is not just about slowing or impeding the flow of drugs from Mexico and Central America into the United States, it's also about reducing the demand for those drugs."

One goal of the strategy is coming up with new and more effective methods of detecting underground tunnels that smugglers use to get their product across the border.

That goal has become even more important because of recent reports detailing plans by al-Qaida to use tunnels to bring bioweapons into the United States from Mexico.

Another goal is to increase safety for law officers who protect the border. There have been numerous incidents of violence directed at those officers and, especially with the violence in Mexico, it's important to safeguard the officers.

Also, the feds want to develop better technology to detect smuggling activities at border crossings. That's necessary, because drugs and smugglers caught at the border obviously don't have the opportunity to operate deeper into the United States.

It's good to see that border security is getting more and much-needed attention from the federal government. The violence we're seeing along the border is, of course, inextricably tied to the drug problem.

Three federal agencies with interests in the border are currently without permanent directors. Immigration and Customs Enforcement, the Drug Enforcement Administration and the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives are working with interim directors.

Napolitano said that won't affect the new strategy. However, of course, it would be better to have permanent leadership in those strategic positions as this new initiative goes forward.

The initiative is welcome.



Obama's centers for excellence

ast week, White House chief economist Christina Romer told reporters that there are "billiondollar bills lying on the sidewalk" in America's health care system — apparently there for

the taking if only Washington would show the will to pick them up.

As a presidential candidate and now as president, Barack Obama has promised both universal access to health care and big savings to taxpaying households.

That doesn't make a lot of sense because usually when you buy more of something, the price tag increases, but Washington seems not to have noticed.

There's a circular logic to the illogical proposition.

Obama's Council of Economic Advisers (headed by Romer) issued a report on June 2, "The Economic Case for Health Care Reform," that concluded: "The central finding of this report is that genuine health care reform has substantial benefits.'

You have to marvel at the ability of political staffers to congratulate themselves on great successes even before their plan has been adopted.

The report does a fine job of outlining the arguments in favor

of containing health care costs. Every year, the rise in these costs eats more out of workers' paychecks. For some readers, premium inflation means that their take-home pay cannot keep pace with inflation and thus they are effectively suffering a pay

To make matters worse, many employees also are paying higher co-payments for health care. Obviously, if Obama can put the brakes on this runaway health cost train, workers, employers and taxpayers will benefit.

But can he make health care universal — that is, expand health care coverage to more Americans — and still save taxpayers money without cutting back on the level of care that most Americans now enjoy?

The president's economists cited a Dartmouth Medical School study that suggests "nearly 30 percent of Medicare costs could be saved without adverse health consequences." I cannot help but suspect that if economists working for President George W.

Bush talked up such economies, headlines would scream: "Bush To Slash Medicare."

And there would be stories quoting fed-up lifelong Republicans turning on the GOP. There also would be a few sneers about Obamaspeak — including the report's suggested strategy of "creating financial incentives for patients needing complex surgeries to use high quality, lower total cost 'centers of excel-

Sure, the new crew means well. Team Obama wants to save families money and make sure everyone has health care. But it's hard to be impressed at the promise for the government to provide universal health care because it's a moral imperative, not so morally vital that most Americans should have to pay

Leading Democrats in Congress now are talking about how to pay for the \$1.2 trillion cost of universal care over 10 years. It looks as if Obama will have to let go of his 2008 opposition to taxing employer-paid health premiums. Bottom line: Expanded

health care won't be free. Meanwhile, it's the economists as opposed to politicians who tout rosy scenarios as they suggest that the Obama plan, and the health industry's socalled pledge to curb cost increases by 1.5 percent annually, could save a typical family of

four \$2,600 in 2020. Only a Washington economist can argue with a straight face that providing quality health care to 46 million Americans who are now uninsured and assert it will save "between \$75 bil

lion and \$125 billion per year." Folks, that's how government and deficits keep getting bigger.

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Obama urges doctors to back his health plan

WASHINGTON President Barack Obama, continuing to promote his health care proposals, will urge doctors gathered in Chicago to support wider insurance coverage and targeted federal spending

Obama planned to tell the American Medical Association's annual meeting in his hometown on Monday that overhaul cannot wait and that bringing down costs is the most important thing he can do to ensure the country's long-term fiscal health, a senior administration official said.

The official spoke on the condition of anonymity.

doctors. America's like many other groups, are divided over the president's proposals to reshape the health care delivery system. The White House anticipates heavy spending to cover the almost 50 million Americans who lack health insurance and has taken steps in recent days to outline where that money could be found.

For instance, Obama wants to cut federal payments to hospitals by about \$200 billion and cut \$313 billion from federal health insurance programs for the poor and elderly. He also is proposing a \$635 billion "down payment" in tax increases and spending cuts in the health care system.

