Barr: Volunteers needed to save fair

Howard County Fair officials want to bring the event back in 2011. To that end. they are calling for the public's support.

the 2010 county fair, which was to be held in September.

"One of the problems is the people on the board pour so much of their time and energy into the fair each year. and we're at a point where no-

body else wants to step up to the plate," County Fair Board President Mark Barr said last week. "You have the same people, year after year, working to put the fair on, and they are pretty much exhausted."

Whether the fair's cancellation is a one-year-only happening or a permanent state of affairs depends on a muchneeded infusion of new blood, Barr said. To that end, the fair board is putting out the

call for volunteers to help resurrect the event in 2011.

"We're looking for volunteers to help us bring back the fair," Barr said. "We need people to help with basically all aspects of the fair operation. There's a lot of parts to it — working with the booths,

Hinojosa acquitted

A 118th District Court jury acquitted a Big Spring man

Tuesday of indecency with a child charges in connection with a 2005 incident in Howard County.

Orr represented the state during the trial, while Big Spring attorney Don Richard defended Hinojosa.

"Personally, I'm disappointed by the verdict," Orr said. "But I understand that the jury had a difficult job ... and we have to take their decision and go on. But I believe the case needed to be prosecuted and that's what we did."

FISD warily eyes property valuations

Forsan Independent School superintendent District's doesn't expect major changes to the district's budget this coming fiscal year.

School district trustees will meet Monday evening to begin hammering out details for the 2010-2011 budget, which Superintendent Randy Johnson believes will be largely

we're not expecting anything huge," Johnson said. "We're expect-

ing our Robin

Johnson referred to is the money FISD must pay out for being considered a "property rich" district under state education financing guidelines. This year, the district had to pay out approximately \$1.25 million to help equalize funding between Texas school districts.

But what most concerns Johnson is the state of the district's property valuations. Because of agreements with

three wind farm consortiums that were signed three years ago, part of the value of those farms will be going off the tax rolls this year. Those agreements stipulated that the businesses would have a certain percentage of their property exempted from taxation over an eight-year period. In return, the businesses would return 40 percent of their tax savings back to the school district.

This is the first year of those agreements in which a significant portion of the wind farm property will be exempt from district property taxes, Johnson said.

"Under the agreement, those firms would pay taxes on the full value of their property for the first two years. In the third year, part of that valuation goes off the tax



DC Democrats returning fire from Texas Gov. Perry

AUSTIN (AP) — Republican Gov. Rick Perry has started a multitude of battles with Washington, D.C., over the years. Lately, Democrats in the nation's capital are showing they can return the fire.

In the past two weeks, President Barack Obama's administration overturned Texas' air permitting program for refineries and petrochemical plants, and U.S. House Democrats put controls on how the state can spend \$800 million in federal education money.


U.S. Rep. Lloyd Doggett of Austin, who pushed the spending restriction, said state lawmakers had perpetrated "a massive abuse of what was intended" with federal stimulus funds. And EPA regional director Al Armendariz called the permitting system "seriously flawed."

A defiant Perry called the moves obviously political and took the opportunity to jab right back.

"I'm worried, I'm concerned, any time someone is more interested in partisan politics than they are in what's in the best interest of our state," he told The Associated Press.

Texas'longest-servinggovernor has slapped at Washington over federal spending, border security, health care, national school standards and other issues. Over the past year, with the rise of the tea party movement and his bid for a third full term under way, Perry positioned himself as a champion of states' rights.

Democrats seem to be paying more attention to his anti-Washington rhetoric now that he has a legitimate Democratic opponent. They deride him for flirting with the notion of secession and for trying to use his differences with federal officials to score points in his race against Democrat Bill White — all while delighting in his newfound national attention.

Perry's "Washington-boogeyman narrative doesn't live up to the facts," said Democratic National Committee spokesman Ricardo Ramirez, noting that the governor accepted billions in federal stimulus money to balance Texas' budget in 2009 even while scolding Congress and the Obama administration over stimulus spending.

