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Rangers investigating inmate's death

A Howard County Jail inmate who was rushed to the emergency room last week died Thursday at a local hospital, spurring local law enforcement officials to call in the Texas Rangers to investigate.

Roger Lee Edwards, 53, of

According to Howard County Sheriff Stan Parker, Edwards was found unresponsive in one of the jail's cell's at 3 a.m. Friday, July

"Edwards was in a pod area in the jail, along with several other inmates," said Parker. "The other inmates noticed he was having trouble breathing and notified the jail staff, who found him unresponsive. At that point they called for an ambulance.

"He was transported ambulance with CPR by progress Scenic in to Mountain Medical Center. were notified of his We death at approximately 3 p.m. Thursday afternoon. Justice of the Peace Kathryn Wiseman has ordered an autopsy and I've requested an outside investigation by the Texas Rangers, standard procedure in a death of this nature."

Parker said Edwards' body was transported to the

Like most taxing entities in Howard County, BSISD saw its certified tax valuations take a notable drop this year, from \$1.17 billion in 2008 to \$1.04 billion in the



Money woes mounting, doctor found in Jackson a chance for fame and a badly needed payday

LOS ANGELES (AP) – Dr. Conrad Murray needed a big payday when he became Michael Jackson's personal physician last spring.

The Las Vegas cardiologist owed at least \$780,000 for settlements against his business, outstanding mortgage payments on his house, delinquent student loans, child support and credit cards. And that doesn't include the \$68,000 the distributor of an energy drink says Murray, a one-time business associate, owes for skipping out on payments.

Court records chronicling Murray's woes in Las Vegas, where authorities searched his home this week as part of their manslaughter investigation into Jackson's death, help explain why — beyond basking in a celebrity's aura — Murray might have jumped at the \$150,000-a-month Jackson's promoter was prepared to pay him to keep the star healthy through a series of concerts in London.

Murray hooked on with Jackson in May, as his bleak financial picture threatened to worsen. He already was under court orders to pay more than \$363,000 for equipment for his heart clinic and \$71,000 in student loans dating to the 1980s, a judgment that hit in April. Two lawsuits claiming he owes \$240,000 more for unpaid equipment are pending in Nevada courts.

And Murray had appeared unable or unwilling to settle more modest debts — a nearly \$3,700 judgment for not paying child support and two recent credit card company claims totaling \$2,600.

White House trying to keep 'cash for clunkers' program alive amid funding concerns

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government's popular "cash for clunkers" program may be running out of money after only a matter of days as car shoppers flock to dealerships to take advantage of the rebates.

The White House said Thursday it was assessing its options amid concerns the \$1 billion budget for rebates for new car sales may have been depleted. The program officially began last week and has been heavily publicized by automakers and dealers.

Transportation Department officials called lawmakers earlier Thursday to alert them of plans to suspend the program as early as Friday. But a White House official said later the program had not been suspended and they were reviewing their options to keep the program funded.

White House press secretary Robert Gibbs said they were working to "assess the situation facing what is obviously an incredibly popular program. Auto dealers and consumers should have confidence that all valid CARS transactions that have taken place to date will be honored."

Dubbed the Car Allowance Rebate System, or CARS, the program offers owners of old cars and trucks \$3,500 or \$4,500 toward a new, more fuelefficient vehicle, in exchange for scrapping their old vehicle.

Congress last month approved the plan to boost auto sales and remove some inefficient cars and trucks from the roads.

medical examiner's office in Lubbock, with the autopsy expected to take place sometime today.

The cause of Edwards' death is still under investigation, according to Parker, but all indications are the inmate suffered a heart attack.

"It was definitely a medical condition that led to Mr. Edwards³ death," said Parker. "We've ruled out an attack by the other inmates or any other outside factors. My understanding is he was being treated for a heart attack, but we won't know for sure until the Rangers complete their investigation."

Parker said he doesn't expect any solid answers from the Rangers — who arrived in Big Spring Thursday night to begin their investigation until the autopsy results are finalized.

"Right now we're just waiting for the Rangers to complete investigation," their said Parker. "The jail staff acted accordingly in the situation, and I don't believe they did anything to contribute to Edwards' condition or death. They handled the situation just as they are trained to."

Funeral services for Edwards are being handled by Myers & Smith Funeral Home and Chapel.



She said, "Uncle Ronnie, have you heard about your nephew Doug's little boy?" I replied that I had not and asked her what was going on.

After a slight pause, Tina explained to me that Doug's little 3-year-old son had been riding on a tractor, brush hogging that evening with his grandpa Doug when he slipped off. His grandpa tried to grab him but could not.

Grandpa Doug could not get the tractor stopped in time to save little 3-year-old Trysen Douglas Crabtree.

I was without words. Tina also explained to me that the accident happened about two hours earlier, and my sisters and brothers were all at the hospital as we spoke.

