ISD to welcome new board member McIntosh

Welcome aboard. The Rev. Kenneth McIntosh, Big Spring Independent School District's newest trustee, will be officially seated during a routine meeting of the BSISD school board at 5:15 p.m. Thursday in the high school board room.

McIntosh, the pastor at Big Spring's First Christian Church for the past five years, was appointed to the District 3 position on the board during the trustees' Aug. 25 meeting.

The position had been vacant since the May general elections. Allen Partee, the incumbent, declined to seek re-election and no one filed to run for the spot.

McIntosh was selected over two other applicants — Natalie Permenter and Lucy Odom - for the position. He will serve until at least next May, when a special election will be held for the final two years of the current District 3 term. "We thought Ken was the right choice,"

School Board President Jeff Brorman said in August.

"He's gone out of his way to implement programs to help keep kids off drugs and he's been a strong supporter of this community, as well."





Lending a helping hand to Isaiah 58

ood pantries serve a vital need in many West Texas communities, especially right here in Big Spring.

However, during these tough times, offering assistance is becoming a little harder to do.

Some West Texas food banks have had to shut their doors and others are working on a very limited stock.

As for area food pantries, food selection is also growing smaller and becoming non-existant.

Isaiah 58 — a local food pantry and 2012 United Way agency — is dealing with empty shelves and the inability to offer the assistance it is used to.

Normally, the food pantry is open for three distribution times a week -4:30 p.m. to 5:30 p.m. Mondays, 9:30 a.m. to 10:30 a.m. Tuesday and again at 4:30 p.m. to 5:30 p.m.

The lack of donations and increase of their food bill has hit them hard, but it doesn't mean they can't be helped and put back in service.

Big Spring Herald and United Way of Howard County have joined together with the help of Walmart and H-E-B in order to conduct a food drive in hopes of restocking at least some of the shelves at Isaiah 58.

Drop off boxes have been placed at both entrances of Walmart and H-E-B, as well as inside the offices of United Way and the *Herald*. Boxes will remain at each location until Sept. 23. All donations will go directly to Isaiah 58.

All non-parishable food items are being accepted during the food drive.

However, if you would like to donate frozen foods, the pantry is equipped to store those as well. Any frozen donations can be taken to Isaiah 58. located at 107 Runnels.

All donations, no matter how small, will help Isaiah 58 provide assistance locally. Donations are the driving force of Isaiah 58.

White House says GOP will do anything to "Muck us up"

t seemed like a trivial matter: On Wednesday, House Republicans forced the president to delay his speech to a joint session of Congress by one day.

Who cares? The White House cares. Very much.

"It is a big deal that the House said no to the president from our end," a White House source with intimate knowledge of what took place between the House and the president told me Thursday.

"This confirms what we all know: They will do anything in the House to muck us up." On Wednesday, the White House

staff did not know exactly what **President Barack** Obama was going to say in his major jobs speech, but they knew exactly

where and when

he was going to say it.

The location would be before a joint session of Congress in the august marble-clad chamber of the House of Representatives. And the speech would be next Wednesday night, when the House returned from vacation and there would be maximum TV viewership.

The speech would be dignified, sober and important. But the planning turned out to be a mess, a mess that illuminates just how hyper-partisan politics has become on Capitol Hill at exactly the time Obama is calling for bipartisanship.

The White House was well aware that the president's speech would conflict with a planned Republican debate sponsored by Politico and NBC to be held at the Ronald Reagan Presidential Library in Simi Valley, Calif. The debate would be broadcast live by MSNBC, CNBC, Telemundo and livestreamed by Politico.

Yet the White House did not see this as an obstacle. "With all due respect, the Politico-MSNBC debate was one that was going on a cable station," the White House source said. "It was not sacrosanct. We knew they would push it back and then there would be a GOP debate totally trashing the president. So it wasn't all an upside for us."

House viewed Boehner as a political opponent, but not as an enemy, and the call was cordial, even pro forma considering such a request had never before been refused.

And, according to the White House source, Boehner said "OK" to Daley's request for the Wednesday evening date.

Then things quickly unraveled. It turned out not everyone was as sanguine as Boehner with the notion that a Democratic president was going to step on a Republican debate.

At 11:55 a.m. Wednesday, the White House tweeted the news about the joint session. "And then Rush Limbaugh beat Boehner up," the source said.

The conservative talk-show personality was in his familiar state of high dudgeon. "This is a pure campaign speech, and to give it the imprimatur of a speech before a joint session of Congress, there's no way. He doesn't deserve that," Limbaugh said. "Boehner's got to say no. Now, whether he will, I have no clue."

