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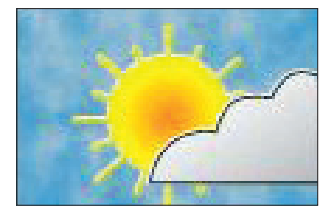

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Legends gets artsy... in a western way

Heritage Museum fundraiser is set for 6:30 p.m. Tuesday. RSVP by the end of the day Friday.

Eat some fish, win some art.

That's an overly simplified description of Heritage Museum's upcoming Legends and Legacies fundraiser, set for Tuesday evening.

The fifth annual event, the museum's largest fundraiser of the year, will begin at 6:30 p.m. at the patio area adjacent to the museum.

Tickets are \$30 per person and \$55 for couples and includes a fish fry, beer and

margaritas and an entry in a drawing for "Rodeo Kings," an original piece of art by Adam Hernandez featuring local rodeo legends Toots Mansfield, Quail Dobbs, Hoyle and Jody Nix and Wacey Cathey. Second prize is a framed, limited-edition print of the Hernandez work, third prize is a \$250 Visa gift card and fourth prize is a \$100 gift certificate redeemable at the museum gift shop.

Museum Director Nancy Raney asks that persons wishing to attend the event RSVP to the museum by no later than Friday afternoon.

"This is our major fundraiser of the year," Raney said. "This helps the operations at

Gulf residents seeing red

GRAND ISLE, La. — The reefs that David Walter makes for anglers to drop into the Gulf of Mexico are fake, but his frustration as he tries to win compensation from BP for lost income is real.

State regulators stopped issuing permits for the reefs on May 4 because of the oil spill,

effectively killing off \$350,000 in Walter's expected business. It sent him into a labyrinth of archived invoices and documents lost by BP. Finally, an offer came: \$5,000.

"I said that's not fair be-

cause if you say that, then I have to go out of business and I lose everything," said Walter, whose company is based in Alabama.

Fishermen, property owners and businesspeople who

have filed damage claims with BP are angrily complaining of delays, excessive paperwork and skimpy payments that have put them on the verge of going under as the financial and environ-

mental toll of the seven-week-old disaster grows.

Out in the Gulf, meanwhile, the oil company on Wednesday captured more of the crude that's been gushing from the bottom of the sea since April and began bringing in more heavy equipment to handle it.

The containment effort played out as BP stock

Ray Coleman, 89, of Big Spring, died Wednesday, June 9, 2010, at his residence. Funeral services will be at 10 a.m. Saturday at Midway Baptist Church with the Rev. Jim Binnix, pastor, officiating. Graveside services with military honors will be at 4 p.m. Saturday at Llano Cemetery in Amarillo.

continued to plunge amid fears that the company might be forced to suspend dividends and find itself overwhelmed by the cleanup costs, penalties, damage claims and lawsuits generated by the biggest oil spill in U.S. history.

In a federal filing Thursday, the company said the cost of its response to the oil spill has grown to \$1.43 billion.

BP tried to reassure investors before the London Stock Exchange opened Thursday, saying it was in a strong financial position and it saw no reason to justify the U.S. sell-off, and many analysts agree that the company can withstand the crisis.

Shares in BP plunged Thursday in early trading in London. The stock had dropped as much as 11 percent to a 13-year low at the opening as experts warned dividend payouts would likely be postponed. However, it recovered some ground by midmorning, trading 4.3 percent lower at \$5.47, as analysts suggested the sell-off was overdone.

Shrimpers, oystermen, seafood businesses, out-of-work drilling crews and the tourism

industry all are lining up to get paid back the billions of dollars washed away by the slick, and tempers have flared as locals direct outrage at BP over what they see as a tangle of red tape.

“Every day we call the adjuster eight or 10 times. There’s no answer, no answering machine,” said Regina Shipp, who has filed \$33,000 in claims for lost business at her restaurant in Alabama. “If BP doesn’t pay us within two months, we’ll be out of business. We’ve got two kids.”

BP spokesman Mark Proegler disputed any notion that the claims process is slow or that the company is dragging its feet.

Proegler said BP has cut the time to process claims and issue a check from 45 days to as little as 48 hours, if the necessary documentation has been supplied. BP officials acknowledged that while no claims have been denied, thousands and thousands had not been paid by late last week because the company required more documentation.

At the bottom of the sea, the containment cap on the ruptured well is capturing 630,000 gallons a day and pumping it to a ship at the surface, and the amount could nearly double by

next week to roughly 1.17 million gallons, said Coast Guard Adm. Thad Allen, who is overseeing the crisis for the government.

A second vessel expected to arrive within days should greatly boost capacity. BP also plans to bring in a tanker from the North Sea to help transport oil and an incinerator to burn off some of the crude.

The government has estimated 600,000 to 1.2 million gallons are leaking per day, but a scientist on a task force studying the flow said the actual rate may be between 798,000 gallons and 1.8 million. A task force member said an estimate come Thursday or Friday.

