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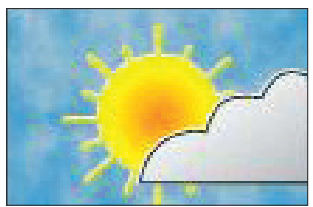

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Free lunch!

No cost to kids anyway, ISD says

Who says there's no such thing as a free lunch anymore?

For youth 18 and under, the cost of lunch will be exactly zero in June, thanks to Big Spring Independent School District's annual Summer Lunch Program.

The program, which will be offered Mondays through Fridays from June 7-30, is available free to any child who shows up at the cafeteria, regardless if he or she is a BSISD student. Adults can eat for the cost of \$1 for breakfast and \$3.25 for lunch.

Cafeterias at Big Spring High School, Big Spring Junior High and Goliad Intermediate will provide free breakfast from 8 a.m. to 9 a.m. and lunch from 11:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. Bauer and Marcy elementaries will offer restricted lunches (a limited number of meals will be prepared and served on a first come/first served basis) this summer.

In addition, Marcy Elementary will serve free meals from July 26 to Aug. 6, BSISD Food Services Director Judy Grant said.

"School takes a summer vacation but hunger doesn't," Grant said. "This program is provided to ensure that the children in our community do not go hungry during the

Jerry Groves, spokesperson for the Big Spring Vietnam Memorial Committee, said this year's ceremony will feature many of the same sights and sounds as last year, minus one.



"Our ceremony will include a prayer and a speaker, much like we've done in years past," said Groves. "However, this year we won't have the motorcycle riders from the annual Ride to Remember stopping in Big Spring."

Groves said this year's ceremony will feature something very special, as the brother of a soldier who gave his life in Iraq will perform "Taps" and "The Star Spangled Banner."

"Our Gold Star mother, Ginger Metcalf, will be there for the laying of the wreath," said Groves. "Her son, U.S. Marine Pfc. Chad Metcalf, was killed in 2003. His brother, Josh Metcalf, will be performing those songs for us during the ceremony. It's very special to have someone who's life has been touched like this participating in the Memorial Day ceremony. We're very proud to have him."

The ceremony will begin at 11 a.m. at the Vietnam Memorial.

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2 more days until BP knows if oil well plug attempt works

COVINGTON, La. — BP kept pumping heavy mud into its blown-out well beneath the Gulf of Mexico on Friday, but the company's

chief executive cautioned it will be two more days before anyone knows if the latest fix attempt will end the uncontrolled flow of crude that has already become the worst oil spill in U.S. history.

BP CEO Tony Hayward had

projected a resolution to the so-called "top kill" as soon as Thursday afternoon, but an 18-hour delay in the injection of heavyweight mud scuttled those plans. Though engineers had stopped pumping hours earlier, BP and coast

Guard officials assured the public Thursday morning that the process was going as planned.

On Friday, Coast Guard Adm. Thad Allen said

Buff's roll Haskell 18-3, keep offense hot

ABILENE — Forsan first baseman Ashley Buzbee believes luck played out in the Lady Buffs' 1-0 win against Petrolia in game one of a Class 1A regional final.

But maybe it's better for the Lady Buffs to be lucky in what turned out to be a pitching duel and one of their toughest games this season.

Thanks to Buzbee's game-winning RBI in the eighth inning, the Lady Buffs are one win away from a return trip to Austin and another shot at a state title. Buzbee's hit went through the centerfield gap and brought Ambra Hill home.

"I think honestly, it was just a lucky shot," Buzbee

said. "Everything was just right there perfect in the moment. If it would have been anywhere else, it probably would have been a pop up."

Forsan coach Shanna Roberts wasn't afraid to rank Thursday's contest as one of the toughest the defending state champions have been a part of.

She has Petrolia's Alaina Anderson to thank for that.

Anderson kept the Lady Buffs off balance all night, fanning 10 Forsan batters. Buzbee said Anderson varied in her pitch location, which made it tough to get a hit off her. Before that game-winning hit, Buzbee struck out, walked and laid down a sacrifice bunt.

Not many other Lady Buffs had much success off

Anderson either. Brittney Roemer got a single in the second inning and Miranda Park got a single in the sixth.

"We managed to persevere and hang in there and go extra innings and still get hits when we needed them," Roberts said. "That's what it's going to take against this team. We're just going to have to keep chipping away until we can manage to get in position where we can score and that's how we're going to win."