A number of Republicans in the House and a few in the Senate did have a clue, and they told Boehner that while they would allow the joint session — it was hard not to for both historic and political reasons — the timing had to be on their terms, which meant it could not conflict with the Republican debate.

At which point Boehner's office announced that Boehner had never agreed to the Wednesday date, that Congress did not get back into session until 6:30 p.m. on that day, that various votes had to be taken, that security had to be arranged, and Obama should push his speech back a day to Thursday.

Which just happened to be the evening the Green Bay Packers were meeting the New Orleans Saints in the NFL season opener. Which meant Obama would have to move his speech up about an hour or so before the kickoff at 8:30 p.m. Eastern time.

When asked for comment, Brendan Buck, press secretary to Boehner, said he had nothing to add to his statement of Wednesday that read in part: "No one in the Speaker's office — not the Speaker, not any staff signed off on the date the White House announced today.' The White House was not pleased. In reality, it believed, Congress really had never gone out of session, a parliamentary move that blocked Obama from making recess appointments. "And they had to arrange security?" the White House source scoffed. "As if they couldn't do

that! This was a political thing, a tea party thing, a Rush Limbaugh thing. They were all giving Boehner gas."

The White House did not want to give in and look weak, but what was the alternative?

An Oval Office speech instead? "You can't speak for 40 minutes from the Oval Office," the source said.

How about the East Room? "He's going to speak to an empty East Room with just the teleprompters and staff there? No," said the source

So it had to be in the House of Representatives, which the Republicans control. "But we couldn't go if they didn't let us come," the source said. "You can't hold the speech in the lobby or in the parking lot. And you're not going to get network coverage if you hold it at George Mason University.

"After a month of world chaos, the setting had to match the topic. And you don't get any better setting than a joint session of Congress.

In the end, the White House felt it had no choice but to give in on the date, and Obama sent an e-mail to his supporters with the subject line: "Frustrated."

"It's been a long time since Congress was focused on what the American people need them to be focused on," Obama said in the e-mail. "I know that you're frustrated by that. I am, too."

Obama said he was going to put forward "a set of bipartisan proposals to help grow the economy and create jobs" and he was "asking lawmakers to look past short-term politics and take action on that plan."

It was, perhaps, not the friendliest message, but the White House was not in a friendly mood. Some Democrats were attacking Obama for once again "caving in" to Republicans, though others thought it was an inconsequential matter.

The White House is viewing it as very consequential, however. "It is a big deal," the source said. "It shows the House Republicans will do no outreach, nothing."

And who does the White House believe was really behind treating the president so shabbily?

"At first, I didn't think it was Boehner, but his caucus," the

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Solyndra debacle spotlights Obama's folly

ast year, President Barack Obama came to the Bay Area to tout "green jobs" at an event at solar panel manufacturer Solyndra's Fremont plant. Quoth the president: "The true engine of economic growth will always be companies like Solyndra.'

On Wednesday, Solyndra announced it was shuttering its remaining Fremont factory, laying off 1,100 workers and filing for bankruptcy. It was a sorry day for the Bay Area.

I remember the day Obama came, May 26, 2010, vividly. Then-Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger came to greet the president and wave to the hard hats. Venture capitalists preened. Just to show how brainy and farsighted the solar crowd is, Obama reminded the audience that his energy secretary, Steven Chu, is a Nobel Prize-winning physicist.

Rube that I am, I didn't understand what Obamaland was thinking. Solyndra had not turned a profit since it was founded in 2005. The plant in which Obama stood was bankrolled with a \$535 million federal loan guarantee. Two months before, PricewaterhouseCoopers questioned Solyndra's "ability to continue as a going concern.'

If the president wants to send a positive message on the U.S. economy, I wondered, then couldn't his people have found a California company

that doesn't rely on a federal loan and actually makes money?

Bad advance work, I figured. A month later, Solyndra canceled a planned \$300 mil-

lion public offering. In November, Solyndra closed its older plant and cut its workforce. Today Solyndra's lights are out.

Now I am wondering: Isn't there some graybeard in the White House who — knowing that the president won't look good if the tax-funded solar plant folds — does some digging to make sure the president's choice of venue will not

come back to haunt him?

Or could it be that Team Obama is composed of like-minded green true believers who insulate themselves from other points of view — much like the way, critics contended, George W. Bush was surrounded with yes men?

Consider: The administration continues to cling to its belief that green jobs are the jobs of the future, despite evidence to the contrary. A July study by The Brookings Institution found that green jobs account for 2 percent of American jobs – and Brookings used a generous definition, which included public-transit

and waste-management jobs as green.

