The Big Spring Airport will be celebrating its 80th anniversary next month and the facility's staff is looking for help from the community to make the celebration one to remem-

Kelly Myrick, administrative assistant for the airport, said she and Airpark Director Jim Little are hoping to the facility for the July 25 celebra-"We've talked to the Commemo-

rative Air Force (CAF) in Midland, and they are willing to fly a pair of World War II aircraft in for the anniversary," said Myrick. "One is a SNJ Fighter and the other is a PT-19 trainer aircraft. The PT-19 is an open cockpit plane, the kind you see in the gles and scarf on.' And while looking at and examin-

ing this pair of restored aircraft is certainly a treat, Myrick said the airport administration is hoping to take it one step further.

"The plane-owners normally offer rides in the aircraft during these types of events, and that's something we're hoping to be able to secure for the anniversary," said Myrick. "The PT-19 normally costs \$200 for a 30-minute ride, and the SNJ Fighter usually runs about \$300 for a 30-minute ride."

Myrick said there's one simple kink in the plan, however.

"We really don't have a budget for this anniversary," said said, "so we're trying to do everything on donations.

Bill allows muni judges to do marriages

Pops in the Park organizers still short on funds

It's crunch time. Members of the Big Spring Fourth of July Foundation, the organizers of Big Spring's Pops in the Park symphony concert and fireworks show, learned late last week that donations for this year's show are still about \$8,000 short of the money needed to produce the event.

However, while members of the organizing committee were pleased to hear that about \$32,000 had been raised, Foundation President Jan Hansen stressed that only a few days remain before the July 3 event and so far, not enough money has been received.

"We're in a position we haven't been in for a very long time," she said following Thursday's meeting. "We knew that the economy effects lots of our donors, just like it's effecting everyone. So, from the outset this year. we've worked awfully hard to raise money. And, to be honest, I still think we'll meet our \$40,000 goal. That's because Big Spring has always come through with the money needed to do this and I believe it will again."

Crowds pack the amphitheater each year, with between 10,000 and 12,000 attending the Big Spring Symphony and Chorus' concert and fireworks program, and the crowd always overflows into the park and along U.S. Highway 87. As big a crowd or even larger is expected for this year's

In addition to the symphony and chorus' performance, the show will be opened by young country singer-songwriter Maren Morris and her band and bluegrass music from Jim Kay and the Kay Grass-

band. "We're again expanding the show, because we always want to make it bigger and better," Hansen said. "I think that's one of the reasons the crowd has also continued to grow over the years. We're

"I now pronounce you" will soon be added to the list of standard phrases coming from Texas municipal judges, as a new bill passed by the state

legislature will allow them to perform weddings. The law — known as Sen-

ate Bill 935 — was passed by the Texas Senate April 23 and garnered the necessary support in the State House of Representatives May 12, with the final hurdle in the legislation overcome May 23 when Gov. Rick Perry signed it into law.

Municipal Judge Timothy Green said the law closes a loophole that's been hotly debated for more than 20 years. "The debate over this issue goes back a long way, and when the legislature took

it up once again during the past session,

I don't think anyone was surprised,"



Two die in house fire in Bastrop County

BASTROP (AP) — Investigators are trying to determine the cause of a house fire that killed an elderly couple in Bastrop County.

Roger Alvarado with the Bluebonnet Volunteer Fire Department said firefighters were called to the house on Farm to Market Road 969 Saturday afternoon. The home was fully engulfed in flames. Brazos County sheriff's officials

have not released the identities, but a family member told the Austin American-Statesman that the victims were an 87-year-old man and his 86-year-

The state fire marshal's office and the sheriff's office are investigating.

Houston couple finds man dead in apartment

HOUSTON (AP) — A Houston couple who awoke to the sounds of gunfire found a man they didn't know shot to death in their bathroom.

Police spokesman Jodi Silva said the couple were asleep when they heard the gunfire early Sunday and awoke to find two men running from the apartment. Silva said they found the dead man while checking to make sure nothing had been taken.

Silva said the man was shot several times. His identity was being withheld pending notification of relatives.

Investigators think robbery may have been a motive for the shooting, the Houston Chronicle reported.

