City OKs bid for pro shop at municipal golf course

Facility should be open in March, city officials say

Golf clubs won't be the only thing being swung at Comanche Trail Golf Course. Hammers will join the fray as construction of a new pro shop begins soon. Big Spring City Council awarded

the bid to build a pro shop to Lubbock contractor Craig Wallace Construction Tuesday night, ending a long and arduous process to stay within budget.

"We opened bids on the project last Wednesday, and we had two bidders," said Assistant City Manager Todd Darden. "We had about eight plan holders at the time of

Thousands getting flu vaccinations

More than 3,000 area residents have received flu vaccinations so far and more are anticipated, health officials said.

Seasonal flu vaccinations have been avail-

able from healthcare providers since earlier this month and doses of the H1N1 flu vaccine should be available by the end of the month. Stephanie Ferguson, team

Council approves anti-vandal fund

Vandals beware, as the Big Spring City Council approved a new fund Tuesday night city officials hope will help crack down on destruction of public "After the last act of vandal-

ism where our playground at Birdwell Park was set on fire, the council agreed to form a committee to look at the vandalism problem and find a



way to put a halt to it," said City Manager Gary Fuqua. "At that time we looked at offering rewards. As most of you know, we offered a reward after the fire at Comanche Trail Park's Kid's Zone.

"What we're looking at doing is a multi-tiered program set up with a pool of money, \$10,000 at this point. We would work with Crimestoppers. They have a point system they use when they look at a crime and have to determine how much reward money to award. We're looking at matching their reward system, and in some instances when it's a high profile case

Physicians at Scenic Mountain Medical Center and Malone-Hogan Clinic also have vaccinations available, spokesperson said.

Ferguson said there are common-sense steps people can take to lower their risk of infection, including regular washing of hands, covering one's nose with a tissue when sneezing and avoiding persons who are sick with

Dr. Scott W. Barclay, a local

physician who specializes in family medicine, seconded Ferguson's comments.

"The best way to avoid a cold or flu is to minimize your risks of illness," Barclay said in a statement. "The numberone tactic to protect yourself and your family from the flu is to get both the seasonal and H1N1 vaccinations."

If you contract the flu, treatment is basically the same, regardless of strain. Ferguson and Barclay both urge people to visit their healthcare provider, as well as taking such

time-honored steps as getting plenty of rest and drinking lots of water or juice.

"For mild cases of influenza, plenty of rest, liquids and over-the-counter medicines will help ease symptoms," Barclay stated. "Overthe-counter cold and flu medications may help lessen symptoms like a cough and congestion, but these medications will not reduce your likelihood of spreading the

Vaccinations against H1N1 (commonly called swine flu) are scheduled to arrive locally later this month. Ferguson said those doses would be dispensed according to guidelines established by the Centers for Disease Control.

Having already put the project out for bids twice — the first time using a construction manager at risk — McEwen said finally having the pro shop ready to move forward is a huge relief for him and the rest of the council.

"Relief. Absolute relief," said McEwen with a laugh. "There was a great attempt by those of us with the city to

Original talks with contractors had council members hopeful the new pro shop would be ready for the reopening of the course, which underwent major renovations

what the city had budgeted, according to McEwen.

"When we originally talked to the architect, he said there was a possibility to get everything done and be in the pro shop when the golf course reopened in April 2008," said McEwen. "However, we didn't even have drawings in April 2008. There was a great deal of frustration and went through two bid processes before we decided to go ahead and take open bids. Fortunately we have something done.

"It's like anything in life, we're going to look back on it and say, 'Wasn't it interesting, those two years when we didn't have a clubhouse?' However, when you're in the middle of it, it's a real pain. And we realize how inadequate the facilities are right now. We have a portable building right now, which isn't fair to the golfers or the golf course itself. I'm really confident when this project is completed and people see it completed, they are going to be impressed."

or there is a lot of damage involved — actually increasing the reward with the permission of the council."

Both the Birdwell Park and Kid's Zone have been attacked by arsonists, in addition to graffiti and other damages at city and other public facilities. And while reward money will be a big part of the program, Fuqua said the city won't stop there.