Even still, Brookings found that green jobs grew at a slower rate (3.4 percent annually) than the national economy (4.2 percent) between 2003 and 2010.

Some Democrats have clued in. Rep. Maxine Waters, D-Calif., recently observed, "Of course we want to be part of the new innovation and green jobs. But you know, the green jobs have been about a lot of talk, and not a lot has been happening on that."

But Team Obama won't give up the dream.

Then again, the administration has friends in the green-titan community. Enter Oklahoma oil magnate George Kaiser, who raised at least \$50,000 for the 2008 Obama campaign and is a frequent visitor to the White House. Kaiser was a top Solyndra investor.

In September 2009, Solyndra became the first recipient of an administration energy loan program that was part of the president's stimulus package. A 2010 Government Accountability Office audit of the program found that five applicants, including Solyndra, bypassed required steps for funding. A Department of Energy spokesperson told The Washington Post that the GAO got it wrong.

The Solyndra decision baffled some industry experts, who questioned the

viability of the company's solar technology. "To think they could compete on any basis, that took a very big leap of faith," solar analyst Ramesh Misra later told the Post.

The House Energy and Commerce Committee has been investigating the Solyndra deal — with little cooperation from the administration Rep. Cliff Stearns, R-Fla., who chairs the investigative subcommittee, noted in a statement, "In an apparent rush to push stimulus dollars out the door, the Obama administration wasted \$535 million in taxpayer funds in guaranteeing a loan to a firm that has proven to be unviable in the global market."

Thursday, White House press secretary Jay Carney defended the loan program with its goal to "invest in cutting-edge technologies."

The president, his Nobel Prizewinning energy secretary and Vice President Joe Biden (via satellite) participated in events that promoted Solyndra's brand. In addition, Solyndra got to spend a half-billion in taxpayer dollars — and still the solar company couldn't succeed.

Stearns and the committee's chairman, Fred Upton, issued a joint state ment that rang true. They said, "We smelled a rat from the onset.'





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Flight 93 video emerges 10 years later

CNHI News Service A video shot moments after the crash of United Airlines Flight 93 into an open field in Pennslyvania on 9/11 has surfaced on the 10th anniversary the 1 minute, 38-second video to Val McClatchey, the woman who shot the only still photograph of Flight 93's haunting, skyward aftermath.

McClatchey recently National Park Service

So, she added, he kept it to himself until he read in the Johnstown, Pa., Tribune-Democrat about the conspiracy controversy surrounding McClatchey's photo. That's when he decided to give her the video to validate her mushroom cloud picture, dubbed "End of Serenity."

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of the tragedy.

The video does not capture the plane's impact. But it clearly shows a mushroom cloud rising from the smoky site of the crash that killed 33 passengers, seven crew members and the four terrorist hijackers.

It was taken by Dave Berkebile, who lived eight miles from the crash scene. The hijackers intended to plunge the plane into the U.S. Capitol building but were overpowered by passengers and the crew.

Berkebile, 80, passed away last February. Five years ago, he gave for an oral history of 9/11. She had endured years of harassment from conspiracy theorists who believe Flight 93 was shot down by U.S. military jets and that her photo was a fake.

Donna Glessner of the National Park Service said the video authenticates the McClatchey photo and also has historic significance because of its timing and content.

"No one else has a video of that smoke cloud," said Glessner. "As far as I know it has not been shown or broadcast anywhere."

Berkebile reports the crash "shook the heck out of the house ... A great big, black cloud just mushroomed right up into the air."

The video will be available at the crash scene's Flight 93 National Memorial, which is being dedicated Saturday as part of the 10th anniversary remembrance of 9/11.

Berkebile's wife, Cathy, said her husband initially offered to show the video to news outlets covering the Flight 93 story, but no one was interested in looking at it.

"We never considered it might be important (until then)," said Mrs. Berkebile.

McClatchey said she only recently turned the video over to the Park Service because she did not want the Berkebiles to experience the conspiracy "fruitcakes harassing them" like they had her.

With the death of Dave Berkebile seven months ago, she added, she decided to donate it to the oral history project.

Libya's former rebels say Gadhafi is now surrounded and trapped

TRIPOLI, Libya (AP) — Libya's former rebels have ousted dictator Moammar Gadhafi surrounded, and it is only a matter of time until he is captured or killed, a top, a spokesman for Tripoli's new military council said Wednesday.

Anis Sharif would not say where Gadhafi had been found, but said he was still in Libya and had been tracked using high technology and human intelligence. Gadhafi is trapped in a 40-mile- (60 kilometer-) radius area surrounded by rebels, he said.

"He can't get out," said Sharif, who added the former rebels are preparing to either detain him or kill him.

