Council OKs aquatic center fee, denies raise for chief appraiser

The Big Spring City Council approved a \$5 entry fee for the new municipal aquatic center on a 6-1 vote Tuesday night, paving the way for the facility to open its doors to the public in a few weeks. The vote was one of the last for

outgoing city council members Stephanie Horton and Joann Staulcup, who both voted in favor of the ordinance. Council members Gloria McDonald, Craig Olson, Terry Hansen and Mayor Tommy Duncan also gave the measure a nod of approval. District 2 Councilman Manuel

Ramirez Jr. voted against the fee — which is more than double the fee charged before the municipal swimming pool was closed — urging the council to reconsider. "I still feel the fee is too high,"

Ramirez said. "There are a lot of families in this area that have two or three kids, and at \$5 each, that is simply out of their reach. I wish the council reconsider this and lower the entrance fee."

According Duncan, if the entrance iee were reduced below the \$5 mark, the aquatics center would fall short of revenue goals designed to help pay for the cost of the facility.

"Any money that is stuck into the pool has to come from another department within the city.' Duncan said.

The ordinance passed on first reading two weeks ago on an identical vote. The council also approved first





Councilman Marcus Fernandez and District 3 Councilman Glen Carrigan weighing in on the issue.

Also during the meeting, the council disapproved the proposed 2012 budget for the Howard County Appraisal District, citing a \$15,000 raise in salary for Chief Appraiser Brett McKibben as the reason.

Duncan was adamant he was opposed to the increase because of tough economical times, not as a reflection on the work McKibben has done in past years.

However, District 6 Councilman Terry Hansen warned the council the hardships faced by area taxing entities should McKibben decide to lose his post could be much more expensive than a \$15,000 raise in salary.

No one on the council would make a motion the budget be approved as presented, with Duncan declaring the item defeated by a lack of a motion. However, city administration advised Duncan the council would need to take a vote to disapprove the budget, which received a 4-1 vote.

Ramirez was absent for the vote, Olson abstained due to personal dealings with McKibben and Hansen voted against the disapproval. Fernandez, Carrigan, Duncan and McDonald voted to disapprove the proposed budget.

The council won't get the final word in the matter, however, as Duncan said a majority of the taxing entities that fund the district would have to nix the proposed budget for it to fail.

Also during the meeting, City Manager Gary Fuqua informed the council a special work session is slated for Tuesday. Fuqua said several items will be discussed during the work session, including the city's ongoing water line replace program and the municipal landfill.

The work session is expected to get under way at 5:30 p.m. in the City Council Chambers, located at 307 E. Fourth St. For more information, call 264-2401.

built back when the air base was still here and there was a large amount of traffic flow through downtown," Dill said. "The traffic flow just isn't there anymore, but we do have the ability to accommodate an increase if one happens again."

Before the other construction work begins Dill said he is planning to have a public meeting, as he did with the construction work on Gregg Street. "This project (Third

and Fourth streets) snuck up on us," Dill plete." Dill said when it comes to scheduling projects the driving force is funding. There are always different variables that could change and cause

delays or change start dates, but as it stands the rehab projects will begin December 2011 and August 2012. The changes on Third and Fourth Street have already taken place.

is that Shriver fell into a classic female trap. She thought she had found a man who would deliver her from a toxic family pattern, only to discover in the end, she married, well, another Kennedy. She deserved better.

When Schwarzenegger decided to run for governor in the 2003

recall election, he told people he did not consult with his wife before he decided to run.

That would look bad for any husband — but appeared especially callous considering that Shriver lost two uncles to political assassination.

Nonetheless, Shriver stood by Schwarzenegger. When the Los Angeles Times printed reports by several women who accused the Terminator of sexually harassing them between 1975 and 2000, Shriver saved his candidacy.

While Schwarzenegger denied harassing the women, he admitted he had "behaved badly."

Shriver may have saved his campaign when she told supporters, "You can listen to the people who have never met Arnold, or who met him for five seconds 30 years ago. Or you can listen to me."

If Shriver has soured on the Austrian Oak, so has California. In his remaining hours in of-

fice, the Governator commuted the sentence of former Assembly Speaker Fabian Nunez's son, Esteban. On the way out the door, Schwarzenegger shortened Nunez's sentence on a charge of voluntary manslaughter from 16 years to seven years. Schwarzenegger recently ad-

mitted to Newsweek his "office" made a mistake in not notifying the victims' families.

That's right, the Governator

put it on his staff. Schwarzenegger also said he felt good about the decision.

"Well, hello," he added, "I mean, of course you help a friend.'

