## CASTRO COUNTY BOND SALES LAG

Castro County War Bond purchases are falling far short of the October quota. Only \$543.75 have been invested in bonds during October according to a check-up at the local bank and postoffice Wednesday. The county quota for October is \$10,500. If the county is to meet its quota nearly \$10,000 must be invested in Bonds within the next five days.

According to a report by the County Bond Chairman, H. W. Golden, Castro county has been exceeding its monthly quota, which has been placed at \$10,500 for the past several months. In August sales of E, F, and G Bonds amounted to \$13,215.25 and in September sales amounted to \$12,922.50.

Mr. Golden is making an emergency call on all bond buyers to make an extra effort in the few remaining days of October to purchase enough bonds to meet the regular monthly quota.

## Cream Rules Given By AAA Co. Office

1 Dairy Feed Payments: All cream and whole milk stubs must bear the name of the purchaser and seller on each stub along with the dates. Applications for cream and whole milk production will be accepted on July and August production only until Oct. 31. September and October production will be accepted after Nov. 1.

2. Grain Sorghums and Sudan loans: Producers who wish to secure a loan on Grain Sorghums, please call at this office when you have filed your grainery and give us needed information, but since we have a loan inspector please don't bring in samples.

On Sudan loans please observe above rules as the inspector gets the sample and checks the grainery at the same time. If you want to comply and receive \$3.50 per acre on your sudan harvested for seed, bring us a record of your production on sudan seed threshed and also take a sample of your sudan, about 1 1/2 lbs, and send it to an approved testing laboratory and secure a purity test on our office. Local warehouse purity test will not be accepted nor will a test from Plainview.

Seed Laboratory Division, care of State Department of Agriculture Austin, Texas. Farmers may send a sample (1 1/2 lbs) of sudan to the above address and secure a purity test free of charge. For additional information call at the A. A. A. office.

## Prisoner of War Labor Available

Castro county farmers will use around 200 prisoners of war for feed shocking during the month, according to M. U. May, County Agent who takes the applications for prisoner of war labor.

It takes from 10 to 12 days to get a contract for prisoner of war and anyone who plans to use this labor should make applications for them at least 10 days before they will need them. All contracts for prisoner of war labor are made on a 30 to 60 day interval which means (Continued on last page)

## Ration Calendar

MEATS, FATS — Red stamps A8 through Z8 and A5 through K5, good indefinitely. L5 through P5 become good October 29 and remain good indefinitely. No new stamps until December 5.

PROCESSED FOODS — Blue stamps A8 through Z8 and A5 through W5 become good Nov. 1 and remain good indefinitely. No new stamps until December 1.

Sugar—Sugar stamps 30, 31, 32 and 33 each good for five pounds indefinitely. Sugar stamp 40, good for five pounds of canning sugar through February, next year.

Gasoline—In 17 East Coast States, A-11 coupons, good for three gallons each through November 8. In States outside the East Coast area, A-13 coupons in new "A" book good for four gallons each through December 21.

FUEL OIL — Period 4 and 5 coupons, and new period 1 coupons good throughout coming heating year.

Shoes — Airplane stamps 1 and 2 good indefinitely. Airplane stamp 3 becomes good November 1 and remains good indefinitely.

## NEW SHOE STAMP VALID

Airplane Stamp 3 in War Ration Book Three may be used for buying one pair of rationed shoes beginning November 1, 1944, the Office of Price Administration has announced.

The new stamp, like Airplane Stamps 1 and 2 now in use, will be valid indefinitely.

Announcement was made September 28 that another shoe ration stamp would become valid November 1, but the number of the stamp was not made known.

As explained previously, validation of the new shoe stamp November 1 continue the rationing rate established a year ago when Airplane Stamp 1 came into use. Since November 1, 1943, shoe stamps have been validated at six-month intervals.

South Pacific  
14 September 44

Dearest Folks:  
I received your letter of September sixth with all the pictures today. Glad to hear from you and the pictures were swell. Gee, the house really looks bare since you cut down all the shrubbery. Be glad when the roses get big because it makes the place look deserted with all the flowers gone. Say, I wish you would take some pictures of the Watcher Street and everything so I can see how much everything has changed since I have been away. If you can I wish you could make some of the plant (OSCS) too. I also got another package from you today, more papers and magazines. They are piling up on me now I can't read them all as fast as they are coming. I really enjoyed the Bell Gardens paper, that is the first one you have sent me. I wondered why you weren't sending them all along. I thought maybe they were not putting out a paper any more. Sure glad to hear that Delton got a ship. Do you know what kind of a ship it is or what the name of it is? I sure thought he would be going back to the States for a leave before he got shipped out again though. He has been out almost eighteen months hasn't he? Say has Wayne ever shipped out? If so send me his address and when you get Alvin's address send it too. They may come out here somewhere close and I can look them up. Do you know what day this is? This is the fourteenth of September and it is exactly fourteen months since I left the good old United States. Sure hope I don't have to spend many more months out here. This ribbon is just about gone I think I will try it on red and see how it is. . . . That's some better isn't it. . . . Sending a few more negatives, hope they turn out O. K. When you get them printed please send me some prints of them so I can see how they come out. I didn't know uncle Leland was in France. I guess he is right on his old stamping grounds, huh. You know there aren't very many men fighting this war that fought in the last one also. I only hope I won't have to go through another one. And I won't either if they run this one right. I get mad every time I see or hear how the damn Republican party and Dewey are slamming Roosevelt. I think it would be just plain idiotic, stupid ignorance to change presidents before the war is over. Especially since things are going so well as they are. What's wrong with the people back there, anyway, are they going crazy or were they always just plain dumb? Maybe I'm all wet but it looks like they are doing some awful silly things. I'm sorry that Marvin doesn't love the Army any more than he does but it is his fault. I tried to warn him that he better join the Navy instead but I guess he didn't believe me. Can't blame him though because I didn't believe myself either. I was just putting out some propaganda! Well, I have run out of anything to write and I have just about run out of paper so I better close for this time. Write soon.

**Prisoner of War Labor Available**

(Continued from page one)  
The labor can be used any time during this period.  
The cost of the prisoner of war labor this year is 25 cents per hour based on the actual time the prisoners of war work. The War Department furnishes the noon day meal and the farmers must furnish the transportation to and from the prisoner of war camp. The officers in charge of the camp will only let prisoners work in groups of 15 or larger.  
To date much Castro County feed has been shocked by prisoner of war labor and some thirty farmers have contracts for use of this labor. The work of the prisoners of war has been reported very satisfactory according to information given County Agent May by farmers who have worked them.  
County Agent May urges every farmer who is planning to use this type of labor to put in an application at least 12 days before they will need them, or preferably 16 days, and in this way they will be assured a contract before they will need the labor. The applications for the labor are made at the County Agent's office and the contracts are signed at the prison of war camp. In event something happens that the labor is not needed after the application is signed the person wanting the labor does not have to sign the contract if he does not want to, May stated.
