A CORRECTION

In last week's issue of The News appeared an item in regard to operating expenses of the school system for the years 1930-31 and 1931-32 in which the figures given were erroneous in that the Auditor's Report was misread, and the Secretary for the Board wishes to correct such error and states that according to such report the figures for the year 1930-31 should have been—\$27,253.03.
 1931-32 should have been—\$19,596.85.
 And that included for the year 1930-31 are items totaling \$3,840.60 for building sites, new equipment and transfer to interest and sinking fund.

Emergency Crop Loans to Close Apr. 30

Farmers in this section who contemplate making applications for emergency crop production loans are urged to do so immediately.
 Applications can be made at the County Agent's office. And on Wednesday's applicants may receive the assistance of John A. Andrews, field supervisor, in making their applications.
 Some five thousand loans have already been completed by the Dallas office, and the appropriation for this loan by the national government was but forty million dollars.
 The deadline for closing the loans has been set or April 30.

DIMMITT WHEAT GROWERS GET ELEVATOR CHARTER

Charters granted this week by the Secretary of State included one to the Dimmitt Wheat Growers, Inc., of Dimmitt, according to an associated press report.
 This concern was formerly the Texas Wheat Pool. It has a capital stock of \$20,000, and the incorporators are: G. A. C. Halfe, A. H. Rowan and Roy Nichols. None of these are Castro county residents, but were formerly connected with the wheat pool, it is understood.

Stephens Is New Mayor; Webb & Byrnes Comm'rs

The City of Dimmitt elected three new officials to guide its destinies for the next two years, last Tuesday when Ozro Stephens, prominent local lumberman, was elected Mayor and C. O. Byrnes and J. W. Webb were named Commissioners.
 The closest race was between R. H. Crump and J. W. Webb, the latter winning by 8 votes.
 In the Mayor's race, Stephens was opposed by George W. Bussey. These were the only two names printed on the ballot, but Edgar Ramey received two votes, and B. D. Woodlee and Dr. Mayes Miller, received one each (written in).
 Jack McIntosh, who announced as a candidate for Commissioner last week, withdrew his application before the ballots were printed and his name was not on the ticket. He received two votes (written in).

Castro Council Hears Reports On Meat Show

Report given by Mrs. R. E. Luke of Sunnyside at a meeting of County Council held in the Commissioners' Court Room April 3, 1934.
 Castro county participated in the Lubbock meat show, sending five women and two girls as delegates.
 We sent 28 entries of canned meats, consisting of 3 cans each, a variety of the following:
 Pork Roast (took first prize).
 Beef Roast (took first prize).
 Liver Paste.
 Sausage.
 Mince Meat.
 Chicken (took 4th prize).
 A team of girls from Arney, Helen and Minnie Morris, gave a demonstration on dressing and canning chicken and ways of serving chicken. They won third place, receiving a check of \$5.00.
 Delegates were:
 Mrs. R. Houy, Mrs. R. E. Duke and Mrs. M. Gilmer, all of Sunnyside; Mrs. Roy Jones of Hart, Mrs. Walter Graham of Arney, Helen and Minnie Morris of Arney. They were accompanied by Miss Izora Clark, Home Demonstration Agent.
 Criticisms of canned meats, as given by Miss Lola Blair, Nutrition Specialist of Extension Service, were very instructive.
 The main criticisms were: too much fat; cans not well filled; seared too brown (should be light golden brown); not thoroughly pre-heated before sealing; chili ground too fine (should be no smaller than black-eyed pea after searing). (Chili cooked too long before filling cans (should just turn white); sausage meat ground too coarse (should be ground twice); sausage meat contains too much fat, hence it shrinks too much; liver paste ground too coarsely.
 Things NOT to put into No. 3 cans:
 Liver paste, sausage, meat loaf, and other ground meats.
 Any kind of greens, English peas, corn and hominy.
 All canned meats should be put into plain tins.
 Mince meat should certainly be put into enameled tins and processed as other meats.
 Sealers should be adjusted each time before using.
 Animals should be properly butchered and freely bled.

Originality, personality and cleverness of dress will also be big factors in the judging.

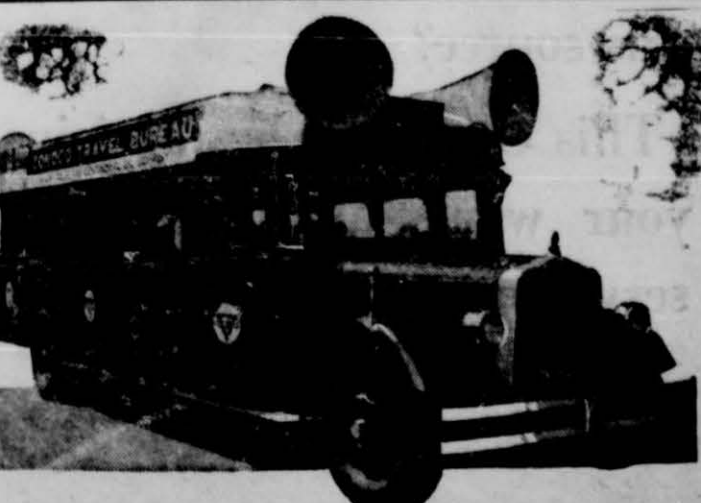
