Drought leaves CRMWD scrambling

Water district hampered by low lake levels, limited pumping capacity



For the Colorado River Municipal Water District, it's a matter of simple math — limited number of water sources plus limited pumping capacity equals reduced deliveries to customers.

CRMWD, which had already reduced deliveries to its member cities by 10 percent this summer, announced

cent full, while Lake Spence was at less than 2 percent of capacity.

That leaves Lake Ivie (currently 26 percent full) and two groundwater fields in Ward County as the district's only reliable sources of water, and CRMWD cannot produce its normal delivery quotient from just those two areas.

"We're pumping the maxi-

mum amount of water we can," Grant said. "We're only able to bring in water from one reservoir and the Ward County wells, so we have limited pumping capacity ... We're in danger of overworking the system, so this (additional) 10 percent reduction gives us at least a small safety margin."

If the drought continues for an extended amount of time, Grant said water customers could potentially face a nightmare scenario.

"If we don't get any inflow by the end of 2012, our projections indicate we will have pumped all the water out of Ivie that we can," he said.

While the only sure cure for the reservoir problem is considerable rain between





Two killed in oilfield accident

Two Big Spring men were killed Saturday morning in an oilfield incident near Lamesa in Dawson County, the result of an accident on a Robinson Drilling Company platform.

Jason Bolt, 25, and Sandy Daves, 28, were killed when bushings on the oil rig they were working on failed, according to members of the victims' families.

Robinson drilling has been plagued by a number of oilfield accidents during the past year.

In June of 2010, two Robinson Drilling employees were rushed to Midland Memorial Tuesday following an accident at an oil derrick located 10 miles north of Midland in Glasscock County.

According to officials with Robinson Drilling, neither man sustained life threatening injuries during the accident.

In April 2010, William cident is being investigated Ryan Locke, 35, died following an oil rig drilling accident at a location between Midland and Gardendale. Locke was believed to have been working from a ladder on the drilling rig when a piece of high pressure pipe broke away, releasing enough pressure in the Big Spring man's direction to knock him from the ladder and platform.

Casey Anthony trial enters 4th week

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) - A more evidence of decomposihair and fiber investigator for the FBI took the stand Monday as the murder trial of 25-year-old Casey Anthony enters its fourth week.

Stephen Shaw told jurors he analyzed hair found in Casey Anthony's trunk and samples taken from 2-yearold Caylee Anthony's skull, which was found in a wooded area near the Anthony

Shaw testified that he saw

tion on the hairs taken from the child's skull than on the hair found in the trunk.

Meanwhile, Judge Belvin Perry ruled that prosecutors could not use an electronic presentation of the hair analysis as evidence, saying that he found it troubling the contents of the study were not shared with defense attorneys ahead of time. Jurors waited outside the courtroom for about 20 minutes while the issue was from a University of Florida settled.

Prosecutors contend Casey Anthony suffocated Caylee with duct tape. The defense has argued the toddler drowned in her grandparents' swimming pool on June 16, 2008.

The child was not reporting missing for 31 days. Anthony faces the death penalty if convicted.

Last week, the defense objected to hearing testimony professor who planned to present a computer animation of the way duct tape could have been used in the child's death.

Perry ruled the jury could see the animation, which featured a picture of Caylee taken alongside her mother that was superimposed with an image of her decomposed skull, and another with a strip of duct tape that was recovered with her remains.

Deliberations on penalty over slain Dallas officer

DALLAS (AP) — A jury in Dallas will decide whether a man convicted in the fatal shooting of a police officer who was serving a warrant should spend the rest of his life in prison.

Deliberations will resume Monday in the penalty phase for Charles Payne.

Payne was charged with capital murder in the 2009 death of Sr. Cpl. Norm Smith, Jurors on Friday convicted Payne of the lesser charge of murder and then started the punishment phase.

Jurors began penalty deliberations Saturday, but had Sunday off.

Payne testified he thought he was being robbed and did not know that the people outside the door of his apartment were police, looking for another man inside the unit.

