

# Baby beaten, couple jailed



A local couple was arrested Friday on charges stemming from the alleged beating of a 1-year-old girl, according to investigators with the Big Spring Police Department.

an injured child. "The child had severe swelling around her eyes and jaw,

and chest," Everett said. "The child also had red whelps on her legs. Officers called for an ambulance and the girl was transported to the emergency room at Scenic Mountain Medical Center. She was later flown to Lubbock as a precaution due to the possibility of a closed head injury. Her condition was not available as of Monday morning."

Everett said both Edmond-

son and Armendarez were present in the apartment when officers arrived.

"The mother (Armendarez) lives in the apartment with two children," Everett said. "No injuries were found on the second child. The investigation centered on Edmondson because he had been with the child overnight while the

# Early voting polls open late two times this week

Area residents hoping to cast their ballots early in year's constitutional this amendment election are running out of time, as this week marks the last days in early voting before the November election.

Voting has been slow, at best, according to Howard County Elections Administrator Saundra Bloom, averaging around a dozen ballots cast each day last week.

"I've been communicating with other counties and they are seeing similar numbers through most of the state," Bloom said. "The only places that are seeing a better turnout are counties where they are holding special elections, which usually mean a pro□ For a list of the amendments, and an explanation of each, see Page 4.

posed bond or candidates.

"Anytime we're going into an amendment election, we already know the turnout is going to be much lower than what we see during elections that feature actual candidates. So, the early voting polls may be pretty deserted throughout the day, but it's something we expected."

With approximately 72ballots cast during the first week of early voting, Bloom said she hopes to see at least a slight increase in totals, thanks to extended hours this week and the last minute rush.

we will be offering extended hours," Bloom said. "The early voting polls will be open from 8 a.m. until 7 p.m. both days. We hope by extending our hours on those days, it will give people a chance to come in and cast their ballots early when they might not normally get the opportunity because of their work hours."

Early voting polls are located in the County Elections Office, which is situated on the third floor of the county courthouse.



#### Girl allegedly taken from Texas complex found dead

CARROLLTON (AP) - Police say a 10-year-old Oklahoma City girl apparently abducted while with her family visiting relatives in the Dallas area has been found dead.

Carrollton police say Jasmen Gonzalez was last seen Saturday night at an apartment complex. Her body was located Sunday afternoon several blocks away behind a residence.

Autopsy results were pending Monday.

Police initially said the girl may have wandered away from where the family was staying, but Lt. Doug Mitchell says police now believe the child was abducted. Mitchell says the killing is not believed to have been random.

He says investigators have examined an SUV and that a person of interest has been interviewed.

Police say no one has been arrested.

#### Hidalgo County deputy shot, hospitalized

ELSA(AP) - A South Texas sheriff's deputy has been shot while investigating an alleged kidnapping and drug deal in a traffic stop that left a suspect dead.

Hidalgo County Sheriff Lupe Trevino says the officer, whose name wasn't immediately released, is hospitalized but should recover.

Deputies received a call Sunday afternoon about a possible kidnapping and stopped a vehicle, carrying four people, near Elsa.

Trevino says a passenger opened fire, striking a deputy wearing bulletproof vest. Two bullets hit the vest, while another struck the deputy's abdomen.

Trevino says the gunman was fatally shot by deputies and two other suspects were wounded. Details on their conditions weren't immediately released. The other person in the vehicle was detained.

#### Hearing Monday on temporary district maps

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — A hearing is scheduled in federal court in South Texas that could determine what district lines can be used temporarily as election officials prepare for next year's primaries.

Monday's hearing in San Antonio involves a combination of several lawsuits filed by minority and Democratic groups. A final resolution is stalled while a Justice Department challenge to lines proposed by the state is pending before a three-judge panel in Washington.

The Justice Department contends that the new state voting maps for U.S. and Texas House races were drawn with discriminatory intent against minority voters. It has asked the tribunal to throw out those lines.

The state, represented by Attorney General Greg Abbott, contends that the plans maintain or increase the voting strength of minorities and are in compliance with the law.

#### Group tries to save

#### 826-foot Asarco smokestack

EL PASO (AP) — A group of El Paso residents is working to save the city's iconic 826-foot Asarco smelter smokestack from demolition.

The 45-year-old smokestack that towers over El Paso's west side was scheduled to fall in the spring, but the contractor in charge of the demolition agreed to a one-year delay to allow the group time to raise money for its preservation.

Contractor Roberto Puga said the organization, led by Gary Sapp and Robert Ardovino, must raise money to preserve the stack and a neighboring 610foot concrete chimney.

"We came to an agreement that if they can show me there's a real grounds well of support to keep it up, then I'm willing to give them a one-year moratorium," Puga told the El Paso Times.



