65 bites the dust

Nightime traffic, trucks will be able to go 70 mph

Texas is the last state in the nation to still lower speed limits at sundown, but that will change Thursday as a new law doing away with nighttime limits goes into effect.

House Bill 1353, passed by the 82nd Texas Legislature and signed by Gov. Rick Perry, sets the speed limit at 70 mph for all vehicles, day and

In years past, trucks were limited to 65 mph at all times and both cars and trucks were limited to 65 mph at night.

The legislation also allows the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) to create a 75-mile per hour speed limit on any state highway found to be reasonable and safe through a speed

TxDOT will be reviewing existing 70-mile per hour speed limits to determine where a 75-mile per hour speed limit may be safely posted, the department said in a recent news release.

higher speed limits.

"We will be removing the existing nighttime speed limit signs, truck speed limit signs, and evaluating approximately 50,000 miles of state highway with a current 70-mile hour speed limit," Carol Rawson, Tx-DOT director of traffic operations, said. "With these contracts in place, we are moving steadily ahead to implement these new laws. However, it is important to remember that any increases to speed limits are not effective until the new speed limit signs are actually installed."

The existing 65-mile per hour night and truck speed limit signs should be removed by the end of this year. The complete evaluation of the state highway system and posting of all new 75-mile per hour speed limits should be complete by early 2013, according to TxDOT officials

Speed limits in Texas are set by the 85th percentile method, which represents the speed the majority of drivers are traveling at or below.

CISD board **OKs** deficit budget

COAHOMA — Coahoma **Independent School District** trustees gave their stamp of approval to a new budget and tax rate for the coming fiscal year during their monthly meeting Tuesday evening.

The \$7.4 million budget does feature a built-in shortfall of slightly more than \$200,000, a result of a \$500,000 reduction in state revenue this fiscal year. However, Interim Superintendent Gary Harrell said the fiscal situation could have been much worse for the district.

CISD cut expenses in several areas, including instituting a freeze on salaries, to help make up the shortfall.

"The district started







making cuts last spring when it became apparent that the state would be cutting the revenue it sends to schools," Harrell said. "As a result of those cuts, instead of a shortfall of \$500,000, it will be \$200,000."

How the district deals with that deficit depends on several factors, he added. An increase in enrollment — and the corresponding hike in state revenue that would bring — has officials hopeful the district won't have to dip into reserve funds to balance the budget. "In theory, this is a

deficit budget," he said. "However, our enrollment is up by about 30 students from this time last year ... and if enrollment stays the way it is, we could possibly wipe





Ah, the realities and fun of the small town

was. Jennet Conant's "A Covert Affair: Julia Child and Paul Child in the OSS" (940.548 CHI J) brings to life their experiences in the Office of Strategic Services in the Far East during World War II and the tumultuous years of the McCarthy Red Spy hunt in the 1950s. I have read her biog-

raphy that detailed her determination to be a State Department wife in France and do think this will be a fascinating look at an entirely different part of her Betty White as

seen on the Snickers commercial, "Hot in Cleveland," "The Mary Tyler Moore Show" and numerous other TV show since the 1950s has been both a sensational comedienne and a dramatic presence. She has written several autobiographies on different parts of her life and this one talks about her life in the present.

"If You Ask Me (And of Course You Won't)" (B WHI B) is just like talking to your favorite aunt, grandmother or older person who is at that stage of life where they do not mind to speak their mind. It is a sweet, smart, frank volume that addresses

many subjects and persons of a certain generation will enjoy it and will "get it."

Another couple of biographies you may enjoy are Charlotte Chandler's "Marlene" (B DIE M), about Marlene Dietrich's life and Larry King's


"Truth Be Told," (B KIN L) a collection of memories of various moments, jokes and questions with famous guests.

"Buried Alive," (622.342 TOR M) by Manuel Pino Toro, is the story of the Chilean mining disaster that buried 33 miners for 69 days and their eventual rescue. The miners were

trapped more than a mile below the earth's surface and their survival is a testimony to their strength of will.

Toro's story is based on interviews with family members, rescue squad workers, politicians and support staff who worked together to bring the miners to the surface and back to their families.

Corrie Ten Boom was living with her sister and father in the Netherlands when



they were arrested for hiding Jews. She and her sisters were sent to Ravensbruck concentration camp, where her sister died, shortly before they were to be freed.

Following her release, Corrie traveled around the world for 33 years, speaking in 64 countries. In each country, she told everyone that there is no pit so deep the love of God is not deeper still.

"I Stand at the Door and Knock" (242 TEN C) contains 40 neverbefore published devotions from Corrie that were broadcast sometime in the 1960s and '70s.

Perhaps they might help you on your faith journey.

