# man charged with assault

A 118th Judicial District Court jury Tuesday

finding Joseph Alton Murley not guilty of aggravated assault with a deadly weapon at the end of the one-day trial.

Murley was accused of deliberately hitting a woman with his car in the 1300 block of Stanford on July 1, 2010. If convicted, he would have faced a prison term of between two and 20 years in state prison.

Assistant District Attorney Robin D. Orr, who tried the case for the state, said a lack of corroborating testimony hurt his case.

"We didn't find out until (Tuesday morning) that the witness wasn't available," Orr said. "I think that deprived us of some valuable corroboration that would have helped the jury understand what was going on." Murley's defense attorney, Robert Miller,

theorized the alleged victim was in fact the aggressor in the incident that led to Murley's arrest, Orr said.

## **Council gets** another look at district makeup

The Big Spring City Council met with attorney Robert T. Bass — via teleconference during Tuesday night's meeting to discuss redistricting efforts, calling for a third "minority majority" district to consider.

Under the current plan, District 1 and District 2 both have a majority of minority voters – mostly Hispanic and African American within their boundaries. However, members of the council felt shifting the lines to make District 3 a minority majority district would better reflect the overall population of the

"If you look at the population of the city, it's made up of approximately 50 percent minorities," Mayor Tommy Duncan said. "Having three minority districts could better reflect that fact."

According to the 2010 Census, District 1,

# Jury acquits | City tax rate to go down but water cost will soar

The city of Big Spring took a step forward Tuesday night in solidifying its proposed 2011-2012 budget and ad valorem tax rate, calling for a public hearing on the matter to be held during its next council

The proposed budget is based on a 94.95-cent per \$100 valuation tax rate, a drop of 5 cents compared to last year's 99.95 cent rate. The proposed rate is also nearly 5 cents below the effective tax rate of 99.7 cents per \$100 valuation.

According to City Finance Director Peggy Walker, because the proposed tax rate is below the effective rate, the public hearing isn't required by law. However, city officials will be holding the hearing

"I noticed a link Evamor had posted on Facebook and I decided to share it and I posted 'Love this water," said Sedberry, who sells it at her shop at 1305 Scurry. "The next thing I know, Shane Menard, an Evamor representative,

was contacting me."

With Big Spring making its way to the national news lately in regards to the current drought situation, Evamor was able to understand the community's situation and wanted to offer support, their according to Sedberry.

"He (Menard) told me they wanted to support a community that supports them," Sedberry said.

After a few calls were made to different members of the county and city of Big Spring, including Volunteer Fire Chief Tommy Sullivan, Emergency Coordinator for Big Spring and Howard County Terry Chamness and City Manager Gary Fugua, arrangements were made to truck in and dispense the water. Chamness worked with Evamor representatives for six days in order to organize the logistics of the

# **BSISD** board expected to OK budget, approve District 3 trustee Thursday

Big Spring Independent School

District trustees are expected to give formal approval to a "it could have been worse" budget when they meet at 5:15 p.m. Thursday in the high school board room. Despite losing more than \$1 mil-

lion in state funding for the coming fiscal year, district officials will present a balanced budget for the trustees' approval. Initial fears were that the cut

in state funding would result in teacher or other staff layoffs, but that will not be the case this year.

"It wasn't as bad as we originally

thought it would be," said BSISD Business Manager Debbie Green. "It's balanced, we didn't have to cut any personnel and we didn't have to tap into our reserve funds." On top of all that, the budget fea-

tures a slight decrease in the tax



bottles passed out yesterday and we are going to do more handouts through various organizations and even looking into setting up another distribution day," Chamness said. "We just have to get the logistics worked out before we can do so."

For most of the day Tuesday, residents were able to drive through the Dora Roberts Community Center parking lot and get a free case of water. City and county employees were on hand, as well as community workers from the county jail, to load the water into the cars as they drove through the line. According to Chamness, it was a big effort put forth by a lot of community people.

"The bigger picture is to hopefully empower other companies to step up and help out communities in this situation," Sedberry said. "They want people to have good quality drinking water."

On top of the donation to Big Spring residents and organizations, donations were made to the cities of Robert Lee and Llano. Another donation is expected to be coming, according to Sedberry. A donation site is also being discussed. The water not dispensed Tuesday afternoon will not go to waste, but has been stored at a local facility until it can be distrib-

"It's still so amazing that

this company took to the time to stop, see our situation and offer their support," Sedberry said. "With them, it's not just about bringing us water today or tomorrow, it's about making people more aware of the situation.

"It just serves as a big reminder there are still generous people out there in the world."

Of course, Sedberry wants to remind everyone, it wasn't just her actions that got the water to Big Spring, but the hard work and dedication of Chamness and all the other's who helped organize Tuesday's event.

in an effort to give local residents a say in how their tax dollars are spent.

"There are legal requirements for a tax entity if you are anticipating adopting a tax rate that is above your effective tax rate," Walker told the council. "Those requirements then call for public hearings, publication and notifications to the public. "Although our tax rate we anticipate set-

ting is well below the effective rate, we still want to give the public the opportunity to talk to the council about any concerns they have with the tax rate or the budget. This is just formal notice to the public that we will hold a public meeting at the next council meeting." The rate consists of 62.1317 cents toward

the municipality's general fund; 8.5 cents for the Big Spring Police Department Narcotics Task Force; 20.7249 cents for general obligation bonds issued in 2007 on voter approval; .7133 cents for certificates of obligation issued in 2007; and 2.8801 cents for certificates of obligation issued in 2010 to finance the newly constructed city aquatic center.