Wrong. You help a friend whose son wielded a knife in a fatal brawl only if you look at the governorship not as public service but as a seat at the big-shot SOB club.

Schwarzenegger is a charmer. He's larger than life. He's entertaining. But he is not so grand he can treat the public safety as if it is incidental. Nor is he so grand that he can get away with the level of betrayal that produces another woman's child virtually under the couple's roof.

Shriver's website promises to "inspire," "empower" and "engage."

Now, I've always considered "empower" to be a proxy for pretend power. Powerful people don't use the term.

Shriver may want to try some new buzzwords.

She might want to repeat a phrase that California voters have been thinking of late: "Hasta la vista, baby."

The story of Arnold ... Not a movie role, but his real life

f it weren't for the sex, politics would barely be worth

Or so I am told. The hours are long and tedious, and the payoff is often quite meager. I am talking about the politics, not the sex. I think.

In the two, interviews I have had with Arnold Schwarzenegger, both times he pointed out to me that he has never failed at anything he has put his hand to.



"I was able to

erything and way beyond my dreams," he told me when he was running for re-election as governor of California in 2006. "I could not have been the bodybuilding champion 13 times over, the world champion. I couldn't have been in the movie business, the success, if it wouldn't have been in California and I wouldn't have been inspired by all the stars around. So I could do all of those things, including becoming governor, only in California."

And he may have been right. Maybe only in California could the Terminator have become the Governator.

After he won his second term,

I interviewed him in the vast Ronald Reagan Cabinet Room in the state capitol in Sacramento and asked him what he would do after he left the governorship in "If you serve the people well, your options are open and you

can decide at the last minute anything," he told me. "If you want to go back to show business, or just go into business or to run for another office, all those options are available.' And all those options did seem

available, even though there had been some bumps on the road. Less than a week before his first election — a special election in which the incumbent governor, the widely despised Gray Davis, had to be recalled before Schwarzenegger could be elected — the Los Angeles Times began printing in chilling detail accusations by women that

Schwarzenegger had groped and improperly touched them. The number of accusers

eventually rose to 15, and Schwarzenegger was forced to say: "Yes, I have behaved badly sometimes ... and I have done things that were not right, which I thought then was playful. But I now recognize that I have offended people."

He apologized, but his poll numbers dipped and his campaign staff grew very worried.

Schwarzenegger had powerful friends, however, very powerful friends, who helped minimize the damage. Before the election, Jay Leno said in one of his nightly monologues: "You've got Arnold, who groped a few women, or Davis, who screwed

the whole state." It got a big laugh.

And then there was Oprah. Oprah had both Schwarzenegger and his wife, Maria Shriver, on her show. Nobody played a more important role than Shriver in saving her husband's political career.

On Oprah's show, Shriver told people not to believe the rumors and the stories, even when the stories came out of Schwarzenegger's own mouth. Schwarzenegger could be a crude guy, especially when it came to violence and women. While promoting "Terminator 3: Rise of the Machines," he gleefully told Entertainment Weekly: "How many times do you get away with this — to take a woman, grab her upside down and bury her face in a toilet bowl?'

Many would agree getting away with that even once is one time too many, but Schwarzenegger was a movie star and there were different rules for him. I was following him around Fresno during his first campaign one day, when people shouted out to him from the crowd: "What is best in life? What is best in life?"

They wanted him to repeat his famous line from "Conan the Barbarian." And he obliged: "What is best in life? To crush your enemies, see them driven before you and to hear the lamentation of their women!"

The crowd roared. Shriver told people to ignore all this stuff. "I know the man

I'm married to," she told Oprah. "I make up my mind on him, based on him. Not based on what people say."

And when Oprah asked Shriver whether, as a Kennedy woman, she'd been raised to ignore a husband's adultery, Shriver grew irritated. "You know that really ticks me off?" Shriver said. "I am my own woman. I have not been, quote, bred to look the other way."

Which, to her credit, turns out to be true. When her husband was forced to admit his adultery recently, after a story in the Los Angeles Times, Shriver took off her wedding ring, gathered up her children and left him.

I once asked Schwarzenegger about the role that acting played in his political life. "Franklin Roosevelt once told Orson Welles, 'We are the two best actors in the country," I told Schwarzenegger. "Are there things you learned from your acting career that you have used in politics?"

Schwarzenegger was eager to answer: "In the close-up on the screen people can read your eyes and your honesty, and the same is in politics. People look at you — many times they forget the words — but they look at you, and they walk away, and they say, 'I believe this guy."