Lawsuit settled in death of Rice football player HOUSTON (AP) — The family of a

former Rice University football player who died during a workout has settled its lawsuit with the school and the NCAA, which has agreed to recommend that its member universities test all student athletes for sickle

Dale Lloyd II died a day after he collapsed during a conditioning workout Sept. 24, 2006. The 19-year-old freshman's death was linked to sickle-cell trait and created the basis for the lawsuit filed in state district court in Harris County.

Much of the settlement is confidential, Houston television station KRIV reported Sunday night.

Police horse tramples, injures woman at parade HOUSTON (AP) — A 50-year-old

woman watching the annual Pride Houston Parade was kicked and stomped by a police horse and likely need plastic surgery. Kirste Reimers didn't notice mounted police officers approaching, trying to keep pedestrians from spilling off the sidewalks into the street during

Saturday night's parade, according to a Houston Chronicle report. She found herself being trampled, and suffered bruising over most of her body. Her chin was split open, teeth were knocked and her head was slammed on the asphalt. She spent the night in an emergency room.

Witnesses said it appeared one of the three horses got spooked as police led them close by the edge of the crowd.

Police said the officers and their horses were just doing their job.

National energy plan, national security go hand-in-hand today

'f you believe energy efficiency and national security are separate topics, never to be conflated, think again. America's energy choices affect its troops on the ground, its foreign policy options and, as noted yesterday, the nation's overall economic well being.

Foreign policy options with an oil-rich country are immensely more complicated when the U.S. consumes about 25 percent of the world's oil supply and must import more than 50 percent of the oil it burns each day. Not only does that trend cost the U.S. important leverage, its entire economy is unnecessarily susceptible to economic shock.

As history shows, national security and economic prosperity are inseparable. The simplest answer undoubtedly still complicated is finding and drilling more oil from domestic sources, using less oil overall and importing far less than we do today. This requires a national energy strategy that has never existed, one that shifts U.S. consumption from fossil fuels like oil and coal toward carbon-freer solutions like nuclear, wind and solar.

Hey, no one said life would be easy.

The U.S. military could be important to the transition and should be a prominent player in any comprehensive energy strategy. The military could provide valuable real-world testing for energy-saving technologies that could be adapted for commercial use. The Internet, for example, started as a Defense Department project in the late 1960s.

Less than 3 percent of the electricity used at U.S. military installations comes from renewable sources, so the potential for more renewable power is huge. Military bases are essentially small cities; efficiencies learned there could be adapted to the broader population. The Air Force, for instance, is the leading federal purchaser of green power, and the Army recently bought a fleet of electric vehicles for its domestic bases.

This would be the beginning. The nation needs to upgrade the existing electricity grid to a so-called "smart," energy-efficient grid. The military could provide a perfect laboratory for pioneering the use of distributed and renewable energy at installations outside combat zones. The experience would accelerate use of these technologies commercially.

Like consumers, the military has an economic incentive to think green and efficient. A \$10 change in the price of one barrel of oil translates to a \$1.3 billion shift in the Pentagon's energy costs. By the time fuel reaches the battlefield, costs could be 10 times higher. These are real expenses dollars lost to inefficiency that otherwise could be redeployed.

Not to mention, of course, the shooting wars fought in places where one key strategic considering is maintaining the flow of foreign oil to the U.S. It stands to reason that less oil needed reduces the need to fight.

As Congress takes on energy policy, we urge members to pay attention to these opportunities and, of course, coordinate efforts so that the military's energy efforts don't trip over the nation's climate policies.

The U.S. must seize this opportunity to transform the military from its reliance on foreign and fossil-fuel energy sources. In so doing, the country that military so ably protects will take a major step toward prosperity and security.

Defense budget is still too big

ast April, Secretary of **Defense Robert Gates** set off a firestorm with a new military budget that stripped funding from certain weapons systems and moved dollars into other priorities. The an-

nouncement was the fulfillment of a campaign promise by President Barack Obama, who had pledged to eliminate Cold War weapons systems we no longer need.

