Howard College receives Oncor incentive



Howard College will be awarded an incentive check from Oncor's Take A Load Off, TexasSM Educational Facilities Program (EFP). The district will receive \$80,200 for upgrading the energy efficiency of the air conditioning system at its central plant.

In addition to financial incentives, the EFP provided no-cost technical

new systems offered maximum efficiency. The air conditioning

equipment installed by Howard College will save about 433,390 kilowatthours of electricity per year, equivalent to preventing the carbon dioxide

emissions of more than 35,000 gallons of gasoline, according to Environmental Protection Agency calculations. "The Educational Facilities Pro-

gram has helped our school and our community by saving taxpayer dollars and improving district facilities," said Terry Hansen, the college's executive vice president. "It's important that we set a positive example for our students, and reducing our energy use is a critical step."

The EFP worked with the district to involve personnel from all departments in the decision-making process so that everyone understood the financial benefits of investing in the projects. Hansen said that aspect of the program is "vital because it guarantees that the financial decision makers understand the long-term advantages of utilizing the equipment and therefore can justify investing in energy efficiency upgrades."

according to Salvation Army officials.

Paula Lafler, a social worker with the local Salvation Army, said the the program has gotten off to a good start, but the hot weather is far from over.

"Anvone that has spent any length of time here in West Texas can tell you we still have plenty of summer — and hot weather — still to come," Lafler said. "We have such a long summer season, that's one of the reasons the fan drive is so important." According to officials with the National

Weather Service office in Midland, thermometers will begin taking aim at a three-digit temperature this week, with high temperatures expected in the mid 90s through Thursday.

Lafler said she knows full well the summer is far from over and it's just a matter of time before the mercury once again rises.



U.S. House wacky singling out Texas

aybe the Democrats in the U.S. House were just feeling giddy last week on the eve of the holiday weekend. Maybe wacky would be a better word. Or maybe they knew what they were doing Thurs- note, it is not a crime to fail to

day when they passed an appropriations bill with provisions that would require Texas and Republican Gov. Rick Perry to jump through hoops required of no other state or governor for a share of \$10 billion in education funds.

The best explanation for their behavior may be that they sought to embarrass Perry because this year, he refused to apply for a share of \$4.35 billion in federal economic stimulus money dedicated to President Barack Obama's Race to the Top education reform program.

But their ham-handed effort can only embarrass themselves. And in the process they have lobbed a softball that Perry can knock out of the park as part of his continuing campaign to depict Washington as an out-of-control, power-hungry monster.

The way the legislation came about is wacky enough — but in fairness to Perry, fairly typical in the nation's capital.

HR4899 started out in March as the \$6 billion Disaster Relief and Summer Jobs Act of 2010. It was passed by the House, but in the Senate it morphed into a \$45.5 billion supplemental appropriations bill that includes \$37.12 billion to continue the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan.

When the bill went back to the House, Democratic leaders added \$10 billion aimed at saving teachers jobs in the face of state budget problems nationwide. The House inserted more money for Pell Grants to college students, border security, innovative-technology energy loans, schools on military installations, Gulf Coast oil spill cleanup, emergency food assistance and a new soldier processing center at

Wait; rewind that part — \$10 billion to save teach-

Could it be relevant that teacher unions have been major Democratic Party supporters? And to echo Perry's point, what happens after the federal money is gone?

Requirements for participation in the teacher jobs program go completely off track. The idea is to give grants for states to pass on to public school districts to retain, recall or rehire teachers or add teaching

For every state but Texas, if the governor doesn't apply for a grant, Education Secretary Arne Duncan can step in and give grants directly to local

All that's necessary is that he determine that in 2011 the state is "likely" to retain the same level of support for education, both in dollar amounts and as a proportion of state revenue, that it had in 2009.

Good teachers are worth far more than their weight in gold, and more power to the federal government if it wants to help fund their jobs perma-

But it is not the place of Congress to tell Texas how to construct its state budget. Perry couldn't commit to anything about state spending in 2012 and 2013 if he wanted to. That's the Texas Legislature's job.

alifornia GOP gubernatorial nominee Meg Whitman has been taking a lot of heat for her voting record. Or nonvoting record. The former eBay CEO didn't register to vote in California until

2002. She failed to vote in the 2003 recall election. She didn't register as a Republican until 2007. Too bad Whit-

man didn't spend her business-bigshot years Down Under. In Australia, it's against the law for citizens age 18 or older not to

Ask Aussies about the system and they generally support it. The Australian government passed mandatory voting in federal elections after voter participation slipped to 59 percent in 1922 from an earlier high of 71 In recent years, about 95 per-

cent of Australian citizens have voted. Besides, some Australians will

vote if you are not registered.

For the vast majority of those who are enrolled but do not vote, it also is easy to get out of the fine — about \$20 for a first offense — by citing illness or another extenuating circumstance. Then there's the phenomenon known as "donkey voting" — or

just randomly ticking off names on the ballot. Call it a protest, call it lazy. The outcome is the **Brookings Institution Senior**

Fellow William Galston has proposed that America adopt the same system to increase voter participation. In the 2008 presidential election, 61.7 percent of eligible Americans voted, according to George Mason University.

I object.

For one thing, Washington should not coerce citizens by making them vote.

In a free country, those who do not wish to vote should be free to abstain. For another, if people are so ill informed as to believe their votes have no import, well, they're probably right.

And while there is no proving that higher turnout means more left-leaning votes, political scientists of both stripes tend to believe that mandatory voting delivers more votes to the left

than to the right. Again, quantity does not mean quality.

