Mavs beat Spurs; Texas playoff rematch set

DALLAS - The San Antonio Spurs figured they were probably going to face the Dallas Mavericks in the first round of the playoffs. So they went ahead and made sure of it by having Tim Duncan and Manu Ginobili sit out the season finale — against the Mavericks, no less.

Dallas beat San Antonio 96-89 Wednesday night in a game Dirk Nowitzki said had "a little preseason feel out there." The Spurs took an early lead, but the Mavs went never trailed again.

Dallas locked up the second seed in the Western Conference, San Antonio the seventh. Even if the Spurs had won, they could've moved up to No. 6 and the Mavs could've fallen to No. 3, which still would've meant a first-round matchup. The only other way it could've worked out was San Antonio playing Phoenix, and apparently the Spurs preferred their chances against their in-state rivals.

"If they're looking for ahead with a 16-2 spurt at the us," Dallas center Brendan

end of the first quarter and Haywood said, "they'll see us this weekend."

> Yet Haywood was among many in the Mavs locker room who insisted they weren't offended that a lowerseeded team wants to play them. Nowitzki laughed and said, "It seems like we play them every year in the playoffs anyway."

Spurs coach Gregg Popovich said his decision was all about resting his stars. There was a little gamesmanship to it, too, as he had both in the initial lineup he turned in. Neither even ended up sitting on the bench.

Popovich probably felt better about his decision after George Hill, who recently missed four games with an ankle injury, aggravated it by tripping over a cameraman during the first quarter. He didn't return. "The real bottom line is that


I'm paranoid about Timmy and Manu being healthy for the playoffs," Popovich said. "We've had playoffs where Timmy hasn't played, where Manu hasn't played, where Timmy's been half-speed, where Manu's been halfspeed for a variety of reasons. We're entering this playoff pretty healthy except for George and I didn't want to screw that up. ... I want a healthy team come playoff time and that's really the bottom line."

Getting the No. 2 seed mattered to Dallas because it comes with home-court advantage in a second-round series. The Mavs sure didn't look hungry for it in the early minutes, trailing 14-10 late in the first quarter.

Then Jason Kidd made a pair of free throws, a 3-pointer, set up Shawn Marion for a

Cards beat winless Astros in St. Louis

ST. LOUIS — Another offensive failure left the Houston Astros one loss shy of the worst start in franchise his-

Houston dropped to 0-8 Wednesday night, limited to four hits by Brad Penny and the St. Louis Cardinals' bullpen in a 2-1 loss Wednesday night.

The Astros remained the only winless team in the majors, mostly because of their big league-low 14 runs.

A day earlier, manager Brad Mills held a rare, off-day optional workout in an effort to help players relax. It was to no avail, as a lineup sorely missing Lance Berkman scored one or no runs for the fifth time.

"There's not a guy that's not trying," Brett Myers said. "I think some of us might be trying too hard. But it's part of the game.

"We miss Lance obviously, but guys have got to step up — including myself."

The Astros lost their first nine games in 1983. They recovered to finish 85-77.

"We're paid to go out there and hit and catch the ball," said shortstop Tommy Manzella, whose fielding error allowed the go-ahead run to score in the first. "If I just catch the ball, we might still be playing."

Penny (1-0) allowed an unearned run on three

hits in seven innings. Pujols drove in a run for his major leagueleading 15th RBI.

Myers (0-1) struck out seven and gave up only one earned run in seven innings, the longest start the Astros have had this season.

Penny has given up only one earned run in 14 innings with the Cardinals, who signed him to a one-year contract in the offseason as the rotation replacement for Joel Pineiro.

The bullpen failed Penny in his St. Louis debut but came through this time. Dennys Reyes got Kaz Matsui on a bases-loaded groundout to end the eighth and Ryan Franklin worked a perfect ninth against the 3-4-5 hitters for his third save in three chances.