Crews working at the site toiled under oppressive conditions as the heat index soared to 110 degrees and toxic vapors emanated from the depths. Fireboats were on hand to pour water on the surface to ease the fumes.

Allen also confronted BP over the complaints about the claims process, warning the company in a letter: “We need complete, ongoing transparency into BP’s claims process including detailed information on how claims are being evaluated, how payment amounts are being calculated and how quickly claims are

being processed.”

The admiral this week created a team including officials from the Federal Emergency Management Agency to help with the damage claims. It will send workers into Gulf communities to provide information about the process. He also planned to discuss the complaints with BP officials Wednesday.

Under federal law, BP is required to pay for a range of losses, including property damage and lost earnings. Residents and businesses can call a telephone line to report losses, file a claim online and seek help at one of 25 claims offices around the Gulf. Deckhands and other fishermen generally need to show a photo ID and documentation such as a pay stub showing how much money they typically earn.

To jump-start the process, BP was initially offering an immediate \$2,500 to deckhands and \$5,000 to fishing boat owners. Workers can receive additional compensation once their paperwork and larger claims are approved. BP said it has paid 18,000 claims so far and has hired 600 adjusters and operators to handle the cases.

The oil giant said it expects to spend \$84 million through June alone to compensate people

for lost wages and profits. That number will grow as new claims are received. When it is all over, BP could be looking at total liabilities in the billions, perhaps tens of billions, according to analysts.

BP stock dropped \$5.45, or 16 percent, Wednesday — easily its worst day since the April 20 rig explosion that set off the spill and killed 11 workers. In the seven weeks since then, the company has lost half its market value.

The latest slide came after Interior Secretary Ken Salazar promised a Senate energy panel to ask BP to compensate energy companies for losses if they have to lay off workers or suffer economically because of the Obama administration’s six-month moratorium on deep-water drilling. In an interview Thursday on ABC’s “Good Morning America,” Louisiana Sen. Mary Landrieu reiterated her call to end the moratorium, saying it will cause economic hardship in the region.

“Every one of these 33 deep-water wells employs, directly, hundreds of people and indirectly thousands,” she said.

Not everyone had complaints about the

claims process. Bart Harrison of Clay, Ala., filed his first claim on Wednesday morning for lost rental income on his coastal property and expected to have a check for \$1,010 within a few hours. The only documentation required was tax returns and rental histories for his units, which were both easy to provide.

“The guy I talked to was knowledgeable and respectful,” Harrison said. “It seemed like he really wanted to write a check and please me since it was my first time in.”

Amen

Politicizing education, really?

When I was a boy growing up in my native Cuba, communist ideology suddenly began to be filtered into my education. The government had determined that, like all other Cuban children, I was to be indoctrinated.

Lesson plans were to be altered; new books had to be written; history needed to be distorted; and Cuban children were to be taught to believe that “Yankee imperialists” were our new enemies — the reason for all our problems.

Back in fourth and fifth grades, I probably was too young to notice these curriculum changes on my own. But my mother, Lilia, who was a teacher, made sure that I noticed.

She had seen the changing lesson plans, refused to implement them and come to the conclusion that no one was going to turn her into an indoctrinator and me into a communist.

We had to leave Cuba, she told me, and move to a country where political ideologies are not allowed to creep into children's education.

Memories of those days — when my mother convinced the entire family that we had to emigrate to the United States — have kept coming back to me recently as I've watched the Texas State Board of Education's efforts to rewrite American history and filter political ideology into the state school curriculum.

Of course, in Texas, the ideology is not communism. It's the other extreme!

In Texas, a panel of elected politicians has unapologetically revised the social studies and history curricula to reflect the majority's Christian/conservative ideology in the textbooks that some 4.8 million Texan schoolchildren will read for the next decade. And because schoolbooks used by many other states are usually based on the standard set by Texas, the politicized lessons will be widespread.

Voting 9-5 entirely along party lines, the Texas State Board of Education last month went along with the Republican majority and crafted new curriculum standards that surely would have made my mother cringe. She was politically conservative and a devout Christian, but until she died in Miami in 1998,

she never believed politicians of any faith or ideological persuasion should be dictating school lessons.

Yet for the next 10 years, the textbooks read by children in Texas and many other states will play down the importance of Thomas Jefferson while elevating the stature of Commie-bashing former Sen. Joe McCarthy. I'm a rabid anti-communist, but McCarthyism was an abomination. I never thought I would see such misguided distortion of history — not again, not since I left Cuba.

Their problem with Thomas Jefferson stems from the fact that evangelical Christians detest the very thing that made him a genius: Jefferson's participation in pioneering the legal theory of separation of church and state.

He coined that phrase!