A White House spokesman declined to comment on the subiect.

Besides opposing the federal health care overhaul and proposed cap-and-trade climate legislation, Perry has criticized the federal government's legal challenges to state laws, including Arizona's immigration crackdown — though he disagrees with the major provision of that law.

He regularly complains about federal efforts on U.S.-Mexico border security. When Homeland Security Secretary Janet Napolitano called to see how Texas was

faring before the landfall of Hurricane Alex, Perry needled her about border issues - then commented that she seemed "a little testy."

Those close to Perry say he's held his anti-Washington views for years, even when he was a Democrat and once took part in a farmers' union protest in the nation's capital. But his feud with the feds is accelerating.

"This fight has raised his profile," said Eric Bearse, a former Perry aide and GOP consultant.

Perry easily defeated U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison in the Republican primary, largely by linking her to big spenders in Washington. So as the November election nears, his attacks on Washington will likely focus even more on White, a deputy energy secretary under former President Bill Clinton.

"I think it's all calibrated" by Perry's political team, said consultant and lobbyist Bill Miller, whose firm donates campaign money to Perry through its political committee. "They've clearly identified something that works for him."

White accuses Perry of talking about Washington so he can avoid his Texas record.

"Maybe he thinks that every he time he says the words President Obama and what he does you will forget what he did when he betrayed the farm bureau," White told the Texas Farm Bureau last week, referring to legislation the group favored that Perry killed.

Perry said that charge by White dumbfounds him, and he won't stop using his bully pulpit. He contends the Environmental Protection Agency decision was imposed by a "radical environmentalist" answering to the upper echelons of the Obama White House. And he called the spending restriction a cheap shot by Doggett, who "doesn't give a tinker's damn about Texas."

Local man found dead in residence

A Big Spring man was pronounced dead at his home in the 1300 block of Sycamore Wednesday evening after police officials say he suffered a self-inflicted gunshot wound to the head.

Brandon Martin, 24, was pronounced dead at his home by Justice of the Peace Benny Green shortly after his body was discovered by family members.

According to Big Spring Police Department reports, Martin's grandparents arrived at his home at approximately 7:10 p.m. Emergency responders were on the scene moments later, but were unable to revive Martin.

"The grandparents said Martin was distraught because his common-law wife had left him," said BSPD Lt. Terry Chamness. "He suffered a single gunshot wound to the head from a shotgun. No autopsy has been planned."

Roy Rogers' stuffed horse Trigger sold to Nebraska TV station

NEW YORK — A Nebraska cable TV network ponied up \$266,500 for Roy Rogers' stuffed and mounted horse, Trigger, at an auction in New York City on Wednesday.

The movie cowboy's faithful companion was bought by the cable company RFD-TV in Omaha, Neb., at a Christie's auction of items from the now-closed Roy Rogers and Dale Evans Museum in Branson, Mo.

Trigger's sale price outpaced the estimated \$100,000 to \$200,000 it was expected to fetch, with many other items also selling far above estimate.

RFD-TV's chief financial officer Steve Campione says Rogers reflects the company's values. The network airs mainly agricultural, equine and country living programming.

The company's owner, Patrick Gottsch, wanted to buy the whole Rogers collection but didn't have time to work out the deal, Campione said.

"It came to our attention a little too late," Campione said. "By the time we lined up the right financing and kind of got our arms around the value of the collection, it was literally 24 hours ago."

Auctioneer Cathy Elkies said it was the "most colorful, emotional and sentimental" sale she had experienced in her 20 years at Christie's.

BP works to fix valve on cap that could choke off oil leak

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — BP engineers working to choke the flow of oil into the Gulf of Mexico found a leak on a line attached to the side of the new well cap and were trying to fix it Thursday before attempting to stop the crude.

