Naturally my opinion won't carry much weight but personally I think that censure is a very mild form of punishment for Senator Joe, rather I think he should be kicked out of the Senate and the chambers be fumigated until congress convenes in January.

### Six-Zone Division Proposed

## City to Be Zoned Off to Assure More Uniform Growth In Future

If you see a group of workers peeping through small transits (surveyor instruments) in Dimmitt this week, don't be alarmed. It's just a sign the town is growing up.

These workers are getting correct measurements in order that the town may be zoned off for future growth purposes. A proposed zoning plan has been drawn up by the city zoning commission and recommended to the city commission. Final approval, however, won't be given until a public hearing is held probably in late November.

The city proper, according to City Manager E. B. Noble, has been divided into six zones on a map prepared by the zoning commission. These zones will be called one-family unit zone, two-family unit zone, multi-family unit zone, Commercial and retail business zone, and heavy industry zone. Each zone will be restricted to the type construction that the name implies. In the commercial and retail business zone, construction will be restricted to masonry building while the other portion will include masonry or steel construction. This particular zone will also be labeled as a fire zone.

A zoning map will be published in the News within the next two weeks and the various zones and their locations will be listed for the benefit of the readers.

According to Noble the town is being zoned off to prevent fire hazards, lower insurance rates and assure a more uniform plan of growth in both commercial and residential areas. This move reportedly has been in the planning stage for sometime and is already in effect in many other towns this size and larger.

Another plan that will go into effect here soon is parallel parking on highways leading into Dimmitt. This move is being made to enable a smooth flow of traffic on east-west and north-south highways leading into the city and in order that these routes may be maintained as four-lane drives. The highway department is instituting this program and it will not apply to other areas of town.

Discussions on soil and soil fertility will be led by Dr. William O. Trogon, agronomist and soil scientist for Mathison Chemical Company, when he speaks before farmers and businessmen at the Legion Hut Thursday night, Nov. 18. The program will start at 8 o'clock.

Dr. Trogon will also show educational slides and movies in connection with the discussions. Planners of the Thursday night program point out that maintaining soils and soil fertility is one of the major problems facing farmers of this area and that the meeting will undoubtedly be worth while to all taking time to attend.

Dr. Trogon, formerly of Midwestern University at Wichita Falls, is acclaimed as one of the best in his line of work and those who have heard him have been impressed with his knowledge of soils and their fertility.

Dr. Trogon's appearance here is made possible by Castro County Grain Company, sponsors of the meeting. Everyone interested in soil fertility is invited to attend.

Hart Man Hurt in Accident Monday

Bob Cranford, manager of Panhandle Compress Warehouse at Hart, suffered a broken leg Monday morning when a bale of cotton fell on him in the warehouse yard, according to a report to the News this week.

Cranford was taken to the Methodist Hospital in Lubbock where he was treated for a broken leg just above the ankle. He was reported Tuesday as convalescing nicely after having the leg set and braced.

Some cotton was being unloaded from a truck when the accident occurred. A bale bounced as it was being unloaded and pined Cranford's leg to the ground resulting in the injury.

These pictures, taken Saturday at various local elevators, show thousands of dollars of grain that will be shipped to other areas as soon as possible. A total of 789 carloads have been shipped to such places as Lubbock, Houston, Galveston and Brownwood, since Oct. 1 and approximately 40 carloads a day are being shipped out now. The county harvest, forecast at ten million bushels, is about 95 percent complete. The average per acre yield is 3,500 pounds or between 65 and 70 bushels to an acre. This reportedly is the best yield ever realized in the county.

The county cotton harvest is about 45 percent complete as total ginnings this week came to 18,659 bales. Approximately 40,000 bales are forecast for the county.
