Following on the heels of an increase in fall enrollment, the spring semester for Howard College has set yet another record for the district with spring enrollment numbers at 5,115.

"Reaching the 5,000 enrollment mark for the district is an outstanding achievement for Howard College," said Dr. Cheryl T. Sparks, President. "This growth is the result of a tremendous amount of work on all campuses and shows the effectiveness of our partnerships throughout

The Big Spring campus enrollment tallied in at 1,828, representing an 8 percent increase over the spring 2010 semester, while the Lamesa

Skywarn classes March 10

Would you know what to do if severe weather threatened the Crossroads

That's the question the National Weather Service is hoping area resi-

dents will ask themselves, as the service prepares to hold its annual Skywarn classes throughout West Texas, including March 10 in the Big Spring City Council Chambers, located at 307 E. Fourth Street.

Set for 7 p.m. until 9 p.m., Chamness local emergency response officials say the SkyWarn class is a great way to brush up on your bad-

weather skills.

"The SkyWarn school is put on by the National Weather Service to train people in the community on how to look at the clouds and conditions and tell what's going on," said Big Spring Police Department Lt. Terry Chamness. "It's very intense. It's very good training and it's only a two hour class. They will also have information on how to go online to the National Weather Service website and track the weather on their radar sites. That way they can see what's coming up."

Chamness said the course will cover the most common severe weather situations for the Howard County area in hopes of preparing area residents for the worst case scenario.

"It's really a lot of good information for people to have," Chamness said. "It gives people a basic knowledge of what severe weather is like in our area. Since we're getting ready to head into the severe weather season, which begins in March and lasts until October, this is really important informa-

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Charges grow in deadly day care fire

HOUSTON — A day care operator ac-

cused of leaving the children she was watching alone when a fire broke out at the facility, killing four kids, faced a growing list of charges Wednesday as authorities continued to answer questions about why the woman wasn't detained before she fled to Nigeria. Prosecutors have now filed a total of

10 charges against Jessica Tata, Donna Hawkins, a spokeswoman with the Harris County District Attorney's Office, said Wednesday. Joining the reckless injury to a child charge that had been filed earlier in the

week are six more counts of the same charge, as well as three counts of abandoning a child. All the new charges were filed late Tuesday. The reckless injury to a child charges each carry a sentence of up to 20 years in

prison. The abandoning a child charges

have a sentence of up to 10 years.

Prosecutors have filed a total of 10 charges against Jessica Tata, Donna Hawkins, a spokeswoman with the Harris County District Attorney's Office, said Wednesday.

The Feb. 24 blaze at the day care facility, run out of a west Houston home, also injured three other children.

Attempts by The Associated Press to contact Tata's family in person and by phone at multiple addresses and tele-

phone listings have been unsuccessful. Houston Fire Department investigators accuse Tata of leaving all seven children who were in the home at the time of the fire without adult supervision.

Investigators said surveillance video

shows she was shopping at a nearby Tar-

get store when the fire started.

Investigators believe the fire was started by a stove top burner that had been left on. Tata told investigators the fire started in the kitchen while she was in the bathroom.

Earlier this week, arson investigators and Harris County District Attorney Pat Lykos exchanged barbs in media reports over whether one of the agencies might have dropped the ball in not charging Tata before she became a fugitive. The first charge against Tata was filed Sunday, a day after authorities say she fled But on Wednesday, Fire Department

Chief Terry Garrison tried to downplay any perceptions the two agencies were fighting.

Garrison said that in retrospect, he might have had investigators follow Tata to keep tabs on her. "Somewhere along the way we may

have made a mistake. We are not going

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

campus bounced back from a fall decrease and realized a 2 percent increase.

SouthWest Collegiate School for the Deaf (SWCID) saw a slight drop of 26 students, representing an 18 percent decrease due to the way state enrollment numbers are calculated. However, for the first time, the campus also serves an additional 16 students through the Virtual College of Texas (VCT) and has four students who take classes on the Howard College Big Spring campus, bringing their total number of students back up to 136.

Holding true to form, one area of particular growth showed up again in the San Angelo campus enrollment as it grew by 587 students, or 24.7 percent, over the spring 2010 semester.