For their trouble, Gates and the president have been accused of gutting America's defenses and even

undercutting our troops in a time of war. Just this month, Alaska Gov. Sarah Palin told a crowd in Auburn, NY, that Obama's plan to cut \$1 billion from missile defense — just 10 percent of its budget and only part of the program dedicated to repelling a mass missile attack from the Soviet Union — was somehow a sign of weakness.

Would you be surprised to learn that the Obama defense budget is actually \$20 billion bigger than the last one signed by President George W. Bush? Moreover, the actual cuts proposed to specific programs are minor in scale compared to the \$700 billion-plus total. And when you consider a report from

\$300 billion in taxpayer money wasted on over-budget weapons systems, the idea that we are somehow "cutting" defense seems exaggerated.

The problem is that the behemoth defense budget, geared more toward expensive hightech weaponry than fighting our current wars, is precisely what we should be cutting in the face of spiraling deficits. For example, the new Obama defense budget halted production of the F-22 Raptor fighter, which never found a real combat use since the Cold War. However, the Pentagon made up for it by doubling expenses for the F-35 Joint Strike Fighter, yet another troubled procurement with serious cost overruns.

The administration also zeroed out \$60 million in funding for the Reliable Replacement Warhead (RRW), a Bush-era program to build more nuclear warheads. Ending the RRW will help the US stop the spread of nuclear weapons and potentially save billions required to support expanded production. But the US spent an estimated \$52 billion last year on nuclear related activities, much of it just to maintain our current arsenal. According to Joe Cirincione of the Ploughshares Fund, reducing America's nuclear arsenal to 1,000 warheads could save up to \$20 billion without compromising our deterrent.

in theory, drawing down in Iraq Building up permanent forces takes time and would be of little use to our present conflicts, unless of course, we are planning on occupying Iraq indefinitely or

invading another country. And as for missile defense, we could go even further than Gates' modest \$1 billion in cuts and not affect our defense against threats like North Korea much to the chagrin of Gov. Palin's efforts to keep federal pork in her home state.

The truth is that shoveling billions at the Pentagon is a big business, with lobbyists, politicians and officials invested in making sure that the money continues to move with no questions asked. Even Secretary Gates' intention of reining in the dysfunctional weapons procurement process is being administered by a former lobbyist for Raytheon, a major defense contractor, who had previously fought against reform.

That's why the mere shifting of dollars and simple demands for accountability from the Obama administration are meeting such fierce resistance.

But when you look at the full range of reforms needed in the Pentagon budget, you might wish that a president could be accused of making deep cuts in defense and have it actually ring

Schieffer says he has vision to be governor

Associated Press Writer WORTH FORT He's the former Texas Rangers baseball team president who later was appointed as a U.S. ambassador.

Many know him as the younger brother of CBS newsman Bob Schieffer. Others remember him as the popular and studious teen who was elected student-body president after giving Kennedy-esque speech-

Now Tom Schieffer is traveling across the state, introducing himself to Texans as a Democratic candidate for governor.

"It's been a long time since we had any vision in this state, and I want to do something about that," said Schieffer, 61. "This spirit of Texas is still alive. This is the election. This is the day. This is the hour to decide to change Texas again."

Schieffer said he is running because the state must improve its education system and stop the high dropout rate, develop a better energy regulatory system, improve the health care system and focus more on the environment.

Schieffer said he can win the 2010 election no matter who survives the brutal Republican primary — Gov. Rick Perry or Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison.

"To win, this campaign must become a cause," he said.

Schieffer, who also has a sister, grew up in Fort Worth and always was a leader, said former classmate Katherine Miller.

Although he was mostly serious, he could be funny and play practical jokes, so he was wellliked, she said. He was known for helping others and even started a school program to help welcome new students,

Schieffer admired President John F. Kennedy and seemed to emulate his speaking style, she said.

"He was interested in running for office when nobody else was in those days," said Miller, now a Houston attorney. "He would start talking and he would hold a crowd. I was surprised that someone our age could talk in such a serious

Schieffer served three terms as a Democratic representative, first elected at age 25 in


Schieffer, an attorney, later became a business partner with George W. Bush and they bought the Texas Rangers baseball team. He was the club's longtime president and succeeded Bush as general partner after Bush became governor in 1995.

