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# Sands trustees eye bond

ACKERLY - School trustees here will decide whether to call for a May 14 bond election when they hold their monthly meeting at 7 p.m. Thursday in the district board room.

Trustees will explore two possible bond options during the meeting. The first would ask voters for \$1 million to upgrade the campus' heating and cooling systems, while the second option would be for \$2 million, which would pay for the HVAC upgrades,

and a new track surface. Superintendent

Wayne Blount said trustees would discuss both options Thursday.

Blount said the

boiler, which is 50 years old, and the chiller, which was installed more than 30 years ago, are no longer economically feasible to maintain.

"We definitely got our money's worth out of them," he said of the systems. "But they are getting harder and harder to repair." Under the \$2 million option, school officials also would purchase three school buses to replace ones bought during the 1992-93 school year, and resurface the track at the

# Invasion suspect arrested

A suspect in the June 5 home invasion in the 600 block of State Street was arrested and charged with aggravated robbery Tuesday, bringing the total number of arrests in the case to more than a half-doz-

Aaron Joe Guzman, 19, was arrested Tuesday by the HCSO on a Big Spring Police Department warrant for aggravated robbery and a motion to revoke probation for possession of a controlled substance, according to law enforcement officials.

According to police reports. numerous suspects — witnesses stated there were between five and seven suspects involved — stormed the home of a Big Spring family at approximately 11 p.m. June 5, kicking in the side and front

# Family, friends waiting for answers as probe continues

COLORADO CITY - Frustration continues to mount among friends and family still hoping for the safe return of 13-year-old Hailey Dunn, who went missing from her home here Dec. 27.

Dunn has been the focus of a region-wide search since her mother, Billie Dunn, reported her missing to the Colorado City

Police Department Dec. 28. Searches of fields and abandoned structures have been conducted in Colorado City, as well as numerous nearby communities, including Dunn, Abilene, Odessa and Big Spring.

The lone suspect in the 25-year-old Shawn Adkins, was named a "person of interest" by law enforcement officials several

Candidate filings have been few and far between in area school trustee races.

Monday was the first day for prospective candidates to file for the May 14 school board elections

and few people have thrown their hats into the ring as of yet. School districts in Big

Spring, Coahoma, Forsan, Stanton and Ackerly will hold trustee elections this May. Candidates have until

March 14 to file their paperwork to get their names on the ballot. Filings can be done at the respective districts' business offices during normal operating hours.

District 1 trustee Irene Galan is the only person to date to file for candidacy in the Big Spring Independent School District, Business Manager Debbie Green said. Along with District 1, District 3, currently represented by Alan Partee, will be decided in May. Partee indicated in January that he will not seek re-election.

Other trustee elections scheduled for May include:

• Coahoma ISD — At-large seats currently held by Lori Martinez and Patric Robinson will be decided. No candidates had filed as of Tuesday morning, said Judy Dobbs, administration secretary.



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## Big Spring man dead, another critical in New Mexico crash

HOBBS, N.M. — New Mexico law enforcement officials continue to investigate an accident Saturday night that left one Big Spring man dead and another in critical condition.

A New Mexico State Police report states that Cory Puga, 19, of Big Spring, died of injuries sustained in a one-vehicle rollover about 15 miles northwest of Hobbs. The report states that a 2002 Chevro-

let pickup carrying Puga, Chad Puga and Chase Musgrove was westbound on State Road 529 when it overturned near the 22 mile marker. Cory Puga and Musgrove, who were the passengers in the vehicle, were ejected.

Neither man was wearing a seat belt at the time of the accident, the report

All three men were transported to University Medical Center in Lubbock. Cory Puga died Sunday morning and Musgrove remains hospitalized in critical condition, a state police spokesperson said this morning.

Chad Puga, who was driving the pickup, was treated for his injuries and released.

"Driver inattention" is the suspected cause of the crash. Neither weather or alcohol were contributing factors in the accident, the report stated.

Blount said it made more economic sense for Sands to finance the projects through bonds than out of general revenue coffers.