I immediately called my sister at the hospital. My brotherin-law Jack answered. He explained to me that the family was OK, as well as could be expected, except for Grandpa Doug. Upon hanging up, I couldn't help but think of the horrific accident and what the family must be going through. I imagined the accident as if I were the grandpa. What Doug must be going through, I could only imagine. He must feel responsible for all this, and the rest of the family must be in such a shock.

I just sat there, staring, for about 10 minutes and then called my wife and children to notify them of the situation.

We never know when the time will come.

My wife always says that when it is time, it is time. But to think



The good ones – and most of them are $-\log$ service "off the clock," working into the night, and sometimes into the next day. There are deeds we don't hear about, usually because they don't tell us. Many prefer not to risk misunderstanding, charges of



I want to share a true account of utter compassion that occurred earlier this year. The parties, as well as the school, will remain nameless. If you happen to be a school employee, I extend congratulations. If folks close to you are, please support and thank them.

It was on a cold Friday afternoon last winter. The elementary school principal was churning through the final hours of a challenging week, looking forward to a dinner engagement.

The phone rang, and after a few words from the anxious fifthgrade girl placing the call, the administrator thought briefly of her contract, the last words of which pretty much say it all: "and certain other duties as may be assigned by the superintendent."

This call, though, resulted in discharging a sacred Christian obligation to help the hurting, whoever they are, wherever they are with whatever is most needed.

The youngster spoke through tears, phrases coming out in chunks. "My mom's awful sick," she said. "Would you be able to go by to see her? She's in hos pice."

Well aware of the youngster's "life story" and cognizant of what hospice care typically means, the administrator put the week's wind-up duties on hold. She knew that the youngster was being reared by a grandmother who had been granted custody several years ago. (The fifth-grader had learned just months earlier that the woman she thought to be her mom was, in fact, her grandmother.) And yes, the educator knew also that the cancer, diagnosed three years ago, was gaining the upper hand.

'Could you please come by after school?" the youngster begged.

Of course she could, and she would. The principal made calls to delay dinner, then hurriedly drove to the hospice facility in the city nearby.

When she arrived, the student was crying, standing vigil at her grandmother's bedside. Already unconscious, the precious patient, just 50 years of age, passed from this life within a minute of the principal's arrival.

The educator sat down, her arms engulfing a 10-year-old who perhaps was already wondering where she'd live next.

Yes, dinner — and a weekend "must do list" — seemed unimportant and far away. The student needed her desperately, and she was there.

A couple of days later, the educator drove to visitation at a funeral home in an adjoining county. The youngster ran to meet her, then proudly made introductions to family and friends gathered there. She wanted everyone to know her friend who happens also to be a school principal.

Multiply this vignette by several hundred thousand, maybe millions. Know that situations just like this, or closely akin thereto, will occur multiple times in the coming school year in communities across the land. School bells will be sounding soon, and the 2009-2010 school year will begin.

A slogan coined for the Association of Texas Professional Educators rings in my memory. It says much: "Supporting your freedom to teach." I'm sure the ATPE would be tickled beyond words if the public at large assumed the same stance. For many students, educators are their only advocate.

Make a genuine effort to thank someone at your school, extending warmest wishes for a great year. Better yet, thank several of them. Offer your prayers and support. Maybe you can compose a fresh bumper sticker to support educators. If you can't, the old, well-worn sticker will work fine: "If you can read this, thank a teacher.'

Remember, when students need them, for more reasons than can be listed, they'll be there


I am more than happy to let a medical doctor treat a physical problem with physical techniques. Yet asking a medical doctor or psychiatrist to cure



Weary from spotlight, Romo glad to be playing football

SAN ANTONIO - No Jessica Simpson, no Terrell Owens. Gee, how is Tony Romo going to get any attention now?

Oh, wait. He is still the starting quarterback of the Dallas Cowboys.

"There's always something new around the corner," Romo said Thursday.

Going into his fourth season on the job, Romo knows all about the spotlight that comes with it. He soaked up plenty of rewards for two seasons, but for the last nine months he's become a pinata, getting bashed for things real and perceived.

The downward spiral began in December with a 1-3 flop of a finish that kept the Cowboys out of the playoffs. The last game was a real stinker, a 44-6 loss in Philadelphia filled with the kind of sloppy mistakes coaches have been trying to get him to avoid for

vears.

Afterward, Romo said something about losing a football game not being the end of the world. The blogosphere and talk radio were all over him for that and they've hardly let up.

He was accused of masterminding T.O.'s release, paying more attention to golf than football, and getting out of shape. Even those who were glad he dumped Simpson took offense to how he did it (the day before her birthday


and not long after she bought him a \$100,000 boat), calling it further proof of his poor leadership skills. Or maybe it was another turnover under pressure.