"For the past several semesters, the San Angelo campus has seen enrollment increases across the board," said Le-Anne Byrd, Provost for the San Angelo campus. "Our campus

students and we are doing our best to keep up with the continual demand for new programs, services, and facilities." One such program addition

is busting at the seams with

was seen when the campus began offering the traditional transferable degrees - Associate of Science (AS), Associate of Arts (AA), and the Associate of Arts in Teaching (AAT). "I think we are responding to

our community by providing these degrees in San Angelo. as well as other programs and services," added Byrd. "It is important for us to listen to our students, businesses and communities and respond to their ever changing needs."

In addition to the degree plans now available on the San Angelo campus and extensive dual credit enrollment throughout the district, administrators see the economy playing a large part in the increases. "When people are losing jobs

or not able to find jobs with their current skills, they go back to school," said Sparks. "And community colleges offer a great resource. We're affordable, accessible and target all different types of learners." While the economy is still

in a rough spot in Texas, college administrators have been working double-time with local agencies to meet the growing demand for more skilled workers and new career technical education programs. "We have been further de-

veloping our Career Technical Education programs to serve all different levels of students," said Sparks. "Our traditional and non-traditional students are both finding value in the CTE programs as they are learning skill sets that make them immediately employable."

The enrollment numbers also continue to support HC's designation as a Hispanic Serving Institution, which allows the college to qualify for certain federal grants such as the Title V grant recently awarded to the institution.

"This designation is important for us as it allows us to compete for funding to develop and improve our services to our students," said Dr. Sparks. "We see our culture and demographics changing in Texas cess every funding source possible to continue to meet the needs of all learners. We can do a better job of that with additional grant funding through the HSI programs." As the state of Texas faces se-

to blame anybody," he said.

Garrison said investigators had trusted Tata's attorney, Mike Monks, who had indicated the day care operator was going to speak with authorities.

But Monks said he was never retained as Tata's attorney and thus never made any promises to authorities that they could speak to her.

Garrison, along with the U.S. Marshals Service in Houston, said a "red notice" has been sent out by the international police agency Interpol on Tata that police agencies around the world to be on the lookout for her. A spokeswoman for Interpol in Washington, D.C. did not immediately return a call.

Even if authorities determine that Tata is in Nigeria, it won't be easy to get her back to the United States, said Douglas McNabb, a Houston attorney who specializes in international extradition law.

Soldier impersonators target women in Internet scams

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — Con artists are targeting women on Facebook in what's becoming an alltoo-common ruse: They steal photos of soldiers to set up profiles, profess their love and devotion in sappy messages — and then ask their victims to cut a check.

Army Sgt. James Hursey, 26, discharged and sent home from war in Iraq to nurse a back injury, found a page with his photos on Facebook — on a profile that wasn't his. It was fake, set up by someone claiming to be an activeduty soldier looking for

Military officials say they've seen hundreds of similar cases in the past several years. Some of the impersonators have even used photos of soldiers who have died overseas.

"It's identity theft, really, if you think about it," said Hursey, of Corbin, Ky., a married father of a 2-year-old. The impersonator us-

ing Hursey's photos portrayed himself as a soldier named "Sergent (sic) Mark Johnson." The fake followed the same steps every time: Send a friend request, immediately express undying love and affection, and ask for mon-

The fake's cover was blown, though: Janice Robinson, 53, of Orlando, Fla., knew something wasn't right when the man professed his love to her and signed every message with, "Johnson cares." She had begun talking to him thinking he was one of several people named Mark Johnson that she knew.

"I said, 'How can you say you love me? You

don't even know me. You are insane," she told The Associated Press in a telephone interview. "... You could tell the guy in the picture was young. I'm 53 years old. You can look at my picture and tell I'm not 20."

Her story was first reported by WYMT-TV in Hazard, Ky., and WK-MG-TV in Orlando. Christopher Grey,

spokesman for the Army's Criminal Investigation Command at Fort Belvoir, Va., said the Internet impersonators often make ridiculous claims. Some say they need money for special laptops and cell phones. Others say they need cash to buy special papers to come home on leave or a registration form because military officials won't let them talk to family.