As a so-called "property-rich" district, tax revenue raised within Sands CISD is subject to state recapture, meaning that the more revenue raised locally, the more that is disbursed to the state. That wouldn't be the case with a bond — debt service money is not subject to state recapture, Blount

"On the maintenance and operation

side of the budget, we need to collect \$160,000 just to keep \$80,000," Blount said. "It makes better sense for us to purchase these items through a bond than through (general revenue). If you can do that, you're saving money for your taxpayers.

Blount estimated that the \$2 million bond would add around 12 cents to the district's tax rate for the 10-year life of the bond.

Sands voters approved a \$3 million

bond for a new gymnasium four years

weeks ago. However, according to Colorado City city manager Pete Kampfer, there hasn't been any new information to release to the family or press in the Adkins, who has main-

tained his innocence in the girl's disappearance since first being questioned by law enforcement officials, has remained out of the public eye since retaining an attorney. However, Adkins recently spoke with television personality Nancy Grace.

Adkins explained conflicting reports about whether he quit his job on the morning of Dec. 27 or was fired, saying that he told investigators the truth — that he quit — but he initially told Hailey's mother Billie Dunn that he was fired to avoid having a fight with her over it.

When asked about cell phone pings suggesting he was in the Colorado City area after leaving work while investigators say he told them he had gone to his mother's house in Big Spring, he insisted that he was never asked specifically when he went so those records do not contradict his story.

According to the affidavits, Adkins deleted information about

his call history from his phone while police were interviewing him. "That never happened," he recently told Abilene news source KTAB.

Adkins also denied making a comment to Hailey's uncle about how hurting a 13-yearold girl would be like killing a deer. He said the uncle told him he had never told that to authorities. "I love animals," he said. "I wouldn't hurt animals He admitted that he

has not been cooperating with investigators since hiring a lawyer because his attorney told him not to talk to them. He called the investigation a "witch hunt" and said that he did not trust the police anymore because "they were just trying to pin it on somebody, which was me."

Billie Dunn and Hailey Dunn's father, Clint Dunn, have both expressed frustration with the investigation.

"I really wish we could get somewhere and get some answers," Billie Dunn recently told reporters. "I'll do anything I can to get some answers. I know they're working long hours, but I do want some answers and I want my daugh-

# NPR, PBS subsidies should go

**▼**he liberal group Moveon. org has been sending out e-mails to warn that Republicans are back in control of the House and to ask recipients to sign a petition that states, "Congress must protect NPR and PBS and

guarantee them permanent funding, free from political meddling." Of course, the

best way to guarantee no political meddling would be to eliminate some \$500 million in federal funds allocated annually to these media's parent organization, the Corporation for Public

Broadcasting. Also of course, the fact that Moveon.org wants to keep federal tax dollars pouring into

the public broadcasting bucket should end any question as to whether NPR and PBS news programs lean left. They do. Yet for all his deficit-reduction

talk in the face of America's \$14 trillion federal debt, President Obama wants to increase CPB's funding by \$6 million in 2014. Last year, former Clinton

White House Chief of Staff Erskine Bowles and GOP Sen. Alan Simpson of Wyoming — cochairmen of Obama's bipartisan

commission on reducing the national debt — showed more fortitude. They released their own debt-reduction plan to cut domestic spending by \$100 billion. "The current CPB funding is the highest it has ever been,' the Bowles-Simpson plan explained. Their plan: Eliminate all of it.

I think public broadcasting stations would be better off if they stopped sucking at the public teat. If viewers and listeners thought that they weren't already contributing by paying taxes, perhaps they would be more inclined to pony up during pledge drives. And maybe public broadcast-

ers would lose some of their irritating sense of entitlement.

Consider their new website, 170millionAmericans.org — a name that is supposed to represent the NPR and PBS base. If public stations had that kind of support, they wouldn't need to claim they had that kind of sup-Then there's the question of

whether taxpayers should be paying for more radio and television. As Rep. Doug Lamborn, R-Colo., wrote in a congressional newspaper, The Hill, "What I oppose is subsidizing an organization that no longer provides, if it ever did, an essential government service. When the federal government is now borrowing

more than 40 cents of every \$1 it spends, no one can justify paying for services that are widely available in the private market.