It was pure baloney, of course. Schwarzenegger had learned how to act a role on the screen, and it helped him act a role with his wife and the public: that of a faithful husband and father.

It was a lie, and now it has caught up with him. Wednesday, CNN quoted a source as saying that Schwarzenegger was "rambling around" his huge house "with none of his family around" and feeling terrible.

I hope it is true. And I hope that, perhaps, in his private and lonely moments, Schwarzenegger will come to realize that lamentation is something not just for women.

Texas theme park for visitors with special needs

SAN ANTONIO —
The carousel has chariots for wheelchairs.
Braille games decorate side panels on the jungle gym. And table-high sandboxes allow just about any kid to build a castle.

Morgan's Wonderland aims to offer everything a special-needs guest might enjoy at a theme park — while appealing to non-disabled visitors too.

"If it wasn't for searching Google," founder Gordon Hartman said, "it would've taken me a lot longer to put this together."

The result is both inventive and heartwarming: a 25-acre, \$34 million park catering every detail to people with physical or mental disabilities, down to jungle gyms wide enough to fit two wheelchairs sideby-side, a "Sensory Village" that's an indoor mall of touch-and-hear activities, and daily attendance limits so the park never gets too loud or lines too long.

year, Morgan's Wonderland has attracted more than 100,000 guests, despite almost no national marketing by the nonprofit park. Admission for people with special needs is free, and adults accompanying them are \$10. Three out of every four visitors do not have disabilities.

Since opening last

The park is the first of its kind in the nation, according to Hartman, a San Antonio philanthropist who named the place after his 17-yearold daughter, who can't perform simple math and struggles to form sentences because of cognitive disabilities. A map in the lobby entrance, where adults with special needs volunteer as greeters, offers a more visual way to gauge the park's early popularity, with the 49 states and 16 countries visitors have come from marked in purple.

Persons with autism, orthopedic impairments, mental retardation or seizure disorders are among the most regular visitors. Tifani Jackson's 11-year-old son, Jaylin, has Williams syndrome, a rare

afternoon at Morgan's Wonderland — the average guest stays about 2 ½ to 3 hours — is deliberately designed to not be an exhausting, endless trudge from one overcrowded ride to the next.

genetic disorder that causes learning disabilities and developmental delays.

Jaylin was showing off his new hat from the gift shop. Now he was coaxing his mom back toward the off-road adventure ride, where rugged-looking jeeps that are wheelchair accessible twist and turn through a short track.

"It's so nice to have

a place like this," said Jackson, who lives in nearby Austin.

Built on the site of an abandoned quarry, Morgan's Wonderland is one-tenth the size of SeaWorld, the destination mega-attraction on the other side of San Antonio. But spending an

Generously spread out, the park has about 20 attractions from active (Butterfly Playground) to easygoing (a train circling a milelong loop through the park and around a lake). Even more tranquil is the Sitting Garden, a quiet and almost meditative enclave that's a favorite among parents with autistic children.

Inside Sensory Village is a mechanic's shop with tools mounted to a low table. A light touch of the drill triggers the crank-like sound of a bolt driving flush into an engine block. Next door is a pretend supermarket with plastic lobsters, ears of corn and cans of tuna, and ca-

shiers who always hand back the right amount of invisible change.

Most interactive is a low-lit space with a touch-sensitive floor, giving the illusion of walking across a pond as the water ripples and colors burst with every step. White canvases on the walls, meanwhile, transform into butterflies chasing a shadow anytime someone steps in front of the projector.

Sprouting from the sandboxes are "diggers" — think shovels and rakes — that can be operated sitting down from a wheelchair. Another nearby sandbox is elevated 4 ½ feet, next

to a musical garden of giant xylophones and chimes. The chariots on the carousel are reserved for wheelchairs, and many of the horses are fitted with high back cushions for children who need the support.

Reservations are encouraged because of the daily attendance limits, though as general manager Dave Force put it, "we're not going to turn away a family that's driven all the way from Arkansas." Each guest is also given an electronic wristband that allows families and caregivers to keep tabs on their group in the park, and scanning the wrist-

bands on some rides emails a free photo back home.

Yet despite being completely designed for individuals with special needs, the park is playful enough to be enjoyed by any kid. The motto of Morgan's Wonderland is even "Where Everyone Can Play." That inclusion was important to Hartman, who on a family trip a few years ago, saw his daughter Morgan wanting to play with three kids tossing a ball in a pool but couldn't interact. The kids, just as unsure how to interact with Morgan, stopped playing.

