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<u>Teen-ager still missing</u> Adkins 'person of interest'

COLORADO CITY - According to Colorado City officials, Shawn Adkins has been named a "person of interest" by investigators in the recent disappearance of 13-year-old Hailey Darlene Dunn, but no arrests have been made at this time.

Dunn was last seen walking

from her home in northern Colorado City to a friend's house about 1 p.m. Monday, Dec. 27, according to initial police reports.

Focus has shifted on 25-yearold Adkins since a series of affidavits were released revealing disturbing details of items and information found in the Dunn home following the execution of a search war-

According to Adkins the affidavits:

• Adkins had previously threatened the lives of both Hailey Dunn and Billie Dunn in February 2010.

• Both Adkins and Billie Dunn apparently held an ongoing, intense fascination with horrific films and brutal crimes. Seized in a box in their bedroom were numerous documents, some fictional and some past crimes, that covered such topics such as serial killers, ax murders,

sexual sadistic activities, the occult, sex and death topics, motives for murder and mass murderers - including the killing of family members.

· Billie Dunn and Adkins hosted a number of friends for a New Year's Eve party at their home - just three days after Billie Dunn reported

Generosity overwhelms **Big Spring State Hospital**

Big Spring State Hospital asked, and the hospital received.

The hospital delivered a plea before the Christmas holidays asking for donations of television sets. Not new television sets, but older ones that may have been replaced on Christmas day to make way for their newer, slimmer cousin — the large, flat-screen TV.

Big Spring State Hospital administrators even offered to pick them up from area homes. At last count, the hospital received 55 television sets — in all shapes and sizes. The hospital received so many that they ran out of storage space, Big Spring State Hospital Assistant Superintendent Lorie Couch said.

"The generosity of the people in West Texas never ceases to amaze me," Couch said. "We knew if we asked for donations, we would receive some, but I had no idea that we would receive so many."

"The community and its people have always been so generous, but the response has been overwhelming."

"We received so many that we are no longer able to store the donated televisions until needed, so we are asking for individuals to donate the televisions to other charitable





Perry's trips to keep him on national GOP stage

AUSTIN – (AP) Texas Gov. Rick Perry has practically turned Washingtonbashing into a sport, but he can't seem to stay away from the nation's capital — or the national stage.

Perry has three trips planned to Washington and its environs through February, along with a jaunt to California for an event honoring former President Ronald Reagan, aides said. Most of the events are drawing other national Republican figures, including a few eyeing the White House in 2012.

But in an interview with The Associated Press this week, Perry said he has no aspirations beyond the Lone Star State. Still, the trips are sure to fuel speculation about his intentions and raise a few eyebrows as the state faces a budget shortfall of at least \$15 billion, one of the largest in the country.

The governor said he'll oppose tax increase and hopes to make Texas a model of fiscal responsibility despite fears that the state could soon be facing deep cuts in the public school system and the health care infrastructure.

"I'm not running for president," said Perry, who will be sworn into his record third term as governor next week. "I'm interested in the members of Congress doing what they said they would do and putting this country back into a substantially closer relationship with the Constitution."

Perry will get to deliver that message to GOP members of the U.S. House on Friday.

Hailey missing. Adkins downplayed the party, stating they just had a few friends over to the house to have drinks on New Year's Eve.

 Billie Dunn volunteered to take a polygraph examination, but when she arrived, she was found to be "under the influence of narcotics," and she was dismissed from the test at that time. On her second attempt, the investigators concluded there was "deception indicated." After the examination, Billie Dunn was given the chance to discuss and explain "why she failed the examination." Officials said she couldn't explain them, and she ended the interview by walking out.

 Adkins twice refused to take polygraph examinations. Then he agreed to a polygraph, but after providing some inconsistent information, he ended this polygraph by walking out. Officials said he failed the polygraph, particularly concerning the whereabouts of Hailey.

• During his polygraph examination, before walking out, Adkins provided some positive reaction about knowing where Hailey Dunn is. Indications were that Hailey may be in Scurry County.