Forsan's ace, Amanda Longorio, knew what Anderson was doing in the circle, but that wasn't easy.

Longorio struck out nine Petrolia batters and gave up six hits in the shutout.

Lindstrom walks in winner as Brewers beat Astros

MILWAUKEE (AP) — Houston's Matt Lindstrom had been perfect in save opportunities this season, but the Milwaukee Brewers forced him to extra innings and snapped that streak.

Rickie Weeks walked with the bases loaded to force in the winning run in the 10th inning to give the Brewers a comeback 4-3 victory over the Astros on Thursday.

Casey McGehee poked a leadoff single into right off Lindstrom (1-1), who had converted 22 straight save opportunities dating to last season, including his

first ten in 2010. After Corey Hart flew out to right and George Kotaras walked, Alcides Escobar hit a liner to left to load the bases for pinch-hitter Randy Wolf, who struck out Weeks, whose throwing error in the sixth gave the Astros their third unearned run and a 3-2 lead, walked on a 3-2 pitch.

"You don't really want to make your money by beating Lindstrom in the ninth inning because he's pretty darn good," McGehee said. "But, Escobar had a great at-bat leading off the in-

ning with a single, not trying to do too much. Rickie had two great at-bats, I thought against him, getting the two big walks, obviously."

Coming in, Lindstrom had walked only four batters in 19 games.

"I was trying to make pitches, picking a little bit and just missing, getting into hitter's counts," said Lindstrom, who hadn't allowed a run in his previous 13 outings. "But today all those guys today was unacceptable. I just got to do a better job of getting ahead."

Trailing 3-2, the Brew-

ers tied the game at 3 in the ninth off Lindstrom, who walked three and allowed four hits.

Escobar led off with a single to left, advanced on a sacrifice by pinch-hitter Craig Counsell and took third on a wild pitch. After Weeks walked, Carlos Gomez ripped a single down the third base line that scored Escobar and pushed Weeks to third. Lindstrom kept it tied by striking out Ryan Braun and retiring Prince Fielder on a deep fly to right.

"They got those timely hits when they needed

them," Lindstrom said.

Rookie John Axford (1-0), the fifth reliever used by manager Ken Macha, pitched a scoreless 10th for his first victory.

The loss spoiled a strong performance from Brett Myers, who allowed two runs on seven hits in six innings. He has now gone at least six innings in each of his 10 starts this season.

"Brett pitched a great game today for us," Lindstrom said. "It fell back on my shoulders. I didn't get it done. I'm

Busch-Hamlin dispute seems far from settled after on-track altercation

CONCORD, N.C. (AP) — Just as Kyle Busch settled into a chair in the media center Thursday, someone dropped a package in front of him.

It was a FedEx box. That's Denny Hamlin's NASCAR sponsor. Busch smiled, opened it up and found a pair of boxing gloves inside.

Busch initially shrugged off the gag that came five days after his on-track altercation with Hamlin in the All-Star race at Charlotte Motor Speedway, but then sounded like he might consider going a round or two with his Joe Gibbs Racing teammate. If so, Hamlin is ready.

Ding, ding.

"Kyle brings this stuff on himself, and he gets mad at the media for asking him questions about his blowups," Hamlin said. "But he does it to himself. I don't want to be part of it. Any drama that he wants to create is on him. Anything he says on the radio is on him."

"All I'm going to say, and I'm going to be done with it, is that each year I think Kyle's going to grow and he just doesn't. Until he puts it all together, that's when he'll become a champion, and right now he just doesn't have himself all together."

So much for playing nice, settling their differences in private and

preventing another Sprint Cup feud.

Although Busch insisted he and Hamlin have moved on from last weekend's incident, he didn't back down from radio chatter in which he threatened to kill Hamlin.

Any regrets? "Absolutely not," Busch said. "It was the heat of the moment and that's who I am and that's my expression and I am not going to be sorry for what I say. It's freedom of speech."

"I was frustrated. ... It was a saying that is said a lot, and take it for what it's worth. ... It wasn't joking, but it wasn't going to happen. It wasn't meant (like I was going

to kill him). With what? With my great looks?"

Busch sure looked intent on doing some damage Saturday night.

Busch attempted to pass Hamlin for the lead with 10 laps to go in the non-points race, but Hamlin blocked him high and forced him into the wall.

