# Texas House OKs voter ID bill

# *Democrats say measure hurts poor, minorities*

Associated Press AUSTIN — The Texas House has approved a bill requiring residents to show photo identification before voting amid complaints from Democrats who say it's designed to erect hurdles for poor and minority voters.

The legislation cleared the House 101-48 Wednesday night after more than 11 hours of debate in which Democrats repeatedly tried to derail it. The measure has sparked anger and partisan bickering ever since Republican Gov. Rick Perry put it on the fast track at the beginning of the legislative session in January. GOP lawmakers say it's necessary to prevent voter fraud. Democrats contend the bill is aimed at poor and minority voters who are less likely to have state-issued identification cards.

# Volunteers needed for annual trash-off

Crossroads area volunteers — led by Keep Big Spring Beautiful — will kick off the season with some spring cleaning Saturday, April 2, as the local organization teams up with the state of Texas for the annual Don't Mess With

#### Texas Trash-off.

"Keep Texas Beautiful is an affiliate of Keep America Beautiful, which has each State scheduled for a clean up from March 1 through May 31," said longtime Trash-off coordinator Pat Simmons. "So, Texas always works on the first Saturday in April unless Easter falls on that weekend.

"Keep Big Spring Beautiful strives each year to make a difference in the appearance of our community. With our recent fires I would hope that every resident and business would survey their property to make sure it is free of tall, dry grass,weeds and trash. This is a perfect target for your property with the very dry and hot days."

The event, held in conjunction with Keep Texas Beautiful's annual state-wide trashoff, has attracted more than 300 volunteers each year, a number Simmons hopes to equal or exceed this year.

"People can clean their own lots or streets or we can send them to a particular area," Simmons said. "Their efforts really make a difference ... It seems like we don't have as much trash to pick up as the

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# District 1 large item pickup Friday

Spring cleaning, anyone? The city of Big Spring's annual large item pickup service will get underway Friday, and according to Code Enforcement Supervisor Chad Averette, the program will be available to more city residents than ever before.

"In the past, the program was simply aimed at residents who didn't have the means to get these large items off their property and to the landfill," said Averette. "Last year, however, we began opening it up to everyone. This is all part of an effort to go through each district and get rid of code violations."

Averette said this month's large item pickup — the first for 2011 — will target District 1. The list of items city employees can pick up during the effort is quite long, but he said there are a few things they can not legally gather.

"Some of the more typical

items we pick up are appliances that don't work anymore, couches and mattresses," said Averette. "Those are the kind of things that we can take to our landfill and we're allowed to pick up. However, we can't pick up any household hazardous waste. That means any kind of chemicals including lawn chemicals, car batteries and tires and things of that nature. We also won't be picking up any tree branches, shrubs or things like that.


"We're trying to target people who are elderly, handicapped or otherwise don't have the means to get these large items to our landfill. This is a service the city is going to provide as a courtesy to those people and give them the opportunity to get things off of their property they might not be able to otherwise."

A driver's license, personal ID card, military ID, passport or concealed handgun permit would be accepted. Voters who don't have an ID could get one for free from the Texas Department of Public Safety. Voters who could prove they had been victims of identify fraud could would be exempt from the new rules.

Voters without ID could cast a provisional ballot but would have to show one within six

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

he great cautionary tale of the 19th century is Frankenstein, Mary Shelly's novel. It's the story of a brilliant scientist,

Victor Frankenstein, who builds a monster out of spare parts and then breathes life into it.

Instead of being grateful to his creator, the monster runs away. It eventually destroys Frankenstein and everyone he cares about.

The great cau-

tionary tale of the 20th century is Cat's Cradle, Kurt Vonnegut's novel. It's the story of a brilliant scientist, A. Felix Hoeniker, who invents a substance ("ice-nine") that can freeze water at room temperature.

It's a military project designed to freeze mud at any temperature, thereby making it easier to wage war in the rainy season. Ice-nine's only failing is that you can't make it stop. It freezes the mud and nearby streams and all other water it comes in contact with.

In the course of Vonnegut's book, the substance is carelessly delivered into the ocean where it freezes pretty much all water everywhere, ending life as we know it.

The cautionary tale of the 21st century is Japan.

The novel has yet to be written, but that country seems to be locked into a Doomsday scenario that reminds one of Dr. Strangelove's end-of-the-world machine. In quick succession,

it has suffered an earthquake, a tidal wave, a flood of Biblical proportions, fire, and the threat of a nuclear holocaust. Maybe not the end of the world, but you can see it from there.

**Dangers of nuclear 'ice-nine'** 

The nuclear disaster is the most worrisome of all. There seems to be no end--one reactor after another fails, threatening to produce its own little Chernobyl.

That would be bad enough if it were just another foreign disaster, but we were just about to start getting back into the nuclear energy business ourselves after refraining from building any new nuclear reactors for decades.

Halting nuclear power plant construction was our reaction to the Chernobyl debacle and our own brush with nuclear disaster, Three Mile Island. It became an article of faith in the environmental community that nuclear power was too dangerous to mess with.