After Bush was elected to the White House, he appointed Schieffer as U.S. ambassador to Australia in 2001 and to Japan in 2005.

Schieffer Although is a Democrat, his past ties to Bush are not necessarily a bad thing, said Jerry Polinard, a political science professor at the University of Texas-Pan American in Edinburg.

"You've got to have a candidate to attract independent voters and siphon off Republican voters ... while holding onto the more liberal wing, which is a question mark, but nonetheless they may hold their noses and vote for Schieffer," Polinard said. "If he has Perry as an opponent, he can isolate him as a far right-wing candidate. And it's not like he'd be running against a person who's enjoyed overwhelming support."

In 2006, Perry was reof the vote in a four-can-

didate race.

Still, any Democratic gubernatorial candidate faces an uphill battle in Texas, where no Democrat has won statewide office since 1994, Polinard said.

As a moderate and conservative Democrat, Schieffer could benefit if the GOP emerges fractured and bitter from its primary, Polinard said.

Schieffer, who has said he had no regrets about supporting Bush, said he's a lifelong Democrat but can rise above partisanship.

"I am a Democrat as Sam Rayburn used to say, without prefix, suffix or apology," Schieffer said in his speech announcing his candidacy last week.

After the campaign kickoff outside Fort Worth elementary school he attended, Schieffer told reporters that supporting Bush for president in 2000 and 2004 were his only votes elected with 39 percent for a Republican in any general elections.

Bond for Stanford to be reviewed

HOUSTON (AP) Texas financier R. Allen Stanford, indicted on charges alleging he swindled investors out of \$7 billion, could find out Monday if he will be freed on a \$500,000 bond or stay locked up until his trial.

U.S. District Judge David Hittner was set to hold a hearing to listen to arguments from federal prosecutors that Stanford, who holds citizenship Antiguan and may have access to hidden vast wealth, is a flight risk.

But Dick DeGuerin, Stanford's attorney, says his client is broke, has never tried to flee and wants to fight the charges against him.

The once high-flying financier and three executives of Houstonbased Stanford Financial Group were accused June 18 of orchestrating a massive fraud by misusing most of the \$7 billion they advised clients to invest in certificates of deposit from the Stanford International Bank in the Caribbean island of Antigua.

U.S. Magistrate Judge Frances Stacy granted Stanford's bond last week and also ordered GPS monitoring and home detention.

But Hittner, who is presiding over Stan-

ford's case, granted a prosecution request to delay Stacy's order until he can review the deci-

Court records show the \$100,000 in cash that needed to be given for Stanford's bond had been paid.

This deal occurred more than 60 years ago at a New York tournament. The form of scoring was total points, in which the primary goal is to make or defeat the contract, just as in rubber bridge. West led the heart king against

three notrump, and East, Morrie Elis, was immediately faced with a crucial decision. South's two-notrump bid promised a heart stopper, which could only be Q-10-x, so West's king had to be a singleton. Since Elis had only one side entry, there would be no way to establish and then run the heart suit.

So Elis decided to look elsewhere for a way to defeat the contract, and concluded that the best chance was to play West for the K-10 and length in diamonds. He therefore overtook the king of hearts with the ace, even though this established a second heart trick for the declarer, and shifted to the three of diamonds.

South put up the queen, and when West produced the king, it was allowed to hold the trick. West then continued with the diamond ten to dummy's ace, on which Elis carefully unblocked the jack. After this stellar defense, declarer

was helpless. He had only eight tricks - five clubs, a diamond and two hearts with the aid of a finesse. If he tried to establish a ninth trick in spades, the defense would grab the ace and run the diamonds for down three. So he did the best he could by cashing his winners to finish down

Elis' apparent generosity at trick one was well-judged. He placed his partner with a holding that would allow defeat of the contract, and proceeded accordingly. The outcome was well worth the extra heart trick he gave away in the process.



Rangers have plan for Hamilton's return from DL

ARLINGTON Texas Rangers slugger Josh Hamilton will begin his comeback from abdominal surgery as the designated hitter for Double-A Frisco.

Rangers general manager Jon Daniels said Hamilton, who last played May 31, will lead off and get as many at-bats

ers on Monday night in their last game before the Double-A All-Star break.

