# Wife jailed

Murder suspect's spouse in custody

The wife of a suspect charged with murder in the May 21 shooting of a Lamesa man is in custody, according to local law enforcement officials. Rosalina

Garcia, wife 30-yearmurder suspect Jose Americo Garcia, was taken into custody by investigators with the

Texas Rangers Wednesday in Lamesa, nearly a month after fleeing the United States to Mexico with her husband and two children.

According to unofficial reports, Rosalinda Garcia has confirmed what law enforcement officials have feared since the arrest warrant was issued May 21: Jose Garcia is currently in Mexico.

Law enforcement officials said Rosalinda Garcia was arrestede in Lamesa and taken to Stanton, where she was processed and booked by the Martin County Sheriff's Office. Soon after, she was transferred to the Howard County Jail on a charge of hindering the apprehension of a fugi-



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

# **Proper use of** safey seats urged

According to figures from the National Center for Health Statistics, motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of death for children 14 years old and younger. The National Highway Safety Administration (NHTSA) estimates that three out of four child safety seats are not used correctly.

Correctly installed child safety seats and booster seats save lives — offering the best protection for children in the event of a crash. "When it comes to the safety of your

children, there is no room for mistake. Child restraint seats can be complicated to install and use correctly. We want to make sure Texas families are buckling their children up right," said Carol T. was reported during the morning hours of May 21, when a local resident called 911 to report someone had been shot at their residence in the 3100 block of County Road D 3600 in central Martin County.

Deputies with the Martin County Sheriff's Office arrived on the scene to find 32-year-old Anau Rodriguez Villagrana of Lamesa suffering from a single gunshot wound to the head.

According to MCSH Chief Deputy Ernest Wakefield, Villagrana was still breathing when emergency responders transported him to Midland Memorial Hospital. However, the Lamesa man was pronounced dead just before noon by Justice of the Peace Joe

Matlock.

The whereabouts of the Garcias' children a 5-year-old girl and a 4-year-old son — are unknown at this time, according to law enforcement officials.

Rosalinda Garcia's arrest is the second related to the murder, as Jose Angel Pena-Alvarez — who is believed to be an associate of Jose Garcia — was arrested earlier this month while attempting to cross from Mexico into the United

According to uncon-

firmed reports. Pena-Alvarez allegedly witnessed the shooting and fled with Garcia to Mexico. It's unclear if Pena-Alvarez is in federal custody.

The U.S. Marshals Service is heading the investigation due to the allegations Garcia fled the country to avoid

prosecution. Jose Garcia was last

seen driving a 1999 Black Chevrolet Suburban with Texas license plate number 747-LDT.

Anyone with information regarding his location is asked to call 911 or the Martin County Sheriff's office at 432-756-3336. Martin County Sheriff John Woodward said Garcia is assumed to be armed and danger-

Garcia is believed to have ties to the Lubbock area and Mexico.

ments," said Debbie Erdwurm, Alzheimer's Association regional director.

This year, an estimated 150 people attended the walk, which according to Erdwurm, is the usual number. The event took off with a few opening words from Malinda Flenniken, general manager of KBST, followed by a flag ceremony and the playing of the national anthem.

"This year is really hard and special because the Promise Garden is in the honor of Nancy Jones — director of RSVP and strong supporter and starter of the Alzheimer's Walk in Big Spring," Erdwurm said. Jones passed away earlier this year.

Alzheimer's has moved up to the sixth leading cause of death in the United States and the fifth for those over 60. There are five million people in the U.S. living with Alzheimer's. "This is one of those

things where people don't want to get diagnosed because they think if there is nothing to do about it then why wurm said. "With this disease, early detection is the key. The medicines won't stop it, but they can provide a much better quality of life."

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

Though a few are hanging in, half of the planet's 7,000 languages will be extinct by the end of this century, experts say. On average, two are signing off each month and many hundreds of languages are spoken by fewer than 50 people each. One teetering language is spo-

ken by only two men — both in their 80's — in Ayapana, Mexico. They are said to be "men of

few words, indifferent to each other's company." Maybe the Ayapanic language is already deceased, lacking only a death certificate.

Words quake at the prospect of dismissal. More in vogue are symbols and abbreviations spewing through space in fragments. Purists also moan about the

dependence on "spell check," believing that it often makes bad matters worse. The "app" (yep, that's a new

word) gets "A's" on spelling, but 'pleads the fifth" on assurance of proper word usage.

A newspaper obituary a while

back said the deceased was a longtime "soil conversationalist."

It is more likely that the writer's intended reference was to his professional title: "soil conservationist."