"We're also looking at installing video cameras," said Fuqua. "We have it in the budget this year to purchase some additional video cameras. The CVB (Conventions and Visitors Bureau) board is also looking at sponsoring some cameras for us. One thing the committee wanted to make sure of is the cameras we buy are the right cameras for the job. You can get cheaper cameras, but the problem — especially at night — is without the proper lenses you can't identify the people or vehicles involved. We also looked at the areas involved and found out some of the areas need not only the static cam-

eras, but the cameras that can pan and cover a wide area.

"Our two chiefs — the fire chief and the police chief — got together and recorded a public service DVD that will be running on Channel 17 to address vandalism and litter, and how they effect our city. It also talks about what citizens can do to prevent them, and it will also be airing information for Crimestoppers. We're also looking at placing signs in strategic areas so people know they are under surveillance by the cameras, and having the Crimestoppers phone number placed on them so people can call it in when they see something happening."

The funds won't just be used to protect city facilities, according to Fuqua, who said the committee encouraged the council to look at a wider range than just municipal property.

"The committee recommended we use this fund ... for any public property," said Fuqua. "That means if the school is vandalized, county property, college district property, then we'll go into motion with the reward fund. Vandalism effects

all of us. I also want to point out this is just a starting point. We're going to continue to build on the program. One of the key items we're going to be working on is getting this information through the school districts and trying to get our young people more involved."

Mayor Russ McEwen said it's fairly easy to rationalize some criminal activity, but vandalizing property — especially property designed for the city's youth — is well beyond his realm of comprehension.

"It's very frustrating because there's a lot of crimes you can almost understand. You can almost understand theft or something like that because there's a purpose to it. Wanton just drives me nuts," said McEwen. "There's no end in it whatsoever. No one gets any money

or property out of it. And on top of it, to destroy property designated for kids, I just can't understand it. The mentality is really a strange thing, and in talking with some of the people who have been apprehended for this, there's this mentality or attitude of, 'What are you upset about? What's the big deal?' And it's kind of hard to believe.'

McEwen said he's unsure how much of an impact the fund will have, but it's better than sitting around and doing nothing.

"This is one of those imponderable things. This is our attempt to do everything we can to try to control this problem, but you just don't know how effective it will be," said McEwen. What sort of effect will it have? I hope it has a great effect, and I anticipate it will leave a mark on it, the cameras more

than the rewards. All of a sudden people are going to look around and realize they could get caught, and that's the key to this. We put up large rewards for Kid's Zone, but unfortunately that's money we weren't able to spend. I wish we had, and it was big dollars. However, we live in different times."

The Howard County Bible Class Fund has set this year's goal at \$40,000. That money will support three classes at BSHS, two classes at Forsan High School and one class at Coahoma High

State to get 500,000 flu doses

AÚSTIN (AP) — Texas has been allocated more than 500,000 doses of the vaccine used to fight swine flu.

The Texas Department of State Health Services says the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention is providing 506,200 doses of the H1N1 vaccine, as an initial two-week supply.

The state agency says Texas expects to receive 15 million doses of the vaccine by the end of January.

DSHS is providing the mist form to some registered providers to vaccinate children ages 2 and 3. The shot form will be offered to some registered providers to vaccinate pregnant women, children who are 4, and children ages 4 through 18 who are at

higher risk.
DSHS, in a statement
Tuesday, said some
12,000 Texas providers have registered to
receive the vaccine.

Dallas millionaire sentenced in child porn case

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — A Dallas millionaire has been sentenced to 30 months in prison for attempting to possess Internet child pornography.

Sixty-three-year-old Ronald E. Elmquist was sentenced Tuesday in federal court in Kansas City.

Elmquist previously was chief executive officer of QualServ Corp. in North Kansas City. He also was on the boards of directors of the Winn-Dixie and RadioShack corporations.

U.S. District Judge Ortrie Smith also ordered that must serve a year of home confinement after his release, perform at least 120 hours of community service each month for three years and pay a \$150,000 fine.

Prosecutors estimated Elmquist's net worth at more than \$13 million.

Taft city manager fired

TAFT (AP) — The Taft City Council has voted to fire embattled city manager Florencio Sauceda.

The Corpus Christi Caller Times reports the city council's 3-2 vote came Tuesday night.