BP said Wednesday evening it had isolated the leak and was repairing it before moving forward. It wasn't clear how it would affect the timing of the operation, or whether oil continued to be slowly closed off into the cap.

Work started earlier Wednesday after a day-long hiatus to allay government fears that the disaster could be made worse by going forward with the tests to determine whether the temporary cap can withstand the pressure and contain the oil. It was the best hope yet of stopping the crude from streaming into the water for the first time since the April 20 explosion on the Deepwater Horizon rig that killed 11 people.

The process began with BP shutting off pipes that were funneling some of the oil to ships on the surface so the full force of the gusher went up into the cap. Then deep-sea robots began slowly closing, one at a time, three openings in the cap that let oil pass through. Ultimately, the flow of crude will be blocked entirely.

All along, engineers were watching pressure readings to learn whether the well is intact. The first two valves shut off like a light switch, while the third works more like a dimmer and takes longer to close off. The leak was found in the line attached to the dimmer switch, but live video footage showed that oil previously spewing from other sources on the cap remained closed off.

U.S. homes lost to foreclosure on track to eclipse '09 levels

LOS ANGELES (AP) — More than 1 million American households are likely to lose their homes to foreclosure this year, as lenders work their way through a huge backlog of borrowers who have fallen behind on their loans.

Nearly 528,000 homes were taken over by lenders in the first six months of the year, a rate that is on track to eclipse the more than 900,000 homes repossessed in 2009, according to data released Thursday by RealtyTrac Inc., a foreclosure listing service.

"That would be unprecedented," said Rick Sharga, a senior vice president at RealtyTrac.

By comparison, lenders have historically taken over about 100,000 homes a year, Sharga said.

Argentina legalizes same-sex marriage with Senate vote

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP) - Argentina legalized same-sex marriage Thursday, becoming the first country in Latin America to grant gays and lesbians all the legal rights, responsibilities and protections that marriage brings to heterosexual couples.

After a marathon debate, 33 lawmakers voted in favor, 27 were against it and 3 abstained in Argentina's Senate in a vote that ended after 4 a.m. Since the lower house already approved it, and President Cristina Fernandez is a strong supporter, it now becomes law as soon as it is published in the official bulletin.

The law is sure to bring a wave of marriages by gays and lesbians who have increasingly found Buenos Aires to be more accepting than many other places in the region.

The approval came despite a concerted campaign by the Roman Catholic Church and evangelical groups, which drew 60,000 people to march on Congress and urged parents in churches and schools to work against passage.

Cardinal Jorge Mario Bergoglio said "everyone loses" with gay marriage, and "children need to have the right to be raised and educated by a father and a mother."

Gunmen kidnap 5 Afghan health workers in Afghanistan's south

KABUL, Afghanistan (AP) – Gunmen kidnapped five Health Ministry employees in the volatile southern Afghan province of Kandahar while police elsewhere said they had killed a Taliban commander, officials said Thursday.

Bombings, gunbattles, assassinations and abductions have been increasing this year as thousands of American troops partnered with Afghan forces fan out in the insurgents' southern strongholds to try to wrest back control and establish effective local government.

Members of a medical team were abducted while returning to Kandahar city, the provincial capital, after visiting a project in Maiwand district, provincial spokesman Zulmi Ayubi said Thursday.

The gunmen forced the car to stop about a mile (two kilometers) outside Maiwand and abducted two doctors, a pharmacist, a nurse and their driver, Ayubi said.

The kidnappers were not identified, but Taliban insurgents have been on spree of assassinations and abductions of government workers.

EASY CHICKEN POT PIE

4 boneless/skinless chicken breasts

- 2 small bags of frozen mixed vegetables
- 2 frozen deep dish pie shells

1 box of non-frozen pie crust, located by cookie dough/ biscuts

instant potatoes small onion, diced Mrs. Dash or veg supreme - McCormick garlic powder 2 bay leaves olive oil 2 tbls stick butter Salt and pepper to taste

Preheat oven at 350 degrees. In large pot, place chicken, bay leaves, a few shakes of garlic powder and six cups of water. Bring to a boil on med/high and cook about 15 minutes.