"Guys are trying their best and it didn't work out a couple of times," Franklin said. "But Penny, he definitely deserved that for

Penny was in the clubhouse at the finish icing down his arm and listening to the home radio feed while watching TV, a combination that ramped up the anxiety.

"Whoever's doing the radio scares me to death," Penny said. "Every time there's a fly ball it's like 'Way

Cruz homers again, Lewis fans 10 in win over Cleveland

CLEVELAND — Colby Lewis is doing just fine in his return to the major leagues.

Pressed into service because scheduled starter C.J. Wilson had food poisoning, Lewis tied a career high with 10 strikeouts and Nelson Cruz hit his AL-leading sixth home run

Wednesday night as Texas beat the Cleveland Indians 6-2.

A crowd of 10,071, smallest at Progressive Field since the ballpark opened in 1994, saw the Indians make two errors, leave 12 runners on base, strike out 12 times and lose their

Lewis (2-0), until beating Seattle on Friday, had been winless in the majors since April 7, 2004. He spent the past two seasons with Hiroshima of Japan's Central League before re-signing with the Rangers in January.

"Lewis isn't afraid to take the ball and he's not afraid to pound the strike zone," Texas manager Ron Washington said. "He gives you everything he has."

The right-hander allowed two runs over 5 1-3 innings. Lewis made 37 pitches in the first inning, but got out of a bases-loaded jam and didn't allow a hit until the third. He gave up three hits and four walks overall.

"I made a couple of good pitches to get out of it," Lewis said. "I'm thank-

Mary Prudie Brown was born in Valiant, Okla.. Aug 19, 1923, to Fannie Pearl and C.E. Story, and County, where her father served as county judge.



She and her husband, Glenn, were active in the Church of Christ and operated the Stanton Walgreen Agency Drug store for more than 40 years. At their 50th anniversary celebration in 1997. County Judge Davenport introduced Mary Prudie and Glenn as "Mr. & Mrs. Martin County." Mary Prudie also served as president of the Texas Federation of Music Clubs and thereafter of the National Federation. She

received the first Distinguished Service Award given by the Texas Federation of Music Clubs at their state convention in Lubbock in March, 2010.

After the death of Glenn in 2000, after more than 55 years of marriage, Mary Prudie served until 2008 as president of Inspiration Point Fine Arts Colonv in Eureka Springs, Ark., and on the board of the Permian Basin Historical Society, as well as on many local committees and programs in Stanton, from the museum and library to the County Agent's office, the hospital thrift shop and the church. In 2006, she was awarded an honorary doctorate from Ohio Valley University in Parkersburg, W.Va., by President James Johnson.

An important new endeavor is her work, begun in 2003 with Guy and his wife, Brenda Cheryl, on The Straight Gate Project, a 501 c 3 charitable foundation operating a three-acre residential complex for Christian prison aftercare and substance abuse

recovery in Oak Cliff (South Dallas). The Straight Gate is one of the largest such projects in the Southwest and has served more than a dozen prison ministries and 400 ex-offenders from throughout the state. The eldest of Mary Prudie's three grandchildren, himself a Dallas resident and Straight Gate volunteer, has already opined that, in the end, this recovery project will be remembered as her most enduring civic work. She was preceded in death by her son, Baxter

Charles, and her husband, Glenn, and is survived by her son, Guy Story and his wife, Brenda Cheryl of Slaton; her daughter, Suzanna Leigh of Dallas; and grandchildren Darcy Wilson, of Dallas, Austen Story, of Washington, D.C., and Dixie (Ivi) Brown

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

The bidding:

Assume you become declarer at four hearts on the auction shown. West leads the K-Q-10 of clubs. You play the jack from dummy and ruff East's ace. How would you continue?