# **Proposed constitutional amendment**

Early voting is going on now at the county courtnouse. Election day is Nov. 8.

Proposition Number 1 (SJR 14)

SJR 14 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to provide the surviving spouse of a 100 percent or totally disabled veteran with an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the surviving spouse's residence homestead as long as the surviving spouse has not remarried, the property was the residence homestead of the surviving spouse when the qualifying veteran died, and the property remains the residence homestead of the surviving spouse.

The proposed amendment appears on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a 100 percent or totally disabled veteran."

#### Proposition Number 2 (SJR 4)

SJR 4 would amend the constitution to authorize the Texas Water Development Board to issue additional general obligation bonds on a continuing basis for one or more accounts of the Texas Water Development Fund II, with the restriction that the total amount of bonds outstanding at any time does not exceed \$6 billion.

The proposed amendment appears on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of additional general obligation bonds by the Texas Water Development Board in an amount not to exceed \$6 billion at any time outstanding."

#### Proposition Number 3 (SJR 50)

SJR 50 would amend the constitution to authorize the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board or its successors to issue and sell general obligation bonds on a continuing basis for the purpose of financing educational loans for students, subject to certain constitutional restrictions,

including a restriction as to the maximum principal amount of bonds outstanding at any one time.

The proposed amendment appears on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds of the State of Texas to finance educational loans to students."

#### Proposition Number 4 (HJR 63)

HJR 63 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to permit a county to issue bonds or notes to finance the development or redevelopment of an unproductive, underdeveloped, or blighted area within the county, and to pledge increases in ad valorem tax revenues imposed on property in the area by the county for repayment of such bonds or notes. The amendment does not provide independent authority for increasing ad valorem tax rates.

The proposed amendment appears on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to permit a county to issue bonds or notes to finance the development or redevelopment of an unproductive, underdeveloped, or blighted area and to pledge for repayment of the bonds or notes increases in ad valorem taxes imposed by the county on property in the area. The amendment does not provide authority for increasing ad valorem tax rates."

#### Proposition Number 5 (SJR 26)

SJR 26 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to allow cities and counties to enter into interlocal contracts with other cities and counties without having to assess an ad valorem tax and set aside a specified amount of funds for the payment of costs under the interlocal contract.

The proposed amendment appears on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to allow cities or counties to enter into interlocal contracts with other cities or counties without the imposition of a tax or the provision of a sinking fund."

Proposition Number 6 (HJR 109)

HJR 109 would amend the constitution to increase the amount of principal that is available for withdrawal from the permanent school fund each year and would also clarify certain references to that fund in the constitution. Increased access to the principal of the state public education trust fund would be based upon HJR 109 granting the authority to consider alternative market calculations when determining the amount of principal that is available for distribution to the available school fund. HJR 109 would also provide authority to distribute to the available school fund annual revenue from school fund land or other properties up to \$300 million per year.

The proposed amendment appears on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment clarifying references to the permanent school fund, allowing the General Land Office to distribute revenue from permanent school fund land or other properties to the available school fund to provide additional funding for public education, and providing for an increase in the market value of the permanent school fund for the purpose of allowing increased distributions from the available school fund."

#### Proposition Number 7 (SJR 28)

SJR 28 would amend the constitution by adding El Paso County to the list of counties authorized to create conservation and reclamation districts to develop parks and recreational facilities financed by taxes.

The proposed amendment appears on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to permit conservation and reclamation districts in El Paso County to issue bonds supported by ad valorem taxes to fund the development and maintenance of parks and recreational facilities."

#### Proposition Number 8 (SJR 16)


SJR 16 would amend the constitution by requiring the legislature to provide for taxation of open space land devoted to water stewardship purposes on the basis of its productive capacity.

The proposed amendment appears on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the appraisal for ad valorem tax purposes of open-space land devoted to water-stewardship purposes on the basis of its productive capacity."

#### Proposition Number 9 (SJR 9)

SJR 9 would amend the constitution to authorize the governor, on the written recommendation and advice of the Board of Pardons and Paroles, to grant a pardon, reprieve, or commutation of punishment to a person who successfully completes a term of deferred adjudication community supervi sion.

The proposed amendment appears on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the governor to grant a pardon to a person who successfully completes a term of deferred adjudication community supervision."

Most of the top players use natural bidding, but some employ highly artificial methods to improve their chances of reaching the perfect contract on every deal. Today's hand, on which North-South reached the perfect contract of seven clubs on a 4-3

fit, provides an apt illustration. The deal occurred in the annual Reisinger team championship. North was Ron Rubin, and South was Mike Becker, both multinational champions. They reached the club grand slam after one of the longest bidding sequences on record.

