

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Atmos rate plan draws city's ire

Council likely to deny utility's increase request

The city of Big Spring is expected to tell Atmos Energy to head back to the drawing board when it comes to rate increases, as the multi-city steering committee involved in the most recent rate reviews will issue a full denial to the natural gas company.

The Big Spring City Council will consider first reading of a resolution denying Atmos Energy Corporation Texas Division's fourth annual rate review mechanism filing; permitting the company to establish a regulatory asset for new depreciation rates which may

be considered in a systemwide rate filing; requiring the company to reimburse cities' reasonable ratemaking expenses; adopting saving clause; determining that this resolution was passed in accordance with the requirements of the Texas Open Meetings Act; declaring an effective date;

and requiring delivery of the resolution to the company and the steering committee's legal counsel.

According to Peggy Walker, finance director for the city of

Big Spring, the full denial will force Atmos to reconsider the rate increases it is asking for and make a new presentation during its annual systemwide rate review.

"Full denials don't happen

often, but there are at least two cities served by Atmos that are getting much lower rates than we are," Walker said. "That's simply not fair business."

Walker said the next round between negotiations

Atmos Energy and the cities it serves isn't likely to be as productive for the steering committee or the cities it

serves. "A new asset depreciation class will certainly give them more leverage going into the full, system-wide rate review," Walker said. "We will basically have to start the process all over again, but the likelihood of getting out with a full denial again is very, very low."

Tuesday's meeting expected to get under way at 5:30 p.m. in the City Council Chambers, located at 307 E. Fourth St. Fore more information call 264-2401.

San Antonio man accused of newborn son's death

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — Authorities say a San Antonio man has been charged in connection with the death of his 2-week-old son who allegedly had been beaten.

The Bexar (bayr) County Sheriff's Office says 22-year-old Justin Janosik was jailed Monday on a charge of injury to a child, causing serious bodily injury.

Bond is \$100,000 for Janosik, who was arrested Sunday, hours after his son, Kaleb, was found unresponsive in the family's home. Autopsy results are pending, but a police report says the boy had bruises on his face and his back.

An affidavit says Janosik often cared for the baby while his wife was looking for work.

Jail records did not list an attorney for Janosik.

kitchen area.

Of course, the building itself has been a fixture in the Big Spring community since it was constructed in 1916. According to Kami, there have been numerous residents who attended school at Runnels who have expressed the desire to contribute to the renovations and shared their appreciation for the efforts of preservation.

"We understand there are many people in the community who have a special place in their hearts for this building and want to be a part of its history preservation," Kami said.

All renovations to this point have been accomplished through donations and other church efforts, but in the near future, the Collins' plan on kicking off the Legacy Campaign, designed to collect funds in order to help with phase three of the renovation process.

"The building already holds a piece of history in education and that is something we want to see continue," Collins

An upcoming phase of renovation will include the creation of a private school — grades kindergarden through 12th grade — and a Bible school or college on the top floor of the main building.

Phase three will include transforming the girls' gym into a family life center, an area the community can utilize. Plans include creating an area that can be used for birthday parties, reunions, gatherings and a place for kids to have

"We are located in the heart of city and right in the middle of the community we are trying to reach," Pastor Collins said. "We are wanting to create a place not only preserving the history of this building, but a place the entire community can enjoy."

Part of the family life center will be the inclusion of an indoor play system measuring 60 feet by 40 feet, standing seven tiers high. The system was purchased from Kenneth Copeland Ministries. The expected time frame for the next step in renovations is from six months to a year, depending on finances.

"There are lots of people personally invested in this building who want to help keep it alive and we are hoping through the Legacy Campaign we will be able to provide an opportunity for them to do that," Kami said. "Through these renovations and creation of the school, we are providing the chance to build the legacy of the school for education."

To further protect the history within the building, there will be a room designated to the display of memorabilia from the old Runnel's school. The room will be set up as a museum and will include items such as old chalkboards that were never erased from the final days of the school — desks and chairs, photographs and other items that were donated or left behind.