Yet students now will be needlessly reminded that the words “separation of church and state” — although part of our judicial language — are not in the U.S. Constitution. In an appalling attempt to weaken one of the pillars that have sustained our great democracy, students will be asked to question the Founding Fathers' commitment to church-state separation.

And so, because Jefferson still stands in the way of the theocracy they would like to create, the principal author of the Declaration of Independence and one of the key thinkers behind our precious Constitution is no longer to be considered an influential political philosopher in world history courses.

Claiming to be reversing what they see as liberal bias in the classrooms and textbooks and ignoring fierce protests from outraged historians and educators, the board's conservative majority proposed hundreds of amendments to skew the standards that had been drafted for more than a year by educators. Some conservative board members said that they belong to a political body and that they had no qualms about making political decisions as they revised the state school curriculum.

They filtered conservative ideology into many lessons, downplaying the importance of the civil rights movement while propping Newt Gingrich's “Contract With America”; citing the “conservative resurgence of the 1980s and 1990s”; recognizing the roles played by Phyllis Schlafly, The Heritage Foundation, Moral Majority and the National Rifle

Association; requiring students to read the speeches of Confederate President Jefferson Davis along with those of Abraham Lincoln; and recognizing country music as a significant cultural movement but denying the same recognition to hip-hop.

The children in Texas also will be taught not that we live in a “democratic” country, but a “constitutional republic.” And they won't be reading about “capitalism” because some board members disliked that word's negative connotation. Now they will learn about “free market enterprise.”

If it weren't so sad, it would be funny.

Amazingly, they wanted to go even further. Some of them wanted to rename the slave trade the “Atlantic triangular trade,” as if trying to minimize the inhumanity of slavery.

In a state where conservatives have tried to prevent children from learning about gay rights, Darwin's theory of evolution and global warming, where evangelicals constantly have tried to ban books they feel are too liberal or anti-Christian, this is not entirely surprising. Unfortunately, politics have a history of creeping into Texas education.

Yet this time, the changes are more dramatic and more ideological than ever. This time, the aim is to brainwash — Cuban-style indoctrination — to promote a right-wing agenda.

In spite of Texas' huge Hispanic population and rich Hispanic history, efforts by the board's Hispanic members to cite more Latino figures as role models were mostly rejected, causing Latina board member Mary Helen Berlanga to storm out of a meeting and charge that “they can just pretend this is a white America and Hispanics don't exist.”

When these revisions were being made, even U.S. Education Secretary Arne Duncan felt compelled to warn that school officials “should keep politics out” of curriculum debates.

“We do a disservice to children when we shield them from the truth, just because some people think it is painful or doesn't fit with their particular views,” Duncan said in a statement. “Parents should be very wary of politicians designing curriculum.”

I know that feeling. I learned it from my mother.

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Complacency is the real problem

Due to frustrations about the endless wars in Iraq and Afghanistan as well as the country's continued bleak economic situation, being an incumbent officeholder has become a dicey proposition. No matter what you stand for, if you're currently a governor or a Congressman, you're in trouble because you're an insider and thereby part of the problem.

Office-seekers use this anti-incumbency fever to paint their foes as “fat cats” who know nothing of the plight of the common man.

Of course, no matter how rich or privileged these wannabe senators, representatives and governors are, they are not already in office, so they claim, they must be better than those who are.

Those seeking office using the incumbents stink argument always pledge to “clean things up,” “end patronage,” “reduce government waste” and do things entirely differently. If only we put them in the power seat then they would be free to correct the many wrongs which their opponents were entirely responsible for.

The exact same sentiment hit a few years ago due to anger with then President George W. Bush. The anti-incumbency fever resulted in a bunch of Republicans getting swept out and a bunch of Democrats getting voted in.

And, as we have seen, this “new” batch of legislators, governors and eventually, a new president, have changed exactly nothing.

Incumbent or not, the people we keep voting into office all come from the same cloth and simply changing the party in control of any one branch of the government does little to actually change anything.

If we want change, then as voters, we must stop getting swept up in the mania of anti-incumbency fever and party loyalty.

Instead, we should look at each legislator, governor and presidential candidate and consider their actions, not merely their words.

It's easy to talk about change and say you are different, but as voters we should be smart enough to look beyond a 30-second campaign commercial. If a candidate's ad says he supports creating jobs in America, but the company he runs has shifted jobs overseas, then, well, we should be able to recognize a fraud for a fraud.

Campaign staff, media experts and poll results can tell a candidate what to say. It's not hard to

deliver the right message — in fact a candidate would have to be a fool to not know exactly what message the public wants to hear — but words should not mask past actions.

As voters, we get what we deserve, because we allow soundbites, headlines and campaign commercials to shape our opinions.

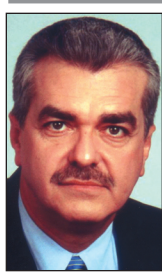
Even when learning the truth would take minimal digging, we prefer to simply keep rearranging the deck chairs as our ship sinks and somehow we are surprised when we get wet.

