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Explosion at refinery injures one

An Alon USA employee suffered minor burns late Friday night after a gas compressor exploded, according to officials at the Big Spring Refinery. Vice President of

Refining Jim Crosby told local media outlets during the weekend the fire started at the refinery's hydrocracking unit at approximately 11:50 p.m. Friday.

Crosby said the fire took approximately 40 minutes to extinguish. employee burned in the altercation and received first-aid

treatment on the scene. The employee was not transported to a hospital, however.

A report filed by Alon with state regulators on Saturday said a gas compressor caught fire and flared during the incident, adding emergency workers brought the situation under control and stopped the flaring.

According to Howard Volunteer County Fire Department Chief Tommy Sullivan, he and his crew were called to the refinery shortly after the explosion. However, after waiting a short period in the facility's

parking lot, refinery officials said they had the fire under control or extinguished.

The explosion caused a loud boom which was heard throughout the eastern part of the county, according to local residents.

The damage caused by the explosion is unknown at this time. Officials at the Big Spring Refinery couldn't be reached at the time of this report.

Atmos rate hike faces final denial

The Big Spring City Council will meet Tuesday evening — prior to continued budget work sessions — to discuss a number of issues, including

final reading of a denial of a proposed rate increase from Atmos Energy's West Texas Division.

The Council voted unanimously July 26 to deny the proposed rate increase from natural gas provider Atmos

is the rate hike unwarranted, a rate decrease is in order.

"On April 1 they filed with the city for an annual increase of \$2.9 million. This is their fourth filing under this particular type of rate review mechanism," City Finance Director Peggy Walker told the council recently. "It does give the city some leeway in negotiating, so we hired someone and they went in and reviewed all of the operating expenses, as well as the revenue classes Atmos currently has. Based on the consultant's recommendation, she said they are actually overearning at this point and should have

Texas drought will harm wildlife habitat for years

CANADIAN, Texas (AP) — In a muddy pile of sand where a pond once flowed in the Texas Panhandle, dead fish, their flesh already decayed and feasted on by maggots, lie with their mouths open. Nearby, deer munch on the equivalent of vegetative junk food and wild turkeys nibble on red harvester ants certainly not their first

choice for lunch.

with the worst one-year drought in its history, entire ecosystems, from the smallest insects to the largest predators, are struggling for survival. The foundations their habitats — rivers, springs, creeks, streams and lakes — have turned into dry sand, wet mud, trickling springs or, in the best case, large puddles.

As the state struggles

"It has a compound effect on a multitude of species and organisms and habitat types because of the way that it's chained and linked together," said Jeff Bonner, a wildlife biologist with the Texas Wildlife Parks and

Department. Since January, Texas has only gotten about 6 inches of rain, compared to a norm of about 13 inches, making it the most severe one-year

drought on record. Last week, the U.S. Climate Prediction Center said the La Nina weather pattern blamed for the lack of rain might be back soon, and if that happens, the dry spell would almost certainly

extend into 2012.

extreme The conditions, which have extended into parts of the Plains including Oklahoma and Kansas, have been made worse by week after week of tripledigit temperatures that have caused reservoirs to evaporate, crops to wither and animals and fish to die.

Already, some rivers and lakes are at lows not seen since the 1950s the decade when Texas suffered its worst drought in recorded history. And in some cases, bodies of water are at their lowest

points ever, said Joseph

The long-term impact from the drought will cross state lines and country borders because Texas is so large and its

ecosystems diverse. For example, birds that migrate south in the winter will find little food and water this year in Texas so they will have to fly even farther south and expend more energy. As a result, they could reproduce less. Some of those birds, such as the colorful painted bunting, often fly to Central America for part of the year

"Continentally said. speaking, this big of an area not getting enough water can impact places far and wide."

The impact on species also could last for years after the drought officially ends. For example, quail normally nest in grass grown a year earlier, but because of the drought, there has been almost no grass growth this year. That means many quail won't be able to nest next year and the impact of the drought on the birds won't be seen until 2012, Bonner said.