 Adkins and Billie Dunn made two withdrawals of cash from an ATM machine in Snyder, in Scurry County, at about 6:20 p.m. on Dec. 27 totaling \$140. They told investigators the money was for purchasing drugs.

• Numerous statements made by both Adkins and Billie Dunn, particularly Adkins, have been inconsistent, some with initial denials, then admissions, then changed statements.

Adkins declined to speak to the AP from a relative's house Wednesday night. Another relative, Adkins' uncle, said his nephew is innocent in Hailey's disappearance.

"He is the most passive, gentle person you would meet in your whole life," Matt Taggart said of his nephew. "He's not capable of that. He wouldn't even know where to start to make a human disappear."

Billie Dunn has not vet been identified as a person of interest or suspect in the investigation. During a press conference Wednesday afternoon, law enforcement and city officials said the investigation continues to narrow into a criminal one, but the idea Dunn may have run away has not been ruled out.

Billie Dunn said Wednesday that the couple had broken up before and that Adkins said some "ugly things," but never threatened Hailey's life. Still, Dunn said she asked Adkins to move out of her home last week.

"If investigators can't rule him out, I can't either," she said. "I'm unsure at this point."

In the affidavits, Dunn also downplayed investigator statements that she and Adkins seemed to be fascinated with sadistic sex and brutal crimes. The affidavits said investigators who searched the couple's home had found printouts of at least 16 different articles related to sex crimes and serial killings, some of them involving adolescents. Dunn, in the affidavits, described her interest in true crime cases as "a hobby."

Department of Public Safety Senior Trooper Sparky Dean encouraged members of the media and those at home not to jump to conclusions based on the information released in the affidavits, saying it is only a glimpse into the ongoing investigation.

Dean confirmed that all persons of interest in the case are being kept under surveillance on a 24-hour-aday basis.

Dunn's disappearance Since gained national attention, searches have been conducted all over Colorado City, as well as the area between it and Dunn, a tiny community north of Colorado City. According to investigators involved with the case, at least nine agencies — including the FBI and Secret Service — totaling more than 30 law enforcement officers are currently working on the investigation.

Anyone with information concerning the girl's whereabouts or circumstances concerning her disappearance are asked to call authorities at 325-728-5294 or 325-728-3161. A reward of \$25,000 is being offered for information in the case.





mongering and the polarizing has been driven by the extreme right. It doesn't matter whether Loughner is a right-winger; what matters is that right-wingers created the environment for a monster to kill.

It's about the cross hairs maps on Sarah Palin's website, targeting 20 opponents, including Giffords, during the November midterm elections. Sarah Palin "has the cross hairs of a gun sight over our district," Giffords said prophetically last March. "When people do that, they've got to realize there (are) consequences to that action.'

It's about people taking guns to political events. It's about Giffords' opponent, Jesse Kelly, a right-wing Republican and tea party favorite who, as he campaigned against Giffords, invited his followers to join him and "shoot a fully automatic M16." It's about Sharron Angle, the Republican candidate and tea party lunatic who spoke of "Second Amendment remedies" when she ran for the U.S. Senate in Nevada, nurturing the warped minds of those who believe the right to bear arms also gives them the right to overthrow the government.

It's about the right-wing hate radio and Fox News pundits who get ratings and hefty salaries for promoting fear, intolerance and hatred of anyone who doesn't think like them. It's about the tea party rallies where gun and war metaphors prevail, where speakers have been known to say that "if ballots don't work, bullets will.'

It's about a loud minority of Americans who are driving this country down a wrong and dangerous path.

Some of them still have the gall to pretend that the Tucson massacre has nothing to do with them. Others have the audacity to claim that these are simply the actions of one deranged individual. They must be totally blind, but they claim they don't

see the connection between the nation's climate of hatred, especially in Arizona, and the massacre in Tucson. They refuse to see the blood on their own hands!