Locating Gadhafi would help seal the new rulers' hold on the country. The announcement after convoys of Gadhafi loyalists, including his security chief, fled across the Sahara into Niger in a move that Libya's former rebels hoped could help lead to the surrender of his last strongholds.

Some former rebels depicted the flight to Niger as a major exodus of Gadhafi's most hardcore backers. But confirmed information on the number and identity of those leaving was scarce given the vast swath of desert — over 1,000 miles (1,600 kilometers) — between populated areas on the two sides of the border.

Perry, Romney, Bachmann to face off at first of 3 debates this month

SIMI VALLEY, Calif. (AP) — Rick Perry is looking to make a strong first impression on the national stage. Mitt Romney is hoping for another flawless debate performance. And Michele Bachmann, perhaps, is shooting for relevance in what increasingly appears to be a two-man GOP presidential race.

With the national unemployment rate stuck at 9.1 percent, the economy was likely to dominate Wednesday's debate at the Ronald Reagan Presidential Library. Republicans competing for the chance to challenge President Barack Obama next fall were taking the stage one day before the incumbent Democrat rolls out a jobs-creation plan.

It's the first of three Republican presidential debates scheduled over the next three weeks.

The events promise to shape the GOP presidential race heading into this winter's series of nominating primaries and caucuses. National and state polls show Perry, the Texas governor, and Romney, the former Massachusetts governor, competing for the lead. Bachmann, the Minnesota congresswoman who was running strong in polls earlier this summer, is trailing, along with no less than a half dozen other lesser-known Republicans.

This would be the first debate appearance for Perry, who has been in the race just a few weeks.

Suicide bombers kill 23 in twin blasts in southwest Pakistan

QUETTA, Pakistan (AP) — A pair of suicide bombers attacked a top army officer in Pakistan's southwestern city of Quetta on Wednesday, missing him but killing his wife. At least 22 others died, including several guards, a senior officer and two children, officials said.

Police said they were investigating whether the strike was in revenge for the recent arrests in Quetta of three top al-Qaida suspects, an operation that was assisted by the CIA.

But within hours, the Taliban claimed responsibility for the attack and a spokesman for the group said Brig. Khurram Shahzad, the deputy head of the region's Frontier Corps, was targeted because of an incident several months ago that left five people dead at a checkpoint in the city.

In Wednesday's blasts, the first attacker detonated his vehicle next to a group of Frontier Corps officers close to Shahzad's house. Hurling grenades, the second attacker than stormed the house and blew himself up inside it, police officer Naseer Ahmed Kurd said.

Police officer Hamid Shakil said at least 23 people were killed and more than 60 were injured.

Congress returns, with budget cuts topping autumn agenda

WASHINGTON (AP) — Fights large and small await Congress as it gets back to business, with jobs and budget cuts topping a contentious agenda that also includes a lengthy roster of lower-profile but must-do items that also are potential victims of partisan gridlock.

President Barack Obama is to unveil his jobs agenda in a nationally televised address Thursday night, but early glimpses of the package show it relies heavily on extending expiring programs.

Obama is expected to propose \$300 billion in tax cuts and federal spending to get Americans working again. Republicans on Tuesday offered to compromise with him on jobs — but also assailed his plans in advance of his prime-time speech.

According to people familiar with the White House deliberations, two of the biggest measures in the president's proposals for 2012 are expected to be a one-year extension of a payroll tax cut for workers and an extension of expiring jobless benefits. Together those two would total about \$170 billion.

The people spoke on the condition of anonymity because the plan was still being finalized and some proposals could still be subject to change.

Gunman wielding AK-47 shoots 11 at Nevada IHOP, killing 4

CARSON CITY, Nev. (AP) — The burst of bullets came suddenly in Nevada's capital.

Just before 9 a.m., the gunman stepped onto an IHOP parking lot from his blue minivan with a yellow "Support Our Troops" sticker on it. He opened fire, then continued into the restaurant and marched resolutely toward a table of uniformed National Guard members before shooting each one of them, and fatally wounding three of them, authorities said.

Eduardo Sencion would kill three people and wound eight others in all before shooting himself in the head in front of a bustling business complex in an unexplained display of violence Tuesday. One of the wounded, a woman and National Guard member, would later die at an area hospital.

The breakfast-time massacre sent tremors of fear through Carson City at a time when lawmakers were not in session. In the immediate confusion after the shooting, officials prepared for a citywide assault.

A motive remained unknown late Tuesday, as lawmakers, business owners and law enforcement officials in this close-knit, government-driven city of 50,000 struggled to understand what drove Sencion to turn an AK-47 assault rifle on his hometown.

