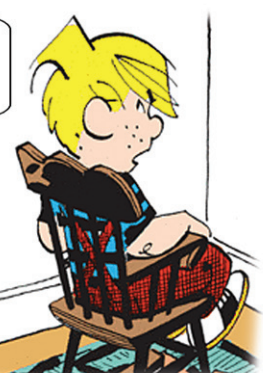

Christmas Child boxes go out today

Time is running out for area residents looking to help brighten the holiday for children around the globe, as today is the last day to submit gift-laden shoeboxes for the annual Operation Christmas Child effort.

The project is offered annually by the Samaritan's Purse charity to provide shoeboxes full of gifts to children all over the world, according to Brenda Franklin, Operation Christmas Child relay center

coordinator. Franklin said boxes will be available for donors to pick up at the Big Spring drop off point of Allan's Furniture until 4 p.m. today.

"The nationwide push for Operation Christmas Child started last week," Franklin said. "We have boxes available, so all our donors have to do is get their items together and ready to go."

Franklin said participating in the annual program is simple, and regardless what country the box of holiday goodies ends up in, it's sure to bring a smile to the face of

the child receiving it.

"All they need to do is get a shoe box and fill it with different items," said Franklin. "Things like toys and hygiene items are always a good idea. Please don't include anything that's a liquid, like lotion or shampoo, or anything that comes in an aerosol can. No breakables, such as snow globes and things like that. When picking out toys, please don't include anything that might be considered war related, such as toy guns or knives. Perishables, like chocolate and other food items, should also be left out.

"Once they have their box filled they can drop it off here at Allan's Furniture, located at 202 Scurry in downtown Big Spring. We'll then pack up all the boxes into a crate and send them to the processing station in Odessa.

"These boxes will be the only thing many of these children will have to open Christmas morning," she added. "Many donors will put scriptures and words of encouragement in the gift, as well, so I feel like we're helping to deliver a really good message."

A \$7 donation is requested — but not required — to help with the shipping costs, and can be left inside the box, according to the Operation Christmas

Child Web site. Franklin said donors should mark their box for either a boy or girl in age groups of two to four years; five to nine and 10 to 14 years of age. The boxes can be decorated with Christmas paper but the lid must be able to be separated from the

box. “There is so much power in a simple gift,” said Franklin. “Children around the world get a chance to hear of God’s love through a simple shoe box filled with many different items. It warms my heart to see all the boxes

according to law enforcement officials, with the accident reported just moments after midnight Sunday.

According to the accident report filed with the Big Spring Police Department, Lewis was a passenger in the Maxima, which was being driven by her husband, who was later flown to University Medical Center in Lubbock by Air Evac. His condition was unknown this morning.

The driver of the Suburban, Pedro Herrera, 29, of Big Spring, suffered only minor wounds and refused medical attention and transportation at the scene.

According to the police report, the Maxima was traveling east on FM 700 toward the SMMC south entrance when the driver crossed over the median lane and into the westbound lane, striking the Suburban head-

“In a head-on collision like that, it can be really hard to imagine how much force is generated,” said BSPD Det. George Oliver. “If both vehicles are going the speed limit — which is 50 mph on that stretch of roadway — then when the two vehicles hit head-on, it was the equivalent of a vehicle driving into a brick wall at 100 mph. The results are catastrophic.”

Oliver said the accident is currently under investigation by the BSPD. No charges or citations have been issued.

According to the accident report, the roadway was dry and the weather was clear at the time of the accident. Oliver said it’s unclear what may have caused or contributed to the tragedy.

'al-Qaida sympathizer' accused of bomb plots

NEW YORK (AP) — An "al-Qaida sympathizer" accused of plotting to bomb police and post offices in New York City as well as U.S. troops returning home remained in police custody after an arraignment Sunday on numerous terrorism-related charges.