"Well, there is no such thing," Grey said. The papers are phony, often poorly doctored versions of actual military

person using Hursey's photographs sent Robinson what he called a form to register to be able to speak to the soldier on the telephone. He told her it would cost \$350 for them to be able to communicate by

The form, a poorly doctored copy of a common Army form used to correct information in a soldier's official record, included a blank to fill in the intended victim's social security number. Robinson said

knew people didn't have to register to talk to soldiers and refused to fill out the form. She also refused his requests to wire money and send credit card and bank account numbers.

Instead, she contacted a local television reporter and Hursey, whose name was visible in the phony profile's photos.

"I just wanted to see exactly how far this would go and I wanted to protect people ... that aren't as savvv to scams as I am and don't pick up on this stuff," Robin-

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Grey said there are no known instances of Army personnel losing money in such scams. But the victims have. In one case, a person lost some \$25,000, he said. Because many scams originate in foreign countries, military officials can do little except offer advice about the scams and direct victims to agencies such as the Federal Trade Commission.

The scam artists use untraceable e-mail addresses, route accounts through international locations, and use payper-hour Internet cybercafes that also make it difficult to trace them, Grev said.

The Army encourages anyone who suspects they are being used in a scam to file a report with their local police as well as report the cases to agencies such as the Federal Trade Commis-

Only one state, Cali-

fornia, has made online impersonation a crime, said Tim Senft, founder of Facecrooks.com, a website that focuses on scams via social media. The law makes impersonating someone online a misdemeanor, punishable by up to a \$1,000 fine and a year in

Hursey, who had been based at Fort Richardson, Alaska, said has no clue who concocted the scheme or why he was targeted.

The fake profile featured several photos of Hursey: After basic training, in Iraq and decked out in his military dress uniform. There was even a picture of his dog. Some of the photos apparently were taken from his mother's Facebook page, Hursey said.

"I think it's pathetic that someone is going to impersonate a soldier to try to get money from women," he said.



sion, the fact remains that had he applied the principle stated above, he would have made the contract.

South should have recognized

that the ninth trick could come only from the club suit, and also that there was no advantage in initiating the suit by leading a low club to the ace or queen. There was a chance, however, that he might gain a trick by playing the king of clubs first. Thus, had South cashed the king initially, he would have had no trouble scoring four club tricks and making three notrump. **Declarer should start** on the basis

that the contract will come home easily if the clubs are divided 3-2. His next thought should be to prepare as well as he can for a 5-0 or 4-1 split.

In doing so, South should conclude that if East has any holding of four or five clubs, only three club tricks can be made no matter how the suit is attacked. South should then focus all his thoughts on the possibility that West has the club length.

Once declarer reaches this point,

he should realize that by cashing the king first, he can overcome the J-10-x-x-x in West's hand, while the alternative low club lead has nothing to gain and may cost him the contract. It is true that in the great majority

of hands it won't make any differ-ence which club is led first, but from the standpoint of good technique, the king is clearly the right play.

Libyan warplanes strike oil port in rebel-held east

AJDABIYA, Libva (AP) — Libvan warplanes struck the oil port of Brega on Thursday, a day after armed rebels foiled an attempt by loyalists of leader Moammar Gadhafi to retake control of the strategic installation in the rebel-held eastern half of the country.

Witnesses could not immediately identify the target of the airstrike. But it was likely an airstrip that belongs to the huge oil complex on the Mediterranean coast.

The attack on Brega, some 460 miles (740 kilometers) east of Gadhafi's stronghold in the capital Tripoli, marked the regime's first counteroffensive in the rebel-held east. It illustrated the deep difficulties the Libyan leader's armed forces — an array of militiamen, mercenaries and military units — have had in rolling back the uprising that has swept over the entire eastern half of Libya since Feb.

In the nearby town of Ajdabiya, also in the opposition-held east, morgue officials said the death toll from the fighting rose to 14 on Thursday. On Wednesday, health officials put the toll at at least 10. Many of the fighters who repelled the government forces in Brega on Wednesday came from Ajdabiya.