Bomb blast outside High Court in New Delhi kills 10

NEW DELHI (AP) — A bomb apparently hidden in a briefcase exploded Wednesday outside a top court in New Delhi, killing 10 people in the deadliest attack in the Indian capital in nearly three years.

The bombing, which came while the city already was under high alert, raised questions about India's ability to protect even its most important institutions despite a national security overhaul that followed the 2008 siege of Mumbai.

The government rallied Indians to remain defiant in the face of such attacks.

"We will never succumb to the pressure of terrorists," Prime Minister Manmohan Singh said during a visit to neighboring Bangladesh. "This is a long war in which all political parties and all the people of India will have to stand united so that this scourge of terrorism is crushed."

Mexico ruling party asks mayor, governor

to step down

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Mexico's ruling party has asked the governor of Nuevo Leon state and the mayor of its capital city to step down temporarily while police investigate an arson that killed 52 people and a casino corruption scandal.

President Felipe Calderon's National Action Party, or PAN, said in letters sent Tuesday to Nuevo Leon Gov. Rodrigo Medina and Monterrey Mayor Fernando Larrazabal that they should leave their posts so that the probe into last month's deadly casino arson attack doesn't become "a struggle between political forces."

Larrazabal is a member of the PAN but Medina belongs to the opposition Institutional Revolutionary Party.

Larrazabal's brother, Jonas, has been detained for questioning in a casino-related corruption probe after videotapes became public showing him taking wads of cash inside an unidentified casino just days before the fire in the Casino Royale.

The newspaper Reforma, which published the images of Jonas Larrazabal, estimated that one wad of cash, stuffed inside a cell phone box, contained 400,000 pesos (\$32,000). Reforma reported that Jonas had visited at least three casinos to collect money in the weeks before the August 25 fire.

Jonas Larrazabal's lawyer, Jesus Martinez, has said that his client goes to casinos for fun, like any customer, but also sells them cheese, mezcal and other products from the southern state of Oaxaca.

Fernando Larrazabal told Multimedios television in Monterrey he would consider his party's suggestion to step down and announce a decision on Wednesday.

4 charged after Texas deputy shot, saved by vest

HOUSTON (AP) — Investigators say four people have been charged over the shooting of a Texas deputy whose protective vest stopped the bullet.

The Harris County Sheriff's Office says Deputy Alan Whitlock was shot in the chest Friday during a traffic stop, but wasn't injured by the bullet. Three suspects were arrested hours later.

A sheriff's spokesman says a fourth suspect was captured Tuesday night and has been charged with attempted capital murder of a peace officer. Investigators believe Kendell Davis fired a bullet that went through a patrol car window and struck Whitlock. The deputy suffered minor cuts from flying glass. Electronic jail records didn't list an attorney for Davis, who's held without bond. woman has been charged with evading arrest.

Perry calls on elite team to lead wildfire search

BASTROP (AP) — Gov. Rick Perry says a 100-member search team will comb an area of Texas near Austin for more possible victims from a massive wildfire already blamed for two deaths.

Perry said the search of Bastrop will begin Wednesday morning. The blaze has destroyed more than 600 homes in and around Bastrop. Authorities said Tuesday that two people have died in one of the most destructive Texas wildfires in history.

Perry said late Tuesday he deployed Texas Task Force 1, the state's elite search team, to help local authorities. The team includes a dozen search dogs.

Texas Task Force 1 was also sent to New York following the Sept. 11 attacks and to New Orleans in the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina.

Wildfires have scorched more than 45 square miles around Bastrop.

Shell to pay \$500,000 for pollution in Texas

HOUSTON (AP) — Shell Chemical LP has agreed to pay 500,000 to a Texas County over five different air pollution events at its Deer Park refinery.

The settlement announced Tuesday was reached after Harris County accused Shell Chemical, a unit of Royal Dutch Shell PLC, of failing to notify officials about the toxic releases. There are two schools and many homes close to the refinery in suburban Houston.

Harris County Attorney Vince Ryan says he's pleased Shell agreed to notify officials within 24 hours of any chemical releases. The law already requires petrochemical companies to notify the county, but Shell apparently failed to do so in five events between 2008 and 2010.

Shell released a statement saying the company disputes those claims but settled to resolve the matter.

Man accused of threatening Google exec via Twitter

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A federal grand jury in San Francisco has charged a San Antonio man with harassing a high-ranking Google executive with more than 20,000 Twitter posts, some of which were threatening. According to court records, Gregory Calvin King was arrested in Texas last month and transported to San Francisco to face charges he threatened Google vice president Marissa Mayer, the company's first female engineer. King's Twitter account shows him sending thousands of threatening posts to Mayer.