Sauceda, who had no comment after the vote, drew attention in August when he was formally reprimanded by the council for giving permission for a rap video shoot.

Critics said the video, which included rappers referring to drugs and flashing hand signals, portrayed a negative image of Taft. Sauceda said he thought the video showed cultural diversity.

Sauceda has been on paid administrative leave since Sept. 9, as Texas Rangers investigate the city's operations.

Taft is a town of about 3,400, located 15 miles north of Corpus Christi.

Texas heavy industries worry about crackdown

DALLAS (AP) — For 15 years, environmentalists have complained that state regulations have allowed the powerful oil and chemical industries to skirt Clean Air Act standards in Texas, the nation's foremost producer of industrial air pollution.

Butthe Environmental Protection Agency last month scrapped several aspects of the state's air-pollution permitting program, including "flexible" permits that have allowed about 140 plants and refineries to exceed toxic emissions limits in the short term as long as they complied to overall federal averages in the long term.

Federal regulators say the move, set to take effect next year, is designed to cut toxic emissions and bring Texas in line with the Clean Air Act. And environmental groups say it will help improve the state's ecology and the health of Texans and those living nearby.

Industry groups, however, warn that getting rid of the state program in favor of more rigid standards will hurt industries crucial to the Texas economy, and that the costs of compliance may hit consum-

"If there is a cost associated with it, it is very

likely that it could cost the consumer more," said Debbie Hastings, vice president for environmental affairs for the Texas Oil And Gas Association, whose provide members about 25 percent of the nation's gasoline supply and include industry giants including Exxon Mobil Corp. and ConocoPhillips.

It's too early to know precisely how the rules will change or how much it will cost, but there's worry in the heavy industries that billow tons of toxins but employ thousands of people and pay billions in state and local taxes. Texas has more oil refineries and chemical plants than any other state, and the permit ruling comes as Gov. Rick Perry and industry officials are railing against a climate bill pending in Congress.

Son arrested, charged with beating mother

JOSHUA (AP) — A 51-year-old woman remained in critical condition Tuesday at a Fort Worth hospital after authorities say her teenage son attacked her with a baseball bat.

Donna Martin Trout suffered severe injuries to her head, hands and arms in an attack Monday and was being treated at John Peter Smith Hospital in Fort Worth.

Her 17-year-old son, Connor Lynn Trout, was in the Johnson County Jail on Tuesday on first-degree felony charges of aggravated assault of a family member with a weapon. His bond was set at \$150,000 and he doesn't yet have an attorney.

Fort Worth police arrested the teen Monday about an hour after the attack when he was in a wreck and attempted to flee the scene, Johnson County Sheriff's office spokesman Lt. Tim Jones said.

The Johnson County Sheriff's Department has arrested Trout twice before, once for theft and another for assault by contact, Jones said.

Former Beaumont OB-GYN pleads guilty to fraud

BEAUMONT (AP) — A 46-year-old doctor who formerly practiced in Beaumont has pleaded guilty to stealing \$76,683 in a scheme in which he billed the state's Medicaid program for hundreds of unperformed tests.

Darryl Clarence Harris, of Los Angeles, CA., faces up to 10 years in federal prison following his guilty plea Tuesday to health care fraud. The OB-GYN's Beaumont practice was enrolled as a Texas Medicaid provider.

Federal prosecutors say he billed Medicaid for ultrasounds and microbial identification tests that his office wasn't capable of performing.

Prosecutors say the scheme lasted from March 2005 to November of that year.

A sentencing date hasn't been set.

Hutchison leaves Senate resignation date up in the air

AUSTIN (AP) — U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison said Tuesday some people are suggesting that she remain in the Senate as she challenges fellow Republican Rick Perry for governor, instead of resigning this fall as she said would.

Hutchison said on Dallas-Fort Worth radio station WBAP that she's not sure whether she will resign from the Senate before the end of the year or even before the GOP primary in March, when she faces Perry, who is seeking a third full term. She said she wants to remain there long enough to fight President Barack Obama's health care

proposal.

"I want to stay and fight with every bone in my body against the government takeover of health care," she said.

In July, Hutchison said she would leave the Senate in the "time frame" of October or November. She has never given a specific date.