Hamilton, who had surgery June 9, will then work out with the Rangers on Tuesday. If all goes well, he will join Triple-A Oklahoma City on Wednesday in Iowa and play multiple games there, including in the outfield.

"There have been no setbacks," Daniels said. "It has been a positive rehab so far."

Daniels said Hamilton took another round of batting practice Sunday before the Rangers played San Diego. Hamilton also ran the bases again, and even slid into bases.

Hamilton could rejoin the Rangers as early as next weekend against Toronto, in their final home series before the All-Star break. Texas then plays seven games on the


West Coast before the break.

Doctors assured Daniels that Hamilton could begin playing in games, telling the GM that football and hockey players with the same injury return to action in the same timeframe.

Without Hamilton in their lineup, the Rangers will have a losing record in June and have lost their lead in the AL West. They were 10-13 for June going into Sunday night's game against San Diego, and a game behind the Los Angeles Angels after leading by as many 5 1/2 games before Hamilton's second DL

Hamilton got hurt when he crashed into an outfield wall making a catch May 17. That came less than a week after

Federer reaches Wimbledon quarters

WIMBLEDON, England Roger Federer found himself in a serving contest Monday at Wimbledon - and won.

The five-time champion hit 23

aces, never lost his serve and advanced to the quarterfinals by beating familiar foil Robin Soderling 6-4, 7-6 (5), 7-6 (5).

Federer improved to 11-0 against Soderling, including a victory in the French Open final to complete a career Grand Slam three weeks ago.

This time the No. 2-seeded Federer came through on a handful of key points. He earned the

only service break of the match in the ninth game of the opening set, when Soderling committed five unforced errors to fall behind for good, 5-4.

With all 16 fourth-round matches scheduled on a hot, hazy day, the Williams sisters remained on course to play an all-family final for the second year in a row.

Five-time champion Venus led 6-1, love-1 when Ana Ivanovic retired with a left thigh injury. Two-time champion Serena beat Daniela Hantuchova 6-3, 6-1. Venus beat Serena in last year's fi-

American 17-year-old Melanie Oudin's surprising run ended when she lost to No. 11-seeded Agnieszka Radwanska, 6-4, 7-5.

Soderling had just two breakpoint chances against Federer both at 4-all in the third set — and failed to put either return in play. Federer lost only eight points on his first serve and committed only eight unforced errors in the

Federer needs three more victories this week for his 15th major title, which would break the record he shares with Pete Sampras. Federer doesn't have to worry about defending champion Rafael Nadal, who missed the tournament with bad knees.

An injury ended Ivanovic's

Padres' Gaudin blanks Rangers for 2-0 victory

ARLINGTON - ChadGaudin is suddenly pitching like an ace for a battered San Diego pitching staff that can use the boost.

Gaudin allowed one hit over eight scoreless innings, the first opposing pitcher to do that at Rangers Ballpark, and the Padres beat the stumbling Texas Rangers 2-0 on Sunday night to win their first series in a month.

"I've seen a lot of games in this park from that dugout," Padres manager Bud Black, the pitching coach for the Los Angeles Angels seven seasons before that. "That was one of the best-pitched games I've seen."

After David Murphy drew a one-out walk in the first and Michael Young followed with a single, Gaudin retired 23 of the last 25 batters he faced — including the last 13. Murphy was the only Texas runner to touch second base.

"I've seen a bunch of balls go out of here," Gaudin said. "I tried to stay aggressive, let them know you're going to attack the zone. That makes it tough for them because they know you're not going to nibble, not going to let them wait for one pitch."

Only two pitchers can match what Gaudin did in Texas, both for the home team.

Kenny Rogers threw a perfect game at home for the Rangers in 1994, their first year in the stadium, and Rick Helling allowed one hit over eight scoreless innings in 1997.

Gaudin, with his fifth team in seven years after being released by the Chicago Cubs the first week of this season, struck out nine and walked two.

"He was a different pitcher than I've seen in the past," Murphy said. "He located his fastball a lot better, and he was

using his slider more, and more effectively."