It started with a normal one-spade bid by North, but from then on most bids were artificial, with South asking North at each turn to describe his hand. Two clubs was artificial and game-forcing, and two hearts showed unbalanced distribution. Three diamonds over East's double of two hearts indicated precisely five spades and four diamonds!

Three hearts was once again artificial and said "Tell me more." Three spades showed one heart and three clubs!

Four clubs said "Tell me more," and four diamonds said "I have a minimum opening bid." Four hearts asked for the number of controls (ace equals two, king equals one), and four spades showed three. Four notrump asked "Where are they?"

Five diamonds showed the king of clubs; five hearts said "Tell me more." Five notrump showed the ace of spades and denied the queen of diamonds!

So Becker concluded that his partner had both black queens for his opening bid and therefore bid seven clubs, which he made easily after

ruffing a heart in the dummy. **Purists will note** that only with clubs as trump can 13 tricks be made. Only 12 tricks are available in either spades or notrump.

PHILADELPHIA (AP) The "All-Hype" team finally played up to their super expectations.

Michael Vick threw two touchdown passes, LeSean McCoy had a career-best 185 yards rushing and two scores and the Philadelphia Eagles routed the Dallas Cowboys 34-7 Sunday night.

Dallas defensive coordinator Rob Ryan fired up the Eagles with some trash-talking during the summer after they added several big-name players

"all-hype" team and predicted the Cowboys would "beat their (butt)."

He was way off.

The Eagles (3-4) dominated right from the start, improved to 13-0 after a bye under coach Andy Reid and snapped a fivegame losing streak at Lincoln Financial Field that dated to last season.

The long-haired Ryan paced the sideline and desperately tried to figure out how to stop Vick and Co. It didn't happen until the fourth quarter when the game was out of reach.

played a defense that came in ranked seventh in the NFL.

DeMarcus Ware was one of the few players who played well for Dallas (3-4). He had four sacks, and has 12 this season.

Coming off a 253-yard rushing performance in a win over St. Louis, Cowboys rookie De-Marco Murray was held to 74 yards on only eight carries.

The defending NFC East champion Eagles entered the passes for 279 yards and led six former Pro Bowl players in free agency and trades.

claimed "Dream Team" backup quarterback Vince Young gave the Eagles that label after signing a one-year deal — was overhyped as Ryan boldly declared in August.

After two straight wins, the Eagles are in a three-way tie with Dallas and Washington for second place behind the New York Giants (5-2).

Vick completed 21 of 28

sacked four times and threw an interception to Nnamdi Asomugha.

McCoy had 80 of Philadelphia's 115 yards rushing in the first quarter. That was more than Dallas allowed in any game this season. The Eagles entered with the No. 1-ranked rushing offense and the Cowboys had the topranked run defense.

The Eagles took the kickoff and drove 79 yards for their first opening-drive TD this season. Vick was sacked by Ware on the first play, but he connected with Jeremy Maclin for 24 yards on the next one. McCoy had a 21-yard run and Vick scrambled 15 yards to the Cowboys 13. On third-and-9 from the 12, Vick tossed a screen pass to Maclin, who followed a lead block by Jason Peters into the end zone. Vick led the Eagles 90 yards with McCoy running in from the 2 for a 14-0 lead. McCoy had runs of 11 and 34 yards before scoring for the seventh straight game. He's one short of Steve Van Buren's team record set in 1947. Asomugha set up Philadelphia's third scoring drive by picking off Romo's pass at the Eagles 33 after the ball bounced off Martellus Bennett's hands. Vick kept the drive going with a 9-yard run on thirdand-8, and made a perfect pass to Jason Avant for a 20yard gain on another thirdand-8. He threw a strike to Brent Celek in the back of the end zone on the next play for a 9-yard TD and a 21-0 lead. The Eagles had a first down at the Cowboys 6 on their fourth possession, but settled for a 23-yard field goal by Alex Henery that made it 24-0. Henery kicked a 26-yarder to make it 27-0 in the third quarter. McCoy's 13-yard run put Philadelphia up 34-0 in the fourth. But the Cowboys spoiled the shutout bid on the ensuing possession when Romo threw a 70-yard TD pass to Laurent Robinson.





# Texans remain on top of AFC South with win

HOUSTON (AP) -The Texans are learning how to win, even when their high-powered offense has an off day.

Arian Foster rushed for 112 yards and a touchdown, and Houston shut down rookie Blaine quarterback Gabbert and the NFL's worst offense in a 24-14 win over the Jaguars on Sunday.

Matt Schaub threw a touchdown pass and ran for another score for Houston (5-3), off to its best eight-game start. The Texans also took one more step toward the franchise's first division title and playoff berth by improving to 3-0 in the AFC South.

"We knew it was going to be a tough, dirty game," said Houston linebacker Brian Cushing, who led his team with seven tackles. "In get a win. We just had to do what we had to do."