The bias issue won't go away. In October, NPR fired Senior News Analyst Juan Williams after he said on Fox News that he got "nervous" when he saw people dressed in Muslim garb

on a plane. NPR CEO Vivian Schiller denied that the firing had anything to do with the fact that one of NPR's own appeared regularly on the conservative cable network. In light of snide personal remarks for which Schiller later apologized, few believed her.

The 170 Million Americans site extols public broadcasting, thus: "The free flow of ideas and debate helps us participate in the political process as informed citizens." Problem: A free flow of ideas doesn't run in one direction; it flows both ways. But I don't think NPR swells understand that.

Megrahi blew up Pan Am Flight 103 over Lockerbie, Scot-

land, on Dec. 21. 1988, murdering 270 people, including 190 Ameri-

by Western justice to escape his fate. Proceedings dragged on for vears, and it wasn't until Jan. 31, 2001, that a three-judge Scottish panel finally convicted him. Megrahi was sentenced to life in

Which should have been the end of a long, agonizing process that had caused tremendous suffering to the loved ones of those who died.

Except the agony was just beginning.

Because eight years later, with no real explanation, Megrahi was released from prison and sent home to Libya and adoring Why? One guy: Scottish Jus-

tice Secretary Kenny MacAskill. MacAskill announced that Megrahi had prostate cancer and had only three months to live and deserved to live them at home in Libya. MacAskill is not a doctor, and

nor did he assemble a blue-ribbon panel to examine Megrahi. Rumors swirled, including the possibility that the British government was trying to help British Petroleum gain access to Libyan oil reserves.

Nonetheless, on Aug. 20, 2009, just 10 days after MacAskill made his shocking announcement, Megrahi was released and flew home to Libva, where he was promptly supposed to die.

Like many of the Texas state agencies, the Texas State Library and Archives Commission is in a world of hurt due to the budget crisis. TSLAC's budget in FY10/11 will go from \$39.5 million to \$11.65 million in FY12/13.

What does this mean to you and your local library?

It means that HCL will no longer have access to the TexShare databases; direct aid which assists us in programming and/or material purchases will be lost; training opportunities (that are required) will no longer available; and matching funds (approximately \$8 million) from the Institute of Museum and Libraries Services, may potentially be lost due to loss of maintenance

of effort. Additionally, the collaboration between TSLAC and the Texas Education Agency that has been in place to have the K-12 databases in your local schools will be cut. This means that the local schools districts, if they wish to purchase those databases, must find money from their budget to fund them. As an example, the TexShare databases that HCL pays \$450 a year for, in real life would cost more

than \$100,000 to purchase on a local basis. What do those resources do? They enable us to offer a broader range of material and services that HCL cannot provide due to cost.

We have access to 14,290 full-text journals, 2,612 newspapers, 5,224 reference books and 420,519 primary source documents. All of this aids the educational aims of our local schools and colleges. Cost on the statewide basis will go from \$9.5 million to \$600,000. Services to academic and public libraries will be zilch, zero, nothing.

Included in TexShare databases are business, medical and health, books and literature, and several genealogy and historical databases that can be used for both educational and recreational uses.

How can you help? I am providing an URL that will take you to a website where you can express your support for all libraries. It is located on the Texas Library Association's website (which is spearheading the drive to keep libraries viable). The site is http://capwiz.com/ala/tx/home/. When you arrive there, press on the link that says "Take Action." That will take you to a pre-written letter that will be sent to Governor Perry, Senator Kel Seliger and Representative Jim Landtroop. If the address I have

provided does not work, you may go to www. txla.org and find the link to the "Take Action" site.

Please understand that your local library services will not wither and die. What it means that if we wish to retain these services, it will come out of the local budget. In turn, it may mean fewer materials will be purchased, the summer reading program may not be as much "fun" and training opportunities will be fewer.

Today in Austin, librarians from all over the state are converging on the Capitol to lobby to retain funding for all libraries.

Please express your support by contacting your elected officials. I have prepared a sample letter and have the names and addresses for those who wish to mail letters of support. They are located beside the online catalogs for you to pick up. Thank you for your support.