Baby boomers are fueling boom in knee, hip surgeries

SAN DIEGO — We're becoming a nation of bum knees, worn-out hips and sore shoulders, and it's not just the Medicare set. Baby boomer bones and joints also are taking a pounding, spawning a boom in operations to fix them.

Knee replacement

surgeries have doubled over the last decade and more than tripled in the 45-to-64 age group, new research shows. Hips are trending that way, too.

And here's a surprise: It's not all due to obesity. Ironically, trying to stay fit and avoid extra pounds is taking a toll on a generation that expects bad joints can be swapped out like old tires on a car.

tires on a car.

"Boomeritis" or "fixme-itis" is what Dr.
Nicholas DiNubile, a suburban Philadelphia

surgeon, calls it.

"It's this mindset of 'fix me at any cost, turn back the clock,'" said DiNubile. an adviser

to several pro athletic groups and a spokesman for the American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgeons. "The boomers are the first generation trying to stay active in droves on an aging frame" and are less willing to use a cane or put up with pain or stiffness as their grandparents did, he said.

A huge industry says they don't have to. TV ads show people water skiing with new hips. Ads tout "the athletic knee," "the custom knee," "the male knee," "the female knee." Tennis great Billie Jean King, 67, is promoting the "30-year" Smith & Nephew knees she got

last year.

"I wanted to make sure whatever they put in me was going to last," she said. "I'm not trying to win Wimbledon anymore. I'm trying to get my exercise in," play a little tennis on the clay courts in Central Park, and walk to a movie

or a restaurant. "If I'd

known what I know

now, I would have had it 10 years ago."

Joint replacements have enabled millions of people like King to lead better lives, and surgeons are increasingly comfortable offering them to younger people.

But here's the rub: No one really knows how well these implants will perform in the active baby boomers getting them now. Most studies were done in older folks whose expectations were to be able to go watch a grandchild's soccer game — not play the sport themselves, as one researcher put it.

Even the studies presented at a recent orthopedics conference that found knee replacements are lasting 20 years come with the caveat that this is in older people who were not stressing their new joints by running marathons, skiing or playing

tennis.

Besides the usual


interesting book with superb illustrations.

younger people increases the odds need future operations when these wear out, specialists

"We think very carefully about patients under 50" and talk many of them out of replacing joints, said Dr. William Robb, orthopedics chief at NorthShore University HealthSystem in suburban Chicago.

But many don't want to wait, even if they're not much beyond that:

-Karen Guffey, a 55-year-old retired civilian police worker in San Diego, plans to have a hip replaced in September. "I can't exercise the way I want to. I have to go slow, which is really aggravating. I want to go full force," she said. "I'm not worried about how I'm going to feel when I'm 75. I want to feel good now."

—Karen Cornwall, a Havertown, Pa., nurse who played a slew of sports since childhood, had both knees replaced last year when she was 54. "I just felt like I was too young and too active to be in pain all the time," she explained.

—Bill McMullen, a former Marine and construction worker from suburban Philadelphia, had seven knee repair surgeries before finally getting a knee replacement at age 55 a decade ago. He took up weightlifting to spare his knees but damaged a shoulder and had it replaced two years ago. "People ask me if I'm happy and I say, 'If you have pain, go and get it done," he said of joint replacement. "It was the best thing for me. I have no pain."

People are urged to exercise because it's so important for health, but there are "too many wannabes" who overdo it by trying to imitate elite athletes, said Dr. Norman Schachar, a surgeon and assistant dean at the University of Calgary in Alberta, Canada.

"They think if they've got a sore knee they're entitled to having it replaced," he said. "I think surgeons are overdoing it too, to try to meet that expectation."

Dr. Ronald Hillock, an orthopedic surgeon in a large practice in Las Vegas that does about 4,000 joint replacements

a year, sees the demand from patients. "People come in and say 'this is what I want,

this is what I need," he

said. "They could buy a cane or wear a brace," but most want a surgical fix.

The numbers tell the story. There were 288,471 total hip replacements in 2009, nearly half of them in people under 65, according to the federal Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality, which tracks hospitalizations.

replacements soared from 264,311 in 1997 to 621,029 in 2009, and more than tripled in the 45-to-64-year-old age group.

"Five or 10 years ago, a very small number of people under 65 were receiving this surgery. Now we see more and more younger people getting it," said Elena Losina, co-director of the Orthopaedic and Arthritis Center for Outcomes Research at Brigham and Women's Hospital in Boston.

She analyzed how much of this rise was due to population growth and obesity, and presented results at an orthopedic meeting in San Diego in February.