While chicken is cooking, place both frozen pie shells on a large cookie sheet and poke several holes all around with a fork. Place in oven for about 10 minutes or until light brown. Remove from oven and leave oven on. Turn burner to low, remove chicken to plate and cool.

Pour water into a microwave safe dish and save for little later. Remove bay leaves and place back into pot. Place pot back onto burner and turn to med/high. Add a couple of splashes of olive oil and butter. Add onions and let cook about 3 minutes.

Add both packages of frozen vegetables and your veggie seasoning, about 3-4 shakes. Add salt and pepper to taste. Stir well and cook for about 10 minutes stirring often.

Meanwhile, dice up cooked chicken and add when veggie mixture is heated through. Take out bay leaves!

Add about 4 cups of the chicken water and bring to a boil. Add a half cup of instant potatoes and cook for 2 minutes. Keep adding 1 tbls of instant potatoes at a time until desired thickness, cooking 1 minute between each added spoon. This makes a great thickener and still gives flavor.


When completed, pour into both pie shells. This makes exactly enough to fill them up so there is nothing left over. Unroll the non-frozen pie crust and place on top, sealing around edges. Cut a couple of slits in the middle with a knife and cook until golden brown, about 10 minutes. Enjoy!

Rangers prepared for second half Texas holds biggest division lead in majors

ARLINGTON (AP) — The Texas Rangers are in bankruptcy and up for auction. They went into the All-Star break after being swept at home by the worst team in the majors.

No longer is it a certainty that Nolan Ryan, the Hall of Fame pitcher and team president, will become a co-owner. And yet the Rangers are having arguably their best season ever. On the field.

Even with the off-field drama and that ugly four-game series last weekend against Baltimore, the Rangers (50-38) are $4\frac{1}{2}$ games ahead of the Los Angeles Angels in the AL West. That is the largest lead in any of baseball's six divisions coming out of the break.

"I've been through every possible twist and turn," said Michael Young, the longesttenured Ranger in his 10th season. "A lot of unknowns and a couple of rebuilding processes, and now here we are. It's just time to go on the field, be loose and have some fun."

Texas opens a four-game series at Boston on Thursday, then goes to Cleveland before coming home to play the Angels.

The 50-year-old franchise, which moved from Washington to Texas in 1972, has never won a playoff series. The Rangers have had only two winning seasons since their last playoff appearance

in 1999.

That dreadful history and the ongoing bankruptcy case related to the stalled sale of the team, which now includes a scheduled Aug. 4 auction, don't seem to affecting their play on the field.

"What I sense is a confidence," manager Ron Washington said.

Ryan before the season said he expected the Rangers to win at least 92 games. Texas is on pace to win at least 98, and now has coveted All-Star left-hander Cliff Lee in the starting rotation.

"Now it's on us. It's on us," Washington said, repeating with emphasis. "I don't think we can cry for anything else. ... There were expectations pectations on us."

Despite financial uncertainty, general manager Jon Daniels last week pulled off a six-player deal to add Lee from Seattle. The pitcher who twice beat the Yankees in last vear's World Series while with Philadelphia, appeared headed to New York.

Instead, Texas got him three weeks before the non-waiver trading deadline.

The Rangers had already gotten from San Francisco veteran catcher Bengie Molina, whose three playoff trips includes a World Series title with the Angels in 2002.

"We might have a little more confidence in ourselves," All-Star second baseman Ian Kin-

on us. Now there's really ex- sler said. "We have guys that have been to the playoffs, have been to the big stage that are big parts of the team and that helps. But we understand we have a long way to go."

Lee made his Texas debut in a complete-game 6-1 loss to the Orioles on Saturday night, when he threw 73 of 95 pitches for strikes. His next start is Saturday at Boston, which puts him in line to start the series opener against the rival Angels.