It's easy to see, looking at all four hands, that the winning play is to lead a heart to dummy's king and, after West shows out, finesse against East's queen on the return. Eventually you lose a spade, but you make

the contract. Without seeing all four hands, however, you might easily play the ace of hearts first and end up down one. The outcome therefore seems to depend on a straightforward guess as to how to tackle the hearts. But there is a bit more to the deal than at first When the hand was played in a

team contest, declarer realized that the only threat to the contract was a 3-0 heart division. After East turned up with the club ace, South decided that West was likely to have the queen of hearts for his opening bid. He therefore cashed the ace of hearts and that was that — down one. While it may be true that West

was more likely to have the heart queen for his bid, declarer missed a surefire way to make the contract. He should have reasoned that cashing the ace first would sink the contract if West showed out, but the same was not true if he cashed the king first and East showed out. Had East not followed to the heart

king, declarer could next have led a heart to the ace, played the A-K and ruffed a diamond and then exited with a heart. After taking the queen, West would have been forced to return a spade or a diamond (the earlier plays in clubs had marked him with just three cards in that suit). either of which would hand South the contract.

Guessing which way to play the hearts was therefore an illusion. The contract was a sure thing so long as declarer played dummy's king first.

A Big Spring man died Saturday following a traffic accident near the intersection of U.S. Highway 350 and Rice Road, according to officials with the Texas Department of Public Safety.

John Wayne Murphy, 45, of Coahoma, was pronounced dead by a doctor at Scenic Mountain Medical Center at 8:14 a.m. Saturday after the vehicle he was traveling in was struck in the passenger side.

According to DPS Operator Matt Cockerell, Murphy was a passenger in a 1998 Ford Escort driven by 19-year-old Roy Garcia Jr. of Big Spring.

"Vehicle one (Escort) was traveling northeast on Highway 350," said Cockerell. "The second vehicle, a 1998 Dodge travelpickup, was ing south on the same roadway. Vehicle one attempted to make a left turn onto Rice Road when the pickup struck the passenger door."

Cockerell said the pickup was driven by Albert Edens. Both Edens and Garcia suffered only minor injuries as a result of the traffic accident.

Graham is showing that immigration reform is still not a top priority for the president, who promised to tackle the issue during his first year in office. And Graham undoubtedly is scoring huge gains among Latinos and other immigrants who are tired of being used and taken for granted by the Democratic

He has become the new John McCain of immigration politics, hated by many in his own party yet keeping his party afloat among many others.

Here's one Republican who obviously recognizes that the GOP no longer can afford to keep alienating Latinos and other immigrants. Even Sen. McCain, trying to get re-elected in Arizona, has been keeping a low profile on immigration nowadays and leaving Graham as the Lone Republican Ranger on immigration reform.

Yet many conservative extremists, blinded by their hatred of immigrants, clearly don't appreciate Graham's efforts to rebuild broken bridges between the GOP and the immigrant communities. They don't see that Graham is making Obama look terrible in the eyes of many of the people who elected him president.

Many Latino and other immigrant leaders, mostly Democrats who supported Obama when he ran for president, now are telling him that it's simply not enough for him to keep reaffirming his support for immigration reform. But when a Republican a leader of the traditionally anti-immigrant party — is telling Obama that it's time for him to act and stop talking, it carries even more weight.

After Obama recently reafmitment to fix our broken immigration system — to appease the angry pro-immigrant protesters in several cities — Graham said the president was only paying lip service while doing "almost

nothing" to promote immigration reform.

"This idea that the president's been unwavering on immigration doesn't really pass the smell test," Graham said March 14 on ABC's "This Week."

The White House insists that the president is waiting for the "framework" of "bipartisan" legislation Graham is drafting with Sen. Charles Schumer, D-N.Y. But Graham, apparently tired of seeing the president sit back and do nothing on this issue, has challenged Obama to come up with his own plan.

"You do the heavy lifting," Graham said, indirectly addressing the president. "You put together a comprehensive immigration reform package. You bring it to the Senate and House and see how many Democrat and Republican supporters you can get. All you've done is talk about what we should do. Now is the time to lead."