With deer, the true

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impact be revealed for years when the low reproduction caused by the drought will leave an age gap between older bucks and younger deer.

Prairie chickens will also reproduce less due to the drought something that could spell more trouble for the species. In the past decade, the chickens' numbers have dropped significantly that the federal government may place them on an endangered species list, a move that would make it illegal to hunt and force conservation of prairie chicken habitats.

John Baccus, a wildlife biologist at Texas State University in Marcos, said he is most immediately concerned with bats and song birds, both of which rely on insects for food. Baccus believes that some females will not have any offspring this year due to a poor diet. Whatever babies are born will likely have a low survival

rate because they are entering a world with a scarce food supply. Already, Baccus said,

he has noticed whitetailed deer looking skinnier than usual, their ribs jutting out. As a result, the mothers are producing less milk and the newest crop of fawns will be weaned at sub-par weight.

"It's an ecosystemwide problem," Baccus said.

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For Star Wars fans, Yoda statue a mecca

FRANCISCO Within sight of the Golden Gate Bridge lies another landmark cherished by a small but fervent group of travelers: a full-size replica of Yoda, George Lucas' master of the Force.

Since the statue of the Jedi sage went up amid Presidio's landscaped lawns in 2005. Star Wars fans have made a pilgrimage to take pictures with their beloved character and take in Lucasfilm Ltd.'s sleek headquarters.

Given the franchise's huge impact not only on pop culture but on the tourism industry, the diminutive Yoda fountain is just one of dozens of location shoots and special sites visited by Star Wars acolytes.

Other sites include Luke Skywalker's desert home in Tunisia, Guatemalan pyramids and a Tuscan lakefront villa.

For the Van Zweiten family of Oploo, Netherlands, a stop to see the pointy-eared master

"The Dutch guidebook said 'Love it, you will,' and we decided we had to come," said Tom Van Zwieten, a tax attorney who has also visited another shoot site in Tenerife, and who brought up his children watching the trilogies.

In"The Empire Strikes Yoda Back," builds Luke's confidence to harness the Force, an energy field that Jedis use to perform supernatural feats. "You must unlearn what you have learned," he tells Luke. "Luminous beings are we, not this crude matter. You must feel the Force around you.'

Some visitors to this corner of the park, flanked by towering palms and eucalyptus groves, hope to absorb such lessons through sheer proximity to the statue, poised atop a rushing fountain.

"Yoda is the source of wisdom and gravitas for the whole trilogy," said fan Dale Tolosa, 37, an underemployed actor who often dresses as a Star Wars biker scout with his chapter of the 501st Legion, an international, all-volunteer costuming group. "It's almost like he's a religious symbol or the Statue of Liberty, or a representation of all the positive fantasy that George Lucas has brought to the world since 1977."

Tolosa and his older brother, Matt, who dons the tunic of Luke's father Anakin Skywalker, also have visited numerous other location shoots, and are planning a trip to Death Valley, where R2D2 cruised the sand dunes.

Gus Lopez, a Star Wars collector in Seattle who runs an online memorabilia museum, has already been there, as well as to the Yoda fountain and to nearly every major Star Wars location shoot the world over, including sites in Norway and the Arizona desert.

Lopez's favorite? A redwood grove near Crescent City, Calif. where Lucas filmed the speeder bike chase scenes for "Return of the Jedi".

"It took friends and I a year to research and find the location because the forest that got logged looks so different today," said Lopez. "For all of these sites, it's about how you connect with the movies and how you actually feel like you're closer to it by being in a place that was involved in making them."

Some passionate fans choose to get directly involved at the locations they visit.

Belgian fan Mark Dermul has been raising money to visit the Tunisian salt lake Chott El-Jerid, which Lucas transformed into the desert planet of Tatooine.

So far, nearly 400 donors have contributed 10,994 to repair the weather-worn plaster, wood and chicken wire holding together the iconic "Lars Homestead" where Luke Skywalker was raised and fans plan to do the restorations next summer, Dermul said.