Spell check, obviously, does only that. When wrong words traipse by, spell check police wave 'em right on through. Those with eyes to see still

may ponder books — the printed kind and others — that have no literary shortcuts. Simon Winchester's The Meaning of Everything, was a national best-seller. It's a fascinating account hundreds of scholars who worked more than 70 years before birthing the Oxford English Diction-

There were deliberations aplenty — sometimes marked by feuds — over pronunciation, accent marks, meanings, etc., in "the grandfather of all wordbooks." Indeed, wheels turned slowly back when words seem to matter a great deal more.

More recently, James W. Pennebaker's The Secret Life of Pronouns details fascinating claims that frequency and patterns of word use provide windows into people's personalities and social connections. A powerful computer program extracted the data.

One example concerns the use of pronouns, specifically "I" words.

Examination of the work of 18 poets — half of whom committed suicide — revealed that suicidal writers used far more "I" related pronouns than the other half that chose to live on.

He also contended that "I" words used sparingly may indicate plans of political leaders to carry out threats. He cited this pattern in the words of Harry Truman before atomic bombs were unleashed, and in Adolf Hitler's speeches before the invasion of Poland.

Words still come in handy for Garrison Keillor, an absolute artist with words.

He's just completed a coast-tocoast "Summer Love" tour, with most of the 25 shows sell-outs rewarded by standing ovations. Part of his magic stems from spinning local medleys spun for each city.

We caught his three-hour show in Fort Worth, where his best line described some of today's youth adorned by metal above the shoulders.

"They look like they fell face first into a tackle box," he said. Garrison and his entourage covered thousands of miles in a handsome tour bus. Maybe Keillor, now 69, got "travel tips" from a colorful sports personality, John Madden. When coach Madden switched to telecasts, he bade good-bye to flying, opting evermore to favor a wellequipped bus for cross-country travel. (Madden hopes to never hold another plane boarding pass in his hand.)

Madden, too, got a lot out of words, even if simply "boom, zap or zoom." For him, a golf term claimed for his errant tee-shots also "fits" his approach to life. He calls it "FIDO." "Forget it, drive on," he suggests for happiness on the golf course--and in daily life.

It's tough to argue with this philosophy. Still, we wish for some middle ground between "sticks and stones and the words that will never hurt us." The thought of the demise of words and languages hurts. Both may some day be buried in adjoining graves.

The Iraq war isn't over just quite yet

o U.S. troops were killed in Iraq last month. So why aren't we celebrating? Because the war isn't over yet and it costs way too much — in Iraqi lives and our money. With so much attention and so

many billions of our tax dollars shifting from Iraq to the devastating and ever more expensive war in Afghanistan, it's too easy to forget that there are still almost 50,000 U.S. troops occupying Iraq. We're still paying almost \$50 billion just this year for the Iraq War. And while we don't hear about it very often, too **P**HYLLIS many Iraqis are still being killed. **BENNIS** 

There's an awful lot of discussion underway about the supposedly massive Pentagon budget cuts that are looming as part of a new deficit deal. But those potential cuts don't even touch the

billion for Afghanistan, just this year alone. Just imagine what we could do with those funds. We could create and fund new middle-class green jobs for 3.4 million workers. Many of the thousands of soldiers we could bring home from those useless

actual war funding — \$48 billion for Iraq and \$122

wars could get some of those jobs. Barack Obama, back when he was a presidential candidate, promised he would end the Iraq War. In 2002, he called it "a dumb war." The U.S. role in the war has gotten smaller but it isn't over — and it hasn't gotten any smarter. Last year, Obama said all combat operations in Iraq were about to end. But 50,000 or so troops are still there, training Iraqi security forces and, oh yes, conducting counterterrorism operations. Don't "counterterrorism opera-

tions" count as combat? Even worse, the Obama administration, following George W. Bush's footsteps, seems committed to keeping U.S. troops in Iraq beyond the December 31 deadline the U.S. and Iraqi governments agreed to back in 2008. That agreement was supposed to be absolute - $\cdot$  all U.S. troops had to leave by the end of this year.

There were loopholes, of course — the agreement said all Pentagon-paid military contractors had to leave too, but didn't mention those paid by the State Department. So guess which agency is taking over the check-writing to pay the thousands of mercenaries preparing to stay in Iraq for the long haul?

But now Washington is ratcheting up the pressure on Iraq's weak and corrupt government, pushing Baghdad's leadership to "invite" U.S. troops to stay just a little bit longer. Iraq's elected parliament, like the vast majority of the Iraqi people, wants all the troops out. But democratic accountability doesn't seem to operate any better in Iraq than it does here in the United States. So the Iraqi cabinet made its own decision, without any messy consultations with the parliament, to "open negotiations" with Washington over how many U.S. troops would continue occupying the country and for how long.