A few laps later, Busch blew a tire and crashed. He responded by lashing out at Hamlin, threatening him over his team radio and then confronting him at Hamlin's hauler after the race.

Team owner Joe Gibbs stepped in and calmed Busch down. Busch ducked reporters afterward, making his media session Thursday his

first reaction to the melee.

"Of course I was heated after the incident," Busch said. "It surprised me and I wouldn't have expected my teammate to race me that way, but he's the leader, he's got the race track and I now understand that."

Nonetheless, Busch said he was surprised to see his teammate racing him like everyone else.

Hamlin clearly had been briefed about Busch's reaction, and he was ready to throw down. He took shot after shot at Busch, and when it was over, he stood up and told reporters, "Y'all be nice to me. I lashed out. It's the new me, the new me."

That was one final parting shot at Busch, who earlier this month credited his calm demeanor during a race as being part of the "new Kyle."

Hamlin laughed at that notion back then and pretty much did the same Thursday, saying he expects more of the "old Kyle" down the road.

Hamlin also reiterated his position that Busch was at fault in the All-Star race.

"He just felt like I took his line away," Hamlin said. "His line, the guy behind me. I'm sorry. ... If I didn't think I could win, then maybe I

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Artest's miracle shot leads Lakers past Suns

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The Lakers' voluminous playoff lore is almost overstuffed with last-minute heroics. In the past decade alone, Robert Horry, Derek Fisher and — of course — Kobe Bryant have all hit dramatic, game-winning shots that will be remembered in Los Angeles for ages.

Ron Artest realizes he was an awfully unlikely candidate to join that list Thursday night in the final second of Game 5 of the Western Conference finals.

That's when the Lakers' only newcomer made everybody at Staples Center forget about his terrible game with an offensive rebound and a layup to beat the buzzer and the Phoenix Suns.

Artest banked home the winning shot after rebounding Bryant's missed 3-pointer, and the Lakers held off the

Suns 103-101 to take a 3-2 series lead in the Western Conference finals.

Artest's basket completed a 2-for-9 shooting night redeemed by one supremely heady offensive rebound that pushed the Lakers to the brink of their third straight NBA finals.

"I wasn't playing my game from the beginning," Artest said. "In the second half, I was finding my way a little bit, made some good passes and good steals and got some rebounds. So I guess that aggressive play can carry over into that last possession."

Game 6 is Saturday night in Phoenix, where the Lakers can clinch the chance to play for their 16th championship — or the Suns can hold serve in a series featuring five wins for the home team.

Bryant had 30 points, 11 rebounds and nine

assists for the Lakers. He also wrapped Artest, who scored just four points, in a jubilant bear hug after Artest homed in on Bryant's miss and threw up an unattractive shot.

It looked beautiful going through the net.

"It means a lot for him," Bryant said. "I think for him emotionally, it's a big boost. ... Once I released the ball, I saw Ron sneaking in. I was just hoping that he got it off in time."

Lakers coach Phil Jackson said he wasn't even sure why he had Artest in the game after the veteran forward missed consecutive open shots earlier in the final minute, drawing the ire of the home crowd with each brick.

"He has an uncanny knack of doing things, and sometimes it just works out," Jackson said. "He just has a knack for being around

crucial plays."

Jason Richardson banked in a straight-away 3-pointer with 3.5 seconds left to tie it for the Suns, who clawed back from an 18-point deficit in the second half. Phoenix got a superb game by Steve Nash, who had 29 points and 11 assists while fighting for the chance to go to his first NBA finals.

"Just when we thought it was OK, in overtime, we lose," Nash said. "So that's life. We have to take a lot of positives from tonight, and realize we have to go home and play well."

Derek Fisher scored 22 points and Pau Gasol had 21 points and nine rebounds for the Lakers, who rebounded from consecutive losses in Phoenix with their best defensive performance of the series, forcing 15 turnovers and holding Phoenix to its lowest point total since the

first round. The Lakers also improved to 8-0 at Staples Center in the postseason.

Lamar Odom had 17 points and 11 rebounds for the Lakers, who led 101-96 on his layup with 1:38 left before Nash hit a jumper and Artest missed twice.

"His whole method since we were small is, 'I'm going to outwork you,'" said Odom, who played AAU ball with Artest in their New York youth. "I'm going to bang you until you don't want no more." His stubbornness is the reason why he took that 3 — because he just missed one. That's part of his game. That's why he's a great player, and that's why he's a great defender. It's just something you have to live with."