Jose Pimentel of Manhattan was described by Mayor Michael Bloomberg at a news conference announcing Pimentel's arrest as "a 27-year-old al-Qaida sympathizer" who was motivated by terrorist propaganda and resentment of U.S. troops in Afghanistan and Iraq. Police Commissioner Raymond Kelly said police had to move quickly to arrest Pimentel on Saturday because he was ready to carry out his plan.

"He was in fact putting this bomb together," Kelly said. "He was drilling holes and it would have been not appropriate for us to let him walk out the door with that bomb."

Ten years after 9/11, New York remains a prime terrorism target. Bloomberg said at least 14 terrorist plots, including the latest alleged scheme, have targeted the city since the Sept. 11 attacks. No attack has been successful, however. Pakistani immigrant Faisal Shahzad is serving a life sentence for trying to detonate a car bomb in Times Square in May 2010.

Kelly said Sunday that Pimentel was energized and motivated to carry out his plan by the Sept. 30 killing of al-Qaida's U.S.-born cleric Anwar al-Awlaki.

Hezbollah unmask U.S. spies; CIA hurt in Lebanon

WASHINGTON (AP) — The CIA's operations in Lebanon have been badly damaged after Hezbollah identified and captured a number of U.S. spies recently, current and former U.S. officials told The Associated Press. The intelligence debacle is particularly troubling because the CIA saw it com-

ing.

Hezbollah's longtime leader, Sheik Hassan Nasrallah, boasted on television in June that he had rooted out at least two CIA spies who had infiltrated the ranks of Hezbollah, which the U.S. considers a terrorist group closely allied with Iran. Though the U.S. Embassy in Lebanon officially denied the accusation, current and former officials concede that it happened and the damage has spread even further.

In recent months, CIA officials have secretly been scrambling to protect their remaining spies — foreign assets or agents working for the agency — before Hezbollah can find them.

To be sure, some deaths are to be expected in shadowy spy wars. It's an extremely risky business and people get killed. But the damage to the agency's spy network in Lebanon has been greater than usual, several former and current U.S. officials said, speaking on condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to speak publicly about security matters.

The Lebanon crisis is the latest mishap involving CIA counterintelligence, the undermining or manipulating of the enemy's ability to gather information. Former CIA officials have said that once-essential skill has been eroded as the agency shifted from outmaneuvering rival spy agencies to fighting terrorists. In the rush for immediate results, former officers say, tradecraft has suffered.

Supercommittee failure would mean Congress' next fight could be over blocking automatic cuts

WASHINGTON (AP) — Failure by Congress' debt-cutting supercommittee to recommend \$1.2 trillion in savings by Wednesday is supposed to automatically trigger spending cuts in the same amount to accomplish that job.

But the same legislators who concocted that budgetary booby trap just

four months ago could end up spending the 2012 election year and beyond battling over defusing it.

Sens. John McCain, R-Ariz., and Lindsey Graham, R-S.C., say they are writing legislation to prevent what they say would be devastating cuts to the military. House Republicans are exploring a similar move. Democrats maintain they won't let domestic programs be the sole source of savings.

In the face of those efforts, President Barack Obama has told the debt panel's co-chairmen that he "will not accept any measure that attempts to turn off the automatic cut trigger," White House spokesman Jay Carney told reporters last week. The leaders of both parties in the House and Senate have expressed similar sentiments — seemingly making any attempt to restore the money futile.

"Yes, I would feel bound by it," House Speaker John Boehner, R-Ohio, said recently of the automatic cuts. "It was part of the agreement."

Police put on leave, Calif. college president vows system-wide probe in spraying of students

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The president of the University of California system said he was "appalled" at images of protesters being doused with pepper spray and plans an assessment of law enforcement procedures on all 10 campuses, as two police officers were placed on administrative leave in the incident that's reverberating around the nation.

"Free speech is part of the DNA of this university, and non-violent protest has long been central to our history," UC President Mark G. Yudof said in a statement Sunday in response to the spraying of students sitting passively at UC Davis. "It is a value we must protect with vigilance."

Yudof said it was not his intention to "micromanage our campus police forces," but he said all 10 chancellors would convene soon for a discussion "about how to ensure proportional law enforcement response to non-violent protest."