Of course it's good news that no U.S. soldiers were killed in Iraq in August. The bad news is that scores of Iraqi civilians were killed. We don't know exactly how many — the Pentagon says it doesn't do body

But we know some of them. On one day alone, August 15, The New York Times reported 89 Iraqis killed and another 315 injured in apparently coordinated attacks. And on the last day of the month, at least seven Iraqis were killed and 25 wounded. Those are just the ones we heard about.

The Iraq War isn't over, and we still can't afford dumb wars. We need to bring those 50,000 troops and those 50 billion dollars home.

I am tired of sending our wealth to countries that use the money to attack our way of life. With Canada having the world's third-largest oil deposit, it makes perfect sense to purchase as much oil as we can from our friendly neighbors to the North.

I have personally witnessed the precautions and safety measures that Trans-Canada upholds to construct and operate their pipeline systems. I can honestly say from a safety standpoint, they are one of the best pipeline operators in our country today. If a pipeline is built right, it is the safest and most economical way to transport any liquid. With over 13,000 construction jobs and 118,000 spin off jobs hanging in the balance and an estimated \$600 million dollars in new tax revenues for the communities, what better way is there to stimulate the economy?

This pipeline comes at a time when we need jobs, friendly oil supplies and private sector investments in our country. Trans-Canada has pledged to transport up to 15 percent of this pipeline's capacity with U.S. oil production to be picked up along its proposed route. #### Class of 1971 – Ringing in the Memories

TO THE EDITOR:

My family moved to Big Spring in the summer of 1967. I was happy to discover I would be starting the ninth grade in the newly constructed and just completed Big Spring High School. I remember that first day at BSHS very clearly. Being new in town, I had no friends. As a 14-year-old my instincts had warned me I was going to have to apply my best adolescent social skills (whatever those were) to make some new friends and make them fast. Mom let me out of our '65 Ford Galaxie 500 at the end of Austin Street on 11th Place — right in front of the shiny new high school auditorium. I zeroed in on a young man standing at the bottom of the steps leading into the auditorium. He was kind of shuffling his feet and kicking a little dirt and rocks around a water meter box. There was no grass yet, just dirt, some rocks and that meter box. I knew kicking dirt and rocks was something I was good at, so I walked right up to this young man, kicked a little dirt around and introduced myself. He said his name was Brad Cederberg. Brad and I discovered we were close neighbors and immediately became best of friends.

A few days later on a Tuesday night, Brad, Bobby Walker and I showed up for the first meeting in the new school year of Key Club International. Ninth grade was new to BSHS in 1967 and the Key Club in Big Spring had never considered membership for ninth graders. I recall that meeting and some of the upper class-men speaking out against letting the freshmen join. But in the end, Brad, Bobby and I were the first freshmen voted into the Key Club. It was in that meeting the Key Club and the men who sponsored it became a huge part of my high school experience.

The Key Club was a service organization sponsored by Kiwanis to build leadership and character in young men. Maybe a little leadership and character happened, but the Key Club seemed very focused on promoting school spirit in those days. Have you seen or heard the ring of the BSHS Victory Bell lately? I don't know what has been the history of the Victory Bell in the last 40 years, but in our time it was clearly in the keeping of the Key Club. I wouldn't have remembered the Victory Bell before 1967 but it looks like that was its first year. The '67-68 year book says, "The Victory Bell was finished before the new year begins." And as freshman that year Brad, Bobby and I got to ride and ring the Victory Bell in the homecoming parade. All during our high school years the Key Club borrowed brand new loaner cars from local dealerships to pull the Victory Bell to every away football game. One of our fund raisers during those years was to purchase the Keystone Mag wheels that are still on the Victory Bell trailer today. Those chrome hub caps were just not good enough for it. One can't over emphasize the grandeur the Victory Bell possessed. It's hard to remember all the facts about this, but the Victory Bell was stolen by Key Club members of a rival football team in 1969. The enemies understood the power the Victory Bell represented at BSHS. It could have just been hiding out in Ricky Simpson's garage, but the couple of weeks it was missing added significantly to the mystique of the revered Victory Bell.

Perhaps you've seen "The Book of Questions" by Gregory Stock, Ph.D. One of my favorites is question 28, "What is your most treasured memory?" My time with the Key Club in Big Spring High School and the Victory Bell may not be my most treasured memory but it is up toward the top of the list.

You won't find my senior picture in the '71 year book because getting a picture made was not a priority of mine that summer. I really did graduate and this year really is my 40th class reunion. I've discovered that reunions might in some ways be like going to heaven. I'm sure heaven will be better, but at reunions you see people you haven't seen in years or people you thought you would never see again. They can look different from what you remember, almost like a new body or face sometimes, but down deep on a very human level you still connect, and just seeing them again somehow adds more meaning to how your life has unfolded.

