# Outrage over Gulf oil spill is growing

Associated Press Writers GRAND ISLE, La. — Thick, sticky

oil crept deeper into delicate marshes of the Mississippi Delta, an arrival dreaded for a month since the crude started spewing into the Gulf, as anger and frustration mounted over efforts to plug the gusher from a blown-out well and contain the spill.

Up to now, only tar balls and a sheen of oil had come ashore. But chocolate brown and vivid orange globs and sheets of foul-smelling oil the consistency of latex paint have

begun coating the reeds and grasses of Louisiana's wetlands, home to

rare birds, mammals and a rich va-

riety of marine life.

With each passing day, outrage grows. State and local officials say the federal government isn't doing enough. President Barack Obama faults the agency that oversees offshore drilling. Republicans say the Coast Guard and the administration should have done more.

A deep, stagnant ooze sat in the middle of a particularly devastated marsh off the Louisiana coast where Emily Guidry Schatzel of the National Wildlife Federation was examining stained reeds.

"This is just heartbreaking," she said with a sigh. "I can't believe it." Fingers are also pointing at BP

### Run for the Wall to stop in Big Spring



TRENT — One of the oldest — and truest — coaching cliches in the book is the maxim that the team which makes the fewest mistakes will win.

Latest case in point: The Forsan Lady Buffaloes.

The Lady Buffs didn't so much overpower Albany as out-execute the Lady Lions, taking advantage of four errors to claim a 5-2 victory in the first game of a best-of-three Class 1A regional semifinal softball series Thursday afternoon at Trent High School.

# Bulldogettes' backs against the wall

#### Coahoma on brink of elimination after dropping 2-0 decision to Alpine

MIDLAND — The Coahoma Bulldogettes are in an unwelcome, but not totally unfamiliar, position.

Alpine pitcher Lauren Harden handcuffed the Bullodgettes to lead the Lady Bucks to a 2-0

victory over Coahoma in the opener of the teams' best-ofthree Class 2A regional semifinal playoff series Thursday at MUGS Field.

Harden got the upper hand of the pitchers' duel between her and Coahoma hurler Heather Newton. The Alpine star limited the Bulldogettes to three hits while striking out 12. Newton, meanwhile, struck out 10, walked one and surrendered five hits while allowing the two unearned runs.

"My hat's off to their pitcher," Coahoma Head Coach Tracy Tadlock said. "She played really well."

While giving Alpine credit for the win, Tadlock added that the Bulldogettes contributed to their demise Tuesday.

"We were not, for whatever reason, ready to play Thurs-

### Cruz leads Rangers to 13-7 victory over Orioles

ARLINGTON (AP) — On a night when their pitchers yielded 15 hits, six walks and hit a batter, the Texas Rangers needed all the offense Nelson Cruz and his teammates could provide.

Cruz had a three-run homer and drove in four runs in his first career four-hit game, and the Rangers matched their longest winning streak of the season with their fourth in a row, a 13-7 victory over the Baltimore Orioles on Thurs-

Texas had eight players with two hits or more while the Rangers reached doubledigit runs for the fourth time in their last 14 games.

Matt Treanor added a threerun homer in a five-run eighth and David Murphy had three of Texas' season-high 20 hits to help the Rangers equal their highest scoring output of the season.

"There's not a letup in that lineup right now," Rangers manager Ron Washington Cruz said.

The Rangers greeted Brian Matusz (2-4) with a four-run first highlighted by Ian Kinsler's RBI single and Cruz's three-run shot.

Cruz, who had been hampered by a hamstring injury. had been 5 for 21 in six games since being activated from the 15-day disabled list on May

"Every at-bat I take, I feel much better at the plate,"

The Orioles answered with a three-run second on Corey Patterson's two-run double and Tv Wigginton's RBI sin-

But Vladimir Guerrero's two-run homer in the second and Murphy's RBI single in the third gave Texas a 7-3 lead, chasing Matusz.