Romo's new reputation was summed up pretty well at a training camp kickoff party Tuesday night.

More than 20,000 fans came and when Romo was announced, the majority gave him a nice ovation. But as the noise faded, another chorus began. Boos.

"It's just part of playing the position," Romo said. "As you get older, you start to realize that not everybody is going to like you. Not everybody is going to want to root for you.

"I wish we practiced yearround," he said. "Practice is a lot of fun. It's enjoyable. You get to compete. We're out here twice a day. I talked to (Troy) Aikman this summer and we were talking about that some of the funnest times you have is on the practice field, getting better."

Rangers' Holland two-hits Mariners, getting 7-1 win

Hanging over Derek Holland's locker is a cartoon drawing of his headshot he got from a fan with the inscription: "New Legend of Lefty."

How fitting after the latest outing by the Texas Rangers rookie.

Holland allowed only two hits and struck out 10 while getting within one out of his first complete game to lead the Rangers to a 7-1 victory over the Seattle Mariners on Thursday night.

"We got a real good look at what Derek Holland is capable of doing,' Rangers manager Ron Washington said. "His future gets brighter."

The 22-year-old Holland became the first Rangers rookie left-hander with 10 strikeouts, and the first Texas lefty since 1999 to reach that total.

Holland retired 24 of his first 25 batters, taking a one-hit shutout into the ninth before starting the final inning with his only walk.

The only hits he allowed were Jack Hannahan's broken-bat single with two outs in the fifth and Franklin Gutierrez's two-out single in the ninth on his 118th and final pitch.

When Gutierrez reached and Washington came out of the dugout, Holland started pleading his case to stay in the game. The manager had already made up his mind and, with a smile on his face, emphatically shook his head as he reached the mound.

"It was just me begging out there, Come on, let me get this one guy, I've

got it," Holland said. "Wash was funny," catcher Jarrod Saltalmacchia said. "He said, 'I know you want to finish this game. But to some shoddy defense.

even better is when you hear the crowd when you walk off this mound.' It was pretty special."

Holland left the mound to a loud ovation that "put chills in my spine." It came from the fans who just seconds earlier had booed Washington when he came out of the dugout.

"He'd taken us as far as we needed him to take us," Washington said.

Michael Young hit two of Texas' five home runs, three of them off starter Garrett Olson (3-5). Hank Blalock, Jarrod Saltalamacchia and Marlon Byrd also connected.

A night after the Rangers struck out 18 times against Detroit, they had 12 hits.

Next move for Rangers is within their farm system

any thought the Texas Rangers wouldn't be buyers or sellers as the MLB trade deadline approaches, but apparently they're considering mak-

ing a move to further bolster their pitching rotation.

A scout for the Arizona Diamondbacks was in attendance at the Rangers' 7-3 win over the Detroit Tigers Tuesday, insinuating that the D-Backs were checking out a player or two

for a potential player swap. The Rangers have inquired about veteran pitchers Doug Davis and Jon Garland. Davis is more of a power pitcher, while Garland is a hit-the-target type.

Davis was originally drafted by the Rangers, but never produced much with the club. As soon as he went to a new ballpark in Milwaukee, he posted impressive numbers. That makes one suspicious to Davis' ability to produce at The Ballpark.

Davis has a 3.76 ERA this season with 100 Ks in 120plus innings. The lefty holds a 5-10 record on a poor Arizona club.

Garland was a key piece on the Chicago White Sox, when they won a World Series in 2005. He won 18 games in

2005 and 2006. Garland is 5-10 this season with a 4.42 ERA. The right-hander won't strikeout many batters, either, recording just 57 in 128 innings.

Are either one of these guys really what the Rangers need?

A couple weeks ago, I was all for the Rangers getting in on the Roy Halladay sweepstakes.

However, the more I thought about it, the less I liked the idea. The Rangers have one of the best farm systems in the majors. The price on Halladay was much too high and would have cost them top prospects Neftali Feliz and Justin Smoak.

Smoak should be able to play in the majors in two or three seasons. Feliz will bemoved up by September and might be a guy the Rangers try to move into the back of the rotation.

The Rangers have three spots in the rotation set. Kevin Millwood is the ace. Scott Feldman — ignore Wednesday night's shelling — has been a solid No. 2. Tommy Hunter has been a great find and fits as a No. 4 or No. 5 starter.

The other two spots are a bit more in limbo. Vincente Padilla can be the Rangers' most dominating pitcher, but is inconsistent. Once he kicks the swine flu, Padilla is the Rangers' No. 3 starter. As for No. 5, Dustin Nippert has earned a shot with his recent performances in spot starts.

He should be rewarded with the final spot in therotation.

This isn't happening, though. Instead the Rangers are throwing Derrick Holland back onto the mound, which is a move that worked out Thursday night as Holland pitched a gem in a 7-1 win over the Mariners. It was by far his best performance of the season as he went into the game with an ERA over 6.