Without the help of any other Senate Republican, Graham is exposing Obama's broken immigration promises and the Democrats' unwillingness to spend political capital on this issue. Of course, this will not make many Latinos or other immigrants automatically vote for Republican candidates in the midterm elections, but it will make them pause before they vote against them.

More than ever, minority voters are realizing that our leaders need to be chosen by their individual positions on key issues, including immigration, instead of by party affiliation.

Yet considering Republicans' record on immigration — and the huge number of immigrantbashers in their ranks — it's truly amazing that a Republican senator could be making a Democratic White House play defense!

Reaching for excuses to explain the administration's failure to pursue immigration reform, White House spokesman Robert Gibbs made clear March 30 that if reform legislation fails this year, the Democrats — quite ridiculously — are getting ready to blame Republicans!

"The president has been a strong advocate and proponent of immigration reform," Gibbs

But he also noted: "This can't just be President Obama. This can't just be President Obama and the Democratic Senate. Quite frankly, it probably can't just be President Obama, the Democratic Senate and Lindsey Graham. It has to be others."

In other words, if more Republicans don't step up, they are to be blamed.

Of course, that's not the same affirmative "Yes, We Can" message we heard from the Obama campaign in 2008, and it's certainly not the majorityrules approach that Democrats used to drive health care reform through Congress.

Now the Democrats want us to believe that if they don't keep their promises to reform immigration, it is the Republicans' fault.

C'mon! We always knew that immigration reform had minimal Republican support and huge conservative opposition. After the way health care reform was rammed down the throats of Republicans, we always knew immigration reform would become even harder for them to swallow.

Nevertheless, Gibbs said that the president will meet with Republican lawmakers "in the near future" and that he will "gauge whether or not it's possible to move forward on this issue."

Of course, that is a far cry from "Yes, We Can" or "Si, Se Puede." It's the first acknowledgment by the White House that immigration reform may not be possible this year.

However, even before Obama tries to win the support of a few Republican senators — necessary to get a 60-vote supermajority — the president needs to secure the support of several Democratic senators who have stood against immigration reform in the past.

"I urge the president to write a bill and see if he can get another Republican, see if he can convince the 16 Democrats who voted 'no' last time," Graham said. "Write a bill, and send it to me. I'll be glad to look at it."

As pro-immigrant marchers occupy the streets of our cities pleading for Obama to deliver on his promises — Graham says people at those rallies should know that their president has been feeding them only "political spin.'

He is calling Obama's bluffs, making Latinos and other immigrants see the deceptions of the Democratic Party, giving Republicans an opportunity to regain lost ground in the immigrant communities and trying to save his party from becoming extinct. And yet Sen. Graham has become the target of immigrantbashers.

On the Internet, many of them have called on South Carolina voters to boot him out of office. One of them charged that Graham is "as big a communist as Schumer." Another one said "Senator Grahamnesty" should stop pretending to be a conservative. One suggested that Graham should pack his bags and move south of the border. And yet another one assumed that Graham "must have an illegal alien mis-

tress on the side or something.' They don't know a good and courageous politician even when

They must be held accountable

f the head of a major business covered up the sexual abuse of children by his employees by simply moving the guilty workers to another location, that CEO would be held criminally accountable.

The same thing would happen if a superintendent of schools covered up the rape of innocent kids by reassigning the offending teachers to another school.

In fact, in any area or field where an adult covers up the abuse of children and puts the abusers in position to commit the same crime

on a new set of kids, the supervising adult would be arrested. Somehow, though, these rules do not apply to the Catholic church. It's important to remember

that the underlying Catholic faith had nothing to do with these unspeakable crimes. The religion's basic beliefs abhor the kind of crimes committed by these rogue priests and covered

should fall not on the church as a whole, but all those who ignored the teachings of their religion to commit unspeakable acts and the church leaders who, instead of protecting the children in their care, chose to protect their own positions. Over the past few years, we

have seen a disturbing pattern of child sexual abuse emerge. A priest would abuse his position of authority to take advantage of children in his parish. The priest's transgressions would be discovered and instead of getting the police involved, church leaders would simply move the offending priest to another parish where he could hurt more kids.