Along with an entrée into the fantasy world, other filming sites offer tourists special services and accommodations, officials say.

On the sweeping

Villa del grounds of Balbianello, visitors can get married in the setting overlooking Italy's Lake Como where Queen Padme Amidala married Anakin in "Star Wars II: Attack of the Clones".

The epic film series has spawned a franchise including collectables, books, television series, video games, and comic books that Forbes magazine estimated in 2007 had earned more than \$22 billion.

Lucasfilm is among several businesses and nonprofits that have relocated to the Presidio, the one-time military base turned national park overlooking the bay and the Pacific. Run-of-the-mill fans, however, aren't invited past the plush company lobby without invitation.

"The Yoda fountain is the public face of Lu-

casfilm, the one picturetaking opportunity that they have with something from Star Wars," says Steve Sansweet, a fan relations advisor to Lucasfilm who houses a trove of collectables on his land in Northern California, dubbed Rancho Obi-Wan.

Jay Shephard, a manager at an online testing company in Baltimore, went a step further, calling the fountain a mecca for fans.

"Yoda's like what I would like to aspire to be in the way that I live my life and the way I raise my kids," said Shephard, who founded a fan site called Theforce.net. "Here's this little guy who's really unassuming, and you think 'how could this little creature be a warrior'? But the messages he shares with Luke in the movie really resonate with all

West's jack of spades dislodged the ace, and declarer led a second trump. West rose with the ace and cashed the ten of spades to set the contract. At the second table, with Norway

South's queen losing to the king

North-South, the contract and opening lead were exactly the same. But at this table South played the hand more carefully and was wellrewarded for his effort.

He also won the club lead with the ace and played a trump, but when East took the king and returned the nine of spades. South did not finesse. Instead, he went up with the ace and led a second round of trumps.

West took the ace but was helpless. He couldn't cash the king of spades because that would make South's queen a trick, while if he played any other suit, South would draw West's last trump and then discard a spade on dummy's fourth diamond. Either way, declarer would finish with 10 tricks

The declarer at the second table was clearly on firmer ground than his counterpart when he spurned the spade finesse. If West had the king, it was surely wrong to finesse, while if East had the king, the opponents could never score more than one spade trick whether South finessed or not

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With right tune, music desk reveals its secrets

DENVER — Denver woodworker Kagen Schaefer drew mazes as a kindergartner to stump his dad. He was building 3-D puzzles out of cardboard by the time he was 11.

This summer, commissioned by a New York film director, the 33-year-old former Colorado College math maior is finishing a one-ofa-kind musical wooden desk. Its secrets can be unlocked only by those who can solve its puz-

The desk, crafted from ebony, Bastogne walnut and pink ivory, has eight square drawers that act like bellows on a pipe organ. When a drawer is pushed in, it emits a tone. Play the right tune of 12 notes, and a secret

drawer is unlocked. Clues to the correct tune are held in a musical score that's hidden in pieces within the desk. The journey begins with a concealed button for a secret panel.

That opens to reveal a puzzle of sliding tiles which, when arranged in the right pattern, allow another drawer to open.

All told, the desk contains more than 20 puzzles. It took about four years to design and build, Schaefer said, and cost about as much as a luxury car.

Each draft from a drawer getting pushed in not only plays a note on a pipe organ in the back but also moves an array of switches into different positions, Schaefer explained. The "switchboard" resets itself on every wrong note, but if the correct tune is played, the final puff of air travels through the board to unlock the secret drawer.

Schaefer and his production assistant are also building a series of round "lotus tables" that Schaefer designed. They have six drawers, plus a series of sliding

puzzle fans. No electronics are involved.

"It's fascinating to take a material like wood and push the limits of it and to have it accomplish unexpected things," Schaefer said. "It's almost a feat of magic."

