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Search continues for missing girl

Reward increased to \$25,000

COLORADO CITY — The investigation into the disappearance of a 13-year-old Colorado City girl has gained national attention, thanks to coverage by TV personality and former violent crime prosecutor Nancy Grace, as

investigators continue to try to determine if the girl has met with foul play Hailey Darlene Dunn, an

eighth grade student at Colorado Middle School, was last seen walking from her home in northern Colorado City to a friend's house about 1 p.m. Monday, Dec. 27, according to Interim Colorado City Police Chief John Bivins.

In a recent TV interview with Grace, Hailey's parents — Billie Dunn and Clint Dunn — say the child often made the half-mile trek across a nearby field from her mother's home to her father's residence.

"She comes over every day, at all times," Clint Dunn told Grace. "She might come over

for five minutes or she might come over and spend all day. She just shows up. She just walks across the field.

"She just disappeared. I didn't see her at all that day (Monday). I saw her the day before (on Sunday.) Later that night (Tuesday) my son, David, came over and asked me if I had seen her and if she had come over that day."

Clint Dunn said Hailey had spent Christmas night at his house, as well as part of the day Sunday.

According to reports by Grace, investigators are believed to have tracked the girl's scent using bloodhounds, leading law enforcement officials to the Western

Suites Hotel, located several blocks from where she was last sighted.

Billie Dunn said investigators are reviewing the video tapes from the hotel and interviewing guests who stayed there the day of the girl's disappearance.

According to an interview with Grace, a witness told

Holiday will extend tax filing deadline until April 18, IRS says

The Internal Revenue Ser-

vice opened the 2011 tax filing season Tuesday by announcing taxpayers have until April 18 to file their returns.

Taxpayers will have until the 18th because Emancipa-

tion Day — a holiday observed in the District of Columbia falls this year on Friday, April 15. By law, District of Columbia holidays impact tax deadlines in the same way that federal holidays do; therefore, all taxpayers will have three extra days to file **Laser Jewelry Repair**

this year. Taxpayers requesting an extension will have until Oct. 17 to file their 2010

tax returns. According to government officials, the IRS expects to receive more than 140 million

individual tax returns this

year, with most of those being

filed by the April 18 deadline. The IRS also cautioned tax-

payers with foreign accounts to properly report income from these accounts and file the appropriate forms on time to avoid stiff penalties.

PROMISES, PROMISES: A few Republican pledges meet reality at dawn of House control WASHINGTON (AP) — Republicans have already

violated some of the vows they made in taking stewardship of the House.

Their pledge to cut \$100 billion from the budget in one year won't be kept.

And for a coming vote seeking to repeal the health care overhaul, the first major initiative of the new Congress, lawmakers won't be allowed to propose changes to the legislation despite Republican promises to end such heavy-handed tactics from the days of Democratic control.

Is business as usual really back so fast? That's not clear one day after Democrat Nancy Pelosi yielded the gavel to the new Republican House leader, John Boehner. The GOP came to power in the House with an agenda that, if carried through, would in fact change how the government spends, taxes and does its legislative business.

Friends say student who killed assistant principal, self was fun

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — An angry online posting from the 17-year-old boy who opened fire at a Nebraska high school, killing an assistant principal before later fatally shooting himself, offers some clues about why the son of a police detective turned violent a couple of months after transferring there. As authorities work to sort out what may have

led to Wednesday's shooting, those who knew Robert Butler Jr. are struggling to reconcile his final actions with their memories of the fun, outgoing student who liked to make jokes and sometimes got into trouble for talking in class. The gunman, who had attended Omaha's Millard

South High School for no more than two months, also wounded the principal before fleeing from the scene and fatally shooting himself in his car about a mile away.

Officials with Colorado City say they have no intentions of letting up on the investigation until Hailey Dunn is located. "From the start, our

department and our colleagues from the other law enforcement and judicial agencies that have joined our effort have treated Hailey's case as one of a missing person. We've made no assumptions as to what occurred, intentionally focusing on rapidly collecting facts and using these facts to guide our work," said Colorado City Manager Pete Kampfer. "We're applying all the personnel and other resources necessary and appropriate to our work in finding Hailey, with no plans of letting up. This is a night and day endeavor for us all."

Billie Dunn said law enforcement officials have not issued an Amber Alert for Hailey because they do not have evidence that she has been abducted. An Amber Alert is an

emergency broadcast response for missing children, hosted by the U.S. Department of Justice. The guidelines posted on the Amber Alert website state that law enforcement must "confirm an abduction prior to issuing an alert."