We have many good members of Congress and a number of good governors. It's foolish to toss the baby out with the bath water simply because we have decided that incumbency invalidates whatever record an officeholder has built.

In looking at incumbents and potential office-holders, the voting public must consider whether the person attempts to actually do what they say.

No one man can make Congress bend to his will (though many have tried) but there's a major difference between not being able to get your agenda through and abandoning your ideals.

News in brief

U.S. and allies get toughest sanctions against Iran

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — The United States and its allies won approval for the toughest U.N. sanctions against Iran for refusing to negotiate on its suspect nuclear program — but they're not the "crippling" penalties U.S. Secretary of State Hillary Clinton vowed to pursue a year ago if U.S. attempts to engage Iran diplomatically failed.

The big question now is whether the new sanctions will somehow persuade the Iranians to suspend their fast-expanding uranium enrichment program and sit down at the negotiating table with the U.S., China, Russia and other major powers who have offered a package of incentives if they do.

Three previous rounds of sanctions failed to get the Iranians into talks and Iran's President Mahmoud Ahmadinejad dismissed Wednesday's fourth round as "annoying flies, like a used tissue."

The Security Council first imposed limited sanctions in December 2006 and has been ratcheting them up in hopes of pressuring Iran to rein in its nuclear program. Iran has repeatedly defied the demand and has stepped up its activities, building a clandestine nuclear enrichment plant at Qom, enriching uranium to 20 percent, and announcing plans to build new nuclear facilities.

The latest sanctions were approved by a vote of 12-2, with Lebanon abstaining and Brazil and Turkey voting "no."

Suicide attack on Afghan wedding party kills 40; suspicion falls on Taliban

KANDAHAR, Afghanistan (AP) — A suicide bomb ripped through a wedding party for a family with several members in the police force in the Taliban's heartland in southern Afghanistan, killing at least 40 people

and wounding dozens more, officials said Thursday.

The blast occurred late Wednesday in a housing compound where men had gathered during the festivities, with female guests at a different house that was not hit, one witness said. Interior Ministry spokesman Zemer Bashary said children were among the dead and wounded. The groom was injured, but both he and the bride survived.

The family that was attacked included a number of Afghan police officers. The groom's brother and two of his cousins were in the police force, according to another cousin, Mohammad Alkozay.

The attack occurred in Nadahan village in the Argandab district of Kandahar province, considered the spiritual home of the Taliban, and the focus of an upcoming major U.S. military offensive.

Bashary said the explosion hit the wedding party about 9 p.m., and that it was a suicide attack. He said at least 40 people were killed and 74 were wounded in the blast.

Peru police give Van der Sloot murder case to prosecutors

LIMA, Peru (AP) — Joran van der Sloot's confession in the murder of a 21-year-old woman — allegedly smashing her face and strangling her — was so complete that police decided there was no need to take him to the crime scene for a walkthrough, according to Peru's criminal police chief.

The case against the young Dutchman, who also remains the lone suspect in the Natalee Holloway missing-teenager case, goes to prosecutors Thursday so they can file formal charges, said the official, Gen. Cesar Guardia.

"We've practically closed the case," he told The Associated Press. "He's confessed with a wealth of details that have been corroborated through criminal investigative rigor."

Guardia denied any suggestion that

Van der Sloot's confession was forced. He said a translator assigned by the Dutch Embassy was present, as was a state-appointed defense attorney.

If tried and convicted on murder charges, Van der Sloot would face from 15 to 35 years in prison.

Pro-business VVD party claims win in Dutch elections

AMSTERDAM (AP) — The pro-business VVD party claimed victory in Dutch elections early Thursday, as voters in the Netherlands continued a Europe-wide shift to the political right and rewarded parties that pledged to cut government spending and discourage immigration.

"It appears as if for the first time in our history the VVD has become the largest party in the Netherlands," would-be prime minister Mark Rutte told chanting supporters in the seaside town of Scheveningen.

With 96.5 percent of votes counted, Rutte's party led left-leaning Labor by 31 seats to 30 in the 150-seat parliament, a result that spelled weeks and possibly months of haggling between the two to fashion a ruling coalition.

Voters also gave a major boost to the anti-Islam Freedom Party of Geert Wilders, which scored its best-ever finish with 24 seats.

The Dutch swing to the right follows that of voters in Britain, who ousted the long-governing Labor Party last month, Germany and earlier in France. Nationalist and anti-immigrant parties have been gaining force even in the traditionally open-door countries of Scandinavia.

Senate to vote on move to stop EPA from regulating greenhouse gases

WASHINGTON (AP) — In the absence of congressional action on climate change, the Senate is heading toward a much-watched vote on whether the Obama administration should be allowed to go ahead with regulations curtailing greenhouse gas emissions from power plants and other major polluters.

