Contreras gets probated term for tot's injuries

A Big Spring man found guilty on a charge of injury to a child during a late-September bench trial was sentenced to 90 days in jail and 10 years probation in 118th District Court Wednesday morning. Joseph Contreras, 21, was found guilty of injury to a child during a Sept. 28 bench trial — a trial where the decision is made by the judge without the benefit of a jury — in connection with injuries sustained by a two-year-old in early December.

Contreras was arrested at a relative's home in the 1600 block of Virginia after officials with the SMMC emergency room became suspicious of the child's injuries — which included a broken leg — and called law enforcement officers. "Officers responded to the emergency room in reference to an injured child. The hospital staff had found the injuries to be suspicious," Sgt. Tony Everett, public information officer with the Big Spring Police Department, said in a press release issued Monday

afternoon. "Officers discovered a two-year-old male had suffered a broken leg. The child also had some bruising in his facial area, as well. "The child's mother had brought him to the emergency and told officers she had left the child with her boyfriend, Contreras, at her apartment at 1002 N. Main St. while she took her oldest child to school. When she returned home she found the two-year-old had been injured and took him to the hospital."

The child was later transferred to a hospital in Lubbock, according to police officials, with serious but not life-threatening injuries. Everett said investigators following up on the case found enough evidence to arrest Contreras and charge him with injury to a child — serious bodily injury.

According to court records, Contreras has previously served 40 days of his 90-day sentence, with the balance to be served at the Howard County Detention Center. The Big Spring man was also ordered to complete 300 hours of community service and pay a \$2,500 fine as part of his sentence.

District Attorney Hardy Wilkerson, who presented

FBI designation only change in Dunn case

COLORADO CITY — Despite little or no new information from local and state investigators concerning the December 2010 disappearance of Colorado City teen Hailey Dunn, the U.S. Federal Bureau of Investigation recently

labeled the case a kidnapping among its online list of "most wanted" crimes.

Dunn has been the focus of a region-wide search since her mother — Billie Dunn — reported her missing to the Colorado City Police Department Dec. 28.

The lone "person of interest" in the case, Billie Dunn's

then live-in boyfriend Shawn Adkins, remains the only suspect in the investigation. However, despite executing a number of search warrants — with

one allegedly turning up child pornography on a computer believed to be used by Adkins — no arrest has been made.

Adkins told law enforcement officials he last saw Hailey Dunn on Dec. 27, when she told him she was going to her father's home nearby and then on to spend the night at a friend's home. According

to investigators, the teen did neither. Billie Dunn said she last saw her daughter at home the night of Dec. 26, nearly two days before she was reported missing.

Both Adkins and Billie Dunn have denied having any involvement in the girl's

The meeting may have been short and sweet, but it was full of positives, which only makes sense since Big Spring Area Chamber of Commerce is focusing on the positive.

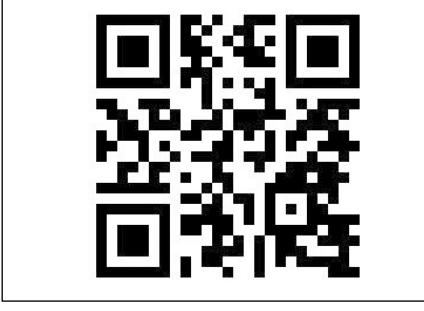
"As I've said before, our hometown really is a jewel and we want to let people know," Terri Johansen, chamber president, said in addressing the Chamber board Wednesday.

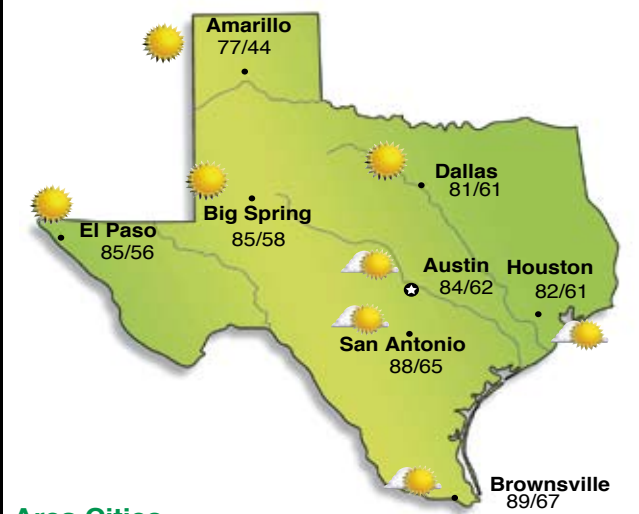

Guerra faces another trial

MIDLAND — Juan Jose Guerra, a Big Spring man sentenced to 20 years in prison after being convicted of attempted kidnapping, attempted assault and possession of items to be used with criminal intent, will be going back to trial Nov. 28. Guerra, was arrested April 28, 2010, in