Since the missing person report was taken last week, Colorado City police also have made three separate requests

quests, we've been told that there is not enough information currently available about Hailey's disappearance to issue an Amber Alert," said Bivens. "The minimum standard for creating an Amber Alert is knowledge of a suspect, a description of a vehicle involved in an abduction and/or a route and direction of travel.

"This community and, in particular, the family and friends of Hailey Dunn can be absolutely confident that we will continue to pursue the issuance of an Amber Alert with each additional piece of evidence we uncover until such

a time as we meet the minimum standards established by the Amber Alert system in Texas."

Hailey Dunn is described as 5-foot-1 and 120 pounds with hazel eyes and hair that's said to be brown with blondish streaks.

"The IRS has made important strides at stopping tax avoidance using offshore accounts," Commissioner Doug Shulman said. "We continue to focus on offshore tax compliance and people with offshore accounts need to pay taxes on income from those accounts."

For most taxpayers, the 2011 tax filing season starts on schedule. However, tax law changes enacted by Congress and signed by President Obama in December mean some people need to wait until mid to late February to file their tax returns in order to give the IRS time to reprogram its processing systems.

Some taxpayers — including those who itemize deductions on Form 1040 Schedule A — will need to wait to file. This includes taxpayers impacted by any of three tax provisions that expired at the end of 2009 and were renewed by the Tax Relief, Unemployment Insurance Reauthorization, and Job Creation Act of 2010, enacted Dec. 17. According to IRS guidelines, those who need to wait to file include: Taxpayers claiming

itemized deductions on Schedule A. Itemized deductions include mortgage interest, charitable deductions, medical and dental expenses as well as state and local taxes. In addition, itemized deductions include the state and local general sales tax deduction that was also extended and which primarily benefits people living in areas without state and local income taxes. Because of late Congressional action to enact tax law changes, anyone who itemizes and files a Schedule A will need to wait to file until mid- to late February.

 Taxpayers claiming the higher education tuition and fees deduction. This deduction for parents and students covering up to \$4,000 of tuition and fees paid to

a post-secondary institution — is claimed on Form 8917. However, the IRS emphasized that there will be no delays for millions of parents and students who claim other education credits, including the American Opportunity Tax Credit extended last month and the Lifetime Learning Credit.

 Taxpayers claiming the educator expense deduction. This deduction is for kindergarten through grade 12 educators with out-of-pocket classroom expenses of up to \$250.

In addition to extending those tax deductions for 2010, the Tax Relief, Unemployment Insurance Reauthorization, and Job Creation Act

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also extended those deductions for 2011 and a number of other tax deductions and credits for 2011 and 2012, such as the American Opportunity Tax Credit and the modified Child Tax Credit, which help families pay for college and other child-related

According to government officials, the IRS will announce a specific date in the near future when it can start processing tax returns impacted by the recent tax law changes. In the interim, taxpayers affected by these tax law changes can start working on their tax returns, but they should not submit their returns until IRS systems are ready

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to process the new tax law changes. Additiongov.

Our View

Let's be sure we drive safely near schools

ow that the holiday season is over, we can begin to get back into some familiar routines. For many of us, that includes some type of arrangement for getting our children to school in the morning and back home again in the afternoon.

For those of us who work, those times can be a harried experience. We're balancing the children's schedulse with ours, trying to get to work, then maybe take a quick afternoon break so we can rush to the school and pick up the children and deliver them to a relative's house, daycare or home.

We've all been outside school buildings when the final bells rings. They are a beehive of activity, with children scampering everywhere and cars lined up waiting. Obviously, the potential for an accident is increased. Fortunately, however, there have been few of those over the years.

That's because most of us observe the speed limits in school zones and are aware of the potential danger.