Yet while many gun-toting conservative extremists still are in denial of their complicity, Pima County Sheriff Clarence W. Dupnik, who is overseeing the investigation of the massacre, became the voice of reason Saturday when he explained: "There's reason to believe that this individual may have a mental issue. And I think people who are unbalanced are especially susceptible to vitriol.'

He said people who make a living "inflaming" the American public may call it free speech, "but it's not without consequences," he added.

"The anger, the hatred (and) the bigotry that goes on in this country is getting to be outrageous. And unfortunately, Arizona, I think, has become sort of the capital," he said. "We have become the mecca for prejudice and bigotry.'

Of course, that's not news to those who have followed Arizona politics lately. The state's efforts to racially profile and violate the civil rights of its Hispanic residents, to trample on undocumented immigrants, to allow guns even in schools and to legislate itself back to the days of the old Wild West already are known worldwide.

Our only hope now is that this painful tragedy will turn the tide against those who promote political change through angry and inflammatory rhetoric, leading demented individuals to vote with bullets instead of ballots.

If they don't tone down their dangerous political rhetoric now that six Americans are dead and a congresswoman is clinging to life, if they don't do it now that our democracy has been assaulted, what will it take?

The blame game is ridiculous

ithin an hour of the tragic shooting in Arizona, it had begun. The Blame Game. The effort to score political points.

The attacks on the ugliness of the political debate mimic the very ugliness they condemn.

The sheriff blamed Rush Limbaugh. Liberal bloggers went after conservative talkers. Conservative talkers lashed

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right back at the sheriff and the liberal bloggers. Drudge kept running the headline that the shooter was remembered by high-school acquaintances as a "liberal pothead."

My own rule of thumb, in the days since, is that anyone who is out there blaming someone else is probably equally to blame.

Obviously, the person to blame is the one who pulled the trigger.

If, as all evidence suggests, that man was Jared Lee Loughner, then it is perfectly clear that the man to blame is a deeply disturbed, mentally ill, deranged individual who — in my book at

least — knew what he was doing and knew that it was wrong.

And that is all that is required to defeat an insanity plea and establish his responsibility.

He deserves a vigorous defense.

And if, as the evidence suggests, he is guilty, he deserves the ultimate penalty.

That is the easy part.

The hard part is what we do with it.

First and foremost, of course, we pray.

We send our sympathies to the families of the victims. We take a moment — more, I hope — to hug our loved ones, count our blessings, cherish the privilege we have to live in a country where such an action is so unusual, so aberrant, as to stop us in our tracks.

Then what?

Do we use it?

Do we use the death of a 9-yearold child, of a respected federal judge, of a young congressional aide, to score points in a political debate?

Political discourse in America is a nightmare: vicious, ugly, mean-spirited and personal.

It wasn't always this way, but it is now. Sadly, it mostly serves the interest of those who engage

in it. And it mostly works. And Tucson has made it worse, not better.

At a time when we need to be pulling together as a country, reaffirming our fundamental values, sending the message loud and clear to whack-jobs everywhere that violence has no place in American politics, we're head over heels in blaming each other.

I turn on the radio, and the left is blaming the right and the right is blaming the left.

Enough already. Stop. Shut up. A child is dead. A wonderful judge is dead. A congressional aide is dead. A woman saying hello to her congresswoman is dead. And more. And more injured.

I don't care who is to blame.

If we cannot come together now, if we cannot say no to all the people who are playing this ugly game and have been for so long, if now is not the moment when we say enough, no more, it doesn't matter whether this shooter was from the left or the right, we need to stop playing with fire ... then what will it take?



ing and revvvving up that thing called a thinking cap, which wore me out. I had no meat thawed out and takeout budget was empty, so after surveying the damage and lack of choices I discovered a twist on an old dish.

This takes less then 45 minutes, still uses convenience items. The hardest part is frying the bacon. It provides protein, veggies and

calcium. Sounds sort of balanced to me. Serve this with salad and bread, and dinner is ready. Enjoy!

