Big Spring sixth-graders are moving up in the world

Of all the changes that will take place at Big Spring Independent School District this school year which began today — the one that gains the most notice is all the construction projects going on at campus sites around town. But another change, this one not quite as noticeable, is the addition of sixth-graders to the junior high school population.

BSISD officials announced their intention to move sixth-graders when they made plans for a \$60 million construction bond which passed voter muster in 2010.

The move will accomplish a longstanding district goal: to cut down the moves students must make as they progress through grades at BSISD. At a majority of Texas school districts, students move twice — from elementary to junior high, then to high school. Until this school year at Big Spring, however, students made three moves — from





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

Clashes erupt near Gadhafi compound in Libyan capital

TRIPOLI, Libya (AP) – Tanks opened fire at rebels trying to storm Moammar Gadhafi's main compound in Tripoli on Monday, although the whereabouts of the longtime Libyan leader remained unknown a day after a lightning advance by opposition fighters who poured into Tripoli capital with surprising ease.

international The community meanwhile called on the longtime leader to step down as euphoric residents celebrated in the Green Square, the symbolic heart of the Gadhafi regime. NATO promised to continue airstrikes until all pro-Gadhafi forces surrender or return to barracks.

spokesman Rebel Mohammed Abdel-Rahman, who was in Tripoli, cautioned that pockets of resistance remained and that as long as Gadhafi remains on the run the "danger is still there."

The clashes broke out early Monday at Gadhafi's long time command center known as Bab al-Aziziya early Monday when government tanks emerged from the complex and opened fire at rebels trying to get in, according to Abdel-Rahman and a neighbor. An AP reporter at the nearby Rixos Hotel where foreign journalists stay could hear gunfire and loud explosions from the direction of the complex.

Tripoli resident Moammar al-Warfali, whose family home is next to the compound, said there appeared to be only a few tanks belonging to the remaining Gadhafi forces that have not the complex. fled or surrendered.

Obama calls on Gadhafi to 'acknowledge reality,' relinguish power

VINEYARD HAVEN, Mass. (AP) – President Barack Obama says it's time for Moammar Gadhafi to recognize that his rule over Libva has come to an end and he should relinquish power to stop the violence and bloodshed of six months of civil war aimed at toppling his autocratic regime.

"The future of Libya is now in the hands of the Libyan people," Obama said Sunday in a statement from Martha's Vineyard, where he's vacationing with his family. The U.S. says it will work closely with the rebels.

After a day of dramatic developments, Obama said the situation in Libya had reached a "tipping point" and control of the capital was "slipping from the grasp of a tyrant."

"The surest way for the bloodshed to end is simple: Moammar Gadhafi and his regime need to recognize that their rule has come to an end," Obama said. "Gadhafi needs to acknowledge the reality that he no longer controls Libva. He needs to relinquish power once and for all." Obama issued the statement after conducting a conference call with members of his national security team, who had provided him with updates throughout the day.

DA likely to drop sexual assault case against Strauss-Kahn in NYC

NEW YORK (AP) — The sexual assault charges that cost Dominique Strauss-Kahn his job as head of the International Monetary Fund likely will be dropped by prosecutors, a person familiar with the case has said.

The likely developments would bring a formal end to the case at Strauss-Kahn's next court date on Tuesday, when prosecutors may ask a judge to dismiss the charges and might elaborate on their reasoning.

The Manhattan District Attorney's office probably will tell Strauss-Kahn's accuser Monday that it won't pursue the case, both because prosecutors don't have evidence proving a forced sexual encounter and because she has a history of lies and inconsistencies that make it impossible to ask a jury to believe her, the person said. The person spoke on condition of anonymity to discuss matters not vet made public.

The case upended French politics before it was riven by questions about his accuser's credibility. It captured international attention as a seeming cauldron of sex, violence, power and politics: A promising French presidential contender, known in his homeland as "the Great Seducer," accused of a brutal and contemptuous attack on an African immigrant who came to clean his plush hotel suite. The stakes were high for both Strauss-Kahn — who resigned his IMF post, spent nearly a week behind bars and then spent possibly hundreds of thousands of dollars on house arrest and for DA Cyrus R. Vance Jr., who was handling the biggest case he has had during his 18 months in office.

One of Strauss-Kahn's lawyers, Benjamin Brafman, didn't immediately respond to an email message Sunday, after the New York Post first reported prosecutors' likely decision to drop the case. The DA's office declined to comment.

Take a virtual tour of New York on Google Maps and some blurry images appear.

As you zoom down in satellite view, what looks like the crisp outline of the airport terminal near upstate Buf-



falo dissolves into a fuzzy white blob. Instead of cars, blotches of color sit in the main parking lot.