Midland on multiple charges, including possession of what law enforcement officials described as a "rape kit." That "kit" included items such as zip ties, rope and a ball gag — which was the criminal intent item prosecutors convicted Guerra of in November 2010. This time, the 50-year-old will be tried for one or more of the other items, such as the zip ties or rope.

Guerra, originally from Colombia, South America, and a naturalized American citizen, is a petroleum engineer, according to police reports, and had lived in California and Kansas prior to moving to Big Spring.

disappearance.

Since the girl was reported missing, Billie Dunn has accepted a plea agreement in Mitchell County court, receiving one year probation for making a false report to police. According to law enforcement officials, Dunn lied to officers regarding the whereabouts of Adkins in mid-March, when she was also arrested on charges of hindering apprehension and prosecution and possession of dangerous drugs.

Billie Dunn isn't serving her time on probation in Mitchell County, however, as Sheriff Patrick Toombs confirmed Dunn moved to Travis County — locat-

ed in the Austin area.

Searches of fields and abandoned structures — led mostly by volunteer groups, including U.S. Army soldiers from Fort Hood in Killeen — have been conducted in Colorado City, as well as numerous nearby communities, including Abilene, Odessa and Big Spring.

The girl's father, Clint Dunn, has traveled all over the West Texas area, handing out flyers and trying to keep Hailey's disappearance in the public eye.

Calls made to the FBI Dallas office and Colorado City Manager Pete Kampfer — who has served as information liaison between the media and law enforcement officials since the investigation began — were not immediately returned.

Hailey Dunn has light brown

hair, green eyes, stands 5 feet and weighs approximately 115 pounds. According to information provided by Hope for Hailey, a non-profit group currently assisting in the search, the girl has a scar on the right side of her forehead and right side of her lip. She was last seen wearing dark blue sweat pants, a light-colored T-shirt and flip-flops.

Anyone with information concerning the girl's whereabouts or circumstances concerning her disappearance are asked to call authorities at 325-728-5294 or 325-728-3161. A reward of \$15,000 is now being offered for information in the case.

Houses are set for Nov. 13.

Debbie Wegman, director of the Convention and Visitors Bureau, reported on the recent trend of local and area hotels not having vacancies.

"Due to a variety of reasons, including oil-field and construction, the hotels have been at capacity, especially during the week," Wegman said. "Things are happening in Big Spring."

Jan Foresyth, director of institutional advancement of Howard College, reported the Ag Appreciation Day was a suc-

cess. She also reminded the board about the upcoming community series luncheon — Part 4: Historic Preservation for our County — set for Nov. 1. Ticket deadline is set for Oct. 28 and tickets can be purchased for \$12 at the chamber. Papa Chon's will be catering the luncheon at Dora Roberts Community Center.

The annual chamber banquet has been set for Jan. 31 with Charlie Johnson as the guest speaker. More information will follow regarding this event.

Dr. Cheryl Sparks, president of Howard College, reported the Sept. 30 ribbon cutting and re-dedication of the college and celebration

of the 65th anniversary went well. During that week, the college also celebrated the groundbreaking of the second phase of the ag complex.

"It was not only a great day, it was a great week," Sparks said. "We are so excited about the college and it is only going to get better and better."

Enrollment at the college has increased 51 percent during the past five years and 78 percent in the past 10 years. The Big Spring campus alone has increased enrollment by 22 percent, while enrollment at SouthWest Collegiate Institute for the Deaf is up 48 percent.

"We have seen the larg-

est growth that SWCID that we have ever seen, with 206 students," Sparks said. "We are having the problem of finding space for the students, but we are working on that and trying to finalize some plans that will solve this problem."

In the ex-officio reports, County Judge Mark Barr said the county is sitting in good condition with the fiscal year ending Oct. 1. Barr reported the county tax base was more than \$2.5 billion. The joint law enforcement has been approved and a construction manager will be selected Nov. 7, after which construction bids for the building will be accepted.