Atlanta Hawks to be sold

Hawks and Philips Arena will be sold to California developer and pizza chain owner Alex Meruelo, but the NBA team will remain in Atlanta, a person familiar with the deal said Sunday.

The person spoke on condition of anonymity to The Associated Press because no official announcement has been made. The deal, subject to the approval of the NBA, is to be announced on Monday.

Hawks ownership group, led by Michael Gearon Jr. and Bruce Levenson, also recently sold the NHL Atlanta Thrashers to a group that has moved the team to Winnipeg. The Thrashers deal was for a reported \$170 million.

Meruelo, who will have controlling interest of more than 50 percent of the Hawks, over 50 franchised and company-owned restaurants in Southern California.

Meruelo also heads The Meruelo Group, a Downey, Calif.-based investment firm, which recently acquired the Grand Sierra Resort and Casino in Reno, Nev., for a reported \$42.45 million.

A tearful Gearon said at the news conference to announce the sale of the Thrashers on May 31 that the owners failed in attempts to find someone to keep the hockey team in Atlanta. Gearon said no local buver emerged with a serious offer for the Thrashers.

The ownership group, called the Atlanta Spirit, also had to look outside of Atlanta to find a buyer for the Hawks. This time, there was no threat of moving the team.

group bought the Hawks, Thrashers and operating rights to Philips Arena, where the teams play, in 2004. There was almost immediate dissension among the own-

The ownership split began in 2005 over Boston-based coowner Steve Belkin's objection to the Hawks' trade of Boris Diaw, two first-round draft picks and a \$4.9 million trade exception to the Phoenix Suns for guard Joe Johnson in 2005.

The dispute led to a long legal battle that ended when Levenson and Gearon announced on Dec. 22, 2010. they had bought out Belkin's 30-percent share.

Gearon grew up with the team and has said he would like to retain a minority share of the team's ownership.

Texans hope secondary can climb out of league's cellar

HOUSTON (AP) — Houston Texans defensive backs coach Vance Joseph offers words of encouragement after almost every practice snap, even if one of his players is beaten on a route.

Joseph may have the biggest challenge of any position coach on the staff — fixing a secondary that ranked as the league's worst in 2010.

"You've got to stay positive, because it's a hard assignment and bad things happen, even when you're playing good," Joseph said Sunday. "Somebody's got to be there supporting them, and it's got to be me, as their coach.

"This is a young group, they want to do well, they want to be great," he said, "so there's no reason not to be positive."

The Texans allowed 267.5 yards passing per game and 33 touchdown passes last season. They drafted cornerbacks Brandon Harris (Miami) and Roc Carmichael (Virginia Tech), then picked up free agents Johnathan Joseph and Danieal Manning to bring experience that the group lacked in 2010.

"They've been around good secondaries, they know how it should look," Vance Joseph said. "They can push these guys, show them how to practice, show them how to prepare, how to think through it.

"We've also got two guys who are in the primes of their careers," he said. strange. Teams drafted these guys pretty high, and now we get them at only the second stage of their careers? All the bad things, the bad habits are behind them. All their good football is still ahead."

One of Johnathan Joseph's first directives when he arrived was talking to cornerback Kareem Jackson, last year's first-round pick who often took the sharpest criticism for the secondary's prob-

Joseph, a first-round pick by Cincinnati in 2006, reassured

Jackson that just about every NFL rookie struggles and that cornerback is one of the hardest positions for a young player to learn. Joseph did not intercept a pass in his first season, but has 14 picks in his four seasons since.

"We've all had those same growing pains," Johnathan Joseph said. "I'm sure, from talking to him (Jackson),that it's behind him. He comes out here every day confident, and it doesn't bother him at all. In this league, you have to have a short memory, which he understands."

Jackson doesn't want to forget 2010 entirely. If anything, he says remembering the backlash from fans and media provides perfect motivation.

"For having a year like that last year, no one wants to go through that," Jackson said, "so everybody is committed to what we're doing. So we're

Radio host called racist after brawl

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Giants manager Bruce Bochy criticized a nationally syndicated radio host Sunday for what he said was a "racist" comment about San Francisco reliever Ramon Ramirez.