Even when the allegations of widespread sexual abuse became public, church leaders did little to punish the offending priests. Instead of openly and honestly complying with investigations, all efforts were made to protect the church at the expense of its young members.

Perhaps the most disturbing aspect of this sexual abuse scandal is that America's legal system has largely ignored the crimes. Why have bishops,

cardinals and other church lead-

ers who knew of these crimes not been held criminally liable for their actions? Yes, we have arrested individual priests, but we have not held their bosses ac countable for covering up their actions and essentially facilitat-

ing more crimes. Don't put Catholicism on trial but apply the law of the land to all criminals. I don't remember there being an exception to the penal code that allows the Catholic church to handle its own business and I don't believe cardinals or bishops have any special legal exemptions when it comes to the rape of children.

And, I still do not see the Pope or any other leader of the Catholic church actually stepping up to take responsibility for what has happened.

At the very least there should be widespread resignations from positions of authority and an open cooperation with the authorities to make sure all the perpetrators and those who covered up the crimes go to jail.

China quake death toll passes 600

MADOI, China (AP) — Rescue teams fought gusty winds and altitude sickness Thursday as supplies of food, water and almost everything ran thin after strong earthquakes left more than 600 dead in a mountainous Tibetan area of western China.

Survivors, many of whom spent the night outside in freezing weather, wandered bleeding from their wounds through Jiegu township for a second day, witnesses said. Rescuers, tired from the high winds and thin oxygen, pulled some survivors and many bodies from the pulverized remains of the town flattened by Wednesday morning's quakes.

"We've seen too many bodies and now they're trying to deal with them. The bodies are piled up like a hill. You can see bodies with broken arms and legs and it breaks your heart," said Dawa Cairen, a Tibetan who works for the Christian group the Amity Foundation and was helping in rescue efforts. "You can see a lot of blood. It's flowing like a river.'

Grim pictures emerged from several collapsed schools that were the focus of early rescue efforts. Footage on state television and photos posted online showed bodies laid out near the rubble, and the Xinhua News Agency quoted a local education official as saying 66 children and 10 teachers had died, mostly in three schools.

AP-GfK Poll: Surprising jump in opposition to Obama's health care law

WASHINGTON (AP) — Opposition to President Barack Obama's health care law jumped after he signed it — a clear indication his victory could become a liability for Democrats in this fall's elections.

A new Associated Press-GfK poll finds Americans oppose the health care remake 50 percent to 39 percent. Before a divided Congress finally passed the bill and Obama signed it

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at a jubilant White House ceremony last month, public opinion was about evenly split. Another 10 percent of Americans say they are neutral.

Disapproval for Obama's handling of health care also increased from 46 percent in early March before he signed the bill, to 52 percent currently — a level not seen since last summer's angry town hall meetings.

Nonetheless, the bleak numbers may not represent a final judgment for the president and his Democratic allies in Congress.

Only 28 percent of those polled said they understand the overhaul extremely or very well. And a big chunk of those who don't understand it remain neutral. Democrats hope to change public opinion by calling attention to benefits available this year for seniors, families with children transitioning to work and people shut out of coverage because of a medical problem.

Gunfire breaks out at deposed president's rally in southern Kyrgyzstan

OSH, Kyrgyzstan (AP) — Gunfire broke out at a rally where the deposed president of Kyrgyzstan was speaking to supporters Thursday. Kurmanbek Bakiyev was hustled into a car and driven from the scene, and there were no apparent injuries in the crowd.

Bakiyev, accompanied by two of his brothers, returned to his home compound in the village of Teyit about two hours later. He made no comment.

The gunfire occurred seconds after Bakiyev began speaking to the crowd of about 5,000 in Osh, the largest city in the southern region that is Bakiyev's support base.