Protesters from Occupy Sacramento planned to travel to nearby Davis on Monday for a noon rally in solidarity

Cowboys defeat Redskins in overtime

LANDOVER (AP) — Tony Romo went this way and that way, scrambling to find Laurent Robinson for the game-tying touchdown and Jason Witten for the go-ahead score — both in the fourth quarter. When that wasn't enough, the Dallas quarterback used his

feet again in overtime, buying enough time to spot Dez Bryant on a third-and-15. The 26-yard completion set up Dan Bailey's winning field goal Sunday as the Cowboys won their third straight, topping the hard-luck Washington Redskins 27-24. "That's Romo. He's

like a snake, man," Washington linebacker Brian Orakpo said. "When you rush him, he's slippery. He's all over the place." Romo completed 23 of 37 passes for 292 yards and three touchdowns — plus no interceptions and a 100-plus quarterback rating for the

third straight week. He keeps, with no dispute, his title as the NFL's Mr. November as he improved to 18-2 with 49 TDs and 12 interceptions in the month. The Cowboys (6-4) also keep their momentum in what is shaping up to be a fascinating December duel with the New York

Giants for the NFC East title. "He makes it look easy," Witten said. "I think it starts with his ability to see it before the snap, and he has a great awareness about him and an ability to make those type of throws. He's done it for a long time."

On the heels of back-to-back double-digit wins, Romo and the Cowboys had to rally against a team that has been in the doldrums for more than a month. The Redskins (3-7) have lost six straight, the longest skid since owner

Red Raiders' defensive skills praised in win

LUBBOCK (AP) — The ball just complicates things in basketball, which is why Texas Tech coach Billy Gillispie said his defense is well ahead of the offense in terms of consistency.

He said his youth-laden team does not have to worry about turning the ball over or movement without the ball on defense, which led to Texas Tech's best defensive performance of the young season.

The Red Raiders' defense

shut down Stephen F. Austin, forcing a 33 percent shooting percentage out of the Lumberjacks en route to a 66-54 victory Sunday.

Gillispie praised sophomore guard Javarez Willis' pressure on the ball, forcing turnovers and disrupting the Lumberjack ball movement.

"I thought we had great ball pressure," Gillispie said. "I thought that 'Bean' (Willis) did a fantastic job of really disrupting every-

thing, for the most part of the game, really putting pressure on them because their offense is a lot better than it looked."

Texas Tech (3-0) led an 18-point second-half lead dwindle to 10 after Hal Bateman stole the ball from Willis and scored on a fast-break layup with 2:08 to go.

However, Texas Tech's defense stifled the Lumberjacks, continuing to force

Death of player leaves Ark football team at a loss

FAYETTEVILLE (AP) — Arkansas' football team was in mourning Sunday following the death of backup tight end Garrett Uekman.

The university said Uekman was pronounced dead at Washington Regional Medical Center in Fayetteville on Sunday.

The cause of death wasn't immediately known, but the university said Uekman was found unconscious and unresponsive in his dorm room on campus at approximately 11:15 a.m. Sunday. He was last seen playing video games by a roommate approximately an hour earlier.

When emergency services personnel arrived, Uekman was in cardiac arrest and was pronounced dead at 12:10 p.m.

"Garrett Uekman was a special member of our family, and we are all saddened by his passing," Arkansas

coach Bobby Petrino said in a statement. "His loss is a terrible shock, and it makes you realize how precious life is."

University police Lt. Mat Mills said there were no suspicious circumstances about Uekman's death, and his body will be sent to the state medical examiner for an autopsy.

Petrino spoke briefly Sunday night, fighting back tears as he read from a statement. He noted that Uekman's final game, Arkansas' 44-17 victory over Mississippi State on Saturday, was in Little Rock's War Memorial Stadium — where he played his high school games while at Little Rock Catholic.

Arkansas athletic director Jeff Long also spoke and said the university wasn't aware of any pre-existing medical condition with Uekman. He said the Razorbacks' players showed

"shock and dismay" when told of Uekman's death at an afternoon team meeting.

