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Term limits approved

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Incumbents ousted

Politicians in Big Spring will have to accomplish their goals within two terms on the city council, as voters approved an amendment to the municipal charter to place term limits on local elected officials.

The proposition — which was brought to the voters via a petition championed by the local Concerned Citizens Council — got the nod from local voters Saturday with 765 ballots (64.34 percent) in favor of the measure and 424 ballots (35.66 percent) against it.

According to city officials, the amendment provides that council members may only run for two consecutive terms in one position, then must sit out one election before running again for the same posi-

City Attorney Linda Sjogren, who was charged with interpreting the amendment presented to the city with the petition, said council members may run for any other position than the one they currently hold if their term is expiring or if they are within the last year of their term, without sitting out a term.

Also, council members cannot be elected to fill a vacancy (unexpired term) in any position on the council within six years of having served in any position on the coun-

"We had about three players who were returning starters. So we were going with a group of mostly young and inexperienced girls," Taylor said. "I think the third game just boiled down to experience. They were more experienced than we were. We just couldn't withstand the pressure."

Taylor said she was proud of the job pitcher Ashley Buzbee did, especially following in the footsteps Amanda Longoria, a two-time all-state selection.

"Our seniors were Miranda Park, Kevy O'Brien, Morgan Forshee and Kay'c Stanley. They did a really good job this year. We're losing four seniors and hopefully we will be able to replace them. That is always a challenge," said Taylor, 2010's Coach of the

Year. "Even the young girls who came in did a good job. They just lacked a little experience.

"I am very proud of what we have started in Forsan and hope to continue. We'll be a lot stronger next year and they'll want it more. I think they'll know exactly what it is going to take," added Taylor, whose Lady Buffs compiled a 24-10 record this year.

State track and field meet recap

Crossroads area athletes fared well in University Interscholastic League state competition over the weekend.

Big Spring High School's Bridgette Tuitt took home gold in the Class 3A girls long jump with a leap of 18-feet, 6 3/4 inches. Teammate Desiree Anderson placed second in the event for a silver medal. She soared 18-3 1/2. Tuitt also finished fourth in the 200 meters (24.84) and eighth in the triple jump (35-03). Anderson was ninth in the 100 meters (12.38).

The Lady Steers' nemisis in the meet was Texarkana Liberty-Eylau, which narrowly edged out Big Spring in the relay events. In the 400 relay, Big Spring ran a time of 47.56, just off the pace of Texarkana's 47.11. The story was the same in the 800 relay. Big Spring ran a 1:39.35, just .35 of a second behind Texarkana's 1:39.0.

Steer classmate Mike Menefield didn't get the state championship repeat he had hoped for in the boys long jump but did win another medal – second place, in fact — with an effort of 24-feet, 1-1/4 inches. He also placed third in the triple jump (47-05).

Forsan junior Ty Johnson placed fifth in both the 100 meter dash (10.99) and 200 meter dash (22.25). Johnson would appear to have a lot to look forward to as his 100-meter time was not far off the pace of winner Devin Parks of Edna, who eclipsed the distance in 10.68 seconds. Johnson, Brendan Roman, Elgen Suazo and Kolten Self made up Forsan's 400-meter relay team, which placed eighth in a time of 43.31.

Measure in works to allow private schools into UIL

The 2011 state track and field meet could be the last time the 100-yearold event is run without private schools.

A measure working its way through the Legislature would let private schools into the University Interscholastic League to play sports except for football and basketball.

If passed into law, the change would start next year in Class 1A, the state's smallest schools.

Several 1A coaches told The Associated Press on Saturday they don't like the idea. They worry private schools will recruit athletes and could dominate a sport like track at the state championships.

"I don't know if it's an equal playing field," said Roby coach Billy Floyd. Roby's only athlete at the meet, Lara Williams, finished second in the 1A girls shot put.

The proposed bill would require private schools to play under UIL rules that ban recruiting for athlet-

This isn't the first year state lawmakers have considered allowing private schools into the UIL. Sen. Dan Patrick, R-Houston, calls excluding private schools from the state's elite competition for public schools a form of discrimination. He says it's unfair to families who send their children to private schools but still support public schools with tax-

Meanwhile, public school coaches remain fiercely opposed to the idea.

"I think it's detrimental to what the public schools try to do within our communities," Bryant said. "Every coach I've talked to is not real excited about it."

CHICAGO — The Chicago Bulls saw the stars aligning for the Heat last summer, the "Big Three" free agents uniting in Miami on a quest for a championship.

Joakim Noah wasn't conceding anything. Nor was Derrick Rose.

Chicago swept Miami in the regular season, and if the Bulls keep this up, they'll knock the Heat out of the playoffs, too.

Rose scored 28 points, Luol Deng ably contained LeBron James and the Bulls struck first in the Eastern Conference finals, pulling away to beat the Heat 103-82 in Game 1 on Sunday night.

"We felt like we could compete against anybody," said Noah. "This is just a really exciting situation right now. The position that we're in is unbelievable. ... Nobody believed that we could be in this position right now."

That belief, along with a major overhaul, led the Bulls to the league's best record and rekindled an attitude not seen in the Windy City since the Michael Jordan era when championships were

an annual event. Missing out on the Big Three? Seeing James and mitting three of his four turn-points and nine rebounds.