Here are some important points to remem-

- Slow down. Always obey the speed limit when traveling through neighborhoods and school zones.
- Be attentive. Watch for children gathering near bus stops and walking in the street, especially where there are no sidewalks.
- Remain alert. Hurried children may dart into the street without looking for traffic.

o many U.S. Latinos. they are much more than figurines in the Nativity mangers under our Christmas trees. They are Melchor, Gaspar and Balthazar, those three magical figures who rode camels and

left toys under our beds every Jan. 6 when we were They are the

same three wise men who brought gifts to the Baby Jesus in Bethlehem, according to the Bible, on the 12th day of Christmas. And they still come around

to visit many Hispanic homes yes, even after we immigrate to the United States — when we remember to invite them! After all, most foreign-born

U.S. Latinos grew up receiving gifts not from Santa Claus on Christmas Day, but from Los Tres Reyes Magos on Jan. 6 — the day Catholics celebrate the Feast of the Epiphany. It's a wonderful tradition that came to the New World — including current U.S. territory — with the Spanish conquistadors. The first Christmas and Three

Kings Day in North America were celebrated in 1539-40 by Hernando De Soto, 12 Catholic priests and some 600 conquistadors, who had camped for the winter in an abandoned Native American village in northern Florida that later would be called Tallahassee.

Those of us who still cherish that tradition and want to pass it on to our children have been fighting an uphill battle in this country for many years. We host some Three Kings Day festivities and try to keep the tradition alive in some homes. But Santa's popularity has been overpower-

U.S. Latinos often are (unfairly) accused of being reluctant to assimilate in U.S. society, yet this is one example of how fast assimilation actually is occurring. The speed with which some of us pick up Santa and drop the three wise men is, frankly, shameful. This is our own holiday for Hispanic children, and those who value our heritage should refuse to let it fade into oblivion.

Of course, Santa also should be welcome in our homes, but not at the expense of our own precious holiday. Instead of allowing Santa to give away all the presents, surely we can ask him to set some aside for the three wise men.

For the Latin American child that is still alive in many adult U.S. Latinos, this should be the time to dig out the roots of our culture and pass our traditions to younger generations. Just as we teach our children that there is a Santa Claus capable of flying on a sleigh, surely we can explain — as our parents did with us — that worldwide overnight toy delivery also can be accomplished by three kings riding on

By maintaining the Three Kings Day tradition — through religious observances, musical concerts, toy drives and even a children's parade featuring three wise men riding camels through the streets of Manhattan — some Latino parents have been able to instill ethnic pride in their children at a very young age. Having their own Latino holiday gets children started in observing the traditions of their

But let's face it; Three Kings Day is not an American holiday. Government offices will not close; banks will be open; schools will be in session; and not many stores will be having

special sales. In spite of the rapidly growing purchasing power of the U.S. Latino population, unfortunately toy retailers in this country have yet to realize that Three Kings Day is a gold mine waiting to be discovered. Some don't even realize why so many U.S. Latinos are out shopping for toys for several days after Christmas has passed!

Ironically, while Santa often is over-commercialized and the true meaning of Christmas often gets diluted, the three wise men could use a little more commercialization to ensure the survival of one of our most precious Christian traditions.

Even in Latin America – where, thanks to the influence of the U.S. media, Santa's popularity has increased dramatically in the past few decades — many people are complaining that old St. Nicholas is replacing the three figures and the Christmas story that has a biblical foundation.

On the Internet, some leftist extremists, unable to contain their anti-American sentiments, have turned on Santa Claus, calling him an "impostor" who represents "cultural colonialism." They say the media are trying to impose "a foreign cultural figure" to replace the Hispanic three wise men tradition, and they have built many websites and Facebook pages to express their bitterness and anger.

But there are many others an overwhelming majority, of course — who reject such cheap politics and refuse to choose between magical figures who come bearing gifts. They are using social networking sites to write moving testimonials, recalling some of the best times of their lives — brought to them by both Santa and the three wise men.

s we struggle through such scintillating titles as "Big and Little," which includes gripping chapters like "a kitten is little, a cat is big," I hope fervently that my nearly 7-year-old son inherits my love of

reading. After an encouraging start when he uttered his first word, "book," we've hit a few roadblocks as the actual act of reading seems well below playing, watching TV and chasing the cat on his list.

Still, we soldier on each night before bed with him reading something to me before I read something to him, all in the hope that someday I will happen upon my son knowingly picking up a book without pictures for pleasure. I'm not foolish enough to believe that having parents who love books automatically results in a child feeling the same way, but since my son copies all of my negative behaviors, I'm hoping one of my few positive features rubs off on him as well.

Though I was a lazy student, who never saw any reason to do what the teacher asked, as I most certainly already knew all the answers, I always read. While other kids actually listened to Amen what the teacher said, I spent

most of my classroom time from elementary school through high school reading as unobtrusively as I could. Sometimes I read ahead in the text book, sometimes I read novels and in one history class in high school, I methodically worked my way through the teacher's personal library.