He also reported the

county clerk's office is working at not only updating all records, but also making records available online.

"We are looking forward to next year, we are on the move," Barr said.

News in brief

Witnesses: Libyan fighters overrun last positions of Gadhafi loyalists

SIRTE, Libya (AP) — Libyan fighters on Thursday overran the remaining positions of Moammar Gadhafi loyalists in his hometown of Sirte, ending the last major resistance by former regime supporters still holding out two months after the fall of the capital Tripoli.

Reporters at the scene watched as the final assault began around 8 a.m. and ended about 90 minutes later. Just before the assault, about five carloads of loyalists tried to flee the enclave down the coastal highway but were met by gunfire from the revolutionaries, who killed at least 20 of them.

“Our forces control the last neighborhood in Sirte,” Hassan Draoua, a member of Libya’s interim National Transitional Council, told The Associated Press in Tripoli after Sirte’s fall. “The city has been liberated.”

After the battle, revolutionaries began searching homes and buildings looking for any Gadhafi fighters who may be hiding there. At least 16 pro-Gadhafi fighters were captured, along with multiple cases of ammunition and trucks loaded with weapons. Reporters saw revolutionaries beating captured Gadhafi men in the back of trucks and officers intervening to stop them.

Clinton urges Pakistan to boost fight against terrorists

KABUL, Afghanistan (AP) — U.S. Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton on Thursday pushed Pakistan’s leaders to fight harder against terrorists within their own borders, saying the Pakistanis “must be part of the solution.”

Outlining a fresh “fight, talk, build” strategy at a news conference with Afghan President Hamid

Karzai, Clinton said it was imperative for the U.S., Afghanistan and Pakistan to cooperate against insurgents.

Clinton is heading Thursday to Islamabad, where she will lead a delegation of Obama administration officials in talks with Pakistani leaders. Ties between the two countries have been strained over counterterrorism issues.

“We intend to push Pakistan very hard,” Clinton said.

Lions and tigers shot to death in Ohio after owner frees them

ZANESVILLE, Ohio (AP) — Amid expressions of horror and revulsion at the killing of dozens of wild animals in Ohio — and photographs of their bloody carcasses — animal rights advocates agreed there was little local authorities could have done to save the dangerous creatures once they began roaming the countryside after their owner released them before taking his own life.

Sheriff’s deputies shot 48 animals — including 18 rare Bengal tigers and 17 lions — after Terry Thompson, owner of the private Muskingum County Animal Farm near Zanesville, threw their cages open Tuesday and then committed suicide.

“What a tragedy,” said veterinarian Barb Wolfe, of The Wilds animal preserve sponsored by the Columbus Zoo. “We knew that ... there were so many dangerous animals at this place that eventually something bad would happen, but I don’t think anybody really knew it would be this bad.”

As the hunt wended down on Wednesday, a photo showing the remains of tigers, bears and lions lined up and scattered in an open field went viral provoking visceral reactions among viewers, some of whom expressed their anger and sadness on social networking sites.

Obama camp plans to target Romney strength

WASHINGTON (AP) — A beleaguered president seeks re-election. His challenger, a candidate with Massachusetts roots and a presidential demeanor straight out of central casting, has to fight through a primary contest fending off charges of flip-flopping.

Election 2012 is looking a lot like the presidential race of 2004.

Democrats in and around President Barack Obama’s campaign are preparing to run against former Massachusetts Gov. Mitt Romney — the man they believe likely to emerge from the Republican contest — by borrowing from the playbook George W. Bush and Republicans used to defeat Sen. John Kerry seven years ago.

Casual Cooking with Kris

Welcoming readers to my world where I enjoy simple, sometimes quick, but always delicious meals.

This week’s recipe is inspired by my other Thanksgiving dinner.

Back when I was 21 years of age I was living in Blacksburg, Va. My stepdad made a smoked turkey which I had never had for the holiday meal. It was so good that I have never cooked a turkey in my life. If my stepdad is out of town for the holidays or is not able to smoke the turkey, then my other meal is herb chicken with all the regular goodies.

The other day I saw whole chickens on sale and got a few because I felt like stinking up my house with herb chicken. Now, I have never roasted a whole chicken and my husband and I prefer dark meat but this was so moist and delicious. A day later, I turned what was left into chicken, vegetable and noodle soup.

You can serve the roasted chicken with a nice fresh salad, dinner rolls and iced tea. The soup can be served with hot cornbread. Enjoy!