The Republican-led measure coming to a vote late Thursday would stop the Environmental Protection Agency from carrying out rules to regulate carbon and other greenhouse gases under the Clean Air Act.

At least four Democrats have indicated their support for the legislation, and the vote is expected to be close. The measure will produce the most important vote this year on the climate change issue and is seen as a test of where lawmaker sentiments lie.

The White House on Tuesday said President Barack Obama would be advised to veto the bill if it ever reaches

his desk. The bill, it said, "would undermine the administration's efforts to reduce the negative impacts of pollution and the risks associated with environmental catastrophes, like the ongoing BP oil spill."

Teams from across Oregon joining search for missing 7-year-old boy

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — Investigators who have searched for six days for a missing 7-year-old Oregon boy without success are turning to experts from across the state to assist in the expanding effort.

The search has been slowed by the rough terrain surrounding the rural Skyline Elementary School, where 7-year-old Kyron Horman was reportedly last seen after a science fair by his stepmother on Friday morning.

Several storms have crossed the area, drenching searchers who called off their efforts on Friday night but have been working nearly 24 hours a day since.

On Wednesday, an experienced search and rescue expert said time is a factor in the search.

Minutes later, a trickle of raindrops segued into a deluge that blew through the area.

South Korea says rocket carrying observation satellite believed to have exploded in flight

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — South Korea says a rocket that it sent into space Thursday carrying an observation satellite is believed to have exploded in flight.

Minister of Education, Science and Technology Ahn Byong-man says officials believe the two-stage Naro rocket operated normally for 137 seconds after liftoff from the country's space center.

But then communications with the rocket were lost.

He says: "We believe that the Naro rocket exploded."

Carrie Underwood wins two CMT Music Awards

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — The fans love Carrie Underwood and they proved it again during the CMT Music Awards.

The former "American Idol" champ won Wednesday night's top honor, video of the year for "Cowboy Casanova," and CMT performance of the year for "Temporary Home" two months after making history by winning her second Academy of Country Music Awards entertainer of the year. Both awards are chosen by fans tuned into the live shows.

She was the night's only multiple winner.

An Error of Convenience

North dealer.

Opening lead — five of clubs.
Regardless of the caliber of the game you play in, one truth remains constant: Many more points are lost on easy hands than are lost on difficult ones. This is because complicated hands that require great skill are relatively rare, while the everyday garden variety that require no special skills come up all the time.

Consider this case where South wound up in three notrump and West led a club. Declarer won the jack of clubs with the ace and immediately led a spade to the jack, losing to the king.

South won the club return and cashed the A-Q of spades. When the suit didn't break evenly, he tried a diamond finesse. Unfortunately, West produced the king and cashed three clubs for down one.

It cannot be denied that declarer ran into a few bad breaks along the way — two finesses lost, the spades didn't split, and the opposing clubs were divided 5-3. However, the fact is that he went down on a hand where making at least nine tricks was an absolute certainty.

South failed because he attacked the wrong suit at the outset. Had he won the opening club lead, crossed to dummy with a heart and tried the diamond finesse first, he could not have made less than four diamond tricks, two clubs, two hearts and a spade for his contract. Indeed, he could just as easily have assured nine tricks by leading a low diamond from his hand at trick two, conceding a trick to the king.

Declarer's error was essentially an error of convenience. Because he had to win the opening club lead in his hand, it was much more convenient to try the spade finesse first than it was to cross to dummy and try the diamond finesse.

The reason for South's failure on this relatively straightforward deal was, sad to say, simply a matter of laziness.

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Barnes drafted by Tampa Bay Rays in 48th round

Howard College pitcher Blake Barnes heard from a familiar voice when the Tampa Bay Rays drafted him with the 1,451st overall pick in the 48th round during the last day of the Major League Baseball Draft on Wednesday.

"It's funny because coach J-Bob (Thomas) at Howard called me first and let me know and after that, I just got a bunch of calls coming in, everybody congratulating me. It was a fun ordeal."

Now that the experience of waiting to get that call is over, Barnes, and fellow Howard College pitcher Burch Smith, have big decisions to make.

The conclusion of the MLB Draft left two Hawks taken by MLB teams. Smith was drafted by the Cleveland Indians — the same team that drafted him in 2009 — with the 600th overall pick in the 20th round Tuesday.

But it's not that easy of a decision to bolt for

rookie ball.

Smith is signed to play Big 12 baseball with Oklahoma and Barnes is expected to go about 85 miles north of him at Oklahoma State.

Similar to Smith, Barnes' decision to go back to school probably rests on what he can do in the Texas Collegiate League this summer and the negotiations that follow.

Barnes also said the opportunity to play Big 12 baseball for another season and have a chance to go higher in next year's draft might be too good to pass up.

Smith and Barnes' story almost sound identical. The two played at Tyler Robert E. High School, were on the Howard College national championship team and now they may cross paths once more.