Perry spokesman Mark Miner said Hutchison is putting her own political interests ahead of Texas by continuing to waffle on whether she will resign. "Nobody really knows

what the senator is trying to communicate, including her own campaign," Miner said in a prepared statement, pointing out Hutchison's statements since the summer about her resignation.

"I haven't been able to set that deadline," HutchisonsaidTuesday, adding that she knows potential candidates who want to succeed her in the Senate are watching closely, but that she feels the health care debate is important. "I don't feel that I have a choice," she said on KRLD radio in Dallas.

Asked if she would remain in the Senate until early 2010, Hutchison said she couldn't say. Asked whether she might not step down at all before the primary, she said, "A lot of people are suggesting that."

Hutchison spokeswoman Jennifer Baker said the senator has consistently said she intends to fight the Democrats' health care plan in the Senate.



Senate leaders to come up with new version of bill

WASHINGTON (AP) - Health care talks slip back behind closed doors Wednesday as Senate leaders start trying to merge two very different bills into a new version that can get the 60 votes needed to guarantee its passage.

All eyes are on Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid of Nevada, who has said he wants to complete the wedding quickly and get historic

health care overhaul legislation onto the floor the week after next.

Both bills were written by Democrats, but that's not going to make it easier for Reid. They share a common goal, which is to provide all Americans with access to affordable health insurance, but they differ on how to accomplish it.

The Finance Committee bill that was approved Tuesday has no governmentsponsored insurance plan and no requirement on employers that they must offer coverage. It relies instead on a requirement that all Americans obtain insurance.

The Senate Health, Education, Labor and Pensions Committee bill, passed earlier by a panel in which liberals predominate, calls for both a government

plan to compete with private insurers and a mandate that employers help cover their workers. Those are only two of dozens of differences.

House panel to begin push on financial overhaul

WASHINGTON (AP) - Small neighborhood banks and the U.S. Chamber of Commerce are overshadowing the nation's biggest banks in influencing lawmakers as Congress begins the initial phase of its long-awaited overhaul of how the government regulates financial companies.

The House Financial Services Committee on Wednesday is taking up key elements of President Barack Obama's proposal for correcting the practices of banks, investment houses and other financial institutions that caused last year's economic collapse.

Up first is a measure that for the first time would regulate privately sold derivatives like credit default swaps, the complex contracts brought down Wall Street banking house Lehman Brothers Holdings Inc. and nearly toppled insurance giant American International Group Inc.

The committee also wants to establish a Consumer Financial Protection Agency to police mortgages, credit cards and other consumer products offered by banks and other financial institutions.

Bankers Republicans generally oppose the new agency, but community banks and the Chamber of Commerce have wielded the most influence in getting the House panel's Democrats to modify and clarify the regulatory powers that Obama would give it.

U.S. commander: **Corruption might** prevent victory

WASHINGTON (AP) The top military commander in Afghanistan is asking for up to 80,000 more American troops even as he warns that rampant government corruption there may prevent victory against the Taliban and al-Qaida, according to U.S. officials briefed on his conclusions.

A still-secret document by Army Gen. Stanley McChrystal that requests more troops is expected to be among the topics discussed Wednesday when President Barack Obama meets with his national security team to hash out a strategy for Afghanistan and Pakistan.

Even with additional troops, McChrystal concluded that corruption still could let terrorists turn Afghanistan back into a haven, according to officials at the Pentagon and White

His request outlines three options for additional troops — from as many as 80,000 to as few as 10,000 — but favors a compromise of 40,000 more forces, the offi-testimony in March

Barofsky: Treasury didn't understand AIG's pay structure

WASHINGTON (AP) - The pitched drama over bonuses for bailedout executives will be revived on Capitol Hill Wednesday as a government watchdog explains how some executives nearly brought down the financial system then pocketed millions.

Neil Barofsky, the special inspector general for the \$700 billion financial rescue program, will answer questions about a new report outlining the official missteps that led to massive bonus payments for executives at insurer American International Group Inc.

In a report released Tuesday, Barofsky wrote that the Treasury Department did not understand AIG's byzantine pay structures when it gave the firm billions in aid last fall. The government has committed a total of more than \$180 billion to wind down the New York-based insurance and financial services conglomerate, and now owns about 80 percent of the company.