Upgrade To Grandma's Tuna Casserole 2 boxes of mac & cheese with cheese pouches - velveeta or

deluxe 1 large can tuna 2 cups of frozen chopped broccoli or mixed veggies

1 can of cream mushroom or celery soup 4-6 slices of cooked

bacon, crumbled 1 can of chopped green chilies

1 cup of shredded mozzarella

1 cup of shredded cheddar

1 cup of heavy cream non-stick spray

Fill large pot with water and cook pasta according to directions. While the water is coming to a boil, cook the bacon crisp and let

it cool. Meanwhile, in a large bowl, open the cheese pouches and combine their incredients with the soup, green chilies, heavy cream and bacon. When water is boiling, add salt and cook the pasta. When the pasta is about a minute or so from being ready, turn off the heat and add your veggies and remove one cup of the pasta water and add that to the bow to help break down the cheese pouches. Stir well. Drain the pasta and veggies and add to the large bowl, mixing everything well. Preheat the oven to 350 degrees, spray non-stick in a large baking dish and place pasta mixture in to it. Spread it out, but do not compact the pasta down. Sprinkle both type of cheeses across the top and place in oven for about 20 minutes until cheese is melty and bubbly.

Proposal aims at healthier school lunches

WASHINGTON (AP) Schoolchildren would have to hold the fries and pick up more whole grains, fruits and vegetables — on the lunch under proposed line new federal standards

for school lunches. The Agriculture Department proposal applies to lunches subsidized by the federal government and would be the first major nutritional overhaul of



school meals in 15 years. It is expected to be announced Thursday.

The guidelines, which were obtained by The Associated Press and confirmed by USDA, would require schools to cut sodium in those meals by more than half, use more whole grains and serve low fat milk. They also would limit kids to only one cup of starchy vegetables a week, so schools couldn't offer french fries every day.

Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack said the new standards could affect more than 32 million children and are crucial because kids can consume as much as half of their daily calories in school.

"If we don't contain obesity in this country it's going to eat us alive

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in terms of health care costs," Vilsack said.

While many schools are improving meals already, others are still serving children meals high in fat, salt and calories. The new guidelines are based on 2009 recommendations by the Institute of Medicine, the health arm of the National Academy of Sciences.

The announcement comes just a few weeks after President Barack Obama signed into law a child nutrition bill that will help schools pay for the healthier foods, which often are more expensive.

Howard basketball in New Mexico for date with T-Birds

Howard College women's basketball head coach Earl Diddle believes New Mexico Junior College is the team to beat in the Western Junior College Athletic Conference.

There's reason to believe him, too, the way he describes the Lady Thunderbirds.

"I really feel that they're one of the top teams in the league," Diddle said. "They beat South Plains by 20 in the (WJCAC Pre-Conference Tournament). They pose a lot of problems for us. They shoot the 3 well and they have very, very good inside play. So they pose a lot of problems for everyone in the league."

The Hawks (15-3, 1-0 in conference play) will get their shot at NMJC at 5:45 p.m. MST today in Hobbs, N.M. in hopes of earning one of their more impressive wins

No. 1 goes down: FSU upsets Duke

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. — Derwin Kitchen scored 22 points and Florida State pulled off its latest upset of No. 1 Duke, snapping the Blue Devils' 25-game winning streak with a 66-61 victory Wednesday night.

Chris Singleton added 18 points for Florida State (12-5, 2-1 Atlantic Coast Conference), which made five free throws in the final 33 seconds to hold off the defending national champions. It was the third time since 2002 that the Seminoles beat a top-ranked Duke team at home.

"They're very fundamentally sound. They play outstanding defense and they're committed to it," Duke coach Mike Krzyzewski said. "Their defense just dominated our offense for about 25 minutes in the ballgame."

The Seminoles led 28-24 at halftime and by as many as 11 early in the second half, but the game was tight to the finish.

Kyle Singler scored 20 points and Nolan Smith had 19 for the Blue Devils, who missed their first 10 3-point attempts and shot 31.1 percent overall, ending their dreams of a perfect season.