"This building will never fully belong to our church in our eyes ... it will always belong to the community," Pastor Collins and his wife

said. "We are trying to do things in the renovation process that will benefit the community and that is why with each step we have the community in mind."

The biggest expense has been in bringing the building up to code. Church officials plan to provide increased handicap accessibility to all levels of the facility. A grand foyer will be

constructed between the two front buildings and serve as a central hub. Elevators to the upper floors will be located within the foyer, as well as handicap accessible bathrooms.

Boehner preparing debt limit, spending cut package

WASHINGTON Bickering in public yet bargaining in private, congressional leaders are struggling for a compromise debt limit deal that avoids a market-rattling default in little over a week while cutting trillions in spending. House Speaker John

R-Ohio, Boehner, planned to meet with his chamber's Republicans on Monday to discuss the GOP's clash with President Barack Obama over extending the government's borrowing authority, which lapses on Aug. 2 — a week from Tuesday.

There were widespread expectations on Capitol Hill that Boehner would unveil debt ceiling legislation by that session, if not earlier.

After meeting at the White House on Sunday with Obama and House Democratic Leader Nancy Pelosi, D-Calif., Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid said bipartisan talks on a solution had collapsed because Republicans were insisting on only extending the debt limit for a short period. He said he was crafting a \$2.7 trillion package of spending cuts that would also push the government's borrowing authority through next year, a timeline that Obama and top Democrats are demanding.

Reid, D-Nev., called Boehner's forthcoming proposal "a nonstarter in the Senate and with the president." In a written statement, he said that it "would not provide the certainty the markets are looking for and risks many of the same dire economic consequences that would be triggered by default itself.'

As yet another day passed with the two parties unable to shake hands, the drama seemed certain to play out in nail-biting fashion. If the government's authority to borrow money isn't renewed by Aug. 2 — its current \$14.3 trillion limit has been reached — it won't have cash to pay all its bills. The administration and many others say that scenario would risk a first-ever federal default, with higher interest rates and other devastating effects cascading through the entire economy.

Norway gunman wants to appear in court in uniform

OSLO, Norway (AP) — The man who confessed to the twin attacks that killed 93 people in Norway will be arraigned in court Monday and has requested an open hearing for his first appearance so that he can explain his massacre to the public.

But prosecutors have asked that the court be closed to the public and media. It's clear from a manifesto Anders Behring Breivik published online to describe the planning and motivation of the attacks that he's looking for a platform for his belief that Europe must be saved from Muslim colonization; he has said that the killings themselves were "marketing" for the manifesto.

His lawyer Geir Lippestad told Norwegian broadcaster NRK that Breivik has requested to appear in a uniform during the hearing, but didn't know what kind.

Breivik describes how he would turn the court appearance into theater.

Prosecutors have asked that the 32-yearold suspect be held for eight weeks, said Oslo District Court spokeswoman Irene Ramm.

By speaking out, Strauss-Kahn accuser treads unusual path

NEW YORK (AP) The hotel housekeeper accusing Dominique Strauss-Kahn of sexually assaulting her is telling her story publicly, she says, because she wants him behind bars. But it's hard to say whether her striking move will help or hobble her goal.

Diallo's Nafissatou decision to speak out in media interviews is an unusual and risky move for an accuser at this point in a criminal case, legal experts said.

It gives her an empowering chance to tell her side of the story as prosecutors weigh whether to press ahead with the case amid concerns they have raised about her credibility. But it also enshrines a version of events that defense lawyers could mine for discrepancies with her grand jury testimony or use as fodder for arguing that she was seeking money or public atten-

Unprecedented wave of drug patents ending

(AP) — The cost of prescription medicines used by millions of people every day is about to plummet.

The next 14 months will bring generic versions of seven of the world's 20 best-selling drugs, including the top two: cholesterol fighter Lipitor and blood thinner Plavix.