They've poured concrete over that water meter box in front of the auditorium where Brad Cederberg and I stood kicking dirt and rocks all those years ago. Brad had such talent and potential and I was sad to learn he lost his life while attending college shortly after graduation. I've missed seeing Brad over the years. The Class of '71 has lost too many friends who will not have their picture made at the 40th class reunion. That makes me a fortunate son to be pulling the Victory Bell in this year's homecoming parade. And we'll be ringing the Victory Bell at the football game. We'll be ringing the Victory Bell so the Big Spring Steers can beat the snot out of the Greenwood Rangers. But we'll also be ringing the Victory Bell in memory of good times, great friends, great men and Kiwanians. I wish I could recall every name of the men in those years who invested their time with the young men in the Key Club. Two who were influential to me personally were Henry Thames

and Leon Taylor. Anyone with memories of those Key Club years is welcome to ride with the Victory Bell in this year's homecoming parade. That includes the calendar girls, too. Those Key Club Sweethearts who had their picture in the school calendar we sold as a fund raiser every year. Let me hear from you. Bobby Walker has said he will

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



#### Vintage plane crashes near grandstand at Nevada air race. killing 3 and injuring more than 50

RENO, Nev. (AP) — Friends of an air racer and movie stunt pilot whose plane crashed into the edge of the grandstand at a show said the 74-yearold was a skilled airman and member of a tightknit flying community.

Pilot Jimmy Leeward of Ocala, Fla., died in the crash Friday after apparently losing control of the P-51 Mustang, which spiraled into a box seat area at the National Championship Air Races at about 4:30 p.m. Friday. Leeward and at least two others were killed; dozens were injured.

Family members were at the air show and saw the crash, said Reno Air Races President and CEO Mike Houghton. "They obviously are devastated," he said. "I

talked to Jimmy's son and his wife wanted me to know that Jimmy would not want us to cancel the races but sometimes you have to do things that are not very popular."

Leeward's pilot's medical records were up-todate, and he was "a very qualified, very experienced pilot," Houghton said. He'd been racing at the show in Reno since 1975.

#### General Motors, union, reach deal on 4-year contract that sweetens profit sharing, adds jobs

DETROIT (AP) — General Motors Co. and the United Auto Workers, sobered by the government bailout and bankruptcy just two years ago, agreed on a new four-year contract without the public acrimony or strikes that have plagued the talks in

Details weren't released, but the union said the deal reached late Friday includes some of its major goals, including improvements in profit-sharing, promises of new jobs and better health care benefits. The deal will serve as a template for contracts that still must be negotiated with Chrysler Group LLC and Ford Motor Co., setting the pay and benefits for 112,500 U.S. auto workers. It also will set the bar for pay and benefits at nonunion auto companies and other industries across the country.

The talks are the first since GM and Chrysler needed government aid to make it through bankruptcy protection in 2009.

"When GM was struggling, our members shared in the sacrifice. Now that the company is posting profits again, our members want to share in the success," UAW Vice President Joe Ashton, the chief negotiator with GM, said in a statement.

The deal likely will include sweeter profit-sharing checks instead of raises for most of GM's 48,500 union workers in the U.S. Also likely is a raise for entry-level workers who make \$14 to \$16 per hour, about half the pay of a longtime auto worker. It also will include creative ways to cut GM's labor costs, which are still higher than those at nonunion U.S. plants owned by foreign competitors.

#### Libyan fighters struggle to regroup after Bani Walid retreat

BANI WALID, Libva (AP) — Revolutionary fighters struggled to regroup Saturday outside the loyalist stronghold of Bani Walid after being driven back by fierce resistance from followers of Moammar Gadhafi, temporarily quieting one battlefield while a second offensive sought to capture Gadhafi's hometown from followers of his shat-There were no signs anti-Gadhafi forces were

seeking to make a swift counter punch into Bani Walid, a mountain enclave about 90 miles (140 kilometers) southeast of Tripoli. The fighters withdrew Friday after facing withering sniper fire and shelling from loyalists units holding strategic positions above the valley entrance to the town. "This may be the worst front Libya will see," said

fighter Osama Al-Fassi. "I don't think we will have orders to move in today." Meanwhile, more families fled the town. At least

a dozen cars streamed out during the lull in the The tough defense of the holdout bastions of Bani

Walid and Sirte — on Libya's central Mediterranean coast — displayed the firepower and resolve of the Gadhafi followers and suggested Libya's new rulers may not easily break the back of regime holdouts. It also raised fears the country could face a protracted insurgency of the sort that has played out in Iraq and Afghanistan.

#### Lawyer for 2 jailed Americans in Iran files bail papers in Tehran court

TEHRAN, Iran (AP) — The defense lawyer for two Americans jailed in Iran moved ahead with bail arrangements on Saturday, as international efforts intensified to seal a freedom-for-bail deal for the two men, convicted of spying.