As a child, I got up early to read the newspaper over breakfast (which occasionally featured Pac-Man Cereal) before moving to whatever novel I was reading while waiting for my friend Matt to make his way up my parents' hill.

I read at night when I should have been doing homework and in front of the television while I should have been watching "The A-Team.'

Rarely without a book in hand, I decided last year that I would keep track of every book I read in 2010. To accomplish this I obtained a bookcase which I set up outside my office door, where I would deposit every book I finished. This plan went well until October, when my mother bought me a Kindle for my birth-

Though I still love the physical concept of books, the Kindle not only allowed me to read faster as not having to turn pages dramatically speeds things up, it also eliminated one of my greatest fears — not having "the next book." Throughout life I

had always worried about being

caught without something to read and this led to my often buying books I wasn't all that excited about, just to have some-

The Kindle ended this fear as I'm no longer dependent on getting to a bookstore to have a book. Because of this convenience, whereas I thought I would mix electronic books and real ones, I have almost exclusively read e-books. That foiled my plan for having an impressive bookshelf, but it did lead to me reading even more books this

In adding my actual books to my electronic books, I read 123 books and 12 novellas. These included novels, non-fiction and three biographies of various members of Guns and Roses, a band I'm not a fan of.

I read literature. I read crap. I read a few things that were a struggle to get through, but mostly I just read.

Reading can entertain you. It can enrich you and it can make life wonderfully more exciting. I'm hoping that my efforts to share this with my child succeed and though I don't imagine he'll ever own many actual books, I'm hoping he fills up his electronic library and that it someday compares to my actual library.

Kubiak hires Phillips to run Texans' D

HOUSTON - Wade Phillips is finally coming home.

Phillips was hired as Houston's new defensive coordinator on Wednesday, assigned to revamp a unit that dropped to the bottom of the league this season.

The former Dallas Cowboys coach has strong ties to the city and head coach Gary Kubiak. He grew up in the area and played linebacker at the University of Houston in the 1960s. He began his NFL coaching career in the late 1970s with the Houston Oilers, who were coached by his father, Bum. Kubiak was a ball boy for the Oilers back then, and the two have

remained friends across 30 years.

Phillips joined Kubiak's staff two days after the Texans fired defensive coordinator Frank Bush, secondary coach David Gibbs, linebackers coach Johnny Holland and assistant linebackers coach Robert Saleh.

The Texans (6-10) lost eight of their last 10 games, mostly due to a defense that ranked as one of the NFL's worst. Houston finished 30th in yards allowed (386.6 per game) and last against the pass (267.5 yards per game).

"I don't think they could've picked a better guy," Bum Phillips said in a phone interview on Wednesday night.

"And I don't think Wade could've picked a better job to come to. He's going to get to work with a guy who he knows and respects. That, to me, makes all the difference in the world. It's a great deal for Wade and a great deal for Houston."

Phillips becomes the third defensive coordinator in Kubiak's tenure, which began in 2006 and was on tenuous ground until owner Bob McNair said this week that he was sticking with his head coach.

Bush and his predecessor, Richard Smith, had no previous experience at the position, and Mc-Nair and Kubiak both said they needed some

Big Spring native Tannehill looks to put finishing touches on Aggies' season

It's not uncommon to see college football apparel throughout West Texas, or anywhere in Texas for that matter. Stickers, jerseys and shirts are just a few things fans use to display their pride.

But in Big Spring, the No.17 in maroon is just a little more popular these days. Texas A&M quarterback and Big Spring native Ryan Tannehill is just a little more popular these days.

"Any time you can have support from people back home, it definitely means a lot and I definitely appreciate that people are willing to support me," Tannehill said. "It's exciting and I just hope they keep supporting my team throughout this whole thing."

The junior has had a whirlwind of a season and looks to put the finishing touches on it with a win over No. 11 LSU (AP Top 25) in the 75th AT&T Cotton Bowl Classic at 7 p.m. Friday in Dallas Cowboys Stadium in Arlington.

What's made the season a special one is Tannehill's rise to quarterback for the Aggies and the way he's led No.18 A&M to the cusp of a 10-win season.

What started out as another season at receiver for the junior turned out to be the season he finally accomplished a long-time goal — being the starting quarterback at A&M.

