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Sexual charge leads to lockup

A Big Spring teen was arrested and charged with indecency with a child – sexual contact Saturday evening after law enforce-



ment officers discovered a female victim under the age of 17 at his home, according to arrest records. Andres Reyes

was arrested Saturday night by the Howard County Sheriff's Office on a charge of indecency with a child – sexual contact after law enforcement officers discovered Perches "in contact" with the female at his home.

According to Sheriff Stan Parker, Perches was taken into custody at the scene and shortly after booked into the Howard County Jail.

"The Sheriff's Office received a call from the north part of the county," Parker said. "We found him (Perches) in contact with the victim a female under the age of 17 years — at a location that was later determined to be Perches' home.

"Perches was taken into custody and booked into the Howard County jail on a charge of indecency with a child - sexual contact, and the victim was turned over to her parents."

Parker said a runaway report had not been filed on the female victim and declined to comment further on the relationship between the girl and

Perches was still in the custody of the Howard County Jail this morning with bond having been set at \$7,500, according to jail officials.

Alon trial continues in 118th District Court

Lawsuit alleges company was negligent

The defense is expected to pick up where it left off Friday when the legal battle between oil giant Alon USA owner of the Big Spring Refinery — and local residents claiming damages caused by the Feb. 18, 2008, explosion once again gets under way Monday morning.

According to court officials, the plaintiffs in the case — which represents more than 150 local residents, including David and Janet Higgins, the two plaintiffs being represented in this leg of the legal behalf of more than 150 action — rested Thursday afternoon, with the Pinkerton Law Firm, defense beginning its based out of Webster, presentations shortly after.

The lawsuit alleges the explosion, which shook Big Spring and destroyed much of the refinery, was caused by negligence on the part of Alon USA and its subsidiaries.

"The defendants (Alon USA and several subsidiaries) acted with malice and such conduct was the proximate cause of plaintiff's injuries," reads the lawsuit, submitted on

Crossroads residents by Texas.

The explosion ripped through the refinery during the early morning hours with at least one Big Spring business shut down due to structural concerns caused by the blast. Several others were reported to have suffered damages, including blown-out windows and doors.

According to witness accounts, the cause of the February explosion

Attorney's trial moved to Big Spring

Winkler County Attorney Scott Tidwell charged with two counts each of retaliation and misuse of official information in connection with a recent

whistleblower case involving a pair of nurses — will go to trial Sept. 26 in Howard County's 118th District Court. The change of venue was

granted by retired 118th District Judge Robert H. Moore III, who presided over the motion Thursday. However, neither the prosecution, headed up by Texas Assistant Attorney General

David Glickler, or Odessa defense attorney David Zavoda got the venue they were

In previous pre-trial motions, Zavoda had pressed the court to hold the trial in Winkler County.

"Mr. Tidwell has a right to be charged by a jury of his peers," he said, according to an article published by the Odessa American. "If the state is concerned that Mr. Tidwell cannot get a fair trial in Winkler County, we relieve them of that burden."

Glickler had pushed to have the trial

WASHINGTON — A crisis-conquering deficit-reduction agreement struck by the White House and congressional leaders after months of partisan rancor picked up momentum in the Senate Monday, as a member of the Republican leadership predicted at least 30 GOP

"Maybe 35 will support it in the end. There will be some who will pull back," Sen. Mike Crapo, the deputy Republican whip, told reporters, as climactic votes approached in both the House and Senate on the long-sought spending plan.

moved to Midland, saying Odessa would serve to separate Winkler County and provide enough insulation from media coverage and knowledge of the case, which has gained statewide coverage. Neither attorney had suggested Howard County as a site for the trial.

According to indictments filed against Tidwell — along with former Winkler County Sheriff Robert Roberts and Dr. Rolando Arafiles — the trio were charged in connection with the whistle-blowing scandal of two Winkler County Hospital nurses who reported "questionable practices" by Arafiles to the Texas Medical Board.

Mitchell Anne and Vicki Galle were both charged with misuse of official information.

Mitchell was later acquitted in a trial prosecuted by Tidwell in Andrews County, where the proceedings were moved in an effort to avoid publicity. Shortly after Mitchell's acquittal, charges against Galle were dropped.