#### F-35 engine battle breaks out on GOP spending bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Obama administration's campaign against a costly alternative engine for the Pentagon's next-generation fighter jet faces a critical vote in the GOP-controlled House, its fate to be decided by more than 90 freshmen lawmakers who previously haven't had to choose sides between two major defense companies.

The expected vote Wednesday comes as the House enters its second day of debate on a \$1.2 trillion spending bill that would wrap up the unfinished business lawmakers inherited after last year's collapse of the budget process. That includes \$1.03 trillion for agency operating budgets that need annual approval by Congress and \$158 billion for military operations in Iraq and Afghanistan.

The engine battle pits Obama and Defense Secretary Robert Gates who say the engine would waste almost \$3 billion over the next few vears — against GOP leaders like House Speaker John Boehner, R-Ohio, whose state is a chief beneficiary. The spending measure includes \$450 million for the engine, which would be built by the General Electric Co. and Rolls-Royce in Ohio, Indiana and other states.

On the other side are lawmakers from Connecticut, where the main F-35 fighter engine is built by Pratt & Whitney, as well members from Florida, Texas and other states.

The F-35 engine vote presents 87 GOP freshmen — infused with a fervor to cut spending — with a dilemma: Vote with the Obama administration to cut spending now or side with supporters of the alternative engine, who argue that it would save money by injecting competition into the F-35 program, the costliest weapons program in Defense Department history.

#### Bahrain protest calls grow from occupied square in Gulf nation's capital

MANAMA, Bahrain (AP) — Protesters demanding sweeping political reforms from Bahrain's rulers held their ground Wednesday in an Egyptstyle occupation of the capital's landmark square, staging a third day of demonstrations that have brought unprecedented pressure in one of Washington's most strategic allies in the Gulf.

Security forces have pulled back sharply — apparently on orders to ease tensions — after clashes that left at least two people dead and dozens injured. Police helicopters, however, flew low over a major funeral procession for one of the victims in which mourners called him a "martyr" and pledged more protests in the island nation — home to the U.S. Navy's 5th Fleet.

Thousands of people spent the night in a makeshift tent camp in Manama's Pearl Square, which was swarmed by demonstrators a day earlier. One demonstrator used a bullhorn to call on protesters to remain until their demands are met, as the Arab wave for change takes hold in the Gulf.

The protests began Monday as a cry for the country's Sunni monarchy to loosen its grip, including hand-picking most top government posts, and open more opportunities for the country's majority Shiites, who have long complained of being blocked from decision-making roles.

But the uprising's demands have steadily reached further. Many protesters are calling for the government to provide more jobs and better hous-

ing and free all political detainees. Increasingly, protesters are also chanting slogans to wipe away the entire ruling dynasty that has led Bahrain for more than 200 years.

#### Navy base in Bahrain means U.S. has a lot at stake as Mideast unrest spreads to Persian Gulf

WASHINGTON (AP) — Unrest surging through the Arab world has so far taken no toll on the American military. But that could change if revolt washes over the tiny Persian Gulf kingdom of Bahrain — longtime home to the U.S. Navy's mighty 5th Fleet and arguably the Middle East anchor of U.S. defense strategy. The discontent that has spilled

into the streets of Bahrain's capital, Manama, this week features no anti-American sentiment, but the U.S. has a lot at stake in preserving its dominant naval presence in the Gulf.

In announcing that it is "very concerned" about violence linked to the protests, the State Department on Tuesday underscored Bahrain's strategic importance as a U.S. partner.

"The United States welcomes the government of Bahrain's statements that it will investigate these deaths, and that it will take legal action against any unjustified use of force by Bahraini security forces," said department spokesman P.J. Crowley. "We urge that it follow through on these statements as quickly as possible."

The 5th Fleet operates at least one aircraft carrier in the Gulf at all times, along with an "amphibious ready group" of ships with Marines aboard. Their presence is central to a longstanding U.S. commitment to ensuring the free flow of oil through the Gulf, while keeping an eye on a hostile Iran and seeking to deter piracy in the region.