Herb Roasted Chicken and Veggies

- 1 whole chicken (insides removed)
- 5-6 potatoes (skin on)
- 6 carrots
- 4 celery stalks
- 5 cloves of garlic
- turkey or chicken herb rub/seasoning
- 1/2 cup of white wine
- 1 small can cream of chicken soup
- salt and pepper

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Place the chicken in a large roasting pan with a lid or a large disposable

roasting pan covered with foil. Place the five garlic cloves, slightly smashed, inside the bird. Wash hands. Pour the wine over the bird. Add salt and pepper and a fair amount of the herb seasoning. Rinse and cut potatoes in half lengthwise. Rinse and cut carrots in about 3-inch sections. Do the same for the celery. Place veggies around the bird and salt and

pepper to taste. Mix the can of soup with about a 1/2 cup of water and pour that around on top of the veggies only. Cook covered for about an hour and a half, remove cover and cook another 20 to 30 minutes. Remove from oven, let rest for about 5 minutes and serve.

For the soup, debone the remaining chicken and place in a large pot. Add remaining

veggies and the slight gravy that it made in the roasting pan. Add one bay leaf, 2 cups of chicken broth and enough water to fill up the rest of the pot a couple of inches over the veggies and chicken. Bring to a medium boil and add 2-1/2 cups of egg noodles and let cook on medium until noodles are done.