Attorney Masoud Shafiei told The Associated Press he was in court, "following up the case" of Shane Bauer and Josh Fattal. Shafiei said he hopes Iran's judiciary will clear the way for payment of \$1 million in exchange for the Americans' release. Bauer and Fattal were detained along the Iran-

Iraq border in July 2009 with their friend Sarah Shourd. She was released last September with mediation by Oman after \$500,000 was paid. They maintain their innocence.

The first word of the bail offer for Bauer and Fattal, who have been in jail more than two years, came earlier this week from Iranian President Mahmoud Ahmadinejad. He said the Americans could be freed in a matter of days. But Iran's powerful judiciary then responded that the bail provisions were still under review.

The mixed signals could reflect the bitter internalpolitical feuds inside Iran between Ahmadinejad and the country's ruling clerics, who control the courts. Ahmadinejad and his allies are accused of trying to challenge the power of Iran's Islamic establishment.

#### **European Union weighs tax on** financial transactions to make banks share bailout burden

WROCLAW, Poland (AP) — European Union finance ministers are debating a tax on financial transactions that would raise money for the EU and make banks share bailout burdens with tax-

The tax would take a tiny fraction from a wide range of financial dealings and use the money to relieve member states' membership contributions

France and Germany support the idea but Britain is opposed because London is a major financial

Belgian Finance Minister Didier Reynders said ahead of Saturday's meeting that if a tax can't be imposed on all 27 EU members, then it could be

discussed for 17 that use the euro. That group doesn't include Britain.

The U.S. opposes such a tax, and many say it won't work unless imposed globally.

resume Saturday. Authorities have been in the area since Monday searching for any clues in Powell's disappearance, but won't specifically say what led to the decision to search this corner of southern Juab County.

The area is about 30 miles south of where Powell's husband, Josh Powell, told police he took his two young children camping on the night she vanished. He told police he and their young sons — then 4 and 2 —left his wife at home about 12:30 a.m. The 4-year-old confirmed the trip to police.

#### Denver prosecutors accuse 2 men of running up tab on dead friend's debit card; body was in car

DENVER (AP) — Two men are accused of driving around Denver with a dead friend, running up a bar tab on his account and using his ATM card at a strip club in what appeared to be a disturbing reflection of the movie "Weekend at Bernie's."

Robert Young, 43, and Mark Rubinson, 25, have been charged with abusing a corpse, identity theft and criminal impersonation.

It's unclear how Jeffrey Jarrett, 43, died, but the men are not charged in his death. The coroner said toxicology tests were pending. Young and Rubinson are free on bond but couldn't be reached for comment Friday.

In the 1989 Hollywood comedy, two ne'er-do-wells find their boss dead at his ritzy beachfront home and escort his body around town, attempting to save the weekend of luxury they had planned.

In Denver last month, according to a police affidavit that gives an account of a story first reported by the Denver Post,

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# Chicken Peach Salsa is a healthy, colorful and delicious dish

Seasonal peaches are still available in September, so now is a good time to get creative with this juicy fruit and pair it with chicken for a new flavor combination.

Peaches are native to China although the scientific name persica and the word peach are derived from an early European belief that they were native to Persia, now present day Iran. Peach varieties are divided into clingstones and freestones, depending on whether the flesh sticks to the pit or not. .

Panko, the Japanese version of breadcrumbs, tend to be lighter, crispier and crunchier than traditional

breadcrumbs.

The salsa includes jalapeno for a touch of zest and heat with mint for cool freshness. Adding this fruit salsa to a poultry dish is consistent with a healthy, cancer-protective diet based on mostly plant foods such as fruits and vegetables.

#### **Chicken Peach Salsa**

Peach Salsa

Canola oil cooking spray 4 medium peaches, halved and pitted

2 green onions (scallions), finely sliced

1 small jalapeño pepper, seeded and finely chopped

1 lime, juice and zest 1/4 cup fresh cilantro chopped

> 2 Tbsp. fresh mint chopped 1 tsp. honey (optional)

Spray grill or grill pan with cooking spray. Heat to medium high heat. Place peaches flesh side down and cook for about 3 to 4 minutes. Flip and cook for another 3 to 4 minutes until peach is tender and heated through. Remove from heat and set aside to cool.

In a medium bowl, mix remaining ingredients and season with salt and pepper. When peaches are cool enough to handle chop into

chunks, add and gently toss to thoroughly combine salsa. Cover and set aside for at least 30 minutes or make in advance and refrigerate.

Makes about 2 1/2 cups

1 tsp. garlic powder 1/4 tsp. cayenne pepper Salt and freshly ground

black pepper, to taste 1 egg, beaten 4 (1 lb. total) chicken

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Spray a baking sheet with cooking spray and set aside.

In bowl, season panko with garlic powder, cayenne pepper if using and salt and pepper to taste.