"Me and Burch have been on the same team since senior year, we won the national championship together and then I signed at OSU, he

Signs point toward Nebraska joining Big Ten Conference

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — Nebraska could be on its way to the Big Ten by Friday.

The university's Board of Regents on Wednesday evening amended the agenda for its previously scheduled Friday meeting to include a briefing from chancellor Harvey Perlman and athletic director Tom Osborne on conference alignment. The regents then could vote to leave the Big 12.

Osborne said a decision has not been finalized, and he declined comment when asked whether the Big Ten had formally invited Nebraska to join the league.

Shawn Watson, the sports coordinator for Nebraska's football team, said Osborne hasn't given the athletic department staff an in-

dication which way the school will go.

Watson said Osborne met with the staff last Friday to tell them about last week's Big 12 meetings and to "get a feel" for what the staff thinks about the Big 12 and Big Ten.

Since then, Watson said, Osborne hasn't updated the staff on developments.

The university issued a statement Wednesday night to counter media reports that regents met informally Wednesday and had already agreed to a move to the Big Ten.

Officials, however, do want a quick resolution on the future of the Huskers' athletic programs, whether that means staying with sev-

Finally!: Chicago Blackhawks win Stanley Cup after 49-year drought

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — There was no red light, just Blackhawks flying over the boards in celebration.

Sticks and helmets were thrown, scattered all over the ice and still no signal for a goal.

After a brief review, there was no dispute — the Chicago Blackhawks were the Stanley Cup champions.

Patrick Kane sneaked the puck past Michael Leighton 4:06 into overtime and stunned Philadelphia to lift the Blackhawks to a 4-3 overtime win in Game 6 on Wednesday night

for their first championship since 1961.

No one but the Blackhawks appeared to know what was going on for a few frozen moments. Kane and his linemates seemed the only players on the ice who knew the puck found the side of the net. The goal light never went on, but that didn't stop most of the Blackhawks from storming the ice and mobbing each other in celebration.

Kane will go down as scoring one of the biggest goals in team history.

"I was just hoping to God it

was just an actual goal," said captain Jonathan Toews, the Conn Smythe Trophy winner as playoff MVP. "They came back hard in the third and we just stuck with it."

Kane raised his arms right away and skated behind the net, knowing the goal was good. While the Flyers sat on the bench in stunned silence with confused looks, the Blackhawks began to celebrate in their own end around goaltender Antti Niemi.

"I knew it went in right away," Kane said. "What a feeling. I can't believe it. We

just won the Stanley Cup. I can't believe this just happened. ... It's something you dream about, scoring the final goal in the Stanley Cup finals."

Before reaching the group hug, Kane stooped to pick up some loose ice shavings — looking like a mischievous kid on Christmas ready to throw a snowball in the backyard.

"There's so many great things about winning a Stanley Cup. This is it," Toews said. "This is the best feeling you can ever get. I just can't

believe it's happened."

Toews was first to touch the Cup, taking it from commissioner Gary Bettman and hoisting it above his head in triumph. Marian Hossa, whose last two attempts at a title were denied the last two years with Detroit and Pittsburgh, was next. He lifted it and bench-pressed the big trophy, snapping his head back in exhilaration.

"I'm so happy I finally did it," Hossa said. "We couldn't just put our heads down. We had to work, and we knew we could do it."

The TCEQ may grant a notice and comment hearing on the application if a written hearing request is

received within 30 days after publication of the newspaper notice. The hearing request must include the basis for the request, including a description of how the person may be affected by the emission of air pollutants from the application area. The request should also specify the conditions of the draft permit that are inappropriate or specify how the preliminary decision to issue or deny the permit is inappropriate. All reasonably ascertainable issues must be raised and all reasonably available arguments must be submitted by the end of the public comment period. If a notice and comment hearing is granted, all individuals that submitted written comments or a hearing request will receive written notice of the hearing. This notice will identify the date, time and location for the hearing.

