# Bovina couple injured in two-vehicle mishap

A Bovina couple was injured Friday morning in a two-vehicle accident about seven miles east of Dimmitt on state high

MRS. KATHRYN Burns Hancock, 62, and her husband, T. S. Hancock, 65, were both injured when their 1973 Mercury struck a 1951 grain truck driven by Stephen W. Anderle, 22. of Nazareth. Anderle was not injured.

According to investigating officer Dyrle Maples, both vehicles were eastbound at the time of the accident. Mrs. Hancock was driving the car and apparently attempted to pass the truck as it was turning left onto a county road. The car struck the rear of the truck at an angle and spun it around.

Mrs. Hancock suffered a broken leg and Mr. Hancock suffered a fractured forearm. Both were rushed to Plains Memorial Hospital by Dennis ambulance and later transferred to Lubbock Methodist Hos-

Maples reported that Hancock was apparently asleep in the back seat of the car at the time of the accident, and might have been killed had he been riding in the front passenger

City to buy shotguns, pistols for policemen

# Weapon purchases okayed

City commissioners voted to purchase shotguns and pistols for city policemen and deleted units 13 and 20 from the city's spring paving project at Mon-

lay night's meeting. CITY POLICE Chief W. W. lones appeared before the commission and requested that the city provide a police radio operator between the hours of midnight and 8 a.m. He also requested that the city buy three shotguns for policemen at a cost of \$85 each and four





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

The problem, say Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials, is that the substances used for waterproofing are


highly flammable. Once a spark from a lantern or stove or the ember from a campfire or cigarette starts the tent burning, occupants are surrounded by walls of flame in

a matter of seconds. Safety experts say that illumination inside a tent should always be done by flashlights or the new neon camp lights.

COOKING inside a tent is just asking for trouble, not only from fire but also from carbon monoxide poisoning as well.

Campfires should be well away from tents, and careful consideration should be made concerning the wind. Campers should remember that the wind direction can change in the middle of the night, making a safe campfire in to a very dangerous one.

AG CREDIT OUTLOOK IS GOOD

Although agricultural loans are expected to increase 15 to 20 percent during 1974, rural areas should have the funds to cover them, believes an economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. And the price of loans should remain about the same as in 1973. Country banks in Texas have larger deposits now due to increased prices received by farmers. Deposits at the beginning of the year were up from 10 to 20 percent depending on the area of the state. Loans from rural banks were also up more than 20 percent in volume from a year ago. Although the agricultural credit outlook is good, farmers and ranchers need to give special attention to keeping complete records to back up loan requests.



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


