

Castro County May Lead the Nation

Figures Claim Castro County Tops In Household Income

Castro County families, living in the center of a vast irrigated farm empire, were pointed out this week as having the largest average spendable household income in the nation.

According to the Standard Rate and Data Service, Inc. the average Castro County household income last year was \$11,173, based on final census figures.

County residents, who probably didn't know they were so well off, will be even more surprised to find how much they led Texas and the remainder of the nation. The national figure is \$6,417 per household and Texans average \$8,869 annually.

County farms have an average gross income of \$42,762 per farm annually.

The now prosperous farms of Castro County plant about 103,454 acres annually in wheat, about 175,893 acres in grain sorghum, and about 60,408 acres in cotton.

Castro County is continuing to grow, not only in population, but financially as well. The number of acres of grain sorghum in the county in 1959 was approximately 3 times as great as it was in 1940, and the cotton acreage in Castro County in 1959 was four times as great as it was in 1940.

The larger farms and the improved methods of farming have increased the county's income greatly. In 1940 there were only 27 farms in the county that had sales over \$10,000 and in 1959 there were 643 farms that exceeded this amount.

This was a remarkable increase, but there were 186 farms in the county that had sales over \$40,000 in 1959! Even the number of livestock has been on the steady increase for the past twenty years. In 1959 the average value of land and buildings on a farm in Castro County was \$135,307.

While the income of Castro County has been on the steady

increase, so has the population. During the past decade population of the county has increased by 64 percent, in 1960 the population of Castro County was 8,894, with rural population at 5,917. The population of the County, Dimmitt, has more than doubled in the past ten years.

The income of the entire South Plains area is higher any other area in the state. The average spendable household income of the area is \$6,172 as compared to the state average household income of \$5,869 annually. The national average spendable income is slightly higher than the South Plains

Lamar Farm Yields First Wheat To Be Brought To Dimmitt

Dimmitt's first load of wheat came into Castro County Grain Company on Wednesday about 5:45 p.m.

The 19,180 pound load of grain came from about 10 miles northwest of town on the Mrs. W. P. Lamar farm which is farmed by Roy Meacham.

The 60 pound wheat had 14 percent moisture content and it is expected that the crop will yield about 15 bushels per acre.

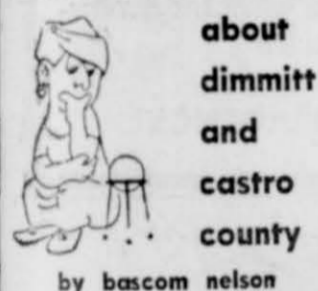
Baseball for 13-14 Year Olds To Be Organized

He came to Dimmitt in 1956 as head basketball coach, and since then he has captured four straight district championships. Ethridge has had 115 wins and 50 losses since he has been in Dimmitt.

He entered TCU in 1949 on a track scholarship, but his track and football career lasted only his freshman year. He started playing basketball and entered as a sophomore, becoming a starter for the next two seasons. He was voted the most valuable player in the conference tournament in his senior year as he was an All-Southwest Conference guard.

The five foot nine coach received his bachelor's degree from Texas Christian University, and his Master's degree from Boston University.

Ethridge played professional baseball in 1952 and 1955 with Shawnee in the Sooner League.

He was married on December 21, 1957, to the former Mitzi Wilson. They have one son, Robert Kirk.

First game will be Tuesday evening at 6 in the City Park. Present there are three teams with a game and a half each week. The three teams will alternate playing each other two night weeks. An Englishman at Easter: Terry Cracknell Studies Grain and Americans

When Terry M. Cracknell stepped off the train at Hereford recently he was all set to start absorbing all he could about the tremendous High Plains Grain Sorghum Industry.

But Cracknell, who is from Ipswich, Suffolk, England, stepped into a new world that has kept him engrossed, not only in grains, but in people who drive on the wrong side of the road, policemen who carry guns, and in drugstores that don't serve "coffee ice".