Radio host Tony Bruno referred to Ramirez as an "illegal alien." He also called Bochy a

"coward" in a Twitter post following Friday night's benches-clearing brawl between the Phillies and Giants. The mayhem came after Ramirez plunked Shane Victorino in the lower back in the sixth inning of the Phillies' 9-2 victory.

Bruno's show is broadcast on local station KNBR 1050 AM. He later deleted his tweet and apologized for his "stupid and insensitive"

"gutless (...) Giants," he tweeted. "Bochy is a coward for having his illegal alien pitcher hit a guy since mighty Frisco boys ...' Ramirez is from the Do-

minican Republic. He has declined to discuss the brawl but said Sunday he is in the U.S. legally and wouldn't be able to work in the major leagues otherwise.

"I'm not interested in what he thinks about me," Ramirez said in a Spanish interview with The Associated Press and a Spanish reporter before the finale of the Giants' four-game series with Philadelphia.

"I'm not interested in what he has to say. I don't need to pay attention to what he has to say about me. A lot of people say things about me. I know who I am. How would I be able to work here if I were an illegal? He put it on the Internet? I can't believe that."

Phillies manager Charlie Manuel and Victorino felt Ramirez hit the center fielder on purpose. The pitcher, Victorino and Giants catcher Eli Whiteside were ejected after the fracas — and Bochy expects to hear from Major League Baseball as soon as Monday regarding any suspensions.

"It's not like somebody went out to the mound," Bochy said of visiting Ramirez or instructing him to plunk Victorino. "He just walked a guy. There's no communication there. The next pitch hit Victorino. It happened so fast. We were as surprised as anybody to be honest." Ramirez is ready to move

forward — from the brawl and Bruno's comments. "Everyone says what they feel in their heart," Ramirez said. "But I feel that's not right."

On his Facebook page, Bruno addressed his remarks. "My stupid and insensitive twitter post was up less than one minute before I realized it was caustic," Bruno said. "It was removed immediately and I typed a quick apology on twitter and here. "Since I was doing my live

He finished strong with three birdies on his last four holes, starting with a 15-foot putt on the 15th. a wedge to 4 feet on the 16th and a 15-footer on the 17th.

It helped a little, but not enough.

Woods started the week at No. 135 in the FedEx Cup standings, and he is not likely to crack the top 125, the number that gets him into the first round of the playoff series that begin with The Bar-

He still has the PGA Championship next week in Atlanta, although Woods said he would not play the Wyndham Championship in North Carolina, the final event to qualify for the FedEx Cup, even if he is outside the top 125.

"No, I'm not playing that week, no," Woods said. "Family obligations.'

That usually means he has custody of his children, and since Woods has never played in Greensboro, N.C., there was no reason to think he might this year.

Woods conceded he was not tournament sharp.

'It's nice for me to get out there in this competitive atmosphere no matter how I was playing just to figure out how to score, because I haven't been forced to score," he said.

"At home, playing money games with my buddies is just not the same. Being out here and being forced to have to post a score, hit shots ... that's a different deal."

BALTIMORE (AP) — Ricky Romero pitched eight innings of four-hit ball, Brett Lawrie hit his first major league homer and the Toronto Blue Jays cruised past the Baltimore Orioles 7-2 Sunday.

Romero is 6-1 in his last eight starts against Baltimore.

Lawrie, who made his big league debut on Friday, hit a 2-1 pitch from Alfredo Simon (3-5) into the right-field bleachers to make it 6-1 in the the solo home run, the 21-year-old Canadian also singled and scored in the third inning. Lawrie hit .455 in the threegame series. Reynolds fourth multi-

coachable, you've got to listen and be ready to fix it. Your best defensive backs are consistent


players. They're the same all the time. When you have young kids who are great players, but on four or five plays, they're not their best, bad things happen. Consistency is