Brega is the site of Libva's secondlargest petroleum facility and has been held by the opposition since last

Egypt's military rulers say Mubarak-appointed prime minister has resigned

CAIRO (AP) — Egypt's military rulers said Thursday the prime minister appointed by ousted President Hosni Mubarak has resigned, meeting a key demand of the opposition protest

Former air force officer Ahmed Shafiq was named prime minister by Mubarak shortly after the Jan. 25 outbreak of anti-government protests in a failed attempt to quiet the unrest. Mubarak stepped down Feb. 11 and the military took control of the country, but Shafiq remained in office at the head of a caretaker government.

A brief statement posted on the military's official website said it had chosen former Transport Minister Essam Sharaf as the new prime minister and tasked him with forming a new caretaker Cabinet to run the government throughout a transition back to civilian rule.

Leaders of the 18-day uprising that forced Mubarak to step down had been pressing the military to fire Shafiq, arguing that a prime minister sworn in by the ousted leader should not stay in office. They also argued that his Cabinet was filled with figures from the old regime.

The prompt acceptance by the military of Shafiq's resignation shows the sensitivity of the ruling generals to the demands of the uprising's leaders, but many in Egypt now believe the military should put its foot down and focus on restoring law and order in this country of 80 million people.

U.S. acknowledges a no-fly zone in Libya would mean war, takes a more realistic view of options

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Obama administration is tempering its tough talk on Libya with a dose of reality, explaining that even a no-fly zone over the country would require a military attack on Moammar Gadhafi's regime. The Pentagon made it clear that it didn't want war.

Statements Wednesday by Defense Secretary Robert Gates and Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton illustrated the administration's effort to rein in "loose talk" about military options to force Gadhafi from power. It was an acknowledgement that, short of an unlikely military offensive by a U.S.-led coalition, the options for international action to stem the violence appeared highly limited, even as armed rebels pressed their fight against troops still loyal to the Gadhafi regime.

"Let's just call a spade a spade: A nofly zone begins with an attack on Libya to destroy the air defenses," Gates told a congressional panel. The Pentagon could get the job done if ordered by the president, he said, but noted that an attack would require more air power than a single U.S. aircraft carrier, which typically carries about 75

"It is a big operation in a big country," Gates said.

The unspoken subtext was that with U.S. forces already deeply committed in Afghanistan, still winding down military operations in Iraq, and on the watch for surprises in Iran and elsewhere in the volatile Persian Gulf region, the risks associated with military action in Libya might be unacceptable.

Obama, Calderon to meet at White House amid heightened tensions

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Barack Obama and Mexican President Felipe Calderon are meeting amid heightened tensions over violence at their shared border, though no major breakthroughs are expected on what's quickly becoming a defining issue in the relationship between the North American allies.

Their meeting, scheduled for Thursday morning at the White House, comes three weeks after U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement agent Jaime Zapata was shot to death in northern Mexico with a gun smuggled in from the U.S. The incident raised questions in the U.S. about Mexico's ability to control violence and has Obama administration officials considering arming U.S. agents working across the border to ensure their safety.

"We have to make sure that those kinds of incidents are not repeated and to the extent that that involves the potential arming of them, that's something I think we have to consider," Attorney General Eric Holder told a congressional panel this week.

Administration officials said the White House has been working closely with Calderon's government on how to protect U.S. personnel working in Mexico, but they wouldn't say whether Obama would press the Mexican leader to allow U.S. agents to be armed.

Officials declare New Zealand quake rescue effort over, with 'no chance' of more survivors

WELLINGTON, New Zealand (AP) Rescuers officially gave up hope of finding more survivors of New Zealand's devastating earthquake, saying Thursday that no one trapped in rubble when the disaster struck nine days earlier could still be alive.

The news was a blow to the families of around 200 people listed as missing, many of whom clung to faltering hopes for good news despite more than a week of silence from beneath the piles of debris that still litter the city of Christchurch. "We now face the reality that there

is no chance that anyone could have survived this long," Civil Defense Emergency Management national controller John Hamilton told a news conference Thursday.

"Sadly, there becomes a point where the response effort shifts in focus from rescue to body recovery," he said. "We have now reached that point."

Ohio bill restricting unions is zipping through Legislature while Wis. measure languishes

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — While much of the nation's attention remains focused on a stalled proposal in Wisconsin to restrict collective bargaining rights for public workers, an Ohio measure that in some ways is tougher and broader is speeding toward reality.