Mr. Cracknell's long trip to the United States actually started two years ago when his employer, Mr. J. Paul, president of R. and W. Paul's, an English grain importing firm, visited this country to see where and how sorghums were produced.

Early this year Mr. Paul gave Mr. Cracknell the assignment to travel to this country and study the grain business under the tutelage of Mr. Bill Waldrep of Community Grain Company of the Easter Community, as arranged by Messrs.

Peeler and Nelson of Grain Sorghum Producers.

What was his first impressions of this country? "Well", Mr. Cracknell says in his perfect staccato English, "You know, people over here drive on the wrong side of the road. It takes a while to get accustomed to this sort of thing. And the people speak so slowly that by the time they get to the end of the word the first syllable has almost been forgotten. But you know the directors of Community Grain. Its employees, customers and the many friends I have made simply spoiled me to such an extent that I almost feel more than at home. In fact, Mr. Ezra Norton of Hereford has literally opened his house to me for the whole five months of my projected stay here, and I feel completely overawed by his generosity and kindness. It is not often one has the privilege to come 4000 miles and live with such an obviously respected citizen and one who's knowledge of Hereford and district together with his fam-

ous cattle could not be bettered."

Since the 23 year old agriculturist has been in the United States he has met with some very amusing situations, such as the time a certain gentleman asked him why couldn't he speak English and Cracknell laughingly said, "being English I was under the impression that I could."

Before Mr. Cracknell was accepted by Seale Hayne Agricultural College in England, he had to get on the job training working on a private farm for eighteen months.

When Cracknell was talking about his future plans he said, "I would like a farm at some stage in my life as I am interested in the life together with management either in feeding stuffs or farming or both." He continued to say that the farms in England are small, from forty to sixty acres being the average.

While it seems that the young people in the United States become discouraged if they are not

twenty-five, in England, according to Mr. Cracknell, people are not usually considered properly experienced and they lack the proper nerve for the more difficult problems of life until they have reached the age of forty-five, in other words, to use a phrase common to Americans, in England a man is not considered "dry behind the ears" until he is forty-five.

According to Mr. Cracknell it appears that teenage marriages and divorces are much more common in the United States. In England a young man does not consider marriage, as a general rule, until he is financially and emotionally able to bear the various encounters of matrimony.

Mr. Cracknell enjoys almost all sports and he is apparently very skilled as he was awarded the Governor's Challenge Cup for the Best All Around Sportsman of the year in 1957. Cracknell's ability in sports was shown again when he won the Car Rally of 1958.

Cracknell's parents and brother live in Ipswich which is located eighty miles east of London. Mr. Cracknell's father is a Financial Officer of the Suffolk Hospitals.

Cracknell's seventeen year old brother, who is just out of his school, is now studying the auto mobile business.

Mr. Cracknell says that his home town, Ipswich, is very damp with the humidity usually at 100 percent!

Cracknell says he is very impressed with "Dimmitt's Talent" a British colloquialism for good looking young ladies, but he was informed that marriage here can be a costly venture when wives in the United States, unlike England, feel it necessary to possess all the modern conveniences.

"I would like to express my thanks for the warm hospitality and generosity I have received during my stay in this area, Cracknell said, "It is a delightful experience and one which I shall always remember."

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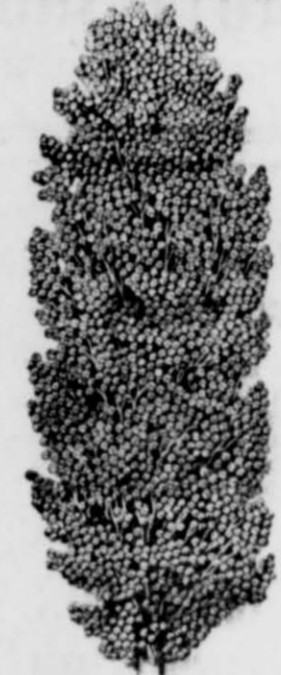