Long also said the school would hold a candlelight vigil Monday night in honor of Uekman and said his family had expressed the desire for the No. 3 Razorbacks to play Friday's game at No. 1 LSU as scheduled.

"Certainly the feelings of football's family (are) that of Arkansas and the Razorbacks were very important to him," Long said. "And that he would want us to continue to complete."

The 19-year-old Uekman redshirted last season for the Razorbacks and played in nine games this season. He was majoring in applied exercise science.

Uekman's parents, Danny and Michelle, released

Griffin, Baylor end OU's hopes of a championship

WACO (AP) — Baylor's Robert Griffin did more than just knock Oklahoma out of the national championship chase with his latest record-setting performance.

The offensive machine known as "RG3" likely put himself back in serious contention for the Heisman Trophy.

Don't expect an argument from Sooners coach Bob Stoops after Griffin threw for 479 yards and four touchdowns, including the game-winner with 8 seconds left that came right after Oklahoma had overcome a two-TD deficit to tie the game in the final minute.

"He's an excellent player," Stoops said. "I've known that for a long time."

While there was a deflected pass that turned into an 87-yard touchdown against the Sooners (8-2, 5-2 Big 12), Griffin hit plenty of receivers in stride.

Then after Oklahoma called a timeout hoping to get the ball one more time, Griffin scrambled for 22 yards. He ran for 8 more on the next play before two more passes — 12 yards to Kendall Wright, who had a record night of his own, and a 34-yarder to Terrance Williams for a 45-38 victory late Saturday night.

"The dude has the ability to take over a

game by himself, and you saw it, and it was amazing," Baylor linebacker Elliot Coffey said. "I'm just glad to be part of it."

Oklahoma plummeted seven spots to No. 12 in the new AP Top 25 on Sunday, and dropped from fifth to ninth in the BCS standings. The Bears (7-3, 4-3) moved up four spots to No. 21 in the AP poll.

The Sooners' first loss ever against Baylor (in 21 games) couldn't have come at a worse time.

Instead of taking advantage of losses by Big 12 rival and then-No. 2 Oklahoma State and No. 4 Oregon that would have pushed them up the line for a national title shot, the Sooners will now have to be content trying to win their eighth Big 12 title in 12 seasons and just get into one of the Bowl Championship Series games.

Certainly an opportunity lost, especially after Stanford and Boise State had both suffered their first losses the previous weekend while Oklahoma had an open date.

"Sure, we were aware of that. But

Today's Highlight in History:

On Nov. 21, 1973, President Richard Nixon's attorney, J. Fred Buzhardt (buh-ZAHRTD), revealed the existence of an 18-1/2-minute gap in one of the White House tape recordings related to Watergate.

On this date:

In 1789, North Carolina became the 12th state to ratify the U.S. Constitution.

In 1861, Judah Benjamin, who had been acting Confederate Secretary of War, was formally named to the post.

In 1920, the Irish Republican Army killed 12 British intelligence officers and two auxiliary policemen in the Dublin area; British forces responded by raiding a soccer match, killing 14 civilians.

In 1922, Rebecca L. Felton of Georgia was sworn in as the

first woman to serve in the U.S. Senate.

In 1931, the Universal horror film "Frankenstein," starring Boris Karloff as the monster and Colin Clive as his creator, was first released.

In 1969, the Senate voted down the Supreme Court nomination of Clement F. Haynsworth, 55-45, the first such rejection since 1930.

In 1974, bombs exploded at a pair of pubs in Birmingham, England, killing 21 people. (Six suspects were convicted of the attack, but the convictions of the so-called "Birmingham Six" were overturned in 1991.)

In 1980, 87 people died in a fire at the MGM Grand Hotel in Las Vegas, Nev.

In 1991, the U.N. Security Council chose Boutros Boutros-Ghali of Egypt to be Secretary-General.

them into awkward shots.