Led by Nash's stirring second-half effort, the Suns hacked away at Los Angeles' lead

throughout the fourth quarter, relentlessly closing in on a road win. Phoenix trimmed its deficit to 95-94 when Nash converted a three-point play and then fed Amare Stoudemire for a layup that barely beat the shot clock with 2:52 left.

Stoudemire scored 19 points for the Suns, who had three looks at a 3-point shot in the final seconds. Nash and Richardson both missed, but Richardson then missed so badly that he banked it in from a long step behind the line.

"We just didn't quite finish the game," Suns coach Alvin Gentry said. "I have no complaints. They played great. We hung in. We did a great job against Kobe on the last shot, just didn't come up with the rebound. To me, it's a great effort by us, and they know we're not going to go away."

Celtics hope to avoid Bruins' fate, reach finals

BOSTON (AP) — It's a good thing for the Boston Celtics that the NBA rescinded Kendrick Perkins' technical foul and nixed his suspension.

He might be the only big man they have left to guard Orlando Magic center Dwight Howard.

Perkins was ejected from Boston's 113-92 loss to Orlando in Game 5 of the Eastern Conference finals on Wednesday night after picking up two technicals in the first half. The league rescinded one on Thursday, clearing Perkins to play in Game 6 when Bos-

ton tries for the third time to eliminate the Magic and advance to the NBA finals.

"We know what we haven't done, and what we need to do," Celtics coach Doc Rivers said Thursday. "I think we'll be ready to do it tomorrow night."

Even with Perkins, the Celtics will still be short-handed trying to slow down Howard, who has averaged 26 points and 13 rebounds in the last two games as the Magic twice avoided elimination.

Backup Glen "Big Baby" Davis was diagnosed with a

concussion after blacking out on the court from Howard's inadvertent elbow to his face in Game 5. Rasheed Wallace tweaked his back in the game and couldn't even sit down to watch film on Thursday.

Rivers said they are both gametime decisions. Reserve Marquis Daniels also sustained a concussion, and he has been all but ruled out for Friday night's game.

"Our mentality is: We just have to lace them up and go play," Rivers said. "We have a lot of bumps and bruises right now, but we'll be OK."

The Celtics need a victory Friday night to avoid a trip back to Orlando for a seventh game, where a Magic victory would make them the first team in NBA history to come back from a 3-0 deficit in a best-of-seven playoff series.

"I didn't like being in a 3-0 hole, but it's still doable. I don't think we've had a lack of belief," Orlando coach Stan Van Gundy said. "We can't go back and get those first three. ... I don't know why we didn't get at it, I don't know why we didn't play with the same type of energy in the first three

games. I really do not know."

Only four times in North American pro sports history has a team come back from a 3-0 deficit. But the Magic wouldn't even be the first to do it this month in Boston: The Bruins led the NHL's Eastern Conference semis 3-0 before the Philadelphia Flyers came back to advance — celebrating in the very same TD Garden locker room where the Magic dress.

"I would doubt that players would get affected by what happened in another sport," Van Gundy said.

heavyweight mud was able to push down the oil and gas coming up at great force from underground, but it has not overwhelmed the gusher or stopped the flow permanently.

President Barack Obama was scheduled to head to the Gulf for a briefing a day after he acknowledged that his administration could have done a better job dealing with the spill and that it misjudged the industry's ability to handle a worst-case scenario.

"I take responsibility. It is my job to make sure that everything is done to shut this down," he said.

Friday's trip will be the president's second to the coast since the BP-leased oil rig Deepwater Horizon exploded April 20, killing 11 workers and triggering the spill.

He will be briefed in Grand Isle, La., where the public beach has been closed since globs of oil started washing up a week ago. Buggie

Vegas, who owns Bridge Side Cabins and Marina there, said Obama needs to see the disaster for himself.

"I think he's going to get the message when he comes down and sees how bad it is," Vegas said.

The top kill is oil and gas giant BP PLC's latest untested bid to end a spill that has, by the most conservative estimate, surpassed the Exxon Valdez disaster by gushing more than 18 million gallons into the Gulf. It has worked on land but never been tried 5,000 feet underwater, and Hayward gave it a 60 to 70 percent chance of success.