Man crafts guitar to honor 9-11 victims the inlaying and carvaircraft was hijacked by

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich. - Of the 90 guitars he has crafted since 1978, Thomas Wayne Felty said the most meaningful is the one made of hard curly maple and designed to honor the Sept. 11 victims of Flight 93.

Felty recently unveiled the six-string guitar at the Terryberry jewelry factory, playing a few chords with a soulful sound. "There's an angel in

there," he said. He and Terryberry die

maker and fellow woodworker Don Bremmer worked on the instrument together, with Terryberry donating some parts.

Felty, 63, completed the design and woodwork, and Bremmer, 52, Felty, of Grand Rap-

ids, demonstrated how the 40 victims' names engraved on the guitar can be felt in the wood, similar to the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C.

The neck is inlaid with the phrase, "Let's Roll," the legendary words of passenger Todd Beamer, who led the effort to overpower the terrorists who had taken over the airliner with plans to use it in an attack on the U.S. Capitol on that fateful day.

"I hope in our humble way we are not only honoring these 40 people, but the thousands of others who died that day," Felty said.

United Airlines Flight 93 was traveling from Newark, N.J., to San Francisco on Tuesday, Sept. 11, 2001, when the

four al-Qaeda terrorists, part of a coordinated attack on American landmarks.

The plane crashed into a field near Shanksville, Pa., during an attempt by passengers to regain control.

The Vietnam War veteran said he couldn't put his feelings concerning the passengers into words, but he put them into wood.

"I'm not a wordsmith, but I am a woodworker," he said.

"It moved everybody. It touched everybody. It was such an incredible act of bravery," Felty said.





New flood dangers as East Coast recovers from Irene's lashing

NEWFANE, Vt. (AP) — As emergency airlift operations brought ready-to-eat meals and water to Vermont residents left isolated and desperate, states along the Eastern Seaboard continued to be battered Tuesday by the after effects of Irene, the destructive hurricane turned tropical storm.

Dangerously-damaged infrastructure, 2.5 million people without power and thousands of waterlogged homes and businesses continued to overshadow the lives of residents and officials from North Carolina through New England, where the storm has been blamed for at least 44 deaths in 13

But new dangers developed in New Jersey and Connecticut, where once benign rivers rose menacingly high. New Jersey ordered new evacuations.

The Passaic River in northeastern New Jersey crested — causing extensive flooding along its course and forcing a round of evacuations and rescues in Paterson, the state's third-largest city.

"Been in Paterson all my life, I'm 62 years old, and I've never seen anything like this," said resident Gloria Moses as she gathered with others at the edge of what used to be a network of streets, now covered by a lake.

Panel: Up to \$60 billion lost to waste and fraud in Iraq, Afghanistan

WASHINGTON (AP) — As much as \$60 billion in U.S. tax dollars has been lost to waste and fraud in Iraq and Afghanistan over the past decade due to lax oversight of contractors, poor planning and corruption, according to an independent panel. In its final report to Congress, to be publicly re-

leased Wednesday, the Commission on Wartime Contracting said the waste could grow as U.S. support for reconstruction projects and programs wanes, leaving Iraq and Afghanistan to bear the long-term costs of sustaining the schools, medical clinics, barracks, roads and power plants already built with American money. Government agencies should overhaul the way

they award and manage contracts in war zones so they don't repeat the mistakes made in Iraq and Afghanistan, the commission said. Among the report's 15 recommendations are the creation of an inspector general to monitor contracting and the appointment of a senior government official to im-

prove planning and coordination.

The Associated Press obtained a copy of the commission's 240-page report in advance of its public release. The commission was established by Congress in 2008 and ceases operating at the end of September.

Petraeus retiring to lead CIA

WASHINGTON (AP) Gen. David Petraeus is bidding farewell to the Army that has been his life and the troops that have been his family for 37 years.

America's best-known general is taking off his uniform before starting a new chapter as the 20th director of the CIA next week, where he will keep waging war on al-Qaida and other terrorist groups, but in a far different manner.

The soldier-scholarstatesman is to be sworn in as the nation's spy chief on Sept. 6, less than a week before the 10th anniversary of the terrorist attacks that killed nearly 3,000 people in three states.

It's a sharp and unexpected career turn for the man many thought would ultimately become the top officer in the land — chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff after six command assignments, including

four in war zones. He is credited with turning around the Iraq war and helping pivot the still uncertain campaign in Afghanistan.





Hartsock was eating lunch. He began choking on a piece of meat. Hartsock says he signaled for help when he couldn't breathe. One unnamed teammate was unable to perform the Heimlich at first. After waiting as long as he could, Shockey decided to take over and succesfully helped the fellow player.

Hartsock joked about the incident Tuesday, saying, "We had to call in the reliever and that was Jeremy Shockey.

"Don't let the tattoos fool you, he's a good Samaritan. He knows how to administer the Heimlich."

The often very vocal Shockey declined to discuss the incident.