The Red Raiders were led by four players in double digits, with guard Ty Nurse scoring a game-high 14 points off the bench. Forwards Jordan Tolbert and Jaye Crockett stepped up in the paint when 6-foot-10 center Robert Lewandowski picked up two fouls in the first 1:34.

Tolbert finished with 10 points - on a perfect 5-for-5 shooting performance, while Crockett had 13 points and a game-high seven rebounds. Willis added 10 for Texas Tech, which had eight players score at least three points.

The Lumberjacks (1-2) failed to get much going inside, as pre-season All-Southland Conference pick Jereal Scott finished with six points and three rebounds in 19 minutes played.

"We didn't play very well inside today until late," Stephen F. Austin coach Danny Kaspar said. "You know, we're not getting much production from our first team all-conference player. He's gotta do better, or I'll sit him down. It's that simple."

Antonio Bostic led Stephen F. Austin with 11 points - the only Lumberjack with more than 10 points.

Texas Tech built a double-digit lead in the first seven minutes of the game with a 13-0 run, giving it a 15-5 lead after a Terran Petteway 3-pointer.

At that point, Kaspar told his team to force the Red Raiders to outside shots, hoping to get back into the game. Losing Lewandowski early in the game meant the Red Raiders lost their biggest and most experienced presence inside.

However, the Red Raiders made 14 of 17 field-goal attempts in the first half, hitting four 3-point attempts.

Gillispie said he was not tre-

mendously pleased with the way his team played offensively, although it had a high shooting percentage.

"I really believe that we lucked some shots in in the first half," he said, "but I never really had a comfortable feeling about how we were executing offensively."

He said the team needs to move more to get the ball inside, instead of settling for some of those long jumpers.

The first-year Texas Tech coach said his players were playing like the team had a bigger lead than it really did down the stretch.

The Lumberjacks cut the lead to 10 twice in the final two minutes, but Texas Tech's guards wasted enough time along the perimeter that the 10-point lead was insurmountable for a struggling Lumberjack offense.

Texas Tech lost its hot hand in the second half, making eight field goals on its 18 attempts.

Crockett was one of the few players in Sunday's game to find success inside the paint, working to get inside positioning to draw fouls against the Lumberjack's zone defense.

Stephen F. Austin went 9-of-17 from the free-throw line in the second half, also having trouble getting inside shots against the bigger Red Raiders.

Jonathan King led the Lumberjacks in rebounding, pulling down six boards and adding nine points. Stephen F. Austin had only five rebounds in the first half.

Texas Tech's turnover woes continued, as it eclipsed the 20-turnover mark for the second consecutive game. The Red Raiders had 19 turnovers in their first game against Troy.

"They played in a 1-3-1 press that we didn't prepare for," Willis said. "It was actually my fault. I wasn't thinking. I was being aggressive, but I wasn't being smart. So I'm pretty sure we'll be working on that, just being solid with the ball and just executing the offense like our coach wants us to."

there's absolutely no thought that we weren't ready for this game," Stoops said. "We worked hard and were prepared. We just didn't play well enough to give ourselves a chance to win."

The Sooners now have to beat Iowa State - which shocked Oklahoma State in double overtime Friday night - to set up the regu-

lar season finale against the instate rival Cowboys for the Big 12 title and the league's automatic BCS berth.

"We've just got to keep playing ball, our goal to win the Big 12 championship is still out in front of us," said Landry Jones, who completed 36 of 51 passes for 447 yards.

Griffin, the fourth-year junior already with 46 school records, broke his own single-game marks for passing yards (on 21

of 34 passes) and his 551 total yards. It was his fifth consecutive game with at least 400 total yards, and came a week after he directed the biggest fourth-quarter comeback in Baylor history - from 21 points down to win in overtime at Kansas.

"When the ball's in his hand, he's going to make good things happen, because he's very intelligent, very passionate, very gifted," Baylor coach Art Briles said.

a statement through the university.

"Our son was living his dream of going to the U of A and playing football for the Razorbacks," the statement read. "He loved his school, his coaches, and his teammates and classmates, and was an influence and inspiration to so many people. We ask for your love and prayers for Garrett, our family and his friends as we all cope with this heavy and painful loss."