Even in Australia, even with compulsory voting, however, high-profile, big-money candidates with poor voting records can prevail. Peter Garrett you know, the tall bald singer from the rock band Midnight Oil — ran for office in 2004. At the time, he was forced to admit that for all his politically correct lectures and exhortations for political activism, he himself had not been on the federal election rolls for 10 years.

At the time, conservative Treasurer Peter Costello told the Herald Sun of Melbourne, "If you haven't been interested enough to have registered and voted in elections, it's a bit rich to ask other people to vote for you."



Whatever my reason, some might say my childhood job was to be the family informer. Sometimes I think I tattled because I was mad at one of my brothers, and I wanted to get him in trouble.

Of course, this particular brother usually did

something worthy of getting in trouble for. I just passed along the incriminating information.

Many children fear the label of rat, squealer, fink or blabbermouth, but there are things children should feel free and comfortable to tell.

Children may be embarrassed or ashamed of the inappropriate behavior someone has had toward them. Their confusion can make them hold their tongue when they should in fact tell what was done.

Sometimes our friends con-

keep and those that we need to share with another.

I had a young childhood friend who vowed me to secrecy about an adult's inappropriate behavior toward her. And I have to tell you that her secret was one I kept her entire life.

My friend passed on several years ago, but I'm still sad because she may have endured much pain and unhappiness, and I never did anything to stop

It had been so easy for me to snitch on my brothers. Yet I can't explain why I couldn't blab about my friend's experience to my mother or some other authority figure.

When I think back on all the tattling I did on my brother, I think that in fact, this brother was doing things that he shouldn't have been doing.

At the time I didn't understand why I needed to tell on him — that it wasn't to get him into trouble but to help him stop doing things that were harmful to his health.

Children need to be taught the difference between senseless tattling and a legitimate complaint or concern. As in many areas of our lives, an examination of our motives is paramount.

Is what we feel compelled to share something that affects ours or others' physical or

psychological safety? Is our mo-

tive with the intent to protect?

Is there an emergency — when

danger is imminent? When I was 11, I had a friend tattle on me that resulted in my suspension from school for three days. I don't think I ever thanked this friend for her brave actions. It was clearly her concern for my safety as well as that of others that she snitched. I was at first humiliated and angry.

But I can tell you now that her tattling completely altered my life. I was forced to make some needed changes that put me on a better path for the rest of my life.

If you have a child who never hesitates to keep you informed, don't discourage the line of communication. We don't want to teach our children to shut up.

The era of children seen and not heard has long ended. Let's teach our kids how to evaluate and process information so they know what's important and know how and when to tattle.

Your child may end up saving another child's life just like my friend saved mine.

The left-hander struck out a career-high 10 and the Rangers capitalized on the Red Sox throwing problems for a 4-2 win Sunday.

constant battle."

Wilson's last road victory came at Fenway Park in a 3-0 win on April 22. He had been 0-2 in five starts away from home since then.

"After being a closer a couple of years, I enjoy a little pressure in the ballgame," he said. "I've always enjoyed pitching here. The fans are into it. I've always enjoyed this mound."

Wilson contributed to the continuing hitting woes of the injury-depleted Red Sox,

who lost for the eighth time in 11 games. Dustin Pedroia, Victor Martinez, Jacoby Ellsbury and Jason Varitek are all on the disabled list.

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Everything was working for Paul Maholm on Sunday, including getting support from a suddenly potent offense.

Maholm pitched a three-hitter for his second career shutout and the Pittsburgh Pirates established a season high for hits for the second consecutive game, beating the Houston Astros 9-0 on Sunday.

Maholm (6-7) faced only two batters above the minimum in needing 103 pitches to throw his first complete game since April 27, 2008. His only previous shutout was against Houston April 24, 2007.

"Everything was good," Maholm said. "I

Oosthuizen takes British Open

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland (AP) — Louis Oosthuizen walked over the Swilcan Bridge toward a victory that was never in doubt Sunday at St. Andrews, another big moment in sports for South Africa.

This celebration, though, carried a different tune.

The drone of vuvuzelas, all the rage at the World Cup, was replaced by the skirl of bagpipes coming from behind the Royal & Ancient clubhouse. For the 27-year-old South African, the sound could not have been sweeter.

With a performance that rivaled the dominance of Tiger Woods at the home of golf 10 years ago, Oosthuizen led over the final 48 holes and blew away the field by

seven shots to capture

the British Open.

"To win an Open championship is special," Oosthuizen said.

"But to win it at St. Andrews ... it's something you dream about."

The timing could not have been better — one week after South Africa concluded a wildly popular World Cup, and the day Nelson Mandela celebrated his 92nd birthday

day.

"It felt a bit special, really," he said. "When I walked down 18, I was thinking about his birthday."



Today's Highlight in History:

On July 19, 1910, Dr. Hawley Harvey Crippen, whose wife, Cora, had disappeared from their London home, was arrested along with his mistress, Ethel Le Neve (posing as Crippen's son), aboard the steamship SS Montrose upon its arrival in Quebec, Canada. (Crippen was later convicted by a British court of murdering his wife and executed; Le Neve was acquitted of any involvement.)

back to Earth before crashing onto the lunar surface. In 1969, the American space probe Mariner 6 flew by Mars, sending back images of the

Red Planet.

In 1970, "The Huntley-Brinkley Report" came to an end after nearly 14 years as coanchor Chet Huntley signed off for the last time; the broadcast was renamed "NBC Nightly News."

In 1972, Democratic vice-

presidential candidate Thomas Eagleton withdrew from the ticket with George McGovern following disclosures that Eagleton had once undergone psychiatric treatment.