The magnitude this wave of expiring drugs patents is unprecedented. Between now and 2016, blockbusters with about \$255 billion in global annual sales are set to go off patent, notes EvaluatePharma Ltd., a London research firm. Generic competition will decimate sales of the brand-name drugs and slash the cost to patients and companies that provide health benefits.

Pelosi issued a statement Sunday night calling on the Republicanled House's "Ethics Committee to initiate an investigation into the allegations against Congressman Wu."

Wu and Pelosi had a telephone conversation Saturday but neither politician has disclosed any details.

Despite calls for his resignation, Wu kept publically silent Sunday. But The Oregonian posted a Washingtondated story on its website late Sunday with a senior Democrat official, who wasn't further identified, confirming to the paper that Wu said he would not resign but would complete his term and retire in 2012.

Couples wed on 1st day same-sex marriages legal

NEW YORK (AP) -From Niagara Falls to Long Island, hundreds of gay couples were married Sunday in joyous, long-awaited ceremonies as New York became the sixth and largest state to recognize same-sex marriage.

Dressed in formal suits and striped trousers, traditional white gowns and T-shirts, the couples began saying "I do" at midnight to the cheers and applause of family, friends and supporters.

"To us, we always felt married. But we didn't have equality," said Cindy Golden, just moments after saying her vows at the Manhattan city clerk's office and formally taking the name of her partner.

Rangers shut out by Blue Jays

ARLINGTON (AP) — Brett Cecil pitched a four-hitter for his second complete game in his last four starts as Toronto beat the Texas Rangers 3-0 on Sunday night.

It was the first career shutout for Cecil (3-4), whose only other complete game in his 55 games was in a loss July 5 at Boston. The left-hander allowed only four singles to the AL West-leading Rangers, who had only one runner reach second base.

Jose Bautista had an RBI double and a diving catch in an unusual spot to back up Cecil, who struck out seven and walked two.

Bautista's hit sent home Yunel Escobar, who led off the sixth with his third hit. Edwin Encarnacion and Travis Snider had consecutive RBI doubles later in the inning off All-Star righthander Alexi Ogando (10-4).

Until Nelson Cruz reached with a two-out infield hit in the ninth on a slow roller toward third base, the other Rangers singles had been leading off innings. They still were never able to put together a run-scoring frame against Cecil.

The AL West-leading Rangers lost for only the third time in 17 games overall, and had their nine-game home winning streak ended.

It was the fifth time this season the Rangers were shut out, but the first by an individual pitcher.

In the field, the Blue Jays used a drastic shift against some of the Texas left-handers that had third baseman Bautista playing short right field — much like the rover in a softball game. Bautista started the bottom of the sixth with a diving catch of Mitch Moreland's sinking

The only Texas runner to get to second base was Craig Gentry, who singled twice a bunt single in third and another hit in the eighth. He got to second in the eighth after tagging up on a long flyball by Moreland.

Gentry was briefly stunned when his helmet came off and he slid headfirst into the back side of second baseman Aaron Hill's leg. Gentry stayed down on the ground briefly and was checked out by a trainer. He stayed in the game.

Ogando had won his previous three starts this month following a three-game losing streak. He struck out six and walked two in 6 2-3 innings.

Each of Toronto's first four innings ended with Ogando striking out a batter, the same way the fifth inning

started. After Escobar and Eric Thames had consecutive two-out singles in the third. Ogando got out of that jam when he threw a 96 mph fastball past Bautista.

Bautista didn't miss in the sixth, and got the Blue Javs going in their decisive out-

Toronto had also scored three runs in the sixth inning Saturday night to take a 4-3 lead in that game, but Texas won with two runs in a ninth-inning rally that included three sacrifice bunts one a suicide squeeze before Michael Young's game-ending hit.

"Now we have a great, full head of steam marching to Sonoma with a win here," added Massey, referring to the NHRA Nationals in Sonoma, Calif., next weekend.

Force, shaking off a qualifying run Saturday in which the body of his Ford Mustang was blown off the chassis and flipped in the air, finished the 1,000-foot course in 4.361 seconds and at a speed of 285.23 mph. 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
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