From 1997 to 2007, the population of 45- to 64-year-olds grew by 36 percent, but knee replacements in this group more than tripled. Obesity rates didn't rise enough to explain the trend.

"At most, 23 percent of the 10-year growth in total knee replacement can be explained by increasing obesity and population size," Losina

"This is a very successful operation. The only caveat is, all the successes have been seen in the older population," who usually put less stress on their new joints than younger folks who want to return to sports. "It's unclear whether the artificial joint is designed to withstand this higher activity," she said.

EFFECT OF DOMESTIC ABUSE ON CHILDREN

In homes where domestic violence occurs, children are at high risk of suffering physical abuse themselves. Regardless of whether children are physically abused or not, the emotional effects of witnessing domestic violence are very similar to the psychological trauma associated with being a victim of child abuse. Each year, an estimated minimum of 3.3 million children witness domestic violence.

There are several general reactions that children from violent homes are likely to show. The same emotional reaction can be acted out differently according to the child's age.

• Feeling responsible for the abuse

A child might think, "if I had been a good girl/boy daddy wouldn't have hit mommy."

Constant Anxiety

Even when things are calm, one never knows when the next fight will start.

Guilt for not stopping the abuse

Children can experience guilt over the good feelings they have about the abuser.

Grief

Children who are separated from the abuser are in the process of grieving over the loss. Children may also grieve over losing the lifestyle and positive image of the abuser they had before the violence began.

Ambivalence

Not knowing how one feels or having two opposite emotions at the same time is very difficult for children. A child who says, "I don't know how I feel about it," may not be hedging but rather is confused about feelings.

Fear of abandonment

Children removed from one parent as a result of violent acts may have strong fears that the other parent could also leave them or die. Thus, a child may refuse to leave the mother, even for short time periods.

Need for excessive adult attention This need can be especially troublesome for mothers who are trying to deal with their

own pain and decisions. Fear of physical harm to themselves

A significant percentage of witnessing children are also abused. They may worry that the abuser will find them and abduct or harm them or that the abuser will be angry and retaliate when they return home.

Embarrassment Especially for older children, sensitivity to the stigma of spouse abuse may result in

Worry about the future

The uncertainty within their daily lives may make children feel that life will continue to be unpredictable.

Deadly storms leave 13 dead in 3 states

EL RENO, Okla. (AP) — Violent storms with winds of more than 150 mph slammed into a chunk of the central U.S. overnight, killing at least 13 people in three states, flattening homes, crushing cars and ripping apart a rural Arkansas fire station.

The high-powered storms arrived Tuesday night and early Wednesday, just days after a massive tornado tore up the southwest Missouri city of Joplin and killed 122 people.

The latest storms killed at least eight people in Oklahoma and two in Kansas before trekking east into Arkansas to claim three more lives.

Just outside the tiny community

of Denning in western Arkansas, winery owner Eugene Post listened to from his porch as a tornado barreled toward his home. He saw the lights flicker, as the storms yanked power from the community.

"I didn't see anything," Post, 83, said early Wednesday. "I could hear it real loud though. ... It sounded like a train going by."

Department of Emergency Management spokesman Tommy Jackson said one person died in that tornado early Wednesday, and another was killed in Bethlehem, Johnson County. Franklin County's chief deputy sheriff, Deputy Devin Bramlett, said early Wednesday that a third person died in Etna.

"I don't know, it's just unbelievable," said Rick Covert, Deputy Emergency Management Coordinator for Franklin County, Ark. "It's just total devastation."

A rural fire station in Franklin County was left without a roof as emergency workers rushed to the wounded.

Obama meets with Cameron, set to address Parliament as he tends to European alliances

LONDON (AP) — President Barack Obama and British Prime Minister David Cameron confronted complex security debates over Afghanistan, Libya and economic growth Wednesday on a day of diplomacy amid testing times for the two allies.

Midway through his six-day, four-country European tour, Obama began his day Wednesday with private meetings at the British prime minister's residence at 10 Downing Street with Cameron and Deputy Prime Minister Nick Clegg.

Later Obama was to hold a joint press conference with Cameron and then a centerpiece address to both houses of the British Parliament.

The U.S. president faced a host of knotty problems to work through with British leaders including disagreements over the NATO-led bombing campaign in Libya.

His larger mission was to reassure European allies that they still are valued partners in a U.S. foreign policy that increasingly looks to Asia. Obama turned back to the grinding issues of eco-

nomic and national security Wednesday after opening his European tour with two days of celebration and ceremony, first in Ireland and then Tuesday in England, where he and Michelle Obama toured Westminster Abbey and feasted at Buckingham Palace as state guests of the queen.