Heath Bell worked the ninth for his National League-best 21st save, matching Brian Fuentes of the Los Angeles Angels for the major league lead. Bell walked Young before Andruw Jones grounded into a game-ending double

Scott Hairston was 2 for 21 since returning from the disabled list until his solo homer in the fourth off rookie Tommy Hunter (0-1). Two innings later, Hairston had an RBI single for a 2-0 lead, then added a double after that to finish 3 for 4 and push his batting average to .310.

With six right-handers on the disabled list, including starters Jake Peavy and Chris Young, Gaudin led the Padres to their first series victory since taking two of three from Arizona on May

25-27. Gaudin threw 101 pitches in a game that started when it was 99 degrees. It was still in the mid-90s when he threw his last pitch to end the eighth and didn't come back out.

"It was a pretty special game," Black said. "But there were a number of factors: the heat, for one. ... Fourth time through the lineup. There'll come a time for Chad."

Plus, Bell hadn't pitched since Tuesday.

"I wanted the complete game, but I'm not upset," Gaudin said.

In his previous start Tuesday at Seattle, Gaudin tied a career high with 11 strikeouts and allowed two runs over seven innings. That victory gave up 17 runs over 14 innings while losing his first three June starts.

The Rangers were held scoreless for the fourth time this season, and had only one hit for the second time. Young also had the lone hit when Detroit one-hit them





I placed an ad in the newspaper, thanking everyone for their prayers and support. Should I have taken the time to send each one a personal thank-you card? — Widowed Mom

Dear Mom: Our condolences on your terrible loss. While the newspaper ad was a reasonable idea, rules of etiquette say that anyone who did a kindness for you, or sent flowers, money or handwritten condolence notes, should be thanked with a handwritten note of your own. (Cards with no personal message do not require an acknowledg-

You also can use pre-printed acknowledgment cards if you write a short personal note on them. If this is too overwhelming, ask a relative or friend to help write these notes on your behalf.

Dear Annie: I want to respond to "Sleepless in Salem, Ore.," whose husband has terrible sleep apnea and refuses to see a doctor. Five years ago, I shared a hotel room with my sister. She was awakened by my snoring and, while she was up, counted the seconds between breaths. The next day, she

told me I often went 40 seconds without breathing and then gasped for air.

When I returned home, I did a sleep study (insurance paid for it). I slept for two hours and then was given a CPAP machine and slept for another two hours. When it was over, the nurse showed me a computer chart. The first two hours looked like a Richter scale gone crazy with periodic flatlining. The doctor said I woke up 248 times and was a good

> candidate for a heart attack. On the CPAP machine, however, I was in deep sleep. It was the first time in years that I felt rested. Before the study, I often fell asleep driving home. Shame on you for telling her to give up by sleeping in another room and making sure his insurance is paid up. Hopefully, her husband will see this and realize he's risking his life and the lives of those

around him. — CPAP User Dear CPAP User: We hope he'll realize it, too, but he isn't as willing as you to get help, which is why we told our reader to take care of herself just in case. It has nothing to do with giving up. It's for her protection.





PARIS — France's anti-doping crusaders are stockpiling needles for testing blood and cups for sampling urine, and two new books on Lance Armstrong have just been released in

Must be about time for the Tour de France.

The seven-time Tour champion is back from retirement, four years after his last victory. Teammate Alberto Contador, the 2007 winner and a top pre-race favorite, returns after Astana wasn't allowed to compete last year.

They are allies, but could become rivals too.

The race starts July 4 with a challenging 9.6-mile prologue in Monaco, the tiny principality in southeast France. The pack will then head out along the Mediterranean, through the Pyrenees, across central France, into the Alps and then up the fabled Mont Ventoux a day before the July 26 finish in Paris.

Riders will dip into Spain, Switzerland and Italy during the 2,141-mile trek and face 20 major mountain climbs during the three weeks.

Tour designers have spiced up the route and revived some rules from the good old days in hopes that fans will have something — anything — to get their minds off the drug use that has marred cycling's premier event in recent years.

Judges from UCI, the sport's governing body, will be back, a year after they were kept out because of a bitter spat with Tour organizers over doping that has now been patched up.