"It's not going to happen every night, but tonight was



nice," Kinsler said. "We feel like every one of us in the lineup can carry the team or drive in runs on any given night. It's nice to have confidence in your teammates like that."

Rangers starter Scott Feldman (2-4) had the benefit of early run support to win for the first time since April 11 despite allowing a career-high 12 hits over six innings.

Feldman gave up four runs, struck out five and walked one as AL West leader Texas won for the 10th time in 14 games to move four games ahead of Oakland in the division.

Luke Scott's three hits

led the Orioles, who have lost five of six and own the worst record in the majors (13-29).

Matusz, in his first full season as a starter, threw seven shutout innings against Cleveland in his previous start. This time the 23-year-

old lefthander lasted only 2 1-3 innings in the shortest outing of his 17 major league starts, allowing seven runs and eight hits. "He's not Warren Spahn,

he's not Sandy Koufax," Orioles manager Dave Trembley said. "He's a young guy that's

learning. I guarantee you he'll take a great deal from this and the next time he faces these guys, you'll see a much better outing."

NOTES: Texas LHP Matt Harrison, on the 15day DL with left biceps tendinitis, threw 30 pitches in a simulated game without discomfort. He'll have a bullpen session on Saturday and if that goes well, he'll pitch for Double-A Frisco on Monday and Wednesday before the team decides how to proceed. LHP Derek Holland has taken Harrison's rotation spot, and Harrison will probably have to work out of the bullpen when he's activated. ... got his first career start at 1B, with rookie Justin Smoak opening the game on the bench after playing 26 straight games since he was called up from

Triple-A Oklahoma City on April 23. Smoak, a defensive replacement for Arias in the eighth, is in an 0-for-11 slump and began the night batting .174. #### Former cycling head dismisses Landis claims against Armstrong

LAUSANNE, Switzerland (AP) — The former chief of cycling's world governing body says that Lance Armstrong never tested positive for a banned drug.

Hein Verbruggen was president of the International Cycling Union in 2002, when Armstrong's former teammate Floyd Landis claims the seven-time Tour de France winner paid the governing body to cover up a failed doping test.

Verbruggen told The Associated Press on Friday that "never has Lance Armstrong been declared positive by a lab."

He said Landis had "a lot of confusion' about accusations he aired this week.

Landis admitted extensively doping in his career, after repeatedly denying it since being stripped of the 2006 Tour de

Verbruggen said Landis lied for three years and then changed his story.

#### Police: 2 suspects dead after Arkansas officers slain

WEST MEMPHIS, Ark. (AP) — Two men armed with AK-47s ambushed and killed two officers who had stopped them on an Arkansas interstate, then died in a shootout with police who had tracked them to a Walmart parking lot, authorities say.

Sgt. Brandon Paudert, 39, and Bill Evans, 38, were killed Thursday while "running drug interdiction" on Interstate 40 in east Arkansas, West Memphis Police Inspector Bert Shelton said. The local sheriff and a deputy were shot and injured in the subsequent shootout, authorities said.

The events started when Evans stopped a minivan with Ohio plates, with Paudert arriving moments later as backup, Assistant Police Chief Mike Allen said. Two men got out of the van with the assault rifles and opened fire on the officers, Shelton said. Paudert, the son of West Memphis' police chief,

died at the scene and Evans died at a hospital, authorities said. Traffic stopped as authorities searched vehicles on I-40 looking for the suspects, who were spotted

about 90 minutes later in the parking lot of a nearby Walmart, officials said. Dozens of officers swarmed the vehicle after a wildlife officer rammed the minivan with his car.

During that shootout, Crittenden County Sheriff Dick Busby was shot in the arm and his chief deputy, W.A. Wren, was shot in the abdomen, authorities said. Both were in serious condition Friday morning, a spokeswoman at the Regional Medical Center in Memphis said.

The two suspects haven't been identified.

#### Greeley families grieve death of 12-year-old GREELEY, Colo. (AP) — A steady stream of par-

ents and children, some in tears, visited an irrigation ditch where the body of a 12-year-old girl missing since March 28 was found.