Obama's message to allies across Europe, and Britain in particular, will be that their longstanding partnerships remain the cornerstone of America's engagement with the world even as the president seeks to strengthen U.S. ties with emerging powers such as China and India.

BUFFALO, N.Y. (AP) — Kathy Hochul told her supporters they had picked the right issue to fight a Republican on long-held Republican turf.

The Democrat rode a wave of voter discontent over the national GOP's plan to change Medicare and overcame decades of GOP dominance here to capture Tuesday's special election in New York's 26th Congressional District. Hochul defeated Republican state Assemblywom-

an Jane Corwin on Tuesday night, capturing 47 percent of the vote to 43 percent for Corwin, to win the seat vacated by disgraced Republican Chris Lee, vote totals showed.

A wealthy tea party candidate, Jack Davis, took

The special election that became a referendum on the health care plan for the nation's seniors may serve as a warning shot to further GOP efforts to cut popular entitlement programs.

"The three reasons a Democrat was elected to Congress in the district were Medicare, Medicare and Medicare," Democratic Congressional Campaign Committee Chairman Steve Israel, D-N.Y., said in an interview.



ARLINGTON (AP) — A lengthy rain delay did nothing to hinder Carlos Quentin's momentum.

Quentin had his first three-homer game and the Chicago White Sox beat the Texas Rangers 8-6 on Tuesday night in a game that was halted for nearly three hours by heavy rain and hail that sent fans scurrying for cover throughout the ballpark.

Fans were moved from the upper deck to the lower seating bowl and then told to take cover in tunnels beneath the ballpark as a storm approached that halted play in the fourth inning.

The game finally resumed after a delay of 2 hours, 58 minutes, and few fans were left when the final out was recorded at 1:27 a.m. local time.

Slumping Adam Dunn hit a tiebreaking shot for the White Sox, but Quentin made the difference with his five RBIs.

Nobody knew for sure when or if the game would resume. The White Sox kept their concentration and won for the sixth time in eight games.

"People just want to talk about the rain delay," Chicago manager Ozzie Guillen said. "That's the kind of game when your players could just say 'Whatever.' You homer in the sixth off

Quentin became the fifth major league player in 13 days to homer three times in a game, joining Carlos Beltran, Jose Bautista, Jason Giambi and Corey Hart, who did it Monday night.

"Talk about dedication. All those Monday (bowling) nights. They weren't all good weather nights, either. He's probably driven through just about everything to get there ... ice, wind, tornadoes ... everything."

There is more to Huey than dedication.

"Just like the rest of us, he's had a bunch of nights where he was dog tired when he got off work. He's not only real dedicated, but he's always been on time, too – ready to go every Monday night," Barnes

Nights like that "two flat" night stand out in this 79-year-old's memory like it happened only

yesterday. "We went into the alley that night when they were first throwing their practice balls, which meant we weren't late but it did mean a fast shoe change," Huey said with a grin.

Among Huey's ther bowling teammates have been brother-inlaw Neill Hutchings along with nephew Brandy Hutchings, as well as a couple of other local bowling enthusiasts in Steve Teague and Danny Hollman. Past teammates have included the likes of Tracey Hageman, Doug Spurleck, Steve Payson, George Kirkland and his brother, Bruce Kirk-

"One of the deals about the team we've got is that everybody on it knows the Lord. But,

with us, if they don't they just as well forget about it," Harris said.

Huey not only is just bowling but, to hear it, still at a quality level, as

"He's still pretty good -- especially for his age. He's probably averaging 165 a game," Barnes said of Harris, who has bowled on a state tournament level everywhere from Houston, San Antonio, Amarillo, El Paso to Lubbock.

A couple of his highperformances light were once bowling a 297, which is just three pins off that sport's perfect game. He also remembers his Big 4 split pick-up, which he got by knocking down pins four, six, seven and 10 with that one memorable shot coming right here on Lamesa's old bowling allev.

"We never shot one of them again," Harris recalled. "At least, we've still got the patch to prove that we did it once."

Harris vividly can remember local businesses like Sam Stevens and Texas Electric, as well as his own Harris's Pest Control, having their own teams in that old Lamesa bowling league.

"Sure, there have been nights where we've wanted to tear some of those guys up, but for the most part they've all been pretty good allaround guys," Harris

Like in any sport, Harris has seen his share of changes.

"O'Donnell had an alley in the '40's that was back when we picked pins up by hand for three cents a line," Harris recalled.