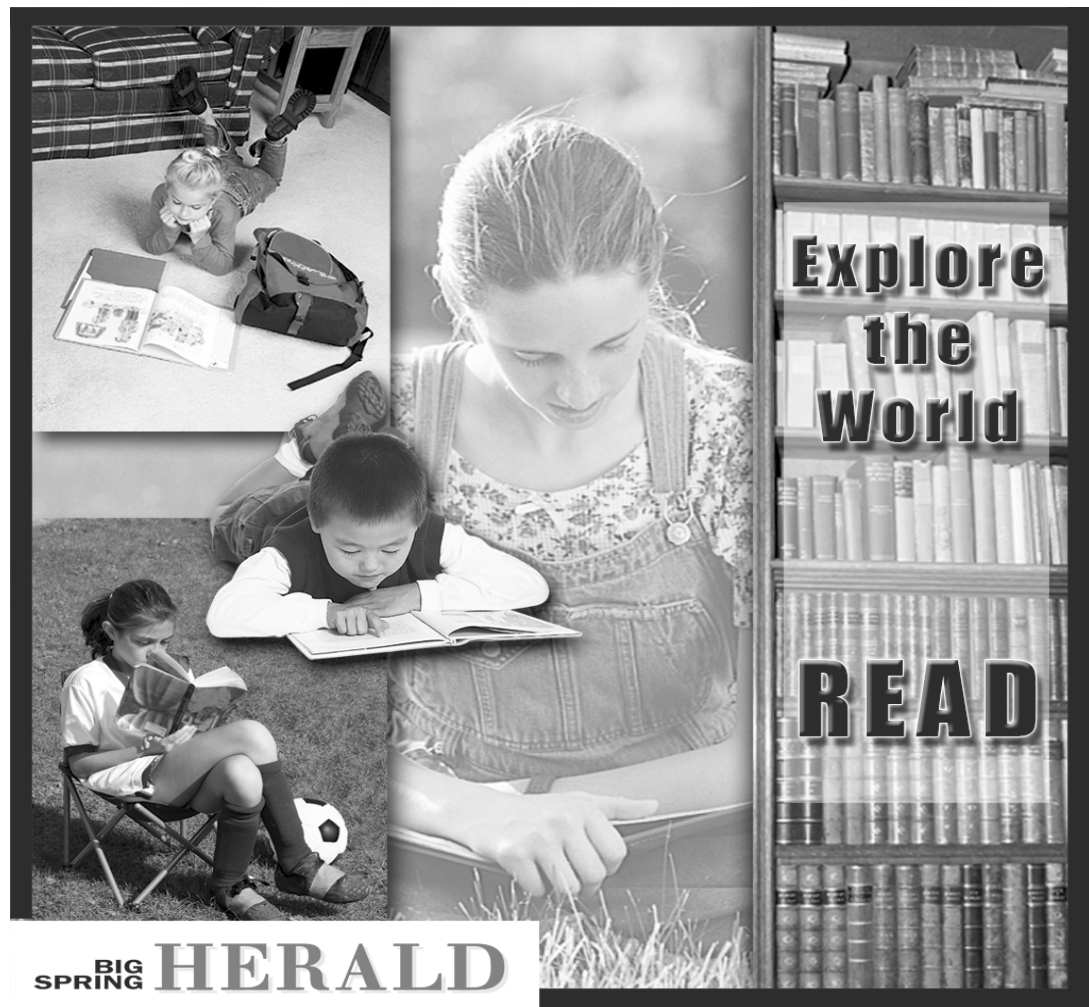

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Lee hits grand slam in 10th as Astros beat Rockies for 6-2 win

DENVER (AP) — Carlos Lee found a more authoritative way to beat the Colorado Rockies. For the second straight game, Lee delivered the game-winning hit for the Houston Astros. His grand slam with two outs in the 10th on the first pitch from Matt Belisle gave the Astros a 6-2 win Wednesday night. The victory was the seventh in nine games this month for the Astros.

"I just happened to run into it," Lee said. "Saw it on time and put a good swing to it ... I hit that ball good."

That's radically different than Tuesday night

when Lee drove in the game-winning run by flaring a broken-bat single into short left field with two outs in the eighth to give the Astros a 4-3 win.

Lee connected for his 15th career grand slam against Belisle, who had held Lee to one hit in 15 at-bats in their prior matchups.

"I wanted to come in on him, as if almost for a ball," said Belisle (1-3), who also was the losing pitcher Tuesday. "I was ready to throw a ball there and put an inner third strike, and we know he can do what he did to that ball. No excuse. Just didn't ex-

ecute a pitch. Put it in a guy's wheelhouse at a bad time."

Brandon Lyon (5-1) eased out of trouble in the ninth to earn the victory. The Rockies put two runners on base, but Carlos Gonzalez lined out to third baseman Pedro Feliz to end the inning.

Tommy Manzella led off the Houston 10th with a single and was sacrificed to second by pinch-hitter Cory Sullivan. Michael Bourn singled to short left field, and Manzella held at third. After Bourn stole second, Jeff Keppinger struck out, ending his 10-game hitting streak.

Rangers cruise past Mariners 12-2

ARLINGTON (AP) — Josh Hamilton said recently he wants the Texas Rangers' offense to have more of a killer instinct.

How about 15 hits and a season-best 10-run victory margin?

Hamilton kept rolling with a home run and three RBIs, giving him three homers and 10 RBIs in the last six games, and the Rangers went on to a 12-2 rout of the Seattle Mariners on Wednesday night.

"We had a big inning early, and then 'let's get another one, and another one after that,'" said Hamilton, who's on a 15-for-35 tear (.429) to raise his average from .281 to .304. "You don't want to let 'em back in the game."