The UCI has rolled out its "biological passport" anti-doping program, in which samples were taken from 840 professional riders to determine their body chemistry profiles. Any suspicious fluctuation from those levels could lead to penalties, even if no specific substance turns up in tests.

France's anti-doping agency, the AFLD, says it's going to target suspicious riders, rather than focus on random tests used in previous years, and will test for an unspecified new drug. The agency has also been authorized to freeze samples taken during the Tour. This allows them to be tested in the future for drugs that haven't yet been identified as performance en-

"We know there are some particular substances and methods, and we are going to try to detect them, sooner or later," said Pierre Bordry, head of the AFLD, which helped nab six cheats at last year's Tour.

"There are things that aren't found in blood, but I'm not going to give an example, because I've learned over

the years the people who advise athletes on doping adopt their programs based on drug-testers' mindsets," Bordry told The Associated Press in an interview on Thursday.

For Armstrong, who famously insisted he was the world's most-tested athlete during his glory years and has never tested positive, the welcome back to a still largely suspicious France may not be warm.

Just weeks before the Tour's start, two books — "La Grande Imposture" (the Great Impostor) by anti-doping doctor Jean-Pierre Mondenard and "Le Sale Tour" (The Dirty Tour) by Pierre Ballester and David Walsh have come out in France to capitalize on the media frenzy over the Texan's comeback.

Both books lay out repeated suspicions about Armstrong over the years, though neither breaks significant new ground. Doping allegations have already

depleted the field this year: Spain's Alejandro Valverde, the winner of the Dauphine Libere stage race and the top cyclist this year in the UCI rankings, has been forced to sit out because he is banned in Italy — which the Tour visits on July 21 — over doping allegations.

This Tour also offers some blasts from the past, including a team time trial in Stage 4 — the first since 2005. Injecting a taste of yesteryear from when riders didn't enjoy high-tech communication, Tour organizers have banned the use of earpiece radios in the 10th and 13th stages - a controversial move that will alter strategies by stripping riders of their coaches' advice during the stage.

Armstrong's longtime mentor and coach, Astana team manager Johan Bruyneel, hates the idea.

"On the radio ban in 2 stages of the TdF?" Bruyneel wrote Thursday on his Twitter page. "I absolutely disagree. What's the benefit of returning to the prehistory?"

But Bruyneel should be comforted by the team time trial, because his Astana squad has four of the world's best riders: Armstrong, Contador, Levi Leipheimer of the United States, and Germany's Andreas Kloeden.

Other innovations include an uphill finish at the moonscape-like Mont Ventoux in the next-to-last stage — an effort to dangle sporting suspense all the way up to the traditional cruise on Paris' Champs-Elysees for the finish.

Mont Ventoux's inclusion almost seems tailor-made for Armstrong, who has called it the toughest Tour climb "bar none" — and one he has never won at cycling's showpiece event.

With Valverde out, the smart money will be on Contador. He sat out last year because Astana was barred from racing because of a doping scandal in 2007. Other pre-race favorites include fellow Spaniard and 2008 Tour winner Carlos Sastre; Cadel Evans of Australia, runner-up both last year and in 2007; and Denis Menchov, a Russian who won the Italian Giro in May.

Other riders with outside shots include Leipheimer, Kloeden, Sastre's Saxo Bank teammate Frank Schleck and American Christian Vande Vel-

And even though he's consigned by Bruyneel to be a support rider for Contador at least from the start, Armstrong can never be counted out.

Missed chances hurt Oudin, a qualifier from Marietta, Ga. ranked 124th. She flubbed an easy volley to lose the first set, and she was up a break in the second

Oudin, making her

Wimbledon debut this year, pulled the biggest upset in the first week by beating former No. 1 Jelena Jankovic. Oudin was the youngest American to reach the women's fourth round Wimbledon since Jennifer Capriati was a quarterfinalist in 1993.

No. 4-seeded Elena Dementieva eliminated fellow Russian Elena Vesnina 6-1, 6-3. No. 8 Victoria Azarenka beat No. 10 Nadia Petrova 7-6 (5), 2-6, 6-3.

In men's play, No. 24 Tommy Haas never faced a break point and beat No. 29 Igor Andreev 7-6 (8), 6-4, 6-4.
