BSISD begins redistricting study

Add Big Spring Independent School District to the list of governmental entities having to redraw their district boundaries.

Discussion about how to re-

draw BSISD's single-member districts dominated most of a four-hour meeting of school trustees Thursday night.

Changes in the school district's demographic makeup, reflected in the 2010 Census, are forcing BSISD officials to

redraw the boundaries of its single-member districts.

In the 10 years since those boundaries were last adjusted, significant changes have occurred, not just in the total number of people living in each district, but in each

area's ethnic breakdown.

Since the 2000 Census, that all-important demographic makeup has changed well beyond federally approved limits, school officials said.

"The Department of Justice allows for a 10 percent devia-

tion (in each district's demographic breakdown) between censuses," said Jeff Brorman, president of the BSISD Board of Trustees. "We have a 28 percent deviation."

Cheshires moving on

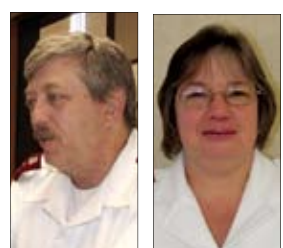

Billie Dunn pleas to false report, receives one year probated term

COLORADO CITY — Billie Dunn, mother of missing Colorado City teen Hailey Dunn, accepted a plea agreement in Mitchell County court this week, receiving one year of probation for making a false report to police.

Dunn entered the guilty plea

in return for the prosecution dropping the other charges stemming from her March 17 arrest, including hindering apprehension and prosecution and posses-

blueprints and plans for three years, Cheshire said the primary goal has been accomplished, the concrete has been poured and construction is under way.

project." Even though Capt. Ed and his wife Capt. Terrie feel their time in Big Spring was short, they feel blessed to have had the opportunity to be here.

"We have enjoyed serving Big Spring and Howard County and feel very blessed by our time here," Capt. Terrie said.

Capt. Ed said, "I have learned in these moves God gives my wife the desires of her heart."

He went on to explain; back in 2007 as the couple was driving

through Big Spring and Terrie looked around and fell in love with Big Spring. "She told me, 'I wouldn't mind being a corps officer here.' Four months after she made that comment the call was received providing that opportunity.

sion of dangerous drugs. Dunn was initially sentenced to 90 days in jail, with jail-time suspended in favor of probation.

Dunn was taken into custody by authorities at her Colorado City home in March while members of the Texas Rangers were attempting to serve a search warrant on the only person of interest in the case — her former live-in boyfriend, Shawn Adkins — when Dunn allegedly lied about his whereabouts.

Hailey Dunn has been the focus of a region-wide search since her mother reported her missing to the Colorado City Police Department Dec. 28.

Billie Dunn won't be serving her time on probation in Mitchell County, however.

Mitchell County Sheriff Patrick Toombs confirmed Dunn has moved to Travis County, in the Austin area. She will serve out her probation there.

Abilene news station KTXS has reported that Dunn's Colorado City residence — the last place Hailey Dunn is believed to have been seen before disappearing — is now padlocked.

According to reports Adkins made to police, the teen was last seen Dec. 27 when she told him she was going to her father's home nearby and then on to spend the night at a friend's home. According to investigators, the teen did neither. Billie Dunn said she last saw her daughter at home the night of Dec. 26, nearly two days before she reported her daughter missing.

Both Adkins and Billie Dunn have denied having any involvement in the girl's disappear-

ance.

Searches of fields and abandoned structures — led mostly by volunteer groups including U.S. Army soldiers from Fort Hood in Killeen — have been conducted in Colorado City, as well as numerous nearby communities, including Abilene, Odessa, Snyder, the Dunn community and Big Spring.

The girl's father, Clint Dunn, has traveled all over the West Texas area, handing out flyers and trying to keep Hailey's disappearance in the public eye.

More than 100 billboards featuring her picture, information about the case and a law enforcement phone number have been set up along interstates in West Texas and other states. Candlelight vigils have been held and posters with Hailey's photo have been set up throughout Colorado City and neighboring

cities, including Big Spring.

Despite the length of time Dunn has been missing — nearly six months now — Colorado City City Manager Pete Kampfer, who has been acting as media liaison since the case began, said investigators are still working hard to bring her home.

Hailey Dunn has light brown hair, green eyes, stands 5 feet and weighs approximately 115 pounds. According to information provided by Hope for Hailey, a non-profit group currently assisting in the search, the girl has a scar on the right side of her forehead and right side of her lip. She was last seen wearing dark blue sweat pants, a light-colored T-shirt and flip-flops.

Anyone with information concerning the girl's whereabouts or circumstances concerning her disappearance is asked to call authorities at 325-728-5294 or 325-728-3161. A reward of \$15,000 is being offered for information in the case.

to the Howard County family of the year."

The Howard County family of the year is the Quail Dobbs family. Quail and his wife Judy moved to Coahoma in 1964 and have been residents of Howard County ever since. His legendary rodeo career even took him into the schools. In 1978 he founded the Coahoma Kindergarten Rodeo, a tradition that continues today.