Hamilton's two-run shot keyed a six-run burst in the second in-

ning against Ian Snell (0-5).

Michael Young homered and Vladimir Guerrero added three hits for the Rangers, 7-2 against the Mariners this season.

"We're swinging the bats really well over the last few weeks, doing what we're capable of doing," Young said. "If we keep improving on offense, we'll be in great shape at the end of the year. We're having good at-bats, working good counts, and finding ways of putting runs across."

C.J. Wilson pitched seven effective innings for the Rangers.

Wilson (5-3) took advantage of the early run support. He overcame a shaky first inning, and allowed two runs and four hits overall.

"I was just trying

to throw strikes and cruise," Wilson said.

Seattle has lost five of six.

The Mariners took a 2-0 lead in the first on consecutive RBI doubles by Jose Lopez and Josh Wilson.

But Snell couldn't protect the edge in the bottom half as Texas tied it on Young's solo homer and Guerrero's RBI double.

"I have nothing but confidence in our team scoring runs," Wilson said. "When (Young) hits a homer right away, you know it's going to be one of those days and we'll be OK."

Texas broke away in the second with Hamilton's homer and RBI singles by Young, Ian Kinsler and Guerrero. Another runner scored on Snell's wild pitch.

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signed at OU. I mean, biggest rivals in the Big 12," Barnes said. "I think it's funny because we were talking, what if we both got picked by the same big league team? But I'm excited for the guy."

Time is on the Hawks' side. MLB teams have until Aug. 16 to sign its draftees.

The Hawks' sophomore outfielder Joe Leftridge also was expected to get strong consideration from MLB teams this year, but 2010 was a different story.

Howard College baseball coach Britt Smith said Leftridge got calls from the Seattle Mariners, but the opportunity to play at school looked better than what Seattle was offering.

Leftridge was drafted

in the 27th round last year as the 808th overall pick by the Atlanta Braves.

"Every school I've called is interested in him as a player," Britt Smith said. "We'll just have to see where his best option is. Because we called a couple different levels, some Division II schools, some NAIA schools and it'll just be a matter of trying to get him the most options on the table so he can make the best decision for him."

Even though some of these players might decide to go to school, Howard College has had their presence felt in the MLB Draft the last two years.

In 2009, Runey Davis went to the Chicago Cubs in the 12th round as the 380th overall selection. Hunter Hill went in the 13th round as the 409th overall se-

lection last year to the Rays.

Britt Smith also pointed out former Hawks Matt Curry and Zach Neal went in the 16th and 17th round, respectively. Curry, who is at TCU, went to the Pittsburgh Pirates and Neal, who plays at OU, went to the Florida Marlins.

Interestingly enough, both players are playing the Super Regionals in the 2010 Men's College World Series.

"That's just a credit to coach Britt and the coaching staff at Howard," Barnes said. "I picked Howard simply because of the amazing coaching. Coach Britt brings players in and he gets them where they need to be, to have the best opportunities they can find. That's what he did for me."

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eral longtime rivals in the Big 12 or leaving for the Big Ten.

"The conjecture and all the intensity surrounding it is not positive," Regent Jim McClurg said of the impending decision. "Everybody needs to know and has a right to know. The calamity and opportunity that's conjured up by not knowing sometimes exceeds reality, so I think it's important to get a decision done."

The Big 12 reportedly has given Nebraska and Missouri a Friday deadline to affirm their com-

mitment to the league.

The Big Ten announced late last year it was considering adding at least one school, and possibly more, to allow for a lucrative league championship game in football and broaden the reach of its cable television network.

Based on 2009 figures, Nebraska would double the amount of money it receives from conference distributions in the Big Ten. Big Ten schools received about \$20 million a year in revenue compared with the \$10 million Nebraska took in from the Big 12.

If Nebraska abides by the Big 12's "good faith" provision in the league bylaws, the switch

would take effect in 2012-13. An institution that withdraws from the Big 12 loses 50 percent of the revenue it would have received from the Big 12 during those two years. A school could lose up to 90 percent of its allotment if it leaves sooner.

In a radio interview Tuesday, Osborne tried to quash speculation Nebraska would, in part, arrive at its decision based on its relationship with the University of Texas.

The Huskers and Longhorns have butted heads over many issues since the Dallas-headquartered Big 12 was formed, and there is a perception in Nebraska that Texas wields too much influence on league policies.

"We certainly don't have anything against anybody in the Big 12," Osborne said on the Husker Sports Network. "This decision is not going to be based on animosity or petty jealousy."

"I mean, you're talking about something that could maintain for the next 75 or 100 years. This is a big deal in terms of the University of Nebraska (and) this is a big deal in view of many other institutions."

Former Oklahoma coach Barry Switzer, a coaching rival of Osborne's in the 1970s and '80s and longtime friend, said hearing Nebraska and the Big Ten in the same sentence doesn't sound right.

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