Swing southeast 140 miles to the prison in Elmira, near the Pennsylvania border, or the atomic research lab in Schenectady, about 180 miles northeast from there — and the images hide behind the same type of blur.

The alterations are not the work of a hacker. In the post-9/11 world, they're the product of New York state's homeland security apparatus, done in the hope of preventing terrorists from attacking.

As a staggered nation scrambled after Sept. 11, 2001, to anticipate possible next targets, there was a widespread sanitizing of publicly available information suddenly viewed as tipsheets and road maps for terrorists.

Texas has highest uninsured rate

WASHINGTON (AP) - Texas would be among the biggest beneficiaries of President Barack Obama's health care overhaul, standing to gain coverage for nearly 4 million uninsured residents.

But Gov. Rick Perry blocked moves to lay the groundwork for that expansion of coverage, and among the alternatives he's supported is an untested regional solution that could prove as controversial as Obama's remake.

With Perry running for the Republican presidential nomination, health care in Texas and his own ideas as governor will get fly-speck scrutiny on the national stage. His state is a study in contrasts, boasting worldrenowned facilities like the MD Anderson Cancer Center in Houston, along with the highest proportion of uninsured residents of any state -26percent.

As a national candidate Perry has made total repeal of "Obamacare" central to his fledgling campaign. But it's unclear what he would put in its place. And if the Supreme Court ultimately upholds all or parts of the law, Perry has signaled that he would help carry out key provisions to avoid defaulting to the federal bureaucracy.

Texas has received various grants under Obama's law for planning, insurance regulation and consumer education.

The state employee benefits system says it expects to draw \$60 million in federal subsidies this year to help cover its early retirees, cashing in on a provision of the law.

Because of its long history of attacking civilians through bombings, kidnapping and rocket attacks, Hamas is also considered a terrorist organization by Canada, the European Union, Israel and Japan.

Hamas' funding comes primarily from Iran, Saudi Arabian benefactors and Palestinian expatriates. Palestinian refugees and their descendants in Gaza also receive hundreds of millions of dollars from the United Nations Relief and Works Agency (UNRWA). Now, with Hamas' recent agreement to unite with Fatah, the terrorist group will have influence over and access to billions of dollars more in aid from the U.S., the European Union and dozens of individual donor nations.

Hamas rules the people of Gaza with a brutal, totalitarian hand. Since Hamas violently seized control of Gaza in 2007, it has permitted no elections and allows no freedom of press, religion or speech. Palestinian women in Gaza are repressed according to strict Islamic custom. More than half of Gazan women report having been victims of physical violence, and

half of all murders in Gaza are "honor killings" of women. Homosexuality is illegal in Gaza, and Christians are often harassed. Against all international law, kidnapped Israeli soldier Gilad Shalit has been held incommunicado by Hamas for five years with no access to the Red Cross.

Hamas opposes the Israeli-Palestinian peace process. Hamas stands openly by its goal to conquer every inch of Palestine, cleanse it of Jews, and establish a fundamentalist Islamic caliphate. Since Israel's withdrawal of security forces and residents from Gaza in

attack on an Israeli school bus killed a 16-year-old boy. Above all, Hamas refuses to accept the state of Israel and condemns any efforts to negotiate peace-a complete repudiation of the efforts of the United States and the Quartet on the Middle East (consisting of the United Nations, the European Union, Russia and the U.S.) to

resolve the decades-long dispute between Arabs and Israelis. Senior Hamas leader Mahmoud al-Zahar recently confirmed that "Our program does not include negotiations with Israel or recognizing it."

Time to stop U.S. aid to terrorists. In April, 2011, Secretary of State Hillary Clinton stated, "We will not deal with nor in any way fund a Palestinian government that includes Hamas unless and until Hamas has renounced violence, recognized Israel and agreed to follow the previous obligations of the Palestinian Authority." In July, 2011, both houses of Congress overwhelmingly passed resolutions that threaten withdrawal of aid from the Palestinian Authority if it persists in efforts to circumvent direct negotiations with Israel by turning to the United Nations for recognitionwhich it continues to pursue aggressively-and if the Palestinian Authority shares power with Hamas. In fact, annual U.S. foreign operations appropriations bills expressly forbid funding for "assistance to Hamas or any entity effectively controlled by Hamas or any power-sharing government of which Hamas is a member."

Two shot at Raiders game

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) Police interviewed witnesses and looked for suspects Sunday after two men were shot and wounded following a San Francisco 49ers-Oakland Raiders preseason game, while the NFL and the mayors of the two cities jointly called for an end to "intimidation" and acts of violence at sporting events.

Saturday night's shooting in the parking lot at Candlestick Park evoked memories of another recent disturbing act of post-game violence involving two rival California pro sports teams

— the near-fatal beating in March of a San Francisco Giants fan outside Dodger Stadium.