The newly acquired pitcher was one of six players wearing Rangers uniforms during Tuesday night's All-Star game. Sluggers Josh Hamilton (.346, 22 home runs, 64 RBIs) and Vladimir Guerrero both were AL starters.

NBA preparing for lockout soon

Steinbrenner's impact on baseball goes beyond New York Yankees

NEW YORK (AP) -George Steinbrenner's impact on baseball went far beyond his New York Yankees.

He showed all teams that spending lavishly on players — when done intelligently — was a way to produce winners, and even some of his rivals adopted that strategy. And he revolutionized the game with his decisions to start a television network and a catering company, and a huge equipment supply contract.

"Regardless of what one's personal opinion is, and obviously he was a close friend, his impact was historical," agent Tom Reich said Wednesday, a day after the colorful and controversial owner died of a heart attack at age 80.

"There are many aspects of the system that wouldn't exist without what he was able to do with the Yankees, not only as a team but as a brand and a business conglomerate. And that changed the financial topography of the game."

Steinbrenner headed a group that bought the Yankees in January 1973 for \$8.7 million the YES Network and net and turned it into a large business valued at \$1.6 billion by Forbes.

Since his health began to decline after the 2003 season, power shifted to Steinbrenner's children and the team's management.

Hal Steinbrenner, the younger son, became managing general partner in November 2008. Hal runs the business for himself, older brother Hank and sisters Jessica and Jennifer.

Team president Randy Levine oversees the finances of the Yankees,

Legends Hospitality. Goldman Sachs has interests in the television and food companies, and the Dallas Cowboys co-own the catering business.

Lonn Trost, the team's chief operating officer, is in charge of the franchise's day-to-day business affairs, and general manager Brian Cashman consolidated authority over baseball personnel decisions when he agreed to a three-year contract in December 2005, a deal followed by another

agreement in 2008.

In the second season of \$1.5 billion new Yankee Stadium, New York has unrivaled resources. The Yankees won their seventh World Series title under Steinbrenner's ownership last season, their first since 2000. A \$206 million openingday payroll was \$43 million higher than that of any other team, and the fruits of that spending shows. The Yankees' 56-32 record at the All-Star break is baseball's best, and they placed a high eight players in the All-Star game.

"The team's not for sale," said Levine "The Wednesday. succession had been planned and implemented. Yankees fans can expect the team to be run as it has been based on the vision of the Boss as carried out by his family."

The defenders scored only their two aces and the king of hearts.

In the normal course of events, you are a defender half of the time and either declarer or dummy the other half of the time. It follows, therefore, that a player cannot expect to be successful without becoming a

competent defender. **To defend well** is not always easy, though; in fact, there are times when it is extraordinarily difficult. For example, take this deal where West got off on the right foot when he led the heart jack in an effort to find his partner's long suit.



The contract should have been defeated, however. East missed the opportunity for a fine play. He should have ducked the jack of hearts at trick one (signaling with the nine) instead of winning the trick with the king. Had he done that, the defense would have scored three heart tricks as well as its two aces

East should assume that West has precisely J-10-x of hearts. If that is West's holding, taking the first trick with the king may prove fatal, since East needs the king as an entry to his hearts after the queen and ace are gone and he no longer has the ace of diamonds. When West later gains the lead with the ace of clubs, his heart return sinks the contract.

It may be argued that ducking the jack of hearts would be a losing play if declarer had only Q-x. This is true enough, but that argument is not sound because it credits West with J-10-x-x — and with that holding, West would lead fourth-best initially rather than the jack.







Previewing baseball's second half

(AP) — When Oakland outfielder Rajai Davis heard the Texas Rangers had acquired Cliff Lee from Seattle late last month, he reacted the same way as many others around baseball did.

"They're trying to make a real run, huh?" Davis said. "They're not playing around."