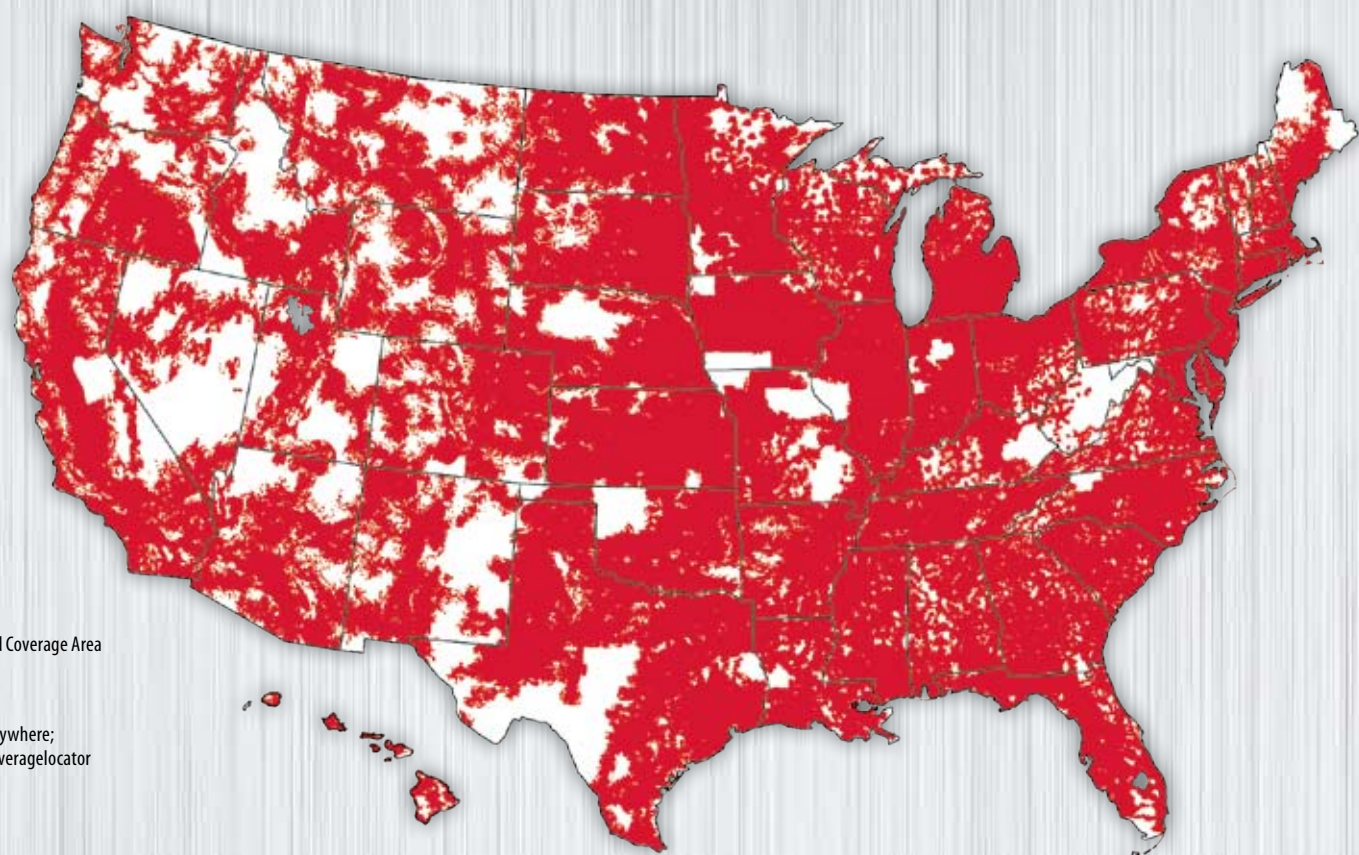

Rangers drop Series opener

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Sometimes, it seems Tony La Russa wishes he could put a dozen more players in his dugout. Just imagine how many moves he could make then.

The St. Louis manager employed most of his roster Wednesday night,

mixing and matching his way through Game 1 of the World Series and guiding the Cardinals to a 3-2 win over the Texas Rangers.

La Russa looked like a genius once again, especially when Allen Craig pinch-hit for ace Chris

Carpenter and delivered a go-ahead single in the sixth inning. The slicing drive off reliever Alexi Ogando fell inches shy of sliding right fielder Nelson Cruz — the opener was that tight throughout a cold, damp evening.

It was a game perfectly suited for La Russa — lots of bunts and pitching changes. And in a postseason in which he's made all the right moves, the 67-year-old boss who's spent more than half his life as a big league manager was at the top of his game.

"It's going to be interesting to see how it plays out," Cardinals outfielder Lance Berkman said. "But I feel like we have to win the National League-style games if we're going to win this thing and tonight was a National League-style game — 3-2, good pitching, good defense, timely hitting.

"I don't think that we want to get into a gorilla-ball-type series with these guys. We'll see what happens when we add the DH and go to the American League ballpark, but I think when we have the National League style and we have the advantage we have to capitalize," he said.

Texas star Michael Young could appreciate that. Sort of.

"This is real baseball. Your pitcher has to hit. More decisions come into play. A little more strategy comes into play," he said. "I enjoy this style of baseball a little more."

St. Louis used 17 of its 25 players, including five relievers.

The Cardinals even

won without their Rally Squirrel. There were no sightings of the elusive critter still roaming Busch Stadium — good thing for the rodent, too, because La Russa probably would've devised a way to catch him.

Game 2 is Thursday night, with Jaime Garcia starting for the Cards against Colby Lewis. Texas has not lost two straight games since Aug. 23-25.

The key sequences in Game 1 came in the sixth inning. In the top half, first baseman Albert Pujols helped prevent Texas from taking the lead on Carpenter's final pitch in the sixth, making a sliding stop on Young's bid for a hit.

It was still 2-all in the bottom half when Rangers starter C.J. Wilson worked around eighth-place hitter Nick Punto with a four-pitch walk that put runners at the corners with two outs.

"I know they had either Carpenter coming up or a pinch-hitter, and with Ogando warming up behind me, I have confidence that he's going to come in and get that guy out," Wilson said.

La Russa did not hesitate, pulling Carpenter and sending up Craig, a versatile player who was injured for much of the season. Texas manager Ron Washington countered by bringing in the hard-throwing Ogando.

Rather risky lately, trying to play baseball chess with La Russa. As Washington said a day earlier: "Well, I don't think I can ever live up to matching

coaching staff. And while Roberson may be the future helmsman of the Steers, Garrett Stuteville showed last week he can come in cold and still throw a 40-yard strike.

The problem with the Steers this season really boils down to timing. They just have not been able to get everything going at the same time. At different times, the defense has shut down some of the most powerful offenses in Left Texas. At other times, Vanderbilt and Michael Olivia have spearheaded a great running attack, full of powerful runners, sending some truly great defenses scrambling for answers. At times, the Big Spring coaching staff, headed by Head Coach Phillip Ritchey, has shown moments of sheer play-calling genius. How many times has Toby Rodgers split the defense and found himself wide open on a deep post route across the middle? Too many times for an 0-8 season.

Friday night, the Steers will play their last home game of the season. It will be the last chance many Steers' fans will have to see the boys play this season. They won't be playing for a district title. They will be playing for pride. They will be hoping the stars align just right and all their strengths come together at the same time, so their hometown can see just how good they really are.