AIG's bonuses sparked a political firestorm earlier this year when it was revealed that the government could not legally stop AIG from paying millions bonuses even after taking billions in bailout

Some were new couples in unions arranged by the church; others were renewing their





This gave him two chances for an extra heart trick: one if West had the queen, and another if the suit was divided 3-3. But East took the jack of

hearts with the queen and returned a heart. When South next played the

A-K, he learned the hearts were 4-2. **Declarer now tried** a low club to the queen, hoping West had the king. But East took the queen with the king and returned the jack of clubs to South's ace.

South's ace.

The situation took a further turn for the worse when declarer next led a diamond to the queen, hoping West had led originally from a three-card suit. But East showed out, and South decided that his last remaining

chance was to try a spade finesse.

So he led a spade to the king and finessed the jack on the return. East won with the queen and cashed his remaining clubs to put the contract down two. All of which indicates that bad luck comes in bunches, though it's true of course that South could have made the contract easily had he known the queen of hearts was doubleton.

One reasonable but somewhat unusual method of play — without the benefit of a peek at the East-West cards — is to allow East's ten of diamonds to hold the first trick! Assuming West made a normal lead from a four-card suit, East would then be forced to return a spade, a heart or a club, all of which would hand declarer his ninth trick.

HOUSTON — The Houston Cougars knocked off their third BCS conference opponent this past weekend to move back into the AP Poll at No. 23.

Now they're back to Conference USA play, looking for their first league win against Tulane after shaking off that embarrassing conference-opening loss at UTEP.

The Cougars may have moved on from that defeat, but they certainly haven't forgotten it. The 58-41 upset by the Miners dropped No. 12 Houston out of the poll altogether.

"I heard someone say that we're tied for first in the SEC and Big 12 South, but tied for last place in C-USA," quarterback Case Keenum said. "None of that matters, what we've done in non-conference. Those wins were good, but that shows how much they mean."

Coach Kevin Sumlin is happy with the mindset of his players and knows they're not content with what they've accomplished so far.

"I like our edge," he said. "Just talking to the guys, our team feels that we still have a lot to prove. As long as we continue with that attitude, our preparation will continue to be good."

Houston is the first C-USA team to beat three BCS conference teams since Louisville did it in 2003 and the first non-BCS team to do it this season. The Cougars know getting back on track in league play is key to their goal of winning the West division of C-USA.

"This is the biggest game of the season right now," receiver Tyron

Bradford, Colt friends despite UT/OU rivalry

NORMAN, Okla. — When Heisman Trophy winner Sam Bradford injured his shoulder last month, one of the first people he heard from was Colt McCoy.

And, no, the Texas quarterback wasn't trying to tease his Oklahoma counter-

McCoy sent a get-well text message to Bradford the night of Sept. 5 and now says he's happy the Sooners' All-American is healthy again — just in time to make things more difficult for the third-ranked Longhorns (5-0, 2-0 Big 12) on Saturday in the latest installment of the Red River Rivalry.

"I think that probably from a fan's perspective and people outside of the game think that it's crazy that I could be friends with Sam or that Sam could be friends with me, but we are and he's a great guy," said McCoy, who finished second to Bradford in last year's Heisman balloting. "We've got a lot in common. But we both understand this is a huge game.

'We're going to go out there and play the best we can. We know what we have to do to go out there and win. Our friendship is one thing but this game is

It's not like Bradford and McCoy don't understand what's at stake when the No. 20 Sooners (3-2, 1-0) and Longhorns meet halfway at the Cotton Bowl in Dallas. The two have split their two head-to-head meetings so far, and it was only by virtue of a tiebreaker that Bradford's Sooners got to play for the Big 12 and national titles last season instead of McCoy's Longhorns.

Both players grew up around this rivalry, which has escalated over the past decade as its impact on the national championship race has grown.

But, to the chagrin of some die-hard fans and even teammates, the Bradford and McCoy friendship doesn't quite mesh with the Hatfield and McCoy nature of the rivalry.

"Colt's a great guy and I think him sending me a text message after I got hurt, telling me that he was praying for me, to stay with it and keep my head up, that just says a lot about the type of guy he is," Bradford said. "I think a lot of people see us going to rival schools, you know, and probably wouldn't have done that.