"Never saw any action coming this year at quarterback," Tannehill said. "Came into the season with Jerrod (Johnson) being the established starter. I really just expected to play the whole year at receiver like I did last year and just try to be the best receiver I could while I was out there. Got the opportunity to move in at quarterback and just tried to seize it."

Tannehill, in his mind, has always been a quarterback and

that's the way it was during his time here at Big Spring High School in a wing-T offense.

Playing receiver at A&M wasn't a bad thing, though. While being a quarterback was something he wanted to do, Tannehill said he wanted to excel at receiver because that's what the team needed him to do.

After splitting time with Johnson at quarterback in A&M's win over Kansas on Oct. 23, 2010, it wasn't until the Texas Tech game when he had the opportunity to prove what he could do as a signal caller. And he delivered that day, throwing for a schoolrecord 449 yards.

In five starts, Tannehill has completed 115-of-179 passes for 1,254 yards and eight touchdowns. It's been enough to garner an All-Big 12 Conference honorable mention nod.

Being a wideout only aided the transition to quarterback. Tannehill credits a lot of his success this season to his ability to relate to his receivers on a level most quarterbacks can't. He's been in their shoes, knows what it's like trying to recognize coverages and run routes. That makes it easier for Tannehill to run the

He's led the Aggies to some of the biggest wins they've had in a while, too — against Tech, Oklahoma, Nebraska and Texas. Tannehill said the 33-19 win over OU and the 9-6 win over Nebraska were the biggest. Those are wins that make programs relevant.

Relevance is really what it's all about for Tannehill. This season has not only been enjoyable because he's had a chance to play at quarterback, but the junior said he is proud to bring attention and buzz back around a program he believes should regularly be in the national spotlight.

"It's tough when your team loses relevance," he said. "I think

Beetle Bailey goes from funny pages to the runway

Associated Press PHILADELPHIA (AP) Don't tell Sgt. Snorkel, but perennially putupon private Beetle Bailey's Army green fatigues are influencing a new collection of limited-edition designer duds.

Arguably the longestserving private never to have been promoted, Beetle Bailey will get the red carpet treatment next week when a line of clothing and accessories bearing his imprint is unveiled at apparel trade show PROJECT New York.

Working in conjunction with King Features Syndicate, designers Darren Romanelli and Hitoshi Tsujimoto have banded together to develop an Americanainspired and militaryinfused collection of jackets, sweaters, T-shirts, hats, shoes, pants and bags.

"It's an Americana type of clothing line. It's real authentic clothes that people wore — jackets, blue jeans and stuff like that," Beetle Bailey creator Mort Walker told The Associated Press Tuesday. "All sweaters, all the stuff that the ordinary guys wear, not the fancy guys.' Those kinds of gar-

ments are not uncommon sights on fashion runways, with heritageinspired and utilitarian looks increasingly en vogue.

But it won't be all fash-

The Titans released a statement Wednesday night in which Adams said Young won't be on the team's roster next season, but he's still evaluating the coaching staff.

"We have two critical decisions to make, the direction of the coaching staff and the future at the quarterback position. They are separate issues to me and will be dealt with separately," Adams said.

Adams is the owner who wanted Young drafted No. 3 overall out of Texas in 2006

"VY is my guy." But with his general manager and senior executive vice president traveling to Houston to meet with Adams on Monday, the 88-year-old owner decided Young no longer is the quarterback for his franchise.

Young is 30-17 in his five NFL seasons, but only 13-14

This deal from a duplicate game provides a case in point. At most tables, North-South wound up in six spades. However, only one declarer managed to take 12 tricks on a hand where only one trick should be lost with proper play.

It isn't hard to figure out why so many declarers failed to make the slam. They chose to crossruff, trumping hearts or clubs in dummy and

ruffing diamonds in their hand. However, there aren't enough trumps and top tricks in the combined hands for this approach to succeed. Even if declarer were able to score all eight of his trumps separately (not possible, of course, after a trump lead), these tricks plus the three side aces do not add up to 12.

The simple mathematics of the situation was duly noted by the one declarer who made the slam. After determining that he was sure to fall short of his goal by adopting a crossruff, he decided instead to establish dummy's diamonds

He won the spade lead with dummy's ten, cashed the ace of diamonds and trumped a diamond, felling West's king. He then overtook the jack of spades with the queen, cashed the spade ace and conceded the jack of diamonds to East's queen.

Dummy's remaining diamonds were now good, and the six of spades provided the entry to them. With the two singletons in dummy covered by South's aces, the slam was home.