Kitchen, a 6-foot-4 senior guard, scored 17 points in the second half and led the Seminoles with a team-high 10 rebounds for his second double-double of the season.

"I think our guys stuck with our game plan," Florida State coach Leonard Hamilton said. "They maintained their poise. We hit the big free throws down the stretch. I hope they understand now exactly the way they have to play in order to be successful."

Singleton's two free throws with 33 seconds left gave the Seminoles a 63-58 lead, but Smith's 3-point-

"We came together tonight," Singleton said. "It just feels good. If we can beat them we can beat anybody."

The Blue Devils (15-1, 2-1) hadn't lost since a 79-72 setback on March 3, 2010, at Maryland. From there, they went on to win the ACC and NCAA tournaments for their fourth national title.

The 25-game winning streak was the second-longest in Duke history.

"We have not been in a game like that. They knocked us back," Krzyzewski said. "You just learn from the experience. We have a long way to go."

It was the fourth time Florida State has defeated a top-ranked team, including in 2002 and 2006 against Duke. FSU fans rushed the floor following the final buzzer, making for a garnett-and-gold mob scene at center court, and one was still climbing on the rim 15 minutes after the game ended.

er chopped the Duke deficit to two with 26.9 seconds remaining.

That was as close as the Blue Devils got. Michael Snaer hit a pair of free throws and Okaro White added another to seal it after Duke misfired at the other end.

Duke came into the game averaging nearly 88

Heat's road streak ends in loss to Clippers

LOS ANGELES — Energized by the prospect of taking on the Big Three, the Los Angeles Clippers came out attacking and never let up.

Blake Griffin had 24 points and 14 rebounds for his 30th double-double, and the Clippers surprised Miami 111-105 Wednesday night, ending the Heat's 13-game road winning streak.

Eric Gordon added 26 points and Baron Davis had 20 points and nine assists for the Clippers, who led virtually the entire game against the NBA's second-best team. It was just the 13th win of the season for Los Angeles.

"I'm sure they were a lot more hyped up for that Christmas Day game against the Lakers and not us," Griffin said.

"Beat the Heat!" the sellout crowd stood and chanted in the closing seconds.

"It's a good win for us," Davis said in a muted locker room. "It's not like we have done anything. We still have to get a lot better to improve our record."

Dwyane Wade scored 31 points, LeBron James added 27 and Chris Bosh had 26 points and 13 rebounds for the Heat, who had also won nine in a row overall.

"It was too much for us to overcome," Heat coach Erik Spoelstra said. "They absolutely blitzed us to start the game. It looked like we were running in mud."

From the start, the Clippers repelled all of Miami's threats, the most dramatic coming with 6:37 to play.

James sprained his left ankle on a drive to the basket when he got blocked and his momentum carried him out of bounds past the baseline. He hobbled back onto the court wincing while the Heat still had the ball and sank a 3-pointer from the left corner, drawing them within two. After a timeout, James returned to the game.

"There's no damage, I got an X-ray after the game," James said. "The doctor told me it's day-to-day so I'll see how I feel tomorrow. I don't have to be a hero in the regular season if I'm not close to 100 percent."

A 3-pointer by Mario Chalmers again drew the Heat within two, but the Clippers then scored six in a row to lead 103-

95 with 4:17 left. Griffin might be the best win of had four points, with Davis sandwiching a fast-break driving layup in between.

With the crowd hanging on every possession, Chalmers and Griffin were called for offsetting technicals when they tangled with 4:32 to g0.

A three-point play by James and a 3-pointer by Bosh got the Heat within four, but Gordon calmly made two free throws to seal the stunning win.

"It means a lot," said Gordon, in his second season. "We know we're a really good team. This my career here."

Los Angeles won its third in a row and eighth in its last 11, while notching its 10th home victory nearly halfway through the season.

"It's one win," firstyear coach Vinny Del Negro said. "We don't get extra wins for this game. I'm more concerned about the growth of the team. These wins give us confidence but we have another game on Friday."