#### Dalai Lama nephew killed in Fla. accident is remembered as dedicated activist for Tibetans

BLOOMINGTON, Ind. (AP) — In his vouth. Jigme Norbu was an American "bad boy" who thought his relationship to his uncle, the Dalai Lama. gave him a special status. Over time, acquaintances say. Norbu's sense of entitlement turned into an embrace of the work of the exiled Tibetan spiritual leader and his own father, as Norbu walked thousands of miles to promote awareness of Tibet's struggle for independence from China.

The work that made him a hero to thousands of Tibetans around the world ended Monday when Norbu was struck by an SUV about 25 miles south of St. Augustine, Fla., during the first day of a 300-mile walk. The walk was the latest in a journey that had seen the 45-year-old activist log more than 7.800 miles on foot and bicycle in the U.S. and overseas to support freedom for Tibet and highlight the suffering of its people.

News of Norbu's death stunned his supporters and acquaintances, who said he had grown into his role as a leader for Tibetans in recent years after a wild youth in the Indiana college town where his family moved in the 1970s.

"He grew up in America. He was Americanized and Westernized," said David Colman, whose son owns a fine arts gallery near Norbu's Tibet and Indian food restaurant in Bloomington. "But he was the Dalai Lama's nephew, and there was a certain specialness that he assumed as a result of

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that. He viewed himself some ways as royalty — which on a religious level,

"He was the nephew of the Dalai Lama, and that tends to shape your ego. And it did."

#### Texas leaders consider freeing more prisoners

AUSTIN (AP) — Texas lawmakers are discussing whether releasing nonviolent convicts is a moneysaving way to help deal with a projected \$15 billion state budget shortfall. Senate Criminal Justice Committee Chairman

John Whitmire of Houston says the state does not have the resources to continue business as usual in Texas. Whitmire said Tuesday that "everything is on the table for discussion this year."

Police, prosecutors and crime victims groups are urging caution in paroling any more convicts.

House Corrections Committee chairman Jerry Madden of Richardson says whatever lawmakers decide, it should not compromise public safety.

A 2009 legislative study urged that additional medical paroles be considered.

#### Day care head charged with capital murder in death

AUSTIN (AP) — The director of an Austin-area day care center has been indicted on a capital murder charge in the death of a 10-week-old child left in

The Hays County grand jury returned the count against 32-year-old Christina Suzanne Lyons. The indictment accuses her of intentionally causing blunt force trauma to the child's head on Nov. 18. The child died on Nov. 25.

Hays County District Attorney Sherri Tibbe tells the Austin American-Statesman that her office won't seek the death penalty, meaning conviction would bring a life sentence without parole.

#### Dozens question treatment by Houston-area officers

HOUSTON (AP) — Some audience members in Houston stood in line more than an hour to criticize their treatment by law officers.

Several hundred people attended a town hall

#### 2nd Texas man executed for torture-slaying

HUNTSVILLE (AP) - A North Texas man convicted in the 1998 torture-slaying of a 19-year-old mentally challenged woman apologized profusely Tuesday just minutes before he was executed, exactly 13 years after the murder.

Michael Wavne Hall, 31, received lethal injection less than an hour after the U.S. Supreme Court refused to stop his punishment for the abduction and murder of Amy Robinson.

Hall was pronounced dead at 6:23 p.m. at the Huntsville Unit of the Texas Department of Crimi-

The second man convicted in Robinson's death, Robert Neville, was executed five years ago.

"I would like to give my sincere apology to Amy's family," Hall said as he was strapped to the death

"We caused a lot of heartache, grief, pain and suffering, and I am sorry. I know it won't bring her

Speaking just above a whisper, his voice shaking and eyes watery, Hall said he wasn't the same person and repeatedly asked for forgiveness. Relatives of his victim stood a few feet away, looking through

"I am sorry for everything. I wish I could take it back, but I can't."

Nine minutes later, he was pronounced dead.

#### Texas ramps up Medicaid fraud collections to \$500M

AUSTIN (AP) — A state official says increased enforcement has helped Texas recover more than \$500 million in Medicaid fraud cases since 2003.

David Morales, who's the deputy first assistant attorney general of Texas, testified before the Senate Subcommittee on Medicaid Tuesday. Lawmakers expanded the Medicaid civil fraud division in Texas four years ago.

State lawmakers are still seeking ways to boost fraud prevention.

