# More Plans Made For County Fair

The Castro County Fair Association this week released the rules guiding Community exhibits, individual farm products, and women's educational exhibits.

## Sept. 7 Deadline For Fair Queen Contest Entries

Organizations sponsoring candidates for the Castro County Fair Queen Contest should give the name of their candidate to either Rosie Bates at MI 7-3845 or James E. Wohlgenuth at MI 7-3712 by Wednesday, September 7.

Plans are being made for each organization sponsoring a candidate to furnish a float or a car in the parade for their candidate to ride.

Judging will be Thursday, September 15 at the Fair Grounds at about 9 p.m.

The contestants will be judged on personality, poise, beauty and any talent which she may have. The girl's will be attired in formal evening dress and out-of-town judges will be secured.

Rules of the contest are that the contestants must be at least 16 years of age, single and a resident of Castro County. The minimum age limit will be waived for the freshman and junior high school classes so they may enter class members in the contest.

tries must be made to the county agent's office or Chamber of Commerce by September 13.

Exhibitors will be assigned space by the fair superintendent. Each community exhibit must contain 15 different kinds of agricultural products which shall be scored for a total of 600 points.

Neatness, attractiveness and general arrangement of exhibits will be scored on the basis of 100 points. The total possible score is 700 points.

Appropriate banners will be given the first seven places. Individuals may show any of the farm products approved by the fair committee. The first places in each class will receive ribbons.

To be eligible for the champion gardener, entrants must have at least five entries in the different vegetable classes. To be eligible for the County Champion Farmer, one must have at least five different entries in farm products.

The women's educational exhibit division is open to any organized group and all entries are subject to the general rules and regulations as published in the fair guide.

The superintendent will assign space with those coming first given their choice. Spaces are six feet wide and eight feet long.

Entries in the Women's Educational Exhibit division will close September 8th and exhibits must be in place by 6 p.m. Thursday, September 15th and must remain until 8:30 p.m. Saturday, September 17th.

## Ammonia Causes County Highway Accident Monday

A freak accident about 1 a.m. Monday between Hart and Edmondson resulted in a narrow escape by two Nazareth families, Mr. and Mrs. George H. Book and Mr. and Mrs. George Brockman and their son Pennyp.

The families were returning from Plainview where they had been bowling in the Book's 1960 model Ford station wagon when they saw a white mist over the road which they presumed to be fog. Instead it was ammonia which had escaped from a nearby tank and which covered the highway for about one-fourth of a mile.

Mr. Book thought he would drive through the wisp of fog but instead he lost all vision and his car left the road and ran across the railroad track north of the highway causing considerable damage. A trucker came by and carried the passengers out of the ammonia area. Farmers and their families from as far as one-half mile downwind were forced to leave their homes by the escaping ammonia which traveled very slowly due to the calmness of the night air.

## Ralph Smith Is New Member of Band Group

Ralph Smith has been notified of his selection to the American School Band Directors Association, an elite group made up of top band directors of the United States.

Smith, who is director of the Dimmitt Bobcat Band, was one of two men chosen for the organization for 1960 from the State of Texas. There are only 31 other members of the organization in the state, out of a total of 850 band directors.

The national organization has 430 members and each was chosen in the same manner as Smith. The prospective new member must go first through a screening committee set up on the state level and then his name and qualifications are passed on to a similar national committee. If approval comes from the national committee, then his name is submitted to a national convention of members for formal acceptance by vote. To qualify, a school band director must have taught for seven years and must have a good band program, both in concert and marching fields and he must have an outstanding record of accomplishment. The other director selected from Texas was Melvin King of Abilene.

In Europe, since about 1890, May 1 has been observed as Labor Day.

### Cleavinger Returns From John Deere Show

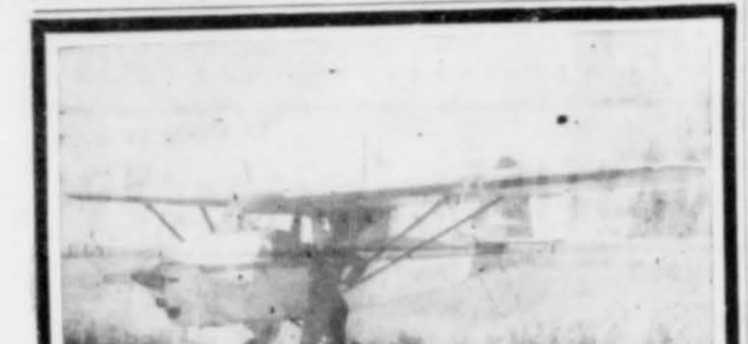

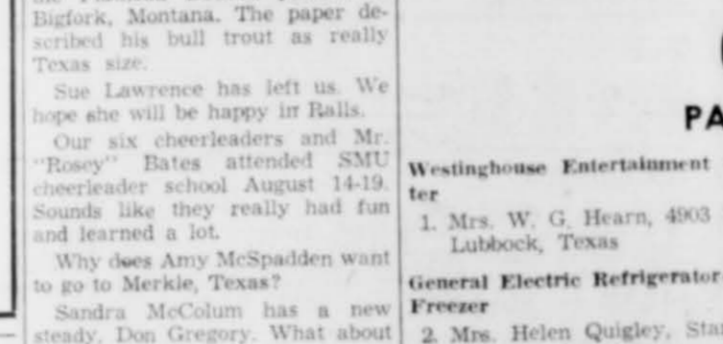

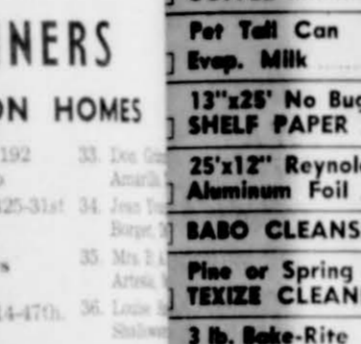