With right at three decades and going in his sport, Harris has learned some tricks of his trade along the way.

"It's something that's either in you or it's not," Harris said.

"Watching all of those pro bowlers back on TV was fun. It seemed like they all had their different approaches, but it's still about hitting that pocket."

Harris also learned to make some adjustments along the way. He has drilled five finger holes in his bowling ball, compared to the customary three hole bowling balls.

"We've had guys tease us about that having to do with old age, but that's got more to do with arthritis as much as anything," Harris

That specially marked ball is something else that separates Harris from many bowlers.

"A lot of us call it the Old Man's ball," Barnes quipped.

"Even guys from the other teams know that ball belongs to Mr. Huey."

When quizzed about how much longer he plans on bowling, Harris quickly replied that he can see another 30 years in sight in that

"We might end up needing to get some oxygen – no, we're not that old yet," said Harris, who has been married to wife Charlene for the past 57 years.

Harris appears to still have the same zeal in that sport as when he first hit the alleys.

"We still want that 300 (bowling's perfect game). We'd like to have that before we go.

Canucks to play for Stanley Cup

VANCOUVER, British Columbia (AP) — Vancouver Canucks captain Henrik Sedin didn't hesitate to compare winning Olympic gold to the chance to play for the Stanley Cup.

For Sedin, who won the Olympics with Sweden in 2006, it was just as important to earn a trip to the Cup finals for the first time in his career - and the first time in 17 seasons for the Vancouver franchise.

"It's up there with the Olympic gold," said Sedin. "It's a tough journey to go through to get here. The Olympic medal, it's a short tournament, you play a few games, you get a few bounces, you're there. This is way tougher."

The Canucks certainly didn't make it easy on themselves Tuesday

Ryan Kesler tied the game with 13.2 seconds left in regulation, and Roberto Luongo made 54 saves before Kevin Bieksa scored a strange and lucky goal 10:18 into the second overtime to send the Canucks to the finals for the first time since 1994 with a 3-2 win over the San Jose Sharks.

Despite the heroics, Luongo, who won Olymmonths earlier, wasn't quite ready to call his first finals a defining moment.

"Hopefully there's a few more to come in the next couple weeks," he said. "I said to my family before the series started, this is what I've been waiting for my whole life. I'm just going to go out there and play and enjoy it."

Only Bieksa got to enjoy the winning goal right away. Few others saw it go in.

NFL still making rules

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) The NFL got back to football for a day.

Not on the fields, of course, with the lockout in its 10th week. In the meeting rooms, where the league announced Tuesday it will punish teams next season if their players commit multiple flagrant hits that result in fines.

The 32 owners also voted unanimously to approve amendments to player safety rules offering more protection to defenseless players and putting more bite in penalties for launching.

Naturally, they discussed strategy for the labor impasse — most of their afternoon session at these spring meetings

was dedicated to that topic. But the big news was the commitment to the "notion of accountability," according to league vice president Adolpho Birch. Any punishment will

be financial, although Birch didn't rule out Commissioner Roger Goodell applying further sanctions such as stripping clubs of draft choices. Details such as the amount of the fines against clubs, or how many player fines would trigger punishment, have not been determined.

"From our end, we are looking at a system that is similar to the one we put in a couple years ago with respect to offfield conduct to really encourage clubs and encourage coaches to teach the proper techniques and to correct dangerous play on the field," Birch said. "As a club's total increases to a certain threshold, we will enforce some ... payback to encourage clubs to stay below that

threshold. "We have to look at it in the context of the penalties that are already being imposed. The player himself will get penalized, which penalizes the team. Subsequently, the player could also be fined by the league. Under our thought process now, nothing would

occur unless there was a league fine or suspension. That is what this policy is designed to do, not simply to punish a team for a penalty on top of the penalty itself, but really to look at things that are egregious enough to result in a fine or suspension by the league." The NFL began a

crackdown on illegal hits, particularly those to defenseless players, last October. It threatened suspensions, but no players had to sit out games. However, Ray Anderson, the league's chief disciplinarian, has said suspensions will be considered for illegal hits this season.

Now, clubs as well as the players are being put on notice that illegal hits will result in substantial discipline.

Birch would not identify which teams from 2010 would have been subject to fines had the policy been in place, but did say at least three teams might have been punished. One player, Pittsburgh All-Pro linebacker James Harrison, was fined \$100,000 for flagrant hits last season.

The amendments for player safety included a measure aimed at keeping a player from launching himself into a defenseless opponent. A 15-yard penalty will result for anyone who leaves both feet before contact to spring forward and upward into an opponent and delivers a blow to the helmet with any part of his hel-

Such tackles will also be subject to fines.