Texas faces a budget shortfall of at least \$15 billion, and controlling the state's Medicaid expenses has been identified as a top priority.





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

# Cards unfazed by Pujols deadline

JUPITER, Fla. — Albert Pujols' locker was stocked Wednesday morning with a red jersey, four pairs of white and gray baseball pants, his spring-training parking pass and several other items.

Still missing: A new contract from the St. Louis Cardinals, and the window to get that done is fast closing.

With a noon Eastern deadline for a new deal looming, Pujols was not at camp with the Cardinals on Wednesday. Many of his teammates were, including a handful of position players who were at work ahead of schedule. Pujols is expected to join them Thursday, whether or not the three-time NL MVP has a contract done to his liking.

"It really doesn't matter to us," said Cardinals pitcher and union rep Kyle McClellan. "It's none of our business. It's none of anybody's business. ... The truth is, I've never been on the mound and thinking of Albert Pujols' contract."

St. Louis manager Tony La Russa said Tuesday that he believes Pujols is feeling pressure from the union to "set the bar" with this deal, which some expect could exceed Alex Rodriguez's \$275 million, 10-year pact with the New York Yankees.

On Wednesday, La Russa insisted that he'd said too much already.

# Armstrong officially off bike \_ 'Retirement 2.0'

Lance Armstrong is calling this one "Retirement

Almost a month after finishing 65th in his last competitive race in Australia, and nearly six years removed from the last of an unprecedented seven straight Tour de France titles, the 39-year-old cyclist made clear there is no reset button this time.

This time, he's leaving professional racing be-

"Never say never," Armstrong laughed at the start of an exclusive interview Tuesday with The

Associated Press, then quickly added, "Just kidding."

His retirement ends a comeback effort that failed to produce an eighth title or diminish talk that performance-enhancing drugs helped his career. The timing has as much to do with his growing responsibilities and family as it does with the physical limitations time has imposed. He's tired, and tired of being hounded. Armstrong will miss competing — let alone dominating a sport like none before him — but not the 24/7/365 training regimen that

"I can't say I have any regrets. It's been an excellent ride. I really thought I was going to win another tour," Armstrong said about his comeback attempt in 2009, four years after his first retirement. "Then I lined up like everybody else and wound up third.

"I have no regrets about last year, either," he added, despite finishing 23rd. "The crashes, the problems with the bike — those were things that were beyond my control."

Armstrong spoke to the AP in a telephone inter-

view and in a videotaped interview from his office in Austin, Texas.

Armstrong zoomed out of relative obscurity after a life-threatening bout with testicular cancer to win his first tour in 1999, then set about recalibrating both the popularity of his sport and how much influence athletes can wield as advocates for a cause — in his case, on behalf of cancer survivors and researchers worldwide.

International Cycling Union President Pat McQuaid had high praise for Armstrong.

"His contribution to cycling has been enormous, from both the sporting point of view and his personality. All sports need global icons and he has become a global icon for cycling," said McQuaid, speaking to The Associated Press by telephone from the Tour of Oman. "The sport of cycling has a lot to be thankful for because of Lance Armstrong."

Along the way, Armstrong also became one of the most controversial figures in the evolving battle against doping in sports. He claims to be the most-tested athlete on the planet during his career. Armstrong came back clean every time, and vehemently denies ever using performance-enhancing drugs.

Even so, he remains shadowed by a federal investigation into the sport launched last year following accusations by former teammate and disgraced 2006 tour champion Floyd Landis that Armstrong used drugs and taught other riders how to beat testing. Though the probe is continuing, lawyers familiar with the case told the AP recently that any possible indictments are a long way

"I can't control what goes on in regards to the investigation. That's why I hire people to help me with that. I try not to let it bother me and just keep rolling right along. I know what I know," Armstrong said. "I know what I do and I know what I did. That's not going to change."

What won't change, either, is his tenacious campaigning to raise funds and awareness in the fight against a disease his doctors once believed would keep Armstrong from competing at anything more strenuous than gin rummy.

That was 1996. A year later, he set up the Livestrong Foundation and raised \$10,000. In the intervening years, Armstrong used his story, his celebrity and hard work to sell millions of those ubiquitous plastic yellow wrist bracelets and enlist lawmakers in Texas and global policymakers on the scale of Bill Clinton in the cause.