King faces up to seven years in prison if convicted. His arraignment date hasn't been set.

Google did not immediately respond to a request for comment.

Texas voting district maps argued in court

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — Attorneys for minority groups that sued the state argued Tuesday that Republican lawmakers discriminated when they drew new district lines for Congress and the Texas House districts.

The attorneys contended that the maps illegally dilute the voting strength of Hispanics and blacks and do not reflect the boom in Hispanic population in Texas over the last decade. Several lawsuits were consolidated into one trial, which started Tuesday in San Antonio and is expected last until Sept. 16.

"I believe there was a preference in design to protect Anglos at the expense of minorities," said state Rep. Trey Martinez Fischer, a San Antonio Democrat who is chairman of the Mexican American Legislative Caucus.

Defense attorneys say the new district boundaries, which are required every 10 years to reflect changes in the Census data, were motivated by politics, not race.


The state is getting four new seats in Congress because of population growth, mostly among Hispanics. The groups suing, which include MALC, the Mexican American Legal Defense and Educational Fund and others, had hoped the new districts would include more minority-led seats.

Rather, attorneys argued, minority voters were packed into existing minority districts, leaving behind Hispanics who are less likely to turn out for elections.

BASTROP (AP) Firefighting crews started Wednesday to gain control of a wind-fueled blaze that has raged unchecked across parched Central Texas for days, leaving a trail of charred properties in its wake and causing thousands of people to flee.

At least two people have died in the wildfire, which has destroyed more than 600 homes and blackened about 45 square miles in and around Bastrop, a city near Austin.

Texas Task Force 1, an elite search team that was sent to New York following the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks and to New Orleans in the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina, will be assisting in Bastrop.

The team has dogs that can help look for people trapped in debris, Chief Bob McKee told The Associated Press. "We also have human remains canines that would scent

on deceased persons or animals," McKee said.

Crews finally got a reprieve Tuesday from winds pushed in by Tropical Storm Lee that whipped the blaze into an inferno over the weekend. Texas Forest Service spokeswoman April Saginor said the Bastrop fire was 30 percent contained early Wednesday, and that the lighter winds were assisting firefighters in their efforts.

"Even though the fuels are critically dry, the grass is dry and the relative humidity is still pretty low, they were able to take advantage of lower winds," Saginor said.

The blaze in Bastrop is the most catastrophic of the more than 180 fires that have erupted in the past week across Texas, marking one of the most devastating wildfire outbreaks in state history. The fires have destroyed more than 1,000 homes,

caused four deaths and pulled the state's firefighting ranks to the limit.

In a housing development near Bastrop, Willie Clements' twostory colonial home was reduced to a heap of metal roofing and ash. A picket fence was melted. Some goats and turkeys survived, but about 20 chickens and ducks died in a coop that went up in flames.

"We lost everything," said Clements, who with his family took a picture of themselves in front of a windmill adorned with a charred red, white and blue sign that proclaimed, "United We Stand."

"This is the beginning of our new family album," the 51-year-old said.

Texas Gov. Rick Perry cut short a presidential campaign trip to South Carolina to deal with the crisis, and on Tuesday toured a blackened area near Bastrop.

"Pretty powerful visuals of individuals who lost everything," Perry said after the tour. "The magnitude of these losses are pretty stunning."

The conservative Republican said he expects federal assistance with the wildfires but complained that red tape was keeping available bulldozers and other heavy equipment at the Army's Fort Hood, about 75 miles from Bastrop. The post was fighting its own 3,700-acre blaze.

White House spokesman Jay Carney said the Obama administration has approved seven federal grants to help Texas with the latest wildfires.

About 1,200 firefighters battled the blazes, including crews from as far away as California and Oregon. Five heavy tanker planes, some from the federal government, and three aircraft

capable of scooping 1,500 gallons of lake water at a time also helped.

The disaster is blamed largely on Texas' yearlong drought, one of the most severe dry spells the state has ever seen.

The fire in Bastrop County is the most devastating wildfire in Texas in more than a decade, eclipsing a blaze that destroyed 168 homes in North Texas in April.

At least 11 other fires exceeded 1,000 acres Tuesday, including a 7,000-acre blaze that has destroyed at least 60 homes and threatened hundreds more about 40 miles northwest of Houston.

An 8.000-acre has destroyed at least six homes in Caldwell County, next to Bastrop County. In far northeast Texas' Cass County, a 7,000-acre fire burned in heavy timberland.

About 40 people who fled their homes in a Bastrop neighborhood were staying at a community center in the town of Paige.