A Senate panel and then the full chamber approved the Ohio measure Wednesday amid jeers from onlookers. The bill would restrict the collective bargaining rights of roughly 350,000 teachers, firefighters, police officers and other public employees, while Wisconsin's would affect about 175,000 workers and exempt police and firefighters.

"For as far-reaching this thing is and how many lives it will affect, I can't believe how fast it moved," said Columbus Police Sgt. Shaun Laird, who wanted lawmakers to spend more time debating the changes.

Wisconsin's bill remains in limbo after Democrats hightailed it for the Illinois border on the day the Senate was to adopt the bill. Their absence left the chamber one member short of the quorum needed for a vote.

In contrast, the Ohio bill could go as early as next week to House committee hearings. Republicans hold a 59-40 majority in the House, where the measure is likely to receive strong support.

German prosecutors say attack on U.S. airmen appears motivated by Islamic extremism

BERLIN (AP) — German federal prosecutors say the attack on a busload of U.S. airmen that killed two and wounded two others at Frankfurt airport appears to have been motivated by Islamic extremism.

Prosecutors said in a statement Thursday that "because of the circumstances there is a suspicion that

it was an Islamist motivated act." The federal prosecutors took over the case early in the day and are working with Frankfurt and federal police.

Texas mulls Arizona-style immigraton law

AUSTIN, Texas (AP)— State and local police officers would be allowed — but not required — to help enforce federal immigration laws under a compromise plan working its way through the Texas Legislature.

The bill is a far cry from some of the harsh crackdowns some lawmakers proposed, but it still sparked often emotional testimony in a House committee Wednesday night. Dozens of supporters and detractors packed a hearing room outside the Texas Capitol, eager for a chance to air their views despite the late hour.

Supporters generally said the legislation would help police identify illegal immigrants who commit crimes in Texas. Critics said it would lead to racial profiling, detract from real police work and give license to rogue agents who want to harass im-

The bill's author, Republican Rep. Burt Solomons, said it would prohibit so-called "sanctuary cities" and law enforcement entities from

migrants.

adopting policies that keep police and criminal investigators from providing immigration enforcement assistance. Republican Gov. Rick Perry put the issue on the fast track at the Cap-

Unlike Arizona's new immigration law, parts of which are being challenged in court, the legislation known as House Bill 12 does not require police officers to inquire about immigration status or enforce federal laws when people are detained.

But the bill would not allow any law enforcement agency from prohibit them from doing so. Solomons said make English the offihis proposal would es-

tablish a "uniform consistent policy" across the state.

It would allow police to ask about immigration status, maintain records of it and work with federal agents on immigration matters when people are "lawfully detained for the investigation of a criminal offense or arrested." Other legislation similar to the Arizona law was also proposed, but Perry's office has been working with Solomons on the compromise bill. The legislation was left pending in a House committee Wednesday night, but other bills adopting policies that were being debated, including one that would a state database of illegal immigrants arrested in Texas.

An estimated 1.6 million illegal immigrants are in Texas, according to the Pew Hispanic Center in Washington. Nationwide, their num-

NFL, union negotiators arrive for mediation

WASHINGTON — The NFL and the players' union sat down Thursday morning for a last-ditch effort to avoid a work stoppage in America's most popular sport.

With the clock ticking down to the midnight expiration of the league's collective bargaining agreement, Commissioner Roger Goodell and the NFL's negotiating team arrived at a federal mediator's headquarters about 45 minutes ahead of NFLPA executive director DeMaurice Smith and his group.

Staring at the first pro football work stoppage since 1987, Goodell said "We're working hard."

Also on hand for the NFL were lead negotiator Jeff Pash, outside counsel Bob Batterman, New York Giants owner John Mara, Green Bay Packers president Mark Murphy, Washington Redskins general manager Bruce Allen and several other league executives. Mara and Murphy are members of the league's labor committee, which has the authority to call for a lockout if a new agreement isn't reached by midnight.

"We'll stay at it as long as it takes," Pash said before the 10th mediation session at the offices of George Cohen.

Joining Smith were union president Kevin Mawae, New Orleans Saints quarterback Drew Brees and about a dozen others, including current and former players.