Dinosaur bones part of more than \$5M Dallas sale

DALLAS (AP) — Private collectors have purchased dinosaur bones as part of more than \$5.3 million in rare items sold at auction in Dallas.

Heritage Auction says an allosaurus and a stegosaurus, in an offering known as the Fighting Pair, sold for nearly \$2.75 million Sunday.

The Dallas-based auction house declined to disclose the buyer, other than saying the bones would head for an overseas museum.

The Dallas Morning News reported Monday that 430 bidders took part in the auction, which also featured a stuffed polar bear, a rare fossilized bird egg and precious gems.

A set of 11-foot-by-9-foot shark jaws did not sell. The items will remain on loan to the Dallas Museum of Nature and Science.

LBJ Library to release **Pentagon Papers Monday**

AUSTIN (AP) — The complete Pentagon Papers are being made public by the federal government for the first time.

The Lyndon B. Johnson Library and Museum in Austin will unveil the once-top secret, 7,000-page Pentagon study of the Vietnam War on Monday.

Simultaneousreleasesarescheduled at the National Archives in Washington, the John F. Kennedy Library in Boston, the Richard Nixon Library in Yorba Linda, Calif., and the National Archives in College Park, Md.

The release comes exactly 40 years after The New York Times published leaked portions of the report. A federal judge soon halted their publication, though other newspapers then began publishing the documents.

A split U.S. Supreme Court eventually struck down the judge's ruling, leading to a major legal victory for press freedom.

1 killed, at least 7 hurt in church van crash

TYLER (AP) — One person was killed and at least seven others were hospitalized after a Louisiana church van crashed while returning from an East Texas water park.

The Texas Department of Public Safety says the crash happened about 5 p.m. Saturday on Interstate 20 eastbound, about 12 miles northeast of Tyler.

DPS Trooper Glenn Davenport says

the van's left rear tire blew out, causing the driver to lose control and veer off the highway. The van rolled several times, ripping off the roof and ejecting eight passengers, killing one. None were wearing seatbelts.

The DPS said the identities of the dead and injured, the conditions of those hospitalized and the identity of the church that owned the van weren't available Sunday.

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Texas Gov. Rick Perry, a potential 2012 presidential candidate, criticized President Barack Obama for increasing access to abortion.

brought cheers from a crowd at a Hispanic anti-abortion event in Los Angeles when he said, "Every life is precious."

Perry told the crowd of about 5,000 that there's no such thing as an unwanted child in the eyes of God.

He criticized the Obama administration for its policies on embryonic stem cell research and use of federal funds for abortion. He said under Obama, abortion has become "a U.S. export."



Bareback champion returns to Big Spring to defend 2010 title

Bareback rider Justin McDaniel has been in the winner's circle plenty in his six-year ProRodeo career. Twice he's won the average at the Wrangler National Finals Rodeo, and just three seasons ago he left the bright lights of Las Vegas with the most coveted piece of hardware in the sport, the world champion's gold

And quite possibly the best regular-season paycheck McDaniel had in 2010 was at the Big Spring Cowboy Reunion and Rodeo, where he scored 76 points on Carr Pro Rodeo's Easy Does It to finish in a tie for second place behind Jared Smith. The \$617 he earned last June was nothing compared to the \$103,189 he won at the NFR, but it was just as important overall.

"That was a big rodeo for me because it was the first one I'd won money on after my injury," said McDaniel, who missed the first half of season after having surgery to repair two herniated discs in his back. "I knew I was rusty, but it felt good to do well in Big Spring."

McDaniel is scheduled to return to Howard County for the Big Spring Cowboy Reunion and Rodeo, set this year for 8 p.m. Thursday, June 16-Saturday, June 18. He'd like to improve on things from last year, and he's already ahead of the game with three rodeo victories, including one the first week in June in Fort Smith, Arkansas.

But he's not the only cowboy itching to get on some of the great Carr Pro Rodeo bareback horses. Matt Bright earned \$81,489 last year riding bucking horses, the best season yet for the 27-year-old cowboy from Azle, Texas.