A volunteer, Debbie Barrington, said some people have been sleeping outside on picnic tables under a pavilion.

"The first night, we had a child 17 months old," she said. "We didn't have milk. The next morning, I think we had eight gallons."

His attendance at a debate Wednesday night in




California — it would be his first on the national stage — is now in question.

Win over TCU pushes Baylor up in rankings

NEW YORK (AP) -Winning the biggest game of college football's opening weekend boosted LSU to No. 2 in The Associated Press Top 25.

No. 1 Oklahoma held on to the top spot in the first regular-season rankings, while the Tigers used their 40-27 victory against Oregon to jump rival Alabama, which slipped to No. 3.

"It's way too early to feel like we have accom. coach Les Miles said. "Our guys understand the need to improve

each game."

The Sooners received 32 of 60 first-place votes and 1,448 points. LSU received 17 first-place votes and 1,415 points.

Alabama had nine first-place votes, and two voters had No. 4 Boise State top-ranked after the Broncos' impressive 35-21 win against Georgia. Florida State moved up to No. 5.

Oregon dropped nine spots to No. 13 and defending national chamstarted the season at No. 23, fell out of the Top 25 after needing a late rally

to beat Utah State 42-38 at home.

The Tigers became just the second defending national champions since the preseason poll started in 1950 to fall out of the rankings after the first week of the season in the first regular-season poll — though the circumstances were far different the first time it happened.

Alabama, the 1964 AP '65 season ranked No. 5. plished anything," LSU pion Auburn, which The Crimson Tide lost 18-17 to Georgia to open the season and dropped out, but The Associ-

ated Press only ranked 10 teams that season. Alabama eventually returned to the Top 10 and won another national title.

The 1961 Minnesota team is the only defending champion to be unranked in the preseason poll.

Wilson shuts out Rays in blinding 8-0 win

ST. PETERSBURG (AP) -C.J. Wilson got his first career shutout on a record-setting night for the Texas Rangers.

Wilson threw a five-hitter, David Murphy drove in four runs and the AL West-leading Rangers beat the Tampa Bay Rays 8-0 on Tuesday night.

"He told us in the fifth inning that he was going to finish," Texas manager Ron Washington said. "He had a

good cutter working. Tight slider. Moving his fastball around. He was in control."

The Rangers have 18 shutouts this season, one more than the previous team record set in 1977.

"Wow ... It's awesome," Washington said.

Wilson (15-6) matched his career high in wins from last year and became the first Texas left-hander to record 15 or more wins in consecutive seasons. He threw 117 pitches in his third complete game of the year.

"I had enough pitches going," said Wilson, who struck out six and walked three. "I was just mixing well."

Murphy and Ian Kinsler homered for the Rangers, who are 3-2 on a six-game trip to Boston and Tampa Bay. Adrian Beltre extended his hitting streak to 12 games with a third-inning single.

Tampa Bay right-hander Jeff Niemann (9-7) gave up seven runs and nine hits in 4 2-3 innings. He has lost three of his last four starts.

Kinsler tied his own team record, set in 2009, with his seventh leadoff homer this season in the first. He has 26 homers this year, including five in his last six games.

Murphy started the second with his ninth homer, then hit a two-run double during Texas' three-run third that made it 5-0. Josh Hamilton also had an RBI double in the third.

Hamilton tweaked his back during the game, but still played eight innings.

Mariners handle Angels again

ANAHEIM (AP) — With roughly three weeks left in the playoff race, Torii Hunter realizes every loss stings the Los Angeles Angels. This defeat only hurt a bit less because of the brilliance of the pitcher who delivered it.

Felix Hernandez pitched eight innings of four-hit ball to win at Angel Stadium for the first time since 2006, and the Seattle Mariners snapped a five-game skid with a 2-1 victory over the Angels on Tuesday night.

Alberto Callaspo drove in an unearned run for the Angels, who committed four errors and dropped 3½ games behind Texas in the AL West standings. The loss was just the Angels' second at home since Aug. 17.

The Rangers pounded Tampa Bay 8-0 earlier Tuesday. Los Angeles was a season-high 13 games over .500 after Monday's win over the Mariners, but still faces an uphill climb in the regular season's final three weeks to make the playoffs for the seventh time in 10 seasons.

"Texas is playing good ball, and we're just trying to keep up with those guys, so $3\frac{1}{2}$ games behind is still pretty good right now," Hunter said. "Today we faced Felix Hernandez, and they had (Tampa Bay starter Jeff) Niemann over there, so there's a difference."