Police confirmed Thursday that the body recovered a day earlier in an industrial area is that of Kayleah Wilson. The coroner's office ruled the death a homicide but hasn't disclosed details. Police said they had no suspects.

After a news conference Thursday afternoon, a makeshift memorial of teddy bears, candles, flowers and crucifixes grew on the grassy banks near a spillway where a worker checking the ditch after a heavy rain found the body.

"It's an open wound because whoever did this is still out there," said Melissa Lujan, whose daughter knew Kayleah. "You know it's bringing us together to where we watch our children more often, we tell them we love them, we kiss them goodnight, kiss them before they leave but just knowing that somebody could do this...

"How could they have a heart? How could they do this to a 12-year-old little girl? I don't understand

The decomposing body had been in the irrigation ditch "for some time" in an area that had been searched twice, Police Chief Jerry Garner said. Greeley is about 60 miles northeast of Denver. The ditch is about a half-mile from the sixth-

grader's home. Wilson's March 28 disappearance spawned repeated searches by police, Greeley residents and the FBI. Authorities said they pursued more than 300 leads and knocked on the doors of about 1,000 homes.

No one has been ruled out as a suspect, but investigators have nothing that points to family members, Garner said.

#### A step to artificial life: Manmade DNA powers cell

WASHINGTON (AP) — Scientists announced a bold step Thursday in the enduring quest to create artificial life. They've produced a living cell powered by manmade DNA.

While such work can evoke images of Franken-

stein-like scientific tinkering, it also is exciting hopes that it could eventually lead to new fuels, better ways to clean polluted water, faster vaccine production and more.

Is it really an artificial life form?

The inventors call it the first synthetic cell, although this initial step is more a re-creation of existing life — changing one simple type of bacterium into another — than a built-from-scratch kind. But Maryland genome-mapping pioneer J. Craig

Venter said his team's project paves the way for the ultimate, much harder goal: designing organisms that work differently from the way nature intended for a wide range of uses. Already he's working with ExxonMobil in hopes of turning algae into fuel. "This is the first self-replicating species we've had

on the planet whose parent is a computer," Venter told reporters.

And the report, being published Friday in the journal Science, is triggering excitement in this growing field of synthetic biology.

#### Ala. evangelist gets life for dead wife in freezer

MOBILE, Ala. (AP) — A south Alabama evangelist who authorities say terrorized his family while preaching at revivals has been sentenced to life plus 51 years in prison after being convicted of killing his wife and storing her body in a home freezer. Circuit Judge John Lockett imposed the sentence

Thursday on Anthony Hopkins in Mobile.

Assistant District Attorney Ashley Rich called Hopkins "evil of the worst kind." Defense attorney Jeff Deen said his client admits putting his wife's body in the freezer, but doesn't know how she

Prosecutors say Hopkins killed his wife in 2004 after she caught him molesting a girl. The wife's body was discovered in 2008.

Besides the murder conviction, Hopkins was sentenced on convictions including sodomy and sexual abuse.

PLC, not only for the April 20 explosion of the Deepwater Horizon rig and the deaths of 11 workers, but for the gusher of oil that flowed entirely uncontained until this past weekend. The company, which was leasing the rig, conceded Thursday what some scientists have been saying for weeks: More oil is flowing from the leak than BP and the Coast Guard had previously estimated.

"It's anger at the people who are supposed to be driving the ship don't have any idea what's going on," said E.J. Boles, 55, a musician from Big Pine Key, Fla. "Why wouldn't they have any contingency plan? I'm not a genius and even I would have thought of that.'