In Saturday's attacks, a 24-year-old man, who reportedly was wearing a "F--- the Niners" T-shirt, remained hospitalized in serious condition Sunday after being shot several times in the stomach. He had managed to stumble to Candlestick Park stadium security for help despite the severe injuries, police said.

A second victim, a 20-year-old man, was treated for less serious wounds in a separate shooting, also after the

game.

Sgt. Mike Andraychak said Sunday that police are looking for "a person of interest" connected to at least one of the shootings. He would not specify which shooting.

A motive for either attack — including whether either was influenced by emotions surrounding a game involving fiercely rival teams — also wasn't known.

Apart from the shootings, a third victim was also hospitalized in serious condition Sunday after he was knocked unconscious in a stadium bathroom during the

football game. That attack appeared unrelated to the other two, authorities said.

The victims' names have not been released as the violent spree overshadowed the 49ers' 17-3 victory over the Raiders.

The crimes prompted San Francisco Mayor Ed Lee and Oakland Mayor Jean Quan to issue a joint statement saying that violence at stadiums in both cities will not be tolerated.

"The incidents are completely unacceptable

Texans run over Saints in Houston

HOUSTON (AP) — The Houston Texans' first-string offense was in top form against the New Orleans Saints on Saturday night, producing 24 points and 283 yards on its first four series.

It was just a preseason game, as Arian Foster said after the 27-14 victory. But coach Gary Kubiak said Sunday that he was encouraged by what he saw from Matt Schaub, the offensive line and running back Ben Tate, who was seeing his first game action in more than a year.

Slow starts were common for the Texans in 2010 — they scored a total of 151 points in the first halves of their 16 games, and 236 in the second halves.

Schaub set the tempo against the Saints, completing 12 of 16 throws for 163 yards, including a 48-yarder to Andre Johnson. Tate and 2010 NFL leading rusher Foster ran for 142 total yards in the first half, helped by efficient blocking from the line and tight ends Owen Daniels, Joel Dreessen and James Casey, who's also learning to play fullback.

"It sure helps when you run the football like that, that's what makes our offense go," Kubiak said. "The thing I was excited about offensively was we played well up front. Our five guys played really well. Of course, getting those two backs back helped."

Tate broke a 43-yard run, Foster scored from 28 yards out and Chris Ogbonnaya and Javarris Williams both had rushes longer than 10 yards. The Texans finished with 208 yards rushing.

"The thing we ask our guys to do is cut, and that's usually the difference in whether we have some 15- or 20-yard runs, and not just 6-yard runs," Kubiak said. "We were cutting good, we were working hard on the backside. As a group, we played faster and played sharper."

Kubiak also pinpointed areas that still need improvement, most notably the Texans' run defense and the return game. The Saints rushed for only 113 yards, but found gaps in the first half.

"They ran weakside iso (isolation)," Kubiak said. "They were very committed to it in the game and did it quite a bit. We stopped it in the second half and got some things corrected, but that's a

concern. They moved the ball, especially in that first drive and in that first half, but we found a way make big to plays."

Kubiak said new defensive coordinator Wade Phillips kept his game simple plan for the second straight week, as the Texans continue to break in his 3-4 scheme. Even with only the basic defense in place, Houston has generated 11 sacks and four turnovers in two preseason games, marked progress for a defense that ranked among the league's worst in 2010.

"There's a progression to what we're trying to do, teachingwise," Kubiak said. "We're just trying not to overload them, and make sure we're good at something before we move to the next thing."

Kubiak hinted that Phillips might delve deeper into his playbook when the Texans play at San Francisco on Saturday.

"I know we've got a lot of other things defensively we're going to do," Kubiak said. "Like Wade has told me over and over again, until we get this right, there's no use in moving on."

Mario Williams and Brian Cushing played well in just over 20 snaps, Kubiak said. Williams, working on the transition from defensive end to outside linebacker, made two tackles, deflected a pass and recovered a fumble. Cushing, who's missed several practices as he recovers from offseason knee surgery, also made two tackles.

A growing concern for Kubiak now is that Houston ranks second-to-last in kick return average (16.9 yards) through two preseason games.

He says the new NFL rule that moves kickoffs up five yards is changing the way every team teaches them, but he still thinks the Texans need to block them better. Houston has no kickoff return longer than 21 yards in the preseason, and no punt return longer than a 19-yarder by Derrick Townsel in the Texans' 20-16 win over the Jets last Monday night.

"We've got to make some vast improvements in there and just settle down," Kubiak said. "We'll really settle down this week with the people that we use in the aspect of that game. The game has changed from a kickoff return standpoint and we've got to adapt to it and do a good job."