Justin Smoak and Kyle Seager scored unearned runs for the Mariners, who had lost 18 of their last 21 games in Anaheim before Hernandez (14-11) outdueled Ervin Santana and silenced the Angels' improved lineup for his sixth victory in eight starts.

"You're going to have nights like that," Angels manager Mike Scioscia said. "When you're facing a tough pitcher, you can't crack the door open for him. They scratched together a couple of runs and made them hold up."

Santana (11-10) yielded seven hits and two walks over six muddled innings in his 200th career start for the Angels, losing for just the second time in 13 starts. Although he didn't give up an earned run, he allowed a baserunner in every inning, and his usually surehanded teammates weren't much help.

"He's got great stuff and has great stats, so I knew it was going to be a close game," Santana said. "It was just one of

Hockey team dies in crash

MOSCOW (AP) – A Russian jet carrying a local ice hockey team Wednesday crashed while taking off in western Russia, killing 36 people and leaving one critically injured, officials said.

The Russian Emergency Situations Ministry said the Yak-42 plane immediately crashed after taking off from an airport near the city of Yaroslavl, on the Volga River about 240 kilometers (150 miles) northeast of Moscow. It said one person survived the crash with grave injuries.

The ministry said the plane was carrying the Lokomotiv ice hockey team from Yaroslavl.

The team was heading to Minsk, the capital of Belarus, where it was to play Thursday against Dinamo Minsk in the opening game of the season of the Continental Hockey League. The CHL is a league of several ex-Soviet nations.

After Hernandez retired the final seven batters he faced, Brandon League pitched the ninth for his 33rd save in 38 chances.

Hernandez improbably hadn't won in Anaheim since June 11, 2006 – also his first career complete game. He has just six victories in 25 career starts against the Mariners' division rivals, but after failing to beat the Angels at all since Sept. 29, 2009, Hernandez has two wins over Los Angeles in seven days.

On Aug. 31 in Seattle, Hernandez finally beat the Angels for the first time in nine tries, pitching a five-hitter.

"He pitches at a level that very few do, but even at his level, he's been a little bit better lately," said Wedge, whose club stranded 14 runners. "We just didn't get the two-out knocks today, but I was really impressed with our defense. ... It was a great challenge on both sides, but Felix is just a special pitcher with special stuff, and he was on tonight."



NEW YORK (AP) — Whether or not she ends up holding the trophy at the end, Serena Williams has no competition at the U.S. Open this vear.

She is the top personality, the woman to watch in a sport that has struggled of late to find, and hold onto, a compelling star.

Part of it is because of the basic numbers — Williams has 13 Grand Slam titles compared to the grand total of zero from the other seven women left in the field.

Part of it is the image - a mercurial and physically intimidating presence on the court, who can charm people when she's off of it.

"There are certain people who are pretty special," said Tracy Austin, who was one of those people back in her day, "and sometimes we don't appreciate it 'til they're gone."

Williams' run at the title is scheduled to resume Wednesday night in Arthur Ashe Stadium, where she'll play Anastasia Pavlyuchenkova, a 20-year-old Russian matching her deepest run in a major.

Play on Tuesday was washed out when a slow-moving rainstorm moved over the Big Apple and forced tournament officials to push several matches involving top players - Andy Roddick, Andy Murray and Caroline Wozniacki — onto outside courts when play resumes.

Williams, though, will be on center stage, as usual, and figures to be for the rest of the week. A favorite coming into the tournament, her odds have only grown shorter -4-11 at some sports books in Europe — as the other "big names" in her sport have lost (Maria Sharapova), withdrawn (Serena's sister, Venus) or failed to show up (Kim Clijsters).

"Of course there's a chance. That's why you play in sports," Austin said when asked if anyone else could even dream of beating Williams this week.

"But it's a smaller chance. I've said in the past that I thought a certain player was a favorite, maybe Serena was the favorite or Justine (Henin) was a favorite. But I can't remember a time in a while when there was as big a gap between Serena, the favorite, and the rest.

"For her to lose the U.S. Open, she's going to have to have a really bad day and someone else is going to have to have a day where

they're just really in the zone."

The candidates include Wozniacki, who has been to only one Grand Slam final, and No. 2 Vera Zvonareva, who has been to two Grand Slam finals and won a total of eight games, five of them against Williams at Wimbledon last year.

Also last year, Zvonareva fell 6-2, 6-1 to Clijsters, the two-time defending champion who would have likely been Williams' best competition here had she not pulled out before the tournament with an injury.

In 1986, Desmond Tutu was installed as the first black to lead the Anglican Church in southern Africa.


In 1996, rapper Tupac Shakur was shot and mortally wounded on the Las Vegas Strip; he died six days later.