Place egg in shallow bowl and panko crumbs in another bowl. Dip chicken into egg, then dredge chicken in panko crumbs. Arrange on baking sheet repeating with remaining cutlets.

Bake chicken on each side for 10 minutes for total cooking time of 20 minutes. Then broil for about 2 to 3 minutes or until golden brown.



Q: Do fresh fruits that are high in antioxidants keep that antioxidant content when dried?

A: Yes, dried fruits can be very good sources of antioxidants despite losing most of the water-soluble vitamin C (one antioxidant) present in their fresh forms. Research now shows that for most fruits, the majority of antioxidant power stems from their many

natural plant compaounds called phytochemicals.

Dried cherries and cranberries remain high in anthocyanins, which are antioxidant, anti-inflammatory compounds that, at least in laboratory studies, also slow development of cancer. Dried apricots provide somewhat less beta-carotene in their quartercup standard serving than you get in a half-cup of fresh apricots, but both forms are excellent sources. Furthermore, total content of phytochemicals

called phenols are similar.

Raisins retain many of the beneficial phytochemicals found in grapes, and studies rate their antioxidant power similar, even considering raisins deliver that antioxidant power in a much smaller serving. Dried fruits also generally retain the fiber content of their fresh forms.

Just remember that you need to find some other good sources of vitamin C, and because calories become more concentrated, watch that portion con-

Q: Is it normal for athletic teenage girls to lose their menstrual cycles, or is that a sign that something is wrong?

A: Experts say the causes and consequences of missing or absent periods in female athletes need to be better understood.

Many female runners and other athletes commonly restrict eating in hopes that weight loss will give them a performance edge, but women athletes who don't consume enough food to fuel their demanding lifestyle are far more likely to report missing or absent menstrual periods.

"The female athlete triad" refers to

how closely related inadequate nutrition, abnormal menstrual periods and bone mineral density are. Although some women may believe that missing multiple periods is a sign of being in good shape, health experts do not agree. Normally, athletics can benefit a young woman's long-term bone

But the hormonal changes that create loss of menstrual cycles mean that the hormones aren't around to support normal bone development.

That translates into increased risk of stress fractures now and earlier onset of osteoporosis, as well as potential fertility problems, in years to come. It could take one to five months (or more if periods have been absent for a long time) of consuming an extra 350 or so calories daily for menstrual cycles to normalize, according to Nancy Clark, RD, CSSD, a registered dietitian who specializes in sports nutrition.

The good news: athletic performance does not suffer for athletes who achieve and maintain a healthy

Q: I've been reading and hearing news that "sedentary behavior" is bad for your health. Is being sedentary the same as being inactive?

A: Probably not. Most studies linking sedentary lifestyles with greater risk of cancer, heart disease, diabetes and other health problems are looking at how often people are involved

in moderate and vigorous physical activities, such as brisk walking, jogging, gardening, dancing, biking and other sports in blocks of 10 minutes or

Accumulating at least 30 minutes of moderate activity daily is recommended to lower risk of our most common chronic diseases, although accumulating 60 minutes seems to provide even more protection, and getting even 30 minutes a few days a week offers some benefit compared to

the many people who get hardly any. However, even people who get 30 to 60 minutes of moderate activity daily often spend most of their waking hours sitting when at work, in recreation and in moving from one place to another. Emerging research shows that this large amount of sedentary behavior — general inactivity throughout the day — may have as great or greater impact on weight and certain metabolic markers of health than the time we spend in designated

"exercise." Scientists suggest that people whose day includes a lot of sitting try to include some standing or brief walking every hour or so throughout the day. We are looking at two separate goals that are important: spend less time sitting and accumulate 30 minutes or more of moderate activity each day.

A pedometer can help you tackle both goals, especially if you set daily targets that gradually increase each

#### Dear Searching,

With more than 21 million Americans living with some form of uncorrectable vision impairment today. more and more products for lowvision are being developed that can help with many different needs. Here is a quick guide to some great products and where to find them.

#### Low-Tech Aids

There are literally hundreds of simple, relatively inexpensive products on the market today that can help people with low-vision. For example, to help with daily living tasks, you can find a wide array of "talking," "large print" or "jumbo-sized" items such as clocks, watches, remote controls, telephones, computer keyboards, calculators, thermostats, kitchen aids and much more, as well as a wide variety of magnifiers. You can find these products at sites like independentliving.com or 800-537-2118; shoplowvision.com, 800-826-4200; maxiaids.com, 800-522-6294; and lssproducts.com, 800-468-4789.