The definition of a

defenseless receiver already has been extended. Now, a receiver who has not had time to protect himself or has not clearly become a runner even if both feet are on the ground is considered defenseless.

Penalized players are subject to being ejected for flagrant fouls.

"This should permanently change the mentality of a defensive player trying to loosen the ball to change your target point," said competition committee cochairman Rich McKay, president of the Atlanta Falcons.

Also, hits to the head of a passer that are not considered "forcible" blows will not be penal-

"We are not saying to take the physicality out of the game in any way, shape or form," McKay said. "There are still lots of hits that are legal." Birch also confirmed

that using the World Anti-Doping Agency to administer the league's drug policy is a possibil-

"From a procedural standpoint, we need to look at those options. That would be one option," he said. "We are certainly looking into that to see what that means for us and to see what that does to advance the idea that the NFL remains the leader in this area. What that means, we'll find out, but we are going to take

a look at it." Also Tuesday, NFL lead negotiator Jeff Pash said no contingency plans for a shortened season were discussed.

"Our contingency plan, first, last and ongoing," he said, "is to negotiate an agreement with the players association. So any opening of training camps is based on a collectively bargained agreement."

Colts owner Jim Irsay said something needs to be in place by July 4 to avoid jeopardizing the regular season. Irsay estimated a \$1 billion loss in revenues if that doesn't happen.

"If you miss those preseason games, or a game or two (of the regular schedule), or start late," Irsay said, "you have lost significant money, in excess of \$1 billion."

The league also canceled next month's rookie symposium, the first league event called off because of the lockout.

"We waited as long as we possibly could," Birch said. "The rookie symposium is an extremely large, complex event that requires a lot of people from an attendance standpoint. It's to the point we needed to be fair to those who would come to help us put it on."

Royals winningest pitcher dies Tennis Continued from I

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — Paul Splittorff, the winningest pitcher in Kansas City Royals history and a popular broadcaster for the team, died Wednesday after a battle with oral cancer and melanoma, the club announced.

Splittorff, 64, died at his home in the Kansas City suburb of Blue Springs, Mo., the team

Splittorff was drafted by the expansion Royals in the 25th round in 1968 and spent his entire 15year career in Kansas City. A big, blond and bespectacled left-hander with a high leg kick, he often appeared to squint into the catcher's mitt as though he was having trouble seeing the sign — proving disconcerting to hitters who wondered if they should be ready to bail out if the ball should come toward their head.

He retired during the 1984 season with a clubrecord 166 victories.

He had already been hagen. But the fact he retired with more victories in a Kansas City uniform than any of the others is a testament to the iron-willed work ethic that characterized both his baseball and broadcasting careers.

teammate on the Royals pennant-winning teams of the 1970s and '80s, took over as the Royals analyst, and Splittorff moved mostly into preand post-game broadcasts. He was never able to regain the clear, distinct voice that fans had known for more than two decades.

Splittorff kept his health issues as private as possible, explaining that his voice problems were the result of a virus.

"He didn't want anyone to feel sorry for him," Royals broadcaster Ryan Lefebvre said.

In 15 seasons, Splittorff was 166-143 with a 3.81 ERA. He was in four postseasons with the Royals, 1976-78 and the 1980 World Series against Philadelphia.

He was particularly effective in the Royals' memorable playoff battles with the New York Yankees in the 1970s and '80s. Against a Yankees' lineup stocked with lefthanded hitters, he was 2-0 with a 2.79 ERA.

Colleagues said Splittorff's work habits set him apart from many former players who transition from the playing field to the broadcast booth without taking time to learn the craft.

"I never worked a game with him where I felt like he was giving a little less effort today than he did yesterday, whether it was research, talking to a player of a coach about a guy he didn't know much about," said Lefe-

On Tuesday, Australian Open champion Kim Clijsters made her return to Roland Garros.

The two-time runner-up, who last played on the red clay of Roland Garros in 2006, has been preparing for the French Open for months.

"All my workouts that I was doing with my trainer were all kind of with the clay season in mind, and we were doing longer intervals, kind of knowing that the rallies would be a little bit longer," Clijsters said Tuesday after advancing to the second round. "Everything was kind of set already on this event a few months ago."

But then, in April, she injured her right ankle dancing at her cousin's wedding, putting her participation in doubt.

The injury didn't appear to affect her much, however. Clijsters passed her first test by beating Anastasiya Yakimova of Belarus 6-2, 6-3.