The Rangers may be in the middle of a messy ownership change that includes a rancorous bankruptcy proceeding, but that didn't stop them from making the first major splash before the July 31 nonwaiver trade deadline. Texas added Lee to a team that will carry a 4½-game lead in the AL West into the second half

of the season, which begins Thursday.

The Rangers are looking for their first playoff appearance since 1999, and adding Lee to a formidable offense lets everyone know they're serious. Lee was 4-0 with a 1.56 ERA in five postseason starts last year for the Phillies. But more importantly, he was 2-0 against the mighty New York Yankees in the World Series.

So who will be the next team to make a move?

The Los Angeles Angels are looking to add a big bat to stay in contention with Texas, and the AL Central-leading Chicago White Sox have similar designs.

"The probability of big guys

moving at the deadline is always a risky proposition to try to handicap," Angels manager Mike Scioscia said. "Things can change from week to week.'

One thing we do know is that the winner of the National League pennant will have homefield advantage for the World Series, after the NL beat the American League 3-1 on Tuesday night for its first victory in the All-Star game since 1996.

With tight races everywhere and the powerful Yankees playing for something bigger than just another title, buckle up for what is shaping to be a wild ride over the next few months.

Here's a look at some of the keys to the rest of the season:

MOTIVATED YANKEES: The Yankees steamrolled into the All-Star break with 30 victories in their final 44 games, looking every bit the favorite that they usually are.

The defending world champions may not even need to make a move after getting all the extra motivation they needed when longtime owner George Steinbrenner died this week.

Alex Rodriguez shared a story about a handwritten note Steinbrenner had delivered to him in 2004 that read "I'm counting on you" with capital letters and exclamation point.

"So I think to this day, we are still playing for him, not to let him down," A-Rod said.

TIGHT RACES: No team is running away with anything right now. The biggest lead in any division is the Rangers' $4\frac{1}{2}$ games over the Angels in the AL West.

A few of the more intriguing races:

—AL East: Arguably the three best teams in baseball - the Yankees (56-32), Rays (54-34) and Red Sox (51-37) are fighting for the title and likely the AL wild card. The Atlanta Braves (52-36) are only other team in baseball with a better record.

-lowing a meeting of the league's board of governors.

The union was alerted to that projection last summer, but Hunter contends revenues turned out to be much higher than anticipated - though deputy commissioner Adam Silver said expenses were up, too.

"Part of the problem with the existing system is it's based largely on revenue, not net revenue," Silver said Monday. "Although our actual revenue numbers were better than what we projected, it came at a large cost. Our teams did a spectacular job in a down economy of increasing ticket sales, but that came at the cost of additional promotions, additional marketing, additional staff."

Hunter was already

wary of the league's projections after it warned its teams last July that next season's salary cap could fall as low as \$50.4 million. It was set last week at \$58.0 million. even higher than this season's.

"Clearly it causes us some concern, causes us to question their numbers," Hunter said.

Hunter said the players will offer their interpretations of the league's finances at the next bargaining meeting. He said he hasn't heard anything from the league since the union submitted its proposal for a CBA earlier this month.

Stern said that proposal basically embraced the current system, but the league believes changes are necessary and the teams that spent freely during free agency did so because it was the only way they could win. Hunter disagrees, saying owners want a system where they

can spend and "receive guaranteed profits unlike any other industry in America."

Stern also said the higher-than-expected cap didn't mean things were better than they were a year ago, but Hunter points to huge increases in season ticket sales in New York, New Jersey, Chicago and Charlotte as proof otherwise.

And since he said player salaries were down by about 1 per-

cent this season, he still maintains the best way for the owners to get the help they need is from each other.

The union is calling for expanded revenue sharing among teams, with Hunter noting that a group of small-market owners recommended it to Stern a couple of years ago. Stern has said it will come after the agreement with the players, but Hunter said it should come as part of the deal.