Dallas backs ready to run

IRVING, Texas (AP) — Considering how poorly the St. Louis Rams have been at stopping the run, getting to play them on Sunday looks like a great chance for the Dallas Cowboys to finally get their ground game going.

Only, in keeping with the way things have gone for Dallas this season, it's not that simple.

The Cowboys are expected to plug two new starters into their offense Sunday. Leading rusher

Felix Jones has a high ankle sprain and rookie DeMarco Murray likely will take his place. Probably blocking for him at left guard will be Montrae Holland, a veteran who was unemployed the first six weeks of the season and was signed Tuesday to fill a void caused by injuries.

Even at full strength, Dallas had one of the league's worst running games, averaging only 84.8 yards per game. A per-carry average of 3.4 yards is even closer to the bottom of the rankings.

This problems has really stood out when trying to grind out yards close to the end zone.

Dallas has a single rushing touchdown through five games. Only Kansas City has less. That inability to finish drives explains why the Cowboys are tied for

the most field-goal attempts in the league.

One more key stat that helps frame all this: Dallas has made five more field goals than extra points; the only other team with such an out-of-whack ratio is winless Miami. This inefficiency is especially jarring for the Cowboys seeing as their three losses are all by four points or less.

"If we want to be the team that our expectations are, we have to be able to get our running game going," tight end Jason Witten said Wednesday. "We've done it a few times, just not as consistently as we need to."

Running against St. Louis should help.

The Rams are allowing 163 yards per game, several first downs more than anyone else in the league. Break it down per carry and their average of 4.9 yards allowed is nearly the worst.

"It's not real fun when you struggle in that department defensively because we firmly believe it has to begin up front," said St. Louis coach Steve Spanuolo, whose background is rooted on defense. "The one thing you always know is that if you commit too many against the run, especially against this team we're getting ready to play, they've got guys on the outside that will kill you. So you've always got to weigh the options of what you try to take away."

If that's a hint that the Rams are more worried about keeping Tony Romo from throwing to Miles Austin, Dez Bryant and Witten, then it's even more of a burden for the Cowboys to get their running game going.

Not that coach Jason Garrett needs a reminder. He got ample evidence last Sunday, when Dallas tried burning up the clock while trying to protect a three-point lead in the final minutes against New England, yet moved backward on three plays and punted, setting up Tom Brady for a winning drive.

Jones was already hurt by then, so it was Murray and third-down back Tashard Choice who couldn't move the chains.

But Garrett believes in Murray, a third-round pick out of Oklahoma.

He's relatively similar to Jones in stature and speed. The difference is experience. After the lockout, he missed most of training camp with an injury. He's played in all five games, producing 71 yards on 24 carries. His longest run is just eight yards. He's also caught four passes for 23 yards, with a best of 13 yards.

Garrett said Murray seemed to find more of a rhythm against the Patriots.

"It was the first time I think we've seen in the regular season where he started to feel like himself," Garrett said. "A lot of times runners just need to get a little sweat, they need to get a little feel for playing, they need to get knocked around a little bit and then they start getting into the mode where they feel comfortable in seeing things and making the cuts they need to make. I think we saw some of that."

Murray agreed, saying he was finally at the point where he could react rather than having to think about what to do, then do it.

"I'm going out there and trusting my ability, trusting my technique and having fun," he said.

Murray said Jones is a more patient runner than he is, meaning that he's able to wait for holes to open then dart toward them. Murray has a good excuse for his impatience, having often had enormous holes to run through with the Sooners.

That gets back to the questions about Dallas' offensive line, which could be more to blame for the woeful stats than the running backs.

Left tackle Doug Free is the only starter in the same spot as last year. The only other hold-over from last season is guard Kyle Kosier, and he's switched sides, now lining up next to rookie tackle Tyron Smith. They're breaking in a first-time starter at center, Phil Costa, and then there's the revolving door at left guard, with Holland likely to be the third starter in six games.

"There's growing pains," Garrett said. "I think our team has responded well up front."

a wit with Tony La Russa."

La Russa liked Craig's chances, even though not everything was tilted in his favor.

"Cold weather game, sitting on the bench, Ogando. It's not a very good situation," La Russa said. "But he's got a history in our system, that's why we like him so much. He should have a really good career."

All the pieces in place, it was time to play — and what followed was the play of the game.