To an audience of doctors Obama plans to say the United States spends too much on health care and gets too little in return. He says the health industry is crushing businesses and families and is leading to millions of Americans losing coverage, the administration official said.

Obama's turn before 250,000-physician group is his latest effort to persuade skeptics that his goal to provide health care to all Americans is worth the \$1 trillion price tag it is expected to run during its first decade.

The president plans to acknowledge the costs. But he also will tell the doctors it is not acceptable for the nation to leave so many without insurance.

Republicans Unified and some fiscally conservative **Democrats** in Congress have said they are nervous about how the administration

Obama has been quietly making a case for malpractice reducing lawsuits to help control costs, long a goal of the AMA and Republicans. Obama has not endorsed capping jury awards

Former Senate Majority Leader Tom Daschle said Monday that controlling the cost of malpractice insurance would have to be a part of the Obama administration's overhaul.



Kobe leads Lakers to 15th NBA title in franchise history

ORLANDO, Fla. — Kobe Bryant jumped and punched the air. He did it again, seven years of pent up frustration freed in a fit of joy.

This was the one he wanted more than all the others.

The one to top them all.

One year after failing miserably in the finals against Boston, Bryant and the Los Angeles Lakers found redemption. They finished a season they felt was theirs with a 99-86 win over the Orlando Magic on Sunday night in Game 5 to win the 15th NBA title in franchise history.

For Bryant, this was the missing piece from his resume, his fourth championship and first without former teammate Shaquille O'Neal.

"I don't have to hear that criticism, that idiotic criticism anymore," said Bryant, the finals MVP. "It was annoving." For Lakers coach Phil Jackson, this

was title No. 10, moving him past legendary Celtics coach Red Auerbach for the most by a coach in league history.

"I'll smoke a cigar in honor of Red," Jackson said. "He was a great guy."

For Pau Gasol. For Derek Fisher. For Lamar Odom. For Trevor Ariza and for Andrew Bynum and the rest of the Lakers, this was a title to savor.

"It's a dream come true," Gasol said. "The completion of a goal."

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — Texas coach Augie Garrido often says baseball is a cruel game.

Don't the Southern Mississippi Golden Eagles know it.

Oh, how they know it.

Jonathan Johnston walked Brandon Loy on four pitches with the bases loaded in the bottom of the ninth inning to give Texas a 7-6 win in the College World Series on Sunday night.

"It's just the way baseball treats people sometimes. It's a brutal game," he said. "Being in this environment for the first time created some nerves that turned into fear and eventually was the demise of an otherwise courageous

The Longhorns' final three runs scored on bases-loaded walks. Of Texas' last 11 batters, six walked and one was hit by a

"That's a tough way to lose," Southern Miss coach Corky Palmer said. "I'd rather have someone hit a grand slam."

The Golden Eagles' dismal pitching performance in their Omaha debut spoiled an otherwise gutty performance against the No. 1-seeded Longhorns. Of the 171 pitches thrown by five USM pitchers, just 94 were strikes. They walked nine.

Texas (47-14-1), in the CWS for a record 33rd time, moves on to a 7 p.m. Tuesday game against Arizona State.

Southern Miss (40-25) will try to stay alive against North Carolina in a Bracket 2 elimination game the same day at 2

The Longhorns got all they could handle against USM. They could never settle in against the Eagles, who came into

the NCAA tournament as a No. 3 region-

Southern Miss tied it at 6 in the top of the ninth on James Ewing's single off Taylor Jungmann (9-3), who had taken over for a struggling Austin Wood. They couldn't finish, though.

Palmer, who talked about his lack of pitching depth in the days before the CWS, realized his worst fears in the bottom of the ninth.

Johnston relieved Fields (2-1) with one out and runners on first and second. The side-arming Johnston struck out Tant Shepherd, but then he imploded. He threw only one strike on his final eight pitches.

When Johnston missed inside on the last pitch, the Longhorns rushed out of their dugout to greet Loy, his arms raised, after he touched first base.

business making precisely the right bid or play in hand after hand. The expert's judgment is not

Note that if McDonald had failed to play the club jack at trick one, the suit would have become hopelessly blocked. Note also that if Mrs. Wagar had neglected to drop her king of hearts on the ace, East would have been unable to gain the lead for the killing club return.

Both plays were absolutely necessary to defeat the contract, but we would prefer to think of them simply as indicated rather than sensational

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


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

Odom scored 17 points, Ariza had 15, Gasol 14 and 15 rebounds, and Fisher, whose two big 3s in Game 4 saved L.A., had 13 points.

It took longer than Bryant expected, but he has stepped from O'Neal's enormous shadow — at last.