Kubiak said guard Kasey Studdard underwent ankle surgery Friday and doctors are still determining if he'll be able to return this season. He said rookie receiver Lestar Jean bruised a shoulder and nose tackle Earl Mitchell bruised a knee. Continued from page 5

and will be prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law," the mayors said. "Fans come to our stadiums to enjoy an afternoon of football, not to be subjected to intimidation or violence.

"These games are family events and the types of images we witnessed last night have no place in our arenas," they continued.

NFL spokesman Greg Aiello echoed similar comments in a statement released Sunday.

"We deplore the activities of a handful of fans at last night's game and pledge our full support to Mayors Lee and Quan and to state and local law enforcement agencies," Aiello said. "We are carefully reviewing the events to make sure we have a full understanding of the facts.

"We will continue to work closely with our clubs and law enforcement agencies to support our fan conduct and stadium security initiatives," Aiello said

49ers coach Jim Harbaugh, who also once was a coach in the Raiders organization, said he was saddened to hear about the spate of violence.

"I didn't know anything was going on during the game. I wasn't aware of that," Harbaugh said. "I feel bad for the people who got injured and the people who had to see that, for those who had to witness it. I feel bad when you sponsor an event, for an organization, and those things happen."

Andraychak said police were interviewing witnesses Sunday, and encouraged others who may have tips or seen the violence to come forward.

The attacks come about five months after San Francisco Giants fan Bryan Stow was severely beaten by two men in Los Angeles Dodgers gear outside Dodger Stadium after the archrivals season opener March 31. Two suspects have been charged in the case.

Police Sgt. Frank Harrell said Saturday that the man shot wearing a T-shirt referring to the 49ers with an obscenity, drove his truck to a gate and stumbled to stadium security. The other man was shot before that in the parking lot and had superficial face injuries, Harrell said.


Harrell told reporters outside the stadium that the two shootings were being treated separately "but we believe they are related." He did not elaborate.

In the attack on Stow, the Giants fan beaten nearly to death almost five months ago, the two men accused in the beating, Louie Sanchez, 28, and Marvin Norwood, 30, have pleaded not guilty.

Stow, 42, a Santa Cruz paramedic, suffered severe brain injuries and remains hospitalized in serious condition. Doctors say while the father of two has made "significant improvement," it's still unclear how far Stow's recovery will take him.

That attack drew widespread attention and focusing the spotlight on security at Dodger Stadium, and the intense rivalry among Dodgers and Giants fans.

Teen football players die in wreck



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LINWOOD, N.J. (AP) — A New Jersey high school and its community were grappling Sunday with a hard reality: four players on their local football team were dead and four others were injured in an SUV crash on the way to a team meal.

The driver, 17-yearold Casey Brenner of Northfield, apparently lost control of the vehicle late Saturday morning as it went around a crest on the Garden State Parkway and came upon heavy traffic, said Sgt. Julian Castellanos, a state police spokesman.

The SUV overturned several times, ejecting two passengers, one of whom was struck by a passing car, Castellanos said. All eight teenagers played for the Mainland Regional High School football team in Linwood. They ranged in age from 15 to 17.

The crash hung heavy over the community Sunday, where filling bleachers at the school's Friday night games is part of life every fall. The Mustangs have won six state championships, including five since Bob Coffey became head coach in 1986.

Before the crash, perhaps the greatest trial for the team came when it had to forfeit four games last year for using a player who transferred from another school and suited up without all the proper paperwork in place.

The victims' teammates planned to don game jerseys for the first time with their names stitched above the numbers to attend an evening vigil Sunday. And they expected

to be together for funerals in the coming days.

Coffey said he'd look for direction from his players, but expected that practices would move ahead — in some form. But two scrimmages scheduled for this week were canceled.

"My gut feeling is that we live for the moment," he said. "As a coach and kids, you've got to take care of what's in front of you right now."

Brenner was killed, as were Dean Khoury of Linwood, 15; and two 16-year-olds, Edgar Bozzi of Somers Point and Nicholas Conner of Northfield.

Coffey said Brenner was competing to be the starting tight end, Bozzi was likely to get playing time as a linebacker, Khoury was working hard after Coffey nearly kicked him off the team for missing a practice, and Conner was one of the team's most enthusiastic special-teams

players.

"All four of them were so happy, doing so well," said Coffey, who lives a few blocks from the high school in a spacious house where his players often gather.

Superintendent Thomas Baruffi described the four players who died as good students, good athletes and well-liked.

At Khoury's family's home in Linwood, the driveway and street were packed with relatives' cars. Many in the family were crying, including his mother, Denise Khoury.

"He was the boy who made everybody smile," she said.

The injured included two Linwood residents, 17-year-old Jacob Smith and 15-year-old Kenneth Randall, and two 16-year-old Northfield residents, Kyle Beattie and Alex Denafo.

Coffey said everyone except Smith was home from the hospital.

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