Craig swung through two fastballs, then hit a drive toward the right field line.

Cruz tried to make a sliding catch, except the ball bounced just before it reached him and thudded off his left leg for an RBI single.

"It was close. I think the dirt caught me," Cruz said.

Craig's single scored NL championship series MVP David Freese, the St. Louis-area prep star who led off with a double. Freese has hit in 11 straight post-season games.

"Man, he's tough," Craig said of Ogando. "He came right at me with fastballs, and I missed the first two. Then that last one I was trying to get the barrel on it, make the defense make a play. Fortunate, kept it fair, and Cruz made a great attempt on that. It was a great play all around."

Ahead, La Russa coaxed three scoreless innings from his deep bullpen. Jason Motte closed for his fifth save of the postseason.

This was the first time Texas had ever played in St. Louis. Yet

Josh Hamilton, Cruz and the big-hitting Rangers looked a lot like the team that fizzled at the plate in last year's World Series against San Francisco.

Each team wound up with six hits. The wild-card Cardinals just did more with them.

Berkman put St. Louis ahead by chopping a two-run single in the fourth. Mike Napoli tied it with a two-run homer in the fifth.

Carpenter earned his eighth post-season win, breaking the team record he shared with Bob Gibson. Of course, all of Gibby's victories came in the World Series.

Wilson fell to 0-5 in his last seven post season starts, including last year.

The Texas lefty recently spent 2½ minutes in a Dallas cryotherapy chamber, where liquid nitrogen lowered the temperature to 295 degrees below zero,

trying to speed body recovery. It was a bit warmer at the ballpark, at 49 degrees for the first pitch.

Wilson became the first pitcher to lose an All-Star game, an AL division series game, an AL championship series game and a World Series game in the same year, STATS LLC said.

Opening lead — four of hearts.
Assume you're declarer in six hearts and West leads a trump. It looks as though you've bitten off more than you can chew — apparently you must lose a club and a diamond — but, in fact, the contract is far from hopeless. If the defender who holds the club length for his side also has to guard diamonds, you can make the slam on a squeeze.

Accordingly, after cashing three rounds of trumps ending in dummy, you lead a low club to your king. West takes the king with the ace and returns the seven of spades. You win with dummy's king and play the queen and another club, which you ruff. You then cash the A-Q of spades, producing this position:

North
♦ K 9 8
♣ 7

West East
♦ Q 7 6 ♠ J 10
♣ 10 ♣ J 2

South
♥ 8
♦ A 10 5

When you now play your last trump, West is in serious trouble. If he discards a club, dummy's seven becomes a trick; if he discards a diamond, all your diamonds are tricks. Either way, you make the slam.
Note that it is necessary to ruff a club for the squeeze to succeed. If you failed to ruff a club, East would be able to guard the clubs while West guarded the diamonds, and you would go down one. The purpose of the ruff is to force one defender to guard both suits, which is the key element of a squeeze.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Oct. 20, 1944, during World War II, Gen. Douglas MacArthur stepped ashore at Leyte (LAY-tee) in the Philippines, 2-3 years after saying, "I shall return."

On this date:

In 1740, Maria Theresa became ruler of Austria, Hungary and Bohemia upon the death of her father, Holy Roman Emperor Charles VI.

In 1803, the U.S. Senate ratified the Louisiana Purchase.

In 1936, Helen Keller's teacher, Anne Sullivan Macy, died in Forest Hills, N.Y., at age 70.

In 1947, the House Un-American Activities Committee opened hearings into alleged Communist influence and infiltration in the U.S. motion picture industry.

In 1964, the 31st president of the United States, Herbert Hoover, died in New York at age 90.

In 1967, seven men were convicted in Meridian, Miss., of violating the civil rights of three slain civil rights workers.

In 1968, former first lady Jacqueline Kennedy married Greek shipping magnate Aristotle Onassis.

In 1973, in the so-called "Saturday Night Massacre," special Watergate prosecutor Archibald Cox was dismissed and Attorney General Elliot L. Richardson and Deputy Attorney General William B. Ruckelshaus resigned.

In 1981, a bungled armored truck robbery carried out by members of radical groups in Nanuet, N.Y., left a guard and two police officers dead.

In 1986, the government of Nicaragua formally charged captured American mercenary Eugene Hasenfus with several crimes, including terrorism. (Although convicted and sentenced to prison, Hasenfus was pardoned and released by Nicaraguan President Daniel Ortega.)