The proposed budget sets aside \$1.5 million for a centrifugal sludge collection system for the city's water treatment plant, a project city officials are hoping will help raise the quality of water delivered by the municipality by lowering turbidity levels.

The budget also provides \$1.05 million for

water line replacement in and around Third and Fourth streets, as well as Birdwell Lane; \$1.7 million for the construction of a joint law enforcement center, a project with Howard County to house both the Big Spring Police Department and Howard County Sheriff's Office; and \$600,000 to begin the process of permitting and opening a new municipal landfill.

While the proposed budget may offer some relief for property owners in the Big Spring area, city water customers will have little to celebrate in the coming year.

The base rate, which is currently \$16.75 a month, could go as high as \$31.75, according to city officials. The majority of the hike is due to a rate increase from the Colorado River Municipal Water District that adds approximately \$11 to the existing base rate to cover approximately \$140 million in new debt the district has taken on to develop its water transmission lines from the Ward County well field.

According to City Manager Gary Fuqua, the municipality would also add \$4 to the base rate to cover its cost increases, bringing the total base rate up to \$31.75. Consumption rates would also go up under the new fiscal plan, increased from the current rate of \$2.80 per 1,000 gallons to \$3 per 1,000 gallons.

The public hearing is set for the council's next scheduled meeting, Sept. 13.

#### Facts on Bullying

The facts on bullying reveal it is a growing problem among teens and children. There are several different types of bullying including cyber bullying, bullying in schools as well as other forms of harassing. Continue reading to learn the facts on bullying.

Bullying can happen anywhere. Many children and teens are regular victims of bullying, which can lead to serious emotional scarring and problems with the victim's self-esteem and self-image. Correcting these behaviors before they start or get out of hand are important for parents and educators to keep in mind. In this article we are discussing the facts on bullying and how you can watch for warning signs in victims of bullying as well as in children who might be bullies themselves.

#### Types of bullying:

- Verbal. This type of bullying usually involves name calling and or teasing
- Social. Spreading rumors, intentionally leaving others out of activities on purpose, breaking up friendships are all examples of social bullying.
- Physical. This traditional form of bullying involves hitting, punching, shoving and other acts of intention physical harm.
- Cyberbullying. This method of bullying involves using the Internet,
- texting, email and other digital technologies to harm others.

#### Facts on bullying:

- Imbalance of power. Typically those who engage in bully-like behaviors use their strength, popularity or power to harm, control or manipulate others. They will usually target those who are weaker in size or may have a difficult time defending themselves.
- Intent to cause harm. A bully is a person who does not do things by accident. The bully intends to physically or emotionally injure a person or
- Repetition. Typically incidents of bullying are not a one-time thing. Bullies target the same person or group over and over again.

It is important for parents to discuss the facts on bullying with their children to help teach them how to watch out for bullying and to avoid being bullied. There are several signs parents can look for when evaluating if your child is a victim of bullying.

- Comes home with unexplained injuries or with damaged or missing
- clothing or other belongings Has change in eating habits
- Makes excuses not to go to school
- Has fewer friends
- Feels helpless
- Talks about suicide Acts out of character
- Avoids certain places or playing outside alone
- Feels like they are not good enough
- Has trouble sleeping
- Blames themselves for their problems

The facts on bullying also provide information on what types of signs to look for in children who might be bullying others.

- Becomes frequently violent
- Has trouble controlling anger Is manipulative and controlling of others and situations
- Is quick to blame others
- Does not accept responsibility for their actions

Needs to win or be the best at everything

Understanding these warning signs can help parents prevent their children from becoming bullies or help them not become a victim of a bully. Counseling or therapy are good methods in helping to treat a child who exhibits symptoms of bullying. Children who are victims may also need some kind of support or counseling to help resolve underlying issues of emotional feelings of inadequacy. Children who are confident and have higher self-esteem are less likely to fall prey to the attacks of bullying.

## Monument cracked by quake

WASHINGTON (AP) — The National Park Service says engineers have found a crack near the top of the Washington Monument presumably caused by a 5.8 magnitude earthquake that shook the East Coast.

Park service spokesman Bill Line said Tuesday night that structural engineers found the crack where the 555-foot landmark narrows considerably.

He says the lower portions checked out fine earlier but later they found the crack. He says the monument will be closed indefinitely to keep the public safe.

An outside engineering service will study the crack on Wednesday. He says it's too early to say what would be involved in fixing it. The 91,000-ton monu-

ment is made of Maryland marble. Here is a summary of

#### Texas bar owner sent

#### to prison for sex-trafficking

MCALLEN (AP) — A South Texas bar owner has been sentenced to 30 years in federal prison for sex trafficking of minors. U.S. Attorney Jose Angel Moreno says 35-year-old

Beleal Garcia-Gonzalez of Mission was sentenced Tuesday afternoon. Garcia-Gonzalez was found guilty last fall of three

counts of sex trafficking, one count of conspiracy to harbor illegal immigrants and six counts of harboring illegal immigrants. A judge in McAllen also ordered Garcia-Gonza-

lez to forfeit his home, which he used to harbor the minors, plus pay restitution to the Honduran girls. They were 14, 15 and 17 at the time of the incidents.

Officers in January 2010 rescued the three girls when they were seen leaving a bar and wearing skimpy clothing during cold weather.