By the end of last year, despite tough economic times, the foundation had raised nearly \$400 million total. But the real heavy lifting may just be beginning.

After lobbying successfully for a Texas state constitutional amendment to provide \$3 billion for cancer research over a 10-year period, Armstrong now has his sights set on California. This summer, he'll work with legislators there to draw up and put on the ballot a measure mandating a cigarette tax with the proceeds to fund further research. Come September, Armstrong will also plead his case before a United Nations General Assembly special session on non-communicable diseases that he provided much of the impetus for.

"We knew we'd be able to have some impact, but we didn't know we'd pick up so much momentum," he said.

That's how Armstrong broke through nearly every barrier the sport had erected over a century and more — by leading with his chin. He spilled blood on the roads, came back from crashes and more than once, crossed the finish line of a stage race draped over his handlebars like a man hanging on for life instead of an unbreakable machine.

One thing that never changed, though, was how Armstrong's withering gaze controlled the pack of riders around him. He doled out favors, like stage wins, or withheld them as the mood struck him. He could command the peloton to speed up to chase a breakaway rider or slow down with an ease the old-time cycling bosses — respectfully called patrons — would have envied.

That was just one reason Armstrong leaves the sport with nearly as many enemies as friends.

"A lot of that has been overanalyzed and inaccurately portrayed, but it's part and parcel of cycling. It's how cycling operates," Armstrong said. "There's too much infighting, jealousy and bitterness within the sport, so everybody tries to pick apart a person or a spectacular performance.

"And some of it," he added, "we bring on ourselves."

Cycling made Armstrong wealthy several times over, and many of the sponsors he brought into the sport continue to use him as a pitchman. A second career in politics someday does not seem out of the question.

"I don't think so. I get asked that question a lot. It's a job. It's probably

More often than not, you win a trick when you can, but the overriding factor in every case is good judgment.

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# Colts put franchise tag on Manning

The Associated Press **INDIANAPOLIS** 

The Indianapolis Colts are keeping Peyton Manning — no matter what it costs.

Manning, the only four-time MVP in league history, has been given the exclusive franchise tag, a move that could cost the Colts \$23 million next season. Team owner Jim Irsay announced the decision Tuesday night on Twitter.

"We have placed the franchise tag on Peyton while we continue to negotiate a long term deal," Irsay wrote.

The move is hardly a

surprise. Last year, Irsay promised to make Manning the NFL's highest-paid player. He has reiter-

ated that position many times since then with one caveat — if the Colts couldn't reach a new deal with Manning before free agency started they would use the franchise tag.

The Colts did the same thing in 2004 before eventually agreeing to a seven-year, \$98 million deal. The Colts then pulled the tag. Irsay hasn't backed

down on either promise, and Manning, as he usually does, has remained silent about the contract.

Three weeks ago, the Colts put their first formal proposal on the table. It was an offer Irsay and team president Bill Polian wanted to make last October, but Man-

ning informed the team then, through his agent, that he did not want to start negotiating until

after the season. The current offer is believed to be richer than the four-year, \$72 million contract that New England quarterback Tom Brady signed

in September. Brady's contract also included \$48.5 million in guaranteed money, and Irsay has called that deal the standard.

"It's not a normal negotiation, his legacy and our relationship, it's very unusual," Irsay said last month.

On Tuesday, Indy decided not to wait any longer to make its decision.

How critical is Manning to the Colts' success?

In 13 seasons, he has broken all the franchise's career records for quarterbacks and has never missed a start. He's taken Indy to the playoffs 11 times, captured seven AFC South titles in eight years,

won two AFC championships, one Super Bowl title and a Super Bowl MVP Award.

The move does free up the Colts to work on other contracts before the collective bargaining agreement expires March 3.

The list of their potential free agents includes running back Joseph Addai, kicker Adam Vinatieri; Charlie Johnson, Manning's blind side protector; Melvin Bullitt, a key backup at safety who is ready to start; starting linebacker Clint Session

and starting defensive

tackle Dan Muir. Irsay also has promised "significant" announcements in the