"Any time you can win first, it's definitely good for a guy's confidence," said Bright, who has wins in Shreveport, La., and Guymon, Okla., already this year. For cowboys who make their livings on the backs of bucking beasts, they know how important high quality animals are to their livelihood. Carr Pro Rodeo has them, and that's why some of the top bareback riders in the business are

Mavericks are NBA champions

Defeat Heat 105-95 in Miami Sunday night

MIAMI (AP) — For Dirk waiting for an NBA title. Nowitzki, the resume is complete. He's an NBA champion.

For LeBron James, the agonizing wait continues for at least one more year.

A season that began with Miami celebrating the signings of James, Dwyane Wade and Chris Bosh — along with the promise of championships ended on the very same floor, with the Dallas Mavericks hoisting the title trophy for the first time in their franchise history after beating the Heat 105-95 on Sunday night. The Mavericks won four of the series' last five games, a turnabout that could not have been sweeter.

"I really still can't believe it," said Nowitzki, who had 21 points and took home finals MVP honors.

He and Jason Terry, who led the Mavs with 27 points, were the two remaining players from the Dallas team that lost

to Miami in the 2006 finals. "Tonight," Terry said, "we got vindication." James did not. Not even

close, and a year unlike any

other ended they way they all

have so far — with him still

He scored 21 points for Miami, shook a few hands afterward, and departed before most of the Mavs tugged on their championship hats and T-shirts. Bosh had 19, Mario Chalmers 18 and Wade 17 for the Heat.

"We worked so hard and so long for it," Nowitzki said. "The team has had an unbelievable ride."

So did the Heat. Unlike Dallas, theirs wasn't a joyride.

"It goes without saying," Heat coach Erik Spoelstra said. "You're never really prepared for a moment like this. ... Neither team deserved this championship more than the other, but Dallas earned it."

Make no mistake: Miami lost the finals, but the blame will be directed at James. Even he knew that after the way he left Cleveland with "The Decision" and all the animus that generated not just in Ohio but around the entire league, the only way he could silence

some critics was with a title.

"It doesn't weigh on me," James said. "At all." Still, he got even more criti-

cism — and a thinly veiled jab

from his former owner with the Cavaliers, Dan Gilbert, who reveled in the moment on

Twitter. "Mavs NEVER stopped & now entire franchise gets rings," Gilbert wrote. "Old Lesson for all: There are NO SHORTCUTS. NONE."

And the winning owner, Mark Cuban, took what may be perceived as a jab as well: "I could care less about the Heat," he said.

Mavs coach Rick Carlisle joined an elite group, those with NBA titles as both a player and a head coach. Others on that list include the presumably retired-for-good Phil Jackson, one of Carlisle's mentors in K.C. Jones, and Heat President Pat Riley who led Miami past Dallas in 2006, and the mastermind of what Miami did last summer by getting James, Wade and Bosh on the same team with an eye on becoming a dynasty.

It might still happen, of

But even after 72 wins this season, including playoffs,

the Heat lost the last game. And that means this year was a disappointment — except to just about everyone else in the NBA, or so it would seem.

"This is a true team," Carlisle said. "This is an old bunch. We don't run fast or jump high. These guys had each other's backs. We played the right way. We trusted the pass. This is a phenomenal thing for the city of Dallas.'

Hating the Heat became the NBA's craze this season, and the team knew it had no shortage of critics, everyone from Cleveland (where "Cavs for Mavs" shirts were popular during these finals) to Chicago (the city James and Wade both flirted with last summer) and just about every place in between lining up to take shots at Miami.

"We could feel it," Carlisle said, noting he was repeatedly told during the finals that "billions" of people wanted to see Dallas topple Miami.

Rangers fall to Twins

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — Francisco Liriano gave the Texas Rangers more Target Field trouble.

Liriano sniffed his second no-hitter of the season, sitting in the dugout Sunday for nearly a half-hour before Adrian Beltre led off the eighth inning with a clean single, and the Twins topped the Texas Rangers 6-1.

The Rangers fell to 1-9 at Minnesota since the new ballpark opened last year. They had won nine of their last 12 games before losing three of four

"I always say, 'Pitching stops everything,'" Rangers manager Ron Washington said. "They outplayed us for the last two ballgames.'