Since Mitchell's acquittal, Arafiles has been accused of aggravated perjury for testimony he gave during the trial. An Andrews County grand jury indicted Arafiles on June 30 on a single count, alleging Arafiles lied while under oath when he denied knowing how Winkler County Sheriff Robert Roberts, a friend, obtained names contact information of patients for questioning about who complained about the physician.

Roberts was the first of the trio to go to trial and was convicted of misuse of official information and retaliation, both third-degree felonies,

and official oppression, a Class A misdemeanor. After waiving jury punishment — part of a deal between the prosecution and defense — Roberts was given four years probation for each of the felony charges and 100 days in county jail for the misdemeanor offenses, all of which will be served concurrently.

The sentencing plea deal for Roberts "was not contingent" on him testifying in the trials of Arafiles and Tidwell, according to defense attorney Woody Leverett, but he would not elaborate on whether the former sheriff will testify in those trials. Former hospital ad-

ministrator Stan Wiley pleaded guilty in March toamisdemeanorcharge of abuse of official capacity in exchange for his testimony. **Investigators** allege

Arafiles approached his close friend, Roberts, who was also a patient,

after the Texas Medical Board contacted the doctor about the complaint. Arafiles asked his friend to help him find out who filed the complaint and Roberts used his authority to get a copy, investigators said. Arafiles and other of-

ficials were then able to determine the identities of those who filed the complaint — names that would have been protected from disclosure if law enforcement officials had not misused their position to obtain confidential information, the Texas attorney general's office said.

Among the nurses' complaints in their unsigned April 2009 letter to the medical board were that Arafiles imencouraged properly patients to buy herbal medicines from him and had wanted to use hospital supplies to perform a procedure at a patient's

Newman unrattled by Dallas' attempt to sign Asomugha

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — Had from Pro Bowler in 2009 to up for the slight of the Aso-Jerry Jones gotten his wish, Terence Newman almost certainly would not be getting ready for his ninth season with the Dallas Cowboys.

It's not that Jones specifically wanted to get rid of Newman. It's just that the top cornerback in the NFL, Nnamdi Asomugha, was a free agent and Jones wanted to sign him. Badly.

And if Jones had succeeded, Newman would've been the obvious choice to be dumped to make room for Asomugha in the starting lineup and under the salary cap.

Jones didn't get his prize, though. So Dallas is sticking with Newman.

Uh, no hard feelings, right Terence?

"It's a business, you know?" Newman said Sunday in his first interview since Asomugha jilted the Cowboys for the division rival Eagles. "I'm here, he's in Philly. That's what I'm focused on right now, moving forward."

It sure beats looking back.

Like everyone else on the Dallas defense, Newman struggled last season. He and Mike Jenkins each went among the most-burned cornerbacks in the NFL, according to STATS, Inc.

Newman gave up 58 receptions for 871 yards and three touchdowns. Only five cornerbacks allowed more yards, nine more catches. Jenkins was among those giving up more yards, 935, the secondmost in the league.

Because teams were successful throwing against either cornerback, quarterbacks felt comfortable throwing to anywhere on the field. That doesn't happen in a secondary manned by Asomugha. He was so feared that only 33 passes came his way all season; only 13 were caught. So it's easy to see why

Jones coveted Asomugha. Newman likely would've been the odd man out because he turns 31 a week before the opener and counts \$10 million against the salary cap this season. He was considered a possible cut long before the courting of Asomugha simply because of the \$8 million in cap room the Cowboys could've created by dropping him. Perhaps the fact they didn't helps make mugha negotiations.

The Cowboys also are trying to make Newman feel wanted with their words.

Secondary coach Dave Campo said Saturday that the front office never should've tried to sign Asomugha and new defensive coordinator Rob Ryan tried to downplay how seriously the Cowboys negotiated. Jones added that Newman knows "you can't have enough corners, enough outstanding corners." Coach Jason Garrett joined the chorus on Sunday, calling Newman "a very talented guy."

"He doesn't seem to me that he's a guy who is slowing down at all," Garrett said. "He still runs well, he's very quick, he has good awareness in the game and he will continue to grow."

His job safe for the time being, Newman knows the best way to keep it that way is by cutting down the number of receptions he allows.

"We didn't play very well in the secondary last year, and the No. 1 focus we have right now is to try to get better as a team, as a secondary, as



Bourgeois has two career home runs. Both were hit at Miller Park. His other was as a member of the Brewers on Aug. 29, 2009.

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
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