1. At first glance, it seems you could lose three spades and a diamond and go down one. However, the contract is certain — regardless of how the North-South cards are divided - if you play correctly.

dummy's spades, divesting yourself of the diamond loser in the process. Draw two rounds of trumps, lead a

spade to dummy's ace and continue with the spade jack. If South follows low, discard your diamond loser. Presumably, North will win the spade with the queen or king and return a diamond. If South has the missing spade honor, you are home, because you intend to discard a heart (and another heart on a subsequent spade) if he follows low, or ruff if he plays

This approach produces 12 tricks whenever South has either one or both missing spade honors, which will occur about 75 percent of the time. Of course, if South produces the king or queen of spades when you lead dummy's jack at trick five, you ruff it, return to dummy with a trump and play the ten of spades, discarding your diamond if South plays low, and again the contract is

# **Rockies blank Astros**

HOUSTON (AP) -Houston's hitters were no match for Ubaldo Jimenez on Thursday

The only thing that slowed him down was the Houston weather on a hot, sticky night with the Minute Maid Park roof open.

Jimenez allowed one hit over seven innings and Troy Tulowitzki had a three-run homer as the Colorado Rockies beat the Astros 4-0 to break a three-game skid.

He could have lasted longer if not for leg cramps that began in the seventh inning.

"It was just because of the weather," he said. "It was so hot out here. The bullpen, it's like a sauna. The bullpen's covered and you lose a lot of water in your body."

The only hit Jimenez (8-1)allowed was Humberto Quintero's single to start the third inning. It came when baseman Stewart couldn't handle the hard-hit grounder barehanded. Jimenez, who improved his major league-low ERA to 0.99, struck out four and walked two.

"He's really special," manager Jim Tracy

said. "He's a big reason why with all the different things we've dealt with and all the different things that we are still sorting through, he's the reason why our heads are still fairly well above water. He's a big, big part of that."

Matt Belisle allowed one hit in the eighth before Manny Corpas did the same in the ninth to complete the shutout.

Lance Berkman walked with no outs in the fourth but Jimenez got out of that inning unscathed when Hunter Pence grounded into a double play after he retired Carlos Lee. He sailed through the next three innings, retiring the next nine batters.

His only trouble came when he came up a bit gimpy on a run to first base when he reached on an error by Pedro Feliz in the seventh inning. He walked around gingerly for a couple of minutes while trainers talked to him, but he remained in the game.

Jimenez struck out the first five batters before walking Feliz. Still, he said he wasn't feeling great early.

"At the beginning of the game I didn't feel

good because I was throwing everything high," said Jimenez, who threw the season's only no-hitter, in April at Atlanta. "But as the game went on, I started getting better. In the fifth and sixth inning I started pounding the strike zone and throwing my breaking ball for strikes."

Quintero impressed with Jimenez.

"He is a good pitcher," he said. "He can throw anything. He was throwing his sinker at 98 (mph), slider, change up, everything." Houston starter Roy

Oswalt (2-6) extended his streak of quality starts to nine after allowing two earned runs and three hits in six innings. That's the longest such streak to start a season for an Astro since Roger Clemens had nine in a row in 2005. The Astros have struggled to score runs with Oswalt pitching and he entered the game with the lowest run support in the National League at 2.29 runs a game.

Thursday was the sixth time the Astros have been shut out this

Houston opened the game with an error

when Oswalt couldn't handle a short flip from Berkman on the game's first at-bat, allowing Carlos Gonzalez to reach first. Todd Helton walked with one out before Tulowitzki's shot to the Crawford Boxes in left field made it 3-0.

"I threw the ball well," Oswalt said. "I thought I had good stuff coming out there in the first inning. I just had that one pitch. I made good pitches to him before he hit the home run that he didn't hit."

A single by Brad Hawpe in the eighth drove in a run to make it 4-0.

**NOTES: Houston LHP** Tim Byrdak, who is on the DL with a hamstring injury and who has also had back problems, will begin a rehabilitation assignment with Triple-A Round Rock on Friday. He is scheduled to pitch one inning on Friday and another one on Sunday.

... Oswaldo Navarro, whose contract the Astros purchased from Triple-A Round Rock on Wednesday, struck out as a pinch hitter in the sixth. ... Helton's double in the eighth inning tied him with Joe Cronin for 40th on the all-time list with 515.