Following Scott Baker's complete game Saturday, Liriano (4-6) needed only 64 pitches to retire the first 18 batters against the high-scoring Rangers. The lefty, who held the Chicago White Sox hitless in a wild effort May 3, sat in the dugout for 27 minutes in the bottom of the seventh before falling behind 3-0 to Beltre and giving up his first hit.

"He was trying to throw it for a strike, and he threw the pitch over the middle of the plate," said Beltre, who later scored on a single by Yorvit Torrealba.

That's all that went right for the

Elvis Andrus was the first to reach base, on a fielding error by rookie third baseman Luke Hughes with one out in the seventh, a questioned ruling by official scorer Gregg Wong.

Then the Twins scored five times in the bottom of the inning, after an iniurv to Texas starter Matt Harrison.

"I got a little bit nervous in the eighth inning. I got behind in the count, and I had to throw a fastball," said Liriano, who matched a season high by striking out nine in eight innings. He allowed two hits without a walk.

The Rangers had plenty of pop in their lineup, with only regulars Mitch Moreland and Mike Napoli missing, but they looked lost against Liriano. Washington even benched Andrus after a lackadaisical play in the seventh at shortstop led to an error and contributed to five unearned runs

"I didn't like his attitude," Washington said, adding: "Elvis is better than that. Elvis doesn't have a problem. Elvis is an excellent ballplayer, but every now and then when he gets like that I have to send a message.'

Liriano came close to becoming the first inning no-hitters in the same season. Dean Chance had a pair of hitless performances in August 1967, although the first one was a five-inning game. Roy Halladay pitched two no-hitters

last year for the Philadelphia Phillies a perfect game in the regular season and a no-no in the NL playoffs. Nolan Ryan was the last pitcher to throw a pair of no-hitters in the same regular season, in 1973 for the California Angels.

Harrison (5-6) left after being struck on his left triceps muscle by Danny Valencia's line drive leading off the seventh, and reliever Mark Lowe was given extra time to warm up. Then the Twins sent 10 batters to the plate, highlighted by Michael Cuddyer's three-run homer to stretch the lead to 6-0.

Harrison wasn't bad himself, allowing five hits and two runs — one earned — while walking three and striking out three through six in-The left-hander has been bothered

by pain from a kidney stone, but he bounced back from a rough start against the Detroit Tigers Tuesday by pitching strong into the seventh.

"He battled. He was throwing the ball really well," first baseman Michael Young said.

Liriano's perfect game ended with one out in the seventh, when the fastfooted Andrus hit a slow bouncer that hugged the line and Hughes, playing third base in the majors for only the fifth time in his career, tried to make a backhanded play.

The ball went under his glove and glanced off his knee toward the Texas dugout, allowing Andrus to take second. Official scorer Gregg Wong, after reviewing replays, ruled the play an error on Hughes.

But Liriano went right back at the Rangers, retiring Josh Hamilton and Michael Young on routine flyballs to finish the inning and keep the no-hitter in tact for the eighth.

"For a minute there, he just went through the lineup," Washington said. "But then he hit a wall, so I sort of wish he would've hit that wall in the first."





wife brutally beat me in front of our 7-year-old daughter. That was the night I decided I had had enough, and packed up and left.

Why is there such silence about women who abuse? And why was I silent? First, I loved her and hoped she would change. Second, I wanted to

stay in the marriage to protect my daughter from my wife. Her anger was often directed at our child, too. Third, I was ashamed of myself for putting up with it. After years and \$55,000

in legal fees, I was finally successful in defending myself against her charges that I was the abuser and got custody of our daughter. As a condition of being

allowed to see our daughter, my ex-wife was ordered by the court to get therapy to deal with her severe emotional disturbance.

I am now in a wonderful, happy relationship with a gentle, mentally healthy woman.

My daughter is much happier and is doing better in every aspect of her life. I deeply regret all the years I wasted hoping my ex-wife would change. Tell your readers that

women can be abusers, too. It's time to break of those sick situations. And please tell us,