Bringing in Davis or Garland would put either one of them as the No. 3 guy in the rotation with Nippert and Holland likely moving back to middle relief. Does this really make the Rangers stronger, though? Is it the move that will propel them past the Angels?

I don't think it is. While adding Davis could be nice — I'd prefer him over Garland it's not a move that makes anyone think the Rangers are automatically going to sweep past the Angels and win the AL West.

In other words, it's not worth sacrificing any part of what looks to be a bright future. For the first time in several years, there's light at the end of the dark tunnel of futility the Rangers have been stuck in for nearly a decade.

Despite a slew of injuries and a bout of swine flu, the Rangers are in the hunt for an AL West title. They're just 3.5 games behind the Angels and 1.5 back of the Red Sox for the AL Wild Card.

The team is starting to get healthier and the offense, which has ironically been the Rangers' major flaw this season, is starting to produce more runs.

The answer for the Rangers this season, or next, isn't going to be found in another organization. The Rangers have the pieces around them. They have to simply put it all together. If Texas was going to trade for anything, it should be a true lead off hitter. Ian Kinsler seems to be swinging for the fences every time he's up at the plate and that's an issue. Elvis Andrus has the ability to develop into a solid lead off guy, but he's not there yet. Plus, Andrus' recent ability to get on base in the bottom of the order has set the stage for the top part of the lineup to drive him in.

Maybe the answer to the Rangers' problem of not getting on base could be addressed by playing Omar Vizquel more and moving Kinsler to a DH role, while the legendary Vizquel plays second. Vizquel is batting .281 in spot duty and has a .340 on-base percentage. His average is nearly 40 points better than Kinsler's and he's 30 points better at getting on base.

This would move Kinsler to the five or six hole in the lineup — a much better position for him with the way he's hitting this season (high power, low average). It does take a power bat out of the

lineup as one of the Rangers' big OF bats (Andruw Jones, Josh Hamilton, Marlon Byrd, Nelson Cruz or David Murphy) will be left out of the lineup. Already, one of those guys aren't getting on the field in each game. Moving Vizquel into the lineup removes a second slugger.

There aren't a lack of home runs coming from the Rangers' lineup.

They've hit 148 this season, which is second in the majors behind only the Yankees (151). The problem is the Rangers are 26th out of 30 teams in on-base percentage, causing a majority of the Rangers' homers to be of the solo variety. They lead the majors in strikeouts with 804.

While there is a bit of mystic to making a trade and adding a bigger name, it's obviously not the pitching staff the Rangers need to address.

Unfortunately, there's also not a good lead off hitter available on the market.

The answer is within and the next great move manager Ron Washington can make is to convince GM Jon Daniels and President Nolan Ryan that this is true. Then, Washington has to realize a sacrifice in power might be the one thing the Rangers need to produce and fly by the Angels.

DENVER (AP) - A sharply divided federal appeals court has refused to reconsider a decision that a Ten Commandments monument on the lawn of the Haskell County courthouse is unconstitutional.

On a 6-6 vote the judges let stand an earlier ruling that the monument endorses religion.

County commissioners had asked the full court to rehear the case. The June decision was

written by 10th Circuit Judge Jerome Holmes.

1. You are sure to make the slam if the opposing clubs are divided 3-2, so all your thoughts should be centered on how to cope with a 4-1 or 5-0 club division.

By far the best approach, after winning the spade lead with the ace, is to play as many trumps as necessary until the opponents have exactly one trump remaining. You deliberately do not draw this last trump, but instead next play the ace of hearts and A-K of clubs.

If both opponents follow to both clubs, you draw the missing trump and concede a club trick. If the clubs divide 4-1 or 5-0 and the ace or king of clubs gets trumped, you score the

rest of the tricks because the player who ruffs is forced to return a spade or a heart to dummy. If the clubs divide 4-1 or 5-0 and

the A-K are not ruffed, you next lead your deuce of trumps, hoping that the player who wins with the missing trump will be forced to return a spade or a ĥeart.

2. Let's say you win the spade queen with the king and try a club finesse. If it loses, South will return a spade, and if North started with five spades to the A-10, you go down one.

Alternatively, you could win the spade lead, cross to the king of hearts and take a heart finesse through South. If this lost, you'd still be in trouble because you'd have only eight sure tricks. You could then try a club finesse, but again would go down if it lost.

The safest line of play is to let South win the first trick! This assures the contract whether North has four or five spades. Let's say South returns a spade at trick two. When you play the jack, North may or may not take his ace, but the contract is safe either way.

Assume he ducks. You next try the club finesse, confident that if it loses South cannot harm you. If he has a spade to play, it means North started with only four of them, and you finish with nine tricks. If South has no more spades, you also have at least nine tricks.