"For him to do something like that and to keep encouraging me, it just says a lot about who he is.'

The opposing quarterbacks got to know each other through the college awards circuit last season, with

Bryant: "I just panicked because I was scared"

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) Oklahoma State receiver Dez Bryant claims he was worried he had done something wrong when he "panicked" and lied to the NCAA about a meeting with former NFL player Deion Sanders at a Texas athletics

In his written apology to the NCAA, obtained Tuesday by The Associated Press following an open records request, Bryant said that he is "very, very sorry" and "made a terrible mistake" when he lied to Marcus M. Wilson, the NCAA's assistant director of agent, gambling and amateurism activities, in July.

"It was all me, there is no one else to blame," Bryant writes in his two-page apology. "I just panicked because I was scared and afraid that I was in some kind of trouble."

The All-American was declared ineligible by Oklahoma State last week and was expected to go through a follow-up interview with the NCAA on Tuesday on Indianapolis.

"I was scared because I was thinking, why would the NCAA talk to me unless they thought I had done something wrong, even though I did not think I had," Bryant writes in his letter. "I worried about the interview and was really nervous during the interview

"I kept thinking about how football has been my dream for years and how football was going to allow the chance to make a living and help my family. My mom, my son, brother and sister all depend on me and I felt that somehow I had let them down."

Bryant's apology accompanies Oklahoma State's formal reinstatement request to the NCAA, in which associate athletic director for compliance Scott Williams asks the NCAA to consider "unique circumstances" and hand down a lighter punishment for Bryant. Williams notes that "the threshold

penalty for a violation of this nature is 50 percent withholding," apparently referring to a standard punishment that Bryant would be forced to miss half of the No. 15 Cowboys' games for his rules violation.

Bryant writes that he denied to Wilson that he had met with Sanders at a Frisco facility named Fieldhouse USA when that "was not the truth." He describes that he met with Sanders and the two "jogged up and down the field, but did not go through any drills, and he did not work me out."

"When I was asked by Mr. Wilson about a work-out, I did not think that what I had done with Deion was a work-out," Bryant writes. "I did not break a sweat when I jogged with Deion. When my coaches have worked me out, like (strength) coach (Rob) Glass at OSU, I do many sprints, stairs and a lot of other drills, which leave me sweaty and tired.

"What I did with Deion was nothing Williams suggests that the NCAA

did not eat." Bryant asks that the NCAA reinstate him before the end of this season. Oklahoma State has played five of its 12 regular-season games, but

Bryant has been held out of the last

two because of the eligibility issues. "I am sorry that Mr. Wilson had to spend so much time on my case, and am also sorry that I have let my family, my teammates, my coaches, my OSU fans and the NCAA down," Bryant writes. "I really love OSU and would like to have an opportunity to finish the season with OSU. ... I know I should be punished, I deserve it, but I hope that my punishment is not so bad that I do not get to play football again at OSU."

The documents also offer a clearer picture of the timeframe of the investigation.

Although earlier documents suggested Wilson was suspicious of Bryant — asking "Why does his story keep changing?" - even before the season started, OSU's reinstatement request shows that the NCAA didn't discover Bryant had lied until a Sept. 24 interview with Sanders.

Bryant was held out of Oklahoma State's game two days later against Grambling State and also didn't play last week at Texas A&M.

"I, myself, couldn't even consider voting for him," Irsay said at the fall owners meetings. "When there are comments that have been made that are inappropriate, incendiary and insensitive ... our words do damage, and it's something that we don't need."

Irsay is the first owner who has stated unequivocally he would reject Limbaugh because he made a habit of "demonizing individuals."

"I met Rush only once. He seemed like a nice guy to me and all those kind of things," Irsay said. "It's bigger than the NFL. As a nation, and as a world, we've got to watch our words and our thoughts. They can do dam-

In 2003, the conservative broadcast personality was forced to resign from ESPN's Sunday night football programming after saying Philadelphia's Donovan McNabb: "I think what we've had here is a little social concern in the NFL. The media has been very desirous that a black quarterback do well."


Columbia, at age 50. In 1960, the idea of a Peace Corps was first suggested by Democratic presidential candidate John F. Kennedy to an audience of students at the






player in college football," Sooners