That argument had just about gone past its sell-by date. Apparently nobody, but nobody, was thinking we could reduce our reliance on fossil fuels without using nuclear energy, which doesn't unleash carbon into the atmosphere. We were told that the technology was much safer now.

President Barack Obama had already proposed an expansion of nuclear energy technology and \$36 billion in Department of Energy loan guarantees for the construction of 20 new nuclear plants.

Now, with Japan experiencing a nuclear nightmare, nuclear energy looks different.

Except in the eyes of Mitch Mc-

Connell, the Republican leader in the Senate. He may be wrong but he's always sure.

"My thought about it is, we ought not to make American and domestic policy based upon an event that happened in Japan."

One can only say: "Huh?" Does McConnell's comment make sense at any level to anyone? It apparently does to Republican senators. They elected him their leader. (I'm going to start putting aside a nickel every time a conservative Republican politician says something intelligent. When I collect enough money I'm going to buy a pack of chewing gum. It shouldn't take more than three or four months. Six at the outside.)

Apparently, Japanese reactors were designed to survive either a tsunami or an earthquake, but not both. This is the problem when designing fail-safe systems--they fail in the most unexpected ways.

This, in turn, leaves the environmentalists among us in a quandary.

We believe in climate change and want cleaner energy than fossil fuels provide. But we know it will be hard to get the quantity of energy we need from alternative sources like wind, geothermal, or solar.

But nuclear energy is our Frankenstein monster, which might prove as uncontrollable as ice-nine.

It's humbling to learn that our most prideful accomplishments are hostage to a shrug of the earth.


# Sometimes, you have to stop yourself from running

Anxiety spreads in Japan over radiation in water; 2 workers injured at stricken nuclear plant

TOKYO (AP) — Shops across Tokyo began rationing goods — milk, toilet paper, rice and water — as a run on bottled water coupled with delivery disruptions left shelves bare Thursday nearly two weeks after a devastating earthquake and tsunami.

The unusual sights of scarcity in one of the world's richest, most modern capitals came a day after city officials reported that radioactive iodine in the Tokyo's tap water measured more than twice the level considered safe for babies.

Radiation has been leaking from a nuclear plant 140 miles (220 kilometers) northeast of Tokyo since it was slammed by the March 11 quake and engulfed by the ensuing tsunami. Feverish efforts to get the plant's crucial cooling system back in operation have been beset by explosions, fires and radiation scares.

On Thursday, two workers at the Fukushima Dai-ichi plant were being treated at a hospital after stepping into contaminated water while laying electrical cables in one unit, nuclear and government officials said.

The two workers likely suffered "beta ray burns," said officials at plant owner Tokyo Electric Power Co, citing doctors. They tested at radiation levels between 170 to 180 millisieverts, well below the maximum 250 millisieverts allowed for workers, said Fumio Matsuda, a spokesman for the Nuclear and Industry Safety.

More than two dozen people have been injured trying to bring the Fukushima Dai-ichi plant under control.

# Except for Qatar, Arab nations that called for action against Gadhafi are missing in action

WASHINGTON (AP) — As America's NATO allies shoulder a greater share of the air war in Libya, the Arab countries that urged the U.N. Security Council to impose a no-fly zone are missing from the action.

Except for the small Persian Gulf nation of Qatar, which is expected to start flying air patrols over Libya by this weekend, no other members of the 22-member Arab League have so far publicly com-

mitted to taking an active role. The U.S. has sold many of these countries, including Saudi Arabia and the United Arab Emirates, billions of dollars in sophisticated military gear over the past decade to help counter Iran's power in the region.

Nearly a week into the campaign to prevent Libyan leader Moammar Gadhafi's forces from attacking civilians, the United States increased the pressure on its NATO allies to take command of the campaign, suggesting the U.S. might even step away from its leadership role in a few days, even with the conflict's outcome in doubt.

Despite the threat, officials said there was no absolute deadline to hand over front-line control to other countries, or for an end to all U.S. participation. Still, with the costs of the campaign growing by the day and members of Congress raising complaints over the goals in Libya, the Obama administration wants its allies to take the lead role soon.

Defense Secretary Robert Gates, an early skeptic of American military intervention in Libya, said President Barack Obama made clear from the start of the campaign last Saturday that the U.S. would run it for only about a week. In an exchange with reporters traveling with him in Cairo on Wednesday, Gates was asked if his comments meant the U.S. had set a firm deadline of this Saturday for turning over command.

"I don't want to be pinned down that closely," Gates replied. "But what we've been saying is that we would expect this transition to the coalition, to a different command and control arrangement, to take place within a few days and I would still stand by that."

## AP sources: Christmas bomber considered Houston, Chicago, then picked cheapest option: Detroit

WASHINGTON (AP) — When an admitted al-Qaida operative planned his itinerary for a Christmas 2009 airline bombing, he considered launching the strike in the skies above Houston or Chicago, The Associated Press has learned. But tickets were too expensive, so he refocused the mission on a cheaper destination: Detroit.