Although there were no reports of injuries, the gunfire underlined the tensions that persist in the second week of the crisis in the ex-Soviet Central Asian country where both the United States and Russia have military bases.

Witnesses said the shots were fired into the air by Bakiyev's bodyguards,

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possibly because of concern about a group of Bakiyev opponents who were approaching from a separate rally about 300 meters (yards) away.

After fleeing the capital last week, Bakiyev in recent days has made a series of public appearances, clearly testing how much support he has to try to resist the interim authorities who have taken control in the capi-

Homes facing foreclosure jumped 16 percent

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A record number of U.S. homes were lost to foreclosure in the first three months of this year, a sign banks are starting to wade through the backlog of troubled home loans at a faster pace, according to a new report.

RealtyTrac Inc. said Thursday that the number of U.S. homes taken over by banks jumped 35 percent in the first quarter from a year ago. In addition, households facing foreclosure grew 16 percent in the same period and 7 percent from the last three months of

More homes were taken over by banks and scheduled for a foreclosure sale than in any quarter going back to at least January 2005, when RealtyTrac began reporting the data, the

Should Israel be able to build residences in its capital city?

A great brouhaha has arisen about a mid-level bureaucrat in Israel's Ministry of the Interior releasing a routine notice that 1,600 residences were to be built in Jerusalem. To the surprise of many, this routine announcement was construed as an insult or worse to Vice President Biden, who was visiting in Israel at the time. she was senator of New York and felt to be much dependent on Jewish support. It almost appears as if somebody in the administration wanted to produce a "crisis" and was looking for an expedient way to accomplish that.

The Muslim Palestinians also claim Jerusalem, or at least its eastern part, as their capital. They want the city to be divided - as it was between 1948 when the Jordanians occupied the eastern part of the city – until 1967, when the Israelis liberated it in the Six-Day War.

The principal basis for the Muslim claim is that Jerusalem does indeed contain an Islamic holy site, namely the Temple Mount (sacred to both Muslims and Jews) with its two mosques, El Aksa and the Dome of the Rock. It is the place from which Mohammed, who never in his life had set foot in the city, is believed to have ascended to heaven. But aware that it was the holy city of Christians and Jews, and wishing to convert them to his new religion, he commanded his followers to build a mosque in Jerusalem. But never in Muslim history did this mosque or this city compare in significance to the holy cities of Mecca and Medina - cities that no "infidel" may visit.

A tenuous Muslim claim. It is on the basis of this religious tradition that the Muslims designated the entire Jewish Temple Mount to be their holy site. The Israeli government, in its constant spirit of accommodation to Muslim sensibilities, has largely acceded to this tradition and has put the area in and around the two mosques entirely under Muslim control. But how would Christians feel if, instead of from the Temple Mount, Muslim tradition

had Mohammed ascend from the Church of the Holy

Sepulcher and if the Muslim Arabs were to claim that site as their property? The Christian world, often ready to consent to Muslim claims against Jews and Israelis, would be greatly astonished and would certainly resist such claim. But Muslim

Arab assertiveness doesn't end there. On the tenuous claim of their right to the Temple Mount, they have construed a claim to the entire city of Jerusalem (or at the very least to its eastern part), which they have declared to be their "third holiest city." And, it would be an insult to all Muslims and all Arabs to leave the city in the hands of the "infidel Jews."

Jerusalem: Never an Arab capital. The city of Jerusalem - in contrast to Baghdad, Cairo or Damascus - has never played any major role in the political and religious lives of the Muslim Arabs. It was never a political center, never a national, or even a provincial or sub-provincial capital of any country, since Biblical times. It was the site of one Muslim holy place, but otherwise a backwater to the Arabs. The passion for Jerusalem was not discovered by the

Muslim Arabs until most recent history. But Jerusalem has stood at the center of the Jewish people's national life since King David made it his capital in 1000 BCE. After the return from Babylonian exile, Jerusalem again served as the capital of the Jewish people for the next five-and-a-half centuries.