In addition to the simple products,

there is also a number of high-tech, low-vision devices that offer incredible capabilities. Unfortunately, many of these items are expensive and they aren't covered by private insurance or Medicare. Here are some to check **Desktop magnifiers:** Also known

as closed circuit TVs, these are home-based machines that provide powerful magnification, contrast and clarity for reading, writing and looking at pictures. While this type of technology has been around for a while, more styles and variations are available today with prices usually ranging between \$2,500 and \$3,000. Some of the best places to find these are at: optelec.com, 800-826-4200; freedomscientific.com, 800-444-4443; enhancedvision.com, 888-811-3161; and humanware.com, 800-722-3393.

Portable magnifiers: For reading small print in and outside the home (food labels, prescriptions, bills, menus, etc.), portable, battery-powered video magnifiers provide the same features as closed circuit TVs, but they're small enough to fit in your pocket. Some good ones to check out are the "RUBY" at freedomscientific. com, the "Compact Mini" from optelec.com, the "Pebble" at enhancedvision.com and the "Feather" at clarityusa.com. Prices typically range from \$350 to \$650.

> Text-to-speech: For converting text to speech, there are sev

eral devices that let you take a snap shot of printed material (magazines, newspapers, books, mail, etc.), and in seconds it reads it aloud. The Clear-Reader+ from optelec.com is one of the best for home or office use, but costs \$2,500. If you want mobility, the Intel Reader (careinnovations.com) is a handheld text-to-speech device that retails for \$899. And for iPhone 4 users, the new ZoomReader app developed by Ai Squared (aisquared. com, 800-859-0270) provides text-tospeech capabilities for \$20.

**Computer** magnification: customize a Microsoft Windows personal computer for low-vision, the computer's operating system offers built-in setting adjustments that can help. See microsoft.com/enable for instructions. If that's not sufficient, Ai Squared sells a fantastic software application for \$545 called ZoomText Magnifier/Reader that enlarges, enhances and reads aloud everything on the computer screen.

Or, if your wife uses an iMac or iPad, Apple provides some outstanding built-in accessibility features (see apple.com/accessibility), including screen and cursor magnification, high-contrast settings and screen reader capabilities.

Low-vision cell phone: The Sam-

sung Haven from Verizon Wireless is a basic flip-phone that provides voice command (you tell it what to do) and voice output (it speaks to you) technology that lets you easily operate it without vision. The cost: \$40 with a two-year contract. See verizonwireless.com or call 800-256-4646.

Talking GPS: To find her way around town, the Trekker Breeze is a small handheld GPS navigator that announces the names of streets, intersections and landmarks as she's walking or riding in a vehicle. Available at humanware.com for \$929.

**Currency reader:** To avoid being shortchanged at the store, the iBill (small enough to attach to a key ring) identifies all U.S. bills by voice or a series of tone or vibrations. Price: \$99 at orbitresearch.com or 888-606-7248.

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

# Obama signs first major patent law change since '52

ALEXANDRIA, Va. (AP) — President Barack Obama signed into law Friday a major overhaul of the nation's patent system, a measure designed to ease the way for inventors to bring their products to market. "We can't afford to drag our feet any longer," the president said.

Passed in a rare display of congressional bipartisanship, the America Invents Act is the first significant change in patent law since 1952. It has been hailed as a milestone that would spur innovation and create jobs.

The bill is meant to ensure that the patent office, now facing a backlog of 1.2 million pending patents, has the money to expedite the application process. It now takes an average of three years to get a patent approved. More than 700,000 applications have yet to be reviewed.

"Somewhere in that stack of applications could be the next technological breakthrough, the next miracle drug," Obama said. "We should be making it easier and faster to turn new ideas into jobs."

The president signed the bill after touring Thomas Jefferson High School for Science and Technology in Alexandria, where he examined students' work, including a wheelchair that responds to brain waves. Obama at one point had to step aside as he admired the technological displays. "I don't want to get run over by a robot," he said.

The law aims to streamline the patent process and reduce costly legal battles. It was backed companies including Google and Apple as well as the U.S. Chamber of Commerce. Small-scale inventors are divided on the legislation, with some arguing that it gives an advantage to big corporations.

Obama was joined at the signing ceremony by Senate Judiciary Committee Chairman Patrick Leahy, D-Vt., and House Judiciary Chairman Lamar Smith, R-Texas, the two main sponsors of the legislation.

August brought one of Wall Street's most volatile rides in history, including the Dow Jones Industrial Average (DJIA) moving 400 points on four consecutive days for the first time ever. It was also noted in The Wall Street Journal over the weekend that the DJIA's average daily August swing was 1.9 pecent, up or down. Though the average was not as volatile as it was during 2008 in the midst of the financial crisis, August was still its 10th most volatile month in the past 75 years.

We noted several times during the month that the swings represented uncertainty in the marketplace. Given the volatility, investors may have looked forward to September's arrival; however, the market kicked off this month with two heavy down days and the month's worst start since 1974, which provided a quick reminder that this is historically the stock market's worst month of the

Investors had plenty to worry about last week and reasons to increasingly fear another U.S. recession. The major averages had gains through Wednesday, but those were erased by the end of the week, and the major averages closed out the week with modest losses.