The decision is among new details emerging about one of the most sensational terrorism plots to unfold since President Barack Obama took office. It shows that al-Qaida's Yemen branch does not share

Osama bin Laden's desire to attack symbolic targets, preferring instead to strike at targets of opportunity. Like the plot that nearly blew up U.S.-bound cargo planes last year, the cities themselves didn't matter. It's a strategy that has helped the relatively new group quickly become the No. 1 threat to the United States.

After the failed bombing and the arrest of suspected bomber Umar Farouk Abdulmutallab, the question of why Detroit was targeted had gone unanswered. It was previously reported that Abdulmutallab did not specifically choose Christmas for his mission.

Abdulmutallab considered Houston, where he attended an Islamic conference in 2008, current and former counterterrorism officials told the AP. Another person with knowledge of the case said Abdulmutallab also considered Chicago but was discouraged by the cost. All spoke on condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to discuss the case.

While the target and timing were unimportant, the mission itself was a highly organized plot that involved one of the FBI's most wanted terrorists and al-Qaida's go-to bomb maker, current and former officials said. Before Abdulmutallab set off on his mission, he visited the home of al-Qaida manager Fahd al-Quso to discuss the plot and the workings of the bomb.

## Census shows Hispanic growth reaching 50 million, now 1 in 6 Americans

WASHINGTON (AP) — In a surprising show of growth, Hispanics accounted for more than half of the U.S. population increase over the last decade, exceeding estimates in most states. Pulled by migration to the Sun Belt, America's population center edged westward on a historic path to leave the Midwest.

The Census Bureau on Thursday will release its first set of national-level findings from the 2010 count on race and migration, detailing a decade in which rapid minority growth, aging whites and increased suburbanization were the predominant story lines. Geographers estimate that the nation's population center will move southwest about 30 miles and be placed in or near the village of Plato in Texas County, Mo.

"There is excitement," said Brad Gentry, 48, of Houston, Mo., who publishes the weekly paper in Texas County, noting that the U.S. population center typically carries symbolic meaning as the nation's heartland. "It is putting a spotlight on a corner of the world that doesn't get much attention. Most residents are proud of our region and like the idea that others will learn our story through this recognition."

Racial and ethnic minorities are expected to make up an unprecedented 90 percent of the total U.S. growth since 2000, due to immigration and higher birth rates for Latinos. Currently the fastest growing group, Hispanics are on track to exceed 50 million, or roughly 1 in 6 Americans; among U.S. children, Hispanics are now roughly 1 in 4.

This meant that declarer started with precisely three clubs. If these included the K-Q, South had the rest of the tricks, while if he had just the queen, the slam was doomed no matter what West did next.

The critical case was where declarer had the king and East the queen. In that event, a heart or spade return would hand South the contract by presenting him with a ruff-anddiscard. Therefore, a club had to be led

# Mickelson looks for momentum at Bay Hill

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) – Phil Mickelson gets to Florida and starts thinking about Georgia.

Even as he began his road to the Masters earlier this month, Mickelson already was making trips to Augusta National to start preparing for his title defense and a chance to join Tiger Woods and Arnold Palmer with a fourth green jacket.

He'll be going back again next week.

For now, Mickelson is looking for a little momentum. That's why he decided last week to add the Arnold Palmer Invitational at Bay Hill to his schedule, giving him two straight tournaments the Houston Open next week before the tournament that matters the most.

"I've probably left this as a question mark all year, just based on how I felt and so forth," Mickelson said Wednesday afternoon after his pro-am round. "But given that I haven't been in contention or played the way I wanted to on the West coast, I wanted to add a tournament."

His only time in contention

was at Torrey Pines, when Bubba Watson made a birdie on the 18th hole and forced Mickelson to make eagle to get into a playoff. Mickelson — as only he does had his caddie tend the flag with his wedge shot from the fairway. He missed and finished second, and hasn't been a serious threat since then.

Bay Hill offers up another strong test, although big changes in the world order of golf have produced an anomaly: For the first time in the history of the world ranking, none of the top three players are here.

The highest-ranked player is U.S. Open champion Graeme McDowell, followed by Woods and Mickelson. Lefty has yet another chance to move past Woods in the world ranking for the first time in 14 years, although far removed from No. 1, it's not all that relevant.

The Masters? That's relevant. Then again, so is the Arnold Palmer Invitational, which Lefty won in 1997.

There are times early in the year, and especially in Florida

during the road to Augusta, that he will find himself thinking about shots he could use in April. Just not this week.


"Because there's so much water, because there's wind, you have to flight your ball differently than you will at Augusta," Mickelson said. "You can't stand on the tee and bomb away, so it will be a little different. But I'll be working on trajectory control, distance control and this course with the wind will be a good challenge to try to get that area of my game sharp."

Woods hasn't been sharp, either, leading to a temporary demise of the best two players of their generation.

For both, the road to the Masters has been bumpy.

For nearly two decades — dating to 1992 — Woods or Mickelson have won at least one tournament before Augusta National. Both are winless this year, and unless something changes the next two weeks, this will be the second straight year that neither has a PGA Tour victory before the Masters.