David Estes, the football coach at Little Rock Catholic where Uekman played in high school, said he was told by Arkansas running backs coach Tim Horton that Uekman had been found by his roommate in his dorm room on campus. Estes said he watched Uekman play and was "beaming from ear to ear" Saturday night in War Memorial Stadium as the Razorbacks beat Mississippi State.

"Garrett was any parent or coach's dream," Estes said. "He was one of those special kids and had a passion for everything. He loved Catholic High, loves UA and wanted to be a Razorback forever."

Dan Snyder bought the team in 1999 and extending the longest losing run in Mike Shanahan's head coaching career. The 1998 team started 0-7.

At least they mounted a stern challenge this time, proving there's always some steam in the Dallas-Washington rivalry. The Redskins scored more points than the 20 they had in their three previous games combined. They sent the game to overtime on Rex Grossman's 4-yard fade pass to Donte' Stallworth with 14 seconds left in regulation and barely missed winning when Graham Gano's 52-yard field goal was barely wide right on the opening possession of the extra period.

"It's not one of those games where we just got beat down," said Washington's Jabar Gaffney, who caught seven passes for 115 yards and a touchdown. "We gave it away. We gave that one away. We've got to learn how to win again."

The Redskins also suffered another injury along the offensive line. Left tackle Trent Williams hurt the MCL in his left knee on the missed overtime field goal. Shanahan said the injury "didn't look very good."

Grossman, making his second start since regaining the starting job from John Beck, completed 25 of 38 passes for 289 yards with two touchdowns and one interception.

Gano's miss set the stage for a flashback moment. It was on a third-and-21 that Romo found Bryant open against cornerback DeAngelo Hall for a 30-yard gain that set up the winning field goal in the Cow-

boys' 18-16 win over the Redskins in Week 1. Hall was again the victim in the key Romo-to-Bryant connection Sunday, leading to Bailey's 39-yard field goal 9:21 into overtime.

"The way I'm playing right now, they need to go and cut me," Hall said, "because I'm definitely not worth what I'm getting."

All seemed set for a dreary Redskins day. They were slumping, and their rivals came in on a roll. There was minimal buzz for the usually electric "Dallas Week," and there were so many Cowboys fans in the stadium that a huge roar went up when it was announced that the visitors had won the opening coin toss. Washington hadn't scored in the first half or held a lead since Oct. 4 and was using its fifth starting offensive line configuration in six weeks.

Grossman's 4-yard quarterback draw in the second quarter ended the first-half touchdown drought, and his 16-yard pass to Gaffney made the score 14-10 just before halftime - giving Washington that elusive lead.

Rookie DeMarco Murray ran for 73 yards on a workhorse 25 carries and also caught a team-high six passes for 32 yards for the Cowboys. However, unlike the previous two weeks when he wasn't sacked, Romo couldn't escape the Redskins' pass rush - he went down four times.

Nevertheless, he extended plays when he needed to. With the Cowboys trailing 17-10, he tossed the 7-yard strike to Robinson, then rolled left to spot a wide-open Witten for a 59-yard score, a play that lasted almost as long as Romo's explanation.

"Once I got out of the pocket and started to roll, there was really one guy that was in the vicinity to where Jason's angle was going," he said. "So, I, just for a second, looked back. He kind of took it, stopped his feet. Because he was moving with me as I was moving left across the field with Jason right behind him, I just kind of stopped him with my eyes going back. He stopped, and then came back, and that's when he was out of position. Jason's angle was great, because he was kind of running away from him. It was perfect."

As simple as that. Notes: Dallas has won six of seven vs. Washington.

Redskins CB Josh Wilson left with a hamstring injury. S LaRon Landry was inactive with an ailing left Achilles tendon, and rookie LG Maurice Hurt was out with a knee injury. ... RB Tashard Choice, making his Redskins debut against his old team on his birthday, had six carries for 7 yards.