The Clippers led by 11 early in the third, when Miami twice got within three, mostly by making nine of 10 free throws.

Florida State's 11-6 lead on Singleton's jumper was the largest either team had in a first half that featured eight lead changes and seven ties. Duke's biggest lead was three points, 16-13 and 24-21.

Myths About Israel and the Middle East (2)

Should we re-examine endlessly repeated clichés?

In a previous installment in this series of clarifying messages about Israel and the Middle East, we examined certain myths which, by dint of constant repetition, had acquired currency and acceptance. We looked at the myth of "Palestinian nationhood," the myth of Judea/Samaria (the "West Bank") being "occupied territory," the myth that Jewish settlements in these territories are "the greatest obstacle to peace," and the myth that Israel is unwilling to "yield land for peace." And we cleared up the greatest myth of all, namely that Israel's administration of the territories, and not the unrelenting hatred of the Arabs against the Jews, is the root cause of the conflict between the Arabs and Israel. But those are not all the myths; there are more.

What are more of these myths?

Myth: The Arabs of Israel are a persecuted minority.

Reality: The over one million non-Jews (mostly Arabs) who are citizens of Israel have the same civil rights that Jews have. They vote, are members of the Knesset (parliament), and are part of Israel's civil and diplomatic service, just as their Jewish fellow citizens. Arabs have complete religious freedom and full access to the Israeli legal, health and educational systems including Arabic and Muslim universities. The only difference between the "rights" of Arabs and Jews is that Jewish young

men must serve three years in the military and at least one month a year until age 50. Young Jewish Arabs have no such civic obligation.

For them, military service is voluntary. Not too surprisingly, except for the Druze, very few avail themselves of the privilege.

■ Myth: Having (ill-advisedly) already given up control of the Gaza Strip, Israel should also give up the administration of Judea/Samaria (the "West Bank") because strategic depth is meaningless in this age of missiles.

Reality: Israel is a mini-state - about half the size of San Bernardino county in California. If another, even smaller ministate were carved out of it. Israel would be totally indefensible. That is the professional opinion of 100 retired U.S. generals and admirals. If the Arabs were to occupy whatever little strategic depth Israel has between the Jordan River and its populated coast, they would not need any missiles. Artillery and mortars would suffice, since Israel would be only nine miles wide at its waist. Those who urge such a course either do not understand the situation or have a death wish for Israel.

■ Myth: If Israel would allow a Palestinian state to arise in Judea and Samaria it would be a democratic state and would be totally demilitarized.

Reality: There is no prospect at all that anything resembling

a democratic state could be created in the territories. There is not a single democratic Arab state - all of them are tyrannies of varying degrees. Even today, under partial Israeli administration, Hamas and other factions fight for supremacy and ruthlessly murder each other. Another Lebanon, with its incessant civil wars, is much more likely. The lawlessness and chaos that prevail in Gaza since Israel's withdrawal is a good prospect of what would happen if Israel - foolishly and under the pressure of "world opinion" - were to abandon this territory. As for demilitarization, that is totally unlikely. Because - with Svria, Irag, Jordan

and Saudi Arabia, most of which are in a declared state of war with Israel, at its borders – an irresistible power vacuum would be created.

Despite pious promises, the arms merchants of the world would find a great new market and the neighboring hostile Arab countries would be happy to supply anything else that might be needed.

Myth:: Israel should make "confidence-building gestures" for the sake of peace.

Reality: What really is it that the world expects Israel to do for the sake of peace? Most of the 22 Arab countries consider themselves in a state of war with Israel and don't even recognize its "existence." That has been going on for over sixty vears. Isn't it about time that the Arabs made some kind of a "gesture?" Could they not for instance terminate the constant state of war? Could they not stop launching rockets into Israel from areas that Israel has abandoned for the sake of peace? Could they not stop the suicide bombings, which have killed hundreds of Israelis and which have made extreme security measures - such as the defensive fence and convoluted bypass roads - necessary? Any of these would create a climate of peace and would indeed be the "confidence-building gestures" that the world hopes for.