"The choice was easy when it came to choos-

ing Quail and his family," Raney said. "It's about time to honor this family and this year we are doing so."

The Glasscock County family of the year is the Mack Halfmann family. They first purchased a piece of land with a big white ranch house which was part of the Oliver Daniels Ranch in 1950. At the time, they were still living in Wall, but split their time between their two locations in order to farm. The purchase of the land came at the beginning of a drought and it wasn't

until years later the family was able to install water wells and irrigation. The Halfmann family started their history in Glasscock in 1950 and now operates 45 sections of farm and ranch land.

There is no admission to Saturday's reunion and tours of the museum will be available. The event is open to the community.

King Solomon, chosen by God and by King David to be his successor to the throne of Israel, asked God to give him some extra ordinary qualities of leadership. He prayed, "So give Your servant an understanding heart to judge Your people to discern between good and evil. For who is able to judge this great people of Yours" (1 Kings 3:9 NASB)?

The Scripture records that because of the king's prayer, God gave Solomon more wisdom and discernment than any king before or after him.

Bringing BSISD's district lines back into federally approved harmony will be the task of the district's legal staff and a newly formed Redistricting Advisory Committee. The committee, comprised of

Superintendent Steven Saldivar and several local citizens, is charged with choosing from three possible boundary changes and recommending new district lines to the school board.

The advisory committee will meet at 5:15 p.m. Tuesday in the high school board room. That meeting will be open to the public. In addition, the

board will hold a public hearing some time in July on proposed district changes once a new map is selected.

"We want the public to be involved with every part of this process," Borman said. "There will be plenty of opportunities for the public to have input into this."

If all goes according to plan, BSISD officials will forward

the proposed changed to the Department of Justice for its review and approval in either late August or early September, Borman said.

In other business, trustees:

- Extended Saldivar's contract through the 2012-2013 school year.

- Approved a salary schedule for the coming school year. All salaries will remain

the same as the previous year, said Sandra Waggoner, chief financial officer of the district.

- Approved local and legal policy updates.

- Tabled appointment of a new District 3 trustee until a later time.

- Approved the Howard County Appraisal District budget.

McIlroy shoots eagle at Open

BETHESDA, Md. (AP) — Rory McIlroy holed out from the fairway for eagle on the eighth hole at the U.S. Open to move to 10-under par, building a six-shot lead at the midway point of Friday's second round.

McIlroy's short approach hit the back of the green and bounced twice, then spun backward about 20 feet and dropped into the cup. He thrust both hands in the air and Phil Mickelson, playing in his threesome, applauded.

McIlroy is in record-setting territory. No player has ever been better than 9 under through two rounds of the U.S. Open and nobody has led by more than six at the halfway point.

He is six ahead of Zach Johnson, who eagled No. 6 and was 3-under par through 10, and seven in front of Robert Garrigus, who was 2 under for the day, and Y.E. Yang, who tees off in the afternoon.

McIlroy shot 6-under 65 to open

the tournament Thursday. His three-shot lead after the first day was the biggest opening-round cushion at the U.S. Open in 35 years.

Conditions couldn't get much better for a U.S. Open, at least in the morning, even though McIlroy was among the few taking advantage. Soft greens and forgiving rough took some of the bite out of Congressional, a monster course at more than 7,500 yards. McIlroy's first tee shot went slightly left into that rough but he had no problem wedging it out and onto the front of the green.

Counting Thursday's round, he has now hit 25 of 27 greens in regulation for the tournament and still hasn't made a bogey.

"It doesn't feel like a typical U.S. Open, for some reason," McIlroy said after Thursday's play. "The golf course is going to get harder and it's going to

Last year, the pair played the longest match in tennis history, with Isner winning 6-4, 3-6, 6-7 (7), 7-6 (3), 70-68 in a first-round match at the All England Club that lasted 11 hours, 5 minutes stretched over three days. A gasp followed the announcement at Friday's draw, followed by laughter.

"It's going to be pretty nuts," Isner said Friday.

"I couldn't believe it. I joked with him earlier in the week, last week, and said, 'Watch us play each other.' And he said, 'No, there's no way. That's not even funny.'"

The two players have become good friends since their historic encounter a year ago. They were to practice together Saturday but canceled those plans once they learned the rematch was on.

"We might do dinner (afterward)," Isner said. "We're really good friends now, but obviously we both want to

win. But we're going to enjoy it and laugh at it at the same time."

The matchup was the talk of Twitter as soon as it was announced.

"Isner vs mahut drawing each other in the first round after last year is the most amazing thing I've seen in tennis! Centre court anyone?!" fourth-seeded Andy Murray said.

Former U.S. Davis Cup captain Patrick McEnroe borrowed his brother John's famous catchphrase as he posted: "you cannot be serious!!!"

The match last year

was played on Court 18, and a plaque this year commemorates the epic contest. Isner said he didn't mind which court they played on.

"I don't care what they do," Isner said. "It's going to be crazy, they might put us on a bigger court, (or) put us back on that court (18)."

This year's match is to take place — or begin at least — on Tuesday. Their first-round match was held over twice because of darkness last year. With rain forecast for the opening week of Wimbledon, there is a chance they could be de-

played again.