Bryant averaged 32.4 points, 7.4 assists, 5.6 rebounds and more than a dozen cold-blooded glares per game. He wasn't out to make friends in these finals, he was out for redemp-

Throughout the playoffs, he didn't smile. He just snarled and bared his

"I was just completely locked in," he said. "I was grumpy for a while and now I'm just ecstatic, like a kid in a candy store."

O'Neal, who won three titles with Bryant before the pair had a major falling out, was glad to see his former teammate win another.

"Congratulations kobe, u deserve it," O'Neal said on his Twitter page. "You played great. Enjoy it my man

Bryant and Jackson, whose relationship strained and briefly snapped under the weight of success, are again at the top of their games.

Together.

Following the game, the pair shared a long embrace.

Jackson, who once called Bryant "a selfish player" now sees the 30-yearold in a far different light.

"He's learned how to become a leader in a way in which people want to follow him," Jackson said. "That's really important for him to have learned that because he knew that he had to give to get back in return, and

so he's become a giver rather than just a guy that's a demanding lead-

After the final horn, Bryant and his teammates bounced around the floor of Amway Arena. Moments later, Bryant swept his two daughters, both wearing gold Lakers dresses, into his

Bryant had come up short twice in the finals before, in 2004 with O'Neal against Detroit, and again last season against the Celtics in the renewal of the league's best rivalry. The Lakers were beaten in six games, losing the finale in Boston by 39 points, a humiliating beatdown that Bryant and his teammates had trouble shaking. They went to training camp with

one goal in mind. This was going to be their season, and except for a few minor missteps, it was. In the locker room afterward,

Bryant made sure Jackson got a champagne shower.

"He took his glasses off, threw his head back and soaked it all in because this is a special time," Bryant said. "For us to be the team that got him that historic 10th championship is special for us."

Orlando will be haunted by moments in a series that swung on a few plays and had two overtime games.

After losing Game 1 by 25 points, the Magic had their chance in Game 2 but rookie Courtney Lee missed an alley-oop layup in the final second of regulation. In Game 4, Dwight Howard clanged two free throws with 11.1 seconds, and the Magic allowed Derek Fisher to nail a game-tying 3-pointer to force OT.



begin to tally up to what he meant to his team. This was Bryant being Michael Jordan, willing his teammates on to great things because he expected nothing less than greatness from them.

They hopped on for the ride because they believed, just like Scottie Pippen, Steve Kerr, and, yes, even Dennis Rodman, believed in Chicago. They knew if they did their jobs the Lakers would be on top when it was all over and, even if they didn't, there was a good chance that Bryant would find a way to rescue the team anyway.

The champagne flowed in the locker room because the Lakers had just won the 15th title in the team's history, and even the Zen Master himself got soaked. But Bryant had even more reason to celebrate because there wasn't

anyone who wanted this championship as desperately as he did. LeBron James may have been this year's MVP. But Bryant was the MVP when it mattered most.

"It felt like a big 'ol monkey off my back," he said.

This wasn't a classic championship series, though few that end 4-1 are. The Orlando Magic had a nice run, but there was never the feeling that the Lakers would relax like they had done against other teams earlier in the

Not with Bryant trying to make a claim to being one of the greatest players ever. Not with Phil Jackson sitting serenely on the bench while cementing his claim to being the greatest coach ever.

Jackson, of course, is famous for his philosophy of living in the moment, something Bryant embraced along the way, too. Neither allowed himself to think past the next game, and Bryant was so focused that he was still scowling after the Lakers won in overtime in Game 2 to go up a commanding 2-0 Afterward, he was asked if he was happy with the win.

"What's there to be happy about?" Bryant asked. "The job's not finished." Everyone was happy on this night because the job was finally finished. Bryant's long road to redemption from last year's embarrassing loss to the Boston Celtics was finally over, and Jackson's record 10th coaching title in just 19 years — was finally secured.

Jackson donned a yellow cap made by his children with the Roman numeral X on it and the years of his 10 titles, a rare display for a coach who even to the end gave all the credit to his players. He and Bryant had a long embrace and, later in the locker room, Bryant orchestrated a surprise champagne shower for his coach.

Jackson would later remember back to a different time and a different Bryant. It was early into his first stint as coach of the Lakers and Bryant had gotten caught up in a shooting display in a game in Toronto one night, neglecting his teammates and turning it into a one-man game.

He brought Bryant in for a chat and told him he needed to be a leader. Bryant declared he was ready to become captain right then.

"Yes, but nobody is ready to follow you," Jackson told his star. They are now, and they're NBA champions because of it. And while Jackson may just decide to call it quits after this one and go off in search of inner peace, you get the feeling that winning this one may make Bryant even more hungry for the next.

For now, though, all he has in mind is a vacation in Cabo, where he can relax and savor the one he wanted most.

"It's tough to say it's a little sweeter," Bryant said. "But it kind of is."