The NFL and the players' union no longer have months or weeks or days to reach a new CBA. If they don't get it done now, the league could see its 2011 season jeopardized.

Neither side was making optimistic proclama-

"We're sticking to a no comment policy," union spokesman George Atallah said. "At some point, we'll say a few things. For now, we'll let them do what they have to do in the negotiating room."

Are they making progress that could lead to a settlement in a dispute that involves \$9 billion in

"I never have expectations, except to have A, B, C, D and E, and to always plan for F," Indianapolis Colts owner Jimmy Irsay said Wednesday night. "It changes. A chessboard that moves around and things happen at unusual hours."

Including, perhaps, in the final hours before the NFL locks out the players, or the union decertifies. An extension of the deadline is possible, too.

The owners didn't spend much time discussing where the negotiations stood Wednesday, cutting their planned two-day meeting to a three-hour affair at a suburban hotel. Patriots owner Robert Kraft and Cowboys owner Jerry Jones, both members of the labor committee, headed home rather than stick around for further talks with the union.

"We can't comment, and even more so, we're certainly still involved in our dialogue, and so there is no comment," Jones said.

Two people with knowledge of the NFL Players Association's plans told The Associated Press the union was prepared to decertify Thursday, barring a last-minute breakthrough. That action means the union no longer would represent the players, who would be giving up their rights under labor law and instead take their chances in court under antitrust law. The people spoke on condition of anonymity

because the union had not made its plans public. There was a flurry of activity Wednesday: a fourhour mediation session attended by all 10 members of the owners' labor committee, Mawae and Brees; the three-hour owners meeting at a hotel 25 miles away in Chantilly, Va.; a one-hour meeting of the league's labor committee immediately after the owners broke up; the cancellation of another planned gathering of owners Thursday; and a private visit with Cohen starting at 8 p.m. by Goodell,

Mara — the first owner to attend the nine days of mediation, on Tuesday — and Murphy left at 9:30 p.m., followed shortly by Goodell, Pash and Batter-

two top league lawyers, Mara and Murphy.

"Long day," Mara said.

Asked the purpose of the 1½-hour evening meeting with Cohen, Pash said: "To speak with the mediator and get some direction."

Irsay said the owners welcomed the opportunity to be updated on negotiations, but there was little reason for them to remain in Washington as the deadline approaches.

"We had the chance to ask questions, but we didn't break with a lockout vote or anything like that," Irsay said.



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

Today is Thursday, Feb. 24, the 55th day of 2011. There are 310 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight History:

On Feb. 24, 1761, Boston lawver James Otis Jr. went to court to argue against "writs of assistance" that allowed British customs officers to arbitrarily search people's premises; citing English common law, Otis declared: "A man's house is his castle." (Although Otis lost the case, his statement provided a source of inspiration for American independence.)

On this date:

In 1582, Pope Gregory XIII issued a papal bull, or edict, outlining his calendar reforms. (The Gregorian Calendar is the calendar in general use today.)

In 1711, the opera "Rinaldo" by George Frideric Handel premiered in London.

In 1803, in its Marbury v. Madison decision, the Supreme Court established judicial review of the constitutionality of statutes. In 1821, Mexican rebels pro-

claimed the "Plan de Iguala," their declaration of independence from Spain. In 1863, Arizona was orga-

nized as a territory.

In 1868, the House of Representatives impeached President Andrew Johnson following his attempted dismissal of Secretary of War Edwin M. Stanton; Johnson was later acquitted by the Senate. In 1920, the German Workers

Nazi Party, met in Munich to adopt its platform. In 1942, the Voice of America went on the air for the first

Party, which later became the

time. In 1961, the Federal Communications Commission

authorized the nation's first full-scale trial of pay television in Hartford, Conn. In 1981, Buckingham Palace announced the engagement of Britain's Prince Charles to Lady Diana Spencer. A jury in White Plains, N.Y., found Jean Harris guilty of second-degree

murder in the fatal shooting of

"Scarsdale Diet" author Dr.

Herman Tarnower. (Sentenced

to 15 years to life in prison,

Harris was granted clemency

by New York Gov. Cuomo in Dec. 1992.)