Defending champion Rafael Nadal was drawn in the opposite half from six-time champion Roger Federer, meaning there is a chance of a fourth Wimbledon final between the two.

The top-seeded Nadal will start against Michael Russell of the United States in the opening match on Centre Court on Monday.

Nadal could come up against the big-serving Milos Raonic in the third round and then 2009 U.S. Open champion Juan Martin del Potro in the last 16. If the

seedings hold, Nadal's quarterfinal could be a rematch of last year's final against Tomas Berdych.

Federer has second-seeded Novak Djokovic as his projected semifinal opponent. The third-seeded Swiss will face Mikhail Kukushkin of Kazakhstan in the first round, and could encounter former finalist David Nalbandian in the third round.

Djokovic meets Jeremy Chardy of France in the first round.

Of the top four,

firmer and it's going to get trickier, but I still feel that it's very playable and fair. If you don't hit a fairway, you've still got a chance to hit it on the green and give yourself a chance for birdie."

British Open champion Louis Oosthuizen and American Ryan Palmer were in the large group at 2 under, hoping they could make up some ground in the afternoon, when they tee off.

McIlroy, who blew a four-shot lead in the final round of the Masters two months ago, knows how much work there is to do to close out one of these tournaments. The big question is whether anyone will be anywhere near him come Sunday.

"It's always nice to shoot a good first round at any tournament, let alone a major," he said. "But no relief. I know I'm playing well. I know this golf course."

Playing on his 41st birthday Thursday, Mickelson was wild from start to finish. Looking to improve on a 3-over 74 that could have been much worse, Mickelson made three birdies over his first nine holes Friday. But that still meant losing ground to McIlroy, whose 65 followed a first-round 65 at the Masters this year and a 63 at last year's opening round of the British Open, tying the major single-round scoring record.

Murray has possibly the most difficult route to the final. Before a possible semifinal against Nadal, he could face Marin Cilic in the third round, Richard Gasquet in the last 16 and three-time finalist Andy Roddick in the quarterfinals.

Murray will meet Daniel Gimeno-Traver of Spain in the first round.

In the women's draw, seventh-seeded Serena Williams

and big sister Venus Williams are in opposite halves, setting up the possibility for a fifth sibling final at the All England Club.

The sisters have won nine of the past 11 Wimbledon finals. Serena, who has won four, is 3-1 against five-time champion Venus in the final.

Serena has played only two matches since winning the title last year after complications from a foot injury led to blood clots on her lungs. She returned in Eastbourne this week, losing a three-set match to Vera Zvonareva.

Zvonareva could meet Venus, who is seeded 22nd, in the fourth round at Wimbledon. Venus opens against Akgul Amanmuradova of Uzbekistan while Serena takes on Aravane Rezaï of France. Zvonareva plays Alison Riske of the U.S.

As the defending champion, Serena's first-round match Tuesday will open play on Centre Court.

Top-seeded Caroline Wozniacki, the No. 1-ranked player looking for her first Grand Slam title, meets Arantxa Parra Santonja of Spain in

the first round. She could meet Serena in the semifinals.

French Open champion Li Na has a potentially tough second-round match. If she gets past Alla Kudryavtseva of Russia in the first round, she could face Sabine Lisicki. Lisicki won the Birmingham title on grass last week and was awarded a wild card at Wimbledon after a long injury layoff.

Maria Sharapova, the 2004 Wimbledon champion, will face Anna Chakvetadze of Russia in the opening round.

This Date In History

Today is Friday, June 17, the 168th day of 2011. There are 197 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On June 17, 1775, the Revolutionary War Battle of Bunker Hill took place near Boston. The battle (actually on Breed's Hill) proved a costly victory for the British, who suffered heavy losses.

On this date:

In 1885, the Statue of Liberty arrived in New York Harbor aboard the French ship Iser (e-SEHR).

In 1930, President Herbert Hoover signed the Smoot-Hawley Tariff Act, which boosted U.S. tariffs to historically high levels, prompting foreign retaliation.

In 1940, France asked Germany for terms of surrender in World War II.

In 1944, the republic of Iceland was established.

In 1957, mob underboss Frank Scalice was shot to death

at a produce market in the Bronx, N.Y.

In 1961, Soviet ballet dancer Rudolf Nureyev defected to the West while his troupe was in Paris.

In 1971, the United States and Japan signed a treaty under which Okinawa would revert from American to Japanese control the following year, with the U.S. allowed to maintain military bases there. President Richard M. Nixon declared a "war" against drug abuse in America in a message to Congress.

In 1972, President Richard M. Nixon's eventual downfall began with the arrest of five burglars inside Democratic national headquarters in Washington, D.C.'s Watergate complex.

In 1986, President Ronald Reagan announced the retirement of Chief Justice Warren Burger, who was succeeded by William Rehnquist. Singer Kate Smith died in Raleigh, N.C., at age 79.

In 1991, the remains of President Zachary Taylor were briefly exhumed in Louisville, Ky., to test a theory that Taylor had died of arsenic poisoning (results showed death was from natural causes).