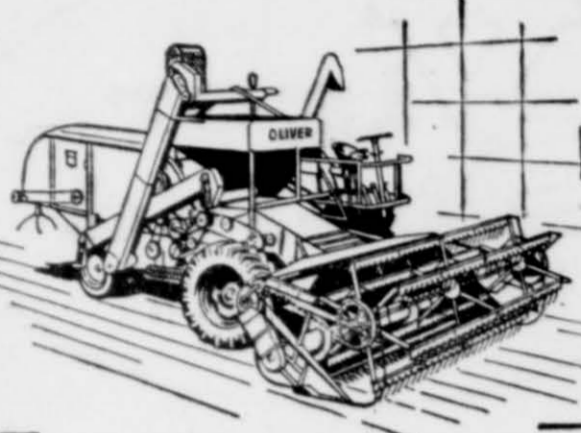

Walter Rogers' WASHINGTON NEWSLETTER

STRIKES AND THE MISSILE PROGRAM

I have received a great deal of mail protesting the recent strike activities at a missile center. The issue involved photographers who have the job of making pictures with relation to the missile program that are vitally essential to the scientists engaged in missile work.

Many people were astounded that a strike or threatened strike could be possible at any installation engaged in activities related to our missile or outer space programs and they should have been. Many thought these to be government operations. Hence they concluded that a strike would be in violation of the law because it was against the government. The latter would be true provided the former were correct. The fact is that these operations are not government operations in the sense of the word that a strike would be in violation of the law. These programs could be entirely government operated and controlled. However in the interest of preserving the free enterprise system

the government contracts these several activities with private enterprise firms. This removes it from a strictly government operation. Hence in the literal sense of the word a strike in such case is a strike against the employer rather than the government. This revelation will no doubt alarm many and it would be most alarming if it were not for other provisions of the law to-wit: the Labor Management Relations Act of 1947 (the Taft-Hartley Act). Under this Act provision is made for the President of the United States to initiate proceedings to enjoin a strike or lockout. This power under the Taft-Hartley Act would, no doubt have been exercised by the President of the United States in the recent controversy concerning the missile program had the matter not been settled forthwith.

There has been great controversy in the past as to whether or not this power of the president is unconstitutional and whether or not the Taft-Hartley Act would apply only to an industry-wide strike or a strike involving a substantial portion of the operations of an industry speaking numerically or percentage-wise. At the present time these two matters have been settled by a decision of a New York Federal Court wherein these two questions and others were at issue. In that case the industry in question was the Atomic Energy Commission and involved the American Locomotive Company under contract with the Atomic Energy Commission for the production of certain items used in the atomic program. The decision was written by Chief Judge Knight of the United States District Court for the Western Dis-

trict of New York and an application for a Writ of Certiorari to the United States Supreme Court was denied. This simply means that the Supreme Court was not at issue with the findings in the case and hence refused to review it. In the decision Judge Knight made several statements which would be good to remember. In one instance he said, "The strike in effect is a strike against the government." In another instance he stated as follows:

The missile program the outer space program the atomic energy program and other programs of this nature that are being primarily financed by the Federal government in order to insure the

best interests the safety and the welfare of this country can and should be worked and developed in full cooperation and conjunction with the basic concepts of our free enterprise system. However it would be good to note that abuses in the development of these programs by either labor or management or both would provide fuel for the fire of those who

would like to see the government take over all operations completely and operate them directly. I would seem to be much better to both labor and management to exercise the utmost discretion in their operations concerning these activities to the end that neither jeopardizes the free enterprise system.

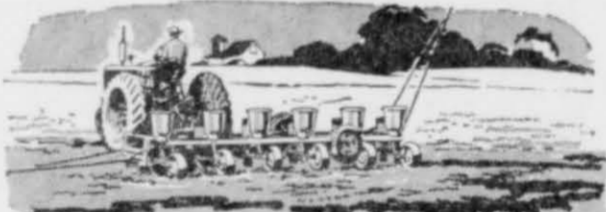