"We're not worried about all the offseason stuff," Rose said. "We're not worried about it. We're just trying to go out there and play hard, play with an edge, play with a lot of intensity." They certainly did on Sun-

day, particularly during the second half. The Bulls went on a 10-0 run midway through the third quarter, then pulled away in the fourth. As the final minutes ticked

away, fans chanted "Overrated!" and "Beat the Heat!" Game 2 is Wednesday night

in Chicago. Rose settled down after comand showed why he is the MVP. He hit three 3-pointers and the Bulls converted 10 of Deng had 21 points. He hit

four 3s, had four steals and seven rebounds, and simply put the clamps on The King, holding James to 15 points on 5-of-15 shooting.

"Definitely to guard a guy like that the whole defense has to stay focused," Deng said. "There were times we switched and times we forced him into the double. Our bigs were great at forcing him into the front."

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Davis has winning RBI for Texas in 5-4 win over LA

ARLINGTON — Chris Davis homered and later drove in the tiebreaking run with an eighth-inning single and the Texas Rangers beat the Los Angeles Angels 5-4 Sunday, winning only their second series in the past month.

The Rangers loaded the bases to start the eighth after Rich Thompson (1-2) failed to retire any of the three batters he faced. Davis then singled to right off Hisanori Taka-

Adrian Beltre also homered for Texas, which won two of three against AL West-leading Los Angeles after having won only one of its previous nine series. The defending AL champion Rangers moved within a half-game of the division lead.

Davis' opposite-field homer over the left-field wall in the fourth off Ervin Santana put the Rangers up 4-1. It was the second homer of the season for Davis.

Mark Lowe (1-0) got out the only batter he faced before Neftali Feliz pitched the ninth for his eighth save in eight chances.

Thompson entered to start the eighth for Santana, issuing consecutive walks to Beltre and David Murphy before Mike Napoli's checked swing turned into a bloop single barely past the infield dirt.

Santana, who has won only once in his nine starts this season, struck out three while allowing four runs.

The Angels had a scoring chance thwarted in the top of the eighth after Alexi Amarista's one-out triple off reliever Brett Tomko. Amarista was caught in a rundown when third baseman Beltre was playing in, then fielded Peter Bourjos' chopper and threw home.

Beltre had a three-run homer in the third, a ball that just cleared the 14-foot wall in left field. His 10th homer of the season was his third in the past four games.

Erick Aybar had three hits and drove in three runs for the Angels, including his second homer of the season both in this series.

C.J. Wilson allowed only two hits pitching into the eighth inning of his previous start Monday against Oakland, but walked five — four of those becoming runs. The Rangers' left-hander, who walked no more than three in his first seven starts, had four more walks against the Angels.

Durant, Thunder beat Griz to reach West finals

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — Kevin Durant bounced back from his worst playoff performance ever to score 39 points, Russell Westbrook had his first playoff triple-double and the Oklahoma City Thunder advanced to the Western Conference finals with a 105-90 victory over the Memphis Grizzlies in Game 7 on Sunday.

Durant, the NBA scoring champion the past two seasons, followed the lowest-scoring game of his two postseason appearances with one of his best. He heated up in the second quarter after an entertaining exchange with his mother, put the Thunder in control late in the third, then put it away with a pair of two-handed slams in the fourth.

Westbrook. criticized throughout the playoffs for taking too many shots, was at his all-around best with 14 points, matching his season-high with 14 assists and producing extra possessions with 10 rebounds.

Mike Conley led Memphis with 18 points, and Zach Randolph was limited to an inefficient 17 points and

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10 rebounds. Randolph averaged 28.3 points and 14.7 rebounds in the Grizzlies' three wins in the series, but made just six of 15 shots in Game 7.

Memphis made the best postseason run in its history — having never even won a playoff game before this vear — but couldn't become the first No. 8 seed to reach the West finals.

Lionel Hollins pulled the Grizzlies' starters with just over $2\frac{1}{2}$ minutes left, after Durant hung on the rim and yelled after his second dunk of the closing minutes. Scott Brooks followed at his next chance, with Durant calmly raising his right fist as he to the sidelines with the sellout crowd standing and roaring at its loudest.

Fans started chanting "We want Dallas!" in the final minute. The Thunder will start the Western Conference finals Tuesday night against the Mavericks, just down Interstate 35.

After Memphis trailed by as much

as 11 late in the first half, Randolph led the Grizzlies back in the third quarter and Conley's 3-pointer cut it to 52-49 with 4:52 left.

Durant provided eight points — including two 3-pointers — during a 14-2 response as the Thunder regained control. After his second 3, he ran screaming to the opposite end of the court and slapped hands with former Oklahoma City player Desmond Mason, who was seated courtside.

Durant added a free throw after Hollins' technical foul, and the Thunder led 66-51 with 1:24 to go in the third. Oklahoma City, which had strug-

gled to hold onto late leads in two overtime thrillers in Memphis, had no trouble closing out this one. James Harden added four 3-pointers

and 17 points for Oklahoma City, and Nick Collison had 12 rebounds.

O.J. Mayo scored 14 for Memphis but couldn't provide the same amount