The Texans have outscored their division opponents by a total score of 99-28. This was the closest of the three games, mostly due to two Houston fumbles that led to Jacksonville touchdowns.

Schaub completed 16 of 30 passes and was sacked twice, and the once Texans again missed star receiver Andre Johnson, who sat out for the fourth straight game with a hamstring injury.

Unlike past seasons, Houston can rely on its defense to pick up the slack.

The Texans stayed in control by holding Jacksonville to 61 yards and five first downs in the second half. Gabbert, making his sixth career

this league, it's tough to start, completed 10 of 30 passes for 97 yards and two interceptions in the game, for an anemic 26.7 rating.

"We had a defense that stood up and said, 'We're gonna win the game," Houston coach Gary Kubiak said. "They were excellent all day, exceptional."

The Jaguars (2-6)couldn't carry over momentum from their surprising 12-7 win over Baltimore on Monday night. Maurice Jones-Drew was limited to 63 yards on 18 carries, and says the entire offense bears some of the blame for Gabbert's struggles.

"We have to continue to give him time in the pocket. We have to catch the ball when he throws it," Jones-Drew said. "The quarterback is only as good as the players around him. So obviously, if he's not doing well, we're not doing well."

The Texans got off to another fast start, scoring on their opening series for the fifth time. Schaub went 4 for 5 and then sprinted for a 2-yard touchdown with 8:21 left in the first quarter.

Jacksonville's sixthranked defense held Baltimore to 34 yards rushing Monday night, but Houston matched that total on its first three possessions.

Gabbert was hurt on Jacksonville's first series.

Forced to scramble, he slid awkwardly at the end of an 11-yard run and was hit by safety Glover Quin and Cushing.

Trainers helped Gabbert off the field with bruised ribs, and Luke McCown replaced him. Gabbert returned on

Jacksonville's next possession, then threw five straight incompletions.

The Texans' offense bogged down, too, failing to convert three consecutive third downs.

"We wanted to get everyone involved," Schaub said. "We had some opportunities down the field, and I missed a few of the throws. I've got to make those plays for us to be successful as an offense."

A slick play by Jacksonville's defense midway through the second quarter created the Jaguars' best scoring chance of the game.

Clint Session sacked Schaub and forced a fumble, triggering an impromptu double-lateral.

Two snaps later, Gabbert threw a short TD pass to Jason Hill, Jacksonville's first touchdown since the third quarter of a 17-13 loss to Pittsburgh two weeks ago.

The Jaguars were lucky to be tied at halftime after producing 113 yards in the half.

"We are working our butts off," Jacksonville coach Jack Del Rio said, "and I'd sure like to have a little more validation for the type of effort that's being put forth."

Jacoby Jones returned a punt to the Jaguars 44 early in the third quarter, and Schaub threw a 7-yard touchdown pass to Joel Dreessen.



# Alves wins bull riding title

LAS VEGAS (AP) -Silvano Alves held on to his sizable lead to win the Professional Bull Riders world title and \$1 million bonus, and Robson Palermo jumped from fourth to first place Sunday to take home \$250,000 as the winner of the six-round event at Thomas & Mack Center.

Alves, from Pilar Do Sul, Brazil, finished with a 2,706.25-point margin over Palermo, from Rio Branco, Brazil, for his

first PBR season title. He earned just over \$1.4 million in 2011.

Alves scored 88.25 on Big Iron in the fifth round, and was third with a 92.25 on Yellow Jacket Jr. in the championship round, both Sunday.

"That (Yellow Jacket Jr.) was a really hard bucking bull," Alves said. "He bucked away from my hand to make it more difficult to ride him. It took everything that I know how to do, all my knowledge, to stay on his back. I knew that I had to ride him today.

"I managed to do this without becoming injured this year. All I can really say is that I'm going to keep trying next year to do it again.

> Barbosa's fourth successful ride in five rounds gave him 357.25 points and put him ahead of Sanderson, who was bucked off Unser Racing Bull in 5.18 seconds in round five. Sanderson was the lone rider to have ridden all of his first four bulls for a score.

> Barbosa entered the championship round ahead of Palermo with 353 points, Guilherme Marchi of Leme, Brazil, with 351, Sanderson with 348.25, Alves with 342.5 and J.B. Mauney of Mooresville, N.C., with 333.5. The top six were the lone riders to have gone 4-for-5 over the first five rounds. Barbosa was trying to become the third competitor to claim the event and Rookie of the Year titles during the same year of this 18-year-old event. Luke Snyder (2001) and Jody Newberry (2003) were the only rookies who had won the PBR World Finals in past years. "For me it's a very big deal to win Rookie of the Year, especially because I got here halfway through the year," Barbosa said. "I think it's really difficult to win with only half a season, so for me it's an awesome honor."