### Pitching highlights baseball's first quarter

From Dallas Braden's perfect game to Hanley Ramirez's loafing, it's been an eventful first quarter of the baseball season.

In the chilly months of April and May, it often takes the hitters a little longer to get warmed up than the pitchers. That trend appears to be continuing this year, with the first quarter of the season being highlighted by the guys on the mound.

There have already been two no-hitters and a handful of one-hitters in the first 40 games of the regular season. As of Thursday morning, eight pitchers, including three in the heavy-hitting American League, had earned-run averages under 2.00. Fifteen pitchers have ERA's better than 2.50 and a whopping 30 starters are under 3.00.

Here's a look at some of the stars, slumps and surprises through the first quarter of the year.

—Ubaldo Jimenez, RHP, Colorado Rockies: Jimenez is making pitching cool for the first time at Coors Field. Threw the first no-hitter in franchise history at Atlanta on April 17 and topped the majors with seven victories and a 1.12 ERA.

–Andre Ethier, RF, Los Angeles Dodgers: Leading the majors with .392 batting average and 38 RBIs. His 11 HRs are second-best in NL. Also has two walkoff hits this season, including a grand slam to beat Milwaukee on May 6. Went on DL with broken finger on Tuesday.

-Braden, RHP, Oakland Athletics: Season numbers of 4-4 with a 3.45 ERA are pedestrian, but one of those wins was anything but. Threw 19th perfect game in MLB history on May 9 against the best team in baseball — the Tampa Bay Rays.

—Justin Morneau, 1B, Minnesota Twins: Hitting behind Joe Mauer, Minnesota's \$184 million man, Morneau is making his \$80 million contract look like a bargain. Leads AL with a .365 batting average and is third with 11 HRs.

#### **SLUMPS:**

-Trevor Hoffman,

RHP, Milwaukee Brewers: One of best closers ever, the 42-year-old Hoffman has blown five of 10 save chances this year, prompting manager Ken Macha to bench him for two games. He is 1-3 with a 13.15 ERA with 7 HRs allowed.

—Aramis Ramirez, 3B, Chicago Cubs. Hitting .167 with 4 HRs and 20 RBIs for the struggling Cubs, who hope his walk-off homer in the 11th inning to beat Colo rado on Monday night was a sign of things to come.

-Ken Griffey, Jr., DH, Seattle Mariners: Another aging star who appears on his way out. Seattle icon is hitting .183 with 0 HRs and 6 RBIs in 30 games. Team closed ranks after report that Griffey was sleeping in the clubhouse during a game.

—Josh Beckett, RHP, Boston Red Sox: Was 1-1 with a 7.29 ERA with 29 earned runs allowed in his previous 27 innings before being put on DL with back problems. Signed a four-year, \$68 million extension in April.

#### **NICE SURPRISES:**

—The Tampa Bay Rays, Cincinnati Reds and San Diego Padres are all on top of their respective divisions. Rays (29-11) are off to best start for a big league team since Boston in 2002. Tampa is 16-4 on

the road this year. The Reds are using pitching and small ball in a quest for first winning season in 10 years. They were in first place in the NL Central this late in the season for the first time since 2006.

"We've been trying to put this thing together for a couple years now," manager Dusty Baker

#### **BAD SURPRISES:**

—The Los Angeles Angels, Milwaukee Brewers and Seattle Mari-

The Angels have won five of the last six AL West titles, but John Lackey, Chone Figgins and Vlad Guerrero left big holes to fill and the Angels (19-24) were in third place in the West.

Starting pitching again is a big problem for the Brewers (15-25), and Hoffman's struggles contributed to the early struggles.

The Mariners remade their roster and were a trendy pick to unseat the Angels in the AL West this year. But Cliff Lee started the season on the DL and the lastplace Mariners (14-26) were the worst in the AL in runs and HRs and second-to-last in batting.





This notice will identify the date, time and location for the hearing.