Countless "peace conferences" to settle this festering conflict have taken place. All have ended in failure because of the intransigence of the Arabs, President Clinton, toward the end of his presidency, convened a conference with the late unlamented Yasser Arafat and Ehud Barak, the prime minister of Israel at that time. Mr. Barak offered virtually everything that Arafat had requested, except the partition of Jerusalem and the acceptance of the so-called refugees, their descendants having swollen from the 650,000 who fled the nascent state of Israel during the War of Liberation, to an incredible 5 million. Arafat left in a huff and started his infamous intifada instead, a bloody war that has cost thousands of Palestinian and Israeli lives. Israel is America's staunchest ally and certainly its only true friend in that area of the world. It is in our national interest that reality, not myths, govern our policy.

Oncor Electric Delivery Company LLC (Oncor) publishes this notice that on January 7, 2011, Oncor filed with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission) its Petition and Statement of Intent to Change Rates, a copy of which is kept at Oncor's office at 1601 Bryan St., 23rd floor, Dallas, TX 75201. This notice is being published pursuant to Commission Procedural Rule 22.51(a)(1).

Oncor's rate filing, based on the system-wide financial results for a 12-month test year ending on June 30, 2010, adjusted for known and measureable changes, supports a net increase in transmission and distribution rates of approximately \$353 million over adjusted test-year revenues, or approximately a 12.6% increase over adjusted test-year revenues of \$2,809.2 million. Test-year revenues have been adjusted to annualize the rate increase from Oncor's last base rate case, to normalize billing units, to remove the revenues associated with Oncor's Advanced Metering Cost Recovery Factor, Energy Efficiency Cost Recovery Factor, and Rate Case Expense surcharge, and to increase test-year revenues to reflect Transmission Cost of Service (TCOS) and Transmission Cost Recovery Factor (TCRF) adjustments approved or pending after June 30, 2010. If the approved or pending TCOS and TCRF adjustments are excluded from the adjustments to test-year revenues (and thus included in proposed base rates), the total base rate increase over adjusted test-year revenues is approximately \$441 million, or approximately a 16.2% increase over adjusted

test-year revenues of \$2,720.6 million. If approved, the increased rates will be charged to Oncor's direct customers, all retail electric providers (REPs), in those portions of Oncor's service area under the original jurisdiction of the Commission. 





This Date In History

Today is Thursday, Jan. 13, the 13th day of 2011. There are 352 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight History:

On Jan. 13, 1794, President George Washington approved a measure adding two stars and two stripes to the American flag, following the admission of Vermont and Kentucky to the Union. (The number of stripes was later reduced to the original 13.)

On this date:

In 1733, James Oglethorpe and some 120 English colonists arrived at Charleston, S.C., while en route to settle in present-day Georgia.

In 1864, composer Stephen Foster died impoverished in a New York hospital at age 37. (In his pocket: a note which read, "Dear friends and gentle hearts.")

In 1898, Emile Zola's famous defense of Capt. Alfred Dreyfus, "J'accuse," (zhah-KOOZ') was nublished in Paris

In 1941, a new law went into effect granting Puerto Ricans U.S. birthright citizenship. Novelist and poet James Joyce died in Zurich, Switzerland, less than a month before his 59th birthday.

In 1945, during World War II, Soviet forces began a huge, successful offensive against the Germans in Eastern Europe.

In 1962, comedian Ernie Kovacs died in a car crash in west Los Angeles 10 days before his 43rd birthday.

In 1966, Robert C. Weaver was named Secretary of Urban Housing and Development by President Lyndon B. Johnson; Weaver became the first black Cabinet member.

In 1978, former Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey died in Waverly, Minn., at age 66.

In 1982, an Air Florida 737 crashed into Washington, D.C.'s 14th Street Bridge after takeoff during a snowstorm and fell into the Potomac River, killing a total of 78 people.

In 1990, L. Douglas Wilder of Virginia became the nation's first elected black governor as he took the oath of office in Richmond.