There was new light shed on the Federal Reserve's deliberations in its August meeting and its decision to keep target short-term interest rates near zero until mid-2013. There were three dissenting Fed governors who did not want to tell the public about plans to keep the rate at a certain level for a specific period. The minutes released last week also showed that there was a faction of governors who wanted to go further with "more substantial" policy action to bolster U.S. growth beyond the interest-rate pledge. Some raised the possibility of a third round of asset purchases, which markets have dubbed QE3 (quantitative easing, part three).

Some officials suggested that extending the average duration of the Fed's existing portfolio by selling bonds with short maturities and buying those with longer maturities could have a similar effect as buying new securities outright. Our belief is that the Fed will take some action at its meeting later this month but will again state that monetary policy alone cannot cure all of the econ-

Obviously, the week's other big news was the August employment report released last Friday. It showed that zero jobs were created during the month. Bloomberg estimates were for a gain of 68,000 new jobs. In addition, revisions to June and July data lowered the number of new jobs created by an additional 58,000. Barron's pointed out that nearly every aspect of the labor picture weakened and there were several sectors, including manufacturing, construction and retail that have posted declines. President Obama will weigh in with his initiative to try to spur job growth with an address before a joint session of Congress on

In addition to the worries about the U.S. economy, there are several concerns and ongoing uncertainties about the European debt crisis. European stock markets have fallen more than the U.S. market in recent weeks and in the coming weeks there will be several key votes among the European Union members about the second bailout package for Greece.

Amidst all the gloom there was a recent bullish development for stocks. A Bloomberg report showed that short selling (bearish bets) against the S&P 500 rose to a nine-month high as short sellers increased speculation that stocks may decline amid concerns over the strength of global economic growth. The amount of S&P 500 shares sold short on Aug. 29 rose to the highest

# Dr. Oz accused of fear-mongering on apple juice

#### By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS

Arsenic in apple juice! Fed to babies! And it probably came from China! Television's Dr. Mehmet Oz is under fire from the FDA and others for sounding what they say is a false alarm about the dangers of apple juice.

Oz, one of TV's most popular medical experts, said on his Fox show Wednesday that testing by a New Jersey lab

had found what he suggested were troubling levels of arsenic in many brands of juice.

The Food and Drug Administration said its own tests show no such thing, even on

one of the same juice batches "There is no evidence of any public health risk from drinking these juices. And

FDA has been testing them

for years," the agency said in

a statement.

The flap escalated Thursday, when Oz's former medical school classmate Dr. Richard Besser lambasted him on ABC's "Good Morning America" show for what

Besser called an "extremely irresponsible" report that was akin to "yelling 'Fire!' in a movie theater." Besser was acting head of the Centers for Disease Con-

trol and Prevention before

joining ABC news as health

and medical editor several years ago.

Arsenic is naturally present in water, air, food and soil in two forms — organic and inorganic. According to the FDA, organic arsenic passes through the body quickly and is essentially harmless. Inorganic arsenic — the type found in pesticides — can be toxic and may pose a cancer risk if consumed at high levels or over a long period.

"The Dr. Oz Show" did not break down the type when it tested several dozen juice samples for total arsenic. As a result, the FDA said the results are misleading. Furthermore, the agency's

own tests found far lower total arsenic levels from one of the same juice batches the Oz show tested -2 to 6 parts per billion of arsenic versus

Tests of the same batch conducted by two different food testing labs for the juice's maker, Nestle USA, which sells Juicy Juice under the Gerber brand, also found levels consistent with the FDA results.

In a letter published on the Oz show's website, Nestle said it told the program's producer in advance that the method the show's lab used was intended for testing waste water, not fruit juice, and "therefore their results would be unreliable at best."

The FDA also sent a letter in advance to the show and threatened to post its findings and the letters online if the program proceeded.

Oz went ahead. "American apple juice

is made from apple concentrate, 60 percent of which is imported from China," the website version of his report says. "Other countries may use pesticides that conswings. The market is tain arsenic, a heavy metal known to cause cancer."

The show tested three dozen samples from five brands, and Oz claimed that 10 had more arsenic than the limit allowed in drinking water -10parts per billion.

However, the FDA said the arsenic in water tends to be inorganic, justifying the strict limit. In contrast, organic arsenic is the form usually found in food and

juices. Tests over the last 20 years show apple juice typically has fewer than 10 parts per billion

total arsenic.

The mercurial Oz is a heart surgeon at Columbia University and heads an alternative medicine program at New York Presbyterian Hospital. He was a regular on Oprah Winfrey's show for many years before getting his own program two years ago.