He said Friday morning the top kill was progressing as planned and BP engineers had completed a second phase by pumping what he called "loss prevention material" into a crippled piece of equipment known as a blow-

out preventer to form a bridge against which crews could pump more heavyweight mud.

"Clearly I'm as anxious as everyone in America is to get this thing done," Hayward said.

BP said in a regulatory filing Friday that it has spent \$930 million so far responding to the ruptured well, including costs for cleanup and prevention work, drilling relief wells, and paying grants to Gulf states, damage claims and federal costs. BP says it's too early to quantify other potential costs and liabilities associated.

Two teams of scientists calculated the well has been spewing between 504,000 and more than a million gallons a day, which in the worst-case scenario means about 39 million gallons could have leaked.

The larger figure would be nearly four

times the size of the Exxon Valdez disaster, in which a tanker ran aground in Alaska in 1989, spilling nearly 11 million gallons.

The new Gulf spill estimates released Thursday were far higher than the 210,000 gallons that BP and the Coast Guard had guessed was pouring from the well.

But even the highest estimate would not make the spill the biggest ever in the Gulf. In 1979, a drilling rig in Mexican waters — the Ixtoc I — blew up, releasing 140 million gallons of oil.

Whatever sense of appropriateness they might have had a one time, had been replaced by attachment to symbols of their past. The caps stayed in place.

When the hymn books had been passed out to those who could hold them, I announced the page number of the first hymn, and the aides helped those who needed help finding the number. By this time, I was no longer hoping for participation. I just hoped to start the acappella singing in a key that was neither too high nor too low for my own voice.

To my surprise, several

strong voices chimed in as we sang "What a Friend We Have in Jesus" and "Sweet Hour of Prayer." Somehow the familiar words and tunes, written over a century ago, changed countenances. Frowns warmed into radiant smiles. Voices emerged from a generation that still views God and country as almost synonymous. The comforting songs transformed looks of confusion into looks of assurance. I was blessed.

The Bible speaks of the power of God's word: "So will My word be which goes forth from My mouth; It will not return to Me empty, Without accomplishing what I desire, And without succeeding in the matter for which I sent it" (Isaiah 55:11 NASB).

Contract Bridge

Bidding Quiz

How many points does the responder indicate by his rebid in each of the following three sequences?

Opener	Responder
1. 1♦	1♠
2♦	2 NT
2. 1♥	2♥
3♣	4♥
3. 1♠	1♦
1♠	3♠

1. Ten to 12 points. Two notrump in this sequence is strictly invitational. By bidding two diamonds, opener announced a hand of minimum opening strength (13 to 15 points) and a willingness to have the bidding stop if responder holds a weak hand.

If in these circumstances responder now bids two notrump, he is saying in effect that game — preferably in notrump — is still possible if the opener has maximum values for his two-diamond rebid (i.e., closer to 15 points than to 13). Opener may then pass two notrump or, with an appropriate hand, bid three clubs, diamonds, hearts, spades or notrump.

Typically, responder might have one of these hands:

- ♠J9763 ♥KQ6 ♦J4 ♠A85
- ♠KJ84 ♥AJ3 ♦Q2 ♠9862
- ♠K1098 ♥Q96 ♦Q73 ♠A104

2. Eight to 10 points. Responder's two-heart bid shows six to 10 points, including distributional values. When opener now bids three clubs, he is presumably trying to ascertain whether responder has minimum or maximum values for the two-heart bid, and he would like any close decision to be resolved by responder's club holding. Three clubs is forcing, and responder then indicates how good or bad his two-heart bid was by bidding game with a good hand or retreating to three hearts with a poor one. A jump to four hearts could be made with any of these hands:

- ♠10 ♥Q853 ♦108742 ♠KQ4
- ♠Q852 ♥K96 ♦9642 ♠K2
- ♠A963 ♥J754 ♦72 ♠Q104

3. Thirteen to 15 points. The jump-raise in spades shows four-card support and the values needed for game. (However, since many now play this bid as merely invitational, showing 11 or 12 points, you should discuss this with your partner.) As the opening bidder has not yet indicated whether he started with minimum or maximum values, it is helpful to him — for game or slam purposes — to know approximately what to expect from responder for the jump-raise. A typical three-spade bid might look like:

- ♠KQ62 ♥Q75 ♦AJ94 ♠108
- ♠A764 ♥93 ♦AK872 ♠74
- ♠AQ95 ♥64 ♦KQ953 ♠Q6

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Character vs. compromise

How does one live with true character in a world of compromise? How do we promote integrity and faithfulness, show humility, and practice kindness when there is so much compromise around us? It is only possible when we determine to hold ourselves to a higher standard and live with an assurance of who we are. Christ paid a supreme ransom for each of our lives, and they should be cherished and celebrated every day. Few things in life are as valuable as respecting our bodies. If we properly care

for our earthly temples, they will gracefully take us to a ripe old age. However, many do not give serious thought to the care of the body. As a result, some use their bodies as a paint pallet depicting obscene words and pictures. Others abuse their good health and then they want immediate solutions once problems arise. Attributes such as perseverance, truthfulness, endurance, prudence, loyalty, and reverence are all traits that give life an uncommon touch. They are priceless and lead to greatness of character. I learned two valuable lessons from a dear friend, the wife of a prominent doctor in the Los Angeles area, many years ago; the importance of taking care of the body, and the attitude we should have in doing so.

Peg, as I called her, was a college instructor. One of her most popular classes was called, "The Body Machine." The class was always filled with both male and female students. She taught them the value of honoring and respecting their bodies. She explained that practicing good character traits not only enhanced the body, but the personality, health, attitude, happiness, and thought patterns, as well. The body actually responds to goodness, just as it responds to pain. Honoring our bodies is one of the most rewarding gifts we can give ourselves. Treating ourselves well, giving consideration to our personal appearance, conduct, and spiritual lives are all beneficial. The more respect and care we give our bodies, the more positive results our bodies give back to us. I learned from my friend that she never allowed unkind words to come from her mouth. She said her mouth was created to bless, not to harm others. She spoke positive, adoring words over not only herself, but others also. She told me to always speak over my body what I wanted

to see happen. Her day started with prayer. She thanked God every day for her home, her health, and a clear mind. "These things," she said, "are like God's heating pad. They go deep into the spirit and warm the soul." Peg shared with me the importance of wisdom, and one of my favorite scriptures is, James 1:5, "If any of you lacks wisdom, let him ask of God, who gives to all liberally and without reproach, and it will be given to him." So how does a person receive wisdom from God? Simply by asking. Wisdom also comes when we read and meditate on the scriptures. God reveals His wisdom to those who inquire. Wisdom adds value and blessed years to our lives. Wisdom is one of our greatest attributes. The Bible is filled with practical truths warning against many things that can get us in trouble, such as co-signing a note, idleness, careless words, selfishness, dishonesty in business, and bad company, to name a few. The Bible provides principles of eternal truths which become the core values that govern our lives; principles like "...

seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all these things will be added to you." Peg told me that God must always come first. Gratefully, I learned this early in my spiritual life and have reaped many benefits for obeying this key principle. When we allow Him to be first, blessings come abundantly. We must be willing to stretch beyond all that we hold dear, go the extra mile, and smile when there is no smile in us. Radical blessings require radical change. So the question is, just how badly do you want it? Living in a society that seemingly has no absolutes, do we just follow the crowd? Not if we really want the blessed life. Good character defines us, sets us apart, marks us, and causes us to stand out in a crowd. It is the uncommon living among the common, not with a haughty or demeaning attitude, but with humility. As the scripture says, "We are in the world, but not of the world." We live our lives in ways that will point others toward the truth, the light, and the way — Jesus Christ. God bless.

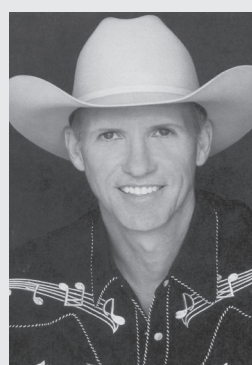

PUBLIC COMMENT/NOTICE AND COMMENT HEARING. Any person may submit written comments on the draft permit. Comments relating to the accuracy, completeness and appropriateness of the permit conditions may result in changes to the draft permit.

The purpose of the notice and comment hearing is to provide an additional opportunity to submit comments on the draft permit. The permit may be changed based on comments pertaining to whether the permit provides for compliance with 30 TAC Chapter 122 (examples may include that the permit does not contain all applicable requirements or the public notice procedures were not satisfied). The TCEQ may grant a notice and comment hearing on the application if a written hearing request is received within 30 days after publication of the newspaper

notice. The hearing request must include the basis for the request, including a description of how the person may be affected by the emission of air pollutants from the application area.
